PANTHERS TO OPEN SEASON WITH PERRIN FRIDAY NIGHT

The Gorman Panthers will open their regular season this Friday night when they host the Perrin Pirates in an 8 p. m. game.

The Panthers are looking forward to another enjoyable season for their fans who are always so supportive of the Big Red in whatever they do.

One of the strongest spots this season should be the Big Red defense. For one thing, the Big Red defense has 15 returning lettermen and the Panthers have had one year under their new coach Bryan Allen, who was the former defensive coordinator at McMurry College. There are 8 or 9 starters back from last season, which was a learning season for the Panthers.

The Big Red were especially strong on offense the past season and the Panther defense came along as they gained experience.

The Panthers will be led on offense by Kris Scitern, a 152 pound senior, who will be at tailback on offense and linebacker on defense; Jade Warren, 176 pound senior will be at fullback and linebacker; Rajee Patel, 151 pound senior will be at the quarterback spot and at defensive back; Tony Forbus, 161 pound senior will be at tailback and will play defensive back (a newcomer to the Panthers); Daniel Sanchez, 157 lb. senior, will be at wingback and defensive back; Flavio Herrera, 146, senior, will play quick end and defensive back; Chris Laminack, 164, senior, will be back at center and linebacker; Daniel Reeves, 157, senior, will be at guard and defensive tackle; Jonray Childers, 174, senior, will be at tackle and defensive end; and Henrik Bodlund, 169, senior (newcomer) will be at tight end and at linebacker.

Returning juniors are Scotty Walton, 142, at fullback and defensive back; Brent Skaggs, 174, at guard and defensive end; John Mart Stephens, 176, at tackle and defensive tackle; Noah Landa, 189, at tackle and defensive tackle; and Shane Caraway, 174, at tight end and linebacker.

Sophomores on the squad are Jeremy Sanders, 141, at quarterback and defensive back; Charlie Torrez, 136, at fullback and defensive back; Juan DeLaTorre, 152, at center and defensive end; and Don Mauney, 186, at guard and defensive tackle.

Freshmen this year include Nick

Guthery, 138, at quarterback and linebacker; Kevin Scitern, 105, at wingback and defensive back; Marco Herrera, 124, at tailback and defensive back; Nic Burleson, 178, at center and defensive tackle; Jason Warren, 124, at tackle and defensive back; Jason Rich, 128, at guard and defensive end; Chris Holland, 142, at guard and linebacker; Justin Snider, 146, at tight end and defensive end; Anthony Patel, 117, at quick end and defensive back; and Tom Bynum, 147, at quick end and linebacker.

Assistant coaches this season will be Mark Kyle, Dudley McCarty and Eddie Pettit.

Gorman looked pretty good in their scrimmage games with Millsap and Dublin. "We have an opportunity to be pretty good," said Coach

Allen. "We must have a quarterback to come through along with some key offensive linemen."

If the Panthers can come through at a few key replacement positions we look for them to give the district-favored Baird Bears another run for their money. However, there are several good teams this season in our district and the Big Red will really have to play some exceptionally fine football to take the top honors this season.

This will be Parents Night and all fans are asked to be at the stadium a little earlier than the usual time for the introduction of players and parents. Let's all come out and support the Panthers to victory on Friday night in their opener.

