Steers Lose Bi-District Game To Petersburg

Petersburg nipped Farwell's playoff career in the bud Saturday night as the under-rated Buffaloes overcame their mistakes to capture a 27-19 decision in the district 3A-4A bi-district game. The Buffaloes totally dominated the game as they put together a 500-yard offense to 233 yards for the

Steers. Gary Erwin closed out the season with an effort of 87 yards and two touchdowns to pace the Steer infantry. Dean Stovall ended a fabulous high school football career with six receptions for an even 100 yards. Wendell Solis led the Buffaloes with 140 yards followed by Joe Robertson with 99. The Buffaloes now advance to

the regional playoffs where they will take on Clarendon.

Danny Prince returned the opening kickoff out to the 44 and the action began from there. The Steers quickly moved into Petersburg territory and advanced to the 29 before the Buffs could halt the drive.

It didn't take Petersburg long as they moved to their 42 where Willis passed to Scarborough for 58 yards and a TD. Steve Weaver tackled on the extra and the Buffs had a 7-0 lead.

The Steers again went on the move as they went from their 34 to the Petersburg 14 in nine plays, but Petersburg again halted the drive short of the goal line. The Buffaloes again penetrated Steer territory as they gained the 23 in six tries, one a 54-yard scamper by Solis.

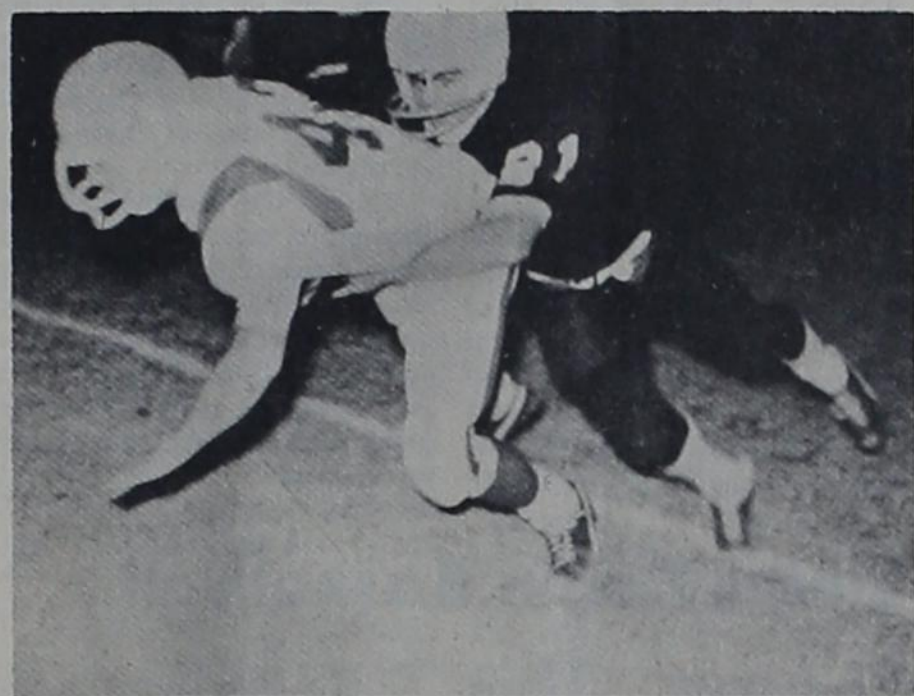
Solis then punched his way to the six, but he lost the handle and Larry Erwin recovered for Farwell. The Steers moved to their 27 but could go no further. Danny Prince got off a 59-yard punt to back the Buffaloes up to their 14. Willis used his strong running game to again drive into Steer country as they moved to the nine in 11 plays. Randy Chandler took the ball away from Robertson on the four to end the threat.

The Steers drove back down-

field but losses on two successive plays left Hargrove faced with fourth and 24 on the Petersburg 32. Scarborough picked off his pass and returned out to the nine. On the second play from scrimmage, Frank Galvan recovered a Harold Morgan fumble on the 15. It took the Steers five plays to move into the end zone with Gary Erwin carrying the final four steps. Wiman added the extra point and with 1:38 left in the half, the score stood at 7-0.

