

Graduation Set for City's Five High Schools

The graduating classes of Coronado, Dunbar, Estacado, Lubbock, and Monterey High Schools will gather in Lubbock Municipal Coliseum at 2 p.m. Sunday, May 18, for the Commencement Sermon.

The five schools will graduate approximately 1948 seniors this year, depending on final grade averages. The graduating classes include 130 students who

completed requirements for diplomas at mid-term and an estimated 61 students who will finish work during summer school.

Reverend Richard Waters, pastor of the Highland Baptist Church, will give the commencement sermon. The invocation will be prayed by Bishop J.E. Alexander of the Ford Memorial Church of God in Christ. Father Michael O'Dwyer of Saint

Joseph's Church will pronounce the benediction.

Music for the program will be presented by an orchestra and choir composed of musicians from all five schools. Dr. George Robinson of Coronado will conduct the orchestra for the processional music, a selection from "Die Meistersinger," by Wagner-Sienicki. Two choral selections will be given. Tim King, director of choral music at Lubbock High, will conduct the selection, "Easter Chorale," by Samuel Barber. James A. Ramsey, director of choral music at Monterey, will conduct the selection, "A Holy Festival," by John Ness Beck.

Platform guests for the commencement Sermon will be Supt. Ed Irons and the five high school principals: Max O'Banion, Coronado; Roy Roberts, Dunbar; E.W. Reed, Estacado; Knox Williams, Lubbock; and B.J. Randles, Monterey.

Seniors will take final examinations Wednesday, May 21. Two schools will have graduation exercises on Saturday, May 24. Dunbar's 144 graduates will have their ceremony in Municipal Auditorium at 8 p.m. Monterey's 634 seniors will have their graduation program at the same time in Municipal Coliseum.

Coronado's 579 graduates will receive diplomas at 8 p.m. Tuesday, May 27, in Municipal Coliseum. The Estacado graduation exercises for 220 seniors will be at 8 p.m. May 27 in Municipal Auditorium.

The graduation exercises for 371 seniors of Lubbock High will be held at 8 p.m. Wednesday, May 28, in Municipal Coliseum.

Also graduating May 28 will be 42 adults who have finished diploma requirements in the Lubbock Evening High School, including five graduates who will receive diplomas from the original high schools they attended. The graduation program is slated for the Smylie Wilson Junior High School Auditorium at 8 p.m.

The last day of instruction in Lubbock Public Schools for students other than seniors is May 28.

Graduation Ceremonies at Texas Tech Scheduled Friday and Saturday

Relatives and friends of the graduates and friends of Texas Tech University are invited to attend commencement exercises Friday night and Saturday, May 16-17, at the university.

The commencement program marks the culmination of the university's 50th anniversary year. Texas Tech President Grover E. Murray and Clint Formby, chairman of the Board of Regents, have joined in an invitation to the public to the Golden Anniversary program.

It will feature a commencement address by Dr. Bevington A. Reed, Texas Commissioner of Higher Education and chief administrative officer of the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System. Reed also was one of the first three recipients of Ph.D. degrees from the university.

Approximately 2,350 graduates will receive degrees in the ceremonies. That compares with 2,116 last year.

The all-university commence-

ment program will be at 7:30 p.m. Friday, May 16, in Jones Stadium, with Dr. Glenn E. Barnett, executive vice president, presiding. In the event of inclement weather, the ceremony will be moved inside the Lubbock Coliseum.

Approximately 1,150 students who completed requirements for degrees last August and an equal number who qualified in December at the end of the fall semester are invited to participate in this spring's ceremonies.

Dr. Murray and Formby also joined in an open invitation to relatives of the graduates to participate in the individual college ceremonies to be held Saturday.

Manpower Training Program to Begin June 9th in Lubbock School District

The new Manpower Training Programs have been announced by the Lubbock Independent School District with classes scheduled to begin June 9. One program is for adult basic education. The other program is designed to prepare adults for the General Educational Development tests that can qualify persons for high school equivalency certificates.

The classes are planned for adults 18 years of age or older who are unemployed or underemployed and who have less than a twelfth grade education, according to Harvy Owen, coordinator of adult education. He said the programs are each scheduled for 100 hours of instruction, three hours daily Mondays through Fridays. Classes will extend to July 25.

Interested adults are invited to apply from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 20, 21, and 22 at Room 313, Lubbock Adult Learning Center, 2013 13th Street.

Owen noted that training allowances of \$2.10 per class hour will be provided under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act for qualified students.

