Talco Area still Plagued With Fires

The Talco Fire Dep. is still plagued by grass fires with little rain and dry hot weather.

This month's fires started on Wed. Sept. 3rd at 3:15 p.m. at Jolntown, when Talco and Bogata Fire Dept. were called to a grass fire thought to have started by burning trash.

Several acres were burned over, with time out, one hour.

11:30 a.m. Tuesday September 11, firefighters rolled on a call to a grass fire near the dump grounds west of Talco. Approximately two acres were burned over. Time out 1½ hours.

6:30 p.m. Saturday, September 13, the Department was called to the Holmes Fee Lease when a

transformer was thought to have started the grass fire. Two return calls were made on Sunday 14. Approximately 100 acres of grass and woods were burned. Also 20 bales of hay owned by Theodius Baker of Mt. Pleasant were

destroyed. 7:45 p.m. Saturday 13 the Fire Department answered a call to the King lease, west of Talco where a grass fire of unknown origin burned over one acre of grass. Time one hour.

5:50 p.m. Monday September 15, the Department answered a call to the Sidney

destroyed.

when Billy Froelich took the

ball in from the 12 yard line.

The Bulldogs tried to pass

their way back into the

game, but the Rebel second-

ary held their own and re-

fused to let the Cooper

quarterback complete a

pass. The Rebel's tightly-

knit defense allowed Cooper

only one first down the entire

second half.

The unmerciful Rebels

scored again with a little

over four minutes left in the

game and this time it was

Paul Froelich who took the

honors after brother Billy

and Bubba Edge put the

Rebels in scoring position.

The game ended with the

Rebels way out on top, 26-0.

The Rebels, who now have

a 1-1 record, hope to make

it 2-1 next week when they

face Prairiland at home. Kick-

off time is 8:00 p.m.

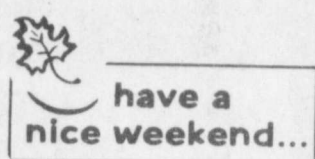
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GED Course Offered

City Manager Possibility Under New Plan

The City of Bogata has voted to hire a "Circuit riding" city manager, joining with other towns in the area to provide this service.

The City Councilman took this step on Tuesday night. Councilman Morris Foster said federal funds are escaping towns like Bogata because they don't have the budget for a full-time city staff which could help determine what grants would be available.

Ark-Texas Council of Governments representative Dale Norton stated that the manager-sharing system has been used in Arkansas

with success. Norton was invited to the next regular meeting of the council.

Talco, Avery, Detroit, Deport, and Mt. Vernon were considered as possibilities for joining the plan.

Representatives from the predominantly black section of town presented councilman with a petition for annexation signed by area residents, saying they wanted city water and sewer service and they were annexed.

Water hook-ups will begin immediately, but sewer service may take longer, since the city is currently

rennovating it's sewer system.

The annexation gave reason for further discussion of residents who live outside the city limits, but are receiving city services.

Councilman agreed to seek the advice of an attorney on further annexation.

Red River Co. Sets 44¢ Tax Rate

The Red River County Commissioners settled the tax rate for next year at the regular monthly meeting in the Courthouse Monday morning but did not finally settle either the County budget or the distribution of the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds.

The tax rate, as valuation taking into consideration the fourfold increase in values assessed by the Equalization Board during the summer.

This 44 cent figure is divided at the same percentage mark as the previous \$1.10 rate, which works out in pennies and fractions thereof, as:

Road and Bridge Special, 15 cents. Road and Bridge, .039 cents General Fund, 18.6 cents Jury Fund, .029 cents Permanent Improvements, .007 cents. Hospital Interest and Sinking, .014 cents. Road and Bridge Interest and Sinking, .015 cents.

However the division of budget figures for the forthcoming year has not proved as easy for the Court, a not unusual situation as all departments of the County seek more funds than are expected to be forthcoming.

The Commissioners have indicated in previous discussions that they would prefer that virtually all Federal Revenue Sharing - Funds be allocated to the Road and Bridge operations, inasmuch as a small amount only of the ad valorem taxes will be received by this fund, but the issue has not been finally decided.

Additionally, there is some difficulty with the project of the income and expenditures for the current 1980 year, upon which the new budget is largely based.

County Auditor, Jack Crawford told the Court that it appeared that the General Fund might end the calendar year near \$50,000 in

the red and suggested some shifts be made in demands on that particular account, also pointing out several Department expenditures which he indicated would have to be reduced.

The Time Warrants, issued by the County in lieu of overdrafts, are also reaching a substantial figure in excess of \$100,000, according to reports made to the Court.

The good news is of course, that the County will soon be receiving ad valorem tax payments; beginning October 1st, and the total of these are expected to bring in perhaps 60 percent more than last year.