The Steers weren't through as Mark Williams picked off a Willis pass on the 43 following the kickoff and returned it all the way. The try for extras failed, and Farwell had a 13-7 edge.

The Buffaloes took the second (Continued on Page 2)

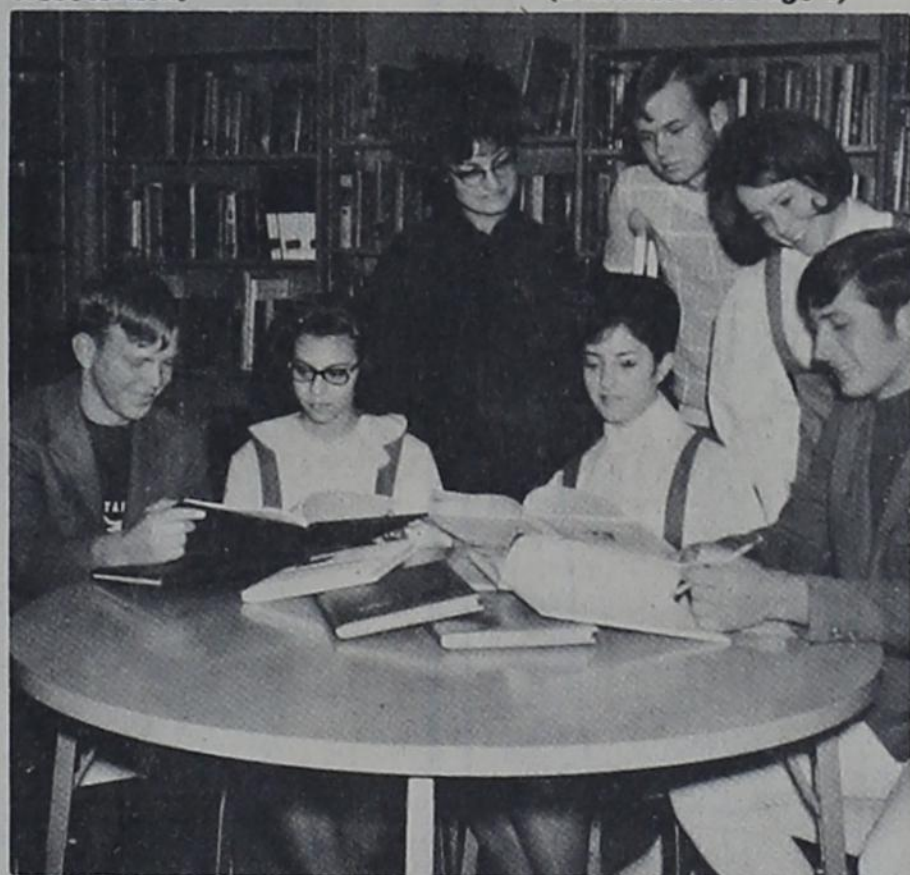
Ex-students who graduated in years ending in the number

Death Claims Pioneer

Funeral services were conducted from the Farwell First Baptist Church Sunday afternoon Nov. 23, for Mrs. H. S. (Grace) Curtis, one of the true pioneers of this area. Officiating at last rites was Rev. T. L. Pond of Stanton, Tex., a close friend of the Curtis family and former pastor of the West Camp Baptist Church. He was assisted by Rev. J. L. Bass, pastor of Farwell First Baptist Church. Burial was in Sunset Memorial Terrace directed by Sherwood Mortuary.

Mrs. Curtis, who was 77 years of age, passed away at Clovis Memorial Hospital Thursday evening following a brief illness.

Grace Haynes Curtis, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Willard Haynes, was born in Rockwell County, Tex., September 21, 1892. She lived in Amarillo for several years and moved with her parents to the Texico-Farwell area in the spring of 1907.

The following year on March 1, 1908, she was married to Henry S. Curtis at Farwell. Their marriage is the first recorded marriage in Farmer County. The Curtises set up housekeeping in a half-dugout south of Texico and made their home in that vicinity until 1928 when they moved to a farm south of Farwell. In 1961 following their retirement they moved to 801 Second Street in Farwell where they lived at time of Mrs. Curtis' death.

