STORMS SWEEP
GREAT PLAINSCONSIDERABLE DAMAGE DONE
BY DIRT STORMS DURING
PAST WEEK TO
WHEAT

Considerable damage was done to wheat fields in the southwest during the last week by the dirt storms which approached gale proportions over the week-end.

Starting with a stiff northerly early Thursday evening and continuing most of the night, many fields that had not been damaged except by drought, started blowing.

The weather calmed Friday but continued to blow Saturday and Sunday. Damage to crops in this section cannot be estimated but it is said to be heavy. A flurry of snow Sunday evening was all that was received here from the predicted snow storm that raged in the northern states. No appreciable moisture has been received this winter and crops in this drought section are suffering.

RABBIT DRIVES
ARE SCHEDULEDFERA IN BEAVER COUNTY TO
STAGE COMMUNITY RAB-
BIT DRIVES WITH-
OUT GUNS

Eleven more rabbit drives are scheduled for Beaver county for the month of March, the drives being sponsored by the county FERA organization and with the positive ruling that no guns will be allowed on any of the drives.

Drivers will be armed only with clubs in the drives and a substantial gun has been arranged as the goal of the drive. Rabbits breaking through the advancing drives of managers gain their freedom.

TAKE STEPS TO
CONSERVE SOIL

RURAL DEPARTMENT OF TEXAS
RELIEF COMMISSION
PLANNING NEW
PROGRAM

Austin, Feb. 27—A soil conservation program designed to save the agricultural resources of the state is being formulated by the rural department of the Texas Relief Commission, it has been announced by V. R. Smith, manager of the rural department.

The plan will make it possible for farmers to preserve their lands and for rehabilitation clients to work on self-liquidating projects which will afford them cash wages to apply on their obligations to the rural corporation.

Under W. M. Burkes, formerly county agent in Upshur county, the conservation service section of the rural department was established last week. Mr. Burkes was named to the place by mutual agreement of rural department officials and officials of the Extension Service at A. and M. College, which will cooperate in the program.

"Terracing alone will not save the soil in Texas," Mr. Burkes declared. "We believe it good practice to take land with an eight to ten per cent slope out of cultivation and convert it into pasture or timber land."

The conservation program will consist of erosion control, running terraces or contour lines, building terraces or contours, terrace outlets, spillways, gully controls, dams; planting legumes, grasses, trees or other cover and soil improving crops; water conservation in the form of wells, dams and ponds; building of trench silos, and storage houses for crops and livestock; forestry, where work will assist in conserving the soil.

County agents have been asked to help start the program by offering the service to farmers in the various counties. Where requests for running terrace lines on as much as 4,000 acres are forwarded to Austin, a conservation assistant, upon approval of the request, will be sent to a county to supervise the work there. From one to four squads of four men each, to be supplied from rehabilitation or relief rolls, will be needed in the work, it has been estimated.

Equipment will be furnished locally. The service will be paid for by the owner of the property at its appraised value on a job, unit, or time basis, the rate to be determined by the extension agricultural engineer, the county terracing committee, and the representative of the rural department of the Texas Relief Commission, and agreed to by the owner.

After terrace lines have been run, the conservation assistant will remain in the county to supervise actual construction of terraces. No part of the construction costs, however, will be borne by the rural department.

