### Three Olton High School Choirs Bring Home Two Sweepstakes

Olton High School Girls Choir and Mixed Choir each won a Sweepstakes award at the Regional University Interscholastic League Contest held in Lubbock Saturday.

This is the first such award won by any choir in the history of the school.

The highest rating is a I Division in concert and a I Division in sight reading. Choirs receiving a I in each contest receives a sweepstakes award.

Three Olton choirs participated in the contests and in addition to the two sweepstakes won by the high school choirs, the junior high choir received a II Division in concert and a I Division in sight reading.

Other area schools receiving sweepstakes awards was the Lockney Junior High Girls Choir and Kress High Mixed Choir.

Concert judges were Mrs. Lavinia Webb, Highland Park, Dallas; Mr. Harry Sellars, choir director, Fort Worth and Mr. B. L. Sittman, a junior high choir director.

Sight reading judge was Al-

len Clinkscales of Duncan High School, Duncan, Okla.

Commenting on the performance of the high school choir Mrs. Webb states "You'd be a credit to any school if you sing like this all the time. What can I say -- you're great!"

Sellars said, "This is the finest work today. Thank you for this music experience. My sincere and humble congratu-

lations to you. What a beautiful job. You should be proud of your director. She really knows what this music is. I have rarely heard work this good in high school."

Sittman summed up his feelings after discussing the good points of the choir by simply stating, "I can't find anything wrong."

### Fire Demonstration Slated For Olton High Students

Students of Olton High School will have an opportunity to see for themselves how fire can be man's best friend or his worst enemy by observing a graphic fire demonstration to be presented at 10 a. m. on Mar. 29, Joe Turner, principal announced today.

The demonstration, in seven parts, will be given under the direction of Joe Smetana, Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau.

A variety of demonstration equipment will be placed on tables sixteen feet in length to illustrate seven basic points: What fire is, how to control fires; the fact that nothing is fireproof, kitchen fires and their control, fuel vapors, the power of petroleum products and household wiring and overloaded electrical circuits.

Smetana will point out that fire is like a three-legged stool - it can't work with one of the legs missing. The "legs" fire depends on are fuel, heat and air.

Yet, in American homes, these three things come together in deadly and destructive combination every 57 seconds - an average of 1,500 home fires every day, according to Smetana.

"That's eight times the number of fires in factories and stores. Worse yet, four out

of five of all fire deaths occur in homes, and for every death there are about 100 serious injuries," the TFB Safety Director explained.

The program is being brought to Olton under the sponsorship of the Lamb County Farm Bureau. The public is invited to attend.

## Laborer Housing Being Considered

Members of the agriculture and area development committees of the local Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture met Monday night at the C-CA office for the purpose of discussing housing facilities which could be made available for harvest crews and also the possibilities of permanent housing for farm laborers employed by local farmers the year round.

Heading up the agriculture committee is Clovis Poteet with committee members Floyd Prentis, Max Malone, Delmer Givens, and Gerald Allcorn. The Area development committee is made up of Earl Spruiell, Parley Myers, G. T. Sides, Percy Parsons, Kelly Kelly with Fred Thompson serving as chairman.

Guests at the meeting were

Arch Fowler, district supervisor and Truman Jones, Lamb County supervisor of Farmers Home Administration.

The possibility of housing facilities similar to those erected at Dimmitt recently was the topic of discussion by the committeemen and other interested parties.

The units at Dimmitt, which is a 192-family project, opened March 1. Known as "Castro County Agricultural Housing", the \$966,820 development was organized and built by an association of 37 farmers in the county surrounding Dimmitt and 25 business firms in the town.

It is the largest non migratory farm labor housing center completed in the country by a private community association assisted by Federal loan and grant financing through the Farmers Home Administration, a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Earl Spruiell, Olton banker, was named to the Board of Trustees of the High Plains Research Foundation, at the semi-annual meeting of the board of trustees, held March 16 in Plainview.

Three members of the board were elected to honorary membership for life. Members honored were J. Frank Triplett, Amarillo; Jess Osborn, Muleshoe; and Harold Loden, Belmond, Iowa. Harold Hinn, chairman of the board, presided at the meeting and suggested these members be honored for their long time service to the Foundation.

Other new members elected to the Board of Trustees were Frank Dickson, Aiken; Frank Pharris, Amarillo; Troy McNeill, Dumas; Sam Singleton, Dalhart; J. D. Smith, Littlefield; Henry Snell, Kress; Cloyce Terrell, Sunray; John McQuien and Clarence Wright, Plainview. Homer Garrison served as chairman of the nominating committee.

