The end of an era

It was the last of four years of four years of high school football and basketball games for Monty Delgado, Shawn Stewart, Greg Actkinson and Darren Haselof.

As readers know, it is my custom not to "promote" individual players during a season because I think it can be detrimental to a team. But at the end, I like to point out what I feel are noteworthy accomplishments. Such is the case here.

I have been in Texico-Farwell for almost seven years. Thus, the majority of that time has given me the opportunity to watch some outstanding high school sports. But what will always stand out in a special way was that group of Farwell sophomores who made it to state two years back.

I believe that every one of the 400-plus Farwell fans who were in Austin that day felt a chill run up and down their spines when Michael Day hit those 2 crucial 3-pointers in the last minute of play to bring the Steers into a tie with eventual champion Edgewood.

It was really something when the 8,000 fans in the hall (subtracting about 400 Edgewood fans) rose as one to cheer the Steers' success.

During these four years, Delgado, Stewart and Actkinson teamed to provide a lot of thrills on the hardwood court for Farwell fans. Dunk shots, great passing, clutch plays provided some great entertainment.

Will we ever forget Delgado's 3 pointers? Actkinson's strong rebounding? Stewart's deft jumpers? I doubt it.

And the passing. When we remember Day's 3-pointer to tie the Edgewood game, we should also remember the beautiful pass he got from Delgado so he could make the shot when he was open.

When we talk about these three young men, we are not only talking about athletes, but also competitors.

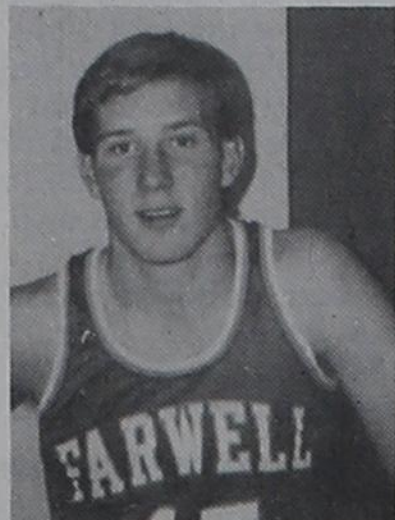
I'm happy for Stewart, who just received a full scholarship to Texas Tech, because he did well not only in athletics but also in the classroom. A fine young man. And when you talk about the last player to leave the gym - it often was Stewart, who kept honing his skills to make himself a better player. That took a lot of work - but it paid off. He earned what he has received.

And Actkinson. A competitor from the word go. Yes, I know that the Steers had an off night when they lost to Paducah last week. That was tough. But Actkinson played his heart out, fighting every inch of the way. I thought it was one of his best games for the way he never gave up and had to carry the brunt of the action when foul trouble put Stewart and Delgado on the bench for much of the game. I congratulate Greg.

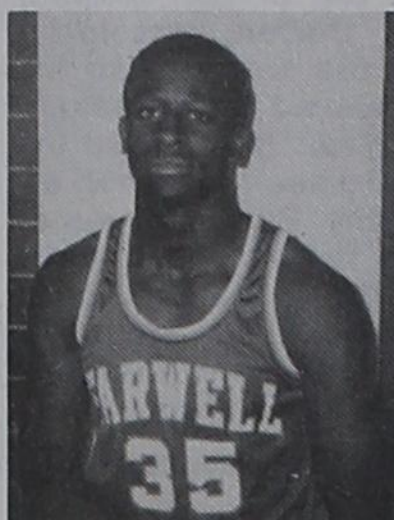
And Delgado. Another hard-nosed player who made the triumvirate so successful during their high school careers. Time after time, when a clutch bucket was needed, it was Delgado who put the ball up - making it. I recall that winter's day four years ago when I was sitting in the Bovina gym with Raymond Delgado, Monty's dad. He told me how his son hadn't gotten much play-

