Dallas Times-Herald Tells About Cisco

Cisco Daily Press today received a copy of the Dallas Times-Herald of May 26, which contained a well-written article that sets forth the many unusual advantages of Cisco as a recreation spot.

The writer, Bruce Cunningham, who with Mrs. Cunningham has visited Cisco on many occasions, touched on many phases of Cisco life that should be interesting to Dallasites and others in search of the "right spot" to spend their vacations in thoroughly enjoyable, healthful manner.

As clipped from Times-Herald, the article reads:

REAL RECREATION SPOT.

By Bruce Cunningham.

Cisco, Tex., boasts a diversified program of recreation tailor-made for play-hungry Dallasites, from the tired business executive craving a relaxing two days of fishing to papa and mama and the kids, who will find Cisco wearing well as a family vacation spot.

A friendly city 135 miles west of Dallas and within easy reach by automobile over Federal Hwy. 80 through Fort Worth, Weatherford, Thurbur, Ranger and Eastland, most of Cisco's recreational facilities are concentrated in the Lake Cisco area, just a skip and a jump from the business section. For instance, the vacationist can step out of his hotel lobby, drive less than three miles over an all-weather road, get in a boat and be fishing for the big ones in 20 minutes.

Front-Yard Sports.

The same applies to golfing, boating, hunting, swimming, picnicking, dancing, roller skating, hiking and nature study, or just idling in the sun or shade. These facilities are practically in the front yard of the vacationist if he chooses one of 12 rock cabins or the rock lodge, all furnished with gas and overlooking the lake. (Editor's Note: Lights, too, Mr. Cunningham?) Nearby gas and oil production is one thing that makes Cisco prosperous and the lake and other recreational advantages available.

For relief from outdoor activity, Cisco boasts a four-lane bowling alley meeting American Bowling Congress specifications. It is in the center of the business section downtown. Visiting keggers will find tough competition among the local dealers in strikes and spares, for Ciscoites take their bowling seriously.

For Swimming.

Cisco has invested nearly \$200,000 to provide recreational facilities immediately below Lake Cisco dam. These facilities are centered around two connected swimming pools—one shallow, one deep—with a combined length of 800 feet and width varying from 200 to 300 feet; and separating the two pools is a sand island for sun bathing or day drowsing under the shade of cottonwood trees. There is a pool for youngsters as large as the average natatorium.

The layout is set in the midst of a wooded canyon across which the big dam lifts 125 feet and flanks United States Highway 283 which crosses the dam on a concrete-steel bridge more than a quarter-mile long; on one side of the dam is the lake with its deep, blue water, and on the other side are the swimming pools, pavilion, free municipal parks and the state

fish hatchery, a source of interest to visitors.

The big pavilion near the swimming pools contains dressing rooms for men, women and children, with suit and towel service, showers and other conveniences. Upstairs are the dance hall and skating rink.

Large Picnic Grounds.

Picnicking in the 11 acres of city parks is free, with utilities and barbecue pits furnished. The 12 rock cabins and stone lodge are maintained by the city for rent to visitors. Tourists unable to obtain cottages or space in the lodge will suffer little, if any, inconvenience because they can stop at the Laguna, Daniels or Mobley Hotels in Cisco and drive to and from the lake in a few minutes.

The golf course of the Cisco Country Club—a nine-hole layout with excellent grass greens—is situated on the south shore of the lake just beyond the country club building.

Air-minded vacationists will find an all-weather Class No. 2 port at Cisco. It is located between the city and the lake, and has an excellent turf runway. Joe Coulter is manager.

A Real Fisherman.

Superintendent of city cabins and in charge of hunting and fishing privileges is Ray Judia, who may be addressed at Cisco, Judia, a whale of a fisherman, gets a wallop out of telling Cisco visitors where the big ones are being caught; he never tires of fishing, and the angler who has Judia in his party is fortunate indeed. He is also an accomplished musician, and when not busy with lake duties he's playing for a dance or party.

The Daily Paper.

STRIKE—AT WHOM?