Clifford and Lurline Nelson Honored On Fiftieth Anniversary



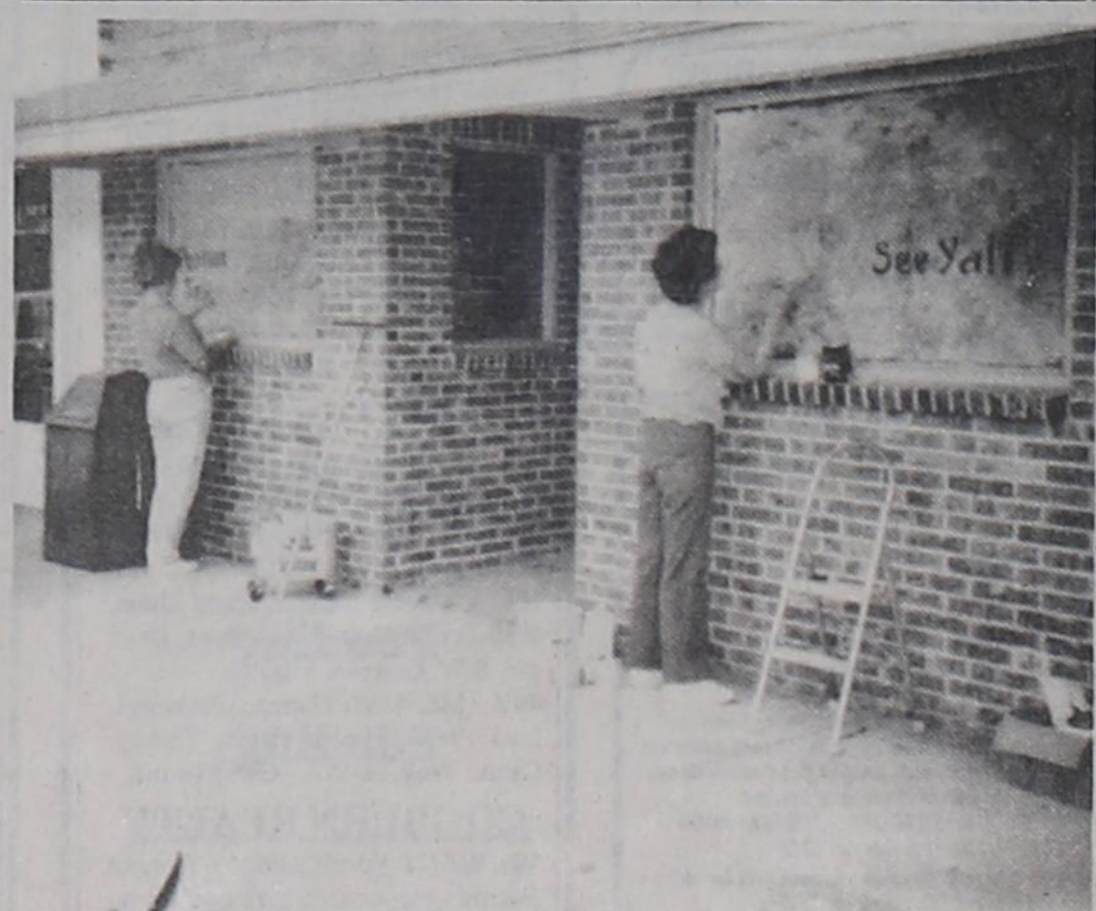

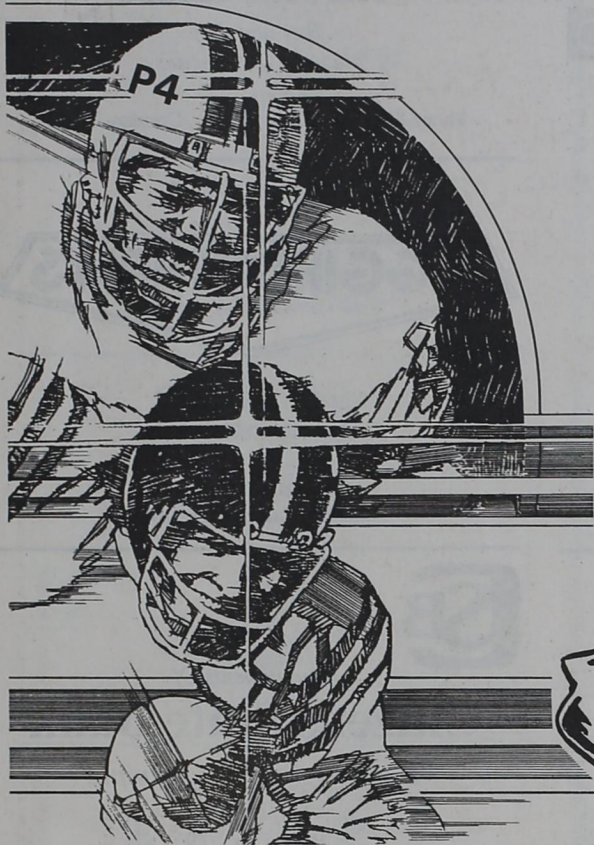

CONSERVATION SERVICE SAYS FARMING CHANGED

"Sometimes we do not notice a problem has disappeared until it reappears," says Ron Bailey of the Soil Conservation Service. Did you notice any blowing dust this spring or last spring? How many years has it been since you have seen a severe sand storm in the area? It used to be almost an annual occurrence.

