Homeowners can reduce 1994 property taxes

Homeowners can reduce their property tax bills in 1994 by taking advantage of several exemptions available to them. Application forms are available at the Mitchell County Appraisal District office located at 12th and Hickory Streets.

Chief Appraiser Mike Burt informs homeowners that Texas law allows them to file a one-time application for home exemptions. These exemptions reduce the appraised value of the home.

Property owners who have never received exemptions on their homes in which they were living on Jan. 1, 1994, and those who became 65 or disabled during 1993, must apply this year to receive exemptions for 1994. Homeowners

must file signed, completed applications at the appraisal office by April 30.

A homeowner's principal residence and yard are considered the residence homestead. It can include up to 20 acres of land and improvements (buildings), such as a swimming pool, greenhouse or other structure, as long as the owner uses them for residential purposes.

Burt said that a property must meet four tests set by law to qualify for the residence homestead exemption. The person or persons claiming the exemption must own the property on Jan. 1; the property must be designed or adapted for human residence; the owner must

use the property as a residence; and the property must be the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the exemption.

A mobile home, even on leased land, can qualify for the exemption if it meets the four tests.

"A property owner can still qualify for the homestead exemption if part of the residence is rented out or used for other purposes, such as a home business," Burt said. "And the home will not lose its exemption if the owner moves away temporarily, so long as he or she intends to return and doesn't claim another homestead exemption elsewhere."

Texas law provides several types of exemptions for

homeowners. For school tax purposes, there is a \$5,000 general homestead exemption for all homeowners and an additional \$10,000 exemption for those 65 or older or disabled.

The school tax exemption for those 65 or older provides a special property tax "ceiling" for school taxes. While the market value of an elderly person's home may fluctuate with the market, the school taxes cannot increase above the tax amount in the first year that person qualified for the exemption.

The ceiling can increase, however, if the owner adds an improvement, other than normal maintenance or repair. When that happens, the new improvement is

taxed at its current market value and the current tax rates. The new rates are added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

If an elderly homeowner dies, the surviving spouse may apply to keep the tax ceiling if the spouse was at least 55 years of age when the older spouse died.

The ceiling does not apply to taxes levied by the county, city or other taxing units. An elderly homeowner who has not previously received the over-65 exemption must apply for it before April 30, Burt emphasized. To qualify, the homeowner must be 65 or older on Jan. 1, 1994.

Election turnout expected to be low

Early voting ended Friday for the April 12 runoff elections with 92 votes cast with the main interest state-wide in the race between Jim Mattox and Richard Fisher for the Democratic U. S. Senator's spot.

The winner of this race will face Republican Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison in November.

Other races on the Democratic ticket include Raul A. Gonzales and Rene Hass for Supreme Court Justice Place 1 while Gene Kelly and Betty Marshall will be on the ballot for Court of Criminal Appeals Judge Place 2.

On the Republican ticket, Patricia Lykos and Don Witting will be on the ballot for the Attorney General spot and Sam Bayless and Sharon Keller will compete for the Court of Criminal Appeals Judge Place 2.

Voters who cast ballots in the

March Democratic Primary may only vote in the Democratic runoff. Likewise, voters who voted on the Republican ticket can only vote in the Republican runoff races.

Any registered voter who did not vote in the March Primaries is eligible to vote in either party's runoff election.

Republican voters will cast their ballots at the Civic Center and Democrats will vote in the same place as they did in the Primary.

Voting places for Tuesday's Democratic runoff elections are as follows: Precinct 1, CISD School Administration Building; Precinct 2, Westbrook ISD School; Precinct 025, Oak Street Baptist Church Annex Building; Precinct 3, Mitchell County Courthouse; Precinct 4,

Senior Citizens Building; Precinct 046, Calvary Baptist Church Family Center (South Building).

TDCJ, local officials begin jail planning

Texas Department of Criminal Justice officials met Wednesday with several local officials and representatives of various utility companies to discuss the exact location of the planned 1,000-bed state jail to be built on land adjacent to the 80-John Wallace Unit.

The meeting was to discuss plans to maximize the use of the land the state owns to allow for future expansion.

As the construction schedule stands now, notice of bids will be given on Oct. 18 and bids would be received on Nov. 15. If these two schedules are met then a notice to proceed would be given on December 13 with a planned completion date of August 9, 1995.

Citizens excited about new programs

Mitchell County residents heard a report Wednesday from Mike Meehan of the Farmers Home Administration concerning an application process to get Mitchell County designated an Empowerment Zone (EZ) or an Enterprise Community (EC).