Three employees in the Cisco office of Lone Star Gas company were awarded service badges Thursday night at a company meeting at Wooten Hotel, Abilene, in which 13 towns in this territory were represented. Fifty-five service awards were made at the meeting. The badges, given for long and faithful service to the public, were gold for more than 15 years' service; silver for 10 to 15 years and five-year pins were blue enamel.

Robert Pharr of Route Two Now at Honshu, Japan

With Eighth Army, Osaka, Honshu, Japan — Technician Fourth Grade Garland W. Pharr, son of Robert Pharr of route two, Cisco, Texas, now a member of the 25th medical battalion of the 25th infantry division of General Eichelberger's Eighth army, now occupying the major part of Honshu, Japan, has been put on temporary duty with headquarters of the 25th infantry division to attend their mess management school located in Osaka, Honshu, Japan.

Sergeant Pharr entered the army in October of 1944 and received his basic training at Fort Sheridan, Texas. He left the United States for overseas duty in July of 1945 and was then assigned to the 25th Infantry Division. Prior to his entrance into the army he attended school at Cisco, Texas, and was employed in farming.

Financial reports make interesting reading to people who know even a little bit about what they mean. To some, they look drab because they are printed mainly in figures; many students never have learned to enjoy studying figures. Just the same, dull old numerals tell the truth in a romantic way to those who love cold facts of struggle and adventure.

Late in May it was my good fortune to have with me an annual report of one of America's largest corporations when I had to spend three hours on a day train. In the back of my mind as I rode along, was a lurking fear that I might reach home a day (maybe a week) late because of labor troubles, just then coiling to strike. My dread threw a bright light on the figures in hand.

Division of Wealth.

The company about which I was reading plays an important part in the lives of more than a quarter of a million people: 100,000 employees and 150,000 stockholders. Two out of every five of these people drew wages while three out of five received dividends. The average share owner got less than \$500 a year. The average employee took home more than \$2,500 a year.

Daily newspapers for days had reported threats of strikes in the plants of the firm I was studying, also on the lines of the railroad I was riding, and in many other industries. Question: If all the employees of all the companies strike for what they want and get it, who will pay the difference? How will they pay it? These questions have answers and they're not secrets.

Enter Apple Conductor.

The train stopped for a few minutes under the sheds of a big town station and a railway newsboy came through with fresh afternoon papers. On page one, under Washington date-line, a wire story told how OPA would grant higher prices on automobiles. Nearby was another item about a 10 per cent boost in shoe prices. Then I remembered that bread and milk and meat all had gone up recently.

Whether you ride or walk or only eat, the price gains catch you. Wages are inside the cost of every manufactured thing, and the consumer pays. It is too obvious to deserve proof. Not long ago officialdom was sounding off freely about how wages in Detroit could be boosted without charging higher prices for automobiles but it didn't work out that way.

Strikes: No Weapons.

It is because strikes are not tools. The official theory was right: Wages can go up without boosting prices but production has to be increased if it happens, and strikes don't increase production. Sudden wage increases of 18 to 30 per cent have to come from somewhere, but where? A stockholder drawing \$500 a year can't offer much of a boon to a \$2,500 wage earner.

Strikes can't take something from the owners of a company that the owners don't get. That leaves nobody to pay the higher wages but Mr. Consumer whose family drives the car, wears the shoes and eats the food.

A large majority of consumers are themselves workers.

In the absence of increased production, a strike is a boomerang. It hits the consumer who is the worker himself.

CATTLE QUARANTINE.

EL PASO, May 30. — Stockmen today feared the newly-ordered quarantine on cattle importations from Mexico would seriously affect what has become a \$9,000,000-a-year industry. Dr. John Redmond, head of the Bureau of Animal Industries here, announced yesterday the new quarantine would become effective June 4, after which time cattle could be imported only by special permission from the Animal Bureau in Washington.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 30. — George Robson of Los Angeles gained the greatest triumph of his auto racing career today by winning the 500-mile Memorial Day automobile race.

