

Friday night's C of C banquet is expected to draw crowd of 300

Advance ticket sales indicate that a crowd of approximately 300 persons will attend the annual banquet of the Post Chamber of Commerce here Friday night. J. B. Potts, president of the organization, said today.

"We've already sold 250 tickets and should easily sell 50 more by the time of the banquet," Potts said.

The place selected for this year's banquet, the Post Junior High gym, will easily accommodate 300 people, Potts said.

"And we hope there are that many on hand," the Chamber president added.

To avoid confusion, Potts said, those attending the banquet are asked to remember that the present junior high gym, where the event will be held, is what was formerly the old high school gym.

Demonstration of the banquet quarters was under way today by members of the high school's Future

Homemakers of America chapter. Potts asked that those who do not already have their banquet tickets to purchase them at the Chamber of Commerce office or from one of the directors. Tickets will also be sold at the door Friday night," he said.

Starting time of this year's banquet is 7 p. m. "We're starting it early and should get through early, since we do not have too long a program," Potts said.

Guest speaker at the banquet will be Charlie Gibson of Greensboro, N. C., who is president of Burlington Industries, Inc.'s mill division.

Postex Cotton Mills, the local unit of Burlington's mill division, is one of two industries to be honored at this year's banquet. The other is Brown Bros., et al, oil operators, of which E. R. (Buster) Moreland is manager.

The two industries are being hon-

ored at this year's event because of their outstanding contributions to the Post community and its

trade territory throughout the years they have operated here.

Gibson will be introduced by Phil Crenshaw, manager of radio station KUKO, who will serve as master of ceremonies.

There will be dinner music by George M. Willson, head of the Post schools' vocal music department, and special music by the "Ambers", a men's quartet.

Outgoing president Potts will install the new officers, who include Charley Luttrell, president, and Frank Blanton, vice president. The organization's new secretary, Helen Livingston, will also be introduced.

Recognition of Postex Mills will be in charge of Irby Metcalf Jr., with S. E. (Shelley) Camp in charge of recognition of Brown Bros.

This will be the first banquet in several years at which the Chamber of Commerce has not honored

an outstanding man and woman of the community.

"We felt that it was time that we give recognition to two industries of the community which have contributed so much and to their employees," Potts said.

In addition to the officers—outgoing and incoming—directors will be recognized at the banquet. The present board, following the recent directors' election, is composed of: Louie Burkes, Robert Cox, Ed Sawyers, S. E. (Shelley) Camp, T. B. Odam, Blanton, Victor Hudman, Metcalf and Mike Mitchell.

Toughest part of project

White River core trench completed

The toughest part of the White River dam project is reported as now completed—the installing of a clay core trench down through all the river sand to prevent underflow of water beneath the new dam.

The core trench effort, which has required the first few months of work by Contractor Steve Luce, was finished Sunday.

Work is now being speeded on the actual dam construction above the river bed.

The dam is scheduled "to be closed" about September according to present estimates, which will permit completion of the project on schedule barring unforeseen difficulties.

Voters 'OK' road bonds

Contracts for the four-laning of U. S. Highway 84 northwest of Post are expected to be let before 1963 is out following Saturday's smashing approval of the \$85,000 bond issue to help purchase Precinct No. 1's share of the right-of-way.

The bond issue—reportedly the first ever approved in County Commission Precinct 1 history—carried by almost an 8 to 1 margin.

The final count was 389 votes in favor of the bonds as against only 50 opposed.

The 439 total vote represented approximately 75 per cent of the paid poll taxes in the precinct, a very heavy vote for a special election.

The closest margin, barely better than 2 to 1 came at the Pleasant Valley box, the No. 7 voting precinct, where 27 approved the bonds and 13 were opposed.

At Close City, the No. 5 box, the margin was slightly better than 5 to 1 with 31 endorsing the bonds with ballots and only six voting no.

The Southland voting box, No. 2 voting precinct, came in last—at 7:45 p. m. via phone—with the biggest margin of all for the bonds, 11 to 1. The vote there was 36 to 3 in favor.

Close City's box reported first by phone at 7:05 p. m. Pleasant Valley's was the next with precinct workers bringing in the results by car at 7:15 p. m. The big North Post box set something of a record in counting time by turning in just 30 minutes after the polls closed at 7:30 p. m.

Highway Engineer Julian F. Smith told the Dispatch minutes after the final results were in that "highway department plans for the four-laning of the 15 mile stretch from the top of the Cap to the Lynn County line will be ready by the time the right-of-way necessary is purchased and cleared."

He estimated that six to eight months time will be required to purchase right-of-way and clear the utilities.

He predicted a contract letting at least by December, maybe earlier. He said it would come within 30 days after the right-of-way purchases are all made.