Mr. and Mrs. Curtis had celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last year. A devoted wife and mother, Mrs. Curtis was a member of the Farwell First Baptist Church. She was also active in several hobbies, including ceramic painting.

Survivors include her husband, H. S. Curtis; five sons, Willard E. (Dib) Curtis of Tempe, Ariz., H. W. (Penn) Curtis of Las Vegas, Nev., Duane Curtis, Big Fork, Mont., and Jim Curtis and Gerald Curtis, Farwell; one daughter, Mrs. Pearl Holbrook, Lakewood, Colo.; two brothers, Raymond Haynes, Tucumcari, N.M., and Lonnie (Pete) Haynes, Richmond, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Sam Lewis, Texico, and Mrs. Minnie Scott, Clovis. Also, 17 grandchildren, 30 great-grandchildren and a host of friends and other relatives.

Lazbuddie To Meet Groom Friday Night

Lazbuddie's Longhorns of District 2-B are into the playoffs again and are carrying a mighty impressive record into the competition, having lost only four regular season games in three years. Their only loss this season came at the hands of Class A Bovina.

The Bi-District game with the Groom Tigers of District 1-B will re-match the teams who met last year in Tulla when the Longhorns beat Groom for the Bi-District title, 26-6. Groom is expected to be a stronger team this season. This year's

game will be played Friday night, Nov. 28, in Panhandle at 7:30 p.m.

Lazbuddie's attack centers around the running of Derrell Mathews, the area's leading scorer with 152 points. He has gained over 1500 yards this season, picking up 107 in Friday night's game against Matador.

Longhorn Coach Pat Casey says they had to rebuild the entire backfield after last year since Mathews was the only returning back; so they took a guard, Larry Hodges, and

made a quarterback out of him; made a quarterback out of end Monte Barnes and put freshman Arthur Graves at a half-back slot. The Longhorns also have a very effective passing game to add to their offensive attack.

In amassing their 9-1 record this season, the Longhorns have averaged 33.8 points per game while holding their opponents to 5.5 average per game. Average yardage for the team has been some 296 yards on the ground and 85 through the air each game.

The Tigers come into bi-district competition undefeated, having beaten Booker Friday night to clinch the District 1-B title. Their well-balanced attack features the running of backs Dan Blackwell, Johnny Brittan, Larry Clark and Dal Howerton. Average weight of the Groom offensive line is 158 pounds, and they are said to be very quick. Thus far this season the Tigers have defeated teams from Turkey, McLean, Wheeler, Vega, Claude, Silverton, Lafors, Textline, Follett and Booker.

half kickoff on their 34 and marched to the Steer 21 before the Steer defense could halt their progress. They then exchanged punts as neither side could sustain a drive, resulting in Petersburg having custody on their 22. The Buffs went on the move as they penetrated to the Steer 30 in eight plays. Solis found running room and raced into the end zone on the first play of the final period. Weaver's extra gave Petersburg a one point lead, 14-13. The two clubs exchanged punts giving Petersburg the ball on their 23. They drove to the 47 before Danny Prince recovered a Morgan fumble on the 49. The Steers pushed to the Buffalo four in six plays and Erwin scampered in for the go ahead TD. A pass for two to Gene Gene Sheets was successful but a penalty for having 12 men on the field called the effort back. The next attempt failed and Farwell held a 19-14 margin.

The Buffs came back quickly as they marched 57 yards in nine plays with Solis scoring the winning touchdown from four yards out. Larry Erwin blocked the kick and the score stood at 20-19 with 1:06 remaining. The kickoff went into the end zone for a touchback. Passing into a stiff north wind, the Steers couldn't gain the necessary yardage and the ball went over. On fourth and ten from the 15, Robertson found daylight and went for paydirt with 19 seconds remaining to be played. The kick was good and the scoreboard read 27-19. The Steers didn't have the time they needed and the gun sounded to end the season for Farwell.