An informed source said that net cash receipts from ad valorem tax receipts beginning next month could approach \$488,000, a substantial and badly-needed increase over the something less than \$300,000 taken in

recent years. Discussion on the budget will continue in subsequent meetings.

The Court approved the purchase of a building site from Clyd Rains at a price of \$1,500. The lot is situated just north across Monroe Street from the Driver's License Building.

The County has been negotiating with owners of property on this entire block with a view to acquiring it as the location of the new jail when and if one is to be constructed in the future. This is the block at the corner of North Cedar and Monroe, northwest of the Courthouse block.

City manager James L. Pryor and Councilman J.R. Lewis appeared before the Court to discuss the possibility of consolidating some of the law enforcement radio dispatch duties.

Two full-time dispatching

services are now maintained one by the City in the City Hall and one by the county in the county jail, both operating 24-hours daily.

Early in the year, Sheriff Bob Storey asked the City to assist with payment of a jailer-dispatcher at the jail, and the Council agreed to contribute \$550 per month for six months, roughly the equivalent pay of one shift of dispatcher at the jail, and Council.

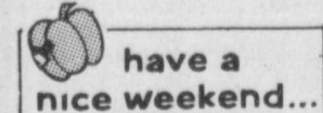
The six months period is now up and the City manager suggest it might be possible to join the two services. However it was brought out that the dispatcher at the jail also serves as the jailer and that city prisoners constitute a considerable portion of the jail population.

A delegation from the Court agreed to meet with Council at the City's monthly meeting to discuss the entire situation

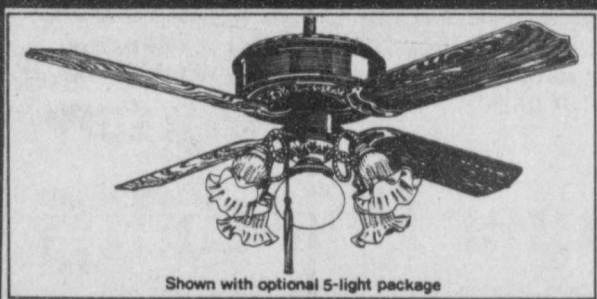

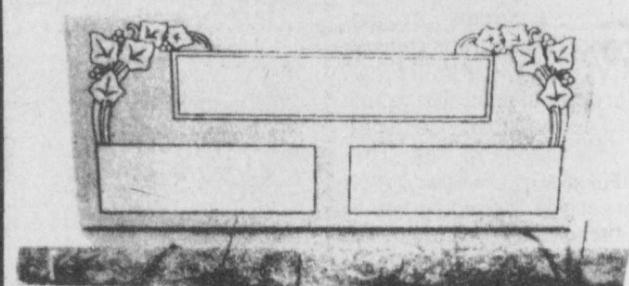
The theme of this year's

The purpose of the meeting is to review developments effecting Texas Conservation programs and to plan future conservation district programs and activities.

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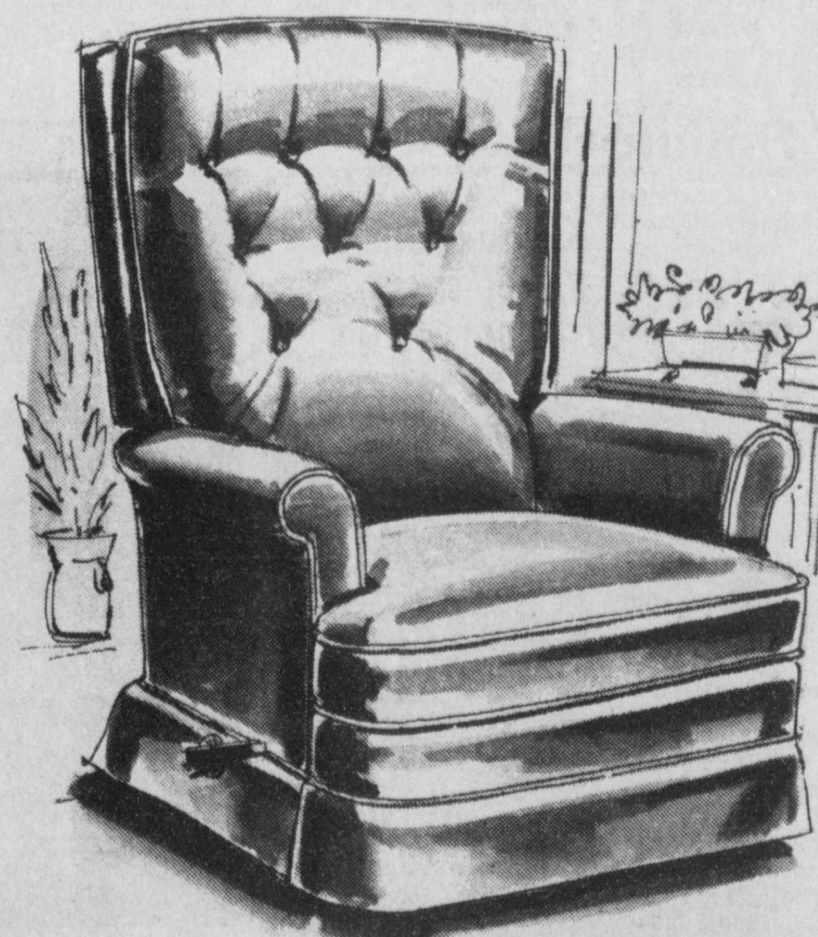

