The Eldorado School Band, directed by C. F. Jones, came back from the Region 2, State Band Contest at Abilene Friday, in a triumphant mood, bearing laurels from their conquest in competition with other Class B bands throughout the region.

In the contest, bands are graded accordingly: first division, perfect; second, good; third, slightly above average; fourth, average; fifth, poor. As there were no bands entered in the first division, the Eldorado group placed in the second division for Class B bands with their concert playing and placed in the third division in sight reading.

Of the five twirlers entering the contest from Eldorado, Tinsy Spurgers won first place; Patricia Humphrey, Joyce Burk and Jo Ann Bearce, seconds, and Louise Burk third.

The brass sextet composed of Charles Jackson, Jimmie Morgan, Marselaine Patterson, Gerald Harris, Jodie Whitten and Lewis Wilson placed in the second division, and was the only group to rate that high in the brass sextet.

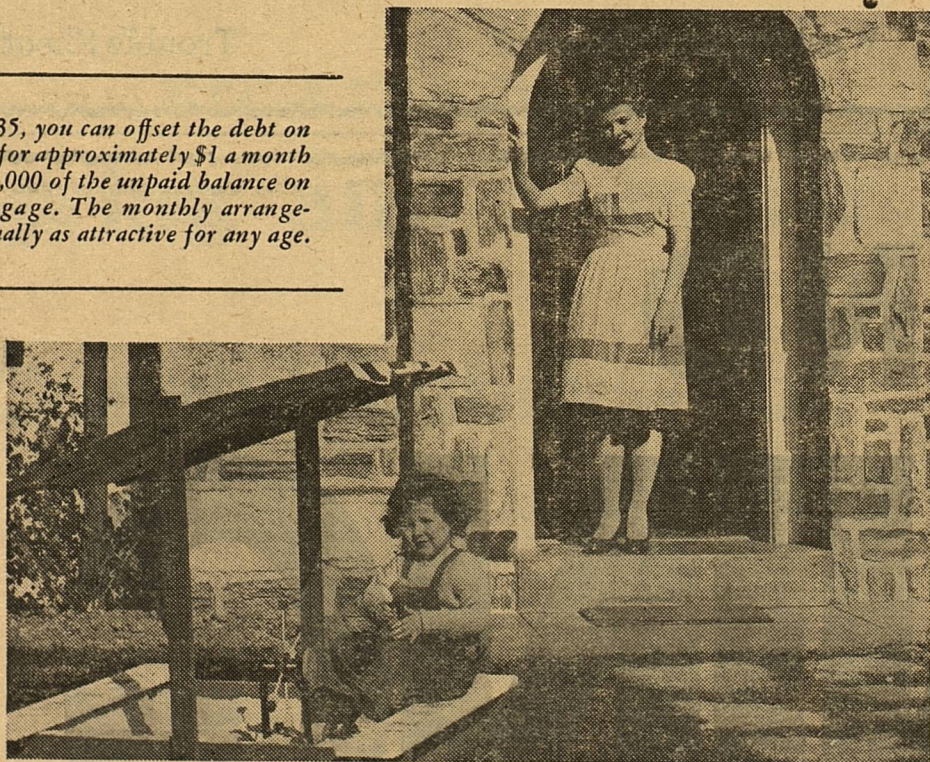

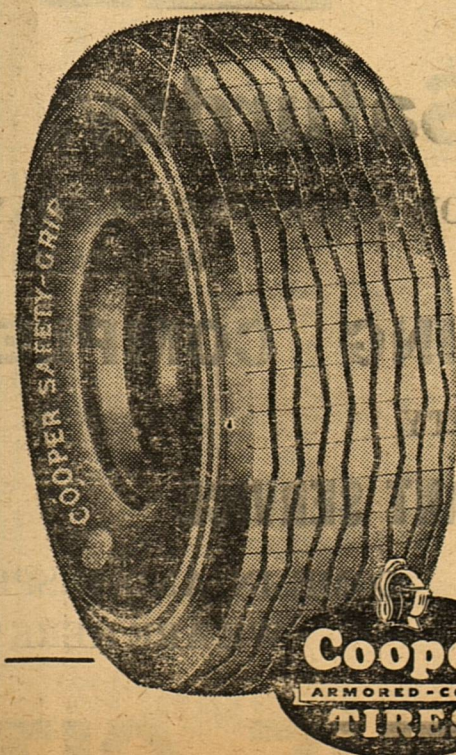

Weekly Gospel Sermon

THE CHURCH OF CHRIST in Eldorado cordially invites you to all services.

