### Red Cross Enrollment Drive is Over Today

#### MEMBERSHIP IS LARGEST SINCE 1930 CAMPAIGN

Membership and Donations Exceed Four Hundred Dollars for 1938 Roll Call

#### Get Over 350 Members

Many Workers Cooperated to Give Every Man and Woman Opportunity to Enroll

The Annual Roll Call of The American Red Cross ended today with Ochiltree County Chapter enrolling one of its largest membership drives. This membership drive, which was from Armistice through Thanksgiving Day, netted the local Chapter 373 memberships for 1938. Mrs. Vance Apple, Roll Call Chairman, reports total cash received \$459.99. This amount included the 373 memberships of one dollar each, also one donation of \$20.00, and the balance was in contributions of less than a dollar. A little less than half of the total received will go to the National Red Cross, and the remainder stays in the Chapter for local needs.

Mrs. Apple, her committee, and all workers, who assisted in soliciting memberships and contributions, are to be commended for the splendid manner in which they conducted the campaign. Every man and woman, who joined or contributed, are helping and promoting the great work that the Red Cross is doing for the preservation of life and health, for the needy and those in distress. ONE JURY CASE TRIED AND OTHER JURORS DISMISSED FOR TERM; HOLD COURT NEXT WEEK

The second week of the November term of the District Court of Ochiltree County was opened on Monday morning, November 22, with petit jurors reporting for duty. Judge E. J. Pickens was on the bench, and held court to order. Several civil cases were called and judgement rendered.

After selecting a jury in the case of J. L. Flowers vs. B. J. Walker, the remaining jurors were dismissed for the term. This case, which involved the cancellation of a contract, went to the jury at 11:30 Wednesday morning, but as we go to press, the jury has not rendered a verdict. Court recessed until Monday morning.

When Judge Pickens left Wednesday evening to spend Thanksgiving at home, he was ill. If he is unable to return for Court Monday, a Special Judge will be appointed to hold court next week, and dispose of all pending cases.

### Conner is Honored at Seven State Wheat Growers Meet

Members of the County Committee, to administer the Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act, were in Wichita, Kansas, Tuesday to attend a seven-state wheat growers conference. Representing the committee were L. R. Conner, Audie Conley and G. B. Mears. Others from Ochiltree County were J. H. Woodward, W. B. Dennison, G. C. Brillhart, Roger Pearson and W. M. Deck.

More than 3,500 farmers from Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Texas, New Mexico, Missouri and Nebraska assembled at this all day meeting, which was presided over by George A. Farrell, director of the western division AAA. While most of the wheat states are in the western region, Texas and Oklahoma are in the southern region.

### MANY FARMERS PAYING DEBTS

FARM SECURITY ADMINISTRATION SERVES MANY FARMERS THROUGHOUT DISTRICT TWELVE

In New Mexico and parts of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Colorado served by Region Twelve of the Farm Security Administration, 151 farmers made settlements of their debts in the past six weeks, according to L. H. Hauser, regional director of this federal agency.

A report shows that arrangements have been made to repay 71 per cent or more than two-thirds of the amount owed. Debt reduction amounted to \$194,354.00 or 28 per cent of the original indebtedness. "The Farm Security Administration cannot be considered a refinancing agency or a credit agency," Hauser said, "because the purpose of the program is farm and family rehabilitation, involving such things as correct farming practices, technical supervision, account keeping, home and farm budgets and farm debt adjustment."

In developing sound farm plans for borrowers it is often found that their debt structure is too high to ever permit repayment. It was pointed out. That is where the work of local farm debt adjustment committees come in. Creditors, farmer debtors and a committee of public spirited citizens work together to bring about a settlement suitable to all.

Hauser called attention to the fact that this farm debt adjustment service is available to all farmers, even though they are not working with this federal agency. "Our committees gladly consider other farm cases and all services are given without cost," he added.

Farmers desiring complete information about this service are urged to contact Arthur R. Turner, county supervisor of this county, or write direct to William Klein, chief of that section, Farm Security Administration, Amarillo, Texas.

Word has just been received by the County Agent from the state office that Ochiltree county is one of the 54 counties in Texas that has secured final approval on adjustments of 1937 work sheets. Compliance forms covering approximately 90 per cent of the work sheets have been submitted to the State Board and are ready for the preparation of the applications for payment by the state office. The applications for signatures of landlords and operators are expected in the county office at an early date.

The grazing capacity of pasture land under the Range program in Ochiltree county has been approved for 16 acres per animal. Fifty-three stockmen and ranchers have made application and are carrying out range conserving practices on 101,000 acres in the county. Inspection of ranches for compliance will be started by R. L. Flowers, County Range Inspector, next week.

