YOUTHS SERIOUSLY HURT IN CRASH

Forty-Four Killed In Tragedies

TRAIN WRECK
FATAL TO 13;
SIX BURNEDOKLAHOMA TRAIN GOES
OVER EMBANKMENT;
15 DROWNED

(By Associated Press.)
HENRYETTA, Okla., Aug. 1.—The bodies of thirteen persons, scalded to death by steam from the exploded boiler of a locomotive, when a St. Louis-San Francisco passenger train was hurled down an embankment by an open switch, lay in a morgue here today while officials attempted to fix responsibility for the tragedy.

Two white men, the engineer and fireman, and eleven negroes, imprisoned in a chair car with the steam from the locomotive, were killed when the train plunged from the tracks.

ROYAL OAK, Mich., Aug. 19.—(By Associated Press.)—Hans Peter Nielsen, of Royal Oak killed his wife and four children with gas fumes and took his own life with poison after setting fire to his home here today.

Fire broke into the flaming house, found Mrs. Magdelene Nielsen, and her four children, Niels Hans, Nine; Bertha, eight; Paul, six and Bodell, two, dead in the bed room. Every gas jet in the house had been opened.

State Tax Rate Is
Still In Quandary

AUSTIN, Aug. 19 (AP).—Another series of meetings this week will be necessary before the state rate tax for the year can be made known to tax collectors of the 252 counties. The automatic tax board, after fixing the ad valorem and Confederate pension levies Saturday failed to take action on the school allotment. The board of education will meet and fix the scholastic apportionment before the tax board decides on the school rate.

The ad valorem rate was fixed at 30 cents, and increase of eight cents over the past year's 22 cents and the pension levy was left at seven cents the constitutional limit.

ZEP ARRIVES IN TOKYO

Federal Farm Board Will
Aid Present Cotton CropSWISS PLANE
DEPARTS ON
HOP TO U. S.KAESER AND LUESCHER
TAKE OFF TODAY ON
WESTWARD ATTEMPT

(By Associated Press.)

LISBON, Portugal, Aug. 19.—Two youthful Swiss aviators, Oscar Keeser and Kurt Luescher, took off from Juncal, near here, at 7:30 a. m. 1:30 a. m. E. S. T. in an attempt to make a westward crossing of the Atlantic to New York.

They considered it doubtful they could reach the American metropolis without refueling and planned to strike first for Halifax, Nova Scotia, probably stopping there for more petrol. It was their intention to fly by the Azores, not attempting to land but returning to Portugal if their fuel consumption was too heavy.

Plane of French Make
The plane was a Farman monoplane of French construction, bearing on its fuselage near its 230-horsepower motor the name "Jung-Schweizerland," or "Young Switzerland."

They carried a vacuum bottle filled with coffee, a quantity of milk, 15 sandwiches, some eggs and chocolate. They also had with them an apparatus to distill sea water.

The course laid out from Lisbon to Halifax, via Azores, was something in excess of 3,000 miles, of which about 950 miles represented the flight to Horta. It was their first intention to land in the Azores if they found their fuel supply would be insufficient for the venture, but when the government informed them the landing field there was not fit for them to come down, they announced they would not make that contingency arose.

TARIFF BILL IS
GIVEN DEMOCRATS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP).—The house tariff bill carrying hundreds of rate changes approved by republican members of the senate finance committee, moved another step in its long legislative journey today with its submission to the democratic committee for their consideration.

Debate on the bill was to have begun today in the senate under the two months recess agreement reached June 19, but the finance group was delayed in its work and will require another week or more to re-write the administration provisions. Actual debate will not start until September 4.

CHINESE ARE
SENDING MEN
TO MANCHURIAFIGHTING BREAKS OUT
AMONG TROOPS; BIG
ARMY MOBILIZING

(By Associated Press.)

TOKYO, Aug. 19.—Rengo News dispatches from Manchuria, today said the first of the large Chinese reinforcement armies which are being rushed to the western Manchurian border had arrived there, equipped with machine guns and field guns.

