There is a great need today to attract more college graduates into business and industry so that they may help meet the need for trained manpower.

Recent polls have indicated that some college campus leaders are indicating a preference for careers in government education and the social sciences, rather than business and industry.

But what greater opportunity for creative expression, for example, is possible than in the space program. Certainly no event in our nation's contemporary history has equaled this national accomplishment, in its value to mankind. It's important for young people to understand that NASA, the government agency for the space program, requires the know-how of thousands of private companies for the research, development and inventive genius to make these successes possible.

Business and industry do provide a real opportunity for creative accomplishments, and through effective communication should attract an ever-increasing number of graduates who recognize the challenge and unlimited horizon.

UNCHALLENGED LEADERSHIP

The Chase Manhattan Bank makes regular reports on the spending habits of various segments of the oil industry. And here, as summed up by the employee newspaper of a leading oil company, is what the oil industry in the Western world accomplished during 1964.

Capital expenditures averaged \$34 million a day reaching a record \$12.3 billion for the year — more than a billion above the comparable figure for 1963. More money was spent for production — about 45 per cent of the whole — than for any other single purpose. Identification proportions — 18 per cent — were devoted to marketing and to refineries and chemical plants. New transportation facilities accounted for 16 per cent of the total outlay.

The banks also found that almost equal amounts were spent in the United States and abroad. But the pattern of the spending varied markedly. As in the past, twice as much money was spent in our own country for production as for all other purposes combined. Outside our shores, no more than a quarter of the total outlay went for production.

Another figure found in the bank's survey is significant. After adding up 1964 spending, it was found that the world petroleum industry's gross investment in fixed assets reached a total of \$136 billion. And more than half of that was located in the United States. In this essential field, as in so many others, our leadership is unchallenged — thanks not only to our oil resources, but to the system of competitive free enterprise which puts them to use.

REPORT FROM RHODESIA—Part III

Salisbury, Rhodesia — After talking with many Rhodesians and with Prime Minister Ian Smith himself, I am convinced he is a devout Christian, a devoted family man, a great war hero, a dedicated patriot with great moral and physical courage. And he's even honest! Although he's been a winner in politics for years, he's not even rich. Imagine!

During one's life, one invariably knows many things which just aren't so. Prejudice, misinformation by the press, misinterpretation and disregard for truth are just a few of the reasons we are all so wrong on so many things. The hypocrisy and moral bankruptcy of the world's press and politicians is incredible. Travel is broadening, to coin a phrase. That's because one sees at first hand. Take my trip to Africa. Among the many things I have learned is that there are actually few cannibals in Africa, even in "states" which are members of the United Nations. By cannibals I mean people who eat people for food. I learned on this trip that some of the people-eaters are not really people-eaters at all. They are merely people-tasters. They partake of humans not for sustenance but for ritual. And they eat only certain parts, prescribed by the witch doctor, tribal tradition and Vodoo. These people, whose skin happens to be brown, believe that certain goodies eaten bestow certain qualities on the eater. The top delicacy is the liver, not especially because of its succulence but because these people believe the liver is the source of strength and courage. 112 BILLION DOLLARS

\$112 billion.
One-hundred, twelve billion dollars.
That's the amount of the proposed federal budget, \$112 billion.
Do you realize what this means?

That figure equals over \$2,000 per American family. And that's the amount each family will have to pay—in income taxes, excise taxes, corporation taxes, tariffs, etc.

Over \$2,000 for your family. Is it worth it? Are you getting what you want from this thing we call "government"? Was it your intention to spend \$100 of that money for gifts, bribes and "loans" to people like Tito of Yugoslavia and a hundred other dictators around the world?

When you worked so hard to earn your income, did you have in mind spending a portion of it to reward the Watts district for

calling our attention to their "plight" through the Los Angeles riots?

Did you have a portion of your pay earmarked to subsidize electricity bills around the country? to subsidize sales of commodities to Communist and other foreign countries? to force unions on unwilling employers? to reward less ambitious for not working? to draft unwilling youths who have other things to do with their lives and send them to die in a war that is none of our business?

These are a few of the places where your \$2,000 will go. Don't be fooled into thinking that most of this is only temporary—that the cost is only so high as long as there is a war on. For there will always be a war of some kind because it's good for business. Not necessarily good for private enterprise business, but very good for "government" business.