The triumph climaxed a 15-year racing career in which Robson had come up the hard way from the dirt tracks on the bush league circuit.

This was his fourth appearance at Indianapolis, but only the third race in which he actually competed. His first time here in 1933 he was "bumped" from the field by a car with a faster qualifying time. He was forced out by trouble in two previous races.

His speed today for the 500 miles was 114.820, and his elapsed time was four hours, 21 minutes 16.74 seconds.

Robson earned in addition to the \$20,000 first prize a total of \$13,500 in lap money.

Jimmy Jackson, one-time athletic great at Indianapolis Tech high school, chased Robson across the finish line.

H. and M. R. R. Suspends Service as Men Walk Out

NEW YORK, May 30. (U.P.)—All service on the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad was suspended today when 750 members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Railroad Trainmen went out on strike.

The walkout was called despite an executive order signed yesterday by President Truman setting up an executive board to investigate the dispute and designed to delay the strike for 60 days.

The strike was called to force the H. and M. to pay the 18½ cent hour wage increase awarded workers in settlement of the national rail strike last week. The company said it was not represented at the settlement.

Cost of 3 Dairy Products Hiked; More Ups Likely

WASHINGTON, May 30. — The government has authorized price increases on milk, butter and cheddar cheese and some other dairy products.

Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles announced last night that consumer prices on milk will be raised one cent a quart, approximately 11 cents a pound on butter, and six cents a pound on cheddar cheese. The increased prices will become effective June 1 "or as soon thereafter as practicable."

Bowles added that "further sharp increases" on the three dairy products will be necessary after July 1 if Congress approves subsidy cuts.

Bowles said increases were approved in order to maintain dairy production in the face of increased food costs and "apparent congressional determination to slash food subsidies" from a new price law. The price boosts amount to approximately 40 cents per undred-weight for dairy farmers.

Bowles announced that ceiling prices also will go up about one cent a can on evaporated milk. Prices on buttermilk, cream, (except in bulk), cottage cheese and some similar by-products will be increased.

Prices will not be increased, he said, on condensed whole milk, whole milk powder, malted milk, baby foods, dry ice cream mix, skim milk powder, casein and skim milk cheese.

776 ANGUS TO SELL.

SAN ANGELO, May 30. — At the second annual distribution sale of the Texas Aberdeen-Angus Association here next Wednesday a total of 745 commercial females and 28 registered bulls will be put up for sale.

Stevenson Won't Run for Governor; 13 in Race

AUSTIN, May 30. (U.P.) — Gov. Coke R. Stevenson finally eliminated himself as a candidate for re-election today, leaving the race for the Democratic nomination for governor to five major candidates and eight minor ones.

Stevenson told a special press conference that he had decided definitely he will not seek a third term as governor.

That automatically established Dr. Homer P. Rainey, ousted head of Texas University, Railroad Commissioner Beauford Jester and Attorney General Grover Sellers as leading runners in the 13-way race.

Close behind — or a bit ahead, according to their managers — were Jerry Sadler of Longview and Lieutenant Gov. John Lee Smith.

Today's announcement by Stevenson confirmed an exclusive United Press dispatch of Feb. 7. The governor said today he had listened patiently to all that has been said in favor of his candidacy. "The arguments advanced, however, do not outweigh the convictions previously formed in my mind that I should not run," he said.

"So believing, and with a heart full of gratitude to all those who have urged me to run again, I hereby announce to the public that I will not be a candidate for re-election."

Heavy Hail and High Winds Hit Dallas, Santone

One of the stormiest months of May in Texas history neared a close today, but the weather bureau could give no assurance of an immediate end to the storms.

The clashing elements loosed record rains, hail and high winds and caused \$2,000,000 damage at San Antonio and in Dallas early today.

Storm-born mishaps injured at least six persons and at Dallas the flooding Trinity river kept rising to endanger life in the lowlands.

Winds of up to 100 miles an hour were recorded at San Antonio, where five new positive cases of polio were recorded along with the state's 15th death since May 1 in the polio outbreak.