A Mukden dispatch to the same agency said Governor Chang Hsueh Liang had appointed General Wang Shu Chang commander of the Manchuria forces at present enroute to the Siberian border and had summoned a military council to meet at Mukden.

Soviet Arrested
The Manchurian report said calm had been restored in that area after the Soviet raid on Dalai-nor, although the town itself was deserted and Manchuria in panic after the clash. Chinese officials arrested twelve Soviet workmen and sent them to Harbin.

A Harbin dispatch said telegraph lines to Pogradichnaya had been cut.

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AGREEMENT MADE WITH
COOPERATIVES FOR
LOANS TO GROUPS

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—The Federal Farm Board announced today it had tentatively agreed to make "certain financial advances" to cotton cooperative associations to assist in the movement of this year's crop.

This decision was reached, the board said as a result of a number of conferences with officials of the American Cotton Growers exchange.

"These associations," the board announcement said, "are now able to obtain loans from the federal intermediate credit banks to the amount of 65 per cent of the value of the cotton."

Proposed 25 Percent More
"The federal farm board proposes to loan an additional 25 per cent at total of 90 per cent for the two government agencies—on cotton on which a definite value has been fixed by hedging in the future market."

"The total volume of advances of this sort to be made by the federal farm board will be limited only by the actual requirements of the cotton cooperative associations. It is expected the sum involved for this year's marketing operations will run somewhere between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000."

Make Early Payments
"The effect of the secondary loan by the federal farm board, the an-

AFTER LONG
ASIAN TOURPERILOUS JOURNEY TO
CHINA MADE IN
102 HOURS

(By Associated Press.)

TOKYO, Aug. 19.—The Graf Zeppelin, giant liner of the air, landed at Kasumigaura airport, 40 miles northeast of Tokyo at 6:27 p. m. today (1:27 a. m. Pacific Standard Time) completing the most perilous trip of its globe circling journey, the flight of nearly 7,000 miles from Friedrichshafen, Germany, in approximately 102 hours.

The dirigible, fresh from a jaunt of 6,432 miles across eastern Europe, Siberian Tundra and Asiatic mountain land, arrived over this city at 4:35 p. m. (2:35 a. m. E. S. T.) just one minute more than 100 hours from the time it left Friedrichshafen, Germany, Thursday 4:34 a. m. (10:34 p. m. Wednesday E. S. T.).

BROWN RIDES ON CREST OF FALL COLOR WAVE

Fashion Experts for Central Press From head to toe brown will be the outstanding color for fall. It will run the gamut from morning to evening. Brown, we remember, was decried in the lead to rust fall, and when it was continued into the summer, some of us shook our heads and thought it rather an unusual shade for warm weather, though it was entirely appropriate for winter, and quite in keeping with the turning of the leaves in fall.

But brown has held its own through both spring and summer, and now is important enough to challenge the status of black. Not that black is out of the picture, by any means. No color can take its place, and black will always have with us, approximately a 50-50 basis in comparison to all other fashionable colors. But brown is now reaching the status enjoyed by beige for the past several years.

Blue will run brown a close second. Popular as is brown, there are women who cannot wear it to advantage. For women with graying hair, for instance, look to brown, and the woman with auburn locks usually looks better in blue or green or black. Black, brown and blue are staples. It is easier to match frocks and ensembles of these colors in shoes and hats.

It is not necessary, but it is a wise move, to match the color of the shoes and hat to the frock or coat. Contrasts are often good, but more frequently bad. Kid leathers are perfectly dyed, and the dark brown or dark blue shoe is a near enough match for almost any shade of either the same or the color of the frock or coat.

For evening wear, where one can be luxurious, the fabric slipper is dyed to match the gown.

Dark Shades for Evening
Even in the midst of summer there is a strong tendency toward dark colors for evening wear, and among these much brown is seen. The evening frock sketched is a Worth model in dark brown chiffon. It is treated after the manner of many of the chic black evening frocks, with only jeweled motifs or ornaments to relieve the monotonous effect. Two interesting features of the frock sketched are the jeweled motifs that edge the décolletage and the rippling cable back. You will note the belted raised waistline and the full dipped skirt with its snug hip-line.

