Two fine athletes from the mighty Bronco track team qualified to run at the State Track meet in Austin on June 5-6, 2009. AA and AAAA schools competed on Friday while A, AAA, and AAAAA schools competed on Saturday at the Mike A. Myers Stadium on the UT Austin campus.

Jesus 'Jesse' Guerrero competed in the Boys' 400-meter dash at about 8:00 p.m. Jesse took 6th place with a time of 49.62 that beat his Regional qualifying time of 49.89, by 0.27 seconds. Jesse ran a tremendous race that had a

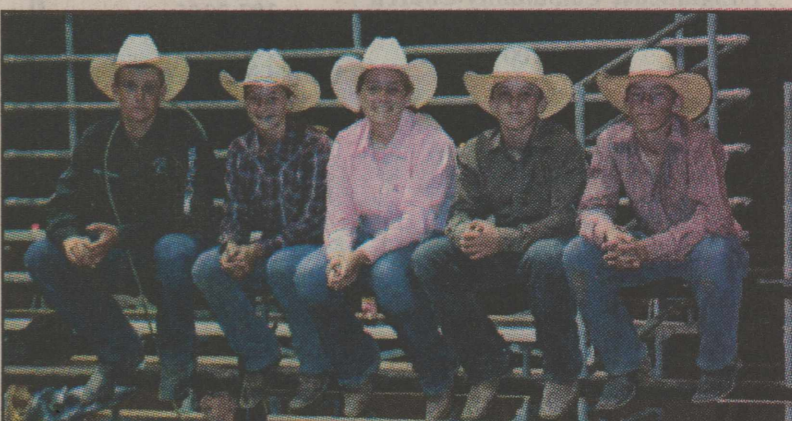


Chapman Harvey architects' rendition depicts how the field house will appear upon the conclusion of the construction project.



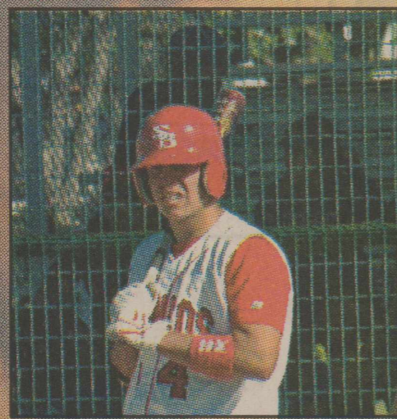

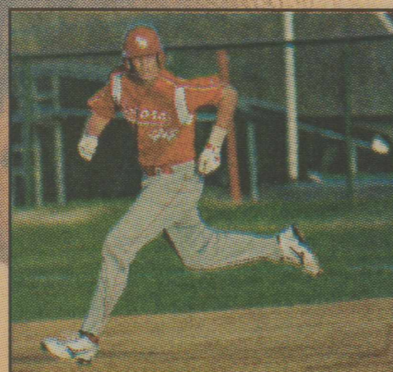

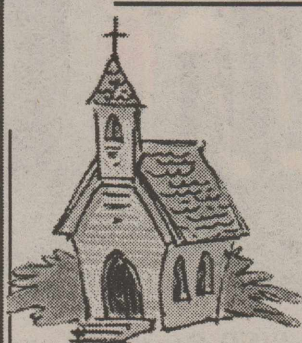

**Letter to the Editor**

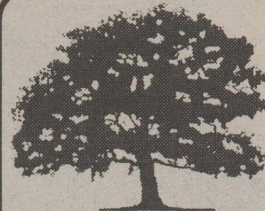
Dear Editor,

# Circumstances Changed; Our Economic Foundation Hasn't

Now that the Texas Legislature has departed town, we are reminded how quickly circumstances change.

Only five months ago, as state lawmakers were about to convene, President Bush held his final press conference, the Detroit auto show opened to great fanfare and a judge said Bernie Madoff could stay out of jail — for now.

That was January 12, the day that I performed my duty as the state's chief financial officer and told Texas lawmakers that they would have 10.5 percent less money to spend than two years ago.

One of my jobs is to predict the future — where the Texas economy will go over the next two years. Fortunately, I've got an excellent staff of revenue estimators to call on.

In January, the ripples of the global recession were just lapping at our boots and Congress was a month away from passing what became the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act.

