Oil Report Given By API For Week

The American Petroleum Institute estimates that the daily average gross crude oil production for the week ended May 7, 1949, was 4,896,750 barrels and that the amount of lease condensate production mixed with crude losing its identity as such averaged 56,550 barrels daily, a total of 4,953,300 barrels of crude and lease condensate. See tables below for details.

Reports received from refining companies indicate that the industry as a whole ran to stills on a Bureau of Mines basis approximately 5,172,000 barrels of crude oil daily and produced 17,530,000 barrels of gasoline; 1,831,000 barrels of kerosene; 9,955,000 barrels of distillate fuel and 7,895,000 barrels of residual fuel oil during the week; and had in storage 123,400,000 barrels of finished and unfinished gasoline; 19,178,000 barrels of kerosene; 51,373,000 barrels of distilled fuel and 61,014,000 barrels of residual fuel oil on May 7, 1949.

Rat Extermination Campaign To Begin Monday

R. E. Wilson of the Department of Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, will be in Cisco Monday, May 23, to begin a rat extermination campaign in the business district. Mr. Wilson plans to take three days in covering the downtown area.

The poison to be used is extremely dangerous and must be placed so that children and domestic animals cannot come in contact with it. Mr. Wilson will supervise the placing of the poison and the taking up of the containers.

Accident Causes Are Listed

Plain stupidity, bad manners, and liquor are the top three causes of automobile accidents, accounting for three-fourths of all fatalities, or over 24,000 deaths per year, according to a case analysis by Northwestern National Life Insurance Company.

May is the month when the auto death toll starts a steady climb which hits its climax on Christmas eve and Christmas day, the study points out.

By far the top killers are the "stupid" group of driver offenses—excessive speed, ignoring traffic signs or traffic officers, passing on hills or curves, and other miscellaneous "dimwit" violations; the study finds that one or more of these offenses is involved in 40 per cent of all fatal accidents and is the principal cause of 32 per cent.

A miniature red sword pin is the symbol that a person has made a contribution to the 1949 fund-raising campaign of the American Cancer Society, Mrs. Marene Johnson, county chairman, disclosed today.

A quota of \$1,505.00 dollars has been set for Eastland County. The annual drive got underway Monday, but rain and threatening weather has caused donations to bog in some areas she said.

Personal letters have been mailed to citizens of the county, outlining the goals and aims of the Texas division of the American Cancer Society and extending an invitation to donate to the needy cause. Contributions, she said, may be sent to the First National Bank of Eastland in care of Guy Parker, county treasurer for the drive.

Containers have been placed in designated business firms in the county for individual contributions. Watchword of this year's campaign are "Learn The Truth" and "Be On Guard." Officials advise that cancer is curable, must be treated early, does not cure itself, is not a disgrace, is neither contagious nor inherited, that pain is seldom an early indication of cancer, and most cancers give an early warning.

Texas, Mrs. Johnson stated, is described as the "black hole of cancer" and that much needs to be done to combat the dread disease.

Mrs. Arnold, who is the former Miss Nanelia Bible of Cisco, told the Press Friday that she and her husband and son escaped swirling waters that later engulfed their home. They waded ankle deep water to higher grounds.

Flood waters, she said, rose above the doors and the contents were badly damaged by mud and silt. Some clothing and furnishings were salvaged after waters subsided.

The couple have been living in Crestwood Addition, Fort Worth, for three years. The former Ciscoans plan to return to their home after repairs have been made.

School Vote Election Returns Are Canvassed

Official returns of the April 18 county-wide election on the proposed consolidation of Eastland County school districts—to group dormant districts with independent districts—were disclosed here today by Carl Elliott, county superintendent.

The results were canvassed by members of the Eastland County School Trustees, the report said. The official count shows that three of the four districts carried the proposed annexation, while the Cisco district voted against it.

The returns by district follow: Rising Star—composed of Cook, Hallmark and Rising Star—82 votes for and 13 against.

Ranger—composed of Tudor and Cross Roads—161 votes for and 4 against. Carbon—composed of Longbranch, Center Point and Kokomo—158 votes for and 51 against.

Cisco—composed of Cottonwood, Sandy, Bluff Branch, Friendship, Romney, Shady Grove, Central, Bedford and Grapevine—306 votes for and 371 votes against.