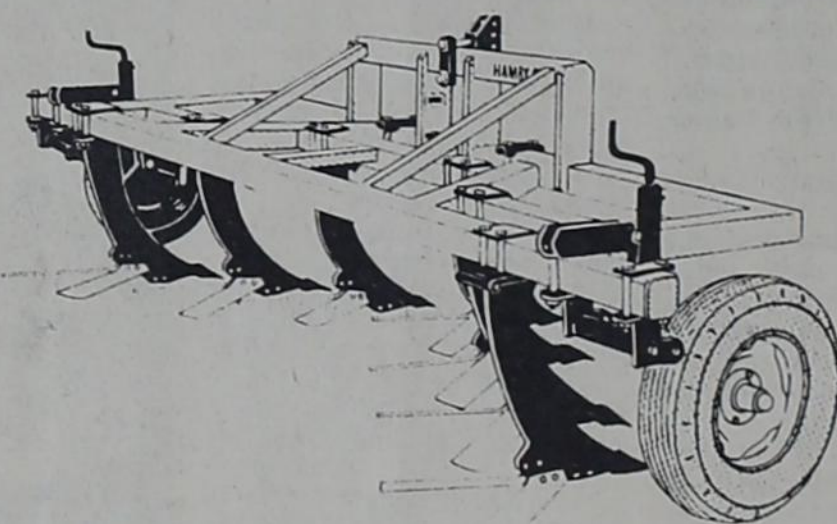
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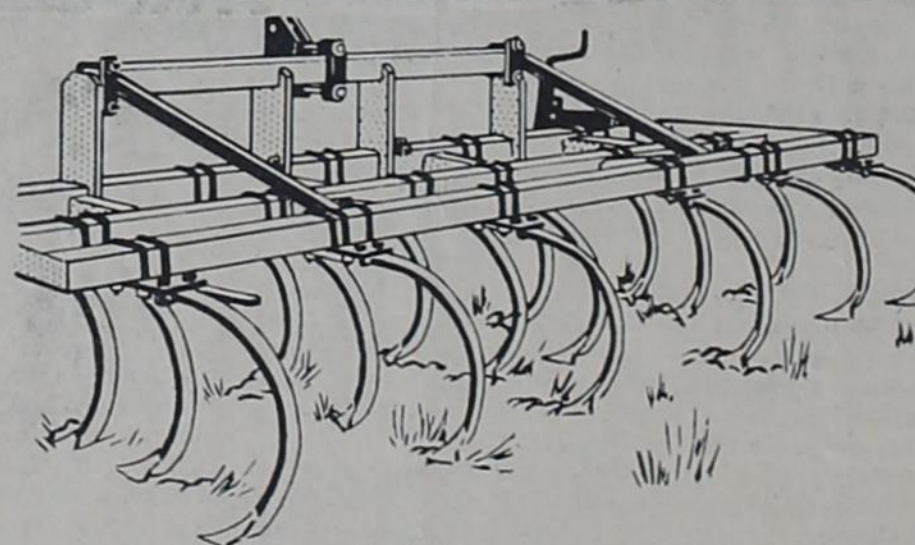

Report From The Sheriff's Office

Officials at the Parmer County Sheriff's Office report the theft of a pickup (1963 Ford) bearing the license 8F-3446 from the Gerald Norton farm Tuesday night. The pickup was stolen out of a field bordering on FM 145.

On the following night, November 19, burglars were busy at Tide Chemical Company. They removed sheet metal from the east end of the building to gain entry and apparently backed a pickup truck into the building. The vehicle was loaded with 59 cases of herbicides (Atrazine and Propazine), a one-gallon bucket of herbicide, and a one-gallon can of green paint. Value on the merchandise was estimated at more than \$5,900.

Later the same night entry was made into Western Ammonia Company. However, nothing was missing at the latter location. Evidence at Western Ammonia indicates that the same group who burglarized Tide Chemical also was implicated in that incident.

Officials theorize that the Norton pickup which had been stolen the previous night might have been used in the burglaries and later abandoned. Any person who might notice an abandoned pickup is asked to notify the sheriff's office.

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Texas Cattle Feeders Assn. --

Local Man Named To Board Of Directors

Lee Hicks of the Far-Tex Feed Yards, south of Texico-Farwell, was among the cattlemen named to the board of directors for the Texas Cattle Feeders Association at its third annual meeting last week.

Hicks, who came to Farwell to assume his present position some two years ago, has been in the cattle feeding business for approximately 12 years. He is a graduate of North Texas State University and had fed cattle in California for ten years before coming to this area. He had been employed by a Clovis cattle company before assuming his present position.

