

Richardson Elected To Head Road Unit At Snyder Meeting

Sam Richardson, local groceryman, was re-elected president of the East-West highway association at its annual meeting held last Wednesday in Snyder. Victor L. Minton, Carlsbad, N. M., was again named secretary, while A. G. Bearden, secretary of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, was elected Texas secretary, W. J. Ely, of Snyder, was named Texas vice-president.

More than 200 delegates from 25 Texas and New Mexico towns and cities were guests at the meeting for the initial session of the East-West Highway Association. Name of the airline transcontinental route was officially changed by resolution from Dallas-Caverns Highway Association, the title used since towns along the road organized in 1926.

A resolution approving the friendly attitude of Texas and New Mexico Highway Commission toward the route and requesting those bodies to speed completion of the 700 mile stretch from the Texas-Louisiana line to the famous Carlsbad Caverns, was adopted without dissent near the close of the all day meeting.

A telegram from Harry Hines, chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, said: "I sincerely regret my inability to attend your road meeting today, as you know, I have since inception of my appointment been aggressively advocating Highway No. 15 as a state artery. There are more road projects in progress now than there ever have been at any time in the past. I fully realize there is much yet to do and I shall apply my best efforts in the future toward its accomplishment."

A number of Lamesa business men, with 35 members of the Lamesa Band with bandmaster Conway King, attended the Snyder meeting.

Grading and drainage work is being done on No. 15 in Dawson county from Lamesa west to the Gaines county line; plans are being drawn for completion of the grading to Seminole and within 60 to 90 days plans will be ready for the section from Seminole to New Mexico State line. East from Lamesa the work is completed to the Borden county line, with a report that surveying is scheduled for Borden county.

County Meet Is Scheduled For March 20 and 21

The Dawson County unit of the University Interscholastic League will hold most of the contests Friday and Saturday-March 20 and 21 at Lamesa school buildings. Programs are to be distributed after the entries are submitted and a program can be planned on the basis of entrants. All principals are expected to have their entries placed with Director General V. Z. Rogers on or before March 14th. All events will be held on the Friday and Saturday, excepting One-Act Play, Playground Ball and Volley Ball. The One-Act Play contest among Klondike, Lamesa and Sparenburg has been set by Director F. T. McCollum for Friday night, March 27th. The volleyball and playground contests will take place on Saturday, March 28th.

The Choral singing contests is set for Friday night, March 20th in the Lamesa High School Auditorium. Each member school (elementary) in the county is eligible and a large number of school children is expected to appear in this feature of the regular meet.

The athletic events for the meet on the 20th are preliminaries in junior and senior track and field events and all tennis contests. These events will be scheduled to avoid interference with the literary events. The out-of-door events of the meet on the first two days will be the Tennis and Track and Field events.

The Director General of the League has appointed Mr. F. T. McCollum as Director of One-Act Play; Mr. G. M. Roberts to conduct the Arithmetic contests and Mrs. H. V. Williams of Woody is Director of Choral Singing. These appointive positions were not filled at the time of the county's organization in the Fall. Principals having problems in these three events will contact the persons named.

Contract To Complete Highway Nine Through Martin Co. To Be Let

The State Highway Department will on March 17 and 18 call for bids for the construction of a caliche base and double asphalt surface from 16 miles northwest of Big Spring to the Dawson County line on Highway 9. This will be across a corner of Martin county. With the completion of this stretch we will have a hard surfaced highway connecting Lamesa and Big Spring. A contracting firm is now at work hardsurfing this highway from Big Spring to a point 16 miles northwest of that city.

Tahoka Deputy Claimed By Death Saturday

F. E. Redwine, 58, deputy sheriff of Tahoka, Lynn County, was fatally wounded last Friday night by his own gun, in the hands of Elmo Banks, 43, negro prisoner, who fired five slugs into the body of the officer and fled.

Redwine, former sheriff of Lynn County, died at 3:05 o'clock Saturday morning in a Lubbock sanitarium where physicians found his body was pierced nine times by five slugs.

The entire South Plains and eastern New Mexico was aroused by the crime and officers in these parts aided in the search for the fugitive which ended at 1 o'clock Sunday morning when a posse headed by Deputy Sheriff Johnson of O'Donnell arrested the negro in a barrow ditch near the Wells store west of O'Donnell. He was indicted Tuesday afternoon and will go to trial Thursday at Tahoka for the murder of Deputy Sheriff Redwine.

