Rebels Burn Tigers 41-0

The Rivercrest Rebels took advantage of a confused Mount Vernon defense and unskilled offense to burn the Tigers 41-0 at Rebel Stadium Friday night. Defensively the Rebels were again awesome, holding the Tigers to only 43 yards on the ground and 36 yards in the air.

Against Mount Vernon, the Rebel offense was just as awesome as the defense, breaking the 400 yard marker to accumulate 401 net yards rushing.

The Rebels made their breaks and capitalized on them, intercepting two

passes that led to touchdowns and recovering one fumble.

There was little in the first quarter to indicate that the Rebels would secure such a decisive victory over the Tigers, as the Rebels took the kickoff and James Strickland ran 63 yards to the Mount Vernon 21. Deep in Tiger territory, the Rebels were unable to score on this first penetration, and let the ball go over on downs to the Tigers.

Strickland was again the subject of Rebel cheers when he made a high, beautiful 46

yard punt to the Tigers on their own three yard line. Four plays later the Rebels were in possession at their own 43, and after a 33 yard scamper by leading rusher Billy Froelich, Jimmy Via scored from the three yard line. Via's extra point kick was not good.

The first rattle of the second quarter belonged to Froelich again, when he cleared left end and ran 57 yards for the second Rebel TD. The extra point run failed.

Three plays after the Tiger kickoff, Via intercepted a pass at the Mount Vernon 40

yard line and returned it to the Tiger 30. It was Via again, three downs later, on a pitch out from Dale Jean, who went into the right corner for the third Rebel TD.

When the next Mount Vernon drive died on the Rivercrest 45 yard line, Jean, behind the blocking of center Keith House, broke through the center of the line on a 27 yard effort to put the ball on the Mount Vernon 26 yard line.

Via again went in for the TD from 15 yards out, and then made the first two point conversion of the game.

The Rebels allowed the Tigers a first down at the beginning of the third quarter, and began their fifth touchdown drive at their own 33 yard line. Jerry Merchant sparked the drive with a 15 yard run, followed by a 24 yard effort by Via. Via made his fourth touchdown of the game from the nine yard line, and Merchant carried across the center for the two point conversion.

An interception by Gregg Norman gave the Rebels possession again before the end of the third quarter, and Rivercrest started their sixth touchdown drive from their own 31 yard line. Froelich almost made this last touchdown, going across the middle to the two, then Merchant pushed to the one and David Birchfield scored. Via's extra point kick was good.

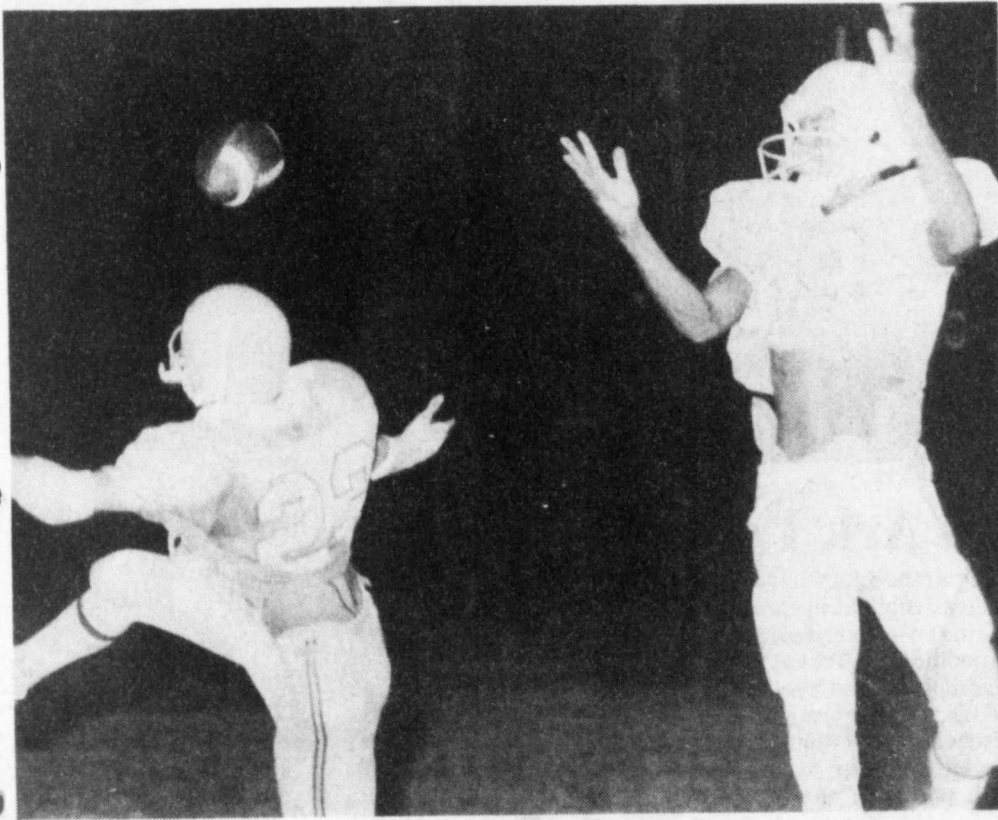
Four plays after the kickoff the Rebels were in possession again, with James Strickland the quarterback. Merchant retained his fullback slot, and Bubba Edge and Birchfield were in as halfbacks. Strickland crossed the goal from the Mount Vernon 11 yard line, but the TD was called back on a penalty for illegal motion by the Rebels.