The local cattleman says, "I believe this area has great cattle feeding potential since much of the feed necessary to a successful cattle feeding operation can be grown locally." Far-Tex Feed Yards feeds for customers in Illinois, Texas, New Mexico, Iowa, Alabama and other states.

During speeches of the final session at the association's annual meeting, optimism and pessimism were sounded by key speakers. Problems centered around expansion and procurement of feeder cattle.

Kenneth Monfort, president of Monfort Packing Co. in Greeley, Colo., told the assembled cattlemen, "The cattle business is not the easy life shown by television westerns, but is as highly competitive as any business operation."

Another speaker, E. A. Trowbridge, a representative of the Wilson Co. of Chicago, said that higher prices for slaughter cat-

tle will provide incentive to increase cow herds and added he believes that Texas will continue to grow in the feeding industry.

All officers of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association are from the Panhandle. President of the Association is R. M. Carter of Plainview.

Two Charged With Cattle Theft

Two area boys have been charged with cattle theft following an incident at Castor Farms last Wednesday night in which 16 head of cattle were stolen.

Charged with the thefts are James Cunningham, 19, of Clovis and a 17 year old youth from Texico. The incident was investigated by Curry County Deputy Sheriff Marshall Gates and James Williams of the Livestock Sanitary Board.

Investigating officers report that the two young men borrowed a pickup from the manager of Castor Farms and borrowed a trailer from another person and hauled the cattle to a farm south of Cannon Air Force Base. The cattle have been recovered and returned to the feed yards.

Theft of the cattle was reported to the Curry County sheriff's office early Thursday morning by Pike Jordan, manager of the feed yards.

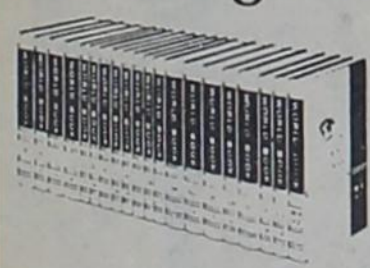
In each of our families we have a traditional or special way that we celebrate this special Thanksgiving season. I hope that each of you have a special Thanksgiving.

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For 1970 --

Announce Sugarbeet Acreage Allotments

Proportionate shares (acreage allotments) will be in effect for 1970 crop sugarbeets. This is necessary in order to avoid excess production. Prentice Mills, Parmer County ASCS office manager said.

The national sugarbeet acreage for 1970 has been set at 1,450,000 acres. The 1969 planted acreage was 1,660,000 acres. Texas is to have 40,784 acres in 1970.

The 1970 sugarbeet program includes the following basic provisions:

1. Set asides of not less than one-half of one per cent of each State allocation will be made for each of the three categories -- new producers, adjustments in initial farm proportionate shares and appeals.

2. Proportionate share allotment areas (such as a territory served by one or more beet sugar companies, a county or a group of counties) will

be established at the option of the State ASCS Committee.

3. If allotment areas are involved, a base acreage for each area will be established by using one of the following:

a. The larger of 70 per cent of the area's 1969 accredited acreage plus 30 per cent of the area's 1967-'68 average accredited acreage during any of the years 1965 through 1969.

b. The area's largest accredited acreage during any of the years of 1965 through 1969.

c. 79 per cent of the area's 1969 accredited acreage plus 30 per cent of its 1967-1968 average acreage.

d. Such other formula selected by the State committee the need for which is justified

and approved by the Deputy Administrator, State and County Operations, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, for application to one or more of the area's accredited acreage records during the years of 1965 through 1969.

4. Area bases shall be factored to the State Allocation less the set-asides.

5. Individual farm bases will be established within each area of a State or within each State if areas are not established by use of one of the methods in item 3 for establishing area allotments, as selected by the State Committee. In land history regions, the history of the farm (as constituted for 1970) will be used. In regions where the personal history of farm

operators is permitted under the Sugar Act, and is used, farm bases will be calculated by using such personal records or a combination of land and personal history.

6. Initial farm proportionate shares will be established by factoring farm bases to area allotments less the set asides or, where areas are not created, to the State Allocation less the set asides. Where appropriate, adjustments will be made in such shares.