Over the next five months, more Texans lost their jobs, but our jobless rate continued to trail the nation's. Housing construction fell, but our foreclosure rates did not spike. Sales tax revenues tumbled from their double-digit growth, but we had accounted for that.

Lawmakers approved a \$182.3 billion appropriations act to fund state government for 2010-11 — without cutting services or raising taxes. And, agree with it or not, they did it with \$12.1 billion in federal stimulus dollars.

Just as important, they left our Rainy Day Fund untouched and we expect it to grow to \$9 billion by the time they return in 2011, and they're likely to need it.

Even in good times, our revenues strain to pay for our expenditures. But, watching what's happening around the country, Texas is in an enviable position.

Unlike California, we're not considering double-digit budget cuts despite historic levels of federal subsidies. And unlike Michigan, we're not trying to diversify our economy as a once-dominant industry struggles to survive. Been there, done that.

Texas is in an enviable po-

sition because of what we learned during the oil bust of the 1980s.

Today, our economy is more diversified than Mexico's or Canada's. And that Rainy Day Fund was created in response to that watershed moment in the 1980s. Still, Texas is not immune to a global recession.

A Chrysler bankruptcy threatens about 50 Texas dealerships. We're still waiting to see the full impact of General Motors going through bankruptcy. Our jobless rate may inch up before it finally drops.

But Texas has the right business mix to rebound sooner than later.

Circumstances changed after January 12, but our economic foundation hasn't. Texas remains solid enough to weather these times.

As the state's chief financial officer, Comptroller Susan Combs on June 8 certified that the state will have enough revenue to support the 2010-11 General Appropriations Act.

"Have a nice weekend," said the officer.

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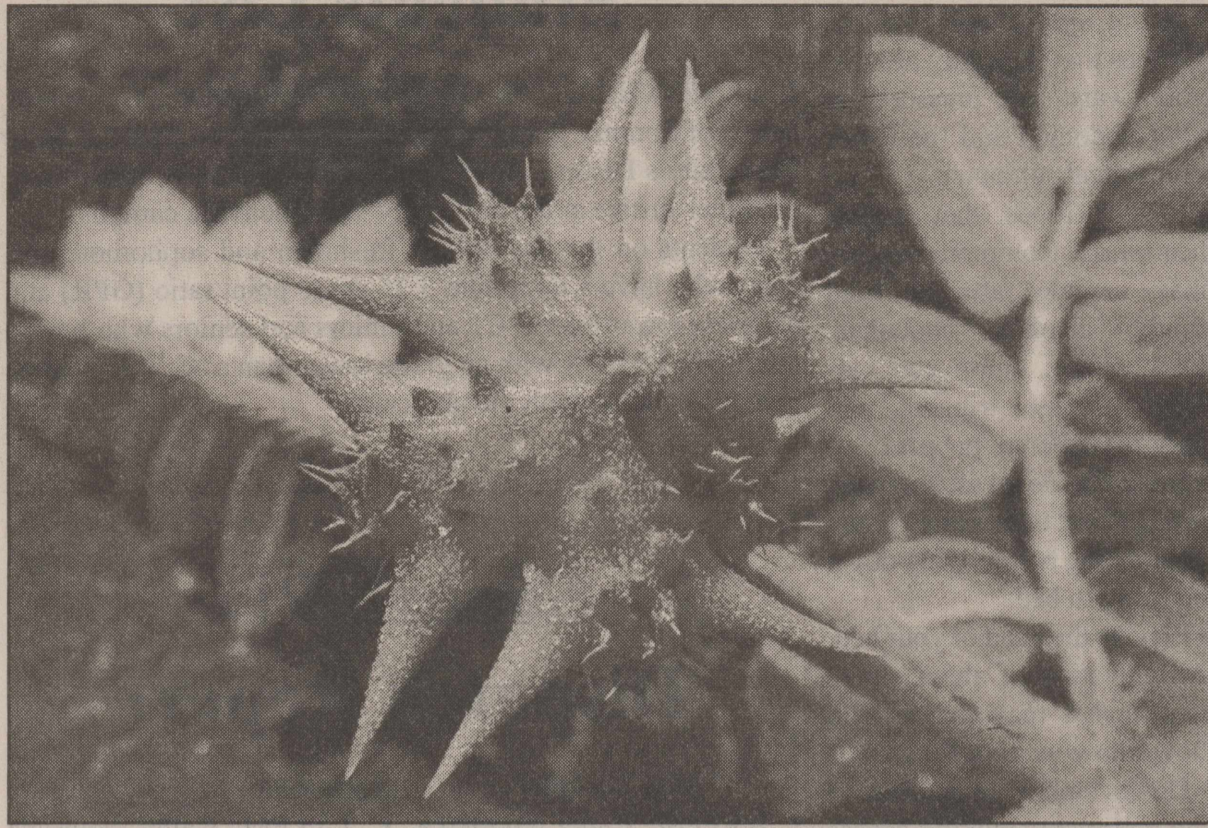

