School Betterment League.

Early in last school year the teachers of Robert Lee School issued invitations to the women of the vicinity to meet with them to consider a matter of vital importance.

The outcome of this meeting was the formation of the Robert Lee School Betterment League, whose object is to raise money for better school equipment and otherwise promote the cause of education in Robert Lee.

Any man or woman interested in the above subject is eligible for membership; the dues are 5 cents per month; and at the present time, 42 names are on the role.

If that wonderful utterance—"By their fruits ye shall know them," be true, then the R. L. S. B. League has justified itself in the few months of its existence. In this time it has, by various means raised the sum of \$307.12, disbursed \$247.70, leaving on hand \$59.42.

The money spent has been judiciously expended for better equipment for the school, among which may be mentioned: Improved black-board and helps in the way of charts, maps, globes, compass. The reconstruction of the primary room with single desks and construction of a cloak room, two unabridged dictionaries and holders, a set of valuable reference books, a set of standard encyclopedias, and a book case.

The League is proud of its achievements but feels that this is only the beginning. The members have been spurred on in their efforts, not only by the great needs, but by the realization that increased facilities means increased efficiency both in learning and in teaching, and thus the children are the gainers all the way round.

The League will continue its activities during the summer, and all members and those contemplating enrolling are reminded that the regular time of meeting is Friday after the first Monday in each month. The next meeting will be at the residence of the President, Mrs. D. I. Durham. Everybody come out and work for the interest of the children.

Good Roads Day Proclamation.

Coke County having fairly entered upon an era of road building and improvement, an enterprise which, I believe, vitally effects the educational, moral and commercial well being of this whole county, and believing, as I do, that the most serviceable of all forms of transportation, is the improved public high-way, I hereby designate July 1st, August 3rd and September 1st 1915 as Good Roads Days for Coke County and request that all places of business be closed and business suspended on these days and that they be set apart for voluntary road workings throughout the county.

Mr. J. S. Cox Dead.

Mr. J. S. Cox died in this city Wednesday night at 9 o'clock at the home of his son-in-law C. T. Bradley. The remains were interred in the Robert Lee cemetery Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The funeral services, both at the residence and grave were conducted by Rev. D. T. Murphy, assisted by Revs. J. H. Smith and J. C. Mayhew.

The deceased was 75 years of age and had been a sufferer from that dreaded disease, cancer for some fifteen years. Six years ago he had an arm amputated in the hopes of a cure but the disease appeared again on his face.

He was a lifelong member of the Missionary Baptist church and was a patient, confident christian through all his suffering.

He was treated as tenderly as a child by devoted children. The patient devotion of his daughter, Mrs. C. T. Bradley was ever present and administered to his every want from whom she was never out of his call, night or day. Other members of the family also did all in their power but it was not so they could always be with him.

The deceased was one of the most patient, uncomplaining christian characters we have ever known and no one could say aught against him.

The Baby From the Farm

The agricultural fairs which are responsible for raising the standard of farm life and for standardizing stock, grain, farm products in general, have taken up a new line of work.

They are improving their farm products that has been, in a way, sadly neglected,—the farm baby. Incidentally they are giving the town and city babies a helping hand, and they are doing it all through what is known as a Better Babies Contest.

If you have not heard of the contest to be held in San Angelo June 8th, 1915, read about it now. The babies are entered like any other exhibit at an agricultural fair, but with this difference—they are not on exhibition all the time. They are examined by judges, just as live stock, grain or apples are examined.

The judges are physicians, and they test the baby by standards which have been set by specialists in the care and feeding of children, who know just how much a baby should weigh and measure and what its general development should be at a given age.

Many readers of this paper can look back to the day when the fair started to standardize their farm products. The farmers who thought they were raising pretty good live stock and mighty fine grain, entered them in a competition with what other farmers were raising. Some times they learned that they

were raising prize winning products; again they found that their farm products were far below the standard set by the judges. And what did they do—these men who took second, third and last prizes? They went back to their farms, took better care of their live stock, raised better grain the next year, and they have been doing that ever since. The result has been a higher grade of live stock in their barns, higher grade of products in their fields, and all because the county or state fair set the standards.

Now that is just what the Civic League is doing when they offer prizes in the Better Babies Contest. They are setting a standard for baby health and baby strength and baby development. They are notifying the parents to bring along the babies from the farm, town and city, for comparison with these standards. They are giving prizes to the babies pronounced best by the judges, and best of all, when the babies do not come up to the standard, and do not win prizes, the judges are telling the parents why, and how the baby can be made better for another year's contest and for all its life.

The result is bound to be not prettier babies, but better babies at each year's contest—a stronger, healthier race of people on the farm, in small towns and in cities.

Do you believe that your League people are doing a good

work? If you have no baby—see the contest anyhow. See the Better Babies Health Exhibit. Tell your neighbors about it and help your friends to interest every body in this splendid work of standardizing the American baby.

This Better Baby Contest will be held June 8th in San Angelo.

Applications must be made by mail or in person from May 17th to June 4th. Send in your application as early as possible so that the appointment cards telling the mother what time to bring the baby can be mailed her and received in plenty time.

