### Livestock Show Association Buys Cross Plains Arena and Grand Stand

Cisco was assured of a modern rodeo plant Monday when it was announced by the Cisco Livestock Show Association that they had purchased the arena, grandstand and equipment of the Cross Plains Rodeo Association.

The plant will be taken down in Cross Plains and brought to Cisco where it will be rebuilt at the Livestock Show grounds just north of Cisco Junior College. The stands will seat some 1,500 persons and the arena and the chutes and pens are in good condition.

Plans for the use of the plant have not been worked out but tentatively call for a Rodeo to be held in connection with the annual livestock show held here,

and the holding of regular matched roping contests.

The newly formed Cisco Rodeo Club has assumed the responsibility for taking down the plant, moving it to Cisco and rebuilding it. The members plan to begin at once on the project and will use practically all volunteer labor.

Officials of the Rodeo plan to begin their work Saturday and asked to call Sandy Sanders, Ted Hale or the Daily Press before Saturday so that arrangements could be made for their transportation, which will be furnished. Steeple pullers, pliers, hammers and nail bars were needed to assist in the work.

A. Z. Myrick is president of the Cisco Livestock Show Association and Ted Hale is president of the Rodeo Club.

The purchase price was not revealed but it was reported that the plant was purchased for a small per cent of its original cost.

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## Letters

Not a drop of precious, life-giving water that falls in West Texas should ever be permitted to reach the Gulf of Mexico. Our entire annual rainfall is no more than one-fourth of what West Texas needs to survive and develop industrially, commercially and agriculturally.

That is the opinion of West Texans who have given the vi-

tal water problems serious consideration and study.

The water conservation program, sponsored by West Texas Chamber of Commerce, is practical, complete and comprehensive. Many lakes, large and small, are planned. In fact, a water reservoir wherever one can possibly be built, urges the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The organization is leading the state in this movement.

Farmers are urged to terrace

their land and build lakes and ponds, to hold and control all rainfall. The thirsty soil needs every drop of water that falls on it.

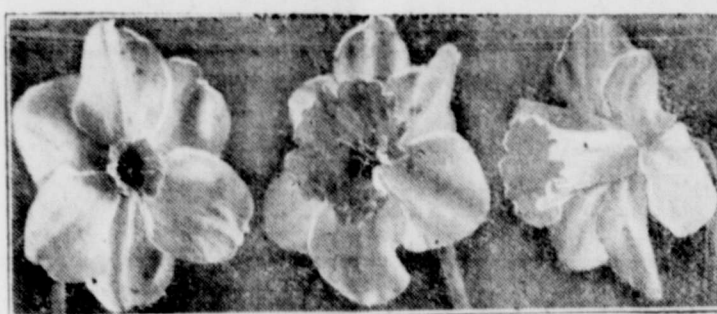
Lakes and reservoirs must be built on all rivers and streams to furnish water for the towns and cities, or West Texas faces disaster. These will require extensive planning and financing, but small lakes and ponds on farms can be built quickly and cheaply, and with government aid in most cases.

Already Texas farmers have 200,000 private lakes and ponds on their farms, supplying a large food item in fresh fish. There are said to be good locations for that many more. An acre of lake will provide 300 pounds of fish a year if fertilized and cared for. An acre of Texas pasture produces 150 pounds of beef.

Any farmer can secure complete information about private lakes and soil conservation from his county agent, or conservation director, and instruction on building and financial aid. This is one of the most profitable operation on any farm.

## Poetic Daffodil Easiest Fall Bulb for Beginners

Most lasting of the bulbs planted in the fall are those lovely spring flowers which have three names—daffodils, jonquils, narcissi. Call them by either name and you will be correct for all practical and poetic purposes. The poets seem to prefer the first two, and the botanists use the last.

The flowers inspire the poets, because they are true heralds of spring, blossoming soon after the ground thaws, the first large blossoms in the garden. Of all fall bulbs they are probably the easiest for the amateurs to grow. They bloom each spring for many years without replanting, and with small attention. Many types multiply until they crowd, when they should be lifted, divided and replanted over a larger area.

The principal difference between the types is in the size of the trumpet, which vary from the large trumpet varieties, which when well grown rise two feet high with flowers six inches across and trumpets three inches long, to the poetic types whose trumpets are mere cups, usually of bright red.

Hybrid varieties between these extremes have trumpets of varying sizes. While large trumpets are so far limited in color to white and yellow, there are medium trumpet varieties which have red and orange trumpets, combined with white or yellow petals, in vivid contrast.

Broeders have long sought to produce "pink daffodils," and a few varieties have been introduced which have trumpets faintly suffused with pink when grown in greenhouses, or in shady places outdoors. But this color fades quickly in the sun.

Daffodils thrive in woods, where they can be naturalized and grow with little attention. They like to nestle at the feet of shrubs, or under trees, where they blossom before the leaves come out in locations which then are in the sun, but later will be shaded. They are seldom lifted oftener than once in three years. But never plant them where their foliage will be cut off before it turns yellow, which indicates that a new bulb has been formed and has matured.