A financial report for the Foundation was presented by Executive Vice-President and Director, Dr. Tom Longnecker.

Chairmen of the various committees presented their reports on research programs recommended by their commit-

tee. Chairmen reporting were: grain and forage sorghum, Elbert Harp, Abernathy; oil-seed, Berwyn Tilson, Plainview; herbicides and fertilizer, Steve Bavousett, Dawn; wheat and small grains, Leo Witkowski, Hereford; castors, Don Marble, South Plains; water conservation and recharge, C. I. Wall, Amarillo. Mr. Wall also reported for the membership committee for Chairman Ralph Wheeler, Edmonson.

It also houses a permanent year-round office of the Texas State Employment Service that will serve as a clearing house for employment opportunities in the area, and a full-time clinic of the State Migrant Labor Health Service.

With the cucumber harvest here in our county, many migrant workers would benefit from this same type housing here at Olton. Farmers would find it would be of benefit to them also in securing labor for their cucumber harvest.

Similar units may be situated at Olton, provided enough interest is shown in securing this housing.

A "town-hall" type meeting

for interested farmers and businessmen has been slated for Monday April 1 at 7:30 p. m. in the school cafeteria. Everyone is urged to attend.

Discussion of the housing for permanently employed farm laborers as well as for crews during harvest will be considered at the meeting. This would save area farmers a considerable sum of money if this housing could be used by their 'year round' hands instead of having to furnish homes that have to meet certain standards.

Several men from Dimmitt have been invited and are expected to attend the meeting to offer any assistance they might to the project.

With a total of 59 1/3 points in the Panhandle meet March 16, the Olton Blue placed third among the 46 teams entered.

Memphis led the track meet with 98 points. Panhandle rated second with 95 points, followed by Olton and Boys Ranch with 36 points.

However, there were 22 teams who did not receive one point!

Charles A. McClain, broke the string first in the 330 intermediate hurdles timed at 40.9 and Joe Luera placed sixth with a time of 44.0.

C. McClain placed third with a timing of 15.1 and Lannie McClain was sixth timed at 15.6 in the 120 high hurdles.

Eddie Hooper hurled the discus for a distance of 136'4" for a second rating. Steve Spain cleared 10'6" to place sixth in the pole vaulting division.

Benny Akin was fourth in the 220 yard dash with a time of 23.2 Timed at 45:3.6, Mike

Parsons was sixth in the mile run event. Joel Nelson, Emily Marquez, R. L. Copeland and Benny Akin, the 440 relay team, placed third with 45.2. Ronnie Yandell won a red ribbon by broad jumping 19'8 1/2".

The mile relay team, R. L. Copeland, Benny Akin, Charles A. McClain, and Kenneth Johnson were fourth, timed at 3:33.4. The Mustangs will participate in the Springlake meet this Saturday beginning at 9 a. m. and the finals begin at 1:30 p. m.