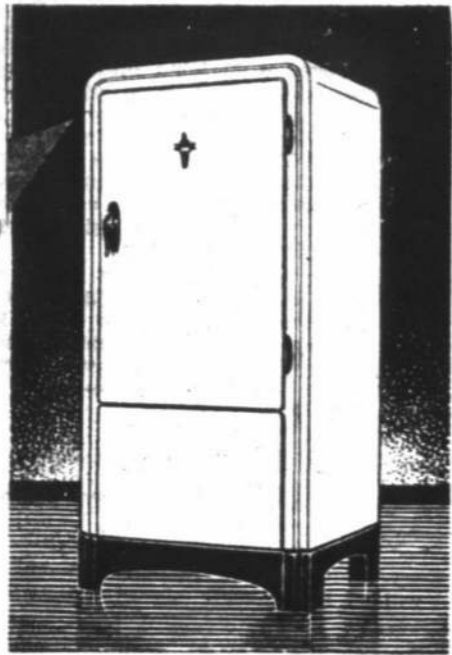
The N. M. team was victorious, the final score being 11 and 6. This was the fourth game that has been played between these two polo teams, each side has won two games.

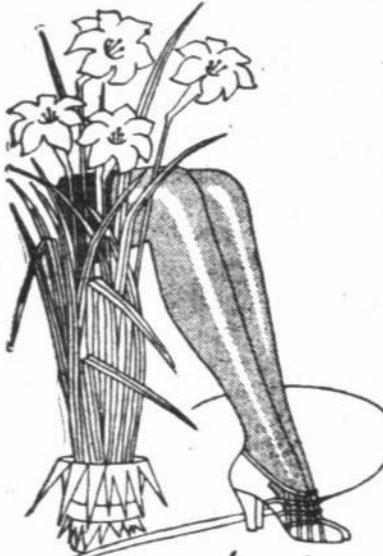

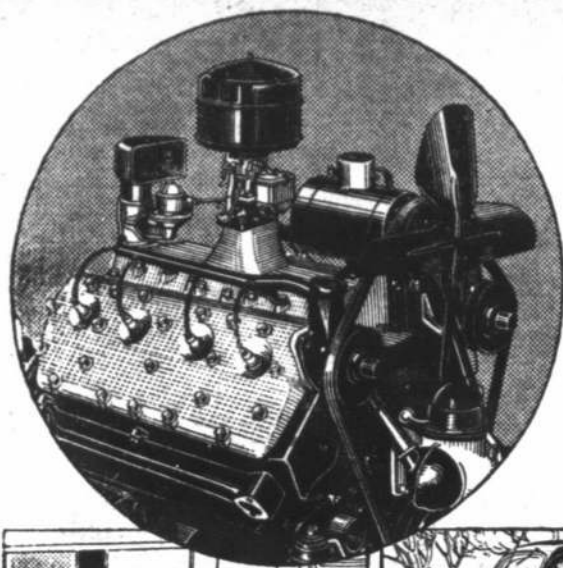

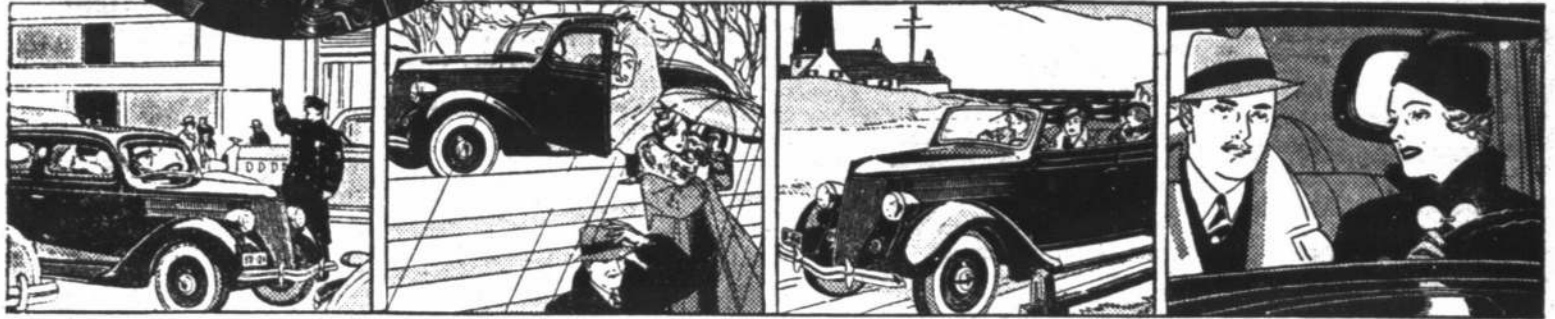

Poultry Health

By Dr. J. E. Salisbury, veterinarian and specialist in poultry diseases, furnished through the courtesy of Davois Sanitary Hatchery

Briefly, there are three main things to watch if you want to raise strong, healthy chicks.