Local Dentist Reprimanded by TSB

The West Texas Times has learned from reliable sources last Tuesday evening that Lubbock City Councilman Dr. Bryce Campbell's license to practice dentistry is to be suspended.

According to the executive secretary of the Texas State Board of Dental Examiners, Carl Hardin, a 60-day suspension is the result of a hearing held last month in Fort

Worth. In addition to the suspension, which will begin in July, Dr. Campbell was also reprimanded and placed on probation for five years. Dr. Campbell, however, has 30 days in which to appeal and ask for reconsideration. It is possible for a re-hearing on the punishment to be held the latter part of this month.

The West Texas Times editor, T.J. Patterson, spoke to Dr. Campbell late Tuesday evening at his home and was told that Dr. Campbell had "no comment."

TSB executive secretary Hardin said the suspension was a result of Dr. Campbell's allowing dental assistants to perform services reserved by state law for the dentist only. The specific infraction was allowing an assistant to make an impression for a crown. The patient was a dental examiner from Austin.

Mrs. Olivia Smith Bradford to Be Honored Here This Sunday Afternoon With Tea

The Ella Iles P.T.A., Faculty and Friends will honor Mrs. Olivia Smith Bradford Sunday, May 18 from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Ella Iles Library at 2401 Date Avenue.

A native of Calvert, Texas, Robertson County, Mrs. Olivia Smith Bradford grew up in this central Texas town. She attended school and was graduated very young from Calvert High School.

Entering Prairie View University she completed her sophomore work. She went to live with an uncle, the late Dr. T.H. Mims in New Orleans, La., where she completed her junior year at Dillard University. Desiring to finish from her home state, she returned to Prairie View and received her Bachelor of Science degree. She received her Master of Education degree at Texas Southern University, and has nine hours above her Master's from Texas Tech University.

Mrs. Bradford is a dedicated teacher carrying on the family tradition for many years. She came from a long line of educators. Her mother, grandfather, and an uncle were principals of schools. A sister and grandmother were teachers. A niece is now employed in the Midland Independent School District.

Prior to coming to Lubbock, Mrs. Bradford worked with her mother in May Pearl, Texas, and received her first teaching experience. She states, "My mother helped me in getting started, and I am very grateful to her." She worked one year at Nash, Texas and one year at Bristol. She became a second grade teacher in the Waxahachie Public Schools. Before leaving the system, she taught typing in the



High School department. She was instrumental through her work in getting commercial courses and Oak Lawn School accredited.

She came to Lubbock in September, 1951 and remained as a second grade teacher at Ella Iles until this year, when she was assigned a combination class of second and third grades.

Mrs. Bradford states, "My first impression of Lubbock was good. I liked here until I witnessed my first West Texas sandstorm. I can remember it well. It grew very dark, I did not know what was happening. I was teaching, windows high, and the sand was blowing, when my principal, Mrs. Mae D. Simmons rushed into the room and said "Miss Smith, it's a sandstorm, pull your windows down". When I looked around sand was everywhere."

During her twenty-four years in Lubbock, Mrs. Bradford has worked under four other principals, Mr. Charles Brown, Mr. Clarence Priestly, Mr. Charles

Johnson, and her present principal, Mr. Charles Harrell.

A faithful member of the Greater St. Luke's Baptist Church, she attends Sunday School, Church, T.Y.P.U., appears on programs and gives demonstrations for her mission and church. Mrs. Bradford stated, "I truly hate to leave my church and members. We have had a good working relationship, and I will always cherish my association with them."

She is affiliated with the National Education Association, Lubbock Classroom Teachers Association, American Childhood Education Association and Texas State Teachers Association. In addition she has done volunteer work with March of Dimes, United Fund and Mental Health. She was an assistant troop leader of the Brownies for 15 years, and an assistant troop leader of troop 113 for about five years.

Mrs. Bradford said, "We have a good system here in Lubbock. I've worked hard and counseled many students. I have seen many of my students go from second graders on through college, and a few are working or substituting in the system now. I do hope that in some small way, I have contributed to their success. I am thankful to God for the many blessings I have received, and I am looking forward to a more relaxed life."

Mrs. Bradford is the daughter of Mrs. Cleo Smith and the late Eugene Smith of Waxahachie, Texas. She is married to Joseph Bradford of Harlingen, Texas, who is employed by the Valley Morning Star, the morning paper of the Valley.