With the point made that the Rebel backup team could score against the Tigers, Rivercrest let the time on the clock run out.

Two Rebels cross the 100 yard mark in the yards rushing department, Via with 109 and Billy Froelich with 152. Jean was close with 70 yards and Merchant had 60 yards to his credit.

The Rebels will play Queen City at Rebel Stadium at 7:45 p.m. Friday, Oct. 19 for the first game of District 20A.

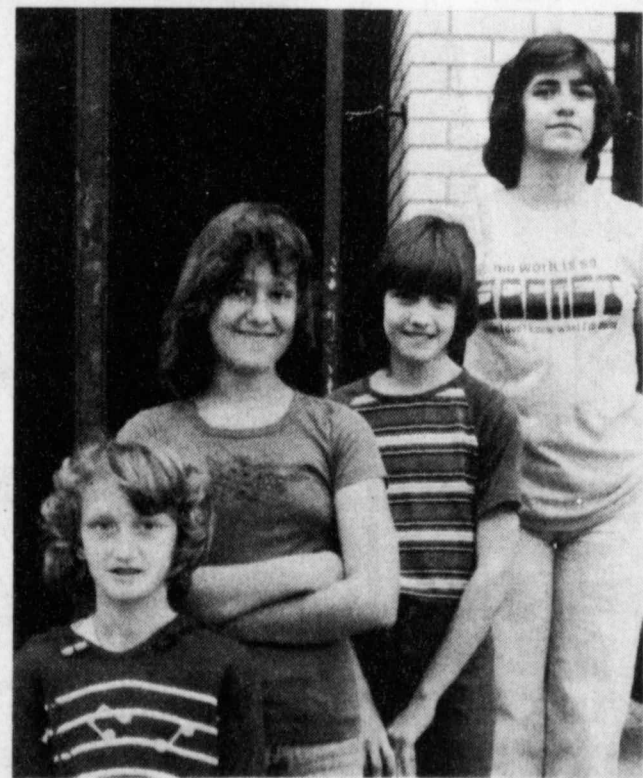
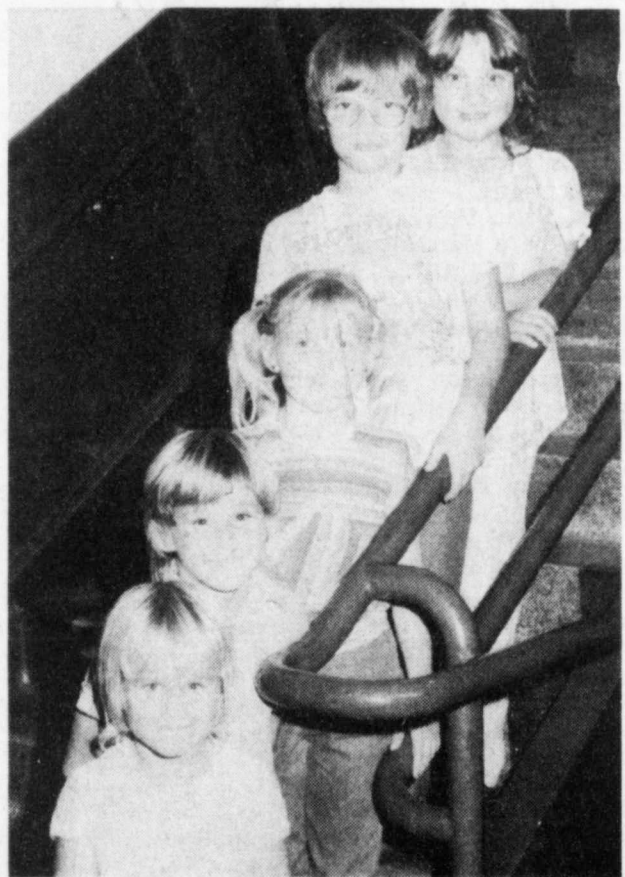