Bowel disorders. Because chicks are constantly picking up things that are

Respiratory troubles. It is just as important to protect your chicks against colds, brooder pneumonia, and other respiratory troubles. This will help to keep the air passages and lungs free of congestion and make breathing easier. It will also help to kill the germs before they have a chance to cause serious trouble.

Since bowel disorders and respiratory troubles frequently go hand in hand, best results are obtained by treating for bowel disorders and respiratory troubles at the same time.

Early worm control. When worms get an early start, chicks go into a rapid decline. That's why it is so important to use the proper preparation for early worm control. A reliable flock treatment is generally considered to be most satisfactory for the young chicks.

You will find that it pays to follow the health building program outlined above, because it will help you to raise strong, healthy chicks, with fewer losses and greater profits in the long run.

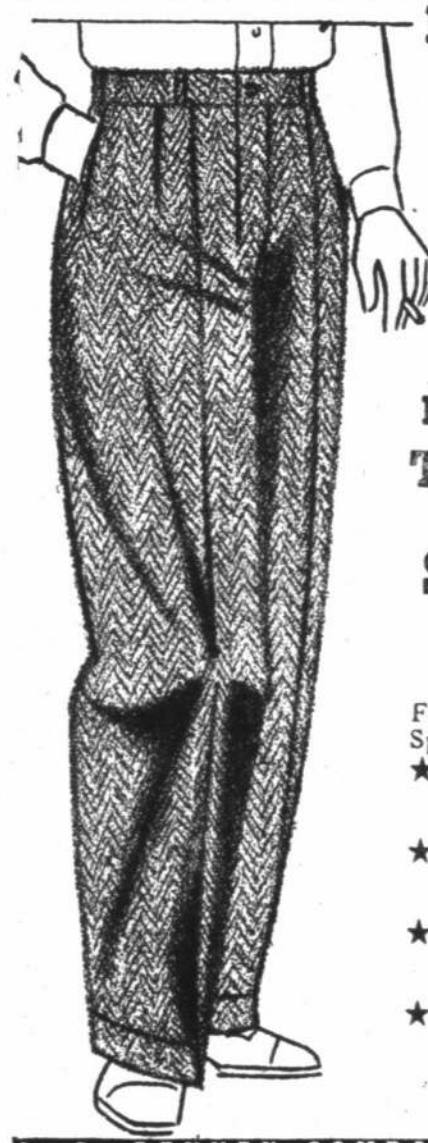

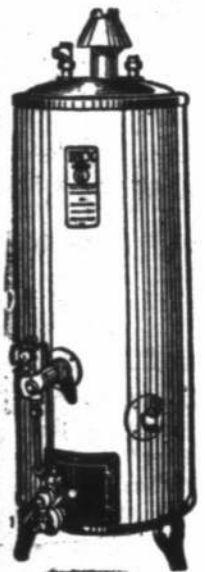

Your State Capitol

Austin has been the rendezvous of three governors during the past week. Youthful Governor Phil LaFollette, of Wisconsin, and Governor Alred attended the Old Washington-on-the-Brazos celebration of Texas' 100 year birthday. As a point of singular interest, Governor Alred called to the attention of those gathered there that the men who signed the Texas Declaration of Independence were unusually young. Forty of the forty-eight signers were under forty years of age. George W. Childress, the author, was but thirty-two. The third governor in your state capital this week was Hill McAllister, of Tennessee. He, too, took part in celebrations.

Rangers, highway patrolmen, pension board supervisors, and now "efficiency enforcers," for the Liquor Board, have been schooled lately in Austin. Consequently, some long over due efficiency in our state departments should be forthcoming. These efficiency schools or perhaps a better name would be a "central controlling agency," have been utilized by the self-termed "new deal" in Texas in an effort to promote coordination and harmony among state employees.

Forty-four hundred workers and fifty million dollars or seven Texas power companies? That is the question that the United States Supreme Court will have to answer in the near future. Seven Texas power companies are suing the United States government in an effort to stop the Colorado and Brazos river projects which

they claim will run them out of business. An adverse opinion against the state would vitally influence Texas in that, dams of these two rivers which farmers are anticipating great help for irrigation and flood control, would be destroyed.

The value of a name is again achieving recognition and causing speculation in the capital city. Which is the best state-wide vote getting name is one of the chief arguments concerning candidates. The run-off is definitely between "Sheppard" and "Terrell" of which we have two of each in races for state and national offices. Senator Morris Sheppard will probably come out on top, but the real contest of names will be in the State Comptroller race in which there is both a "Terrell" and a "Sheppard."