# The Year of the Goathead?

Due to our good rains of April and May, we are seeing an abundance of forbs (or weeds- depending on your point of view). One such is the "goathead" (*Tribulus terrestris*). It is a plant designed to survive. From the time the seed sprouts until it blooms and starts to form seed can vary, but usually only takes 2 - 3 weeks. The seed is an amazing product of natural selection. The seed coat is extremely durable and in the right conditions can last upwards of 20 years. Each burr separates into five separate segments (with 2-4 seeds inside it). Those individual seeds have a varying degree of dormancy. One portion of the seed may be past its prime, but there's a couple more still to come into theirs. So you see, the seed can patiently wait and wait for the right conditions to sprout. Seems like they're everywhere this year.

The goathead is a summer annual native to southern Europe. It can be a major problem in pastures, turf, along roadsides and parks. The seeds have sharp points that can injure people and pets when stepped on and can even puncture bicycle tires.

The seeds also injure the feet, hides, mouths, and digestive tracts of livestock. The foliage may contain levels of nitrate toxic enough to poison livestock. Some researchers have also connected a toxin produced by goatheads to photosensitization in sheep. However, its main weedy characteristic, as indicated by its other common names of puncturevine or caltrop, is its spiky seedpods. (A caltrop is a metal device, used to deter passage by vehicles with pneumatic tires or the hooves of horses; it has four projecting spikes so arranged

that when three of the spikes are on the ground, the fourth points upward to poke a tire or hoof.)

In areas where it's difficult to remove by hand or hoeing, herbicides may be used to control. The smaller or younger the plant, the better the postemergent herbicides work. Glyphosate is one of the best herbicides to use as long as there's no other desirable vegetation to keep. It is non-selective and will kill all green vegetation. If Puncturevine is in grass or lawn, a 2,4-D type herbicide will kill all broadleaf type plants and leave the grasses alive. Great care must be taken when using 2,4-D. This type of spray can easily affect desirable plants. As with any chemical spray, always read and follow the label.

Biological control has also been proven effective. Two weevils, *Microlarinus lareynii* and *M. lypriformis*, native to

India, France, and Italy, were introduced into the United States as biocontrol agents. *Microlarinus lareynii* is a seed weevil that deposits its eggs in the immature burr or flower bud and the larvae feed on and destroy the seeds before they pupate and emerge as adults, disperse, and start the cycle over again. Generation time is 19 to 24 days in the summer. *Microlarinus lypriformis* is a stem weevil that has a similar life cycle except that it lays its eggs in the undersides of stems, branches, and the root crown. The larvae tunnel in the pith where they feed and pupate. The adults emerge from holes chewed in the upper surfaces of the stems, branches, and crowns. Adults of both species overwinter in plant debris. Although the stem weevil is slightly more effective than the seed weevil when each is used alone, the weevils are most effective if used together and the weed is moisture-stressed. Both species of weevils are available for purchase from biological control suppliers.

# 51 New Game Wardens Will Enforce Texas Conservation Laws

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Game Warden Academy's largest class ever will graduate at 9 a.m. Tuesday morning in the House of Representatives chamber at the capitol, after which the 51 cadets will disperse to their first duty stations across the state.

Game wardens perform water rescue operations, respond to natural disasters, and conduct public outreach programs, in addition to enforcing traditional hunting, fishing, and water safety regulations.

"Basically, game wardens are the primary law enforcement off the pavement in Texas," said Major Danny Shaw, director of training at the academy.

This 54th Game Warden graduating class was the first to be trained at the academy's new site in Hamilton County, in a facility donated by the nonprofit Police Activities League. Previously, cadets trained at a converted ware-

house in Austin and various borrowed facilities around the state, adding extra costs and travel time to the training schedule.