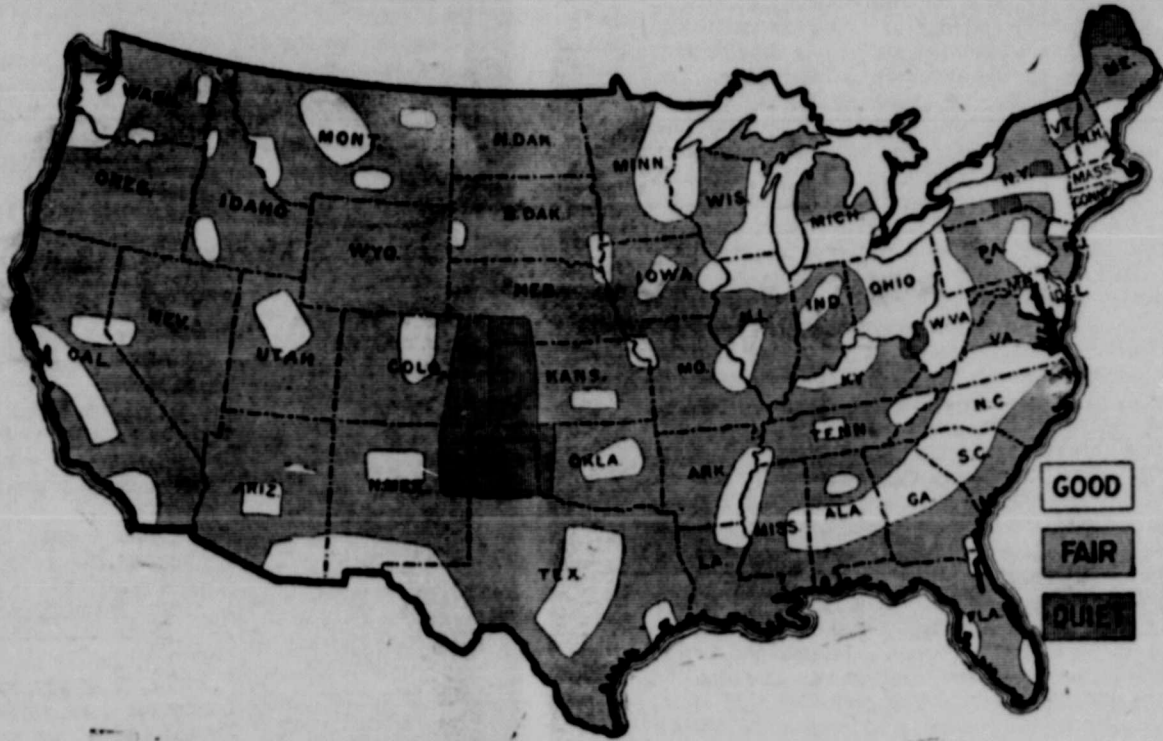
"Need for this work is best described," Mr. Burkes said, "by the fact that not more than one-tenth of the land in the state needing conservation work has received it, and in most instances where this work has been carried on, it has been incompletely done."

PASSED AWAY SUNDAY

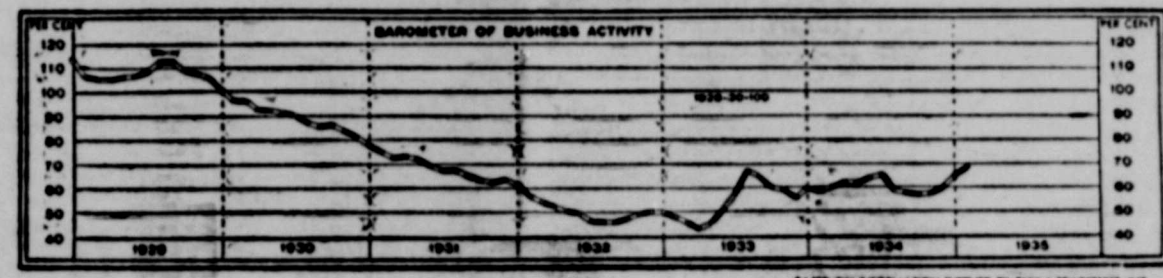

January saw a lull in wholesale and retail trade but manufacture and industry showed more than seasonal activity. Snow cover was widespread in areas where moisture was lacking.

Contra-seasonal gains included particularly iron, steel, automobiles, farm implements, electrical equipment, glass, rubber goods most textiles, furniture and shoes. Electric power continued its steady rise. Coal output equaled 1931. Lumber

output lessened but shipments increased. Carloading dropped slightly and bank clearings were larger. The Dun & Bradstreet Weekly Food Index in January was at its highest since November, 1930. Failures continued fewer than a year ago.