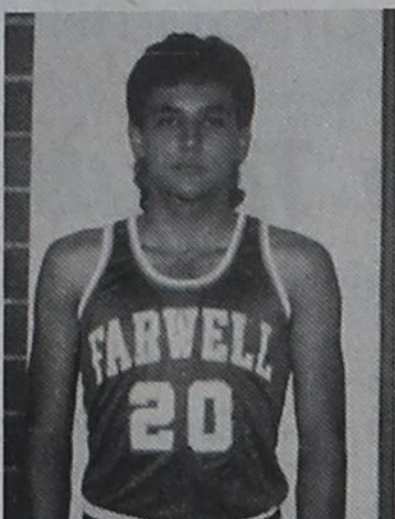

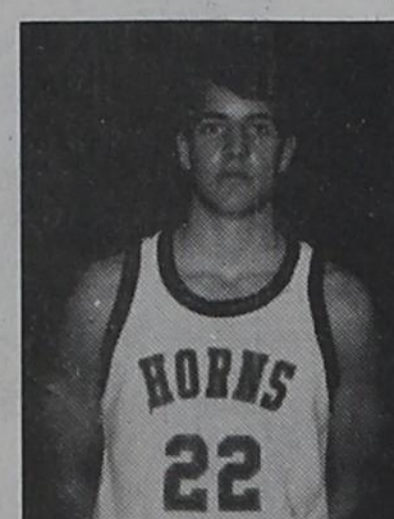

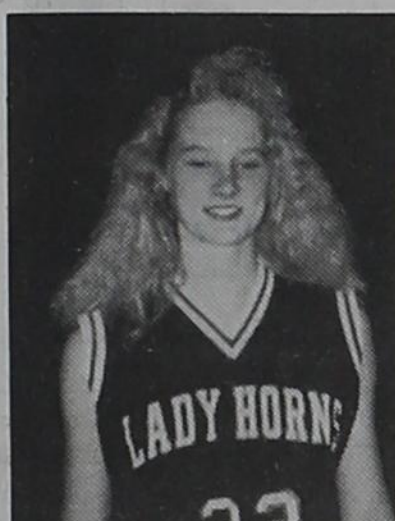

There are three seats open on the Farwell school board.

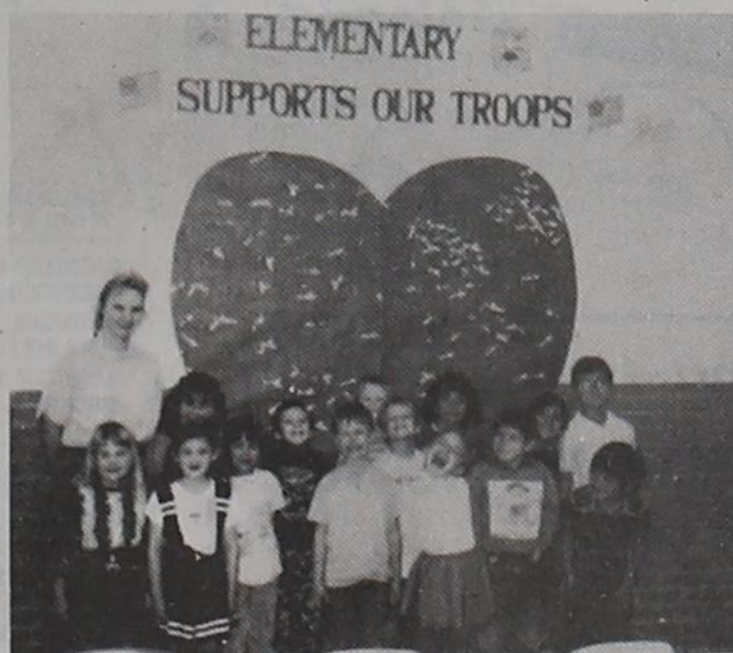
Pond wasn't the source

For 6 area schools

More courses to be offered

An historic meeting was held in Farwell Tuesday.

It was called by Farwell School Supt. Richard Boothby to begin planning for a fiber optics network for Farwell Schools. This will mean expanded course offerings for Farwell students.

Simply put, it allows students and teachers to sit in studio classes while they see, hear, talk and learn with their counterparts in other neighboring school districts. It gives students access to courses they wouldn't otherwise have in small schools - crucial to meeting state accrediting requirements.

It appears that the network may include six school systems and a trio of telephone companies.

Attending the Tuesday meeting at Boothby's office were representatives of the three telephone cooperatives - 5 Area, ENMR and West Texas; plus the superintendents of Farwell, Friona, Bovina, Muleshoe and Lazbuddie schools. Other school officials also were present.

Five Area officials explained that Three Way Schools ought to be involved, too, due to the 5 Areaterritory. Boothby had not realized that and hadn't invited Three Way. Three Way will be asked to future meetings.

Boothby is serving as a catalyst on this plan because he initiated a similar plan in Balke, Okla., where he was superintendent before coming to Farwell last year. The Oklahoma plan, which involved four schools, was the first of its kind in that state.