"If we have no problems there we may be ready for the contract in six months," Smith said.

He added that completion of the "technical planning" for the four-laning will take three to four months to complete, that "we already know what we are going to do and the plans are about 25 per cent complete."

The bond issue got a united supporting effort from the Post Chamber of Commerce, county officials, and a good-size group of community-spirited citizens who spent last Friday and Saturday working hard "to get the vote out."

When the polls opened, it then got a heavy endorsement from the voters with no last minute opposition developing.

Concrete plant to be sold to Brady firm

The Post Ready Mix Concrete Co. has sold its local concrete plant to the Young Ready Mix firm of Brady and the equipment will be moved from Post to Brady by the end of this month, George Booher, manager of the local operation, announced today.

Booher said he will continue to operate his portable concrete plant at the White River dam site until that construction is completed and then may move it back into Post, if it isn't required elsewhere.

Directors authorized payment of bills and discussed the district's financial situation.

It was announced the Civil Court of Appeals at Amarillo has set April 2 for the hearing of the district's appeal on the condemnation award last fall on the purchase of the actual dam site acreage.

Contracts let for 'phone exchange building, lines

Caprock Telephone Co., Inc., of Spur has awarded contracts for construction of an exchange building and for poles, lines and other equipment for the new telephone exchange that will serve Post and its trade territory.

At the same time, the Spur company let contracts for a new exchange building at Flomott, in Motley County, and for lines to serve subscribers in Motley, Briscoe and Hall Counties.

The contract for both exchange buildings went to the B. D. Click Co. of Abilene on its bid of \$10,684, the lower of two submitted. About one-half of that amount represents the sum to be spent on the exchange building in Garza County, which will be located on a recently acquired site six miles north of Post on the Spur Highway.

Stake Construction Co. of Lennox, S. D., was awarded the contract for the pole lines on its bid of \$169,461.50, the lowest of a number submitted by construction companies in seven different states.

The Garza County portion of that contract is also about half the total amount, according to James Wright, manager of Caprock Telephone Co., Inc.

Wright said engineers have completed setting stakes for the outside construction and will complete the same preliminary work for the exchange building within the next week.

Construction of the new lines are

expected to begin within 30 days and will require some 100 construction days, excluding Sundays, Wright said.

Construction on the new exchange building for Garza County will begin as soon as the engineers are through staking.

The new telephone system will provide service into and from Post for areas of the county that are now without telephone service.

Speaker tells Rotarians

\$45,000 improvements slated at Camp Post

An estimated \$45,000 worth of improvements for Camp Post, the South Plains Council Boy Scout camp southwest of Post, are planned for 1963, Post Rotarians were told Tuesday by Bill McElroy of Slaton, area Scout executive in a talk on Boy Scouting.

A new kitchen and a new dining room to seat 250 are planned at a cost of \$14,000. Four new troop campsites will cost \$5,500.

A headquarters building and health lodge will be built at a cost of \$11,500 and a food storage building for \$3,000.

'63 dog license tags on sale at City Hall

The new 1963 dog license tags have arrived and are now on sale, Wynelle Holland, City of Post secretary, said today.

A city ordinance requires that dogs be licensed after being vaccinated against rabies.

The license fee is \$1 each for all dogs.

In addition, some \$5,000 in repairs will be made to the camp swimming pool and \$5,000 for the camp's water system.

McElroy said a \$162,500 capital campaign for the South Plains district is just getting under way, with half of the money going for camp improvements at three camps and half for a new headquarters building, equipment, and visual aid library. The South Plains Council headquarters building already is under construction, McElroy said, just off the circle in south Lubbock.

At the present time Post's scouting program includes 82 Cub Scouts, 69 Boy Scouts in three units, and 17 boys in one Scout Explorer unit.

The Post Rotary Club has sponsored one of the local Scout troops for the last 37 years.

James Mitchell, owner of Garza Auto Parts here, was elected president of the Post Rotary Club for the 1963-64 club year at a meeting of the club's new board of directors Tuesday afternoon.

He will take office July 1, succeeding Louie Burkes as head of the civic organization. Burkes will become vice president, a post assumed by the retiring president.

Claud Collier was elected treasurer and Henry Tate, secretary. Collier will begin his new duties immediately, succeeding Walter Johnson who is resigning from the club. Tate will assume office July 1.

New club directors elected by the club at its Tuesday luncheon were Bob Mason, Wesley Scott, Collier, Harold Teal, and Tate. Holdover directors next year will be Burkes, Rev. Ed Herring, and Bobby Pierce.

Wednesday, March 6, is the deadline for candidate filing for the school board election. The terms of Malcolm T. Bull and Bobby Pierce are expiring.

The Forrest Lumber Company will close its Post yard at 302 West Eighth Saturday afternoon after 14 years of operations here.