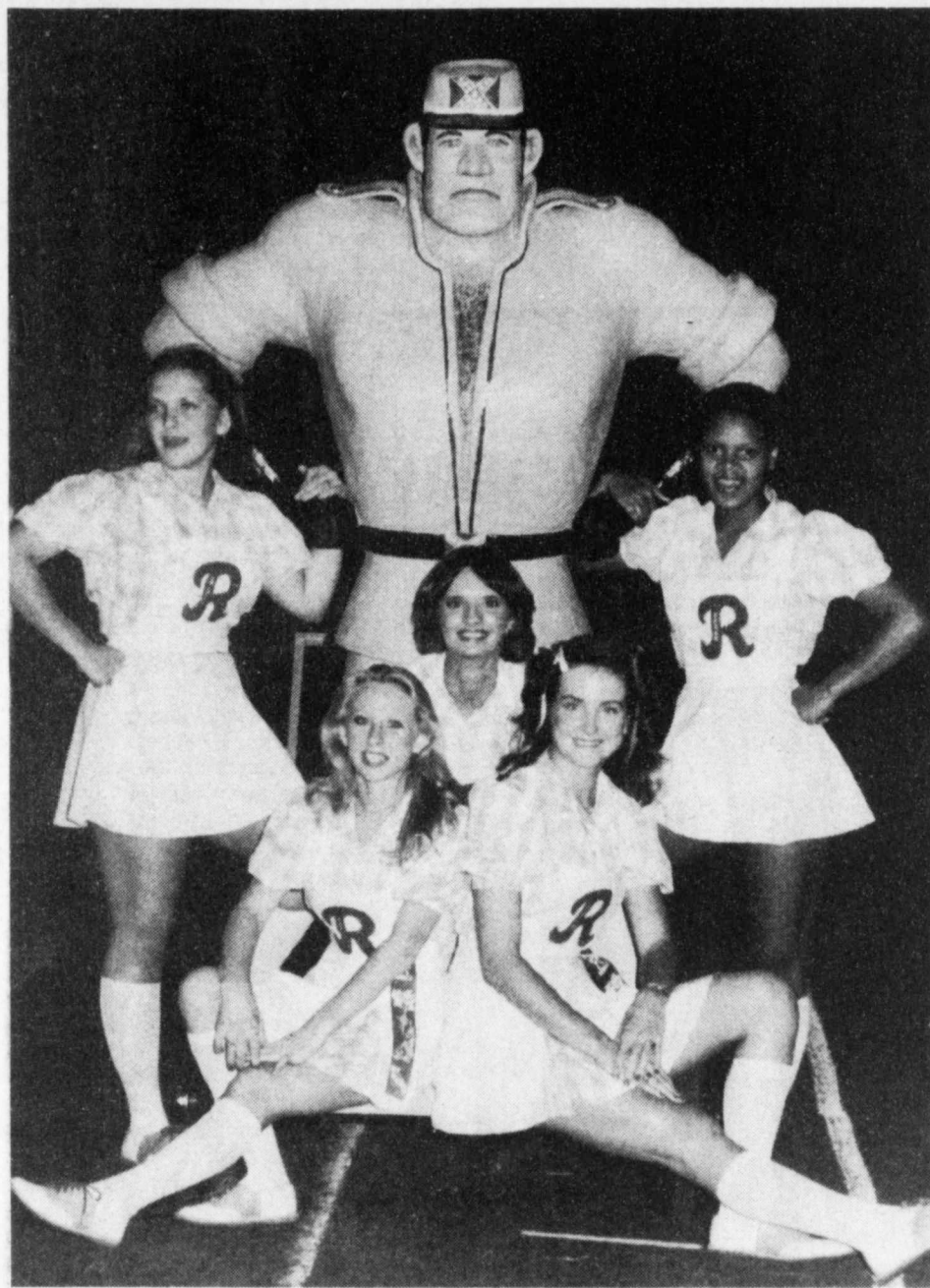

Board Studies Reading Program

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, October 2, 1979 at 7:30 p.m. with six of the seven

members present. A presentation was made to the Board about the various Reading Programs under study and-or being presently used in the Talco-Bogata

Schools. Jeannie Caraway, Region 8 Reading Director, along with two of the district's elementary teachers, made the presentation. The elementary teachers, Fredrika Hudson and Rosie Hale, were approved to attend a workshop related to one of the Reading Programs. Region 8 will sponsor one of the teachers with the local district paying the expenses of the other one.

Donna McBrayer, Cooperative Curriculum Director for the school district, also met with the Board to review her various duties and responsibilities. Mrs. McBrayer is working under a new program approved by the 66th Legislature whereby schools with less than 1,000 students qualify for .6 of a personnel unit which may be combined with another school district for the employment of personnel. 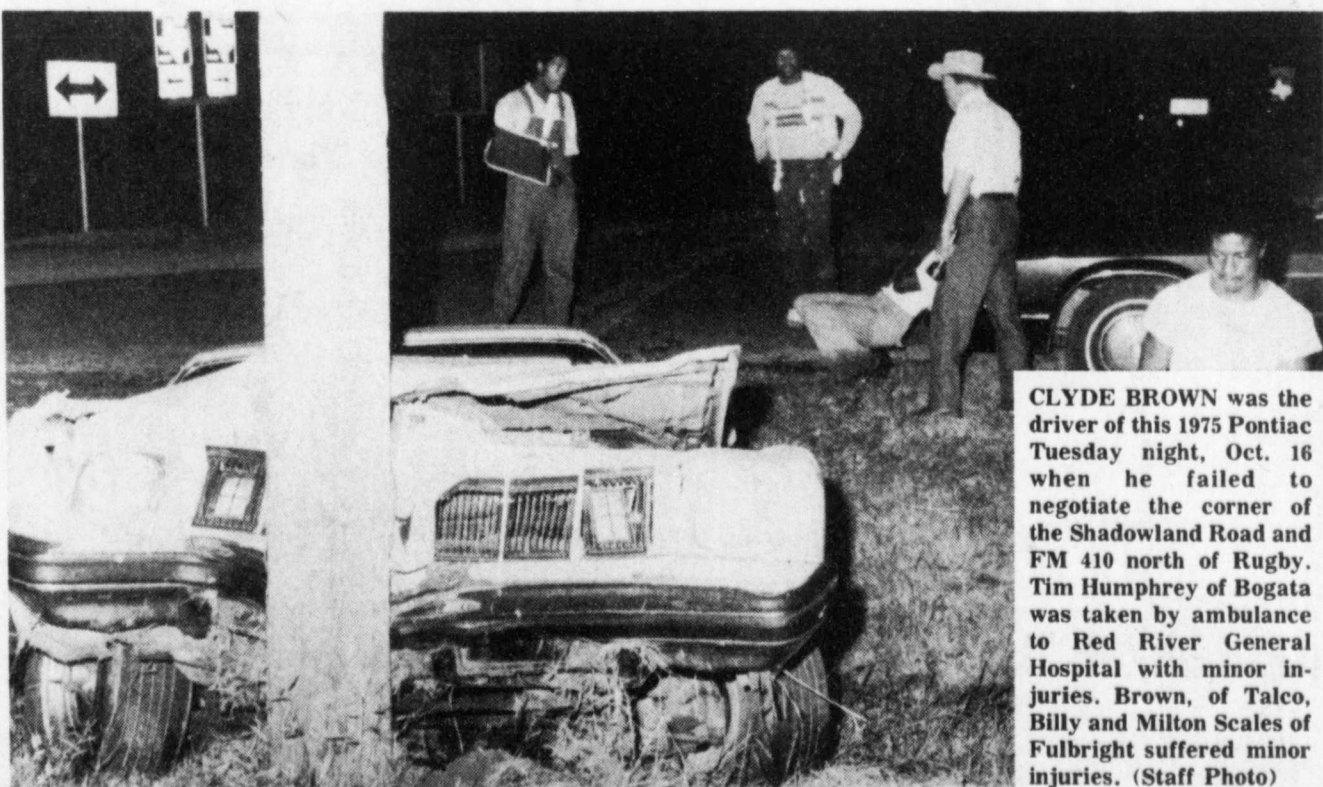
Senior Citizens may price the articles as each individual wishes, they need not be present during the sale but may be if they wish, and all proceeds received by sale will be paid to those entering the articles.