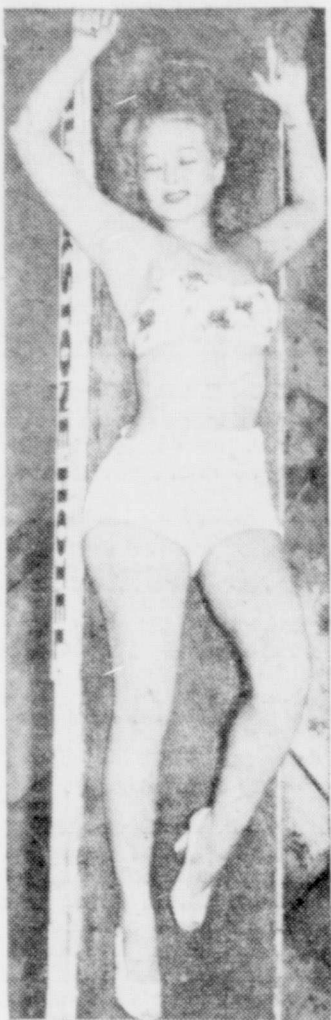
The President is apparently doing his best, and making good progress, in an attempt to outlast and stop the epidemic of strikes that endanger the very life of this Nation.

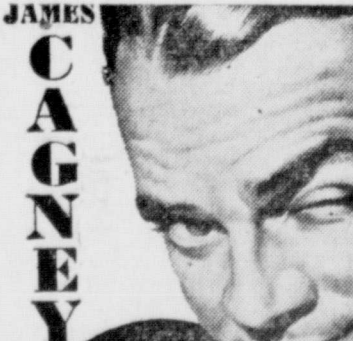

Dallas Times-Herald Tells About Cisco

Cisco Daily Press today received a copy of the Dallas Times-Herald of May 26, which contained a well-written article that sets forth the many unusual advantages of Cisco as a recreation spot.

The writer, Bruce Cunningham, who with Mrs. Cunningham has visited Cisco on many occasions, touched on many phases of Cisco life that should be interesting to Dallasites and others in search of the "right spot" to spend their vacations in the thoroughly enjoyable, healthful manner.

As clipped from Times-Herald, the article reads:

REAL RECREATION SPOT.

By Bruce Cunningham.

Cisco, Tex., boasts a diversified program of recreation tailor-made for play-hungry Dallasites, from the tired business executive craving a relaxing two days of fishing to papa and mama and the kids, who will find Cisco wearing well as a family vacation spot.

A friendly city 135 miles west of Dallas and within easy reach by automobile over Federal Hwy. 80 through Fort Worth, Weatherford, Thurbur, Ranger and Eastland, most of Cisco's recreational facilities are concentrated in the Lake Cisco area, just a skip and a jump from the business section. For instance, the vacationist can step out of his hotel lobby, drive less than three miles over an all-weather road, get in a boat and be fishing for the big ones in 20 minutes.

Front-Yard Sports.

The same applies to golfing, boating, hunting, swimming, picnicking, dancing, roller skating, hiking and nature study, or just rolling in the sun or shade. These facilities are practically in the front yard of the vacationist if he chooses one of 12 rock cabins or the rock lodge, all furnished with gas and overlooking the lake. (Editor's Note: Lights, too, Mr. Cunningham?) Nearby gas and oil production is one thing that makes Cisco prosperous and the lake and other recreational advantages available.

For relief from outdoor activity, Cisco boasts a four-lane bowling alley meeting American Bowling Congress specifications. It is in the center of the business section downtown. Visiting reglers will find tough competition among the local dealers in strikes and spares, for Ciscoites take their bowling seriously.

For Swimming.

Cisco has invested nearly \$200,000 to provide recreational facilities immediately below Lake Cisco dam. These facilities are centered around two connected swimming pools—one shallow, one deep—with a combined length of 800 feet and width varying from 200 to 300 feet; and separating the two pools is a sand island for sun bathing or day dreaming under the shade of cottonwood trees. There is a pool for youngsters as large as the average natatorium.

