Phase One Of Library Is Approved

Official word was received this week from the Texas State Library approving part one of the formal application for construction funds for the county library, Jack Miller, chairman of the library board, announced this week.

Miller said that before final approval can be given, two more applications must be submitted after the architect is hired and detailed plans and specifications are submitted and approved. The selection of a building site will have to be completed before the next application is due.

Although we expected \$48,000, the State Library anticipates that we can qualify for a full \$50,000 in matching funds, Miller added.

The next step is to select an architect and after that, to determine a definite site for the library with the help of the architect, library consultants and other knowledgeable people in this area.

When the true cost of the building and construction site are known, there will be a drive for citizens to contribute to the estimated goals.

Without formal solicitations interested citizens and businesses have already contributed over \$4000, Miller said, in addition to the initial gift of over \$100,000.00 given by Mrs. Tylen Perry of Plainview.

Peace Officer Training Available 25-County Area

Peace officer training by the Panhandle Region Police Academy, Amarillo, is serving as a stimulus for trainees to pursue further academic work, according to a quarterly report on the project made public today.

Training is offered by the academy under contract between the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and Amarillo College.

It is supported, for the current year's operation, with a \$17,850 grant from Governor Preston Smith's Criminal Justice Council.

During the quarter ended June 30 basic law enforcement training of 160 hours was given 23 students.

Specialized training in such areas as Narcotics and legal matters, inservice training for sheriffs and a bomb confer-

ence was given 117 peace officers.

All training by the academy is available to all peace officers in the 25-county Panhandle Region. The counties are Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe and Hall.

Because of the college setting for most classes, a number of participants are showing interest in taking additional academic courses at the college, according to the report.

As a result, it is suggested, the training program will yield secondary benefits in the general upgrading of law enforcement personnel in the Panhandle Region.

Delinquency, Drug Abuse Center Receives Grant

Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center, Plainview, will establish a regional treatment center for juvenile delinquency and drug abuse with a grant approved Aug. 13 by Governor Preston Smith.

The award, \$196,480, comes from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U. S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

It will be matched by a local in-kind contribution valued at \$80,047.

Adjudicated delinquents from the 9-county region served by the MH/MR Center will be accepted into the program, which is geared to drug abuse and its residual health problems.

Extensive use of volunteers and community services hopefully will increase the chances of returning the child from his antisocial behavior into the norms of society.

Counties served by the center will include Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Motley, Parmer and Swisher.

The award was among 39 action grant applications and one for a planning grant considered by the Criminal Justice Council at its monthly meeting. Applications totaled \$3,455,547.

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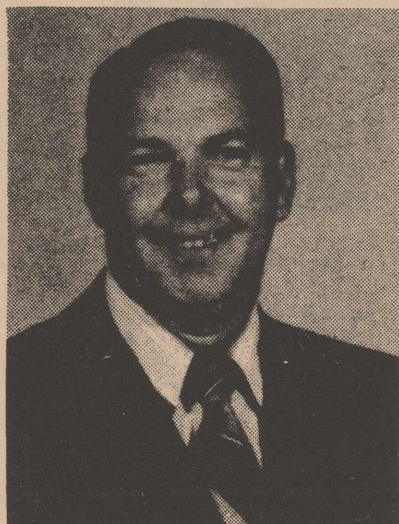
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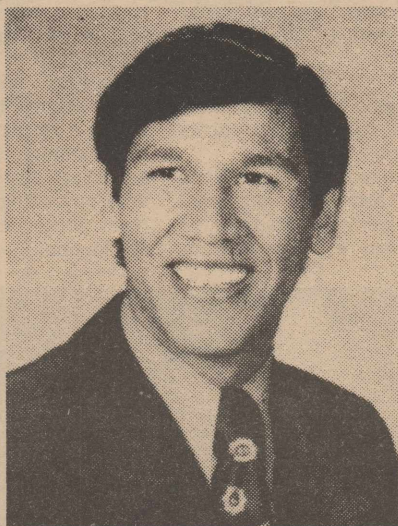

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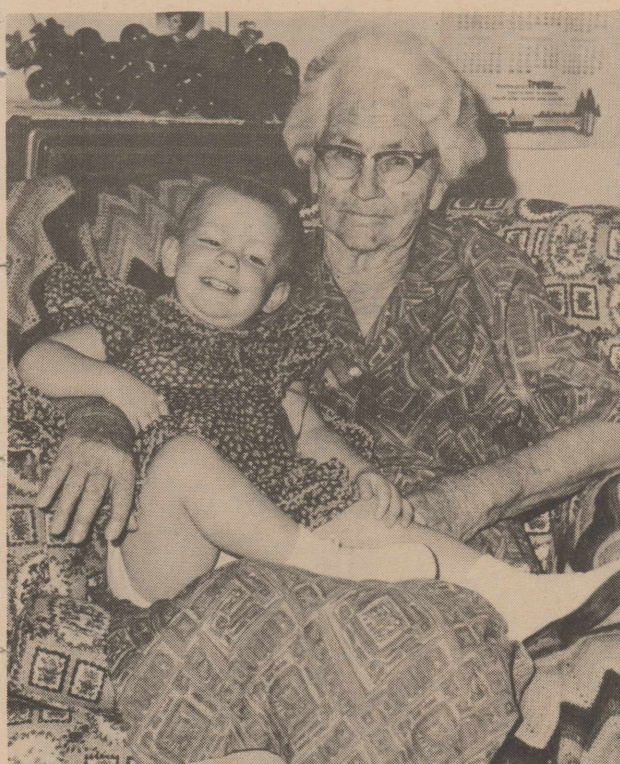