Working Within The System Will Pay Off

The words of George Thomas "Mickey" Leland, III, state representative from Houston, made a lot of sense last week in an interview with United Press International (UPI). The young 30 year old Leland said: "I did not believe in the system at all. I did not think that a person like me could operate in the system. But after being in the legislature for a while, I found there are certain things that can be gained through being in the system."

Although he has been called a black activist, and even admits that he was a hell-raiser and hoodlum in high school and became a civil rights activist, he is in a better position to help the people from the poverty-ridden Fifth Ward of Houston and still be a credit to the black community. Of course, there are still many problems that he would like to see taken care of as soon as possible, but he knows that it will take time.

There are many young aggressive black brothers in Texas who have come to realize that one must get inside the system to see exactly what is going on. It is hard to determine what is happening on the outside looking in.

We can appreciate what Brother Leland said about this great country we live in, and other brothers and sisters throughout the world. He said: "I appreciate this country and the good that it has done. But I'm not a patriot. I'm a citizen of the world. I respect the value of human life in North Vietnam and South Vietnam, in China and Africa. We're all kin to each other. There's no document that can divide us. No national boundaries can divide us."

Working within the system is not a cop-out as some may suggest. Even in the city of Lubbock, we don't have blacks working within the system to get the necessary things which will benefit the entire poor community. A lack of not being where the action is in Lubbock, keeps the "have not community" out of the mainstream of life. This is quite evident with the lack of representation on the city council and the County Commissioner's Court.

We say to Brother Leland to keep on working within the system. It will be hard for him in days, months, and years to come because as he says: "I don't have any peers in the House, not even among the other blacks or the white or Chicano liberals." As we say at the TIMES, when you are able to think with a mind of your own, it's very hard to find any friends.

We hope that the lesson he's gained in the state legislature will be seen and heard by other black brothers and sisters in Texas and the nation. We need people like Brother Leland who will do something constructive at the local, county, state and national level of government. What he's doing, we believe, will bring about a positive change for the benefit of the masses.

West Texas needs someone of Leland's profile at the State House in Austin. As we've said many times to many people, it's a long way to Austin, and not just by miles. Working within the system, whether it be at Austin or Lubbock, will pay off in the long run.

As I See It!

Last week, the House Judiciary Committee approved a bill to extend the Voting Rights Act of 1965. It is hoped that this bill will be urged through the Rules Committee and cleared for action on the House floor as quickly as possible. This is a very important bill in which we all should be concerned about.

For those of you who are not aware of this Bill, H.R. 6219, here are some major provisions which this Bill has for all American citizens:

1. It extends for another ten years the key sections of the Voting Rights Act, mainly those that: (1) enable the federal government to send federal registrars and observers into areas where there is evidence of discrimination in federal elections and (2) require any state or locality covered by the Act to clear changes in voting laws or procedures with the U.S. Attorney General before putting them into effect.

2. It bans literacy tests and other devices permanently.

3. It expands the basic protections of the Voting Rights Act to include "language minorities", mainly persons of Spanish heritage but also American Indians, Asian Americans and Alaskan natives.

4. Citizens who feel their voting rights are being denied would be authorized to bring private suits and, wherever such a case is won, would be eligible to collect attorney fees.

As concerned citizens, all of us should get involved and see that the expiration date for these key provisions of the Act are passed. Although we don't vote as we should in Lubbock and other parts of West Texas, we should at least be concerned in knowing about these matters which exist in our country.

If you are concerned about this passage and would like to do something, there is something you can do before the expiration date of August 6. You can write to the members of the House Rules Committee and explain to them your feeling about this important Act.

Here are the members of this committee: Ray J. Madden (D-Ind.), chairman; James J. Delaney (N.Y.), Richard Bollin (Mo.), B.F. Sisk, (Calif.), John Young (Tex.), Claude Pepper (Fla.), Spark M. Matsunaga (Hawaii), Morgan F. Murphy (Ill.), Gillis W. Long (La.), Joseph Moakley (Mass.),

Andrew Young (Ga.), James H. (Jimmy) Quillen (Tenn.), John B. Anderson (Ill.), Delbert L. Latta (Ohio), Del Clawson (Calif.), and Trent Lott (Miss.).

It would make good sense to write them at once, urging them to report out H.R. 6219 as quickly as possible. It is necessary to keep in mind that House members will take a Memorial Day recess from May 22 through June 2. It would be a big step forward if the House could consider H.R. 6219 and act on it before leaving town for the holiday.