The layout is set in the midst of a wooded canyon across which the big dam lifts 125-feet and Banks United States Highway 283 which crosses the dam on a concrete-steel bridge more than a quarter-mile long; on one side of the dam is the lake with its deep, blue water, and on the other side are the swimming pools, pavilion, free municipal parks and the state

fish hatchery, a source of interest to visitors.

The big pavilion near the swimming pools contains dressing rooms for men, women and children, with suit and towel service, showers and other conveniences. Upstairs are the dance hall and skating rink.

Large Picnic Grounds.

Picnicking in the 11 acres of city parks is free, with utilities and barbecue pits furnished. The 12 rock cabins and stone lodge are maintained by the city for rent to visitors. Tourists unable to obtain cottages or space in the lodge will suffer little, if any, inconvenience because they can stop at the Laguna, Daniels or Mobley Hotels in Cisco and drive to and from the lake in a few minutes.

The golf course of the Cisco Country Club—a nine-hole layout with excellent grass greens—is situated on the south shore of the lake just beyond the country club building.

Air-minded vacationists will find an all-weather Class No. 2 port at Cisco. It is located between the city and the lake, and has an excellent turf runway. Joe Coulter is manager.

Big-mouth and small-mouth bass, crappie, bream and channel cat are in abundance at Lake Cisco, which is constantly stocked from the nearby state fish hatchery.

A Real Fisherman.

Superintendent of city cabins and in charge of hunting and fishing privileges is Ray Judia, who may be addressed at Cisco, Judia, a whale of a fisherman, gets a wallop out of telling Cisco visitors where the big ones are being caught; he never tires of fishing, and the angler who has Judia in his party is fortunate indeed. He is also an accomplished musician, and when not busy with lake duties he's playing for a dance or party.

Their Daily Paper.

On the right "ear" of the 25-year-old Cisco Daily Press, Publisher-General Manager A. B. O'Flaherty claims for Cisco: "One of the most healthful areas in the U. S. Robert Pharr of Route Two Now at Honshu, Japan

With Eighth Army, Osaka, Honshu, Japan — Technician Fourth Grade Garland W. Pharr, son of Robert Pharr of route two, Cisco, Texas, now a member of the 25th medical battalion of the 25th Infantry division of General Eichelberger's Eighth army, now occupying the major part of Honshu, Japan, has been put on temporary duty with headquarters of the 25th Infantry division to attend their mess management school located in Osaka, Honshu, Japan.

Sergeant Pharr entered the army in October of 1944 and received his basic training at Fort Sheridan, Texas. He left the United States for overseas duty in July of 1945 and was then assigned to the 25th Infantry Division. Prior to his entrance into the army he attended school at Cisco, Texas and was employed in farming.

Financial reports make interesting reading to people who know even a little bit about what they mean. To some, they look drab because they are printed mainly in figures; many students never have learned to enjoy studying figures. Just the same, dull old numerals tell the truth in a romantic way to those who love cold facts of struggle and adventure.

Late in May it was my good fortune to have with me an annual report of one of America's largest corporations when I had to spend three hours on a day train. In the back of my mind as I rode along, was a lurking fear that I might reach home a day (maybe a week) late because of labor troubles. Just then coiling to strike. My dread threw a bright light on the figures in hand.

Division of Wealth.

The company about which I was reading plays an important part in the lives of more than a quarter of a million people: 100,000 employees and 150,000 stockholders. Two out of every five of these people drew wages while three out of five received dividends. The average share owner got less than \$500 a year. The average employee took home more than \$2,500 a year.

Daily newspapers for days had reported threats of strikes in the plants of the firm I was studying, also on the lines of the railroad I was riding, and in many other industries. Question: If all the employees of all the companies strike for what they want and get it, who will pay the difference? How will they pay it? These questions have answers and they're not secrets.

Enter Apple Conductor.