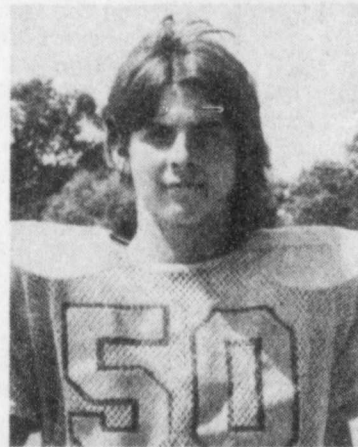

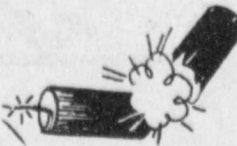

If you hate to make sandwiches and pack lunches every morning, take heart. Here are a few suggestions for making sandwiches ahead of time.

Most sandwich fillings will freeze, when properly packaged.

The old stand-by of peanut butter is an excellent choice for the freezer. Also cheese, sliced meat and fish are good choices for sandwiches you prepare ahead of time.

In addition, when you have leftover meat such as roast, and everyone in the family is tired of it, slice it and make a few sandwiches out of it.

For freezing, be sure to wrap the sandwiches in a moisture proof material.

Labeling and dating are also recommended if you plan to make a large supply. Sandwiches can be safely stored for three to four weeks in the freezer. They defrost overnight in the refrigerator or in approximately three hours at room temperature.

Here are some special suggestions: Vegetables lose crispness in the freezer, so avoid using them as a sandwich filler. If a slice of lettuce is desired, add it to the sandwich in the day it is defrosted for use.

Cooked eggs become rubbery or undesirable upon freezing.

Sandwich fillings that contain lots of mayonnaise or salad dressing may cause the bread to become soggy. Next time you are preparing sandwiches for all the members of your family who carry brown bags, why not prepare a few extra? Then when you're in a hurry one morning, you'll have a handy supply of ready made lunches.

Continuing Education From Cuthand University

A lot of our young people riding around in the shade of a golf umbrella fastened onto an Early-American Kubota, just don't realize how things were back in the Age of the Mule.

When I was too young to go to school, or to go to the field either, North Main Street at five-thirty in the morning was like a circus parade, except that the circus vans were farm wagons heading for the prairie and the plumed horses pulling them were long-eared mules from the First Families of Missouri. Those were the days when Neil Rozell's grand-daddy's corn-cob pipe was called a Missouri meerschaum.

Mules have played a big part in the history of our town. William Humphreys, our earliest settler, may have ridden to Texas behind a team of oxen. But history records that his two daughter caught their husbands when a pair of young fellow came through driving a herd of mules from Missouri. After those boys had been two weeks on the road with a herd of dusty mules, the Humphrey girls must have looked mighty good. And after a young lifetime on the frontier with no near neighbors, even a muleskinner must have looked good to those girls.

Though in those early days people around here spent a lot of time studying mules, nobody thought about the fact the mule was brought over by the Spanish settlers in the sixteenth century. More than four hundred years ago a pair of those mules got away and started breeding in the wild. Within fifty years mules had spread all over the place. They did

especially well in Missouri. But it was at College Station Texas, that if you cross a mule with a horse, the offspring will be a jackass,

which is a long-eared animal so stubborn it won't bear young. Nature is sometimes downright wasteful.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate un-

manned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

al amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."