7. Marketing within proportionate shares is one of the conditions that a producer must meet to qualify for Sugar Act Payments.

8. A producer desiring a sugarbeet proportionate share (allotment) must file an application for such acreage with the ASCS

Office maintaining his farm records. Applications may be filed at anytime during the period October 27 through November 21, 1969.

Persons desiring further details about the sugarbeet program should contact the local ASCS Office.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced a series of public hearings on wage rates and prices for the 1970 sugarbeet crop.

All of the hearings will be held between December 1 and December 12 in the following cities, all of which are in the major producing and labor supply regions of the sugarbeet area.

First of the meetings will be in Detroit on December 1, with

subsequent meetings in Fargo, N. D., Sacramento, Calif., San Antonio, Tex., and Denver, Colo.

The series will be considered as one hearing, and testimony at each of the places will constitute a part of the same record.

One condition which producers must meet to qualify for payments under the Sugar Act of 1948, as amended, is to pay wage rates not less than those determined to be fair and reasonable by the Secretary of Agriculture after public hearings and investigation.

To obtain the best possible information, USDA requests that all interested persons appear at the hearings to express views and present appropriate data.



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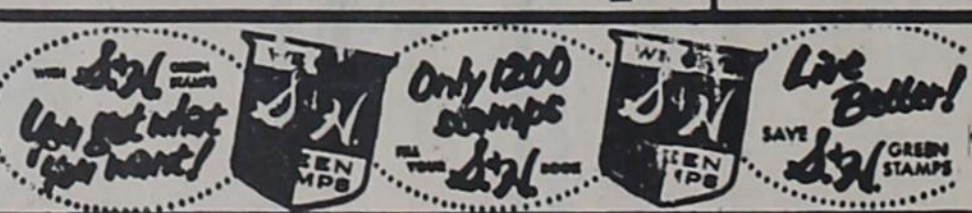

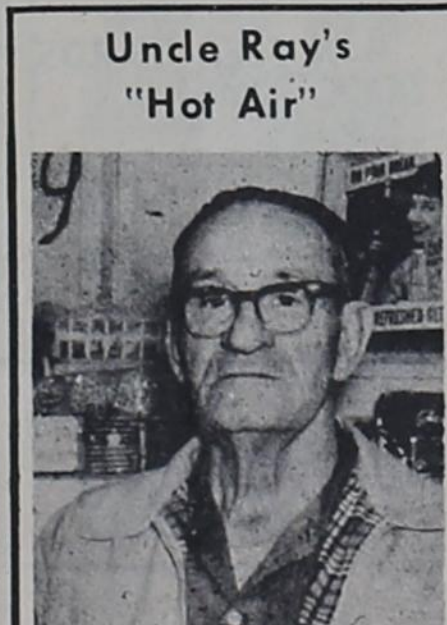

November 14 Lazbuddie Longhorns played a non-district game with Amarillo Alamo Catholic Mustangs, winning the contest by a score of 26-0. In the first quarter Derrell Mathews plowed four yards for a touchdown. The conversion attempt was not good and at the end of the first quarter the Horns had a 6-0 lead.

Derrell Mathews rammed 10 yards for another touchdown in the second period of play and at the end of the half Lazbuddie went to the dressing room with a 12-0 edge.

In the third quarter Lazbuddie tallied again. This time Derrell Mathews sprinted 15 yards for the score.

The fourth quarter saw Arthur Graves take a 12-yard scoring pass from Derrell Mathews to round out the scoring. Mathews also ran the two-point conversion.

The Horns had 18 first downs to six for the Mustangs and 208 yards total offense. Derrell Mathews rushed for 107 yards on 21 carries. The Mustangs could only manage 47 yards total offense.

Last Friday night Lazbuddie journeyed to Matador for the final game of the season. The Longhorns whipped a stubborn Matador team, 28-8.

In the first stanza neither team could muster a sound offense, but in the second quarter Derrell Mathews sprinted 23 yards for a TD to give the Horns a 6-0 lead. As it turned out that was all of the scoring in the first half.

