Blue ribbons came in bunches to Earl Brown and James Kelley, exhibitors in Agriculture Division of 1959 Mitchell County Fair.

Brown, Hereford breeder and landowner, won six of the first place ribbons with versatility in all phases of agriculture.

Fire Damages Oil Storage At Cuthbert

Fire caused extensive damage Thursday morning to an oil field storage facility in the Cuthbert area.

Colorado City firemen, who extinguished the fire, believe the blaze was started by lightning in the pre-dawn thunderstorms about 3 a. m. Thursday.

Tank batteries, storage tanks and other facilities were burned. One tank almost collapsed, a steel catwalk buckled and firemen improvised step ladders to fight the fire.

The fire was at oil production storage owned by Walter W. Krug of Odessa on the C. C. Mills lease. A boy discovered the tanks blazing at about 8 a. m. and notified the alarm. City firemen were at the scene two hours before the blaze was extinguished.

City's Water Plant Employee Is Certified

J. M. Watson, three-year employee at Colorado City's municipal water plant, has received a Grade C "certificate of competency" for his skill and knowledge of water plant operation.

The certificate was awarded under Texas' general sanitation law that water plants furnishing the public must be under supervision of an operator who has proved his talent for the job in written examination and who has been certified by Texas State Department of Health.

Watson's examination for Grade C certification covers fundamental knowledge in quality requirements for a public water supply, interpretation of bacteriological analysis, selection of pumps, well or surface supply sanitation, distribution system sanitation and procedures in pipe laying and maintenance.

The certification requires a minimum of one year experience plus credits earned by attendance at annual district and state water works short schools sponsored by State Health Department, the engineering extension service of Texas A&M College and Texas Water & Sewage Works Association.

5 Wolf Opponents Lose as 4 Triumph

The Ballinger Bearcats, opponents here next Friday night for Colorado City Wolves, did an excellent job of losing their Friday night game to Stamford. Final score was 55-6.

While the Wolves were idle Friday night, nine future Wolf

opponents were playing games that may be indications of how well the Wolves will do in the season ahead. Five of the teams registered losses and the other four won.

In the first quarter of the Ballinger game, the Bearcats who lost also to Brady last week, held the Bulldogs score-

less. The Bulldogs made up for lost time in the second quarter and scored 35 points. Pip Lee, Ballinger quarterback, threw to Ballinger end, Bill Jones, who ran 20 yards to make the only score for the Bearcats. This was late in the fourth quarter of the game.

This game left Ballinger still looking for its first victory of the season. Maybe the Colorado City Wolves can make them look some more. But Ballinger's opponents have been among the state's finest and the Bearcats have had habit in past years of being "up" and at their best against the Wolves.

The Winters Blizzards, who will meet the Wolves here October 9, won their Friday night game with Anson by a score of 14 to 6. The first half moved slowly, but both teams speeded up in the last half.

The Sweetwater Mustangs, last team on the Wolf schedule, got the round end of a 24-0 score, Friday night in their game played in Sweetwater against powerful Breckenridge. The Mustangs helped give the game away by fumbling since all three of the Breckenridge scores were made as results of Mustang fumbles.

The Lamesa Tornados, Nov. 13th opponents of the Wolves, made only one score against the District 2AAAA Midland Tornados Friday night. Lamesa is a title threat in the Wolves' District 3AAA. Final score was 17-6.

Snyder Tigers, another 3AAA club and who plays the Wolves here Oct. 30, fell victim Friday night to a called back touchdown and a fumble. The Tigers could, at least have tied the Breckenridge-Bulldogs had it not been for the called back TD and the fumble. As it was, the 3AAAA Bulldogs won the game 12-0.

The Wolves' opponents for Nov. 6, Lakeview Chiefs, started late in their season opening game and lost to Kerrville's Tivy Antlers. Although they started late, the 3AAA chiefs played a good game after they got underway. Final score was 20-16.

The Kermit Jellow Jackets who meet the Wolves Oct. 3 in Kermit, opened their opening season by beating the Hobbs Eagles 12-0. Good passing was responsible for both scores.

Two other future Wolf opponents, played Friday night. They were Monahans and Andrews. Monahans won over Crane by a score of 26 to 8. Andrews won their game with Seminole, 12 to 8.

Ladd, as the much maligned, but stalwart artist, gives a fine rendering of a man in a

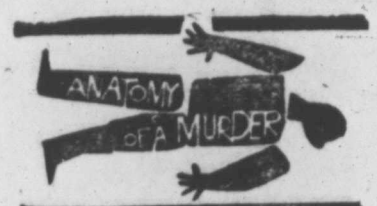

For instance, women in Italy are so strikingly beautiful your head is in a whirl as they pass you on the street.