Some of them are delightfully fragrant. They are ideal cut flowers, as is shown by the quantities of daffodils forced and sold by florists each winter. The trumpet varieties are easily grown as house plants, provided only that the atmosphere is not too dry, in which case buds often blast. The sooner daffodils are planted in the fall, the better; it gives them more time to make roots and become established in the new location before the freeze-up. They need this time, because they blossom so early in the spring. They have little time to grow then, after the ground thaws out.

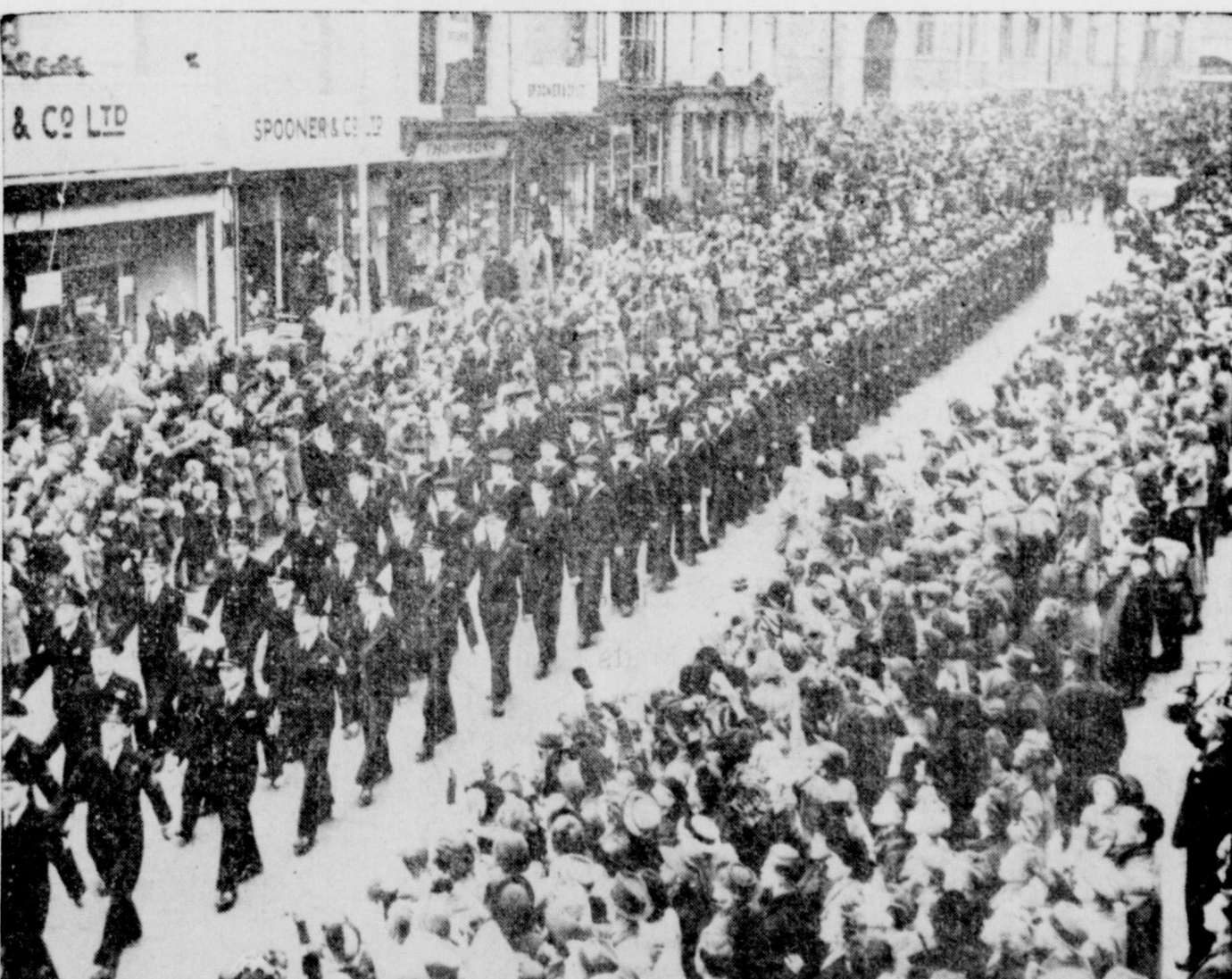

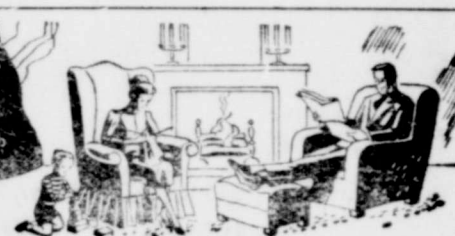

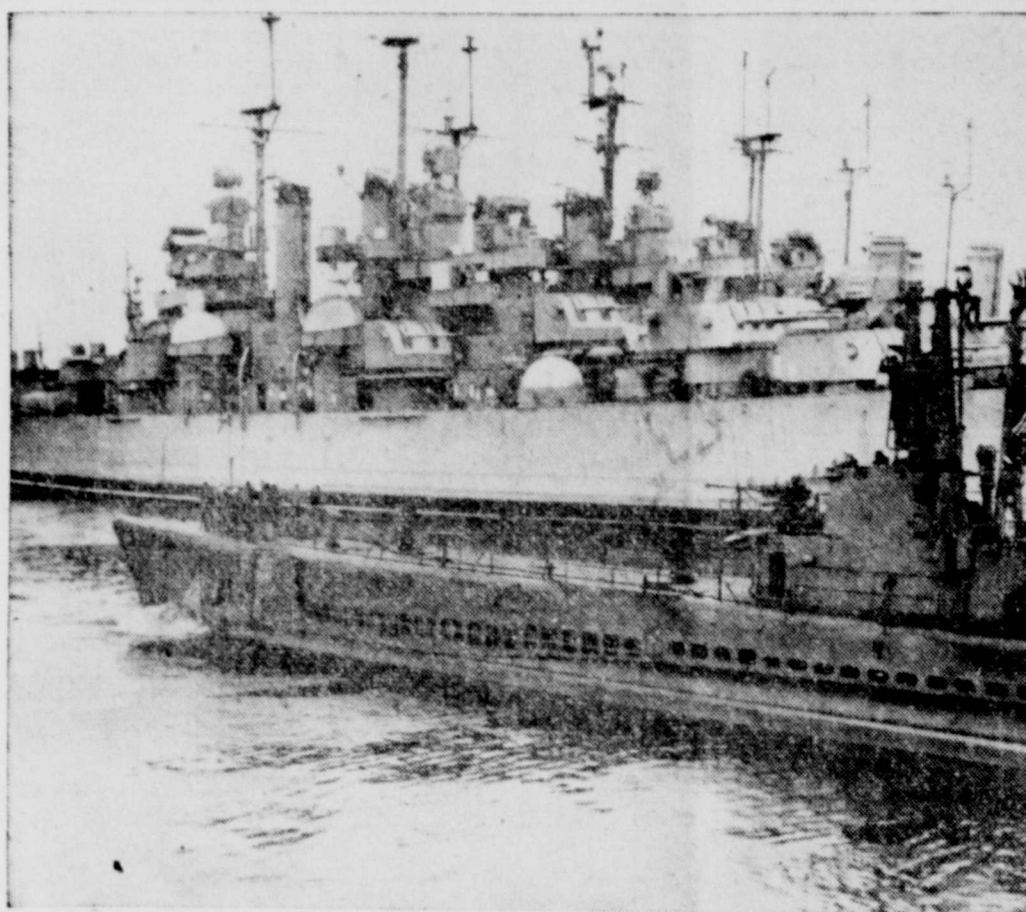

## VA Appeals For More Nurses

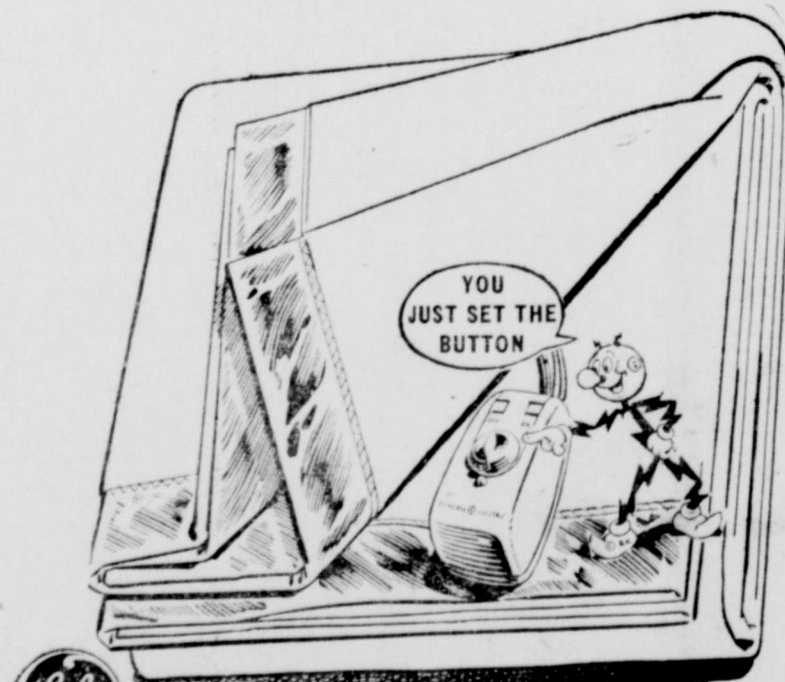
