Martin Wins Runoff

Bruce Wins Commissioner's Post

State Representative Elmer Martin won a landslide victory over his challenger, Mike Young of Abilene, with Martin being re-elected by a more than 2 to 1 margin in Saturday's runoff of the Democratic primary.

Robert Bruce won the post of Precinct 4 county commissioner as he received 257 votes

compared to 206 for his opponent Billy Preston.

Bruce will succeed Moody Richardson who is retiring.

A total of 1,541 voted Saturday in Mitchell County.

In Mitchell County, Martin's home, Martin won by even a larger margin than in the Democratic primary, as he received

1,452, 94% of the vote. Young only received 81 votes in Mitchell County.

In Young's home in that part of Taylor County in the district, he only received 52% of the vote, for a total of 641 votes in an extremely tight vote. Martin received 575 votes in Taylor County.

The vote in Mitchell County was extremely heavy for a runoff election while voting in Nolan

and Jones County was heavy. The turnout in Taylor and Fisher Counties was extremely light.

Here is the vote for individual precincts for Mitchell County:

--Absentee, Martin, 54, Young, 14.

--Precinct 1 & 5, Martin 414, Young, 30.

--Precinct 2, Martin, 130, Young, 4.

--Precinct 3, Martin, 415, Young, 19.

Here is a list of how the voting went in each county:

--Mitchell, Martin, 1,452, Young, 81.

--Fisher, Martin, 569, Young, 213.

--Nolan, Martin, 2,109, Young, 566.

--Taylor, Martin, 575, Young, 641.

--Jones, Martin, 916, Young, 1,370.

The total vote for Martin was 5,721 to only, 2,871 for Young.

In a statement issued Saturday night, Martin said, "We're very happy about this. Billie and I are very grateful to all the residents of Mitchell County and residents of District 61 who went to the polls today (Saturday)."

Along with the joy I trust the good Lord will impress upon Billie and me to be truly humble for this Democratic nomination.

This has been a hard long campaign and people I imagine are as tired as the candidates. My best wishes go to my run-off opponent, Mike Young, and Alton Stagg, who campaigned in the primary. My entire campaign was based solely upon my record and integrity so I can't help but see the votes today as a spur for me as your state representative to continue to do my very best to listen to the good people of the 61st District and to seek their best interests in an honest, fair but determined manner.

My very special thanks to those many friends who gave their extra time, their talents and their effort to make this a winning campaign, while I, by necessity, was busy in Austin as your delegate to the state constitutional convention. I'm overwhelmed with the landslide victory in my home county and again I thank the many, many friends who worked many hours and helped my campaign."

No New Fire Station

City Council Approves Revenue Sharing Budget

The City Council of Colorado City met in special session Thursday to consider a budget for spending revenue sharing monies, to appoint a fire marshal and to approve making a payment to the builder of the city's new civic center now under construction at 2nd & Oak.

The council authorized issuing \$49,000 in certificates of obligation to B. D. Click of Abilene for work done to date on the civic center. The amount issued is about one-third the total cost of the building.

The council also appointed R. L. Mickle to be the city's new fire marshal, effective June 10. Mickle, a longtime city resident, succeeds James Sprout who resigned the job in May.

The council approved spending

\$97,714.07 in revenue sharing monies received from the federal government during the next year.

Items to be paid for through revenue sharing monies and the approximate date the money will be spent are as follows:

--June 1, 1974, \$11,000 for new trash truck (already ordered).

--July 15, 1974, total of \$21,000, \$15,000 for paving projects including paving a road to the city's Ruddick Park, \$5,000 for improvements at Ruddick Park, and \$1,000 for museum equipment. (The council approved spending about \$600 at Thursday's meeting for two rotating racks for display of pictures and other items at the museum).

--Oct. 15, 1974, \$20,000 for cleaning and repainting the city's two water towers and the stand pipe.

--Jan. 15, 1975, \$8,000 for improvements to city's water filter plant.

--April 15, 1975, a total of \$12,000, \$8,000 for improvements to sewer plant and \$4,000 for sewer rod machine.

--July 15, 1975 for a new road grader.

City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr., earlier in May had announced a tentative budget that included building a new fire station. However, since that announcement

other more pressing needs have come up and Sadler said public opinion also seemed to be against building a new fire station at this time.

The council may also have to use some of the revenue sharing money to pay for a fence around the land area near the water in-

take at Lake Colorado City. State Health Department officials have said they want the city to warn anyone who comes near the area of the water intake, by land or by water, of the danger that exists. It is now believed that a fence around that area will cost some \$6,000.



New Fire Marshal

R. L. (Mike) Mickle learned this week that he will be the city's new Fire Marshal, to assume duties June 10. The appointment was made during Tuesday's city council meeting, filling the vacancy created by the resignation of James Sprout. Mickle and his wife Melba, have three children--Elaine Jamison, Stephen and Billy Mickle, and are new grandparents Elaine's baby girl born Thursday in Tucson, Arizona.

Housing Plans Available

Officials of a Fort Worth construction firm will be in Colorado City sometime the week of June 10 to talk with people interested in building new homes as well as talk with local officials about the possibility of building an apartment complex here.

Floor plans of homes built by the firm are now on display at City National Bank, Chamber of Commerce and Colorado City Savings & Loan.

Anyone interested in building one of the homes is asked to leave their name with the Chamber of Commerce so they can be contacted when the representative of the Fort Worth firm is in town.

In addition work is now under way on new homes on E. 14th Street. These homes are being built by a San Angelo firm.