### UNEMPLOYMENT FIGURES LOW

FIGURES SHOW THAT COUNTY HAS SHOWN MARKED IMPROVEMENT DURING RECENT YEARS

After a tabulation of the unemployment census taken from November 16 to the 20, local postoffice officials disclosed that out of Ochiltree county's total population according to last census of around 5220 persons, approximately 261 are unemployed at the present time.

The census which was nation-wide was taken by the government for the purpose of determining just how to cope with the unemployment situation. Persons who registered were those who were out of a job, wanted a job, were physically able to work if they had it and those who wanted more work. All persons working on any relief project were included also.

PANHANDLE DEFEATS PERRYTON FOR DISTRICT GRID TITLE IN GAME AT BORGER FRIDAY, NOV. 19

In a game Friday afternoon at the Borger High School stadium the Panthers defeated the Perryton Rangers in a 26-13 football victory which gave them their second straight District Two-B grid title.

In the early part of the first quarter the odds were against the Panthers while the Rangers were running.

ning up five first downs, and they could get only one. However, in the second quarter Adams, halfback for the Panthers, intercepted a Ranger pass on the 50-yard line, and started the fireworks which continued throughout the game. After a completed pass to Sterling, LE for the Panthers, they marched for a score, Sparks breaking through the center of the line to bring down the first touchdown for Panhandle. He failed to make the extra point good. That made the score at the end of the first quarter Panhandle 6 and Perryton 0.

At the beginning of the third quarter a pass from Perryton's 12-yard line from Smith to Sterling, in the end zone, and the extra point made by Sparks, made the Panthers still more superior in regard to the score. Late in the third quarter Crawford, going over from the 4-yd. line on the end run, brought the score to 19-0.

A trick pass in the fourth quarter accounted for the Rangers' first score. With the ball on the Panther 37-yard line, McWilliams faded back to pass. After evading a couple of the Panther tacklers, he passed to Schroeder on the line or scrimmage. Schroeder went by the astounded Panthers to cross the goal. McWilliams smashed the right side of the line to cross for the extra point.

From the Rangers' 27-yard line, Crawford hurried to Sterling who went for the last touchdown for the Panthers for the afternoon. Sparks made good his kick for the extra point.

The play, that raised the temperature of the spectators who were practically frozen, came with the next kickoff when McWilliams received on his own 18-yard line and pranced down the field with another score for the Rangers. His try at smashing over for the extra point, however, failed. Leaving the final score 26-13 with Panhandle the WINNER!

## EDITORIAL

### THANKSGIVING DAY

Thanksgiving Day (in the United States and Canada, is a day set apart annually for the giving of thanks to God for the blessings of the year. Originally, it was a harvest festival, and while the purpose has become less specific, the festival still takes place late in the autumn, after the crops have been gathered.

Plymouth Colony's first dreadful winter, during which almost half of the Pilgrim company died, had passed, and renewed hope had grown up with the summer. When the corn crop was gathered in the fall of 1621, Governor Bradford decreed a day of thanksgiving. Great were the preparations—the few women in the colony spent days boiling and baking and roasting; and even the children were busy turning the roasts on the spits before the open fires. As guests there were more than four-score friendly Indians, who brought, as their share of the feast, wild turkeys and venison from the woods. The first Thanksgiving, however, was not merely a feast—there were prayers and sermons and songs of praise; and three days had gone by before the Indians returned to their forest and the colonists to their tasks.

Since 1864, the same day has been regularly set apart. The President annually makes a formal announcement, and the governors of the various states issue proclamations calling on the people to give thanks. The day is not a national legal holiday—the United States has no legal holidays, not even the Fourth of July—but almost every state has legalized it by legislative act. Throughout the country, but especially in New England, where the custom originated, the day is looked upon with great reverence. It is peculiarly a family day, and the very sound of the name brings back inevitable memories of "back home," of the old farmhouse kitchen, and of the pantry crowded with "good things."

### Fruits of Christianity

International Uniform  
School Lesson for Nov.  
Text: John 15:1-16

THE life of the true Christian is the vine and its fruit. For consideration of the lesson in connection with the assurance that whatsoever we shall be also

does the vine yield its fruit. Through its roots in the ground, the vine draws the life-giving power of nature, and the care with which the gardener trims it and directs it into disciplined growth.

It is, says Jesus, in the life of the vine that we see the life of the Christian. It is in proper connection with the forces of grace that the spiritual vine bears its fruit. Christ is the vine, and God the Father is the gardener.

Man cannot bear fruit in his own strength. He is directly in connection with the source of spiritual life. We must abide in Christ, and we would bear Christ-like fruit. The relationship of the branch to the vine is a mutual relationship. As long as the branch is in the vine, it is of the vine, and its quality is the quality of the vine. God's purpose concerning the lives of his people is that they should be like the Father who is glorified.

says Jesus, in our bearing much fruit, and it is in this that we manifest our discipleship.

