

Steers Win Bi-District Go, 20-28

Now, As I Saw It . . .

Going into the game as the underdogs, the Farwell Steers scored an upset the past Friday afternoon by downing a favored Follett Panther squad, 28-20, in the bi-district game for title to the region embracing District 1-B and 2-B in six-man football.

Despite the weather, which included a dash of snow, sleet, rain and plenty of stiff north wind, a good crowd assembled at an improvised field at Follett. The new field was marked off on the prairie following rains of the day before which had put the regular playing field under water. And among the fans were frantic and half-frozen Steer followers, who trailed their team through a perfect 1947 season, in which the locals racked up eight consecutive wins.

Representatives of station KICA, Clovis, were also on hand for the bi-district playoff, and a recording of the play by play was made and broadcast to fans over the area on Saturday, sponsored by business firms of the Twin Cities.

To Have Trophy

As winners of the championship game, which incidentally, is as far as six-man competition goes, the Steers will put into the display case at the school a trophy—and business men have already started a fund for a gold football. In addition, Coach Jack Williams reported today that the squad also hopes to secure the football used in Friday's game, which will be inscribed with the names of the players and placed in the trophy case as a proud memento.

Robertson, Hart, Sheets and Graham were all playing their last game for Farwell and turned in a game to be long remembered. Hart's hard running was outstanding, as was Robertson's signal calling and Sheets' drop-kicking, in addition to his 80-yard run for a touchdown.

Big Don Ford, soph, turned in a sparkling game from his end position offensively as well as his half-back position defensively. Thomas played the best game of his career. He wouldn't be carried out of play and caught two touchdown passes. Big booming Booth was superb. He was in the Follett backfield all afternoon and his powerful kickoffs, which went completely out of the park, were something to see. His hard tackling saved many yards, and probably more scoring on the part of Follett.

The first half proved almost a draw for the two competitors, with neither squad appearing sufficiently strong to stop a goal-bound attack. The Steers held a slight edge, coming out 14-12 by virtue of Sheets' placement kick. Third quarter play was also to and fro, but onlookers agreed that the fourth period belonged to Farwell.

Cecil Wynn, mainstay of the Follett team, was as good as reports prior to the game had indicated, but the cold fact remained that his assistants did not measure up to the ferocity of the Farwell defense. As one onlooker put it, "I never saw a Farwell man fail to block, tackle or dive into the fray during the game." Wynn, in the judgment of the sidelines, was by far the best high school player seen in many years. He did everything well, on both offense and defense.

Several substitutes were used by the Follett squad, but the Steers used only one sub, Graham, who replaced Thomas and went to center as Sheets, regular center and place-kick artist, shifted into the backfield. Hart, Booth, Ford, Sheets and Robertson went the whole way for the locals.

The Steers came from behind twice in the game, overcoming a 6-0 lead by a touchdown and placement kick early in the second period, and again edging ahead 14-12 after both teams scored touchdowns in the second quarter. After that, they held a lead throughout.

First Quarter

Opening up the game, Follett got the ball on their own 15. On the first try Heil netted six over right tackle, with Sheets and Ford taking him down. Heil then lost four, but C. Wynn retaliated, taking the ball to the Farwell 20 on a long run. Heil went around left end for two and was snared by Robertson; C. Wynn added one yard and then passed to Roach, on the 18, where Robertson and Booth hammered him down. Heil gained four, then five, then seven, putting the ball on the five; C. Wynn carried to the 1-foot marker, and then made the first count, standing. The kick was bad, and the score stood 6-0.

Follett kicked, Hart received and handed the ball off to Sheets, who ran to the 30. Robertson lost five,

Although the story has no doubt been stretched to some extent by those who greatly enjoyed Sheets' display of football strategy, this is the way it went when a Tribune reporter heard it . . .

Ted, like other sideline quarterbacks, always gathers at the local drug store to talk with other fans and gather observations on previous games. Sheets was one of the very first to be there last Saturday morning, however, as he was anxious to

tell those who had not observed the game just exactly how Harry performed.

As soon as he had a crowd large enough to justify a detailed report, Proud Papa began to orate excitedly. Increasing the tempo with waving arms and frantic gestures, Sheets ripped off his coat and began to tear around the drug store floor at an amazing pace, stiff-arming, dodging, executing perfect crossovers and grimacing uninvitingly.

As a grand climax to the 80-yard gallop, he charged through the door of the store with a loud war-whoop and has not been seen since by the businessmen.

P. S.—Sideline observers at the actual game Friday say that Ted's performance was even more inspiring than son Harry's, as he gesticulated and squirmed his way down the edge of the field to "assist" Harry.

Farwell-Bovina Exes Play Thanksgiving

Asked as to whom was coaching the Bovina players, one of the stars laughed and reported, "We aren't working out—don't intend to get sore before the game. We're studying up on a few plays, and will put on uniforms for the first time Thursday."

The locals will also be definitely out of practice, save perhaps Don Williams, who played with Farwell last year, but fans should get their money's worth just by watching their antics.