Guaranty Bancshares Receives Okay

The application of Guaranty Bancshares, Inc. to become a bank holding company has been approved by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System

according to Bill G. Jones, Chairman of the Board of Guaranty Bond State Bank in Mount Pleasant.

The approval by the Federal Reserve authorizes the acquisition of Guaranty Bond State Bank in Mount Pleasant and Talco State Bank in Talco by the new holding company.

"The two banks have been closely affiliated by common ownership and management for over 65 years," Mr. Jones said, "and no change in management or personnel is expected. The two banks will

continue to be dedicated to sound banking practices and to be responsive to the convenience and needs of the communities they serve.

Establishment of the holding company will provide bank management with greater flexibility in responding to the changing and increasing financial needs of the customers of the two banks. The holding company will also be able to consolidate its resources as needed to increase lending ability to serve their communities.

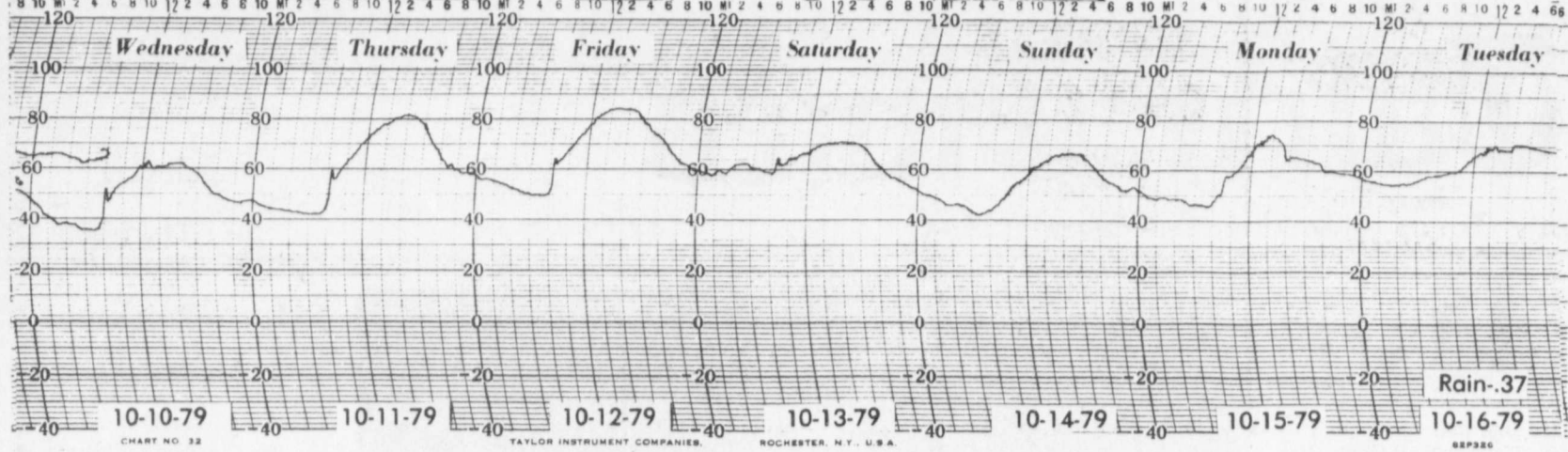
Jones stressed that the management of both banks will continue to be deeply concerned with the public interest and civic endeavors in their respective communities.

The Talco State Bank was organized in 1913 by some of the principal stockholders of Guaranty Bond State Bank. In 1945, Felix Jones, father of Jerry and Bill Jones, became president and major stockholder of Talco State Bank. The bank has been managed by members of the Jones family since that time.