Beneath the Sheets

Coincidentally, ENMR officials had visited Boothby at Balke to see how it was working a couple of years back.

Here's what fiber optics does: It allows schools to share a teacher over an "inter-active" TV system. This means the teacher can see the students in all the schools since each classroom involved would have TV sets. The teacher can hear the students' questions, and, obviously, the students can see and hear the teacher through cameras being used.

"Getting larger schools like Muleshoe and Friona in this program will definitely help Farwell," says Boothby. "For example, I want Farwell to offer an honors diploma and we can do this with this program. It will allow us to provide some advanced courses we can't offer now."

For example, Boothby says that Balke was able to offer as many as six extra courses, advanced placement English, art, accounting 2, and Spanish 2.

In the system used by the four Oklahoma schools, each had to pay \$15,000 a year for 5 years to recapture their capital expenditures. The phone company there used an 8-fiber cable - and only 1 fiber was needed for the school plan. There were 8 TV monitors in each classroom, plus cameras for the teachers.

Because of his experience, the Texas school officials asked Boothby to be the contact person with the 3 telephone companies. The next meeting is planned for April 3. If all goes well, the plan

will likely go into effect in the 1992-93 school year - or earlier.

ENMR, 5 Area and West Texas are already meeting to see how the linkages can be arranged and what the costs will be. A lot of fiber optic cable already has been laid in this area.

Boothby reports that the response from the 3 telephone cooperatives "was very positive. They want this to

The annual Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet will be held March 9 at 7 p.m. at the Farwell Community Center.

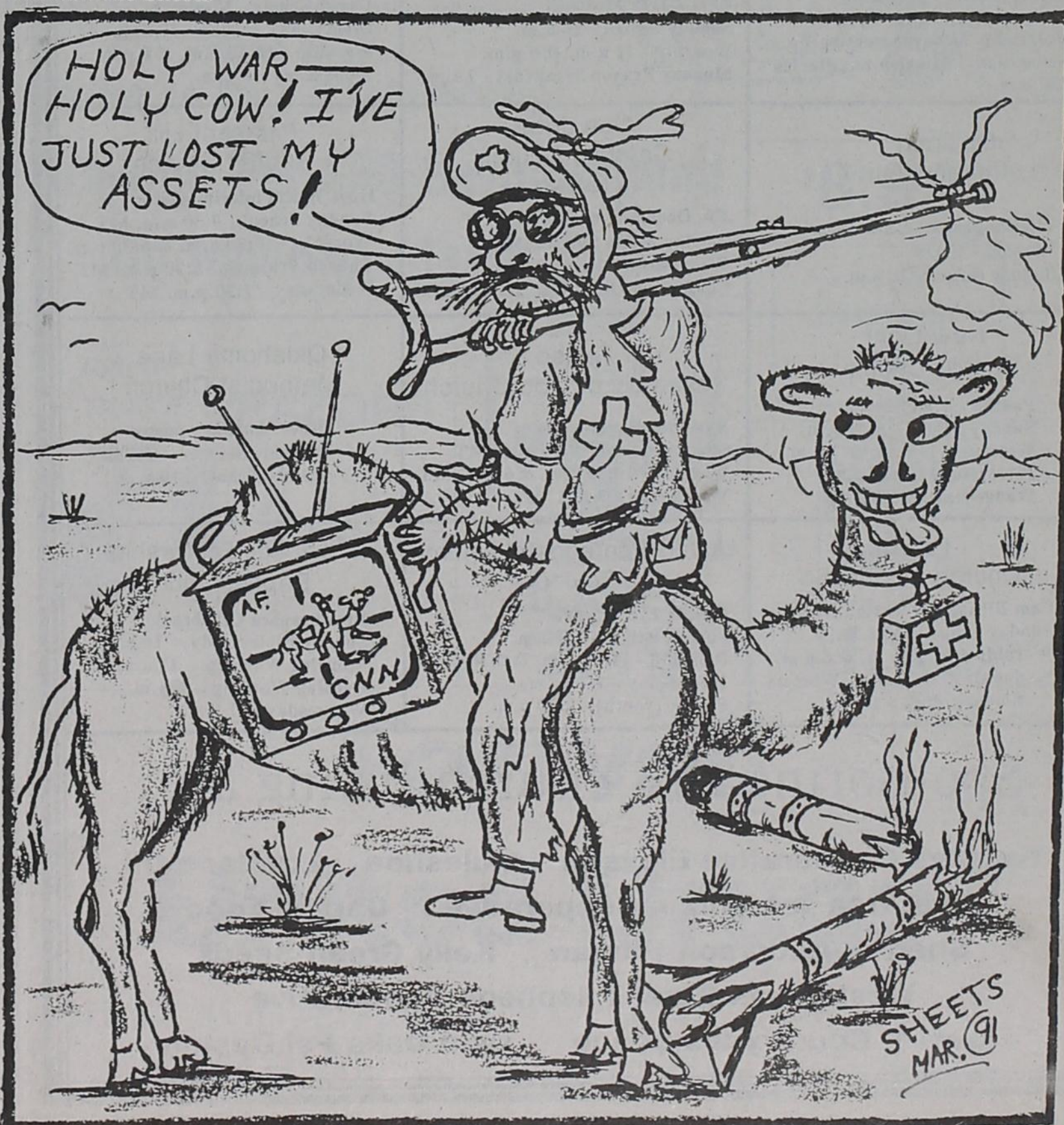
The cost is \$7.50 per person. Tickets are available from Chamber members and at the State Line Tribune.