Game time is 2:30, with admission set at \$1 for adults and 50c for students. The affair is sponsored by the American Legion. Referees will be Edelman and England of Friona.

Cold, Snow Leaves Little Moisture

The coldest weather of the winter season, accompanied by a light snow left little moisture here over the past weekend.

A light snow, which covered the ground about a half inch, fell here Friday morning, following the lowest reading of the season early that morning, when the mercury dipped to 18 degrees above.

Wheat growers began sounding a pessimistic note early this week after a full week of cloudy and cold weather failed to bring any appreciable moisture, and most of them now agree that there is little chance that a wheat crop will be made here next year.

Retired Minister Is Buried At Bovina

Parmer Farmers Approve Soil Conservation Plan

TO ATTEND FUNERAL

Mr. and Mrs. Paul Wurster, accompanied by his step-father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Earl McCollum of Portales, left here Wednesday for Wichita, Kansas, where they will attend the funeral of H. E. Sweetland, 40, of that city.

Sweetland, who is Wurster's brother-in-law, died of a heart attack at Cheyenne Falls, Colo., Monday morning, as he was preparing to leave that city after transacting business. Burial will be made in Wichita on Friday of this week.

Frank Read, Friona Resident, Dies On Ranch In Colorado

Word was received here Tuesday of the sudden death of Frank Read, age 65, at the ranch headquarters of Pete Buske, near Springfield, Colo.

According to information reaching here, Read is believed to have died of a heart attack while engaged in doing the chores about the ranch headquarters. His body was found on Monday morning by neighbor, and it is understood here that he had been dead several hours when discovered.

Read was a pioneer citizen of Parmer County. For a number of years he and his brother, Bill, owned and operated the Star Ranch in the Lazbuddy community, and served as County Commissioner from that district. The depression following World War I caused the financial collapse of the Read Brothers and Frank had been making his home in Friona during recent years, where he lived with his family. The brother is understood to be in Iowa.

Read's wife and several children survive. No announcement has been received here as to funeral plans.

More Firemen Needed To Man Department

The urgent need of additional manpower to properly operate the Texico-Farwell Volunteer Fire Department was brought to the attention of those attending the regular meeting of the Mens' Club, last Thursday evening.

Odin Huggins, clerk, and Felix Monroe, newly named assistant chief appeared before the Club and urged the business men of Texico and Farwell to support the department. It was brought out in the discussion that at present, virtually all of the regular members of the department are residents of Texico, with Farwell barely represented among the crew members.

The point was also developed that there were many young, able-bodied men in Farwell who have never given any consideration to becoming members. Huggins brought out the fact that Texas laws require a crew of 20 members in regular attendance to be recognized by the Fire Insurance Commission. The average attendance for some weeks has been only 15, he said.

Monroe said that the weekly meetings, held each Wednesday at 8 p. m., some new phase of fire-fighting instruction was being given the crew. "We'll have something new every meeting night," he stressed.

With Monroe and Sam Lewis, both of whom have had government fire control training at the Clovis AAB, as members, and with the equipment now on hand, it was pointed out Texico-Farwell can boast of an exceptional fire fighting crew—with a sufficient number of men.

Young Wins Third In State Garden Contest

Announcement was received by County Agent Ollie Liner this week that George Young, 4-H clubber of the Oklahoma Lane community, had been named as third place winner in the Texas 4-H garden contest.

In accordance with his placement, Young receives a check for \$20 from the Texas Seedmen's Association, the county agent added.

Young is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Young of the Oklahoma Lane community.

Life With Father.

Unanimous approval of a Soil Conservation district was given by 190 voters the past Saturday, when a special election was held to determine whether or not the farmers of Parmer county wanted such a district established here.

According to tabulations received by County Agent Ollie Liner, Rhea voted sixteen for, Oklahoma Lane also had sixteen in favor, Friona polled the heaviest approval, with 94; Bovina cast 18 affirmative votes, Farwell had 16 "ayes"; Black added seven more, and Lazbuddy cast 23 in favor of the district. Not a dissenting vote was polled.

Now that the farmers have signified their approval of the district, the project moves along these lines: W. L. Edelman, as polling superintendent, County Agent Ollie Liner and ACA secretary Harold Carpenter will meet to divide the county into five conservation districts.

Following this, two supervisors will be named by Edelman, representing Districts 2 and 4, and these three men will hold election in other districts, to name supervisors from Districts 1, 3, and 5.

Plan To Be Made

A plan of work for the county, including contouring and terracing on dry-land farms; legume planting, permanent pastures, crop rotation, etc., on irrigated land, will then be drawn up by the supervisors, and a history of the county will be written. This, with the work plan, will be submitted to the state SCS office.

When the work plan is approved, a definite work unit will be established in the county, and Agent Liner said today that the size of the county unit would depend on the amount of funds administered by SCS.

Supervisors of the county districts will meet monthly with the SCS director located in this county, to discuss operation and further plans.

