Policemen Grab Forger Leaving Store Here

Police arrested a 23-year-old man seconds after he passed a forged \$75 check in a Colorado City store Wednesday morning.

He was attempting to drive away from Safeway when Police Chief Jesse Browning and Patrolman Nick Martinez blocked his path with their patrol car.

Police were on the alert for the man after two \$50 forged checks had been cashed Tuesday at the same Safeway store and at Day 'N Nite Drive-In Food Store.

Two additional checks -- already made out for sums of \$66.50 and \$125 -- were on the suspect when taken into custody.

Chief Browning said the two uncashed checks were in the man's pocket.

All the forgeries were on personalized checks of John B. Harvey of Colorado City.

Harvey reported to police he had abandoned his car for a period of time Tuesday near Coahoma after a mechanical failure. A check book was in the car at that time.

Browning said he believed the forger, who is from Haskell, probably stopped at the car and stole Harvey's blank checks while the vehicle was unattended.

Police had been on the look-

out for the forger after the two checks were passed here Tuesday. They had a description of his car and a license plate number observed at Day 'N Nite.

Chief Browning and Martinez

were in the vicinity of Safeway at mid-morning Wednesday when the patrolman spotted the Pontiac at the store.

"We just whipped our patrol car around in front of the man's

car as he was leaving the Safeway parking lot," Browning said.

He had just cashed the \$75 check in Safeway and had been recognized from the day before as he started to depart.

Raise For Supt.

Unanimous Vote By School Board

Salary for Supt. James McMath will increase to \$16,662 for the current year but Colorado Independent School District actually will be paying less locally.

School board voted unanimously Monday to raise the superintendent's pay from the 1968-69 level to \$16,662 plus car allowance.

Car allowance increases from \$60 per month during the last year to \$75.

Despite the new increase,

McMath total pay -- combined salary and auto allowance -- is the lowest of any AAA in District 3-AAA. Salaries for superintendents in the district range from Colorado City's combined total of \$17,562 to a salary high of \$19,012 plus car and car expenses.

The fact that the Colorado City school district will be paying less from local funds into the increased salary results from the recent Texas Legislature's increase in school salaries.

For 1968-69 the state

minimum foundation paid \$11,981 and the district \$2,999 for the superintendent's \$14,980 salary. Car allowance of \$60 was paid by the district.

Now, under the new legislation, the state pays the foundation minimum of \$15,462 while the district pays \$2,200 above this minimum for a total salary of \$16,662. As previously, the district pays the entire \$75 monthly car allowance.

Board member A. K. (Kay) McCarty Jr. presented the motion, seconded by W. J. (Dub) Waldrip, for the increase after Board President Tom Rees placed the salary question before the board.

Other school salaries were set earlier by the board, which also earlier has authorized renewal of McMath's contract. However, it was decided to wait until final legislative action before setting the superintendent's salary, Rees said.

Ned Smith Funeral Wednesday

Funeral for Ned Smith, 52-year-old Mitchell County farmer was conducted Wednesday in Kiker and Son Chapel.

Smith was found dead on his tractor Monday about 7:45 p.m. after failing to return home. He suffered an apparent heart attack.

Officiating in final services were Rev. Billy Wilkinson of First United Methodist Church and Rev. Caddo Matthews, pastor of Plainview Baptist Church.

Burial was in Colorado City Cemetery under the direction of Kiker and Son.

Pallbearers were Hunter Mann, James Cox, John Russell, Mark Vest, R. B. Baker and Herman Moody.

Colorado High Wolves open their 1969 AAA football schedule Friday, traveling to Sweetwater for a 7:30 p.m. contest with highly-regarded Ponies.

Both are in District 3-AAA but are in separate zones.

Coach Truman Nix's club, underdogs in this new season of 3-AAA play, were impressive last weekend when they outscored AA Stamford in a scrimmage in Merkel.

Sweetwater, runner-up for district championship last year, is tagged as strong contender again this year.

The weekend football schedule returns to Colorado City Saturday when the Colorado High Freshmen tangle with Snyder's Travis Junior High at 6 p.m. and C-City's Junior Varsity against Coahoma B at 7:30 p.m.

On the sidelines with the Wolves in Sweetwater will be Emmett Banks, booster of the week, and Jay Guelker, dad of the week, from the Quarterback Club.

Quarterback members will meet at the field house here Friday at 6 p.m. to provide a "send-off" for the varsity to Sweetwater.

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New Owners • Third Of Families Moving From Public Housing Purchase Homes

Approximately one third of the tenants moving out of Colorado City's public housing apartments last year bought homes in the city.

That's the report from Colorado City Housing Authority which administers and operates the community's 50 public housing units.

Seventeen tenants moved out of the units during the 12-month fiscal period between April 1, 1968, and March 31, 1969. Six of these purchased their own homes when they had the low rent apartments.

During the 12-month period the city's 50 units averaged 49 per month occupied, according to the report prepared by Dee Tonn, manager for the public housing units.