The train stopped for a few minutes under the sheds of a big-town station and a railway newsboy came through with fresh afternoon papers. On page one, under Washington date-line, a wire story told how OPA would grant higher prices on automobiles. Nearby was another item about a 10 per cent boost in shoe prices. Then I remembered that bread and milk and meat all had gone up recently.

Whether you ride or walk or only eat, the price gains catch you. Wages are inside the cost of every manufactured thing, and the consumer pays. It is too obvious to deserve proof. Not long ago officialdom was sounding off freely about how wages in Detroit could be boosted without charging higher prices for automobiles but it didn't work out that way. Why?

Strikes Are Weapons.

It is because strikes are not tools. The official theory was right: Wages can go up without boosting prices but production has to be increased if it happens, and strikes don't increase production. Sudden wage increases of 18 to 30 per cent have to come from somewhere, but where? A stockholder drawing \$500 a year can't offer much of a boon to a \$2,500 wage earner.

Strikes can't take something from the owners of a company that the owners don't get. That leaves nobody to pay the higher wages but Mr. Consumer whose family drives the car, wears the shoes and eats the food.

A large majority of consumers are themselves workers. In the absence of increased production, a strike is a boomerang. It hits the consumer who is the worker himself.

CATTLE QUARANTINE.

EL PASO, May 30. — Stockmen today feared the newly-ordered quarantine on cattle importations from Mexico would seriously affect what has become a \$9,000,000-a-year industry. Dr. John Redmond, head of the Bureau of Animal Industries here, announced yesterday the new quarantine would become effective June 4, after which time cattle could be imported only by special permission from the Animal Bureau in Washington.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 30. — George Robson of Los Angeles gained the greatest triumph of his auto racing career today by winning the 500-mile Memorial Day automobile race.

The triumph climaxed a 15-year racing career in which Robson had come up the hard way from the dirt tracks on the bush league circuit.

This was his fourth appearance at Indianapolis, but only the third race in which he actually competed. His first time here in 1939 he was "bumped" from the field by a car with a faster qualifying time. He was forced out by trouble in two previous races.

His speed today for the 500 miles was 114.820, and his elapsed time was four hours, 21 minutes 16.74 seconds.

Robson earned in addition to the \$20,000 first prize a total of \$13,500 in lap money.

H. and M. R. R. Suspends Service as Men Walk Out

NEW YORK, May 30. (U.P.)—All service on the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad was suspended today when 750 members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and Railroad Trainmen went out on strike.

The walkout was called despite an executive order signed yesterday by President Truman setting up an executive board to investigate the dispute and designed to delay the strike for 60 days.

The strike was called to force the H. and M. to pay the 18½ cent hour wage increase awarded workers in settlement of the national rail strike last week. The company said it was not represented at the settlement.

Cost of 3 Dairy Products Hiked; More Ups Likely

WASHINGTON, May 30. — The government has authorized price increases on milk, butter and cheddar cheese and some other dairy products.

Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles announced last night that consumer prices on milk will be raised one cent a quart, approximately 11 cents a pound on butter, and six cents a pound on cheddar cheese. The increased prices will become effective June 1 "or as soon thereafter as practicable."

Bowles added that "further sharp increases" on the three dairy products will be necessary after July 1 if Congress approves subsidy cuts.

Bowles said increases were approved in order to maintain dairy production in the face of increased food costs and "apparent congressional determination to slash food subsidies" from a new price law. The price boosts amount to approximately 40 cents per undred-weight for dairy farmers.

Bowles announced that ceiling prices also will go up about one cent a can on evaporated milk. Prices on buttermilk, cream, (except in bulk), cottage cheese and some similar by-products will be increased.

Prices will not be increased, he said, on condensed whole milk, whole milk powder, malted milk, baby foods, dry ice cream mix, skim milk powder, casein and skim milk cheese.

Stevenson Won't Run for Governor; 13 in Race

AUSTIN, May 30. (U.P.) — Gov. Coke R. Stevenson finally eliminated himself as a candidate for re-election today, leaving the race for the Democratic nomination for governor to five major candidates and eight minor ones.

Stevenson told a special press conference that he had decided definitely he will not seek a third term as governor.