The afternoon frock of printed sheer velvet, with its much longer skirt and raised waistline, is another illustration of the vogue for brown. The background is dark brown with the small print in one of the capricious shades. It shows the snug hip-line with low puffed cap sleeves and three tiers. The hat and shoes are brown.

The higher waistline is also shown in the sports frock at the right. This is a knitted suit in two shades of brown with peach and white. The skirt is of dark brown, and the jumper and sleeveless jacket in the shade of two brown peach and white. Dark brown shoes complete the ensemble.

Carl Williams of Oklahoma, representing cotton interests on the board, in commenting on the announcement, said "this is just exactly what the cotton growers want."

The injured youths were on operating tables within ten minutes after the accident, both bleeding profusely.

Blood was flowing freely from a gaping hole in Rinsinger's forehead and from Lowmire's head and right leg where the broken bone protruded. Ambulance attendants' clothing was saturated in blood after working with the injured pair.

X-rays Are Taken
Throughout the night and early morning friends of the pair were grouped about the hospital. Between three and four o'clock Lowmire began regaining consciousness and came from under the effects of anesthetics given him while his leg was being set and his head sewed up. X-ray pictures of the broken leg showed three distinct breaks in the two leg bones and a small portion of one of the bones chipped. Physicians said there was a possibility that the leg might have to be reopened and treated today.

THREE OLD STARS ARE CHALLENGED BY YOUNGSTERS

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Aug. 19.—Three players who have known what it is to be queen of American courts and 61 others who would like to know were here today for the opening of the women's national tennis championships at the West Side Tennis club.

Helen Wills, of Berkeley, Calif., defending champion, has won the title five times, among the 63 players seeking to dethrone her are Mrs. Molla Mallory, eight-times national champion, and Mrs. May Sutton Bundy of Santa Monica, titleholder in 1924.

Miss Wills and Mrs. Mallory have had almost a struggle hold on the singles championship ever since 1915. Only once in the last 14 years has any other player won the title.

Mrs. Hazel Hotchkiss Wightman, turned the trick back in 1912. Mrs. Mallory then Molla Bjurstedt, began her reign in 1915, won again in 1916-17-18-20-21-22-23. Miss Wills first won the title in 1923, repeated in 1924-25, did not defend in 1926 and won it again in 1927 and 1928.

Miss Wills' most serious opposition this year is expected to come not from either Mrs. Mallory or Mrs. Bundy but from several younger players.

Some of those who take their tennis very seriously have criticized the Davis cup committee of the United States Lawn Tennis Association for sending George Lott against the French defenders. They are of the opinion that Frank Hunter instead of the young Chicago boy.

It would seem, however, that the American team didn't do bad in winning two of the five matches in the challenge round and that young Lott made a magnificent stand in the final match upon which the cup depended.

That Would Have Been Sweet
There has been a romantic distributed that the American officials committed an act of great gallantry and sportsmanship in substituting Lott for Hunter.

The tale goes that when the American committee learned that Rene Lacoste, the French ace, was in poor health and would not be able to play, it deliberately weakened the American team to equalize matters.

That's a sap idea from the start. The committee when it named the American players was not certain that Lacoste would not play. The French have done tricks like that in the past.

The Dough Comes First
And more important, the possession of the Davis Cup means too much financially to the American association to warrant any such gestures of magnificent sportsmanship.

It is quite obvious that Lott was placed on the team as a single player for the sole reason that the men in charge thought he had a better chance to win than Hunter had.

LAST MAN GOES

Gunsmith's Death Takes Last Of Defenders

Petmecky also saw service in the Confederate forces as a member of Sibley's brigade.

Fernando Raven, another of the vigilantes died here several months ago.

The Finer Life

It is the fashion of this country
especially among people who are
better educated than the average to
speak slightly of America as a
"materialistic nation."

By this, of course, it is meant that
we think too much about making
money and not enough about living
freer and more satisfying lives.
Our scale of values is material rather
than spiritual. The cash register
is, if not our Bible, at least our
prayer book.