Average monthly rent paid in this period was \$26.93 per tenant.

Occupancy according to ethnic backgrounds are almost equal, although black tenants number the most. Thirteen of the tenants, as of last March 31, were Mexican-American, 19 were Negro and 17 were Anglo.

Sixteen of the apartments were occupied by elderly tenants.

Financial stability of the Colorado City Housing Authority, which is financed by its rent collections and bond issued and paid for under the federal housing program and not by local tax funds, is rated "very strong" for the sixth consecutive year. This rating is by the Federal Housing & Urban Development Administration and is based on federal measurements for authority all across the nation.

The Colorado City authority

paid out \$13,284 in total operating expenses during the 12-month period while receiving \$16,537 income. This left a residue of \$3,253 before payment to the Federal Public Housing Authority.

Rental brought in \$14,571 while \$549 came from additional charges to tenants and \$416 from interest on investments.

Expenditures included \$3,341 for administration, \$2,572 for utilities, \$4,989 for labor and materials in maintenance to the apartments, \$719 for insurance, \$1,300 paid in lieu of taxes, \$100 in rent collection losses, \$190 in social security taxes, \$80 for termite control.

The local authority had a total of \$9,534.29 in investments and deposits as of March 31. This included \$8,000 at Colorado Federal Savings & Loan plus \$1,206 more in general fund deposits.

City Council heard the report and officially accepted it under provisions of the charter of the housing authority.



68.5 Park Acres

Expansion At Lake Colorado City

Fifty-five more acres of scenic land and approximately 70 more surface acres of water will become available to public use Jan. 1 at Lake Colorado City.

Expanded area for outdoor recreation -- more than quadrupling the size of the city's Merritt Park on the lake's west shore -- will result from a new lease agreement between the City of Colorado City and Texas Electric Service Company.

City Council voted unanimously to approve the lease, a project proposed and spearheaded over a period of almost 10 months by City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr., Don Benson, local manager for TESCO and Chamber of Commerce president, and Larry Kinard, superintendent of TESCO's Morgan Creek Power Plant.

Previous lease agreements prevent Texas Electric from making the expansion area available until after Jan. 1.

The new area, viewed by many sportsmen as probably one of the most attractively scenic area at the lake, will increase the size of Merritt Park to 68.5 acres.

It will envelope a peninsula jutting out into now-restricted water south across the lake from Wyatt's Point, and will extend west and south around Dorn's Draw.

The new acreage is about 900 feet at its widest point and will provide an unprecedented potential for park development.

With the additional lake waters in the vicinity of the park, Texas Electric will open a portion of one of the finest fishing areas within the entire southwest.

This is the area behind the line of barrels which cut the public away from the intake and discharge near the power plant where warm water from the huge generators provide excellent spawning for fish.

Benson praised City Manager for innovating the expansion plan and commended the cooperation between all parties that culminated in the final decision.

"On behalf of Texas Electric Service Company," Benson stated, "I commend the City Parks and Recreation Board

for splendid developing of the city's Merritt Park and, thus, making evident the potential for additional development."

"Our Chamber of Commerce also is proud of this program and is certain that the improvements and developments of these new 55 acres will make out lake park one of the most outstanding for any lake in Texas."

Benson added that it was with regret that TESCO could not -- because of earlier agreements -- make the land available before Jan. 1.

City Manager Sadler, who watched crowds overflow the city park at the lake and other public areas even after full development, envisioned the larger park area and contacted Benson and Kinard in January.

The trio inspected the site, repeatedly studied the terrain and possible limits, then recommended the program to TESCO officials in Fort Worth.

W. G. Marguardt, vice president of operations, and Jim Pennybaker, superintendent of power, became interested in the

lake plans and pushed the project in Fort Worth.

Burl B. Hulsey and other officials gave their nod for the new lease after boundaries, legalities and other requirements were finalized.

Also active in the planning was the State Fish & Game Commission, which recognized lake as one of the most unusual and best for fishing.

Lake Home Combines Mobility, Ingenuity

A sign of the times is the mobile home of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Moser at Lake Cham- pion.

It doesn't look like a mobile structure from the outside.

And the spacious rooms inside do not give a hint of "mobility."

Facts are that the house is not one but two mobile units planned and built to be connected together at the home site, is set on a concrete foundation and has porches, patios and a double carport underneath the roof flashing that gives an all-in-one look.

A definite advantage of purchasing a home of this type, according to Mrs. Moser, is

time element involved. They ordered their home from a Denton company the first week in February, 1968, and moved into the finished residence the second day of March—just three weeks later.

The home has white vinyl siding, regular mobile windows, sliding glass doors in the living room and bedroom which overlook Lake Champion, eight-foot acoustical ceilings and ash paneling.

Cabinets are plentiful in the kitchen and utility room. More storage space is located above the pass through counter from the kitchen to dining area. Beige formica covers cabinet tops.

