New Roof Okayed For Junior High

School board members looked at a \$410 cost increase and agreed to go ahead with re-roofing of Colorado Junior High.

Cost will be at least \$8,577, according to latest figures from an Abilene roofing firm.

That sum is \$410 more than an \$8,167 proposal from the same company last September.

The new roof is sorely needed at Junior High. It has been on the list of "musts" facing school officials for months and months.

However, it has been postponed in the face of other necessities and the continuing pinch of finances.

Board members authorized Supt. Lloyd McKee to negotiate a contract with Lydick-Hooks Roofing Company now.

The roofing company notified McKee last month that price increases had sent the cost figure up to \$8,577 from the earlier September sum.

Additional price hikes are contemplated this month, according to the company.

The coal tar pitch roof is one of two major repair bills facing Colorado Independent School District immediately. Also coming is extensive work on the boiler and heating plant at Colorado High -- a job which is expected to cost from \$2,500 to more than \$6,000, but a job that must be done.

In another phase of school business, the board of trustees discussed the possibility of revising the district's policies regarding student suspension and expulsion.

Other schools will be checked,

especially in regard to suspension and expulsion relating to habitual or prolonged absenteeism.

Colorado City schools now have policies and regulations pertaining to suspension (a temporary status placed by principal) and expulsion (permanent status requiring action of the board). Data obtained in the current study will determine if there is a need for revision.

Adopted a school district calendar for the 1971-72 school year, beginning next August 23 with teacher in-service and concluding June 2, 1972, with teacher in-service.

Approved a trip for Colorado High vocal music students April 23-24 for First Annual Greater Southwest Musical Festival in Amarillo.

The trip for approximately 47 students with the school providing buses and drivers and entrance fees. Bake, candy, stationary and spring concert

ticket sales will provide about \$521 from choir students toward the trip.

The board also heard reports from Colorado High Principal Wally Price and Athletic Director Weldon Brevard concerning the 1971-72 athletic budget and plans.

It appeared that the athletic director and board are pointing to an athletic budget of approximately \$32,000 for the next school year.

If that develops, then athletic expenditures may be slight under recent years when expenditures repeatedly exceeded budget limits.

Brevard reported on his work since arriving here several weeks ago to become head of the school sports program. He also invited board members to visit the field house and dressing rooms to inspect clean-up work and other improvements. Price outlined plans for better See ROOF Page 7

Each of the Youth Tour participants will be given a set of colored slides showing highlights of the Washington trip. It is expected that the young people will use the slides in reporting the events of their Youth Tour experience to local groups, such as youth groups, service clubs, church groups, farm groups, or any organization desiring an interesting program for its meeting.

Being at the helm of the association is not new to the local ginner. It is his second term as president, having served in the office also in 1966.

Hargrove is one of three persons with the distinction of being elected to two terms as president of the cooperative ginners.

The new president succeeds Eulis Ray Sinton.

Hargrove was elected and installed at the 19th Joint Annual Meeting of Texas Federation of Cooperatives, Houston Bank For Cooperatives and Texas

Cooperative Ginners Association.

ing east on the same access road.