Weather Recorded In Deport, Texas During Past Seven Days



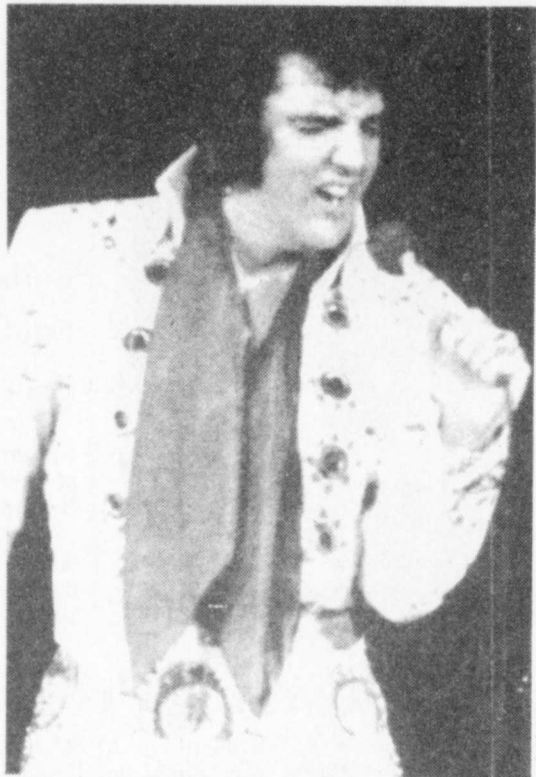

Films Of Noah's Ark To Be Shown

Exclusive slide films of Noah's Ark and the Tower of Babel will be shown free at Clarksville Intermediate School, Saturday, Oct. 20, from 1:30 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. by Holy Ground Mission of Frankston, Texas.
Holy Ground Mission, using archaeology to restore ancient Biblical events, has mounted archaeological expeditions to Turkey every summer for the past seven years. Their recent re-discovery of Noah's Ark made headlines worldwide with photos of the Ark appearing in the recent motion picture "In Search of Noah's Ark." After viewing this film and seeing the photos of Noah's Ark, Billy Graham said that it was one of the best films he had ever seen.

"We not only have the finest slides taken of the real Tower of Babel and the city of Babel in Southern Turkey but have conclusive historical evidence that the book of Genesis 10 and 11 is totally true," said Tom Crotser, director of Holy Ground Mission's Institute for Restoring Ancient History. Crotser said that the meeting is free and open to the public. "Also, we invite scholars, ministers of all faiths and college professors who might desire to look more deeply into the archaeological finds and their significance, which will also include slides of Noah's Ark," he added.

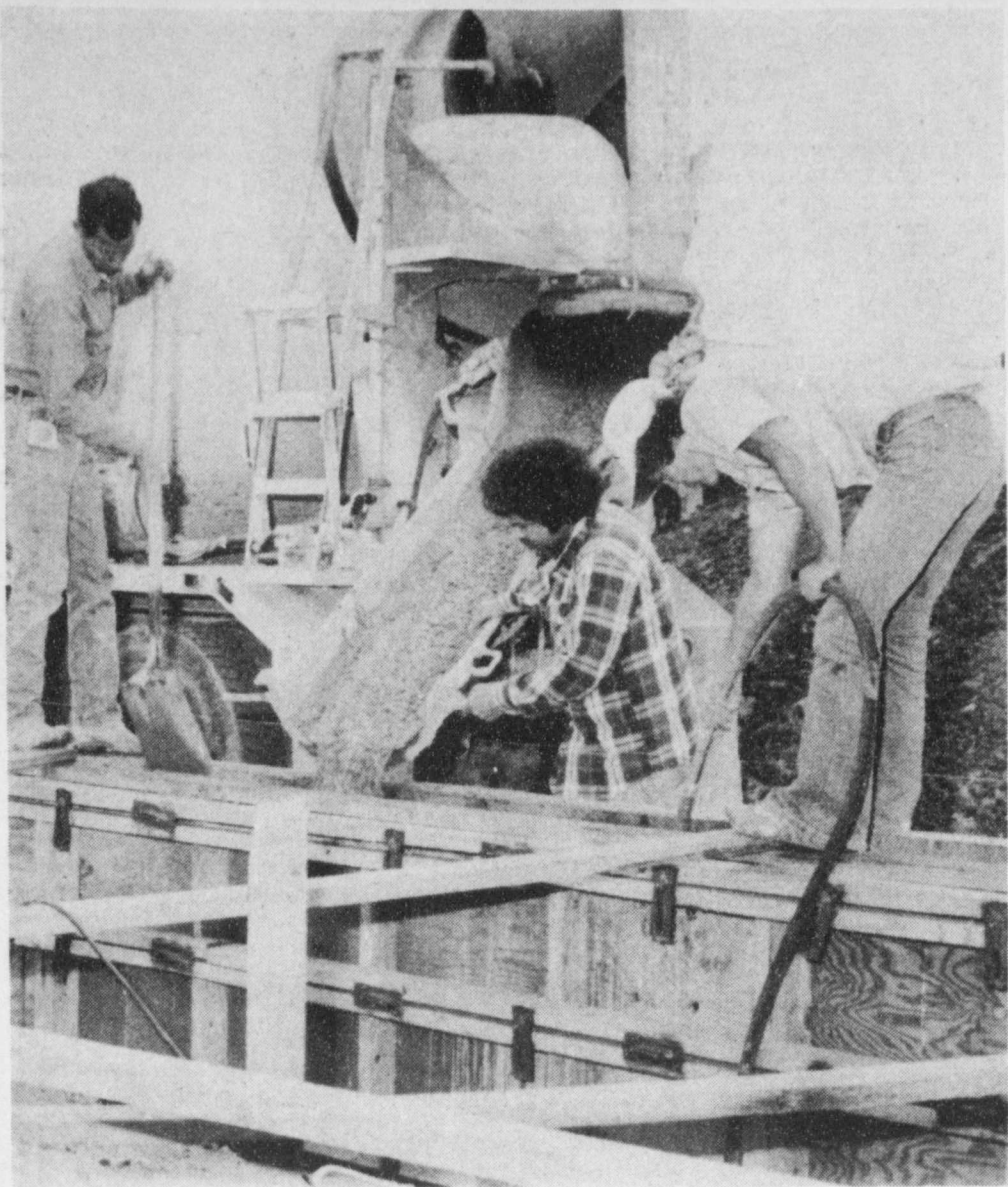

Firearm Safety Should Be Observed

Once again, during this fall and winter season, more than 20 million Americans will take to the open country to enjoy the ancient sport of hunting.