As an offshoot of this program, Boothby also notes that Clovis Community College is very interested in using fiber optics to provide night classes in Texas communities so folks don't have to drive to Clovis. Boothby has met with the college's Jim Turner on this.

The Texico Wolverines overcame a 17-point deficit to defeat the Melrose Buffaloes at Texico Saturday and capture the District 6A Tournament Championship, 73-64. Texico is now 20-3.

The Wolverines next challenge are the regional playoffs at Grady this weekend. The games will be at Grady, the District 7 tourney winner, because they upset San Jon in their district playoff last week.

Today (Friday), it will be Grady vs. Melrose at 6 mst p.m. at Grady. Then Texico vies against San Jon at 7:30 p.m. mst at Grady.

If Texico loses Friday, it's out of the playoffs. However, if they win Friday, they go on to state regardless of the outcome of Saturday's game. Tickets are \$3 for adults and \$2 for students.

It takes 40 to 45 minutes to drive to Grady from Texico - Farwell.

As for San Jon, here's what coach Richard Luscombe had to say:

"They match up pretty well with us. They don't have big kids, but they are fast with a lot of speed and shoot the ball well. We have played them three times in the past three years and every time it's a good ball game. And

we're glad we're not playing San Jon at San Jon."

The 2-week layoff may have made Texico sluggish. Since they had won their district, they didn't play again until the district tourney title match.

Melrose started with a slight lead and the game was tied at 8-all at the 4:10 mark of

the first quarter when Josefe Gonzales made 1 of 2 free throws. The Wolverines then took the lead at 11-8 when James Phipps made a layup and a free throw. But with 1:41 left, the Buffaloes went up 14-13. Buffalo increased their lead to 19-13 by the end of the first quarter.

The first quarter was highlighted by two major themes: - The Wolverine full court press was effective in causing at least three turnovers. - Melrose used its height to control the boards.

At the onset of the second quarter, it first appeared it would be a Melrose blowout. The Buffaloes hit their first six shots without a miss, including a 3 pointer. Meanwhile, Texico missed its shots and couldn't get rebounds.

Just three minutes into the second quarter, Melrose had hiked its margin to 32-15. Then the Texico rally began.

Benjy McDaniel hit a jumper. After a Melrose free throw,

Texico got 2 points from

McDaniel and 4 more from Kenny Shaw within a minute. Meanwhile, the Texico press forced 3 more turnovers.

With 2 1/2 minutes left, Jason Pyle, who came off the bench to contribute heavily to the win, hit a 3-pointer. This was followed by a free throw by Warren Martin, whose rebounding and shooting in the second half also was instrumental in the win. Gonzales made 2 free throws, following by more free shots by Pyle and Josh Autrey.

The half ended with the margin cut to 10, as Melrose led 41-31.

Melrose again opened a quarter like a house afire. The Buffaloes canned their first three shots, including a 3-pointer, to up their lead to 48-33 at the start of the third quarter. But Texico outscored them 18-7 the rest of the quarter, led by Pyle, Gonzales and Martin. Also, Shaw's ball handling was a key to the Texico offense.

The final period began with Melrose up, 55-51, but the momentum had shifted to Texico, especially with its better use of positioning under the boards for rebounds.

Texico closed to within 2 on a rebound basket by Gonzales. After a Melrose 3-

pointer, Pyle hit one. Then a pair of free throws by Jaime Estrada knotted the score at 58-all at the 6:30 mark.