All of this sounds quite discour-
aging. Yet there is a side to it
that is often overlooked. One of the
approaches to a fine spiritual civil-
ization may lie straight through the
region of crass materialism.

Take this little story as an illus-
tration.
Not long ago a California farmer
loaded a refrigerator ship with a
cargo of green vegetables and ripe
fruits from his farm and sailed for
the Orient, determined to see if
lands like China, the Philippines
and the Malay islands could not
provide a good market for such pro-
duce. The home market was glut-
ted. Prices were low. An indus-
trious farmer with a fertile piece of
ground could not always count on
finishing the year with more money
than he had when he began it.

So this enterprising farmer sail-
ed to the Orient. He visited a dozen
ports—Shanghai, Manila, Soura-
baya, Bangkok, Saigon, Batavia, and
he found a ready and eager market
for his wares. He sold all he had
at a nice profit and returned home
to tell his fellow farmers that the
Orient, properly cultivated, could
make them all prosperous.

Now that man was strictly a ma-
terialist. He wanted only one thing
—a chance to get more dollars. Yet
the thing he did may eventually open
the way to a broader, finer life for
many, many men and women.

Despite all of our talk about the
transience of the quest for money,
the fact remains that it is a lot
easier to get spiritual values into
your life if you have money than if
you have not. Nothing shuts a
man out from a free and satisfying
existence like poverty.

Consider it, now, on a farm where
there is a constant struggle to make
both ends meet, how are men, wom-
en and children going to lead lives
that are anything but sordid, unim-
agined fights for money? How can
they enjoy the fruits of a rich
civilization—music, literature, leisure,
quiet study and reflection? They
simply can't. The job of making
a living takes all their time.

But suppose a "materialistic" ex-
porter finds there is a new market and
enables them to make more money?
They are freed from the grip of
poverty. They have the time and
the money to go after the things
that are really worth having. They
can think about something besides
their bread and butter.

The "materialist" has been given
two bad names. There are times
when he is by way of being our sal-
vation.

Our Army

It is small wonder that President
Hoover is moved to protest by the
discovery that the U. S. army
budget will, by 1933, call for the
largest war expenditure of any coun-
try on earth.

We have the smallest standing
army of any major power. We do
not have compulsory military ser-
vice in any form. We have every
reason to believe that our relations
with our neighbors are going to con-
tinue peaceful—and, in any case, our
army is not our "first line of de-
fense," as is the case in most
countries.

Why, then, should our army
budget be so high?
President Hoover's determination
to bring about a drastic reduction
is extremely praiseworthy. Surely
the job can be done without in any real
way detracting from our prepared-
ness.

amateur standing.

