Much Terracing Being Done Over Dawson County

Land owners and tenants alike are taking advantage of the opportunity offered by the Soil Conservation Service of the local CCC camp to build terraces and run lines for contour listing on the lands they will plant this year. More than ever before the farmers are realizing the importance of this work to the conservation of their fertile fields.

It was the privilege of a representative of the Dawson County Courier to take a trip southeast of Lamesa this week in company with F. A. Vestal, who is in charge of the soil conservation work at the local camp. We inspected the terraces recently built by Mr. Batson on the Ed Miller farm north of Wilson as well as those on the Oscar Krohn farm and the C. Jobe farm.

Of special interest to us was the method Mr. Krohn employed to complete his terraces after the lines were run and the terraces started by the CCC crew. He constructed a V-drag with heavy timber and a discarded grader blade. This he hitched to his power lift on his tractor and completed the work of building the terraces without any extra help or additional power than that of his regular farm tractor. He completed about 4 miles of terraces on his 160 acres at a total cost for tractor fuel of \$9.56.

Mr. Vestal reports that they have calls for help on much more terracing than they have the equipment to handle. Plans are being worked on to make more equipment available to farmers of Dawson county who want to build these terraces.

Pioneer Stockman Dies Here Monday

The remains of John W. Wristen were laid to rest Tuesday afternoon in the Lamesa cemetery, following funeral services which were held in the First Methodist church at 3:30. Rev. M. M. Beavers and Rev. David J. Murray conducted the services.

Mr. Wristen, well known rancher and stockman, lived several miles southeast of Lamesa for several years and was a familiar figure to Lamesa citizens who held him in high esteem. He passed away in a local sanitarium early Monday morning following an attack of pneumonia.

John W. Wristen was born on July 7, 1877 in Montague county, Texas. He had been a resident of Dawson county for many years.

The deceased is survived by two brothers, Will Wristen of Grand Falls, Texas, Bert Wristen of Roswell, N. M.; three sisters, Mrs. H. J. Price of Lamesa, Mrs. W. Matthews of Buena Vista, Texas, and Mrs. A. J. Farek of Clegg, Texas. All were present for the funeral with the exception of Mrs. Matthews.

Emergency Crop Loans Now Available

Application for emergency crop and feed loans for 1937 are now being received at Lamesa by Harold D. Himmick, field supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration.

These loans will be made only to farmers who cannot obtain credit from any other source, as provided by regulations issued by the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1937 crops, or for the purchase of feed for livestock, and in no instance may exceed \$400.

Farmers are not eligible for these loans if they can borrow from an individual, production credit association bank, or other concern.

Emergency crop and feed loans will not be made by the Farm Credit Administration to standard rehabilitation clients of the Resettlement Administration whose current needs are provided for by Resettlement.

As in the past, the security for these loans will consist of a first lien on the crop financed if the loan is for the production of crops, and if for the purchase of feed for livestock, then a first lien on the livestock to be fed. Landlords, or others having an interest, will be required to waive their interest in the crops or the livestock to be claims in favor of the lien to the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration until the loan is repaid.

Checks in payment of the approved loans will be issued by the Regional Emergency Crop and Feed Loan office at Dallas.

Green Hut Cafe to Re-open Saturday

Closing the Green Hut last month, Mr. Newland began a complete rebuilding of the equipment and appointments, and a full crew of workmen have been busy on the job early and late every day since, rushing the work to completion.

Contract for the fixtures were given to Allen and Waller, local architects and the work of the building and installing was done entirely by local labor and local material. Even to the big refrigerator in the kitchen which was designed and built in the local cabinet shop of the contractors.

The dining room is equipped with booths of modern design, the tables are topped with heavy inlaid linoleum bound with nickel plated strips. The counter, which is on the north side of the building is topped with the same materials. An attractive color scheme of green and white lends a pleasing air to the entire interior. A well planned lighting arrangement adds to the attractiveness of the room.

Mr. Newland has adopted a motto "Better Foods" and promises that the motto is to be observed in reality in preparation and serving of meals at all times. A special feature of the new cafe will be the famous "ring cooked, sealed flavor" steaks, originated and copy-righted by Ike Mincks, famous Tulsa Oklahoma, food caterer.