Three EZ's will be chosen and 30 EC's will be selected from applicants from throughout the United States and those communities chosen will receive big bucks. The EZ communities will receive \$40 million and the EC communities will receive \$3

million each. Committees are now being formed and input form every citizen in Mitchell County is wanted. Details on how to contact committee members will be released later.

Don Jones, who attended the initial meeting in the state on these programs, said "community involvement and community input is very, very important in the application process."

Among the areas to be considered includes health care, education, job creation - "just about every facet of the community," said Jones.

He also said if the application is not accepted this time it is important for future programs.

"I get excited because we can't lose."

The next scheduled meeting of the committees is set for Thursday, April 14 at 6 p.m. in the Medallion Room of Caprock Electric.

Junell says, "Write your Congressman"

Representative Rob Junell told a large crowd at a noon luncheon at the Wallace Center Thursday that "there is no way to predict what changes are in store from Washington, D. C. for the Congregate Meal Programs."

This is the program that provides 90% of the funds for the meals at the Wallace Center and the Lorraine Senior Citizen Center and they are in danger of being cut as the funds may be funnelled into President Clinton's health reform programs.

"Our best friend in Washington is Charles Stenholm and I urge each of you to contact him and Senator Bill Sims, the two U.S. Senators (Phil Gramm and Kay Bailey Hutchison) and the President and let them know that you do not want to lose these funds that provide a valuable service to the older citizens of Mitchell County."

Junell added that if the Federal government did not continue to fund the program then it would be very difficult for the state to pick up the slack.

"We will present a new budget in December and the administration has emphasized that it will be without any new taxes," Junell said. "Any shortfalls in the budget will be pared from ineffective programs now in place."

Junell said that Gov. Ann Richards was very supportive of the programs and would "help everyone fight to retain them." He added that he would be meeting with the Governor Thursday night (April 7) and he would certainly relay the feelings of Mitchell County to her.

"She is a big supporter of Mitchell County."

The Governor has been invited to the ribbon-cutting for the 80-John Wallace Unit on May 11 and Junell said Thursday that he expects Gov. Richards to attend. Her scheduling office in Austin said Thursday that "it is looking like her schedule will allow her to attend."

TxDOT gives report on future projects

Some forty people were in attendance at a meeting conducted by the Texas Department of Transportation here Thursday night to hear of the state's plans for highway improvements in and around Mitchell County.

Maribel Jaso, District Engineer of the Abilene District, conducted the meeting.

Among the improvements planned include converting what is known as the "landfill road" to a Farm-to-Market Road in 1996 and have it connect to Rogers Road. In 1995, add more lighting on the Interstate around Colorado City and

These and other questions will be answered at the seminar. Reservations can be made by contacting Kelley Jones in Sweetwater, (915) 235-4324. There is no cost for this program.

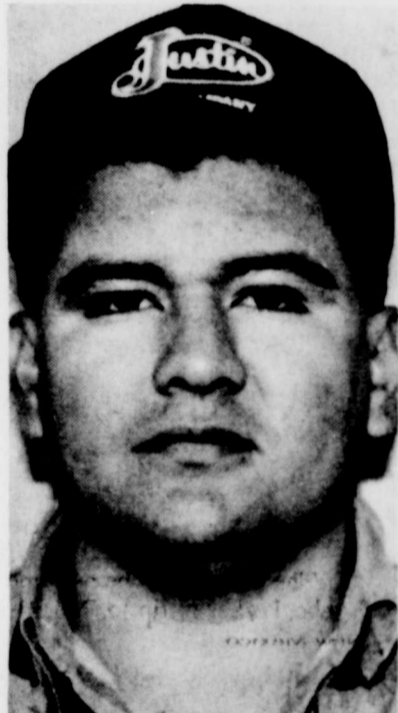

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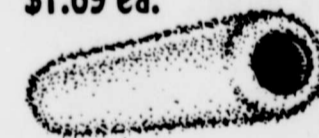
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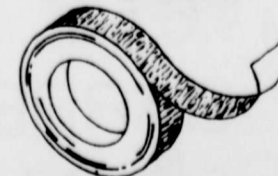

T.D.C. Engineering Inc. of Abilene has revealed plans to drill an 8,000-ft. new pool wildcat well in Mitchell County's Hettey Field. The operator has 289 acres leased, with drillsite in the H&TCRR Co. Survey A-1745. It has designated the venture as the No. 2 Wallace. Drillsite is one mile southeast of Loraine.

Two new pool wildcat wells are planned by T.D.C. Engineering Inc. of Abilene in Mitchell County's Hettey Field, about 15 miles southeast of Loraine. Chevron U.S.A. Inc. of Midland has revealed plans to drill a total of four wells in Mitchell County's Westbrook Field, five miles northwest of Westbrook. All four carry permit for 3,500-ft. tests. The wells will be known as the No. 5108, No. 5211, No. 5310 and No. 5409 North Westbrook Unit. The wells are located in a 7,979-acre lease in the T&PRR Co. Survey.

