Shivers Barely Leads in Governor Race

There will be a run-off in the Governor's race between Ralph Yarbrough and Gov. Allen Shivers, who is seeking a third term. At the last count Shivers was leading Yarbrough by approximately 23,000 votes.

In Mitchell county the only county-wide run-off necessary is in the race for tax assessor-collector. In that race Tom Glover led incumbent Martin Dobbs 1264 to 1100. In the primary, Mann received 317 votes and Combs 310. The run-off primary will be held August 28.

In the race for commissioner of precinct 1, Sam Thompson led incumbent Jim Bodine 801 to 777. Vardy, the third candidate, received 412 votes.

In the race for State Representative L. L. Armer defeated Cecil Lotief in the three county district to retain his place in the legislature. The vote was 5,134 for Armer and 4,032 for Lotief.

In his bid for re-election as district attorney, Eldon Mahon defeated Jim Pearson 4347 to 2857. In Mitchell County Mahon had 2095 to 887 for Pearson and in Nolan County the vote was Mahon, 2242 and Pearson 1970.

Incumbent Sam Bullock defeated Vance Dickenson of Loraine 1706 to 1286 in his bid for a fourth term.

Voters of the county retained Dick Gregory sheriff. Gregory polled 1749 votes and his opponent, Kyle Hardegree, 1239.

In the three-man race for the office of county superintendent, incumbent Roy Davis Coles outdistanced his two opponents, Matt Graham and Olson Sweat and will hold the office another four years. The votes was 1569 for Coles, 631 for Graham and 785 for Sweat.

Mose Allen was retained as constable of precinct 1, getting 1151 votes to 457 for Lewis and 300 for Grissom.

Bennett Blair defeated Bob Horton 411 to 210. Loraine gave Horton 191, Landers 8 and absentee 11; Blair 394 in Loraine, 4 at Landers and 13 absentees.

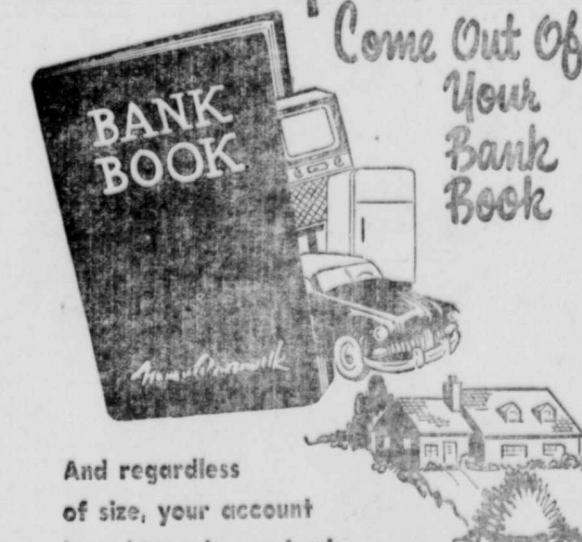