Gross railway earnings gained five per cent over 1933 but net earnings fell three per cent although 40 per cent above 1932. Retail trade in 1934 gained 15 to 20 per cent over 1933 in value. Stocks

ebbed in strength and activity; bonds were active and slightly higher. Leading cereal prices were the lowest for three months. Cattle and hog prices in late January were nearly double a year ago. The February map shows a little more cheerfulness, especially in industrial sections. With its rise in January, the barometer passed the June, 1934, and July, 1933, high points and slightly exceeds the July, 1931, average.

1935 CAR TAGS
GOOD MARCH 1

LICENSES MAY BE DISPLAYED
DURING MARCH ACCORD-
ING TO NEW LAW
PASSED

Texas motorists may start attaching their 1935 automobile license plates tomorrow, according to a new bill passed last week and signed by Governor Allred. The plates must be on all automobiles and trucks using the highways by the first of April.

The new measure does not change any of the other regulations regarding license tags. For example, if you purchase a new car during March you must register it for one month of 1934, but at the same time you can purchase your 1935 license and put it on your car.

All cars must be licensed by April 1. Stiff penalties must be paid if motorists fail to conform with this law.

Thousands of mothers-in-law will be feted in Amarillo next Tuesday when the governor of Texas appears to pay his homage to the second Mother-in-Law Day.

March 5 will be re-dedicated to mothers-in-law and all West Texas will be on hand to pay tribute to them. Governor Jimmy Allred will make his first trip from Austin since the inauguration to speak before the group.

A day of free entertainment has been planned for the visiting mothers-in-law. Cafes and drug stores in Amarillo will serve free coffee, ice cream and sodas to all who wear the sweet-pea badge.

A parade in which a dozen bands will participate will be formed of the mothers-in-law and they will pass in review before the governor. Newsreel cameras will record the demonstration.

Registrations for mothers-in-law will start at 9 o'clock in the Amarillo Hotel and the Amarillo Building.

At 1 o'clock the governor will speak to the assembly on Polk Street. The most distinguished mother-in-law in Texas—Mrs. Oran Miller of Wichita Falls, mother-in-law of Governor Allred—will be crowned.

At 1:30 o'clock the parade will start and end its way to the Municipal Auditorium where the governor will speak to the mothers-in-law. At 3:30 o'clock all theatres will be thrown open to the honor guests for a free movie.

The first Mother-in-Law Day was celebrated last year. It was sponsored by Old Tack as a tribute to his Mother-in-Law. The idea spread rapidly and mother-in-law clubs were formed over the entire nation. Many will send delegates to the celebration in Amarillo.

International Sunday School Lesson

By A. C. Williams, Minister Perryton Church Of Christ

Lesson 9 March 3, 1935
PETER TEACHES TRUTHFULNESS

Memory Verse: "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you" Jno. 15:14.

Lesson Text: Acts 5:1-6; 8:18-24

I. Two Liars (Acts 5:1)

It is to be expected that some church members will backslide. It was so in the church at Jerusalem. Even with all the opportunities afforded in that day of pure and simple Christianity Ananias and his wife decided to cheat the Lord and feed their own selfishness. They sold some land and brought only part of the money to the apostles for distribution to the poor. But that was not the worst thing about the transaction. They pretended that it was the whole price, and that they were really giving all they had for the great work. It was not a mere falsehood to men. It was lying to God.

II. The Consequence Of The Falsehood (Acts 5:5)

God looks upon the heart. It may be easy to deceive men, but not so, the Lord. Sham and pretension may influence blundering humanity, but the infinite eye of God sees the unvarnished facts of the case always. So with the case of this man and his wife. How noble it is for a husband and wife to plan together provided they plan constructively. How beautiful the harmony between mates when the interest of the kingdom of Christ is held in honor in their plans. But how disgusting the plottings when a dagger is aimed at the Lord Christ and a wound proposed for his church. There is no greater enemy of Christ than a wolf within the fold, a snarling,

carping rebel who desires to expose God's children to ridicule and derision. But if such characters appeared in the first century, we may expect to see them today. But their presence does not nullify the grandeur of the Church of our Lord nor forfeit her right to be His peculiar possession.