The age limit will be between six months and thirty six months. If any mother has a baby, either a sickly one or a big fat one be sure to bring it to the baby contest. The Physicians will examine it and tell its mother what is wrong with it. If a sickly delicate child, while the fine healthy baby will have a chance to win one of the handsome bronze medals given for the highest scoring baby.

All of this contest is given free to the mothers and their babies. We want the country mothers to know about this great opportunity offered them and to bring their little ones to this Better Baby Contest. YOUNG FOLKS' CORNER

Who Wears the Ring?

The number of persons participating in the game should not exceed nine. Some one of the company is selected, unknown to you, to put a ring on one of his fingers. You now say you will tell him who wears the ring; second, the hand it is on; third, the finger of the hand, and, fourth, the joint of the finger. This is apparently presuming to do a great deal, and your hearers will look on at first rather dubiously.

The company being seated in regular order, the persons must be numbered 1, 2, 3, etc. The thumb must be termed the first finger, the forefinger being the second. The joint nearest the extremity must be called the first joint, the right hand is one and the left hand two.

These preliminaries arranged, leave the room to order that the ring may be placed unobserved by you. Suppose that the third person has the ring on the right hand, third finger and first joint. Your object is to discover the figures 3131. Returning to the room, ask one of the company to perform secretly the following arithmetical operations:

- 1.—Double the number of the person who has the ring. In the case supposed this will produce..... 6
- 2.—Add 1 to the result..... 7
- 3.—Multiply by 5..... 35
- 4.—Add 10..... 45
- 5.—Add the number denoting the hand..... 36
- 6.—Multiply by 10..... 360
- 7.—Add the number denoting the finger..... 3131
- 8.—Add the number denoting the joint..... 3131

He must apprise you of the figures produced, 3096. You will then, in all cases, subtract from it 3535. In the present instance there will remain 3131, denoting the person No. 3, the hand No. 1, the finger No. 3 and the joint No. 1.

Growth of Boy Scouts. Notwithstanding the rapid development and great extent of scouting at the present time in this country, we are, after all, reaching but a small percentage of the boys whose interest might be had if adequate leadership were provided. Judging from the reports from all parts of the country, the present basis upon which we are now organized and going forward seems to assure a greatly increased development during the coming year. From Oct. 1, 1914, to Feb. 5, 1915, 45,339 boys were enrolled, as compared with 32,929 for the same period of 1913 and 1914; 839 new troops were organized, as compared with 533 for the same period of 1913-14. Commissioners were granted to 4,113 men to serve as scout masters and assistants, as compared with 2,251 for the same period of 1913-14.—Report of Boy Scouts of America.

Scouts Off on Long Hike. With flags flying from a two wheeled trek cart built especially to convey their camp equipment and food supplies across the continent, six boy scouts under the leadership of H. S. Sorrells, former scout executive at St. Paul, recently left St. Paul for a 2,800 mile hike to San Francisco.

They expect to reach the end of their journey about Sept. 1. Sorrells said that every foot of the distance will be walked. Attached to the cart are six ropes, which the boys will use to haul the vehicle.

The Commercial club equipped the boys with cots and ponchos and has provided two signs to be displayed on their cart reading, "Boy Scouts of America of St. Paul, Minnesota, Leaving From St. Paul for San Francisco, Distance 2,800 Miles."

A Fine St. Bernard Dog. In Minneapolis there is a St. Bernard dog that deserves a gold medal. He has trained himself to stop runaway horses and has performed several feats in that line. Not long ago, while this dog was taking a walk with his nose along, just ahead of a party of ladies were crossing the street, and there seemed to be no escape from certain death, when the dog gave a leap and caught the lines of the runaway between his teeth. His great weight brought the frightened animal to his haunches just as he was within six feet of the terrified women.

NOTABLE IN THE LIMELIGHT

Louis D. Brandeis, Special Treasury Counsel.

In the trial of the suit instituted by the Riggs National bank of Washington against officials of the United States treasury department Louis D. Brandeis of Boston will act as special counsel for the accused officials. The bank has accused Secretary of the Treasury William G. McAdoo, Treasurer John Burke and comptroller of the currency John Skelton Williams of conspiracy to wreck it.

For many years Mr. Brandeis has been a national figure in American public life. He is an advocate of social reforms, a publicist of renown, a lawyer of distinction, who has served as special counsel for the government in many celebrated cases. Mr. Brandeis is regarded as an expert in legislation and administration efficiency.

While Mr. Brandeis is largely a product of New England, he is not a Yankee. He was born of German-Jewish parents in Kentucky in 1856. After a preliminary education in Germany he went to Harvard law school, was a professor there for awhile and then began practice in Boston. Soon he was recognized as one of the most successful lawyers and acquired one of the biggest practices in the city. Although a man in public life, Mr. Brandeis is not in politics. His use of politics has been merely as a means to the end of pushing social and economic movements. Several years ago his admirers tried to get him to run for mayor of Boston on a nonpartisan ticket, but failed to get him interested.