Kenneth J. Arrington, Minister "Christ sent me not to baptize" (1 Cor. 1:17)

One of the most abused of all scriptures is the above statement of the Apostle Paul: "Christ sent me not to baptize." By even a casual study of the context (background) of these words, it is clearly seen why Paul said what he did.

In the church at Corinth, some divisions had arisen. Groups were formed and named themselves after the one who had taught, and probably baptized them. This was wrong, and Paul was trying to get them to cease being divided by wearing human names.

Paul says that he was thankful that he had baptized only a few of them, "lest any should say I had baptized in mine own name." (1 Cor. 1:15). In this connection he then said: "For Christ sent me not to baptize, but to preach the Gospel; not with wisdom of words, lest the cross of Christ should be made of none effect." (v. 17)

Paul's statement that "Christ sent me not to baptize but to preach the Gospel . . ." was due to the fact that he was sent out primarily to "preach the Gospel." He was an apostle of Christ, and therefore especially qualified to teach the Gospel. Others could do the baptizing as he taught the need of everyone's being baptized. As a true apostle of Christ, Paul had to preach what Christ commanded "every creature" (Mark 16:16) to do to be saved, and that was to be baptized. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved. . ."

Some men today think Paul was ruling out the idea of the need of Gentiles being baptized. No such thing could possibly have been true. Paul did not say: "Christ sent me not to teach sinners to be baptized." He rather said: "Christ sent me not to baptize, but to preach the Gospel." Certainly he taught baptism as essential to salvation just as did all the other true representatives of Christ.

C. M. Reynolds Buried Today

Charles Monroe Reynolds, 84, prominent Schleicher County rancher, died of a heart attack Wednesday morning at 11:00 at a San Angelo hospital. He had been taken suddenly ill on the preceding day at his home and was rushed to a San Angelo hospital for treatment, but failed to recover.

Services are being held today, Thursday, at 3:00, in the First Baptist Church, conducted by the Rev. Jim Hays of Eldorado and Rev. J. L. Ratliff of Ozona.

He was born Nov. 6, 1863, in Fayette Co., to Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Reynolds of La Grange. He came to Schleicher County in 1909, and settled on the ranch which he purchased 20 miles from Eldorado, operating the place until his retirement in 1941. On April 10, 1918, he was married to Minnie Clark, who survives. Of the 4 children born to this union, three survive: Mrs. Marion Dacy and Bob and Billy Jack Reynolds. One son, C. M., died in service, Oct. 9, 1944. Surviving in addition to the widow and three children are two grandchildren and several nieces and nephews. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

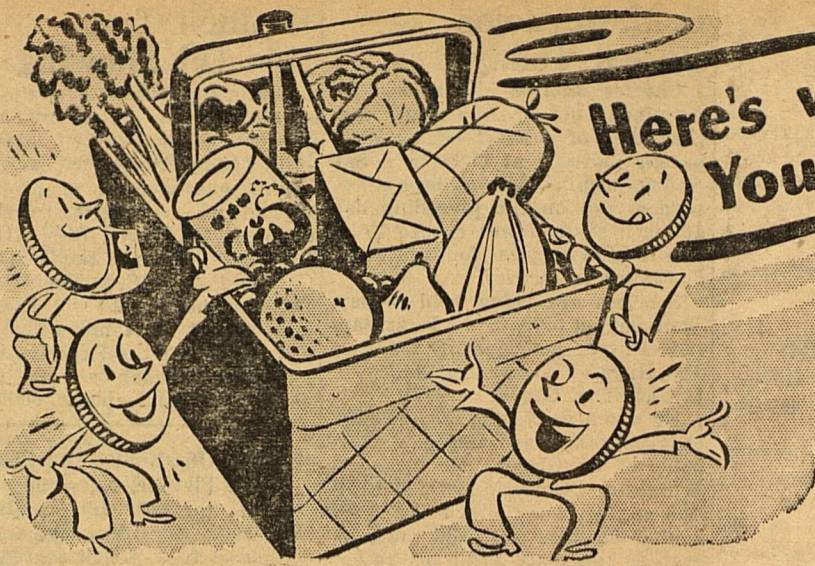