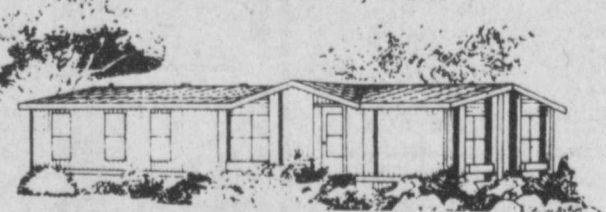

Blood Drive For Otha White Scheduled

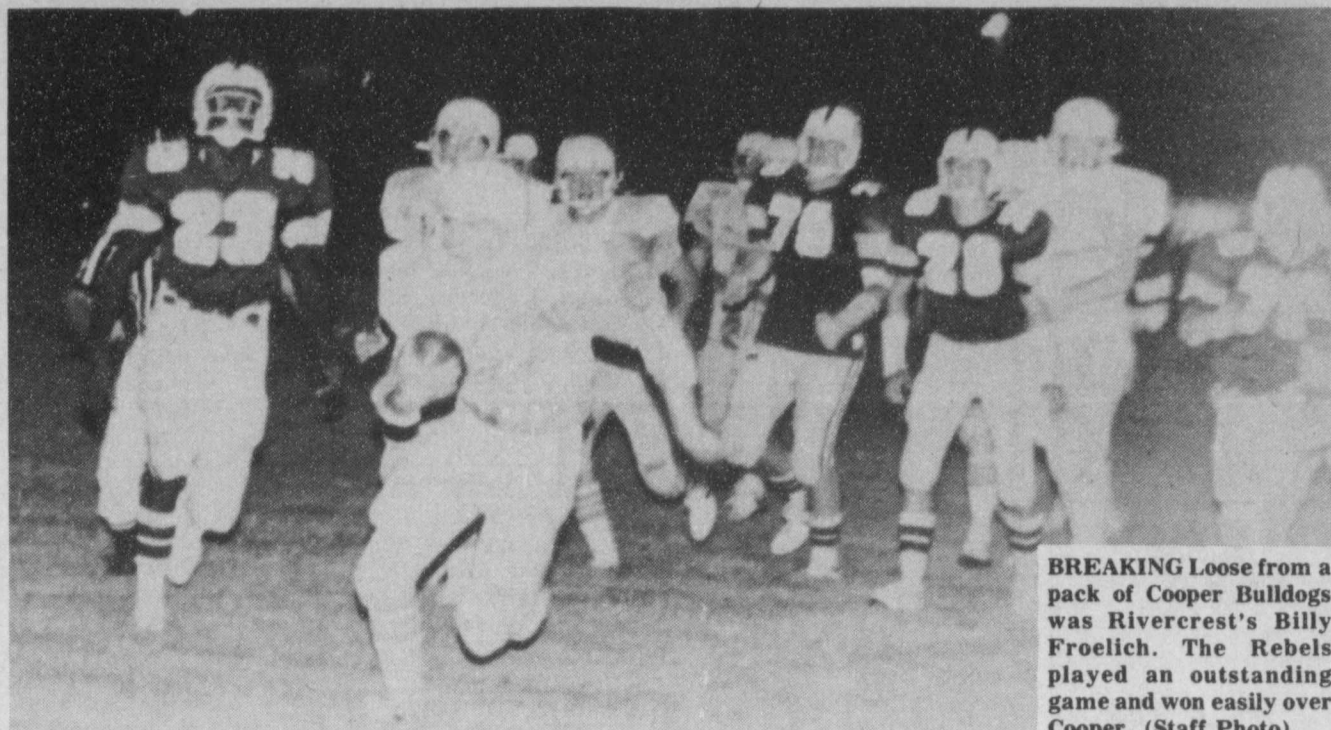
There will be a blood drive in Bogata on September 27 to collect blood to help replace that used by Otha White of Bogat.

Those who can are urged to donate to this cause.

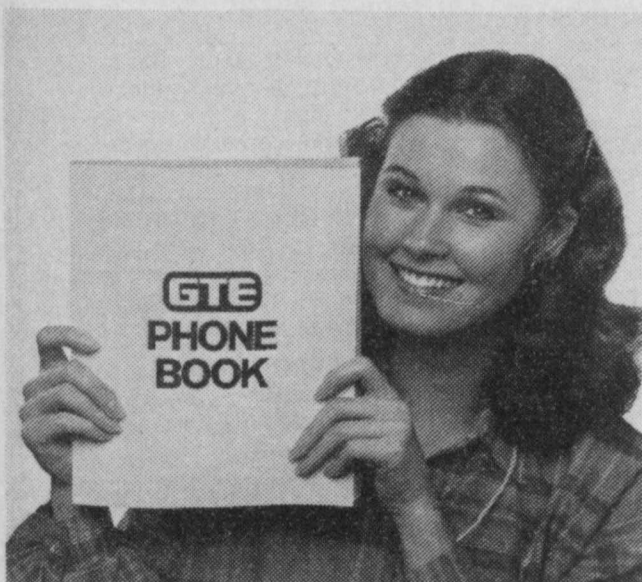