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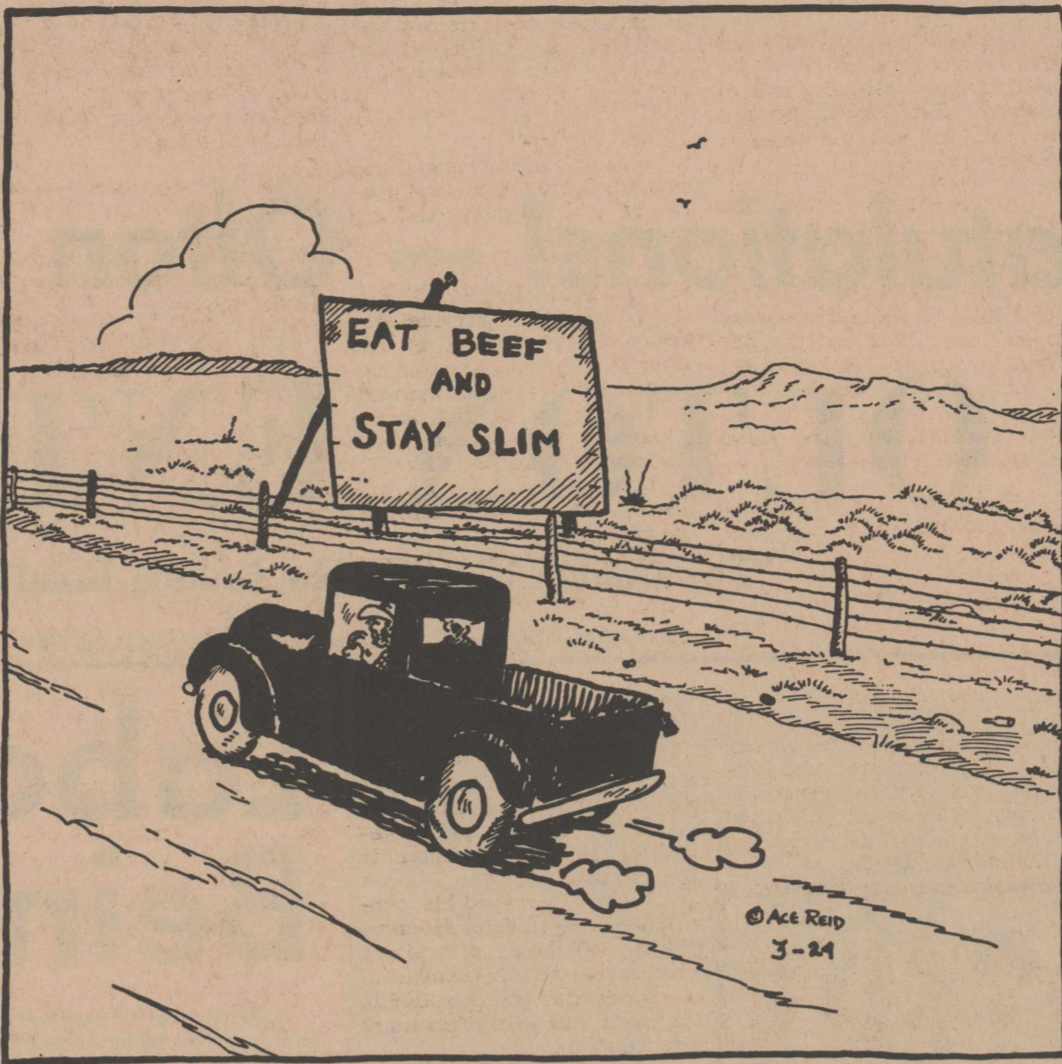

The conference concluded with everyone singing "God Bless America." They were directed by Dr. Cram.

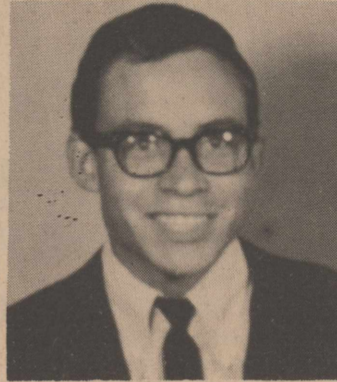

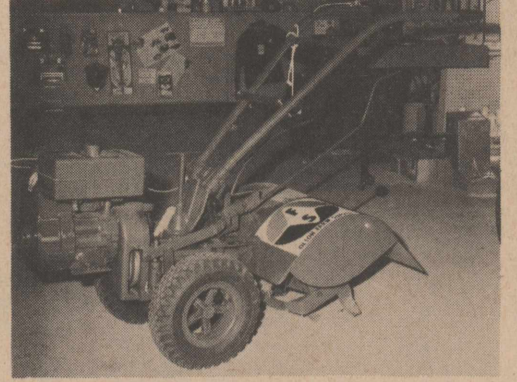

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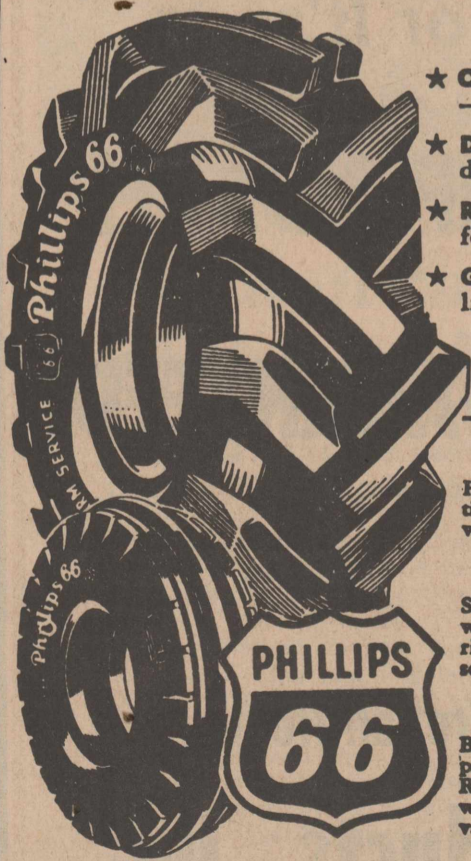