"More than 14 million Americans buy hunting licenses every year. With more hunters afield, the chance of accidents is even greater," said Gawain Bonner, vice president for the Recreational Safety Section of Texas Safety Association.

More than 1,000 persons are killed in the field every year. Studies of the causes of hunting accidents show that most accidents can be avoided.

Knowledge of gun safety begins with a study of how they operate. The majority of shooting accidents in the hunting field happen at short range. All guns-from the BB on up-must be used with the same principles of safety that apply to the most powerful.

A true sportsman follows the 10 Rules of Gun Safety, they are:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.

2. Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded. Unattended guns should always be unloaded.

3. Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions.

4. Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble. Keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger.

6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot.

7. Wear a safe color. The best is daylight fluorescent orange.

8. Never climb a tree or a fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun.

9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or at the surface of water.

10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

"The true sportsman gladly teaches the younger generation the responsibilities of gun ownership. He cooperates with all wildlife and law enforcement agencies. He respects the rights of property owners. And, most importantly, he is far less likely to become just another statistic by the end of the hunting season," Bonner commented.

Texas Safety Association urges all hunters to recognize the responsibility of safe handling of firearms.

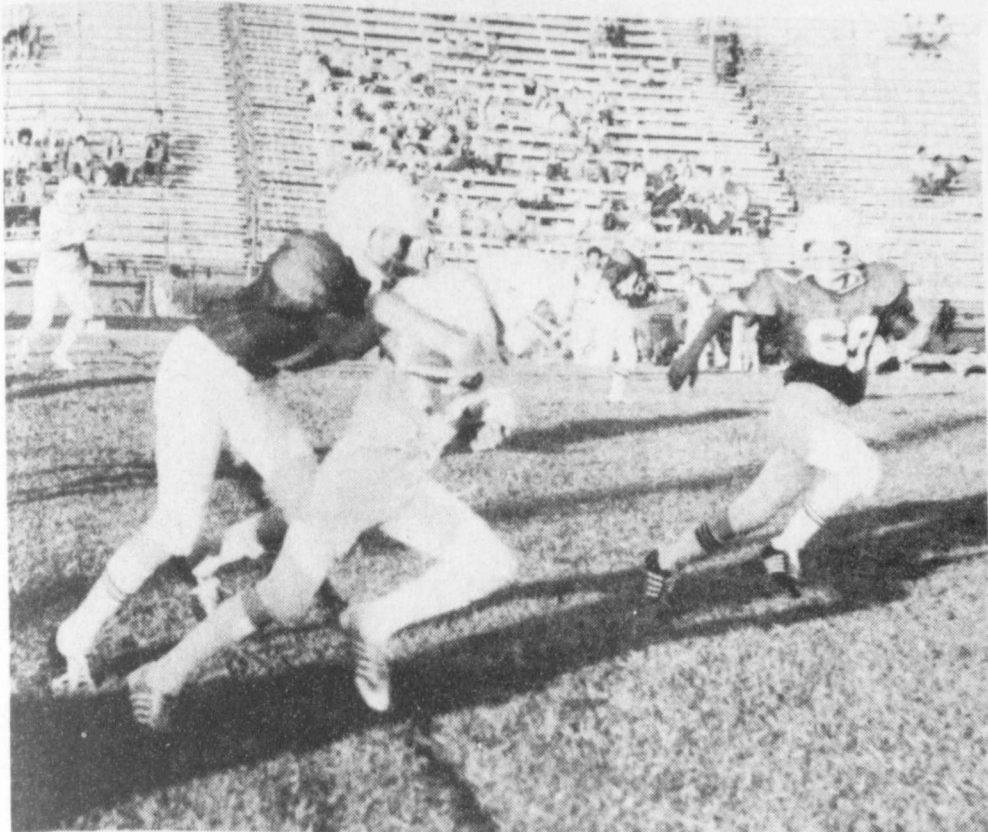

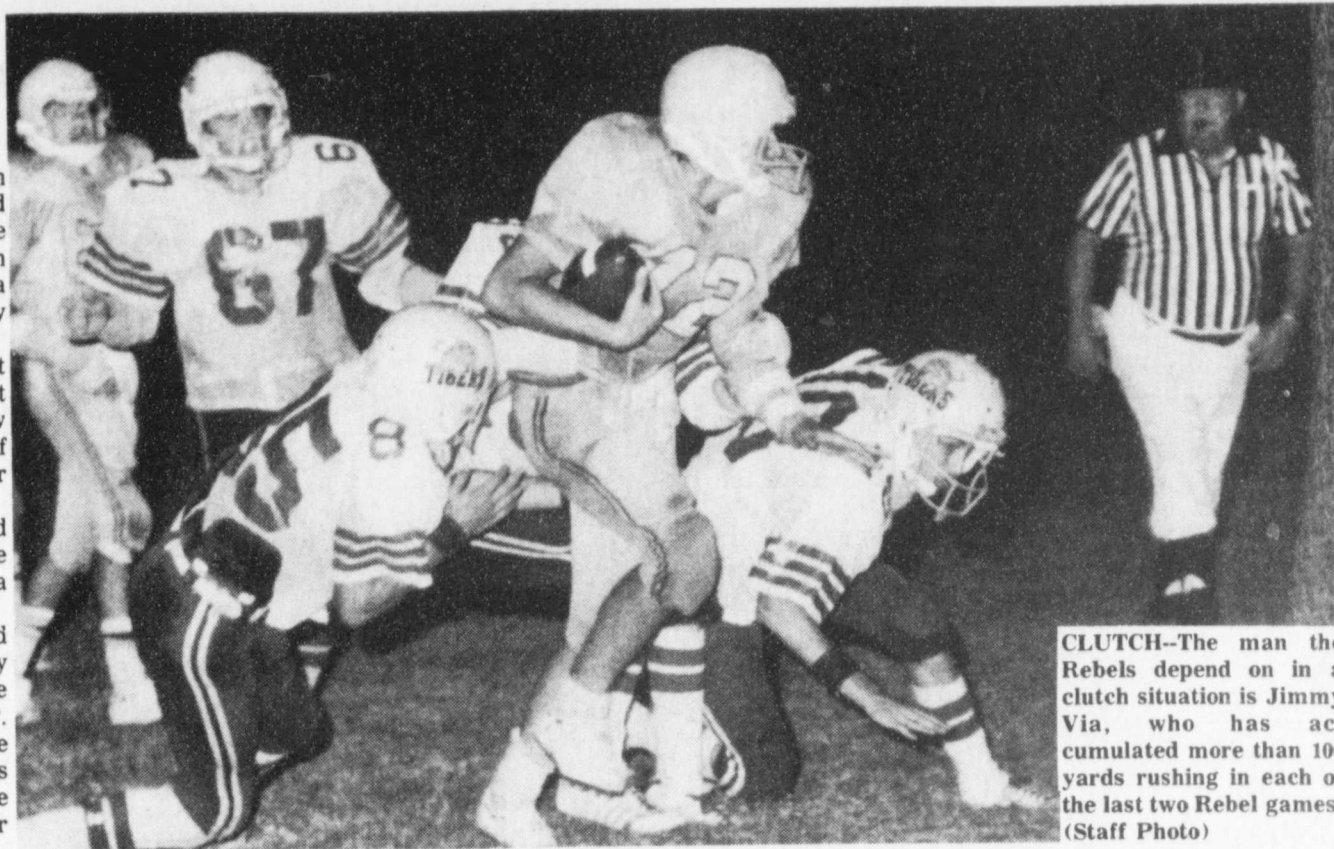

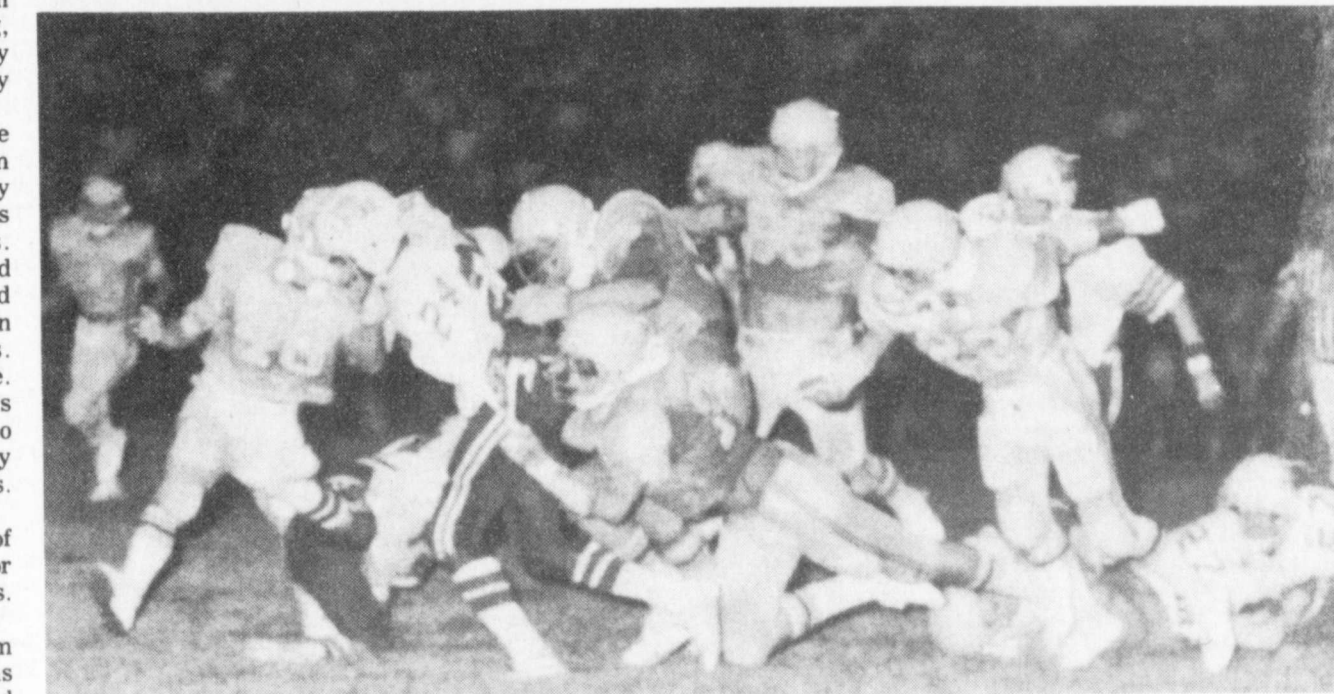

East Texas Eating

By Margie Rice

The pumpkins are ripening! And, are they good!