Associated with Mr. Newland will be Mr. and Mrs. G. Maurice Lamphere, who came here with him from Fort Peck, where they had been associated with him since he opened his cafe there. They are both experienced caterers, having several years experience in the business with large cafes in the north and northeast.

FIRE DESTROYS BROODER HOUSE AND BABY CHICKS

Traffic Safety Committee Chairman Appointed

Austin, Feb. 16. —(Special)—C. J. Rutland, of Dallas, as Chairman of the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee, will direct the statewide war on traffic accidents which has been declared by Governor Allred.

Mr. Rutland was elected by the committee at its meeting in Austin last week when one hundred members gathered from every section of Texas to organize and plan a state safety program which will end the reign of Sudden Death on Texas Highways and streets.

The chairman is an outstanding authority on traffic safety having served as regional director of the National Safety Council and as chairman of the Dallas Citizens Traffic Safety Commission. He is a graduate of Texas A. & M. College and of Cornell University.

The safety program adopted by the Governor's committee will be built around the three "E's" of Safety—Engineering, Education and Enforcement—a tried and proven program of safety Conference on Street and Highway endorsed by the President's National Safety as well as by the National Safety Council. Supplementing the three "E's" of safety will be the legislative work of the committee which urges the adoption of a stricter driver's license law and other safety legislation now pending before the legislature.

The membership of the Governor's committee is composed of representatives from women's clubs, civic clubs, parent-teacher's associations, churches, chambers of commerce, automobile clubs, boy and girl scout organizations, the press and radio. In addition, public spirited citizens and public officials charged with safety responsibilities comprise this non-partisan, non-political traffic safety committee.

In the words of Governor Allred "the committee will be the super safety salesman of the state who will spread the gospel of safety throughout Texas in this relentless warfare on traffic accidents."

Car Owners Can Aid In Highway Survey

The car owners of Dawson county can aid tremendously in furnishing official information to the State-Federal Highway Planning Survey for use in working out a logical plan on which future road and street construction will be based. Mr. R. W. Herndon, the Assessor and Collector of Taxes has been given a number of post cards which ask for fundamental information that is needed in road planning, thus affording the motorist opportunity to participate in outlining his future road program. These cards, to be distributed to car owners as they pay their 1937 registration fees, require no postage and are self-addressed. The number of cards which have been furnished Mr. Herndon was judged according to the number of motor vehicles which were registered in the County during 1936. The number of cards allotted to Dawson County is as follows: 2700 for passenger automobiles, 700 for trucks, and 75 for trailers and 50 for owners of five or more vehicles.

The business of constructing and maintaining highways, streets, and roads has become a tremendous task within recent years, and it now affects the well being of every citizen. Obviously, every effort should be made to plan our public road system so that the burden for roads will be distributed justly. The information sought on these cards is vital to the establishment of an equitable, well-rounded program. In order to work out such a program the Texas Highway Department and the United States Bureau of Public Roads are conducting a state-wide Highway Planning Survey, and it is to the advantage of each county to participate to the greatest extent possible.

SAFETY---OR THIS?

DEATH, in the guise of heavily loaded motor trucks, rides the highways of Texas every day and every night. The toll of human death and injury of these vehicles is appalling.

In the five-year period, 1932 to 1936, inclusive, trucks in Texas have participated in 8,416 highway accidents in which 2,195 persons were killed and 11,962 injured. In 1936 alone, their record stood 2,208 accidents with 3,323 persons injured and 576 killed. These actual records of people killed, as shown by Texas newspapers, compared with the number of deaths resulting from all motor vehicle accidents, as given by the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin, show that the average Texas truck participates in twice as many fatal accidents as the average passenger car.

Likewise, as might be reasonably expected from their greater weight and size, and as shown by the records of the Texas Railroad Commission, the Carrier-for-Hire truck accidents, during 1936, have resulted, vehicle for vehicle, in three times the number of fatalities as for the average passenger car.

Increased liability to highway accident forms an inseparable result of BIG truck operation. But even now, the threat of greater highway hazards hangs over the people of Texas. Newspapers report that operators of BIG trucks have organized for the purpose of securing an increase in weight and speed limits, already too large. These are the elements, weight and speed, which, in highway accidents, spell "D-E-A-T-H."