On each farm which cooperates in the conservation plan, the work unit of the SCS will visit, lay out a farm map, analyze the soil, and set up a plan on a three-to-five year basis, Liner continued.

He stressed the fact that cooperation with the SCS is not obligatory to any one, and if a man decides to drop work which has been started, he is free to do so. There is no charge made for any work offered the farmers by the SCS.

Mrs. Wright Allowed \$250 For Damages

The County Commissioners Court, in session here Monday, allowed Mrs. W. H. Wright damages in the amount of \$250.00 in connection with right-of-way privileges across her land on Farm to Market Highway No. 299. This was the amount of damages determined by a Jury of View in the case, and the condemnation proceedings, already started, were ordered dismissed by the Commissioners.

The only other business coming before the Commissioners, according to the minutes, was the payment of current bills.

INJURED IN ACCIDENT

Information has been received to the effect that Mrs. Audie J. Barker, of Douglas, Ariz., was injured in an auto smashup in her home city of Douglas on November 7. Reports say that a taxi failed to observe a stop sign and hit the Barker car. Mrs. Barker sustained a broken rib and numerous bruises and was hospitalized four days. She has now been returned to her home and is recuperating nicely. The taxi driver was hospitalized also, with a slight concussion. Mrs. Barker is the former Martha Jane Williams, of Texico.

ATTEND FUNERAL

J. F. Pesch, M. and Mrs. Louis Pesch, Mrs. E. A. Hromas, Mrs. Clifford Leake, Mrs. Joe Hromas, and Frank Pesch were called to Abilene last week by the death of Mrs. Ed. Pesch, on November 20. Funeral services were held at Abilene on Friday, and the body was taken to Dallas for burial in Laureland cemetery, by the side of her parents. The Parmer county residents returned home on Sunday.

Loss that will doubtless run into the thousands of dollars was sustained by Triplett & Pringle, Bovina cattle feeders, in an early morning fire the past Friday.

Bovina, being entirely without fire protection, called on the Texico-Farwell and Friona Fire departments, who responded promptly and did all they could with the limited water supply available in fighting the fire.

No estimate could be made of the damages suffered. Triplett, one of the operators of the business, was in Amarillo and could not be reached by telephone. Bob Pringle, the other partner, was in a Clovis hospital recovering from an operation, and would make no estimate on the loss.

At the time the fire was discovered, shortly after 3 a. m., the flames were lapping above the large feed barn, and nothing could be done to save any of the contents of the building, which housed many hundreds of sacks of ground grain, cottonseed meal, and the grinding equipment, all of which was a total loss. Miraculously enough, none of the large ricks of bundle feed, stacked near the building, caught fire.

Volunteer firemen from Texico-Farwell and Friona battled the blaze in freezing weather, but were handicapped in their efforts to control the flames due to lack of water. Only water from the booster pumps could be played on the fire, and this method proved too slow to accomplish much. Refilling the booster tank also was extremely slow, in view of the fact that there are as yet no fire plugs connected to the large Santa Fe storage tank.

After bringing the fire under control, firemen stood by for several hours, guarding against flare-ups that could have occurred in the smoldering feed stacks.

No loss was sustained among the 1438 head of cattle on feed at the time of the blaze.

To Rebuild

Construction has already been started on two new buildings that will take the place of the one destroyed by fire. Pringle said Tuesday afternoon that one building would be used to store ground feed and the other would be used to house the grinding machinery. Both buildings will be floored with concrete and made as nearly fire-proof as possible.

More Deer Hunters Come In Meatless

More deer hunters have been arriving home during the past week most of them without any venison. But even at that, most of them fared better than Bowden Dar, and Don Fought, who spent one night out in the wilds when they failed to find their way back to camp.

A party of Bovina nimrods, composed of Frank Ayers, Mr. and Mrs. Buck Ellison and Byron Turner, came in with a lone bobcat, which Ayers killed.

Mansell Cranfill and his party returned from South Texas with the report that the only deer they got was eaten in camp.

C. E. Leach and T. E. Daniel, both of Bovina, each brought in a small buck, taken near Folsom, N. M.

Shoulder Broken In Garage Accident

Wert Pace, of the firm of Pace Brothers, Texico garage operators, is nursing a broken shoulder this week which he sustained early last week while working at the garage.

While engaged in doing some work on a large truck, the entire machine got in motion, catching Pace between the front fender and a brick wall, resulting in the injury. Fortunately, help arrived immediately and released the mechanic from his pinned-in condition.

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Health Notes

AUSTIN—Rheumatic heart disease is now the first cause of death among children aged 10 to 14, and is second only to tuberculosis at ages 15 to 25. Despite the importance of this disease its epidemiology is not completely established. No vaccine such as those that prevent typhoid, diphtheria, smallpox, and whooping cough has yet been developed for its prevention or control. We do know, however, some of the danger signals and with the physician's care some of the damaging results of the disease may be prevented.

