Rains Over County Help Some Areas

First general rain in the county since the month of May fell in Mitchell County Friday night with Landers community boasting 1.5 inch.

Other parts of the county received amounts varying from .70 inch to .75 inch.

Colorado City official weather station reported only .21 inch.

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Some farmers in the drought-ridden areas, south and west, have been plowing up the sorry cotton, reported Eddie Braswell, manager of the ASCS office here. Rain now, however, brightens the picture for dry-planted maize and will help the parched ranges.

Cotton crop in the deep sand or on sub-irrigated acreage north of town will definitely benefit from the first rain seen in August, Braswell added.

Rain record for all of 1964 has been stingy and scant. July brought only .18 here in 31 days.

It rained .89 inch Jan. 29, .21 Jan. 30 to start the year off with 1.10 inch the first month. February's total was only .38 inch total for eight scattered days of scattered showers.

Precipitation for March was 1.34 inch. April was dry and brought only .33 inch in town.

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First Classes September 2

All students who expect to attend senior or junior high school in this September are to show up for final registration beginning Tuesday, announces Frank W. Wilson, superintendent of schools here.

Seniors and freshmen are to complete registration Tuesday from 9 a. m. until 12 noon and from 1 p. m. to 4 p. m.

All students, both newcomers and former students, may report to junior and senior high buildings on a "come and go" schedule.

Juniors and eighth grade students have the same morning and afternoon hours for final registration, Wednesday.

Sophomores and seventh grade pupils are expected to report sometime between 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. Thursday.

Thursday and Friday, August 27-28, is set aside for registration of new pupils expecting to go to school at Primary building, grades 1-3, and at Hutchinson School, grades 4-6. "Come and go" hours will begin at 8:30 a. m. and end at 12 noon.

First day of regular classes in all schools is Wednesday, Sept. 2. Cafeterias will be open and school buses will be on regular schedule, Wilson said.

Wallace School will complete registration of all pupils that day; and will then begin regular classes. Citizens are reminded that there will be no first grade classes in Wallace this term as all Colorado City first grade children will enroll at Primary School.

First holiday of the new term is just around the corner from first full day school Monday, Sept. 7, will be a full holiday in observance of annual Labor Day, here, the superintendent said.

Orientation for all Colorado City teachers begins Monday, August 31 and continues through Tuesday, Sept. 1.

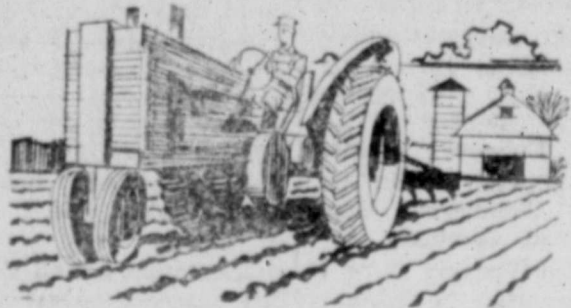

SMACK in the middle of August is as good a time as any to reflect on the matter of giving — and getting — free advice.

So much depends upon the motive of the advice giver. There is no slightest doubt that it was some old mama bird, who thought up the ancient advice which goes "The early bird always gets the worm."

Any mama worm in her right mind would advise her little worm children just to learn to sleep late.

TROUBLE with most free advice is that it's worth just about what it costs. Nothing.

The exception, here, is advice people sometimes manage to get in sidewalk consultations with the family doctor or coffee-break suggestions from lawyer or auto mechanic, maybe.

Average man or woman doesn't have so much at stake and can just let go with "If I were you" to the heart's content without danger of losing a possible paying customer in the future.

THERE are always people in this world who can tell you how to raise your kids better, how to save money, how to hold your husband, how to stick to a diet and what to do when in-laws visit too often and too long.

Not all of them make their living writing columns, but plenty of 'em do.

ADVICE compiled from the average lovelorn column could confuse an earnest seeker after the best way to catch and keep a man.

"Keep him guessing, always," advises one. "Always let him be sure of you and your utter devotion," reads the next.

The same holds for most all advice, written or spoken. Count calories. Calories don't count. Exercise. Don't bother to exercise.

View this contradicting child-rearing advice from different journals: "Take a boy to the woodshed often enough and you'll never have to take him to juvenile court."

"Any parent who has to paddle a child, openly admits the kid's smarter than he himself is."

THING you learn, after a while, is to pick and choose just what part of all that free advice is worth trying.

To go around trying to follow all of it, all at once and you'll wind up like the man who jumped on his horse and rode off in all four directions at once.

You get nowhere a-tall.

SHAKESPEARE said it best, as usual, when he wrote simply "Twere easier to tell twenty what were good to be done than to be one of the twenty to follow after mine own teaching."

How true! Way we've got it figured for now is to ignore all advice, also as usual, and to spend all the rest of our days just giving it. It's not only easier, it's more practical, for a born figure-outer of other people's problems.

GIST and sum of it for most of us, anyhow, is that if we could all do as well figuring out our own problems and running our own lives as we all think we could do with everybody else's little old trials, this would be a better world.

This be the truth from cradle to hearse.

Our very own problems are just so much worse.
