Graduation Caps Struggle

Diploma A Medal In Teen's Fight With Cancer

(Editor's Note: This story appeared in the Gazette Telegraph, Denver, Co. and was written by Dave Curtin).

Reginald Loggins had to take three painful steps up to the stage Saturday to receive his high school diploma, but that was the easy part.

Getting there is what took guts.

In October, doctors told Loggins he had bone cancer in his right leg. He had been unable to attend classes at Widefield High School since Nov. 28, when treatments were started to fight the disease.

But the 18-year-old with the "good head and the big heart" kept studying and persevered through surgery and five chemotherapy treatments to earn his diploma. Just Wednesday night, he had to go into the hospital again, this time because of a lack of disease-fighting white blood cells in his body. The chemotherapy treatments had brought on that condition.



Despite a battle with cancer that began last fall, Reginald Loggins finished his classes and graduated last month from Widefield High School, Denver, Colorado.

But he was released Friday, just in time to join his 436 classmates at the commencement in the audience Saturday

were Loggins' proud parents, Raymond and Bobbie Loggins, who adopted him at the age of 7 months.

"There were times when I felt like giving up, and then I would think about the rest of my life," Loggins said after the graduation. "It's not worth giving up the rest of your life for a stupid illness like cancer."

The sudden knowledge that he had cancer interrupted Reginald's busy life. "I had been playing tennis and I fell, I just thought I had twisted my knee, but I was so busy with school, work and clubs that I didn't go to the doctor.

"When my mom insisted I go, the doctor found a spot on the bone."

Loggins underwent four chemotherapy treatments that hospitalized him for 10 days at a time. In February, he underwent a relatively new limb-salvage procedure at Children's Hospital in Denver. Eighteen inches of cancer-infested bone was replaced by a light metal alloy and a plastic knee cap. That was followed by more chemotherapy.

"One of the things that impresses me the most about Reggie is his ability to reach out and help other kids in the hospital," said Rick Dunworth, a social worker in the oncology unit at Children's Hospital.

"He'll go into other kids' rooms, introduce himself, sit down and talk to them. Many of the kids are afraid of losing their hair (as a result of chemotherapy). Reggie

My law partner and I shut down the office, loaded up the kids and headed to Ft. Worth a couple of weeks ago. We were both delegates to the Democratic Party convention. We left the kids with my parents in Farmers Branch and spent two days listening to speeches and debate. This is not a propaganda sheet made to chastise or vilify. This is a newspaper made to educate and not to agitate.

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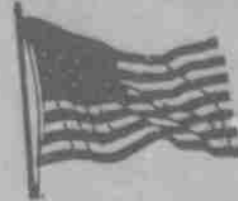

Stiffer Penalties for White-Collar Criminals?

Michael Goldsmith is a law professor at Brigham Young University and also serves as vice chairman of the American Bar Association Criminal Justice Section.



YES

Should there be stiffer penalties for white-collar criminals?

Yes. Both federal and state laws provide strong penalties for white-collar crimes, but many judges are reluctant to impose stiff sentences. This stems from the socioeconomic bond judges share with white-collar citizens and from the misperception that nonviolent offenses are less serious than street crimes. Equal justice should be imposed upon all who violate the law. Sentencing disparities should principally reflect the seriousness of the offense rather than socioeconomic class distinctions. On this basis, white-collar crimes merit stiff penalties because such offenses pose a serious threat to our social order. Though white-collar crimes may not cause physical harm, their long-term economic and psychological effects often are devastating. Fraud costs American society more than \$200 billion annually. Inside traders, corrupt S&L officials and others are responsible for the financial ruin of thousands of families. Those who cause such harm should not be shielded from proper retribution because they stole by stealth rather than plundered through physical might.

What is appropriate punishment?

Appropriate punishment should include imprisonment to fit the crime, as well as a fine exceeding the criminal's ill-gotten gain. The offender also should forfeit his interest in any enterprise used to commit the crime. For example, corrupt politicians, union officials and corporate managers should be required to surrender their positions of trust in their respective organizations.

How would this deter white-collar crime?

In white-collar cases, imprisonment generally is critical to deterrence. Fines alone are not enough; they rarely upset the offender's lifestyle. Michael Milken may be required to pay \$600 million for his illegal stock activity, but he remains a multimillionaire. He and others like him should not be allowed a brief respite in some "Club Fed" and then return to a life of privilege. No one considering a criminal act would be deterred by "punishment" of this kind.

Elizabeth Nepstad is executive director of the Foundation for People, Inc., a non-profit organization which implements alternative sentences and provides support services for criminal offenders.



NO

Should there be stiffer penalties for white-collar criminals?

No. The myth is that stronger penalties (usually defined as more incarceration for longer periods of time) will teach a lesson to the individual offender so that he will "go straight" while deterring others from committing crimes. The truth is that our prisons teach people how to be better criminals. Seventy-four percent return within four years. Our prison population has increased 113 percent between 1980 and 1989. We lock up more people per capita than any other society except the Soviet Union and South Africa. If tough sentences stopped crime, we would have one of the lowest crime rates in the world. Instead we have one of the highest! What we need are alternative sanctions that work.

What is appropriate punishment?

Appropriate punishment holds the offender accountable for his actions while restoring the victim, the community and the offender. We have genuine justice when our criminal system helps repair injuries caused by crime. Restitution, victim-offender reconciliation, community service work projects and programs that enable the offender to understand the reasons behind his crime and change his future behavior have demonstrated their effectiveness. Some offenders should be imprisoned. But at a cost to taxpayers of \$20,000 per year, plus prison construction costs of \$100,000 per minimum security cell, we need to carefully evaluate who should be incarcerated and for how long.

How would this deter white-collar crime?

Harsh penalties won't deter criminals who believe they won't get caught. White-collar offenders in particular rationalize and minimize their behavior. They don't think of themselves as criminals and don't think they will get caught. The sanctions outlined above are punishment. Fifteen hundred hours of community service (for example, helping recently released convicts find legitimate jobs) is a way to let the community see there are consequences for actions, thus serving as a deterrent. **Id**

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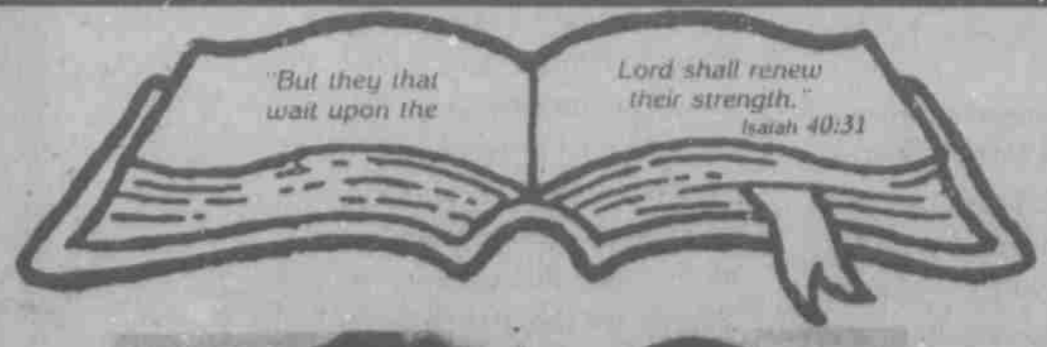