Exposure to frequent chilling, damp or overcrowded living quarters, a poor diet, an attack of scarlet fever, a bad cold or other infection caused by certain streptococcus germs are likely to be predisposing factors in the appearance of rheumatic fever.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, points out that in general the danger signals of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knee, ankle, elbows, or wrists. The pain usually is felt in one of these centers and spreads to the others. Oftentimes a child will get irritable and cross without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude; he may cry easily or develop habits of nervousness. A physician should be consulted at once in such a situation, for the symptoms may be the beginning of rheumatic fever.

According to Dr. Cox the best safeguards against this disease are to have each child examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kind of food and plenty of rest. When the disease is suspected of being present, a doctor should be consulted at once and if he prescribes complete bed rest, his advice should be implicitly followed.

USE PROPER SIZE FUSE IN REPLACEMENTS

LUBBOCK—It's as unwise to install an oversize fuse in a fuse-box as it is to slip in a penny, according to Miss Lola M. Drew, assistant professor of home management at Texas Technological College.

A 15-ampere fuse is proper for the average home circuit, Miss Drew stated, and to install a heavier fuse is dangerous since it will not blow in case the circuit becomes overloaded. Fuses are designed to blow, thus breaking the current, at a point just below the maximum load the wires can carry, she explained. When the current continues on overloaded wires, the wires get hot and eventually set inflammable surroundings on fire. Because wires are installed in attics and walls, fires from this cause are often not discovered early and are therefore extremely dangerous, she pointed out.

Insurance policies often include a clause rendering the policy void if fire is started from electrical wiring where pennies or oversize fuses are installed, she added.

In any case of fire caused by electricity, all circuits leading into the house should be broken before water is used to extinguish the blaze, she warned, because water will serve to conduct the current and increase the danger.

ENROLLMENT CONTINUES TO CLIMB AT TECH

LUBBOCK—Number of students at Texas Technological College this fall increased almost 14 per cent over 1946, as compared with a national average increase of 9.62 per cent in universities, colleges and professional schools, and an increase of 6.75 per cent in Texas state college enrollments.

Tech has the second largest increase in number of students of any state-supported college in Texas, according to figures from the state department of education. North Texas State Teacher's College, whose student body rose from 3795 in 1946 to 4666 this fall, was first. Texas Tech student body increased from 5365 in 1946 to 6114 this fall.

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ROTC TRAINING WILL BE GIVEN AT TECH

LUBBOCK—Because of increased demand for ROTC training at Texas Technological College, students interested in military science will be permitted to begin training during the spring semester as well as during the fall, Lt. Col. L. C. Adams, head professor of military science and tactics, announces.

College ROTC units over the nation will furnish 1200 regular army officers per year in addition to reserve officers, Adams stated. Regular army officers will be chosen from

senior graduates who are outstanding in military science work.

Vets Can Qualify For Study Abroad

World War II veterans desiring to study abroad can qualify for benefits at the same time under both the GI Bill and the Fulbright Act administered by the State Department, the Veterans Administration ruled this week.

The VA ruling held that payments of education and training benefits under the GI Bill may be made to

student-veterans regardless of any grants made to them under the Fulbright Act, since the funds used to administer the latter were not secured from United States government appropriations.

The Fulbright Act, passed by the 79th Congress, provides for grants in aid to American students for study abroad or to foreign students for study in this country with costs defrayed by credits acquired through sale of surplus property abroad.

The Act also specifies that vets of World Wars I and II must be given preference by the 10-man Board of Foreign Scholarships which awards

the study grants.

It is hoped that a limited number of grants will be made under the Fulbright Act for the academic year 1948-49. Applications are not being received at this time, but persons desiring information on the program may obtain it from the Division of International Exchange of Persons, Department of State, Washington, 25, D. C.

Some Vets Eligible For More Training

Almost all of the 2,013,000 World War II veterans who completed or dropped out of school or job training courses they began under laws administered by the VA are eligible for additional training.

VA said this week that all but 29,000 of these interrupted or discontinued their training before they had used all of the training time for which their active war service qualified them.

Of those not eligible for further training, 20,600 are disabled veterans who were declared rehabilitated. The remaining 8,400 are those who used all of their available entitlement.