Construction began in April on a \$20 million training complex at the new Hamilton site. Fundraising is needed to complete the ambitious projects, and Texans are encouraged to support future Texas game wardens. More information is on the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Web site.

Current graduates received 1,400 hours of training over seven months in areas such as peace officer training, firearm use, public speaking, police driving, all terrain vehicles, and various Texas Parks and Wildlife statutes and other state codes.

The new game wardens will report for duty in different counties across Texas within the next week.

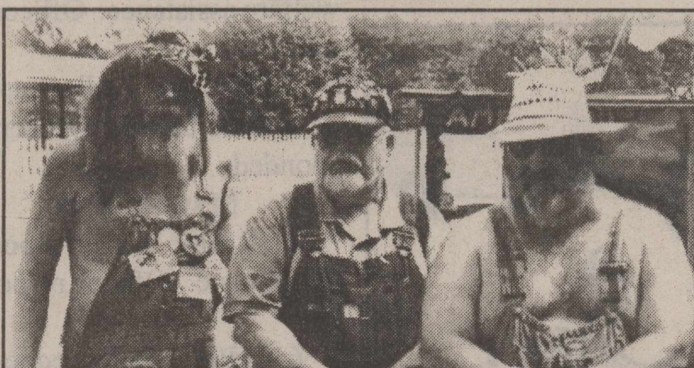

Amistad: Water clear; 77 degrees; 0.86' low. Black bass are excellent on Yamamoto Senkos, minnows, and watermelon and watermelon red soft plastics, and on topwaters early. Striped bass are good on swimbaits, Sassy Shad, and Rat-L-Traps. White bass are slow. Crappie are slow. Catfish are fair on cheesebait and punchbait. Yellow catfish are good on trotlines baited with live perch. Everyone in the boat must have a Mexico fishing license (if fishing the Mexico side) whether fishing or not.

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## Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease

Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease (GERD) is a chronic digestive disease that affects millions of people in the United States. GERD occurs when stomach acid or other digestive juices flow back into your esophagus, the "pipe" that connects your mouth to your stomach. Though acid reflux and GERD are closely related, they are not necessarily the same disorder. It is when acid reflux occurs more than twice each week or interferes with your daily life that your health provider may diagnose you with GERD.

When you swallow, a small muscle near the bottom of your esophagus, called the lower esophageal sphincter, opens to allow food and liquid to flow down into your stomach and then closes again. However, if this muscle relaxes abnormally or weakens, stomach acid

can flow back up into your esophagus, causing heartburn. This acid may irritate the lining of your esophagus and cause it to become inflamed.

Over time, the inflammation can erode the esophagus, causing bleeding, trouble breathing and other serious problems.

In addition to acid reflux, symptoms of GERD may include, but are not limited to:

- Heartburn, spreading to the throat with a sour taste in your mouth
- Chest pain
- Difficulty swallowing
- Dry cough
- Hoarseness or sore throat
- Sensation of a lump in the throat

Make an appointment with your health provider if you experience severe or frequent GERD symptoms or if you turn to over-the-counter med-

ications for heartburn more than twice per week. You are likely to start by seeing your family's health provider. He or she may refer you to a specialist in digestive disorders – a Gastroenterologist. Your health provider may suggest tests and procedures used to diagnose GERD, such as an X-ray of your upper digestive system, endoscopy and a test to monitor the amount of acid in your esophagus, among others.

Conditions that may increase your risk of GERD include, but are not limited to:

- Obesity
- Hiatal hernia
- Pregnancy
- Smoking
- Dry mouth
- Asthma
- Diabetes

Seek immediate medical attention if you experience chest pain, especially when accompanied by symptoms such as shortness of breath or jaw or arm pain. These may be signs of a heart attack.

Treatment for heartburn and other signs and symptoms of GERD usually begins with over-the-counter medications that control acid:

- Antacids that neutralize stomach acid. Overuse of some antacids can cause side effects such as diarrhea or constipation.

- Medications to reduce acid production. These may not act as quickly as antacids but they provide longer relief.
- Medications that block acid production and heal the esophagus. These block acid production and allow time for the esophagus to heal.

Tell your health provider if these medications do not seem to be helping after a few weeks. If heartburn persists, your health provider may recommend prescription-strength medications. Too, medications are sometimes combined to increase effectiveness. Though most GERD can be controlled through medications, there may be instances where medications are not effective. In these instances, your health provider may recommend additional treatment options.