Nephew of the Czar. Recent dispatches from the scene of war operations in Poland have made

GRAND DUKE DIMITRI. mention of Grand Duke Dimitri of Russia, who was attached to the army which invested Pzemy and compelled the capitulation of that fortified city. Grand Duke Dimitri is a cousin of the czar, and is the son of Grand Duke Paul, brother of the late czar Alexander III. He was born near Moscow on Sept. 6, 1881, his mother dying six days later.

Like all of the Moscowite grand dukes, he was educated for a military career, and after graduating from the war college he entered the cavalry. After serving as a subordinate for a time he was appointed adjutant to the adjutant of the Eleventh regiment of grenadier guards and later was made captain in the Second regiment of the fusiliers of the Imperial guard. Since hostilities began he has been on the fighting line and recently was decorated as knight of the order of St. George in recognition of meritorious services in the field.

THE KITCHEN GUPBOARD

PICKLES AND CONSERVES.

THE recipes following can all be very highly recommended, the first being a southern delicacy that comes from a New Orleans house-keeper.

Sweet Pickle Relish.—The ingredients required are one dozen salt pickles, to be purchased at almost any grocery shop; one pound of light brown sugar, a spice bag containing eight whole cloves, one tablespoonful of whole allspice and two sticks of cinnamon, broken into small pieces, about one pint of cider vinegar and a quarter of a pound of seeded raisins. Cut the pickles in slices one inch thick. Place the pickles, raisins and sugar in a stone crock and let them remain overnight. In the morning drain off a little of the watery liquid (not the sugar), turn into a preserving kettle, cover with the vinegar and add the spice bag. Boil for fifteen minutes; then remove the pickles and cook down the sirup with the raisins until it is as thick as honey. Return the pickles to the sirup, let it all boil up once more and seal in self sealing jars, as one does with preserves. This pickle will keep for a long time.

Apple Ginger Conserve.—Use tart, juicy apples for this relish. Peel and cut the apples into eighths. Place them in a large graniteware kettle, arranging them in layers, and sprinkle brown sugar generously between each layer. Then add to each quart of chopped preserved ginger and sufficient vinegar to barely cover the fruit. Allow the apples to stand overnight, and in the morning place over a moderate fire and bring slowly to the boiling point. Simmer until the fruit is tender, but not broken; then skin out the apples and boil down the sirup until quite thick. Seal all, boiling hot, in air tight jars.

Spiced Peaches.—Wash the dried or evaporated peaches and soak them overnight with cold water to cover. Then drain and to five pounds of the fruit use two pounds of sugar, one-quarter of an ounce of cinnamon, the same quantity of ground cloves and mace and one quart of vinegar. Put the vinegar in a graniteware kettle with the sugar and the spices in a small cheesecloth bag. Simmer this sirup for fifteen minutes; then put in the peaches to cook until tender. Watch the fruit carefully, stirring occasionally, for the fruit will scorch easily. If gas is used for cooking a small asbestos pad over the burner is recommended. Seal in air tight jars.

THE KITCHEN GUPBOARD

ECONOMICAL GRIDDLECAKES.

BREAKFAST MENU.
Fresh Eggs
Griddlecakes, Maple Sirup
Tea, Coffee or Cocoa.

POUR one cupful boiling water over one-half cupful cornmeal. Stir one-half cupful sweet milk and one and a half cupfuls of sour milk together. Add two cupfuls flour and two tablespoonfuls liquid yeast. Beat thoroughly and put in a warm place to heat overnight. In the morning add one-half teaspoonful of soda and one teaspoonful salt.

Fried Tomatoes.
Cut ripe, solid tomatoes in halves. Dredge with pepper, salt and sifted cracker dust. Put three tablespoonfuls of butter in a pan. When very hot cook the tomatoes on both sides and serve. Flavor with a little onion juice.

Remove Pecan Meats Easily.
Place pecans in a pan of boiling water. Remove from fire and let stand for a while. Then crack and remove meats from shell.

Fish Hash.
Take equal parts of cold flaked fish and cold boiled potatoes finely chopped. Season with salt and pepper. Put fat salt pork in frying pan and remove most of the scraps. Leave enough fat in pan to moisten fish and potatoes. Put in frying pan and stir until heated. Cook until well browned underneath. Fold and turn like an omelet.

Potato Croquettes.
Take some fresh boiled potatoes or some leftovers from the day before. Rice two cupfuls and mix in one-half cupful of grated cheese. Add one egg and two tablespoonfuls butter. Season with one-half teaspoonful salt and a few grains of cayenne. Shape into desired form. Roll in crumbs, egg and again in crumbs. Fry in deep fat and drain on paper. Set in oven to keep hot.

Cocoanut Cases.
Cream six ounces butter with eight ounces sugar, and when very light add two tablespoonfuls rosewater. Then stir in lightly eight ounces grated cocoanut and one-half teaspoonful of nutmeg. Whip the whites of three eggs to a stiff froth and fold in lightly. Form into small soufflé cases and bake until brown. Serve cold, with powdered sugar sprinkled over.