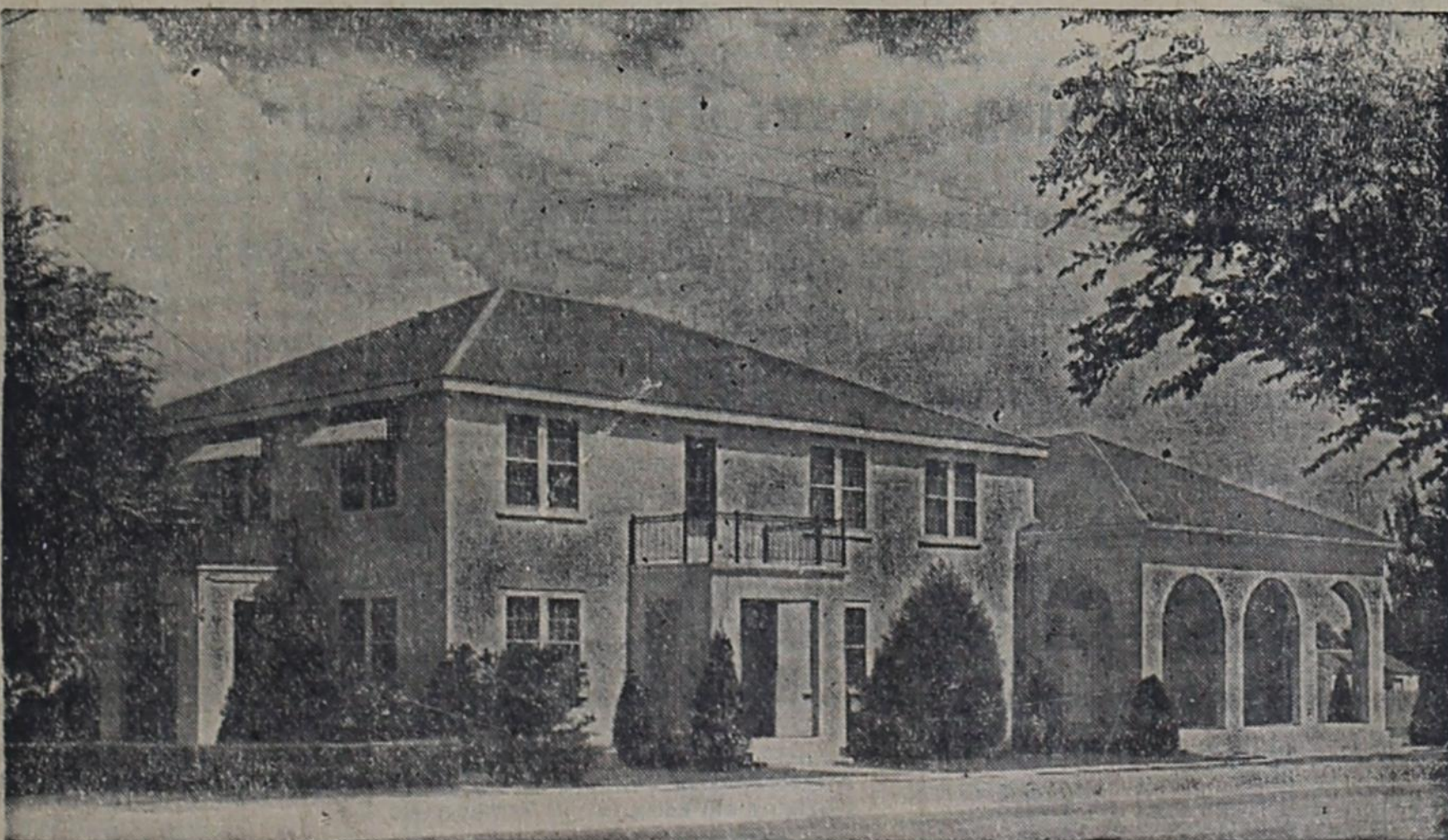
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Bovina Grateful To Fire Department

New Hudson Soon On Display In Farwell

The new Hudson has been enthusiastically received by the dealers who have previewed it, reports Walter Hardage, Hudson dealer, who returned Monday from Fort Worth, where he attended a closed showing for Hudson dealers.

The public showing and announcement of this entirely new automobile will take place in Farwell as soon as all of Hudson's 3,000 distributors and dealers have received their display cars, Hardage said. At that time the full story of the new Hudson will be told.

The new Hudson, Hardage added, will be powered by a new Super-Six engine, the most powerful six-cylinder engine built today, and an improved Super-Eight engine.

He said that because the new Hudson is so different from any car ever mass-produced, changeover problems were greatly multiplied, but despite the fact only a few weeks elapsed between the time the last 1947 model was built until the first new 1948 model rolled off the final

assembly line.

"Because of the unusual and advanced design and construction of the new Hudson," Hardage said, "an entirely new manufacturing approach was developed. This required the scrapping of many assembly line techniques as we have known them in the automobile industry."

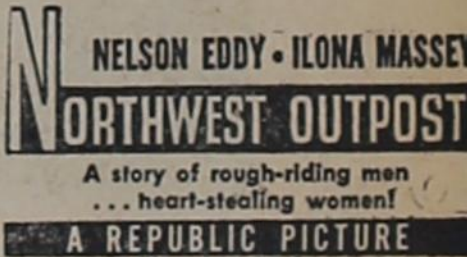

Hospitalization Is Discussed for Vets

Q. I am a World War I veteran and would like to know if I am eligible for medical care and hospitalization in a Veterans Administration hospital?

A. You are eligible for hospitalization in a VA hospital if you have a service-connected disability. If your disability is nonservice-connected, you must state under oath that you are financially unable to pay for private treatment. Then you must wait until a bed is available in a VA hospital.