As I See It, it would make good sense to get involved in this type of an effort. Voting is something which affects all of us.

If you read the Police Beat this week, you will read about two cases of "Indecent exposure to young girls" in our community. As parents, let's talk to our young people and tell them of the many problems which they can get into if they don't be careful. The little girls in those cases were only ages ten and eleven. One of those young girls could have been yours as well as mine.

If we see strange people in the community taking advantage of little girls, let's report the incident to the Lubbock Police Department so some of these people will be arrested.

We don't need these kinds of acts occurring in the City of Lubbock, regardless of the location.

With all sincerity, I hope each parent with little girls as well as little boys will tell them to stay out of cars with unknown people. From time to time, it couldn't hurt to check the route they take home from school or any other public place. Think about the welfare and safety of our little girls and boys.

Jim Segrest, general manager of the Buffalo Springs Lake, told me last Friday afternoon that it won't be long before Buffalo Springs Lake will have some Northern Pike. He tells me that this will be the first time ever for this type of fish to be placed into this lake.

It was good to talk to Brother Segrest. Under his administration, Buffalo Springs Lake has a lot of good things going. KISSINGER: FALLING DOMINO?

Washington—Secret military cables place the blame for the quick collapse of South Vietnam directly on President Nguyen Van Thieu.

Thieu left Saigon with a blast at the United States. He blamed untrustworthy Americans for the defeat. The truth is that his own military miscalculations, more than anything else, caused the debacle.

Thieu was indecisive. He gave the order to pull back his troops into a more defensible perimeter, but then could not decide where they should make a stand. He issued orders, then cancelled them.

Finally, the commander of the key Second Military Region, after a meeting with Thieu, returned to his men and announced: "We're pulling out tonight."

They left behind vast stores of weapons and equipment. They also left the First Military Region outflanked. The retreat quickly turned into a rout. As the panic spread, Thieu went into seclusion to wait for an American miracle. He kept insisting to his ministers in the final days that "the Americans can produce miracles."

But there were no miracles. In fact, the chief U.S. "miracle worker," Henry Kissinger, may be the last casualty of the war.

The backrooms of Washington are buzzing with talk that the one-time superstar Secretary of State is on his way out. Many experts believe that the fall of South Vietnam was an inevitable result of the 1973 Paris peace accords, which Kissinger negotiated. The terms granted the North Vietnamese army a formidable foothold in the South.

The Kissinger policy in neighboring Cambodia also crumbled when put to the test. Cambodia was a peaceful, neutralist nation until Kissinger and President Richard Nixon took the war across the border in 1970. Now it is in Communist hands.

Kissinger's failures in Southeast Asia, say our sources, may cost him his job.

Jackie Jottings: Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis is an international superstar; a cult figure who has been a symbol of America. Along with millions of others, we admired her courage and marvelled at her elan. But when, as an historical exercise, we probed behind her public image, we discovered that she was a monetary monomaniac.

We discovered that she entered into a \$3 million contract as a pre-condition of marriage; raised pin money to the level of a six-figure tax shelter; and turned her clothing into a resale industry. She could not manage the functions

of her personal life without a battery of attendants, transporters, lawyers and diversers. She consumes enough of the world's luxuries to provide necessities for hundreds of families.

Jacqueline and Aristotle could not get along, and could not stand each other's friends. He referred to her companions as "faggots," and she routinely snubbed his oil-industry friends.

For example, Ari invited British Petroleum chairman Sir Eric Drake and his wife to Skorpis one summer. Jackie ignored the guests, and spent her time running movies to entertain herself.

When Ari scheduled an important dinner with Mobil Oil President William Tavoulaareas and his wife, Jackie refused to attend. Like a school kid playing hookie, she sent a note instead, falsely claiming that her son John was sick.

Our sources say that Jackie frets a lot lately about her age. She is terrified, they say, of turning 50. When the subject arose recently, she put on a sour face and exclaimed "Ugh!" This concern translated itself into more spending on cosmetics, clothes and beauty treatments.

Contrary to her glittering public image, close friends portray Jackie as a self-centered spendthrift.

Ballet Brouhaha: The Shah of Iran has made enemies of some Washington ballet buffs. The Persian potentate reserved more than 800 seats at the Kennedy Center for a May 17 American Ballet Theater performance.

Some of the regular customers were miffed when they were asked to "voluntarily" exchange their tickets to accommodate the Shah's party.