**Leggitt-Martin Vows Read In Olton Methodist Church**

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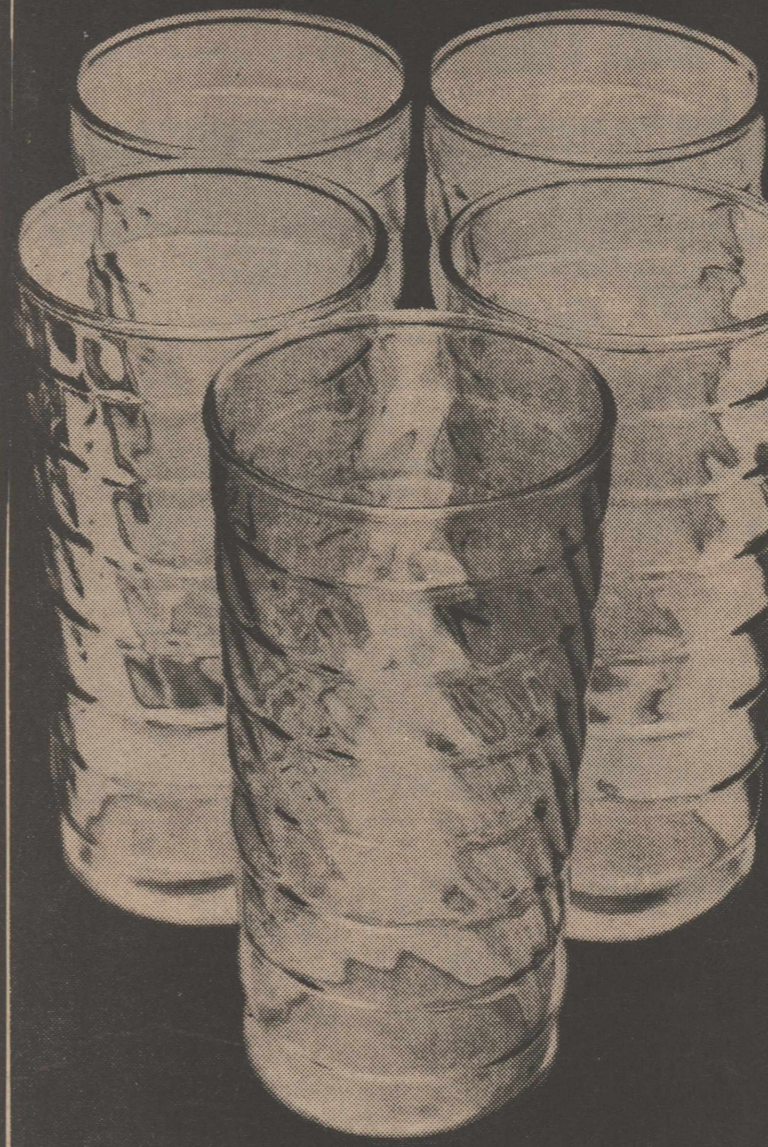

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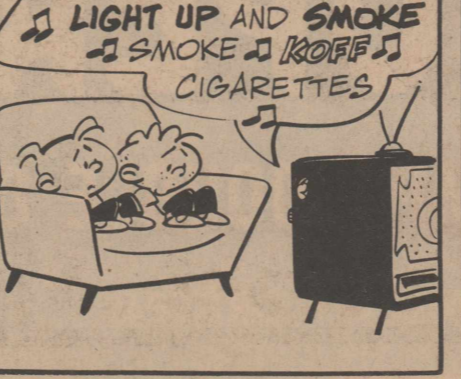
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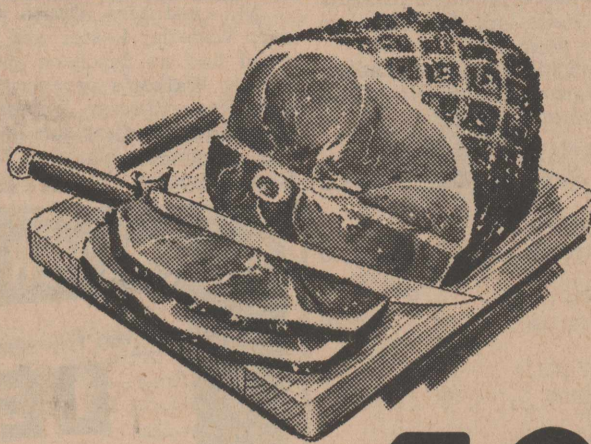