Q. What veterans have preference to VA hospital beds?

A. Veterans suffering from service-connected disabilities and those requiring emergency treatment are given preference to hospital beds.

Q. Am I eligible to benefits under Public Law 16 if I was discharged for a service-connected disability before I had served 90 days in the armed forces?

A. Yes. For purposes of Public Law 16, service of 90 days in the armed forces is not required.

Q. Can you tell me what the deadline is for a disabled veteran to apply for one of the specially equipped automobiles?

A. The last date on which applications can be approved is June 30, 1948.

Q. May a veteran receiving disability compensation receive at the same time subsistence allowance under Public Law 346?

A. Yes.

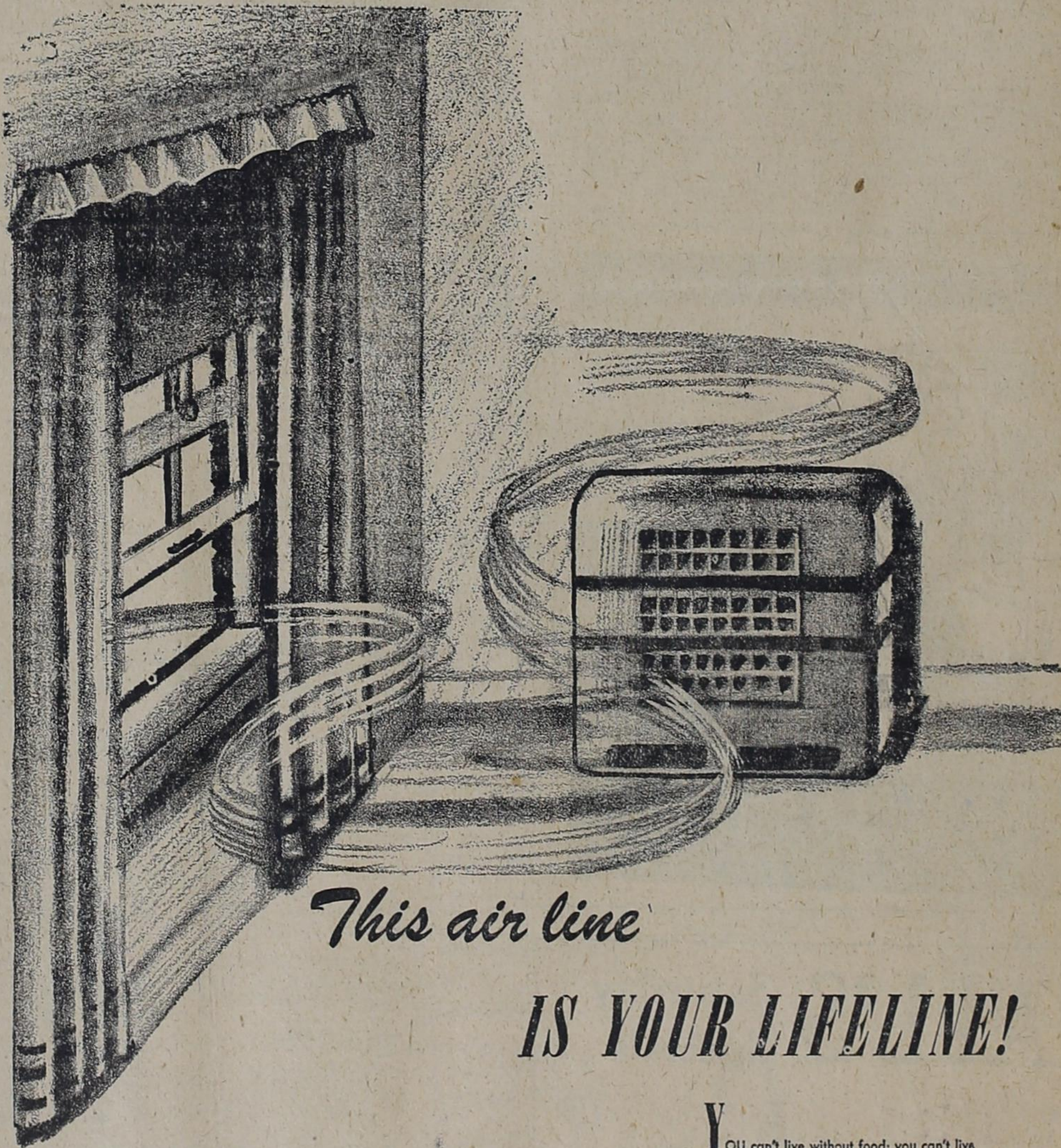

Hall Warns of Danger In Using Gasoline

AUSTIN—Gasoline will not only shorten that new long skirt but also your life, if you use it for dry cleaning, Texas housewives were warned today by Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner.

Hall said that improper use of gasoline caused 14 fires in August in Texas, and 5 in September.

