Summer, with its soft blue sky and relaxing warm days, we greet with open arms.

But is each of us doing her bit to prepare to meet beauty with beauty?

For, of what use are the pleasant days and alluring fairy moonlight nights if one is not looking her best? Skin should glow with healthy color, eyes should sparkle, hair should shine.

Care of the skin is perhaps the most important duty owned beauty in summer time. For with the glare of sun, sweep of wind and splash of waves, tender skin is at the mercy of the elements unless she who cares will devote a little time and attention daily to her face.

Morning and Night

Daily, I repeat, twenty minutes a day will do the trick. But it must be each day—ten minutes in the morning and ten at night. First of all get an expert facial just to learn that invigorating rotating motion that eradicates wrinkles and lifts sagging muscles. At this time, too, have your skin diagnosed so you will know whether to buy your beauty aids for oily, dry or normal skin.

Then lay in your supplies. A jar each of some standard, thin, cleansing cream, a good tissue builder or tonic cream, an astringent and a non-greasy vanishing cream. Also a standard rubber face puffer and a box of cotton.

Step by Step
Begin your treatment, get your supplies together, sit down quietly before a good mirror and begin.

First apply the cleansing cream, beginning at the chin and rubbing upwards always as the face extends. Go gently but thoroughly over the entire face and neck, loosening all the particles of dirt. For in the matter of skin treatment, cleanliness comes second to nothing.

Now wipe off all traces of cream with a soft towel or tissue paper. Second, apply a little of the tissue cream and with your face puffer gently whip the sluggish skin to invigorate life.

Third, when the puffer has softly patted in as much of the cream as your skin can absorb, begin the massage. Place your thumbs at your temples, with arms well up and gently massage the facial muscles that lie under the surface of the skin and are responsible for that much desired firm, rounded contour. Always rub upwards and not too hard.

Always Upward
Again wipe face and neck with towel using the same upward stroke.

Fourth, dip a wad of cotton in astringent and lightly go over the entire face and neck. This closes the pores, freshens the skin and adds a delicate odor.

Fifth, wrap a piece of ice in a towel and, beginning at the chin, run the ice gently over the face, cooling and perfecting the closing of the pores.

Now, the Makeup
Now the face is ready for makeup. Glistening cleanliness, a healthy glow of transparent skin, and above all a certain spiritual benefit that flatters woman's ego and gives her that assurance that only good grooming can, are the next results that will accrue.

Remember that a thin, non-greasy vanishing cream and a soft powder make the best base.

There are many special preparations for outdoor sports, that appreciably increase summer beauty and therefore deserve consideration. These include sun powder, water proof cream and of course freckle creams that come both mild and strong to suit the varying crops certain misses grow.

MAILMEN WILL ASK APPROVAL OF ROADS BILL

WOULD HAVE \$75,000,000 ALLOTTED EACH YEAR FOR BETTER ROADS

(By Associated Press)
AMHERST, Texas, June 30.—Senators and congressmen of Texas will be asked by the Texas Rural Letter Carriers association in its annual meeting here on July 4, 5 and 6 to actively lend their support to a bill which will be presented to the next regular session of congress in which the body will be asked to appropriate \$75,000,000 each year for use in improving the post roads of the nation, according to Earle Slater of Clyde, president of the rural carriers state organization.

Measure Failed
According to Slater, such a measure was introduced during the last congress, but on account of lack of general interest never reached a vote. The national association of rural carriers have been considering the proposition and are favorable toward it, he declared, and he has assurance that the membership of the Texas division will favor it unqualifiedly.

The United States has at this time approximately 215,000 miles of post roads, according to Slater. In Texas alone, there are 65,000 miles of roads which are so designated and over which the carriers travel regularly in distributing mail to the rural people.

With \$75,000,000 annually from the federal treasury being expended in improving the post roads of the nation, Slater declares that in a few years the country would have a very good highway system designated.

Help Entire Country
"Such action from the national government," Slater says, "will not only benefit the rural carriers, but it will also be helpful to the entire country. One of the greatest needs of the nation today is for better roads and with the post roads put in better condition, hundreds of thousands of rural citizens will be the beneficiaries."

Texas carriers, in their coming meeting here, will likely memorialize the state of Texas to designate the post roads in this state as secondary highways and ask further that these roads be given more attention from the highway department, Slater thinks.

Ferguson Burial To Be Made At Bartlett Friday