Nothing is said about what hardships were worked upon the destitute people as the result of Ananias' selfishness and falsehood. He who sparingly sows will reap sparingly. So the giver in this case suffered more than those he feigned to help. The Lord's work will go on regardless of those church members who give nothing to the work. The wheels of the kingdom will not be stopped by the interference of a few disloyal subjects who have self at heart instead of Christ. The church at Jerusalem moved majestically on despite this tragedy. The flag of heaven had been unfurled in this city and victory over sin and Satan were the grand objectives sought. But as for Ananias and Sapphira, they died in shame and disgrace for their sin.

The death of this disobedient couple was miraculous. Let us bear in mind that not all the miracles performed by the apostles were those of healing. The first recorded miracle of Paul was the smiting with blindness, the sorcerer, Elymus. If faith was required of the person upon whom the miracles were performed, then Ananias, Sapphira had to believe that they would be killed or it could not have been done! So we readily see the error of requiring the recipient of the miracle to have faith in order to its accomplishment. Surely the dead Lazarus did not have to believe Jesus could raise him from the tomb!

III. Simon Of Samaria: What He Saw

Our lesson now turns to the eighth chapter of Acts, to the narrative about Simon who had been converted under the preaching of Philip. Though Philip possessed miraculous power, having had the hands of the apostles laid upon him (Acts 6), he could not pass this gift to any one else. Though he performed many wonders in Samaria, it was necessary for the apostles to come from Jerusalem to lay hands upon the Samaritans in order to confer these miraculous gifts. Simon wonderingly beheld this spectacular performance. He was anxious to pass this gift to others, and was willing to pay for it. But a thing that we have no right to possess, should not be sought. We have no right to buy it. Much less have we the right to take it even without buying it. To attempt to seize or claim the power the apostles had it to commit a sin even worse than Simon did. Had the gift been his to possess, Peter would have surely told him so. The great sin was in thinking the gift of God could be purchased with money. But since Philip did not have it, surely Simon ought to have seen that it was the exclusive heritage of the apostles and could not be had by other men either by purchase price or theft. If we could prove that we to-day had the power that the apostles had, it would only demonstrate that we had stolen something that did not belong to us.

IV. Simon Of Samaria: The Law Of Pardon For An Erring Child Of God

The alien sinner becomes a Christian by faith, repentance, confession and baptism for the remission of sins. The erring child of God is forgiven for his sins when he repents of them, confesses his faults, and asks forgiveness. The case of Simon is illustrative of this fact. To become a Christian, he obeyed the gospel just as the rest of the Samaritans did. Peter does not tell him to be baptized, since he is a child of Jehovah, but to repent of his wickedness and pray to God for pardon. Simon was in the gall of bitterness and bond of iniquity, but this bond can surely seize any Christian who forsakes the way of his God. It is refreshing to know that though we may make errors in the life and work of a Christian we have an advocate with Christ who is our High Priest now at the right hand of God who will intercede for us when we humbly come to Him in penitent petition.

Grow Healthy Chicks For Poultry Profit

I. TEN COMMANDMENTS OF CHICK RAISING

Oklahoma A. & M. College

Poultry keeping is an enterprise engaging the attention of thousands of people in all sections of the country. A flock of poultry is generally kept for the purpose of giving a cash return on the investment either in the sale of breeding stock, hatching eggs, and baby chicks or market poultry and eggs.

Those keeping poultry as a side line on a farm or as a business conducted apart from farming should keep in mind that the kind of stock, the time of hatching, the quality of chicks, kind and amount of feed fed, and environment and management are factors having much to do with the financial success of the undertaking.