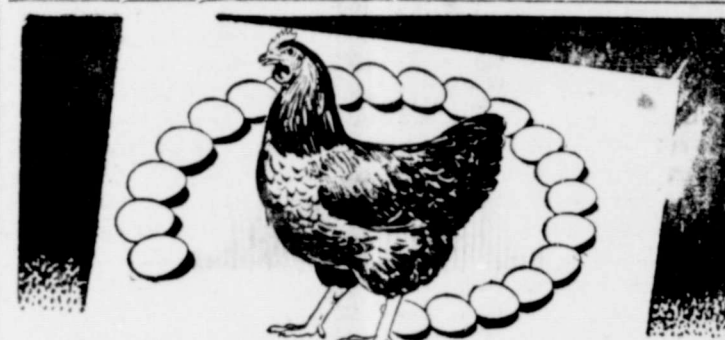

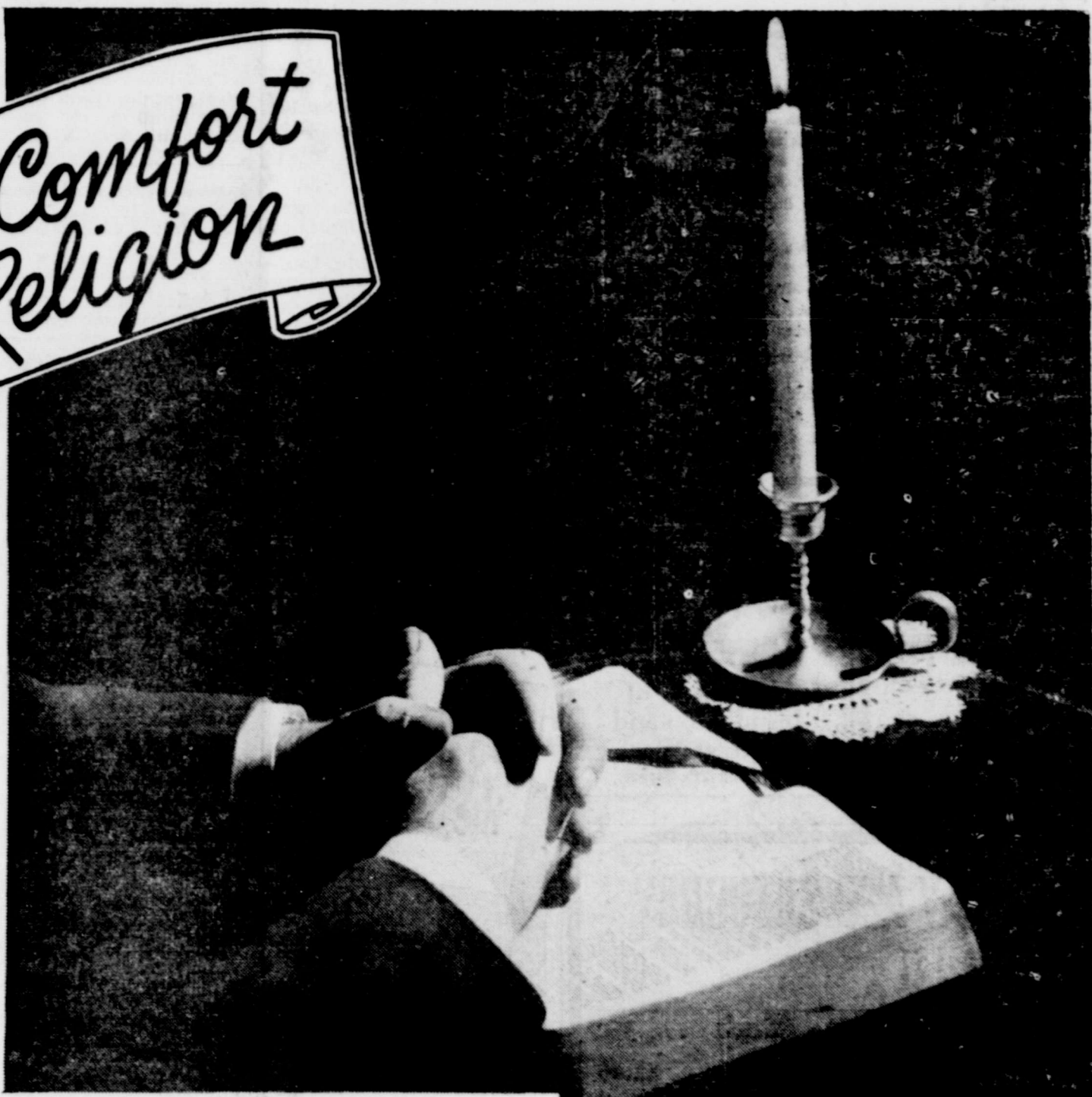
HOSTESS TO GROUP

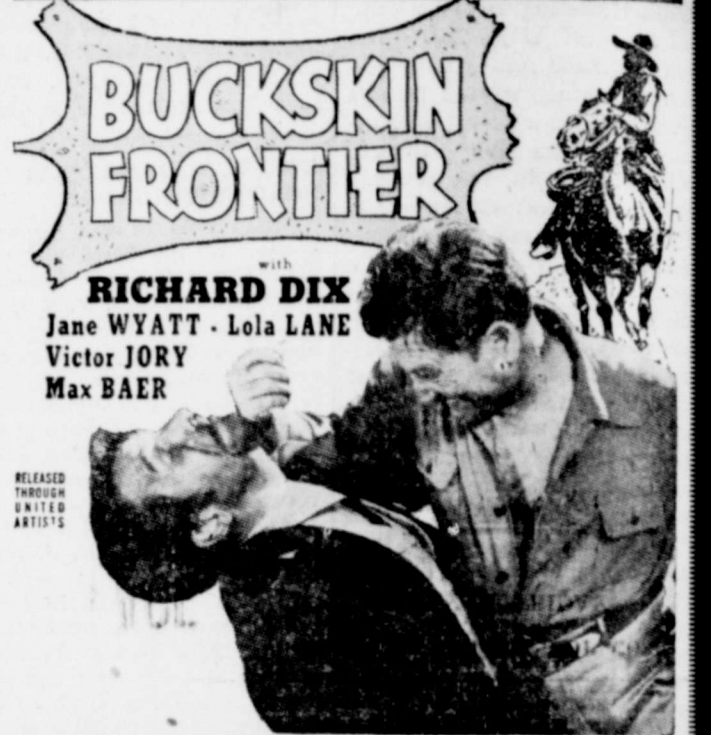