Just minutes into the third quarter Lazbuddie's Derrell Mathews put six more points on the board, crossing the goal line from four yards away. The two-point conversion was made successfully by Arthur Graves.

Still in the third quarter, Jimmy Noland, a tackle, grabbed a blocked punt and raced 33 yards for another Longhorn TD. Arthur Graves again got the call for the conversion and he made it across once more.

The Matadors came fighting back in the third quarter as Ronnie Welling plunged over from three yards out.

In the fourth quarter Matador got a safety when they tackled Arthur Graves in the end zone. Larry Hodges put the game out of reach in the same quarter when he churned across the goal line from ten yards out. This ended the scoring.

Lazbuddie had a total offense of 278 yards. Derrell Mathews rolled up 198 yards with his nifty running and became the area's leading scorer with 152

points. The Matadors totaled 163 yards all together.

Lazbuddie ended the regular season competition with a record of nine wins and one loss. They averaged 33.8 points per game and held their opponents to 5.5 points per game.

Derrell Mathews had 1571 yards rushing for an average of 157.1 yards per game. Larry Hodges totaled 622 yards for an average of 62.2 yards per game. As a team Lazbuddie averaged 296 yards on the ground per game and 85 through the airways. The Longhorns intercepted 18 passes.

Monte Barnes had seven interceptions for one TD and Mike Casey had five thefts. Rene Flores, Derrell Mathews, Charles Lee, Arthur Graves, Mark Barnes and Gail Morris each had one interception to their credit. In the pass receiving department Derrell Mathews came up with seven receptions for two TD's. Charles Lee grabbed 13 aerials for three TD's, Mike Casey, 18 for four TD's, and Arthur Graves, five for two TD's.

Lazbuddie's Bi-District opponent will be the Groom Tigers. The game will be played in Panhandle Friday, November 28, 7:30 p.m.

Groom is a fine team. They have a well-balanced attack and are undefeated going into playoff competition. The Tigers have a good set of running backs in Dan Blackwell (senior, 120 lbs.); Johnny Brittan (senior, 145 lbs.); Larry Clark (junior, 142 lbs.). The offensive line averages 158 pounds and is quick.

They have defeated Turkey, McLean, Wheeler, Vega, Claude, Silverton, Lefors, Texline, Follett and Booker.

Last season Lazbuddie met Groom in Tulia and came out victorious 26-6. This season however, Groom appears to be stronger than last year and the Longhorns can expect a tough battle.

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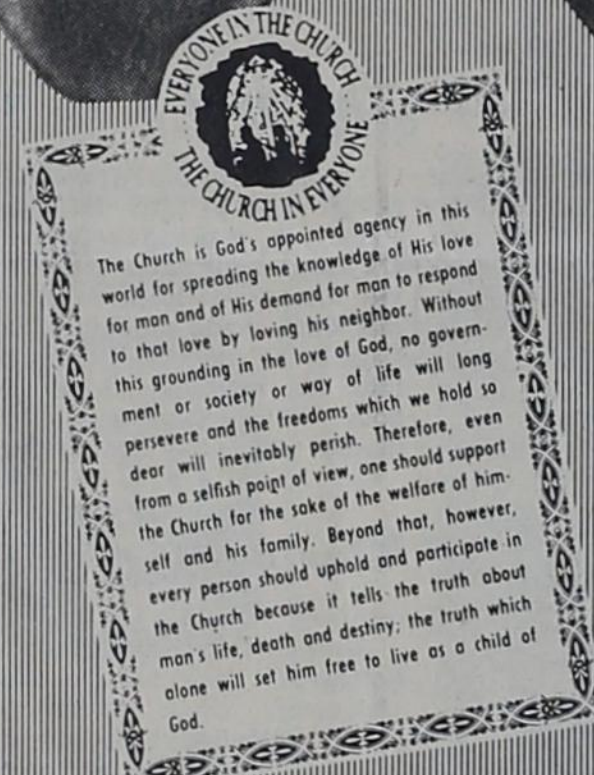

time Monday morning, according to school officials.

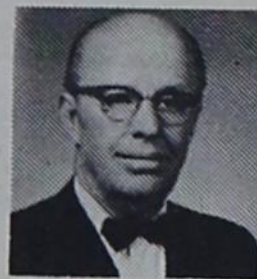

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Food for Thought

In the last two decades the popularity of convenience foods has spread like the morning dew. There's hardly a homemaker left who doesn't use heat-and-eat foods or instant products of some variety.