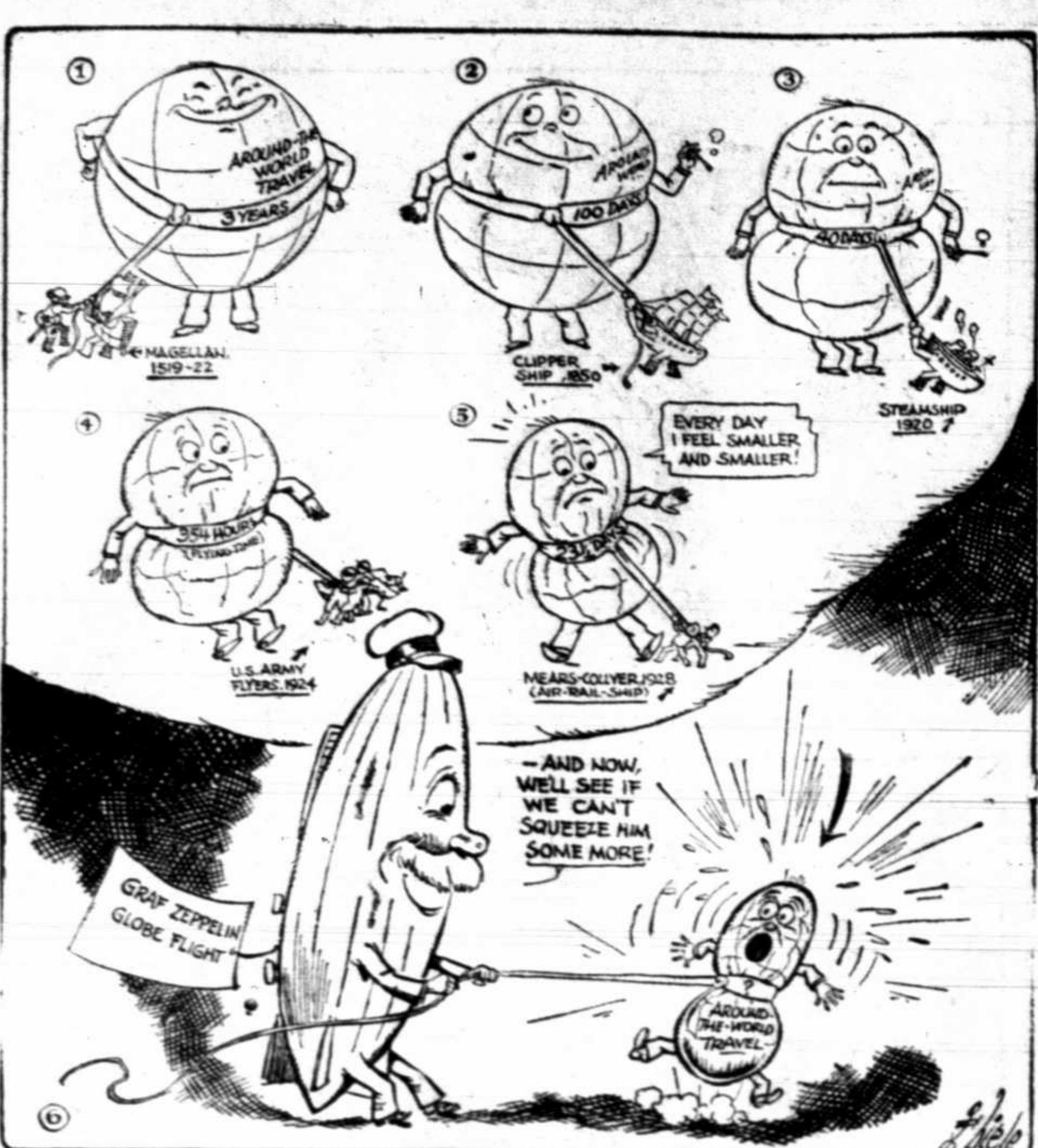
Turning from the sublime to the

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—It looks
as if the next Senate investigation
might be an inquiry as to whether
any of the power interests have
been trying to monkey with the
Federal Power Commission.

This commission is composed of
the Secretaries of War, Interior and
Agriculture. Its directing head is
an executive secretary, F. E. Bon-
ner, succeeding O. C. Merrill, just
retired. It controls all power sites
on navigable waters and on public
lands and federal reservations, and
has supervision over licensing, in-
stallation, design construction, main-
tenance and operation of power
projects on these sites.

The commission is supposed to
function in the interests of the
people. In its annual reports, how-
ever, one finds such complaints as
that owing to lack of money and
personnel it has been unable to per-
form its duties, "related primarily
to the protection of the public in-
terests. Attempts to enable the
commission to carry out its pro-
tective functions as required by law
were for a while blocked in Con-
gress, allegedly with the aid of
members friendly to the power in-
terests."

The Water Power Act provides
for investigation, upon each appli-
cation, of engineering features, best
interests of the region, financial
angles, and other matters but the
sites have been handed out with
little opportunity for such work as
that, owing to a small staff and low
appropriations.

Lately, however, the accounting
staff of the commission has been
able to put on a burst of speed, try-
ing to catch up with its protective
work, and this activity appears to
be worrying the power interests,
who seem to have sought to head
it off or nullify its effectiveness.
Sites are licensed for 50 years, at
the end of which time the govern-
ment can recapture the plant or re-
lease it to a preferred applicant
such as a municipality. The Act
provides a system of public utility
accounting and the government,
upon recapture, is supposed to pay
only the actual cost, minus the
depreciation reserve. The higher
the depreciation reserve the less
the government will have to pay—
and vice versa.