And the cosmetics and notions we might think are all our own, well, these are on the store counters throughout Europe.

Only difference is the price. A five-cent packet of Kleenex here costs 20 cents in Europe and 5 cents in Israel, Mrs. Berman reports.

At Style Show

Mrs. Berman, who is chock full of interesting information concerning the trip she and her husband made by land, sea and air, isn't kidding about the beauty of the Italian women. She attended a style show, too, while in Rome and feasted her eyes upon the latest from Italian fashion houses.

"Not only are the women outstunningly lovely," she said, "but their dress also is above average."

"The women are so pretty it is not uncommon to stop and stare at them as they pass you on the street."

The Berman's stayed in Italy 11 days and were served

a different kind of spaghetti each meal. The food was served personally, as it is in France and other European countries — cooked and served at your table from heated chafing dishes.

Many of the foods are boiled, mixed and seasoned before your very eyes at your individual table in the many eating villas in Eastern Europe, she said.

Many Castles

Castles began to look common as apartment houses by the time the Berman tour was over. Majority of architecture they saw was old but ornate, and many of them seemed to be the pride of the natives of the various countries. All were interesting and with character.

Only country with modern architecture was seen in Israel, a new country, where many of the buildings are similar to ours in the United States.

In Amsterdam, Holland, the Berman's visited in the home of a cousin whom they had never seen. She was in a German concentration camp during World War II.

An unexpected pleasure for the Berman's was their chance meeting of Otto Frank, father of the celebrated Anne Frank, and the one responsible for the "Diary of Anne Frank." It was just after the initial meeting in the London Town Hall of the World Union Of Progressive Reformed Judaism which the Berman's attended from July 9 to July 16th.

"We met Mr. Frank while we were all waiting outside Town Hall for a taxicab to return to our respective hotels," said Mrs. Berman. "After inquiring, Mr. Frank learned we would be going his way and asked to share a taxicab with them."

"Later we met on various occasions during the world meeting in London."

Frank asked the Berman's to visit his home in Amsterdam, Holland. In return, the Berman's invited him to visit them in Colorado City when he returned to America.

Frank said the royalties from "Diary of Anne Frank" went to charities throughout the world.

Celebrities whom the Berman's saw in Nice, France, were Gary Cooper, his wife and daughter; Roz Russell, and Van Johnson, all Hollywood movie stars who dined alongside the Berman's in the dining room of a resort hotel.

They saw George Gobel in the lobby of their hotel in London, and Liberace played for them on board the Queen Elizabeth as they crossed the Atlantic.

Among the guests touring with the Berman's was Judge Lena Barron of Boston Massachusetts, voted "Mother of the Year for 1959." She is the only woman to ever sit on the Massachusetts supreme court and Mrs. Berman reports that she is very personable and likable.

While attending the World meeting in London the Colorado City couple met and visited with the national president of Temple Sisterhood which represents over 100,000 people. They also visited with Lady Montagu, former President of

"I didn't want to wear a Russian flag, so she chose the locket," Mrs. Berman smiled. Another item she bought in each country was a doll. All the dolls she sent to Dallas as a grand gift to her granddaughter, Tony Berman.

JANE MERRILL SPEAKS

Power of Speech Is Topic Of Beta Sigma Phi Talk

Miss Jane Merrill, president of Beta Sigma Phi, was speaker for the reassembly dinner Tuesday night in the Terrace Room of the Baker Hotel, for the sorority Mu Pi Chapter.

Topic of her talk was "Oratory."

She said that oratory, according to the Daniel Webster, is

"think as he thinks and feel as he feels."

Beginning her talk with a quote from Adolph Hitler, Miss Merrill said if another mad leader uses the oratorical powers of a Hitler to arouse men, the end of civilization, as we now know it, would be ended.

It was Hitler, himself, who said "The power which has set in motion the greatest avalanches in politics and religion has been, from the beginning of time, the magic force of the spoken word—that and that alone."

The speaker emphasized that for obvious reasons speech has immeasurably more power now than in previous generations. The greatest orators of former generations spoke to scarcely a million hearers in a lifetime. Even at the beginning of the century, it was uncommon for anyone to be reached by public speaking more than once a week, the speaker emphasized.

Miss Merrill said that, above all, effective speaking is not the artificial, pedantic speaking of those who are rigidly governed by rules devised by writers who rarely come to grips with real audiences.

Effective speech is direct utterance adapted to the needs of the audience, she noted.