Even the spice industry has done its part in simplifying life for homemakers. There are now several dozen spice blends that make seasoning foods a cinch.

For example, one that is particularly popular at this time of year is pumpkin pie spice. A judicious mingling of cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves and ginger, it takes the guess-work out of baking that Thanksgiving dessert.

The spicy blend is equally delightful in cakes, cookies, nut bread, rice and steamed puddings. You also can add it to squash, sweet potatoes, or carrots for a different flavor. And just try it in eggnog, or in a chocolate cake, too.

Incidentally, one of the newest things to happen to a turkey is a sesame stuffing. All you do is add one cup of toasted sesame seeds to your favorite stuffing or mix (enough for a 12-to-15-pound turkey). It's great in a corn bread stuffing, too.

And if you want to give your vegetables a new zest for holiday entertaining, try some of the following tricks. Add a pinch of mint flakes to pickled beets. Saute mushrooms lightly with a sprinkle of coriander for seasoning. Skake a bit of cinnamon on tomatoes, fresh or broiled. Add dill to glazed carrots, and fresh ground nutmeg to spinach. Season to taste, of course.

Speaking of these spicy things to taste, reminds us that the holiday season is a good time for cleaning out that spice shelf. Throw away all the little stale dabs left in cans or bottles, and start fresh if you want your holiday cooking to be worth every taste.

Soil Conservationist Says --

Soil Determines Irrigation System

A well-designed conservation irrigation system delivers the required amount of water to all parts of the area to be irrigated at the required accessible rate without damage to the soil or excessive loss of water. It is accessible and easy to operate without obstructing other farming operations. In planning an irrigation system you must know the many factors that effect the design in the area to be irrigated. Factors are the soils, topography, crops to be irrigated, water supply, existing facilities, and available construction and farm equipment.

Soil is the foundation on which a conservation irrigation system must be built. It must be irrigable, that is capable of sustaining yields high enough to pay cost of development plus those of farming operations and maintenance. A farmer must be able to get a profit from irrigation without soil deterioration.

A soil survey is essential to irrigation planning. It is the basis for determining if the soils are irrigable. The location and extent of soils that differ widely must be considered in deciding how an area can be subdivided if necessary, so that suitable application methods and required amounts of water can be determined. The most important soil characteristic is its ability to take up and retain water.

Other soil conditions that affect irrigation are high water table, restrictions to drainage, erosion hazard, plowsoles and compacted areas.

You must know the rate at which water enters a soil under the varying land use and cropping conditions that may occur during the period when irrigation water is applied. Surface sealing, compaction, soil erosion, land leveling, tilling practices, and other factors effect the intake rate of any soil. The intake rate of a soil effects the methods of water application, length of run, and the time of application, which in turn effects the cost of a system.

Know the amount of water a soil can hold available to plants. The water-holding capacity limits the amounts of water which can be applied at any one irrigation. For a given crop

a soil with low water holding capacity requires smaller and more frequent irrigations than a soil with high-water-holding capacity. This is one factor in determining the number of days that can be allowed for applying irrigation water and hence is one basis for capacity and equipment design. The irrigation system must be designed so that water can be applied over the entire field before all the available stored moisture in any part of the field is used by a crop.

For irrigation soil depth is the depth from which a plant extracts moisture. A soil that permits normal root development and penetration provides maximum water storage. Restricting layers, such as rock, severely compacted layers, sand lenses, or a high water table, affect the moisture-storage capacity.

Erosion, by either irrigation water or rain, can be a hazard to the operations and maintenance of an irrigation system. Irrigation should not be planned for land subject to erosion until erosion control measures have been established or are provided for in the farm irrigation system. Some soils are more susceptible to erosion than others.

Topography is a major factor in determining the feasibility of irrigation, selecting the methods of irrigation, estimating the number and kind of water-control structures needed, and determining the need for land leveling.

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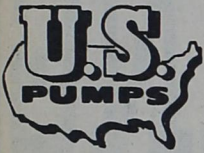
