A field goal by Marilyn Glover in the last 15 seconds of play was the winning shot for Deport to win the game from Bogata and the West Zone Red River Junior High Conference Monday night in Deport gym. Deport edged by Bogata 18 to 17. Glover was high for Deport with 11 and Frances Dodd paced Bogata with 12 points.

In the boys game, Bogata was victorious by a score of 38 to 31. Joe Kelsey was high for Deport and the game with 18 points and Raymond Screws for Bogata with 15.

Monday night's win placed the young Tigerettes in first place and the Junior Tigers in second place in the West Zone.

Talco boys are first place winners in the boys division of the Red River Conference in the West Zone and Talco girls are in second place following Deport.

Play-off for the conference championship will be this weekend. Games will be played at Avery beginning Friday at 5 p. m. Youth Is Killed In Car Accident

Richard Glenn Stephens, 18, of Houston, was killed Friday in an automobile accident in Houston. Funeral service was Monday at 2 p. m. at the Pentecostal Church at Cunningham with Deport Baptist pastor, Rev. Paul Campbell, officiating. Interment, under the direction of Grant Funeral Home, was made in Restland Cemetery at Cunningham. Lt. Knudson and military of Texarkana, officiated at graveside rites.

It was reported Stephens and four other youths were returning home from a bachelor party, as one of the group was to marry Saturday night, when the late model car crashed into a culvert. Stephens, riding in the back seat, was killed instantly, and the other youths hurt, one critically.

After his leave at home, Stephens was scheduled for overseas duty with the paratroopers.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Stephens of Houston, he was born July 27, 1946. He was a grandson of Mrs. W. E. Howe of Deport, and made his home with her while attending Deport School. In the service, he was stationed at Ft. Bragg, N. C., and was on leave at the time of the accident.

Open New Wing Red River Haven

A new 20 bed wing at Red River Haven Nursing Home in Bogata has recently been completed and residents are now residing in the new quarters. The new brick, fire-proof addition, located south of the original structure, is connected via the enlarged day room and kitchen service area, to the main building.

Housed in the new facilities are an isolation room, 17 private rooms and one semi-private room. This brings the nursing facilities to 60 bed capacity, with licensed nurses on duty 24 hours daily.

With the new and additional improvements, Red River Haven has received a new rating, Type 3, which is the highest rating approved by the State of Texas, according to Administrator E. E. Kirkland.

Scholastics Count At Bogata-Talco School Is 902

Scholastic census for the Bogata-Talco Consolidated School has been completed with a total of 902 students in the district, according to Bogata Supt. Travis Hale. Of this number 761 students are white and 141 colored.

In the Bogata area the census check showed a total of 24 more students in the district this year than in 1964. Bogata listed 463 white students and 81 colored for a total of 544 of school age, compared to 447 whites and 73 colored for a total of 520 in 1964.

Figures this year showed 358 students in the Talco area. Of this number 298 are white and 60 colored. Last year's Census report showed 374 scholastics enumerated. Summary of scholastics enumerated: 156 white male, 142 white female; 33 male Negro, 27 female Negro.

Austin. —Gov. John Connally's top legislative project — creation of a powerful coordinating board to control state colleges and universities — apparently is headed for early enactment.

Bills to establish the board breezed through Senate and House committees to floor calendars without direct attack after members of the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School testified for them.

Quick and easy committee approval contradicted early rumblings that establishment of the strong central board would meet vigorous opposition in the Legislature.

It seems that opposition, if there is to be any, will be confined to specific details of the bill and not to the overall proposal.

If enacted, the 18-member coordinating board would have broad powers over all aspects of higher education in Texas — junior colleges, as well as senior institutions.

It would have the final word on launching or eliminating college degree programs, control the addition or deletion of courses, develop future plans for higher education and pass on proposals to create new senior colleges.

It would supplant the existing Commission on Higher Education, although members of the commission would be eligible for appointment to the board.

Said Governor Connally: "I am very pleased with the action of the two committees. This reflects what I have said all along — that there is a great will and desire on the part of the Legislature to make some real strides toward excellence in higher education."

Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria is handling the bill in the House and Sen. Bill Moore of Bryan has it in the Senate.

Talco Girls Are Champs Of 17-A

Talco Trojanettes captured their third straight District 17-A championship here Friday night with a 41-34 victory over James Bowie in the season's finale.

The Trojanettes finished the season without a loss in either half, thus taking the overall crown.

The victory Friday pushed the Talco girls to 20-4 for the season. The state-ranked squad must face one of the few unbeaten girls' teams in Texas in bi-district action.

Coach Larry Tucker said Brownsboro had already captured the 18-A title, and Talco and the club would get together probably the first week in March.

Brownsboro is 27-0 for the season. This was the team which eliminated Talco from the playoffs last year.

In Friday's contest, Sue Smith tallied 19 for the Trojanettes and Katy Fry hit 12.