Melrose didn't give up. They re-took the lead at 60-58 and at 63-61. An offensive rebound bucket by Martin made it 63-all.

With 2:51 left, Melrose faked a stall but threw the ball away. Seconds later Pyle's rebound tip-in gave Texico the lead it would lost, 65-63.

After Melrose made a free shot, once again Texico scored on a rebound bucket, this time by McDaniel, who was fouled in the process. His three points made it 68-64.

With 1:40 left, Melrose

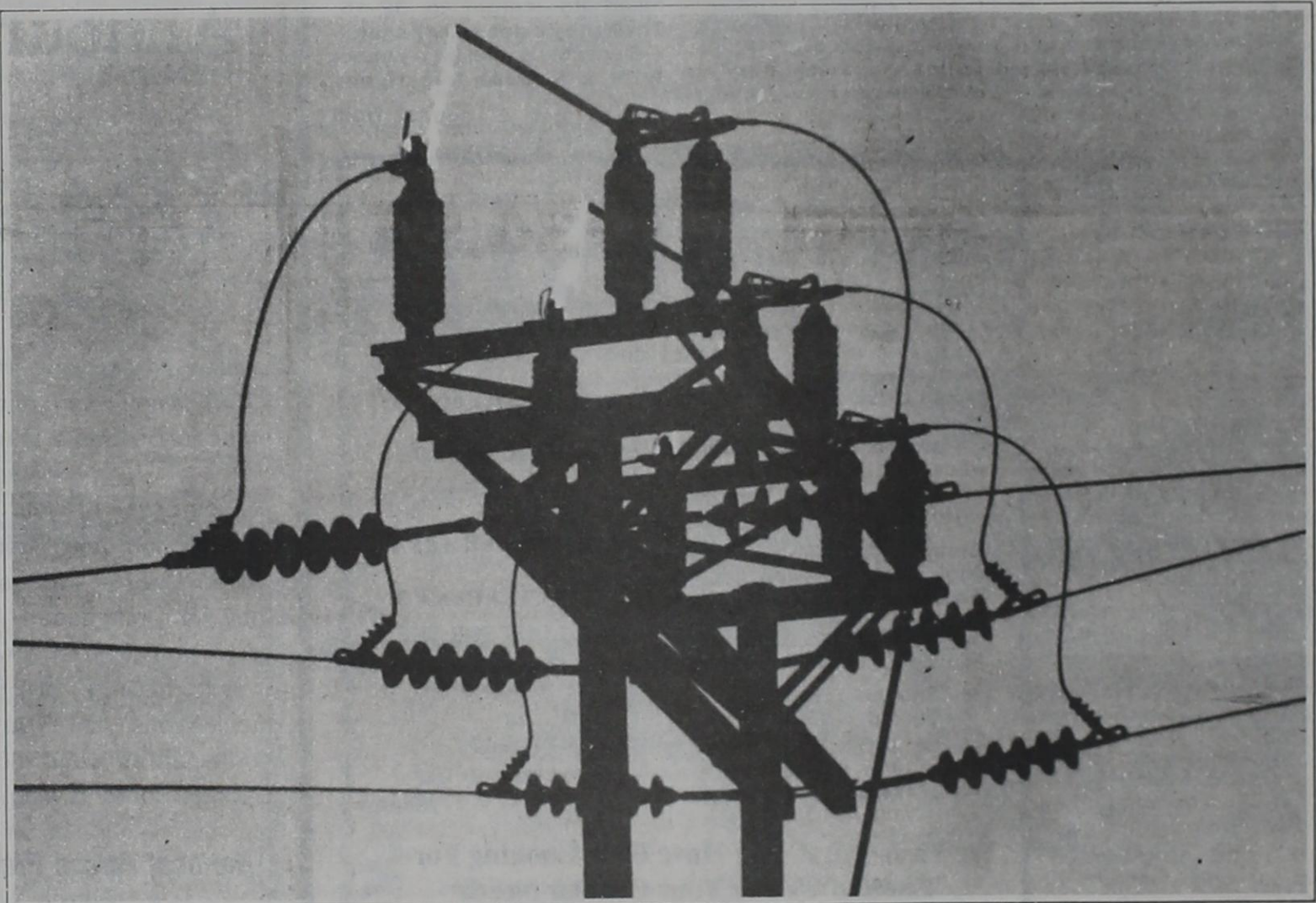

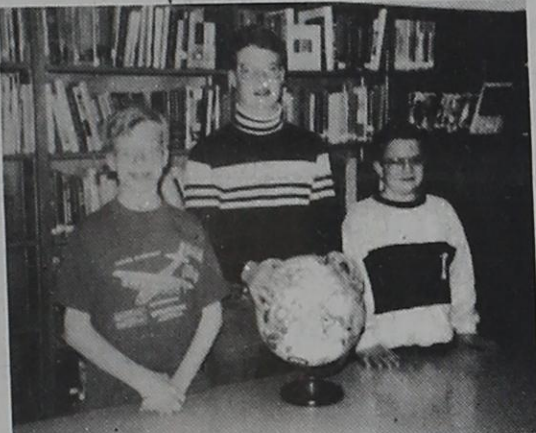

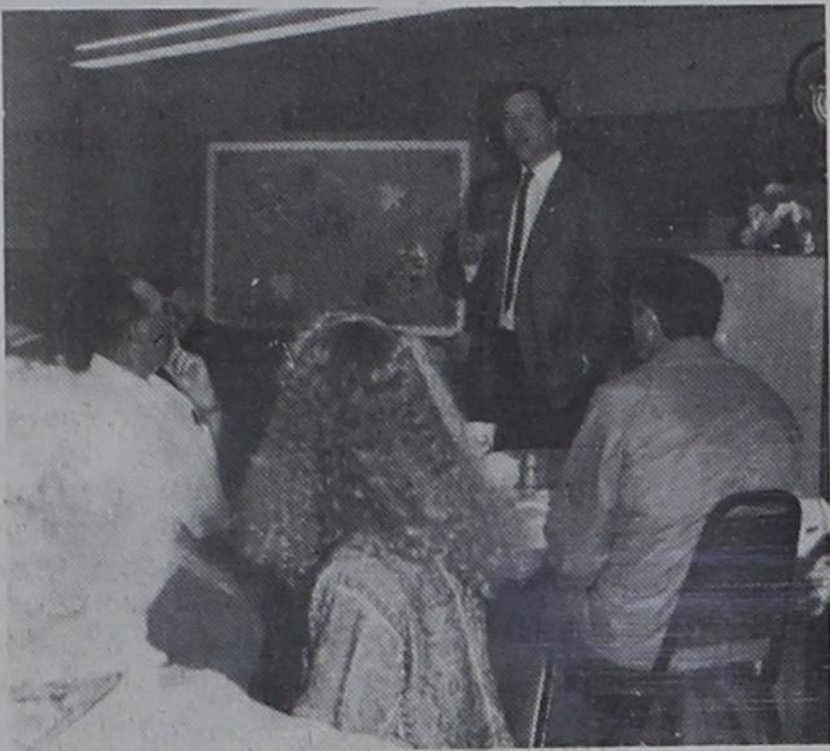

Kindergarten And
Pre-Kindergarten
Registration

Thursday, March 14, 1991, is the day to register children for next year's Farwell Kindergarten and Pre-K classes.

Registration will take place in the Elementary Library Thursday, March 14th, from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.

All children who will be four and five years of age by September 1st and live in the Farwell School District need to register for next year's classes.

To register, a child must have immunization records, a birth certificate and a copy of the Social Security card. Only official copies of birth certificates are accepted and must have been obtained from state offices.

Sarah Owen, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during registration.

Registration will close promptly at 4:00 p.m.

Pre-K Requirements

To be eligible, a child must be 4 years old prior to September 1st, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced-price lunches), and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Texas school districts are required to provide Pre-K, if 15 or more students are identified.

Out of School? Tests scheduled

The out-of-school examinee registration packets for the Texas Education Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) exit level test are now available at Farwell High School.

During each regular exit level test administration, individuals who are no longer enrolled in school and have not previously passed both sections of the TEAMS test, but have met all other graduation requirements, may retake the section(s) not passed. During the April administration, the English language arts test will be administered April 3 and the mathematics test April 4.

Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and wish to register to retake the exit level mathematics and/or English language arts test(s) may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus, district

central office, or education service center. Registration forms must be completed and returned in the preaddressed envelope and are to be received in Iowa City, Iowa, by March 13.

The Texas Education Agency and National Computer Systems will not be responsible for registration forms that are delayed or lost in the mail. It is suggested that individuals registering for the test make arrangements with the appropriate postal agent for a proof of delivery notice.