A hanging Early American brass lamp and indirect lighting is used in the kitchen.

Avocado carpeting covers floors in the living-dining room, hallway and bedrooms.

A Duncan Five mahogany dining room suite compliments period furniture in the living room area. Accenting the furnishings is a couch re-finished in gray wood trim and matching linen embroidered with dainty yellow and avocado floral designs.

Draperies of avocado and

white loose woven fabric hang from brass rods.

Occasional chairs, a marble topped round coffee table and a white and gold French Provincial pole lame complete the living room decor.

Regular mobile home splash board is used around the tub and shower in the full bath.

Formica cover dressing table top and a three-way mirror hides bathroom storage area.

Future plans for the Mosers include replacing splash board with ceramic tile and carpeting both baths, kitchen and utility area.

Big, roomy closets in bed-

rooms and hallway are closed by sliding doors. Vented doors are used in the bedroom area.

Guest bedroom has contemporary furnishings.

Master bedroom, a 12 1/2 by 20 foot area, is furnished with French Provincial furnishings and accented by three antique

pieces - a picture depicting the life of Christ from His birth to ascension, a large walnut table and a small hand carved, teakwood table with dragon legs.

Mr. and Mrs. Moser have given the companion chair for the teakwood table to the local museum.

A half bath and two large closets are located off the master bedroom. Sliding glass doors and windows are covered with light avocado and gold drapes.

Lake side of the Moser home is landscaped with weeping willows, nonbearing mulberry and various fruit trees.

Mr. Moser retired about six years ago after 39 years in

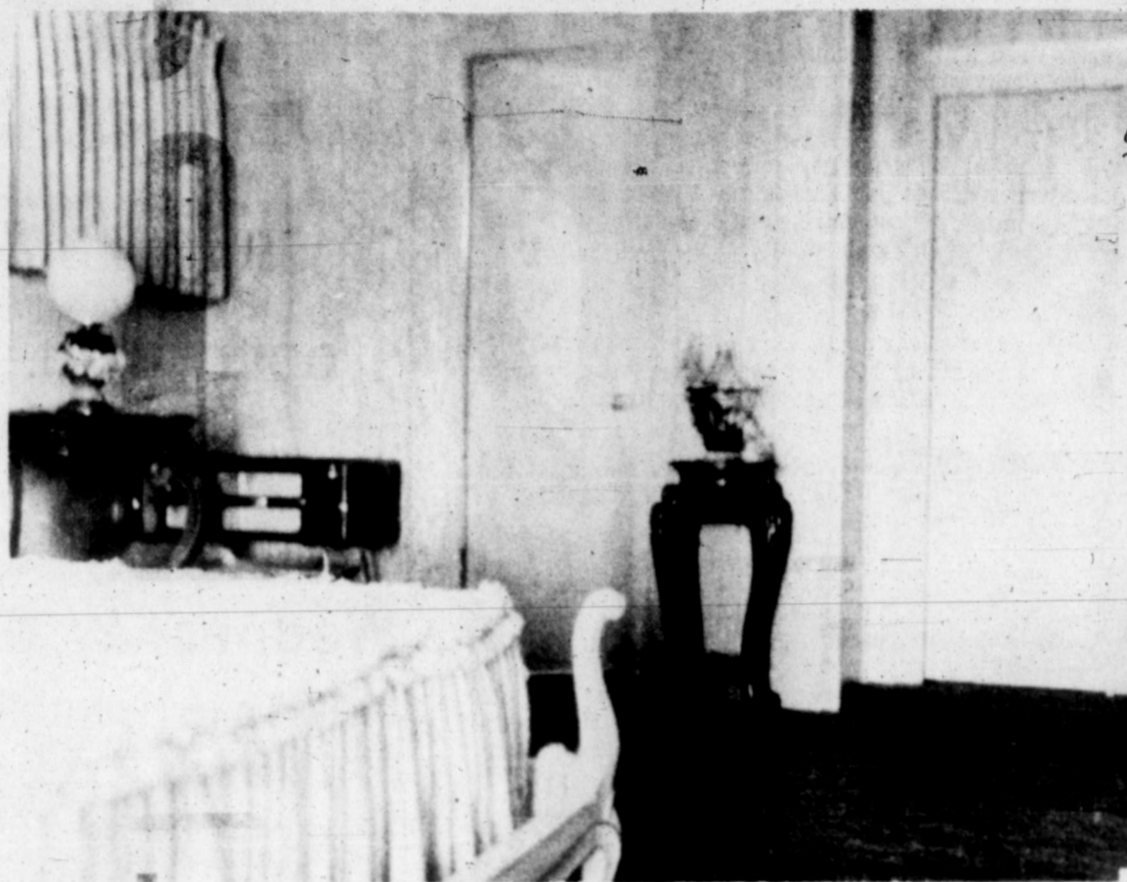
the wholesale produce business here and since that time he and Mrs. Moser have traveled, fishing and sight-seeing in various parts of the country.