Without that war in Vietnam, the politician would have a much harder time justifying the taking of \$112 billion of our money.

Wars have always been a help to governments. Randolph Bourne called wars "the health of the state."

The income tax propaganda tells us that Justice Holmes said he enjoyed paying his taxes—because with them, he was buying civilization. Has government brought civilization to Vietnam and those who have been killed there? Has it brought harmony and civilization to labor relations? Did it create civilization in Watts or Selma?

And those many billions for protection and "natural defense"—are they buying protection? Has the draftee who is sent to die been protected by his taxes? Instead of defending us, our "government" thrusts us into the middle of every petty brawl in the world.

Actually, there is only one form of protection we are buying. Those of us who pay taxes are buying protection from our own government, who would otherwise put us in jail for not buying our freedom.

With the figures flying around in the air today, this is a good time to stop and reflect upon the nature of this thing we call "government". Is it protecting you? Is it promoting your welfare?

Or is it merely a tool by which the "ins" protect their own interests at the expense of the "outs"?

Think about it.

Veterans News

The Veterans Administration has received complaints that a private insurance company is distributing printed information in a campaign to sell its policies under the guise that they are GI insurance policies.

The material is mailed in a brown envelope similar to the type used by the Federal Government. Jack Coker, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Waco said.

He pointed out that the material, if read carefully, is not misleading. If, however, it is read quickly, the reader is led to believe that premium rates for the private policy are about the same as GI insurance.

The big difference, Coker said, is dividends paid over the years on GI insurance. The net GI premium is therefore considerably cheaper than that offered by the company distributing printed information.

VA officials in Washington have contacted the Insurance Commissioner of the state where the company is licensed and also given copies of material to the Federal Trade Commission for investigation and any action that the Commission deems necessary.

First Savings And Loan Passes \$5 Million Mark

First Savings and Loan Association passed the 5 million dollar mark in total resources during the month of January according to Albert Dillard, President of the Association.

Since hardboard panels are lightweight, they can be handled easily. They can also be worked with simple handyman tools. The absence of rough grain and knots lets them take paint or stain readily.

Strong and tough enough to take hard outdoor wear as house siding, hardboard panels are also used extensively as accent trim, especially around windows and as gable ends.

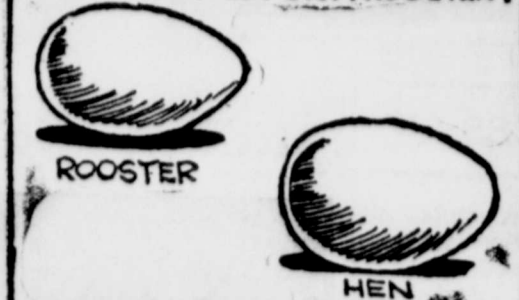

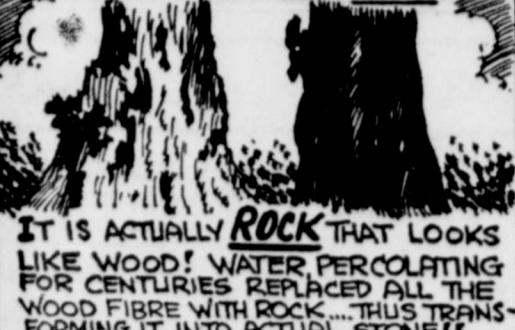

GUN CARE
By Vern Sanford

A good gun can last a lifetime.

Such a guarantee—covering defective material and workmanship—now goes to every purchaser of Browning's O/U shotguns. But there is little reason why most any good gun can't last well beyond the life of its owner. All it takes is a little care.

Too many of us get careless with guns. We fail to clean and oil them properly. We toss them around in the back seat of an automobile, or store them away for several months of the year in some damp spot where rust can develop.

In the olden days much better care was taken of fowling pieces. In the first place, a gun was essential to a man. He needed it for taking food and sometimes for protection. He used black powder, with mercuric primers that would cause corrosion.

Back in those days when the hunter came home he swabbed out the tubes of his shotgun with soap suds, or wiped his rifle barrel clean with a good commercial cleaner capable of eliminating the mercury flakes from the primer.

Then along came the non-mercuric primers. Black powder gave way to smokeless and we

were told it was no longer necessary to clean a gun after every shoot.