The right to grant, condition or deny the use of the highways for profit, belongs to you, the people of Texas, notwithstanding the attempts of the operators of BIG trucks to take it away and give it to the federal government instead. Your present laws, limiting the size, weight and speed of trucks, were enacted by reason of your insistence, and by your insistence they have remained on the statute books. Their amendment would serve the sole purpose of increasing the profits of operators of the BIG trucks, with the certain results of also increasing the mounting injuries, deaths and property losses now taking place on your highways.

Public welfare and public safety demand that existing highway regulations shall be retained and enforced.

FARMER WASHINGTON HELD HIS SOIL WITH 'RUBBISH'

"My countrymen", wrote George Washington in 1782, "are too much used to corn blades and corn shucks and have too little knowledge of the profit of grassland."

H. H. Bennett, chief of the Soil Conservation Service, says "Washington was among the first to recognize the

dangers of a single crop system of agriculture and the benefits of a vegetative cover in protecting the soil against erosion.

"On his own farms Washington used 'vegetable rubbish', as he called it, to check the spreading of gullies and prevent sheet erosion. For nearly every acre he owned he had a system of crop rotation, and sometimes several alternate systems for a single plot.

"The practices which Washington used to control soil erosion on his farms now seem somewhat inadequate. Scientific farmers today employ these practices in a more advanced form and supplement them with methods which, in Washington's time, were virtually unknown. But the Soil Conservation

Service maintains Washington was on the right track and was far in advance of most farmers of his day, both in theory and in practice."

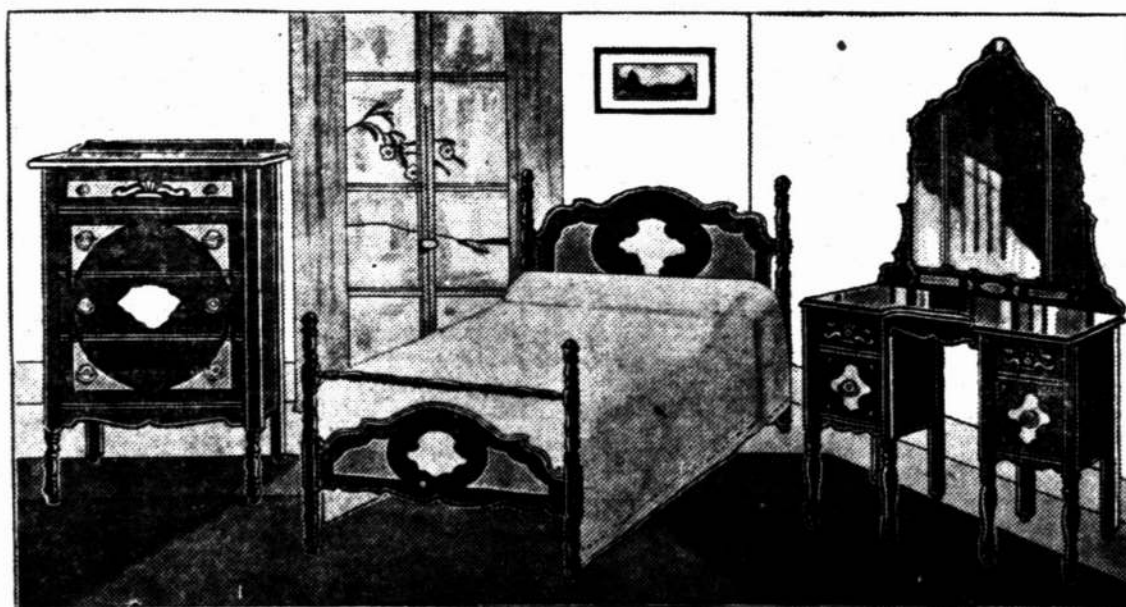

Outline New Texas Health Program

Austin, February 16.—Outline of a new Texas health program to cope with the changing social goal of equal opportunity for old and young, adequate health protection for all, was made by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, at the fourth Texas Conference on Child Health and Protection.