Also W. H. Cox of the Cox Insurance and Real Estate Agency has announced that he has a number of floor plans at his office and has a number of avenues to finance new homes. He has said he can have the homes built on lots he owns or on a lot owned by the prospective homeowner.

The shortage of housing is said by local civic leaders to be one of the prime problems facing Colorado City. The local housing market is saturated with few if any homes for rent and only a few for sale.

Several real estate agents have told the Record that real estate is now selling faster here than ever before.

Loraine Graduates Receive Diplomas

COG To Set Up Job Program

Several changes have been made in the Summer Youth Employment program for the county, but it is expected to get underway by June 10.

Last year's employment program was operated by the county under contract with West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG) but this year the program is being administered directly through the COG agency in Abilene.

The county's youth, ages 14-21, who are students in high school, college or technical school, and who meet family income guidelines set up by the Department of Labor Manpower

Program, are eligible to sign up for summer jobs.

The agencies that can make use of youth workers during the summer months are governmental entities, such as the schools, city or county and hospital district; non profit organizations such as Community Action, Boys' Club or Woodland School; or government offices, such as the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service or Soil Conservation Service. These are only examples and do not constitute a complete list of the employing agencies.

Application forms are available at the Community Action office in the Community Center on 10th Street.

The forms are to be filled out and brought to Colorado High School auditorium at 9:30 a.m., Tuesday, June 4.

Applications will be separated according to eligibility and applicants will be notified if they meet the job requirements.

Carlos Flores Jr. of Snyder is in charge of the Manpower program for COG in this area, the field co-ordinator.

Mitchell County has been allotted 31 slots (or job positions) according to population and Average Daily Attendance (ADA) figures in the schools. Twenty-three of these slots are for Colorado City and the other eight slots will be for Loraine and Westbrook but no breakdown as to how many for Loraine or for Westbrook was available from James Swaim, COG program director in Abilene.

According to Swaim, an enrollee in the summer employment program may work a maximum of 320 hours during the summer months and earn not more than \$840, less Social Security.

Swaim also stated that any of the agencies which meet requirements to use the summer youth workers should contact Flores and make arrangements with him for enrollees' services.

Four Teachers Resign

Lloyd McKee, superintendent of schools for Colorado City, announced last week that four teachers have resigned recently and their resignations will be submitted to the June 10 meeting of the school board.

The four are Barbara Sutton, program manager and demonstration teacher for the bilingual program; Susan Evermon, 4th grade teacher at Hutchinson; Douglas Keese, high school history and math teacher and Johnny Creager, educational diagnostician for Plan A.

Mrs. Sutton resigned her position because she is expecting a baby, McKee said, and Mrs. Evermon has a small baby to give her full attention to. Both Keese and Creager have made plans to move to other areas to teach, McKee added.

City Purchase Was Illegal?

An Abilene man has stated that a recent purchase by the City Council of Colorado City was illegal as the purchase exceeded \$2,000 and the council did not take bids on the items purchased.

Felix Rosser of Turner Supply in Abilene, who identified himself as a former city councilman in Abilene, said the purchase of chairs and tables for Colorado City's new civic center was illegal as according to state law, anything costing more than \$2,000 has to be put up for bids.

The City council in its May meeting purchased \$5,931 worth of tables and chairs, along with storage dollies for the chairs

and tables for the city's new civic center.

When contacted by the Record, City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. said that it is too late to cancel the order now for the equipment which was purchased from Texas Hotel & Restaurant Equipment Inc. of Fort Worth.

Rosser said he would have liked to have had a chance to bid on the equipment and he thought he could have provided a lower total bid price than what the city paid for the chairs and tables.

Sadler also pointed out that he did not know if the purchase was illegal, adding that the city's attorney, Dell Barber, was present at the meeting and did not say anything about the purchase.

Jim Williams of the Fort Worth firm submitted the price for the tables, chairs and dollies at the same time he submitted a new list of prices on kitchen equipment for the civic center.

Texas Hotel & Restaurant Equipment, Inc., was the low bidder for the kitchen equipment and Williams told the council he could save the city money by changing items as specified in the bid information.

Williams spoke to the council at its regular May meeting and told council members of how some \$2,000 could be saved on the kitchen equipment.

The council approved Williams' recommendations and then applied the savings and almost \$4,000 more to purchase the tables and chairs from Williams.

ASCS Letter Information

Don Stewart, executive director of Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), advises county farmers in May's Newsletter to report prevented or failed cotton acres to the ASCS office by June 17.

Farmers who were unable to plant cotton by June 1 because of dry conditions or who planted but failed to get the crop to come up because of dry conditions are asked to report the disaster not later than June 17.

Stewart emphasized that "being unable to plant by June 1 does not mean that cotton cannot be planted later."

He added that "anytime during the year after June 1 cotton is destroyed by natural disaster, report the loss immediately to your ASCS office."

The same principles apply to feed grain acres except that the dates are different--June 20

plant and July 5 to report failed acres.

Stewart also mentioned in the Newsletter that producers who do not plan to carry out approvals issued under the 1973 REAP or 1974 RECP might think about cancelling the practice application through the ASCS office, so that neighbors might use the cost-share program to carry out conservation practices.

Both REAP and RECP are conservation programs operated on a cost-share basis, the producer who is approved for the program sharing the cost of improvements with USDA.

Spot checks on CAP acres have revealed some small mesquites, Stewart also cautions in the letter, and landowners are reminded that their presence on the conserving acres is a program violation.

The May Newsletter ends with this note--"Pray for rain!"