Some believed this. As a result their guns became pitted. Not from the effects of the primer and powder, but from handling and moisture that got into the barrels.

If you are shooting a gun every day, it still is a good idea to clean it often. It should be wiped thoroughly with a silicone cloth after every handling.

I know a fellow who has a cabinet containing a dozen or more fine guns. They are behind a locked glass door, away from easy handling. But occasionally some friend does get to look them over. Before they are put back into their rack they are wiped over with the silicone cloth. This prevents any possibility of barrel rust from damp fingers or handprints.

This chap has one gun in his case that is 60 years old. It has been used a lot under almost every condition. First shells shot in it were black powder with mercury primers. But today that gun is just as shiny as it can be. It has no rust spots, even though the blue is worn thin in places. And the wood still retains its polish.

There are many agents on the market today for cleaning guns. Some are solvents, some are inhibitors which can be applied under pressure. Then there are the old reliable oils, any of which will do a good job.

Many gun owners find that a 15c can of household lubricant available in any service station is adequate. It certainly is better than nothing at all.

If you treat your gun properly you won't care whether it is guaranteed for your lifetime or

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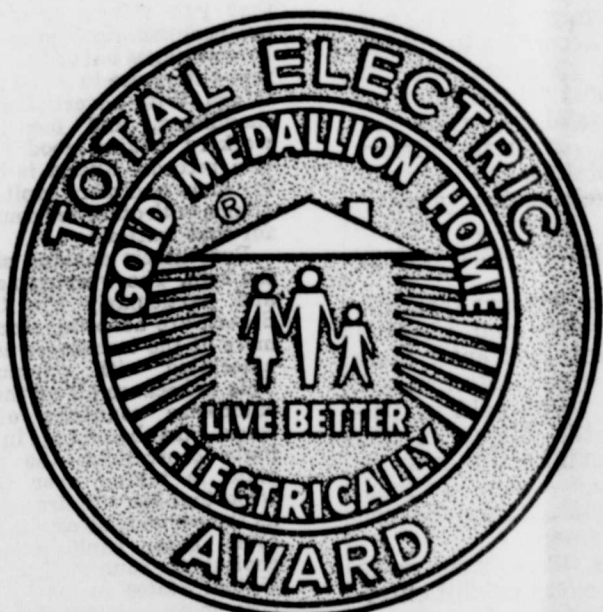

Science Fair Set At Midwestern March 7 To 13

Preparations are being made for the annual Regional Science Fair, co-sponsored by Midwestern University and the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce, to be held on the MU campus, Wichita Falls, March 7-13.

Held during Science Education Week, the fair will be the elimination point for scientific projects bound for the national fair from District 7, as designated by the Texas State Teachers' Association. Counties included in this district are Archer, Baylor, Clay, Ford, Hardeman, Jack, Montague, Knox, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

Any student enrolled in grades 5 through 12 in a private, public or parochial school in this district may enter an original work in the Science Fair.

Exhibits will be classified for judging according to grades and subject matter. Fifth and sixth grade student exhibits will be in the intermediate group; students in grades seven through nine will be in the junior high group.

Entries from grades 10-12 will be classified according to subject matter. The divisions will include biological science (botany, zoology, physiology, medicine, conservation, natural history and related fields), and in physical science (chemistry, geology, engineering, physics, mathematics, astronomy, meteorology and others).

Sweepstakes winners from the biological science and physical science divisions will enter their exhibits in the International Science Fair to be held in Dallas, May 10-13. Entries in this fair come from as far away as Puerto Rico, Japan, Ireland, Spain, Thailand, Korea, France and West Germany.

Certificates have been made available for every exhibit entered in the Regional fair. These include recognition for projects in each division.

Presentation of awards will be made at 6 p.m., Saturday, March 12, in the MU auditorium. Entry blanks may be obtained by writing Dr. Arthur Beyer, Regional Science Fair, Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, Texas.

Comment from the Capital—

WHITHER ARE WE DRIFTING?

Communism is on the move everywhere in the world and gaining power day by day. Many people discuss communism, but very few review the basic philosophy behind a form of government, so dictatorial. I'd like to do so right now.

We know from history that communism doesn't work. It's been tried over and over in the past 100 years and it's flopped every time. It's such a bad form of government, as a matter of fact, that communism has to be forced on people—they will not willingly accept the system! All communist countries have to use secret police to terrorize the population into submission and have to build walls and patrol borders to keep the people from escaping to freedom.