The commission accounts, under
Chief Accountant William V.
King, have been using the Inter-
state Commerce Commission's
standards which consider deprecia-
tion an definite operation expense,
whereas electrical utilities involved
consider depreciation allowance a
matter for the board of directors to
consider after making provision for
bond interest and dividends. Other
accepted standards used by King
with the commission's authority,
have been equally annoying.

Recently word went around
through the "grapevine route" that
an attempt was being made to move
King somewhere else. Whether this
report was true or not, a remark-
able document has found its way
into print, tending to insure the
safety of King's job, to reveal the
attitude if not the activities of some
of the power interests and to make
likely a Senate investigation.

Certain Washington correspond-
ents have it from the best author-
ity that this document, labeled
"The Federal Water Power Act and
Its Administration. A summary
with suggestions. CONFIDENTIAL,"
was written to be passed
around among power magnates.
There is no apparent doubt as to
the genuineness and it contains a
number of juicy highlights. Such
as:

"Despite our efforts to curtail
the work of this (accounting) de-

The communication disapproves
of the accounting department's
checking up on charges billed to
subsidiary companies holding con-
struction licenses by engineering
and management companies. This
is an old device by which higher-
ups on the utility game are enabled
to grab huge slices of money which
are paid by the consumer.

And the surprising sugges-
tion—"if . . . further direct en-
largement of the accounting staff is
prevented it is believed that these
departments will not have men
specifically trained for this work.
At least they will be removed from
the direct supervision of Mr. King."

Those urging the investigation
also want to know who has been
getting a lion's share of the com-
mission's permits.

it was a swanky Fifth avenue hat,

the-city" looks. Every since I left
Manhattan someone has been giv-

IF SYMPTOMS INDICATE
POISONS IN THE BLOOD

Answers to Correspondents

B.—Steady loss of weight, fatigue
all out of proportion to the activi-
ties, vague digestive disturbances
and sleeplessness, all point to tox-
emia from some cause.

(Toxemia means poison in the blood.) It may
point to toxemia from early tuber-
culosis, and it is perhaps best for
one suffering from such symptoms to
see a lung specialist, for early
tuberculosis is difficult to diag-
nose, and perhaps only those who
have had an extensive practice in
diagnosing lung condition may be
able to diagnose it. (Of course, a
lung specialist will also give you a
general examination.)

Mrs. C.—The shape of the bones
and the musculature of the legs are
inherited characteristics, and some-
times the legs are apparently over-
large for the rest of the body. When
they are overlarge from this cause,
and not from excess fat, they have
to be endured, just as an overlarge
nose has to be endured. Of course,
if they are so large that they are
deformed, then plastic surgery could
be called into use.

Your daughter of 17 is around 30
pounds overweight, so undoubtedly
her extra fat legs are part of her
general excess weight. You will
find that her extra 30 pounds go
off, her legs will reduce in size. She
might also try massage, either with
the hands or with one of the patent
hand rollers. This will have to be
very persistently applied, and over
a long period of time, before she will
see any results.

Jumping rope may be good for
your large hips and legs, but no
violent exercise should be taken
(particularly after the age of 40).
Mrs. C. without a complete physical
examination by a competent physi-
cian.