"Hundreds of women die tragically and needlessly every year because they insist on cleaning clothes or floors with gasoline," he continued. "Ten cents worth of gasoline is sufficient to blow up an ordinary house."

A gasoline explosion can result from two causes, Hall explained. One is a static spark—from the friction of rubbing together the cloth being cleaned, scuffing your feet on a rug, or merely pouring the liquid from one can to another—set off in a place where gasoline vapor is present. The vapor off a one-gallon open can of gasoline can fill an ordinary kitchen in a few minutes.

The other cause of gasoline explosions and fires is the use of it near a flame, such as the pilot on a cook stove. Gasoline has been known to have been touched off by open flames over 200 feet away, Hall said in warning Texas housewives not to do any home dry-cleaning in the yard, as did a woman in West Texas who was burned to death as a result.

The extreme flammability of gasoline vapors is also the reason why a person shouldn't smoke or strike a match while even sitting in his auto at a filling station when the gas tank is being filled. The engine should be cut off while the car is being re-fueled because of danger of sparks, Hall said.

"Gasoline should never be kept in the house and should not be allowed to remain in an open vessel or in any can not tightly covered. Especially, it should not be kept in a glass bottle, for if the bottle should break, liquid and fumes would escape, causing a serious hazard. The safest place for gasoline in quantity is underground," he said.

Hall recommends carbon tetrachloride for removing spots from clothes

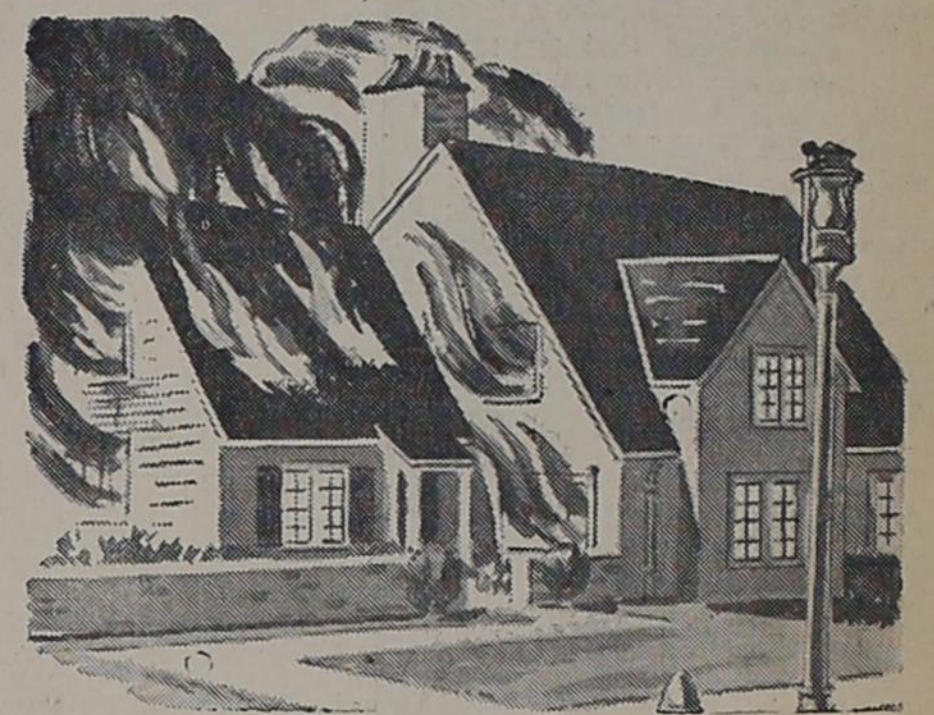

Another new bridge on the Santa Fe

A new double-track steel bridge now spans Canyon Diablo (a giant gash 225 feet deep in the tableland of northern Arizona) on the main line of the Santa Fe between Chicago and California.

This new bridge, which replaces the old single-track viaduct, is 544 feet long, 32 feet wide at track level, and contains over 2,000 tons of structural steel.

The heaviest trains can cross it in both directions at once, and it's

built to handle anything in rail traffic the future may bring.

It was quite new; this was his first drive to wear it, and he liked its musical ring as well as the fresh leather smell of its narrow collar.

That completed, he gave a toss of his head and a switch of his tail and with a deep, satisfied bellow, took his place in the lead. The other steers soon swung in line and the long northward trek was resumed.

Thus Blue found his niche and filled it well. At the head of the herd he was a sober, steadying influence. He never "boogered" at a jackrabbit or other such sudden movements, and if a herd should stampede he would step aside from the path of the rush and go to bawling. If the boys could get the stampede a quieting influence.

Charlie Goodnight steadily refused to part with Old Blue in spite of many offers, and even after his trail breaking days were eased up, he continued to be of service to the ranch. It was to Blue that an outlaw or stray steer, or even young buffaloes, would be fastened, and Blue would pilot them back to camp.