Communism doesn't work because its theory of government doesn't work. Communists believe in a strong central government that can dictate everything. They believe that a super-state can eliminate waste and increase prosperity. It can't. Just take a look at Russia for proof. That country's been living under communism for 48 years now. The people are still poorly clothed, poorly fed, and poorly housed—and there's waste galore because the bureaucrats that run things aren't good businessmen. So Russia has to borrow pages out of the book of free enterprise to make a go of things. With advertising, merchandising, and bonuses to workers making good production records, Russia is becoming more and more capitalist. (Same with other red countries, for that matter.)

But there's another side to the coin. The western nations, and particularly the United States, are adopting more and more of the techniques usually associated with communism. This is because all of the free enterprise countries of the world are becoming increasingly centralized—the super-state is taking over in the west, too! Isn't it strange that as the communist countries become more capitalist, the capitalist countries, with the United States in the lead, become more socialist?

The best place to find out about communist aims and policies is in the *Communist Manifesto*, written by Karl Marx in 1847. This action handbook is still followed to the letter by communists. Marx lists 10 specific steps which, if followed, will practically guarantee the communication of any country. The most important step of all (the building block upon which all the others rest) is a heavy and progressive income tax!

This tax allows government to re-distribute the earnings of the most productive people in the society. Today, we have a situation where it is just about as profitable for a man not to work as it is for him to go out and give an honest day's labor. And by having the money available to dole out, the government can buy the support of the people receiving handouts.

It is ridiculous that the people in this country have to pay close to \$40 billion dollars a year in taxes to the federal government, without having a say as to how it is spent. Doesn't it seem that the individual states could do a better job in providing what is needed for their citizens? Why does the federal government have to be the middleman? It takes money from the people and then redistributes it to the people—but there's overhead all along the way, and we have to pay for that!

Marx also called for the free, compulsory education of children in state-run schools.



Now I'll be the first to admit that the federal government doesn't control the subjects every schoolchild learns. But I'll also point out that the federal government is having more and more to say about what subjects are taught in school, who teaches them, and how they are taught. Government control always follows governmental money—and government money is starting to pour into local school systems. The handwriting is on the wall.

Another of the 10 steps toward communism calls for the abolition of all rights of inheritance. Increasingly heavy taxes are helping to bring this step closer and closer to reality.

The manifesto calls for a central bank, with the central government managing the currency. That has already come to pass in this country. With the gold and silver backing for our money removed, currency can be artificially regulated by the government

at will—it can print what it wants and not worry about having the gold to back it. Just to see how bad the situation really is, why not this—check the next 100 dollar bills you get. Now many are Silver Certificates (they're the bills backed by hard metal). I'll bet you get more than 10! All the rest will be Federal Reserve Notes—bills created by the government and spent by the government.

Control over communication and transportation, another communist step, is with us in an altered form. Agencies such as the Federal Communications Commission, the Civil Aeronautics Board, and the Interstate Commerce Commission enforce the views of the bureaucrats in power. They can, and do, grant licenses to people or businesses they favor and deny them to others.

I ran across a small item in the newspaper the other day that, at first glance, had nothing to do with this subject. It seems that forest rangers in our great western national parks are complaining about the eating habits of the animals. The bear and deer have become so used to being fed by tourists, that they forget how to fend for themselves. They refuse to go out and search for food. The rangers have to feed the animals all during the last months when the parks are closed and the tourists have gone. Isn't the same thing happening to us? Aren't we becoming so used to going to the public trough for handouts that we're forgetting how to fend for ourselves? You know, Marx was no fool. He recognized that communism would have to be imposed gradually so as not to alarm the people. Isn't the yoke of slavery being quietly dropped into place around our necks as we stand around enjoying the doles being handed out by an ever-swelling welfare state?

Think back. I can remember when people would refer to it as "my government." Then it became "the government." Today, more and more, you hear "the government's people." The government, once the servant of the people, is rapidly becoming their master—and a ruthless master it will be.

Just to convince yourself how far down Marx's road of communism our own country has traveled, why not get a copy of the Manifesto and read it. Then ask yourself, "Whither are we drifting?" and think about it until you get an answer!