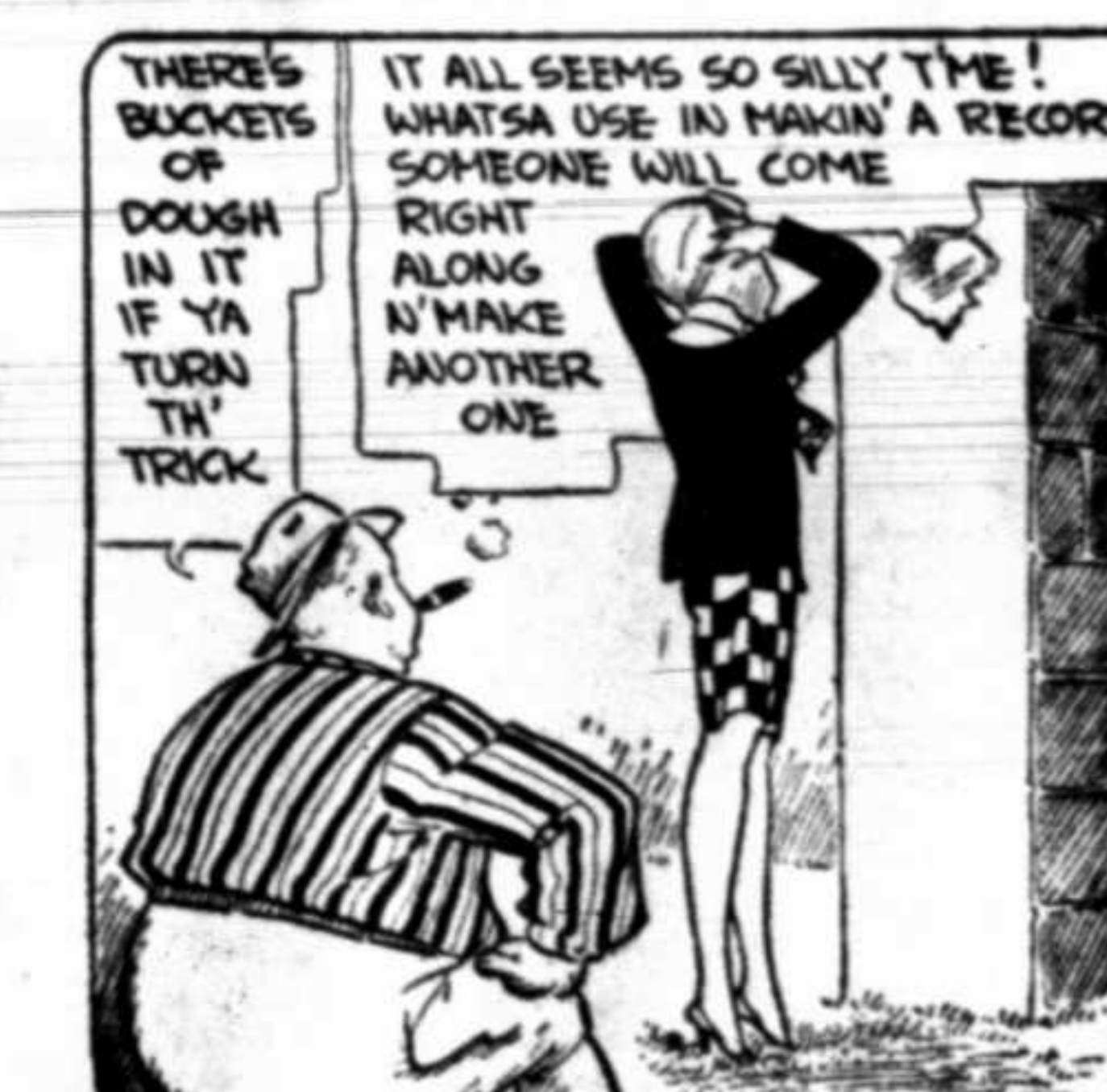

STOCKS MOVE HIGHER TODAY

NUMBER OF SHARES GO ON ADVANCE; RAILS IN STRONG

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP)—Stock prices moved irregularly higher at the opening of today's market, with rails, oils and Public Utilities again in good demand. Atchafalaya opened 3 points higher, Westinghouse Electric 2, General Electric 1 3/4 and Standard Oil of New Jersey, and Gillette Safety Razor about a point each. International Telephone crossed 120 to a new high record. North American Co. and Union Pacific were heavy.

Wall Street apparently was not disturbed by reports of military disturbances in the far east. Most week-end trade reports were optimistic in character, and had a cheerful effect on speculative sentiment.

Film Stocks Up
Westinghouse Electric, expected to benefit materially from the railroad electrification projects, was marked up nearly 5 points to a new high record at 253 1/2. International Telephone, crossed 122 to another new high for the present stock market. Paramount Famous Lasky and Packard (old stock) also reached new high ground.