Lifestyle changes may help control your GERD symptoms. The American College of Gastroenterology recommends:

- Maintain a healthy weight. Excess weight puts pressure

on your stomach causing acid to back up into your esophagus.

- Avoid tight-fitting clothing. Clothes that fit tightly around your waist put pressure on your abdomen and the lower esophageal sphincter.

- Avoid foods that trigger heartburn. Common triggers may include fatty or fried foods, alcohol, chocolate, mint, garlic, onion and caffeine, though triggers will vary for different people.

- Do not lie down after a meal. Wait at least two to three hours after eating before lying down or going to bed.

- Elevate the head of your bed. An elevation of about six to nine inches may reduce acid flow into your esophagus.

- Do not smoke. In addition to the detriment smoking causes to your overall health, it decreases the lower esophageal sphincter's ability to function properly.

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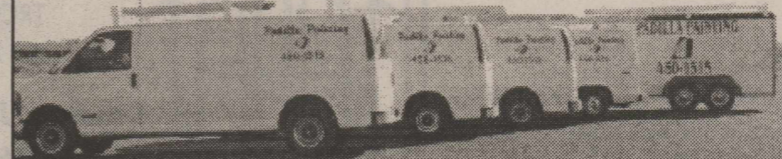
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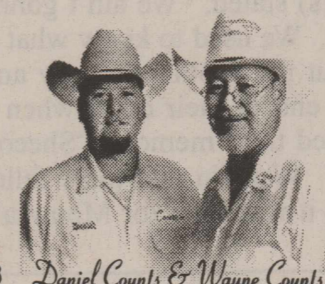

The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and has made a preliminary decision to prepare a draft permit for public comment and review. The TCEQ Executive Director recommends issuance of this draft permit. The permit application, statement of basis, and draft permit will be available for viewing and copying at the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality Central Office, 12100 Park 35 Circle, Building E, First Floor, Austin, Texas; the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality San Angelo Regional Office, 622 South Oakes Street, Suite K, San Angelo, Texas 76903-7035; and the Sutton County Library, 306 East Mulberry Street, Sonora, Texas, beginning the first day of publication of this notice. At the TCEQ Central and Regional Offices, relevant supporting material for the draft permit, as well as the New Source Review permits which have been incorporated by reference, may be reviewed and copied. Any person with difficulties obtaining these materials due to travel constraints may contact the TCEQ Central Office file room at (512)239-1540.

**PUBLIC COMMENT/NOTICE AND COMMENT HEARING.** Any person may submit written comments on the draft permit. Comments relating to the accuracy, completeness, and appropriateness of the permit conditions may result in changes to the draft permit.

A person who may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the permitted area may request a notice and comment hearing. The purpose of the notice and comment hearing is to provide an additional opportunity to submit comments on the draft permit. The permit may be changed based on comments pertaining to whether the permit provides for compliance with 30 TAC Chapter 122 (examples may include that the permit does not contain all applicable requirements or the public notice procedures were not satisfied). The TCEQ may grant a notice and comment hearing on the application if a written hearing request is received within 30 days after publication of the newspaper notice. The hearing request must include the basis for the request, including a description of how the person may be affected by the emission of air pollutants from the application area. The request should also specify the conditions of the draft permit that are inappropriate or specify how the preliminary decision to issue or deny the permit is inappropriate. All reasonably ascertainable issues must be raised and all reasonable available arguments must be submitted by the end of the public comment period. If a notice and comment hearing is granted, all individuals that submitted written comments or a hearing request will receive written notice of the hearing. This notice will identify the date, time, and location for the hearing.

Written public comments and/or requests for a notice and comment hearing should be submitted to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, Office of the Chief Clerk, MC-105, P.O. 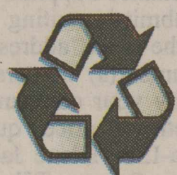

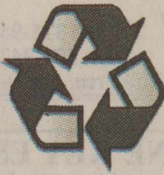

**Only on June 13, 2009:**

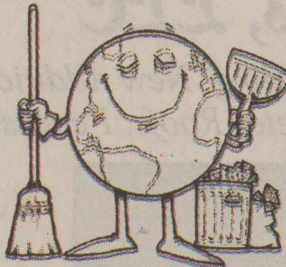