Dunigan Operating Co. has filed first production figures on a new wildcat well in Mitchell County. The No. 1 Strain showed potential to pump 57 barrels of oil per day. The operator has 320 acres leased, with drillsite in the J.W. Miller Survey A-1447, 16 miles northwest of Colorado City. Bottomed at 8,324 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Ellenburger Formation, 8,256 to 9,263 feet into the wellbore.



Cinco de Mayo story continues

(Editor's Note: This article is reprinted from The Austin Light.)

Pueble, Mexico (May 5, 1862)—A volunteer soldier from Texas today led Mexican Army troops in Mexico's greatest military victory. General Ignacio Zaragoza of Goliad, Texas (now United States) was commanding the troops defending the Mexican fortresses of Guadalupe and Loreto when they came under attack by 3 columns of invading French troops. The French were driven back three times and lost over 600 men in the afternoon battle.

Zaragoza was born at La Bahia del Espiritu Santo (now Goliad) in 1829, when it was still Mexican soil. Born in the fortress, son of a captain, Zaragoza excelled in the command of cavalry troops in battle. Texas Mexicans are known to be natural horsemen. He volunteered in the Mexican Army when he heard that the French were trying to gain control of the liberal government of President Benito Juarez. Zaragoza brought many other Tejanos and monetary contributions from Texas as well.

The famous battle began at noon when French General

Laurencez sounded the attack. Laurencez had boasted that "We are so superior to the Mexicans racially and militarily that I could take their forts with only 600 men." By 4:30 that afternoon, Laurencez retreated and left 600 behind.

Zaragoza first ordered the forts well defended by ground troops and cannon. After repelling the third attack by the 3,000 French troops, he ordered his cavalry to attack the rear and flanks of the attackers. After the battle, he was quoted as saying, "Our arms are covered with glory today."

In Mexico City, President Juarez was said to have been proud of the Texan in charge of his troops. He declared the day a national holiday in remembrance of the liberal principles for which his government has fought.

In Goliad and other towns in Texas, the victory represents the contributions of Texans of Mexican heritage to the republican form of government. The day will undoubtedly live on as a day of pride for generations to come. And Zaragoza's name will be commemorated by those people.

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Cattlemen warned of fine print

The Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas is warning cattle raisers to pay close attention to the fine print when signing new easement contracts with rural electric cooperatives. Jim Selman, ICA First Vice President, notes that many new contracts contain clauses or sections that could infringe on private property rights.

These new provisions are in response to requests from federal officials who have enlisted the aid of electric co-ops to gather archaeological, historical and biological information (particularly relating to endangered species). The co-ops are in a unique position to gather this data because their utility infrastructure covers a large portion of rural Texas, and because they have gained the trust of ranchers and farmers who rightly view the co-ops as being historically pro-agriculture.

Selman encourages his colleagues in the cattle and ranching business to protect themselves by reading proposed easement contracts carefully and cautiously, paying particularly close attention to any language that goes beyond the normal rights associated with electric construction or conveyance.

"Based on their good reputation, people won't look too hard at rural co-op contracts," Selman says. "But the co-ops are being pressured to infringe on private property rights, and rural people need to alert themselves and look out for their own interests."

Billy Bob Low is an ICA board member who ranches near Gonzales. His family was asked to sign an easement contract to facilitate relocation of some power lines. The proposed contract contained a section that gave the electric co-op the right to conduct "archaeological, historical, environmental or other studies" on the property covered by the easement. In addition, Low was concerned about a provision that authorized the co-op to clear brush or other unwanted vegetation with chemical herbicides.

Low was worried that the blanket authorization for environmental, historical or archaeological studies could dramatically affect his property rights in the future,

particularly if a significant cultural find was made on his land or an endangered species habitat was discovered. Similarly, Low was apprehensive about the possible negative impact on his cattle and land from the co-op's unrestricted use of chemical herbicides within the easement area.

After expressing his strong objections to these provisions, the co-op agreed to remove them from the contract and the easement was granted without any infringement on Low's property rights.

"I told them I wouldn't sign the contract with those provisions,"

Low says, "and the co-op took them out immediately without argument or fuss."

ICA supports a strong and healthy working relationship between electric cooperatives, which have done much to improve the quality of life in rural Texas, and the thousands of Texans who make their livings through ranching and farming. However, ICA urges rural property owners to be wary of new easement contracts that contain potentially harmful sections and encourages its members to work with the co-ops to renegotiate the contracts so their rights are protected.