Rails made further response to reports of record-breaking car readings for this season of the year. Heaviness cropped out in several of recent leaders such as U. S. Steel common, American Can, Simmons Co., and National Dairy products, all of which yielded a point or so in the first half hour.

Foreign exchanges opened steady with cables unchanged at \$4.83 3/4.

WHEAT PRICES ARE IRREGULAR

CHICAGO, Aug. 19 (AP)—Wheat scored a quick upturn here today after an early setback, but failed to hold gains well.

Opening 3-5c to 1-1-1/4c off, Chicago wheat staged somewhat recovery, and then rose temporarily to well above Saturday's finish. Corn, oats and provisions were easy, with corn starting at 3-8c decline to 5-8c gain, and subsequently showing an irregular downward trend.

"Tell me your philosophy of life and I will tell you your fate," he said.

FLOYDADA, Aug. 19.—Free delivery of city mail will become effective in Floydada on September 1, according to J. D. The service was not requested until it was found that all houses had been numbered, all street names erected, sidewalks built, postoffice receipts well above the requirement and the majority of the people desired the service. Following this survey the postoffice department granted the petition provided eighty-five per cent of the residents in the territory to be served erected mail boxes in order to get the service.

GOVERNOR MOODY DECIDES THIS IDEA OF TRYING TO SAVE TAXPERS' MONEY IS THANKLESS JOB; TAX BIG WORRY

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Aug. 19.—Governor Moody has about decided it is a thankless job—this thinking of trying to save the taxpayers a few dollars on the state rate. Everyone who observed his work on the top-heavy appropriation bills was convinced that it was a tedious and trying task. It required constant application, much midnight oil and limitless diplomacy.

By day he received and listened to scores of individuals and committees who called in person to urge that he leave untouched by his blue pencil items they were very interested in. By night, surrounded by a committee of advisers, he attempted to do his whittling, exercising care to take from the money measures only items that were not absolutely necessary and which would be foregone for the time being, or until the state's finances were in better condition.

Rejected Entire Batch

The governor did his level best to get the legislature to cut the bills to within the state revenue, even going so far as to reject the entire batch of some \$51,000,000 worth of appropriations and calling the legislature back to reduce them. After it had cut them to \$47,800,000 he found it necessary to eliminate items aggregating \$3,000,000 from the revamped measures.

It necessitated the veto of buildings for four colleges and schools. Fearing that the governor might decide these buildings could be eliminated for the time being, friends of the schools poured into his office to urge their approval. Senators and representatives camped on his trail.

Swept All Aside

Notwithstanding all the influences brought to bear on him to leave certain items untouched, he swept everything aside and made an effort to size up the situation as an unbiased Texan—a governor trying to hold the tax rate down.

After he had done his work, there came criticism from many quarters. Some of the departments did not like it because he had curtailed their allotments for help. The board of control chairman contended that by cutting the eleemosynary bill the governor had forced a situation that was difficult of solution. It was stated that the institutions would have to revert to their double shift

In probable violation of the 9-54 hour law.

Governor Moody claimed that with the assistance of a member of the board he had carefully taken from the bill provisions for attendance that he felt were superfluous. In addition, he contended that the 9-54 hour law did not apply to state institutions and pointed to an opinion handed down by Chief Justice C. M. Cureton of the supreme court when Judge Cureton was an assistant attorney general some years ago.

Arouse Farmers' Ire

He aroused the ire of farmers of West Texas when he took from the claims and accounts bill the \$150,000 voted to pay claims for damages incurred under the pink boll worm quarantine.

To make a long story short: The governor was probably subjected to more criticism than praise for his effort on behalf of a lower state tax rate.

"It may not amount to more than \$1 to the average taxpayer, but every one cent saved on the state tax rate represents about \$300,000 in the aggregate to the taxpayers," Governor Moody said.

He said if he had left the legislature alone and not resubmitted appropriations and then refrained from doing any vetoing, it would have required a 40 per cent tax rate to meet expenses of the state. The constitutional limit is 35 cents.
