Voting opportunities begin in April when members of the governing body of the city and the school district are elected. Then in May the first primary (earlier than usual this year) for the democratic party will be held. Voters will have an opportunity to vote for precinct, county, district and state officials from constable to governor. Selection of county and district officials should be of unusual interest to local voters this year as some of the candidates hail from Loraine.

In addition to the usual voting privileges, however, other opportunities may come up during the year to vote on matters of importance. Colorado City might decide she would like for voters of the entire county to vote bonds to build her an airport or a coliseum—and of course you would want to be armed with a poll tax. You may also have an opportunity to vote wet or dry during the year. Get that poll tax.

Social Security Tax Rate Up January 1

Ben Hawkins, Administrative Officer of the Big Spring office, recently called attention to the increase in Social Security tax rates which became effective January 1, 1960, under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act.

The tax rate increased to 3 percent for employers and 3 percent for employees, or a total of 6 percent. These rates will apply to wages paid on or after January 1, 1960, even though the wages are earned prior to that date.