Walter Johnson, manager of the yard for nearly 11 years, said the yard closing decision was announced Monday. Johnson, who has been associated with the Forrest Lumber firm since joining them at Slaton in February, 1952, will be transferred to the Lubbock yard of Forrest.

Johnson said the company, which owns the local yard property, plans to sell or lease its property here.

The closing of the local yard reduces the number of yards operated by Forrest from ten to nine.

Outstanding community effort

Overwhelming approval given the \$85,000 U.S. 84 right-of-way bond issue in Precinct 1 Saturday shows the public's concern for good area highways and its real appreciation of the state highway department's road programming and cooperation with Garza County.

The bond election, besides that, was strong proof of what a united community effort can do. Getting almost 75 per cent of the poll tax list to the polls, even when the oldsters are not figured in the percentage, is a tremendous accomplishment.

It was made possible through cooperation, coordination, good planning and person-to-person "get out the vote" contacts.

As one who played a prominent role in the election's success commented when the results

were in, "It proves it can be done—and done well if we work at it."

The bond issue was by far the best community effort since the White River dam project was endorsed several times at the polls.

Your Chamber of Commerce played a leading role. It proves what such an organization can accomplish.

Probably even more important to the community and area in the long run than the voting of the highway bonds Saturday was the demonstration to all concerned what can be accomplished through real community work and cooperation.

That kind of a maximum effort—if projected into this area's future—can win us many new and important benefits in the years ahead.—JC

Hospital report gratifyin' one

The Garza Memorial Hospital report made to Post Rotarians last week was a gratifying one to the community at large. Not too much has been printed over the years about hospital finances.

It was indeed nice to know that for the last five years the hospital has been operating "in the black" and that the hospital has been able to pay back much of its early losses, thus enabling the county to retire the hospital bond issue several years ahead of schedule.

It is anticipated by all concerned that the bonds will be completely retired next year.

The fact that hospital expansion—more beds and additional equipment—looms as a future need should not bring any qualms to citizens in general.

The community in the last decade has grown in hospital usage to the point where the facilities are being utilized virtually to capacity. For a

continuation of such fine service more bed space and additional equipment for even better care will be needed.

We feel sure when the time comes for hospital expansion the county will not hesitate to provide the funds. Few counties we know of have done as well with a hospital program to take care of its own.

The hospital trustees, the county commissioner's court, Hospital Administrator Don Curl, the staff of doctors, and the hospital staff are to be commended for an excellent job well done.

Putting "frosting on the cake" so to speak have been the "pink ladies" of the hospital auxiliary who have not only made a very necessary and worthy contribution to the hospital's operations but have firmly imbedded the hospital in the community's heart.—JC

Headway on planning project

Two more city planning studies for the future of Post—one on local housing and the other on immediate and future utility needs—were presented to the City Planning Commission here last week by a Dallas firm of consulting engineers which has been working the past year on the project.

Three more reports are to come before the final report which will include a wrap-up of all the firm's recommendations. The three other reports before the final are (1) capital budget, (2) zoning, and (3) subdivision regulation proposals.

Each of these reports—five have been made to date—are printed, with the city superintendent having a number of copies. Interested citizens are welcome to check them out and study them as long as they are returned in a proper time.

The city planning project by the firm is a

federal aid one for the city and is aimed at projecting all the city's community needs for the next 20 years.

As we understand it, the capital budget report which is coming up next will contain the recommendations as to how best to finance the necessary improvements and program them in an even flow over the years.

When the zoning report is in, the city planning commission will get to work on a zoning ordinance which the community badly needs for property owner protection.

The reports we have seen to date are excellent ones on each phase covered. The firm searches for the facts involved and then develops its recommendations from the data. All is carefully laid out in the report along with reasons for the recommendations made.—JC

This is one of the teams in which I participated that went to the state contests. Vocational Agriculture III

Since enrolling in Voc. Ag. my freshman year of high school I have learned a great number of things.

The first year in Voc. Ag. is most important of the four-year course. In order to pass the first year we had to be able to name every breed of beef cattle, dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, and poultry. We had to be able to recognize these breeds as well. Also in my first year of Ag. I was very lucky to be on the land judging team, this is a contest that ties in with the GCS. We placed eighth in the state.

In V. A. II we started learning to weld and use a cutting torch. We had a meats team in which we had to know every cut of meat that comes from a lamb, beef, or pork

carcass. We were also required to grade the carcasses according to USDA regulations. We won area in this.

In this, my third year of Ag. we have already broadened our knowledge on many different subjects. We have worked on the harder points of welding and have had a Parliamentary Procedure team that ranked fourth in the state.

All of the contests are carried on by the FFA and are for members of Voc. Ag. who are in FFA.