FROM this figure of the vine and the branch Jesus turns to speak more directly of love. It is love that is the essence of the vine and the branch. It is love that constitutes the relationship between God and Christ and ourselves.

Experience of the Christian comes from the love of God and the grace of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

As we have this divine love, so it is our privilege to abide in it. And the test of the reality of our love is our fulfillment of the commandments of Jesus, even as he fulfills the Father's commandments and abides in the Father's love.

What a rich experience it is that Jesus opens up to the Christian! "These things have I spoken unto you," he says, "that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be made full."

It is an interesting study to search out all the passages in the New Testament where "joy" is mentioned. The Christian life is not a life of dullness, or of sober seriousness. It is not even one of passionate earnestness.

It misses its climax unless there be in it real joy—the exuberance that cries in ecstasy, "Thanks be unto God for His unspeakable gift."

Following from the Bible: "I will overturn, overturn, overturn it: and it shall be no more, until he come whose right it is: and I will give it him" (Ezekiel 21:27).

The Lesson-Sermon also includes the following passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Marvels, calamities, and sin will much more abound as truth urges upon mortals its resisted claims; but the awful daring of sin destroys sin, and foreshadows the triumph of truth" (page 223).

## Panhandle Defeats Perryton 26-13 to Take District Title

In a game Friday afternoon that reached fever heat at times, before about 2,000 fans who were shivering from the afternoons' cold blasts which swept the stadium of the Boyer High School, the Panhandle Panthers handed the Perryton Rangers another sectional defeat 26 to 13, to advance another step toward the championship of Region 1 in Class B football.

The early part of the first quarter held no rosy hopes for the Panthers, as the Rangers were piling up one first down after another, to get five of them to their credit, while the Panthers could get but one. However, early in the second frame the Rangers had their expectations shattered beyond repair when Adams, halfback for the Panthers, intercepted a pass on the 50 yard marker.

From then on, Smith, Sparks and Crawford took over the detail work, and with a completed pass to Sterling, ace end for the Panthers, they marched for a score, Sparks plunging the center of the line from the 1 yard line on his second attempt. Sparks' attempt at goal kick was wide, to place the Panthers in a commanding position with regard to score.

Feeling their lead of six points insufficient, the Panther machine went on, during the remainder of that period to even the first down with the Rangers at 7 all to close the first half.

During the early part of the third quarter a most spectacular score was pulled out of the Panthers' bag, when Smith passed from Perryton's 12 yard line to Sterling, in the end zone, who caught it as he was falling to the ground. Sparks made his kick good this time.

Crawford clinched the game late in the third quarter, going over from the 4 yard line on an end run. The Panthers had taken over from the Rangers on the Ranger 33 yard line after the Perryton lads had failed on downs. Crawford clipped off 23 yards of the distance to pay dirt on a run around right end. A penalty against Perryton for offside, and a 1 yard plunge by Sparks then set the play for Crawford to cross the goal, to make the score 19 to 0 for the Panthers.

Using the screen pass for the second time this season accounted for the Rangers' first score early in the fourth quarter. After receiving the Panther kickoff late in the third quarter, on his own 10 yard line, McWilliams toted the rind back to the 23. After three plays which netted but two yards, one of them an incomplete pass, McWilliams whizzed off 23 yards around his left end. After making no gain around the right end, Lewis passed to McWilliams to net one yard. With the ball on the Panther 37 yard stripe, McWilliams faked back to pass. After evading a couple of Panther tacklers, he passed to Schroeder on the line of scrimmage. Schroeder slipped through the astonished Panthers to cross the double marker. McWilliams smashed the right side of the line to cross for the extra point.

Hard luck continued to stalk the Rangers. After W. Flowers had intercepted a Panther pass on Perryton's 31 yard line, Lewis, McWilliams and W. Flowers had worked the ball well down in Panther territory, only to have one of their passes intercepted by Sterling on the Panther 22. From that point the Panthers again scored in only six plays, climaxing with another sparkling aerial from Crawford to Sterling, to finish the Panther scoring for the afternoon, after Sparks had made good his kick for extra point.

The rousing play of the afternoon came with the next kickoff when McWilliams received on his own 18 yard stripe and stepped the remaining sod to cross the goal after snaking his way through the whole Panther outfit. His attempt at smashing over for the extra point, however, failed, and within a few minutes the game was over with Panhandle on the long end of the score.

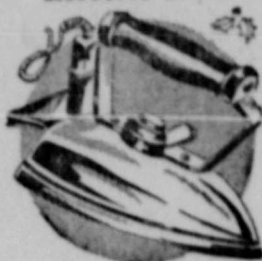