Present plans of the State Department of Health are designed toward an expansion of activities in line with the current aspects of this new social order. Since health is a purchasable commodity, it behooves us to spend our money in a way that will buy the most health for the greatest number. In a nutshell, our job is to provide preventative with our tax money rather than palliatives, such as job insurance and pensions for the unemployed.

Recently the State Health Officer has been in conference with the Board of Health and other leaders, and together they have mapped out a plan with the general objective of reducing infant and maternal mortality, malnutrition, tuberculosis, malaria, pneumonia, hookworm disease, dysentery, syphilis and pellagra. To do this the State Health Department hopes to maintain (1) a well organized and a well equipped central office with trained specialists, (2) To establish health towns which do not now have any districts to cover these counties and

health service, (3) To continue to cooperate with existing health departments in various counties and cities.

Through the creation and maintenance of these new health districts the Health Department hopes to standardize health procedures throughout the State so that the following objectives may be approximated: Better supervision and enforcement of our health laws; adequate teachings of health in our public schools; providing at least some health service for the vast area now without protection; development of local health services; facilities to meet emergencies and epidemics; and development of a well balanced program on maternal and child health protection.

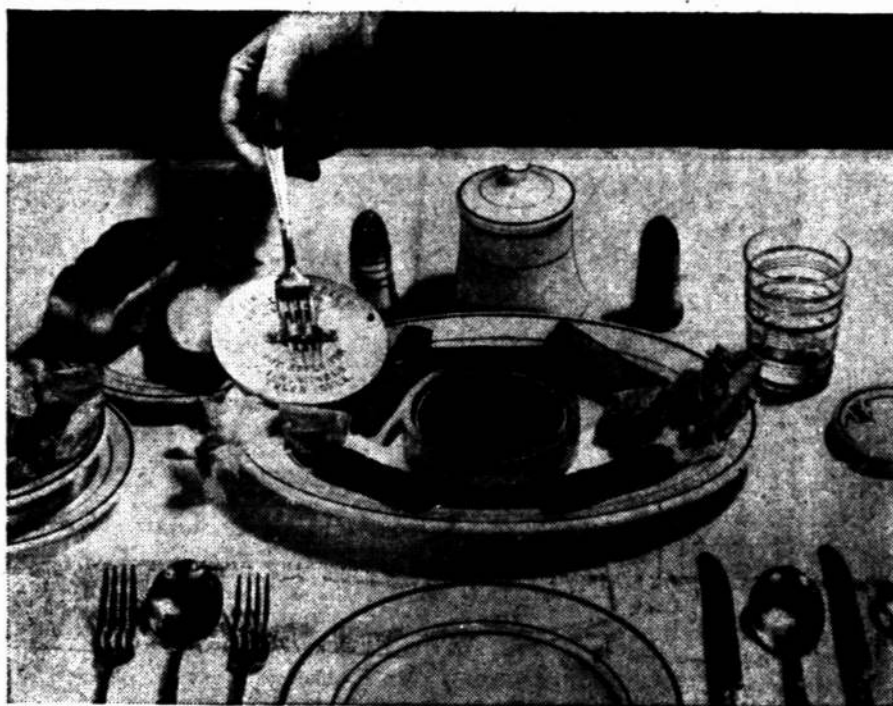

METHODS OF IMPROVING TEXAS FARMS FOR QUAIL MAY ALSO IMPROVE PASTURES

The increase of bermuda grass and the decrease of needle grass and bitterweed in the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas pastures at College Station, where experiments in quail management practices are being conducted by the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Service, are both good indications that pastures may be improved for quail and cattle at the same time. Spring plowing and spot burning for the increase of quail foods is proving to be efficient this year for that purpose and it is possible that in many cases considerable improvements in the value of the pastures for cattle may also result, although these Texas experiments are only in their first season and final conclusions cannot be made.

One of the first problems that received attention of the Texas Cooperative Wildlife Service when it began its work at College Station in December 1935 was how quail cover and food conditions may be managed—how the Texas farm could be improved for quail. These experiments resemble somewhat those of Stoddard in Georgia. Ten foot strips were plowed across the parts of the pasture where needle-grass was thickest and then after dark on a quiet night slow fires were set in spots between the strips. These burning and plowing operations were repeated at intervals during the spring of 1936.