Some people think that Voc. Ag. and FFA are for boys who are going to be farmers only. This is not true. In land and meats judging alone there are over a dozen fields of work one can enter.

At the present we are working very hard on livestock judging in which we hope to do real well.

Junior High reporter says 'okay' world's most widely used phrase

Can you name the most widely used phrase in the whole world? Okay, we'll tell you: It's "O. K." Experts have long puzzled about its origin.

One theory was that "okay" came from the Choctaw Indian word "okeh," meaning "it is so." Experts later discovered this theory—but not before it had cropped up in several dictionaries and encyclopedias.

The opponents of Andrew Jackson gave rise to another explanation. Jackson, who grew up on the frontier, never learned to spell well. To poke fun at this weakness, political enemies spread the rumor that he approved papers with an "Oll Korrek" or simply "O. K." It made a good story, but it wasn't true.

One theory gained wide acceptance. A printed example of "O. K." appeared in a presidential campaign of 1840. The secret O. K. Club of New York supported Democrat Martin Van Buren for a second term. Van Buren was a native of Old Kinderhook, a village in New York State. Hence the "O. K."

Now a new theory moves the origin back to Boston in 1839. This year Boston papers started a craze for using initials in place of words. "It shall be done" became "I. S. B. D." Then papers went even further by using incorrect first letters. "H. S. M. J." was short for "Huff said 'mong gentlemen," and says the newest theory, "O. K." for "Oll Korrek."

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Garza pool reopened with 4 completions

Dr. Sam G. Dunn of Lubbock has reopened Duffy Peak (Glorieta) production in north central Garza county with the completion of four wells in the field area in Section 31, Block 8, H&GN Survey, 1 mile northeast of Post on the L. Gordon lease.

The No. 1 Gordon potential for 2.25 barrels of oil per day plus 40 per cent water from perforations 100-120 feet. It was dug to 3,109 feet with 4½-inch casing set at 3,100 feet.

It spots 230 feet from north and west lines of the southwest quarter of Section 31.

The No. 1-A Gordon, at 850 feet

from north and 1,000 feet from west lines of Section 31, gauged 13.55 barrels of oil per day plus 50 per cent water from perforations 3,076-88 feet.

The No. 2 Gordon potentialized 10.84 barrels of oil plus 35 per cent water from perforations 3,075-90 feet at 330 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of Section 31.

The No. 3-A Gordon potentialized pumping for 10.83 barrels of oil and 45 per cent water from perforations, 3,044-48 and 3,053-63 feet.

All perforations in 4½-inch casing were fractured with 500 gallons of fluid. Gravity oil was 33 and no

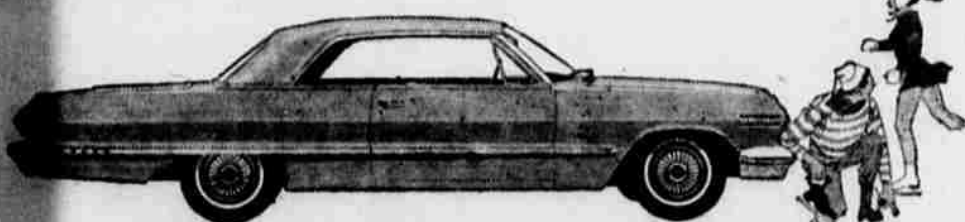

This is for worm fishermen . . . the folks who use those live, natural baits with the long, squirming bodies.

Campaign is on for home safety

AUSTIN—The Texas Safety Association today urged Texans to put safety "first" in the home to stop an apparent increase in fatalities and injuries from accidents.

"Preliminary accident reports for the past months show that home accidents are taking a high toll and that the public will have to become more safety conscious to stop this needless loss of lives," J. O. Musick, general manager of TSA, said.

Reports indicate that approximately 200 persons died and another estimated 1,800 were injured in home accidents in January. Fires, falls and poisonings from gases and vapors accounted for the majority of the fatalities.

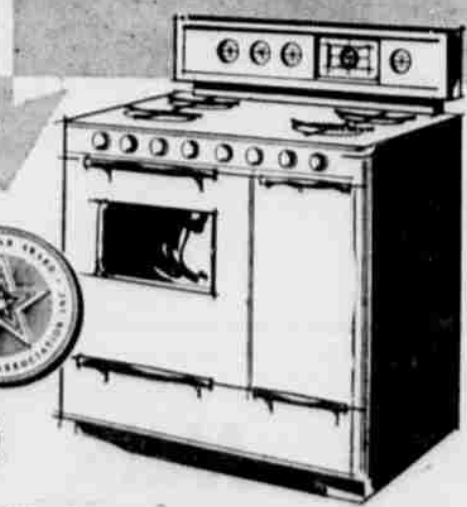