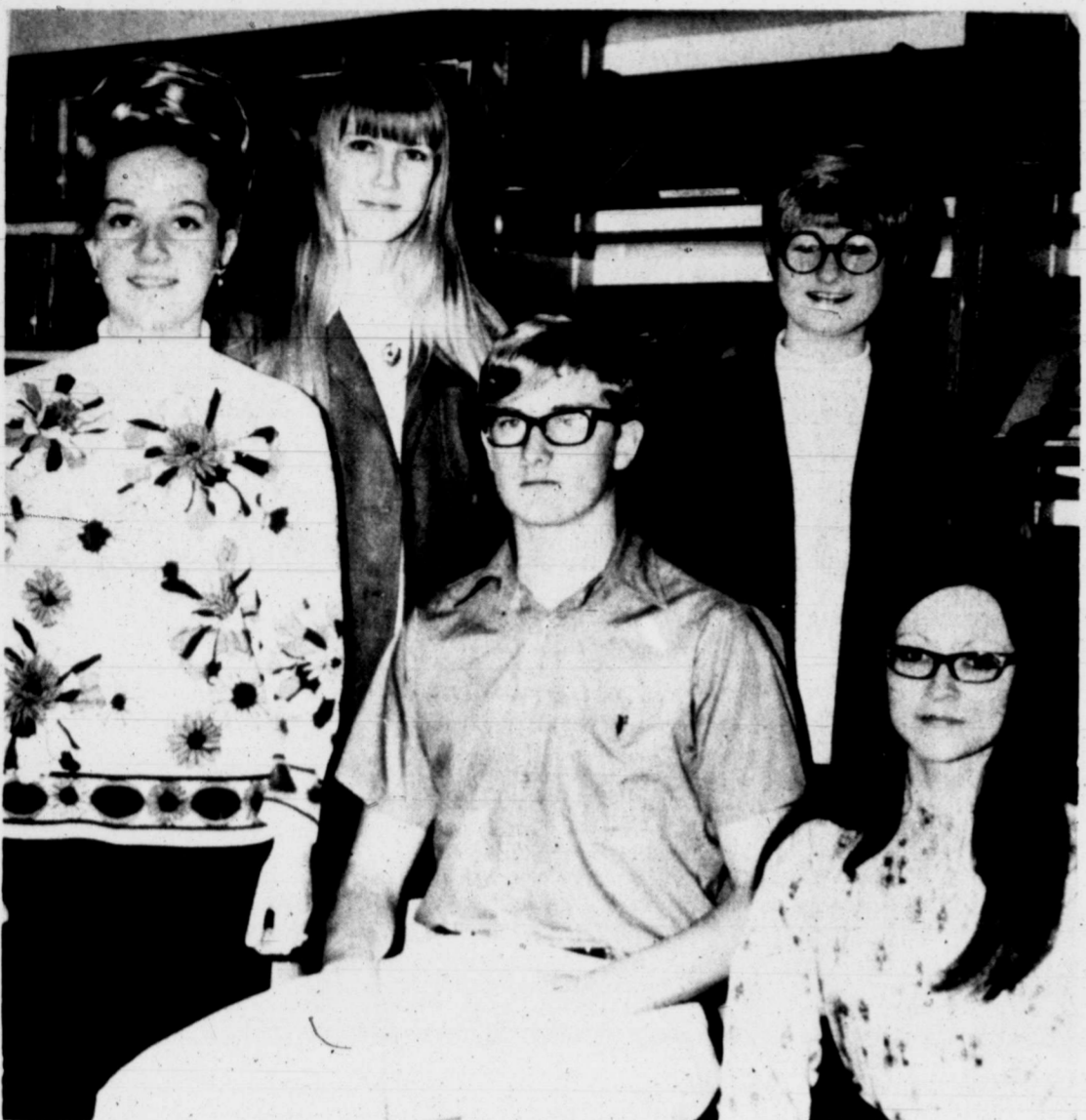
The vehicles collided head-on about 2.7 miles east of Colorado City.

ESSENTIALLY there are really just two kinds of people in this world. The well organized and the disorganized.

A well organized woman is one who can answer her personal correspondence while sitting calmly under a dryer with rollers in her hair.

A disorganized woman is more likely to sit reading movie magazines from the beauty show stack whether she approves or even believes a word she's reading or not.

Well organized people do not waste time. They eat and sleep, work and play strictly on schedule. All their closets and bureau drawers are in order... hedges are trimmed, buttons are sewn on... and they know exactly where to find insurance papers, cancelled checks and all the old family photographs.

"THE LOVE of an Air Force officer for a buddy shot down over North Vietnam led to the calling of a joint session of the Texas Legislature," reports the Associated Press in the Port Arthur News feature.

C.A.'s best friend, AF Maj. Mike McElhannon of Ft. Worth, was shot down over North Vietnam August 16, 1968. No word has been received on whether he survives, the AP story explains, quoting Lt. Col Wilkins as saying "We were closer than brothers."

Late last November C.A. went to the capitol to see how to go about getting the special joint resolution expressing concern for the 1,300 Americans held prisoner or missing. He used his vacation time to work at the project as a private individual, Associated Press relates.

Astronaut Alan Bean and Dallas millionaire Ross Perot were there for the ceremonies along with Lackland AFB band and two former prisoners of war, James Rowe of McAllen and Fred Thompson of Randolph AFB.