A great many plants showed some change on the experimental plots. Dove-weed, one of the best quail foods, made an average increase of over 1500 percent. Bermuda grass, buffalo burr, and horse nettle, also made definite increases. These are all good quail foods and one is a valuable pasture grass. Some plants, especially needlegrass and bitterweed were at least temporarily reduced in amount by burning. These will be of even greater interest to pasture managers than those increased.

Fifteen Fire Cautions

1. Keep children and fire safely apart. Children can be taught the dangers of fire. Keep matches out of the way of children.
2. Do not throw away cigars, cigarettes and matches without first extinguishing them. A careless smoker is as bad as an electric storm to burn the buildings.
3. Do not allow accumulations of combustible waste materials in or near the house. Without them fires from carelessly discarded smoking materials would be less frequent.
4. Keep chimneys and stovepipes clean with all joints and connections tight. Provide separate metal cans for ashes and for rubbish. Never mix.
5. Place substantial fire-resistant guards in front of all woodwork close to sources of heat. The open flames of gas, kerosene, alcohol, and gasoline stoves should be particularly shielded.
6. Keep greasy and oily rags in tightly closed metal cans provided for that purpose.
7. Avoid the filling of lighted lamps. Avoid the use of kerosene to light or quicken fires. The application of heat

to kerosene results in the generation of gases which are very explosive.

8. Do not use gasoline, naphtha, or benzene for cleaning. Use some of the safer solutions now obtainable and these in any considerable quantity, out of doors and during the day.

9. Keep all open flames away from gas leaks. Explosive mixture of gas and air are quickly formed in such places, and they only need a lighted match or a taper to cause disastrous results.

10. Avoid hanging lace curtains or other draperies near gas jets or other open flames. The draft from near-by windows may cause fires quick to spread and difficult to extinguish.

11. Avoid toy wax candles. Each year a number of deaths of children due to placing candles on Christmas trees produces a sad ending for an otherwise joyful season.

12. Never leave babies alone in the house—not even a minute where there is a lighted lamp or open fire.

13. This is an age of electricity. Let's learn to use it with safety. Permit only experienced persons to install or repair electrical fittings and appliances. There are definite rules for wiring, which if known and observed will prevent electrical fires. Keep a supply of fuses on hand. Do not use a penny for a fuse. When a fuse burns out replace it with a new one.

14. Turn the current off on an electrical pressing iron or other electrical appliance before leaving it.

15. Two good Safety points: (A) Make it a point to know how to get out of every building you enter. (B) Never sit in a closed room or office. Always ventilate with fresh air. These two precautions may mean the saving of your life and of others in case of fire.

TEXANS IN STATE CHARITY INSTITUTIONS

Denton, Feb. 16—Approximately 11,000 unfortunate Texans will require care from state-supported charitable institutions this year. The blind, the deaf, the dumb, the insane, the aged and homeless men, women, and children, and the tuberculosis patients of the state are now cared for in seven separate institutions widely scattered over the state.

To care for this large number of unfortunate, the Board of Control recently recommended a budget of \$14,728,299. It has also recommended a new insane hospital in West Texas, centrally located to serve that section; facilities for 150 additional patients at the Abilene State Hospital for Epileptics; a new building at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium; a cottage-type building at the Gainesville Girls' Training School; and the expansion of child welfare division activities to relieve the strain on orphanages.

State institutions include the Texas School for the Blind, Austin, with 220

students; Texas School for the Deaf, Austin, 511; State School for Deaf, Blind for Colored Youth, Austin, 283; State Home and School, Corsicana, 879; Austin State School, Austin, 1298; Confederate Home, Austin, 190; and Confederate Woman's Home, Austin, 91.

State Tuberculosis Sanatorium, San Angelo, 800; Home for Neglected and Dependent Children, Waco, 379; State Juvenile Training School, Gainesville, 972; Girls' Training School, Gainesville, 240; and State hospitals at Abilene, 1,106; Austin, 2,331; Rusk, 2,250; San Antonio, 2,550; Terrell, 2,368, and Wichita Falls, 2,200.