Motorists Urged To Get Stickers

School Election Set For April 3

Board of Trustees of Talco - Bogata Consolidated Independent School District has ordered that an election be held in said School District on April 3, 1965, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District seven members.

If my election causes an unbalance of this distribution on the board, I agree that I will resign in order for the board to appoint someone to serve which would adhere to the above agreed upon representation.

Neal Solomon, Mt. Vernon insurance agent, former teacher and president of the Franklin County Chamber of Commerce, was elected to the Legislature from Dist. 11 Saturday.

Complete, unofficial returns gave Solomon 1,991 votes, to 1,667 for Kearney Brim of Sulphur Springs, his nearest opponent in the field of nine candidates. The candidate with the highest vote was elected. There was no runoff. Candidates ran without party designation. Solomon is a Democrat.

Solomon will succeed Joe M. Chapman, who resigned to accept appointment as judge of the Eighth Judicial District. The 11th House District includes Hopkins, Delta, Franklin and Titus Counties in East Texas.

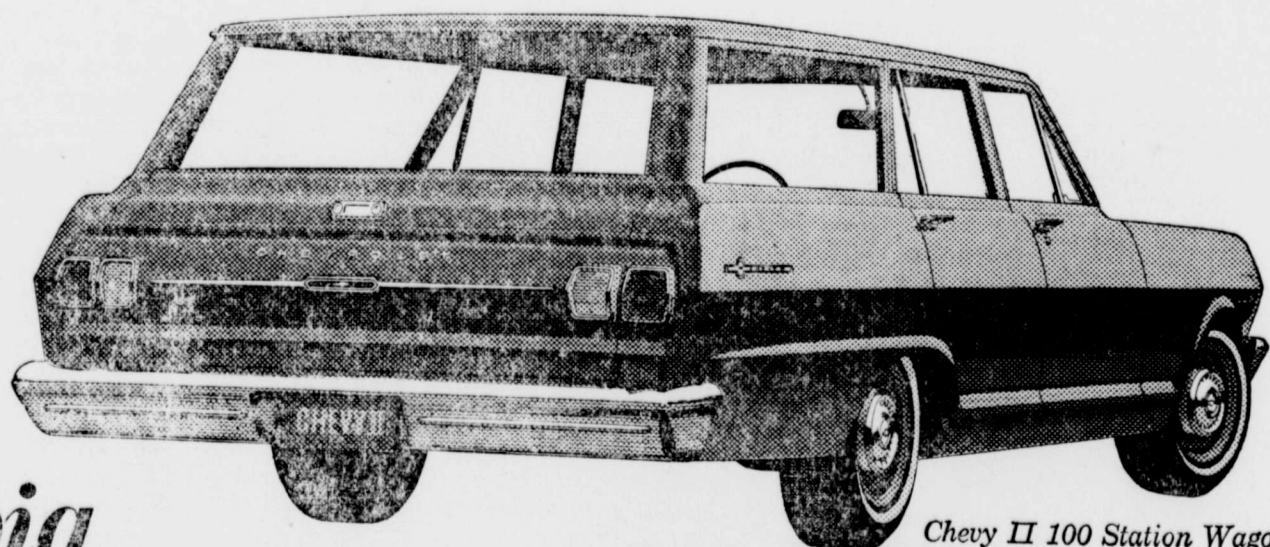

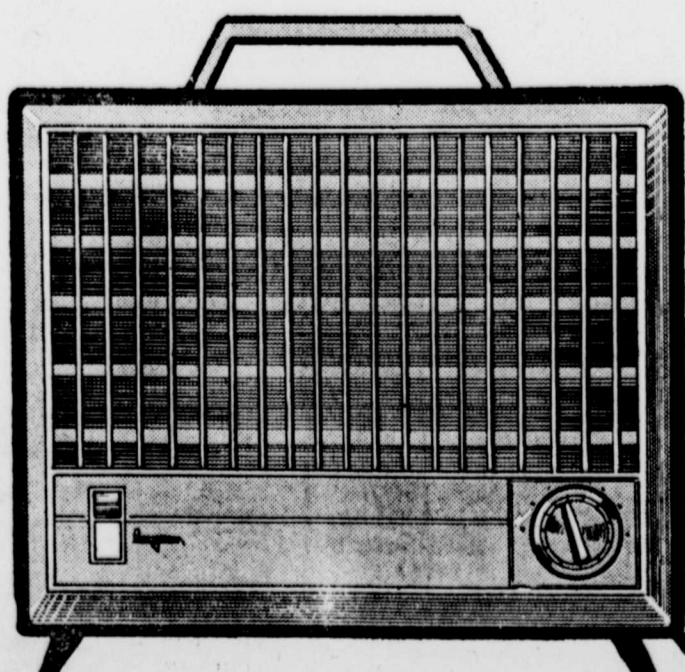