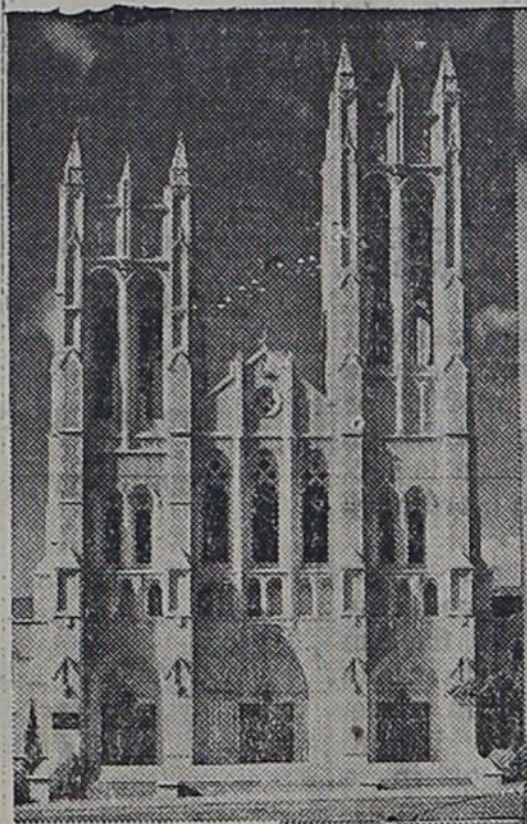

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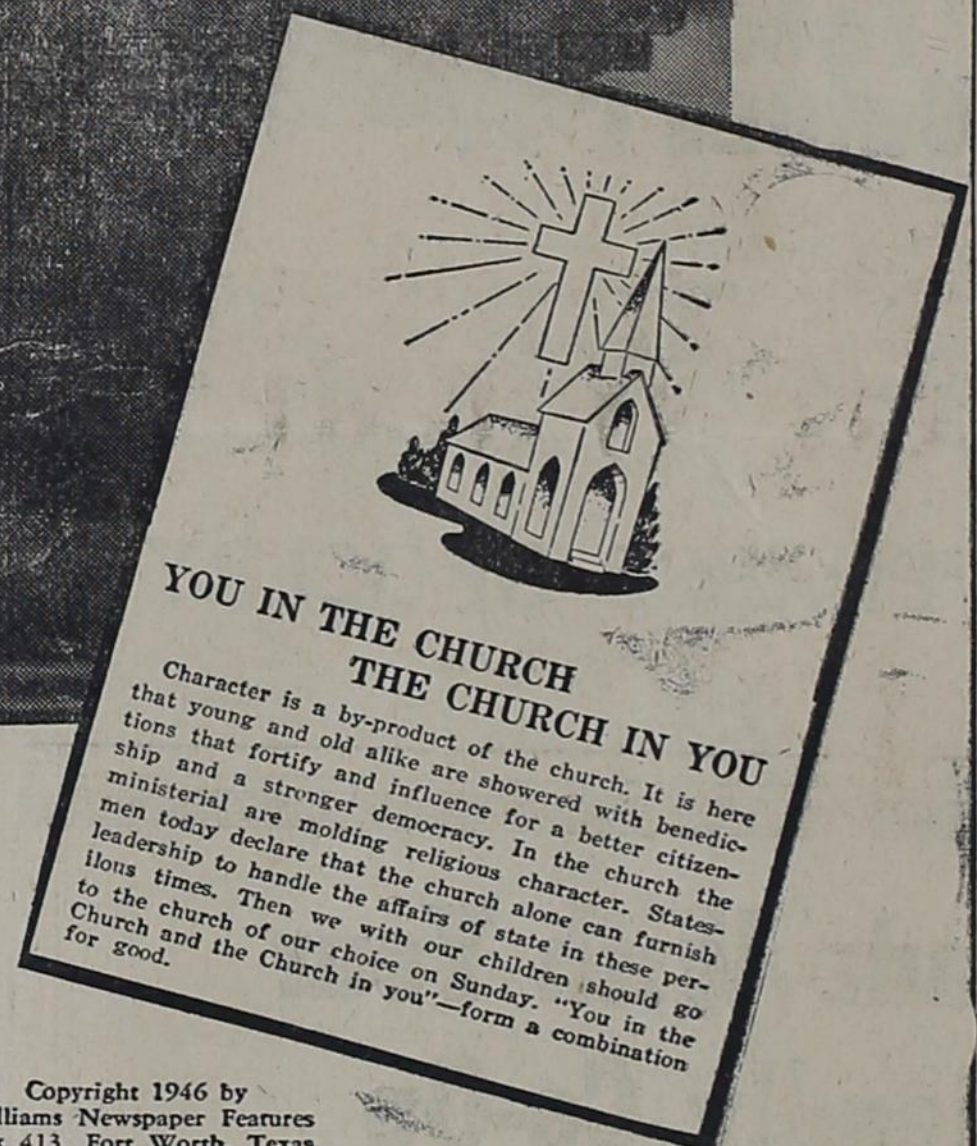