That automatically eliminated Dr. Homer F. Rainey, ousted head of Texas University, Railroad Commissioner Beauford Jester and Attorney General Grover Sellers as leading runners in the 13-way race.

Close behind — or a bit ahead, according to their managers — were Jerry Sadler of Longview and Lieutenant Gov. John Lee Smith.

Today's announcement by Stevenson confirmed an exclusive United Press dispatch of Feb. 7. The governor said today he had listened patiently to all that has been said in favor of his candidacy. "The arguments advanced, however, do not outweigh the convictions previously formed in my mind that I should not run," he said.

"So believing, and with a heart full of gratitude to all those who have urged me to run again, I hereby announce to the public that I will not be a candidate for re-election."

Heavy Hail and High Winds Hit Dallas, Santone

One of the stormiest months of May in Texas history neared a close today, but the weather bureau could give no assurance of an immediate end to the storms.

The clashing elements loosed record rains, hail and high winds and caused \$2,000,000 damage at San Antonio and in Dallas early today.

Storm-born mishaps injured at least six persons and at Dallas the flooding Trinity river kept rising to endanger life in the lowlands.

Winds of up to 100 miles an hour were recorded at San Antonio, where five new positive cases of polio were recorded along with the state's 15th death since May 1 in the polio outbreak.

"TALKING" NOT ENOUGH.

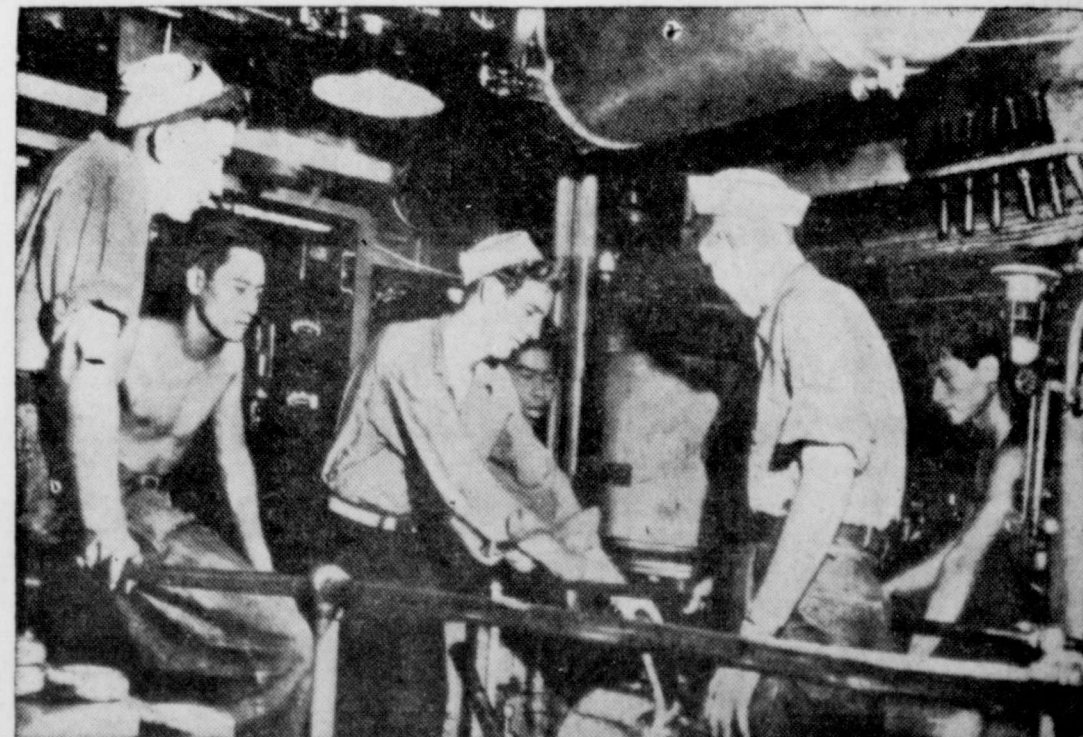