"Adequate rainfall has helped," Bailey says, "but farmers are going a good job of managing their peanut land for wind erosion." Very seldom do you see peanuts harvested in the fall anymore without a cover crop of small grain being planted immediately following harvest to hold the soil in place until the next peanut crop is planted. "More farmers are also returning their peanut residue to the land following harvest than they did a few years ago," Bailey said.

Soil erosion came to the forefront when the U. S. Congress passed the "Food Security Act of 1985". The Act basically says that if you are farming highly erodible land and wish to participate in government sponsored commodity programs, then you must follow a conservation plan that keeps soil erosion within certain limits.

"Developing compliance plans to meet the provisions of the Food Security Act has not been a problem in Eastland County," Bailey said, "except for tremendously increasing our workload". "Most farmers in the county were already planting cover crops and following a good plan before the Food Security Act was passed," Bailey said.

Bailey said that five percent of the plans are spot checked each year to see if they are in compliance. "I do not foresee many farmers getting into trouble with conservation compliance except when land changes hands. The new operator might unknowingly violate the program so I suggest that if farmers pick up new land or wish to change their farming operation that they contact the Soil Conservation Service or the ASCS office to make sure their compliance plan is up-to-date before planting any commodity crops," Bailey said, "because non-compliance is serious business and a farmer could lose their program benefits."

The Soil Conservation Service is located in the Farm Bureau Building and the ASCS office is located in Pogue Industrial Park in Eastland.

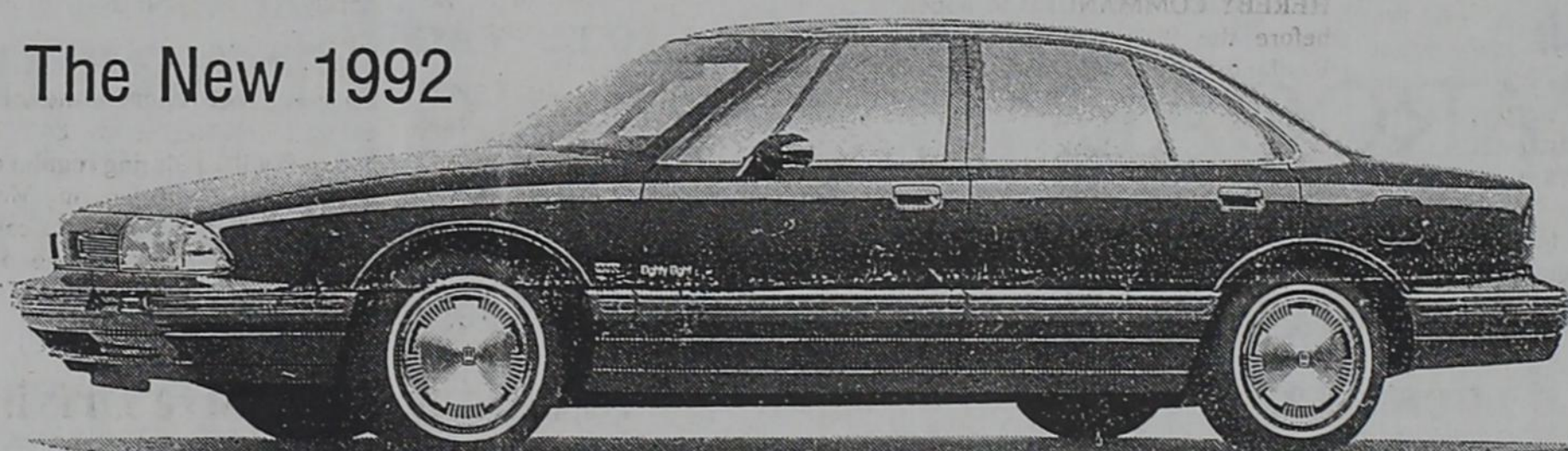

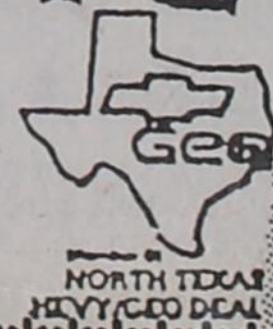