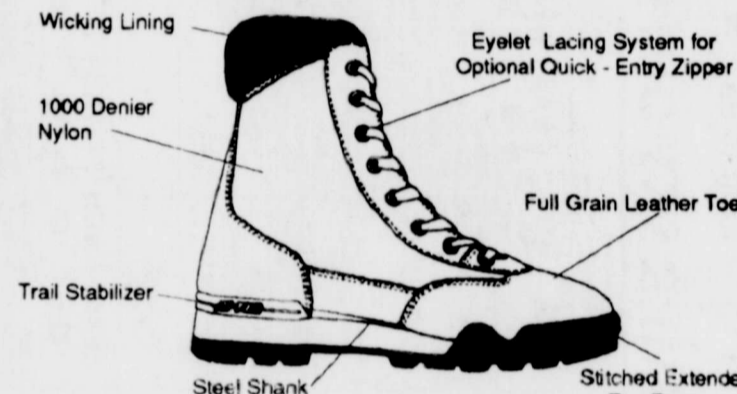

Texas Education Agency moves to resolve disputes

A new mediation process designed by the Texas Education Agency to more quickly resolve disputes between school districts and parents over special education services has saved the state, local school districts and taxpayers an estimated \$5 million, according to an Agency analysis.

The program, launched in August 1992, aims to reduce the amount of time and money spent resolving special education disputes and encourage positive, cooperative relationships among school districts and parents of students with disabilities. Rather than attempting to resolve the disputes through formal legal proceedings, mediation relies on an informal process during which an impartial mediator

attempts to help the parties involved in the dispute reach a mutually agreeable solution.

While the Agency has been offering mediation services for the last eight years, the increasing number of requests for formal special education hearings has prevented the Agency from conducting mediation in a timely manner. To better handle mediation requests, the Agency hired eight individuals on a contract basis to serve as mediators to implement the new program.

During the 1989-90 school year, the Agency received 72 requests for special education hearings, and in 1990-91, that number nearly doubled to 130. Such hearings are costly because they are formal legal proceedings during which parents and school districts are usually represented by attorneys. In addition, federal regulations governing special education require the Agency to contract with independent hearing examiners to administer the hearings, instead of assigning the cases to Agency hearing examiners. A single hearing costs approximately \$6,000 to \$8,000 for the Agency and approximately \$60,000 for a school district, after attorneys' fees and employee time are considered.

By contrast, a dispute handled by mediation costs the Agency only about \$1,000, and is provided at no cost to either party in the dispute. Mediation also is provided on-site, usually within the district at a mutually agreeable location, so travel expenses are incurred only by the mediator. Whereas disputes addressed through the formal hearing process can take 45 days or more for resolution, mediation can resolve a dispute on the same day as the mediation session and only several days after the mediation session request.

Although mediation can be a less grueling and costly process than a formal hearing, the Agency cannot require either party in a special education dispute to use mediation. When attempting to have their dispute mediated, parents do not lose the right to have a formal hearing on the dispute. But

the mediation process can be much quicker and can save the participants thousands of dollars in legal representation fees. Although mediation does not require either party to be represented by attorneys, either side may have attorneys present during a mediation session.

The eight mediators hired by the Agency have extensive experience in mediating disputes and each mediator participated in a four-day mediation training session focusing on special education issues. Training for the mediators was provided by the Justice Center of Atlanta, Inc., a nonprofit agency based in Atlanta, Georgia.

MEDIATION PROCESS

When the Agency's Office of Legal Services receives a request for a hearing to resolve a special education dispute, a copy of the request is sent to the Complaints Unit, which in turn contacts both parties to inform them that mediation is available. If both

parties agree to mediation, the case is assigned to a mediator, who arranges and schedules a mediation session at a time and place agreeable to both parties.

The mediation session is confidential. There are no formal minutes taken, nor is the mediation session taped. The parties involved in the dispute—not the mediator—are responsible for resolving the matter. The mediator's role is to help the parties arrive at resolution.

Each party in the mediation process is allowed the opportunity to make an uninterrupted opening statement. After both sides have presented their concerns, the mediator meets with each side separately in what is called a "caucus" in order to explore alternatives and points of agreement between the two parties. If a mutually agreeable solution is determined, an agreement outlining the resolution and each party's role in it is developed and signed by

the parties. Both parties are given a copy of the agreement, which also is sent to the Agency and maintained for record-keeping purposes.

During the 1992-93 fiscal year, which ended last August 31, the Agency received 270 mediation referrals and conducted 116 mediation sessions. Settlements were agreed to in 100 of those cases, meaning that 86 percent of the mediation sessions resulted in resolution of the disputes. Agency officials estimate that the 100 settlements saved the Agency and local school districts more than \$5 million in attorneys' fees and related expenses.