If you are of the generation that hasn't the faintest idea of what to do with a fresh pumpkin, read on.

Select a firm, small to medium size "pie" pumpkin. Wash and dry it. Cut the pumpkin in half, remove the seeds and membrane, and place cut sides down on a baking sheet or in a shallow pan. Bake in a 325 degree oven for 45 minutes or until the halves sort of collapse and are tender to the puncture of a fork. Remove the pumpkin from the oven and scoop the cooked flesh from the shell. Put the pumpkin through a sieve to remove the stringy membrane. A five pound pumpkin will yield around four and one-half cups of nice smooth cooked pumpkin. Cooked pumpkin may be safely kept in the refrigerator for four or five days.

Pumpkin freezes beautifully. Simply fill moisture-proof containers to one-half inch from the top with the cooked, sieved pumpkin and freeze. I freeze some in pint containers for pies, some in 1 cup containers for Pumpkin Bread, and some in 1/2 cup containers for Pumpkin Muffins. In other matters, the Board continued to discuss the district's involvement in the Red River County Tax Appraisal District. The Appraisal District will be made up of a five-member board to be elected by the various tax bodies in the county with the number of votes to be determined by the amount of taxes assessed by each tax body. This five-member board will take office beginning January, 1980 and will get under way with their various duties and responsibilities leading toward full implementation of the Appraisal Board by January, 1982.

Board approval was given to a Title 1 Complaint Procedure, the Preliminary Application for Foundation School Funds, the various financial reports, and to renewing a contract with the firm of McCreary & Huey for the collection of delinquent school taxes.

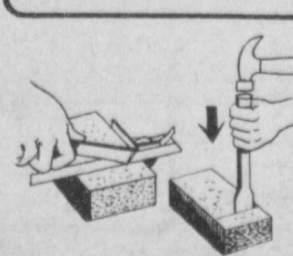

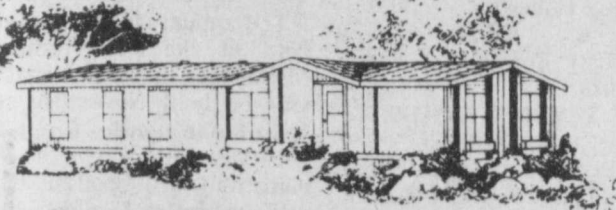

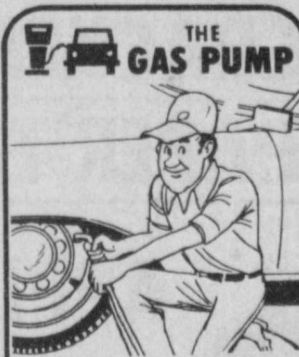

Gardening Made Easy

While daffodils are the earliest and most permanent of the spring bulbs, it's generally the tulips that follow a few days to weeks later that cause the most excitement. Tulips without a doubt are the most flamboyant color you can add to the yard in late March to early April. They bridge the gap between daffs and azaleas - most years overlapping at both ends of the season. Thallia narcissus (lovely white, orchid-like clusters) are late and come off perfectly with Red Apeldoorn tulips and dark blue Berna pansies in March. An April combination that is a favorite of mine matches Geo. Tabor azaleas (soft pink, white and rose) with Sweet Harmony tulip (soft lemon yellow and white) with Johnny-jump-ups in blue and violet or sky blue forget-me-nots. If you know which plants bloom together, there is no end to the combinations that you can come up with each spring. Some years mother nature scrambles the seasons a little and the unexpected happens, but most years I can depend on a certain succession of blooms from the same plants each season. If this gardening is new to you, try an assortment the first season (be sure to get the names down so you can identify the varieties when in bloom) and add to your favorites the next fall.

While I have tulips in the yard that have returned for more than 10 years, it is a good idea to plan on adding new ones each season. The cost is about the same as a bedding plant and even a dozen makes a good show

when grouped by the front door, light post or patio corner. Add a dozen pansies in the same spot and from November to February you'll have a smattering of bloom - March to June a gush of color for only about five to six dollars. Almost any color combination is possible, just remember that the soil must drain well, be soft (add peatmoss) and have at least half a day sun for both to do well. Be sure to use a good bulb food when you plant and again as the leaves push out of the ground in March. Either mix under the bulbs or do as I usually do, scatter after planting. There will be plenty of winter rain to wash it in. This feeding is the most important part of keeping the bulbs big enough to bloom each year. Never cut the leaves until they have died naturally - those leaves make next year's bloom! Bonemeal used to be the recommended food but not any more. All experts agree that bulb food contains twice to three times the available phosphorous (rendering plants are now too efficient and there is nothing left in the bones and the resulting meal). Tulips need to be as dry as possible in summer to keep from rotting. Digging in summer is the best way to keep them over, or just add some new ones each year.

Cut Bricks