But the Kennedy Center director Martin Feinstein managed to mollify some of the put-upon patrons by giving them tickets to a special performance by Russian ballet sensation Mikhail Barishnikov.

Obscene Calls: Saturday night, it seems, is the big night for crank calls at the White House. These calls are immediately transferred to Secret Service agents, who tape the conversations. The most prevalent theme, we have been told, is for drunken damsels to proposition the President. The most amusing calls are then replayed to entertain the President's bodyguards.

Drug Bust: The Senate has uncovered widespread corruption in the federal Drug Enforcement Agency. The investigation, spearheaded by Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., has discovered that corruption, including actual drug trafficking, is rife among federal and local narcotics agents. Jackson will also produce evidence that our borders are virtually unprotected against the massive flow of narcotics.

King Caucus: Congressional Republicans have attacked their Democratic colleagues for allowing "King Caucus" to rule the Congress. Despite adopting many reforms, the powerful Democratic caucus is still secret. Now the Republicans have taken the lead. They've voted to open their caucus to the public and press. The Democrats have an open caucus proposal scheduled for debate later this month. But Congressional sources doubt the present proposal will be passed.

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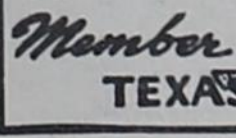

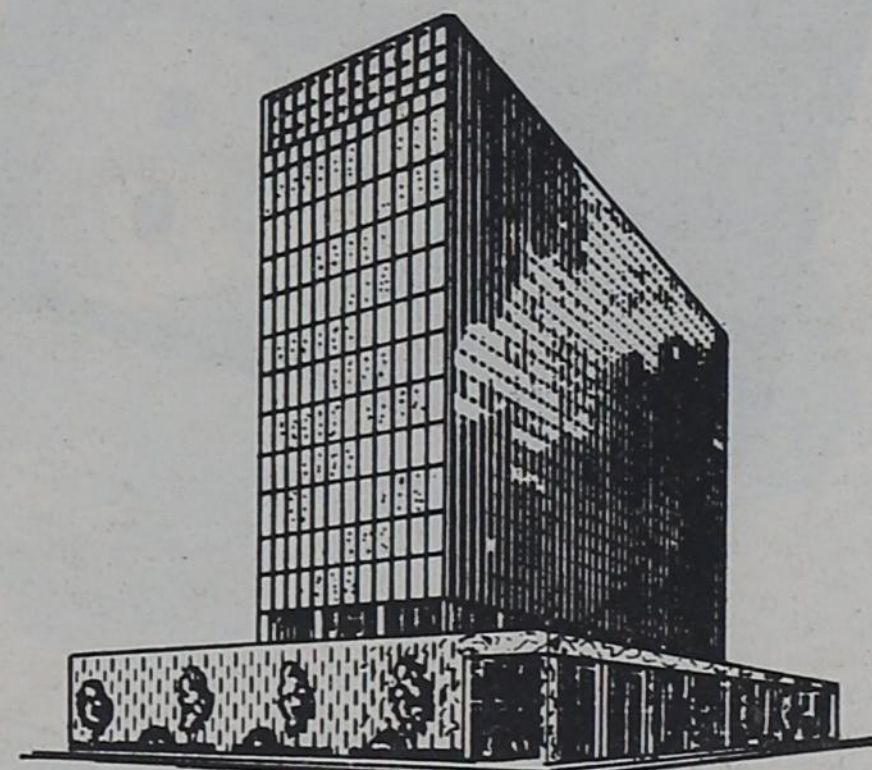
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Dunbar High School News Briefs

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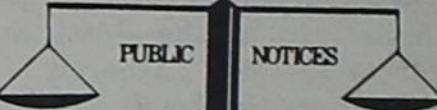
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TITLE I GRANT MODIFICATION AND PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT

The Texas Department of Community Affairs announces that it has submitted a grant modification to the Department of Labor for funding under Title I of the comprehensive employment and training act of 1973. (ceta), P.L. 93-203. The total amount of FY 76 funds available for the entire 161 counties of the balance of state area will be \$17,263,703. Each area within the balance of state shall receive its fair share of the funds allocated. The purpose of these funds will be to provide job training and employment opportunities for economically disadvantaged, unemployed and under-employed persons and to assure that training and other services lead to maximum employment opportunities and assist program participants to become economically self-sufficient. Special emphasis will be given to significant segments of the population which will include, but not be limited to, persons receiving public assistance payments, Vietnam-era veterans, former manpower trainees, and persons of limited English-Speaking ability.