In Oklahoma, a program sponsored by the Extension Division of the Oklahoma A. and M. College, commonly known as the "Grow Healthy Chick Program," is proving valuable in helping to improve the quality of the chicks and reduce losses. The chick improvement program really lasts all the year, but a chick mortality record is kept for only 10 weeks, beginning at the time the chicks are placed in the brooder house. Chick mortality blanks and a series of instructional news letters will be sent to each chick owner who enrolls in the Grow Healthy Chick Program, and who follows instructions and carries out the recommendations as far as possible.

There are about 35 million baby chicks hatched in Oklahoma each year, and approximately 25 per cent of the chicks die due to disease, parasites, and other causes. On farms where the improved practices have been followed according to the Grow Healthy Chick Program, the mortality rate has been reduced from 25 per cent to an average of 10 per cent per year.

The factors of most importance to consider in the Oklahoma Grow Healthy Chick Program are:

1. Start with chicks from high quality, well fed and well managed flocks.
2. See that chicks are hatched at the proper season to allow for age and growth for fall production.
3. Repair and disinfect the brooder house and get it in proper condition before the chicks are placed

in it.
4. Allow at least one third of a square foot of floor space for each chick in the brooder house at the beginning and allow more space as the chicks grow.

5. Locate the brooder house on clean soil where there have been no chickens or chicken manure for the past year.

6. Plow soil, plant to green feed in preparation for the new chicks. Make provisions for ample supply of green feed.

7. Set up the brooder stove and get it in first class working condition for 12 to 24 hours before the chicks are placed under the hover.

8. Feed only high quality feed that is properly mixed according to known authority. Feed regularly and do not make a sudden change of feeds or feeding methods.

9. Brood each hatch separately and do not keep chicks of different ages under the same hover.

10. Follow a rigid sanitary program at all times remove droppings and change litter when needed, scald milk and water containers, remove from flock any weak, crippled or dead chicks as soon as they are observed.

See your county agent or home demonstration agent for more details in regard to the chick program.

Farm Costs On Spot

4-H Club Contest Offering \$7,500 In Prizes Now Open To All Members

Farm costs and leaks of the 1935-36 year will be put on the spot by 4-H club members of the nation and in addition to the fun of doing it they have a chance to earn some wonderful prizes.

The contest is a renewal of one widely participated in the past year in which winners of merchandise and purchase certificate prizes given by the International Harvester Company aggregating at least \$7,500.00 are soon to be announced by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club, which conducts it.

Officially accepted by club leaders for this state, the contest is open to every enrolled boy or girl, and offers county, state, sectional and national prizes on the same basis as the previous contest except that winners of more than one prize must surrender the lower ones to an alternate.

The record books must be opened any time between Jan. 1 and March 1 and cover the 12 consecutive months following. Contestants may use any record book providing an opening and closing inventory, record of money expended and received, costs of principal crops, etc., and a balance sheet.

Contestants are encouraged to enlist the aid of leaders, parents and others in keeping the record, but it must be in the contestants own hand. It is hoped thus to spread the value of cost accounting which is of increasing consequence in meeting federal production control requirements, obtaining credit, and making tax returns.

The records, which may be kept of the home farm or a neighbor's are to be confidential and returned after judging to the club member. Detailed rules may be obtained of the county Agricultural Agent.

Show Profit In Hens

Oklahoma Flock Record Keepers Show Substantial Profit During Year 1934

Stillwater, Okla.—The goose that laid golden eggs in the old fable may have made money for her master faster, but not any more surely than the 20,000 hens owned by 131 flock record keepers in Oklahoma in 1934, says H. G. Ware, Oklahoma A. and M. college extension poultryman.

Those 20,000 hens each paid a 94-cent feed bill for the year and then banked \$1.05 each for their owners. Of course, those figures are averages. Some made more, some less. The hens averaged 135 eggs apiece for the year. The average price was 16 cents a dozen.

"These figures show two important things for flock owners to consider," Ware said. "First, there is an opportunity to increase the average production. Hens that lay 135 eggs will show a profit, but suppose the average could be raised to 150 or 175 eggs per hen. The gain would be far different.

"Second, the price of eggs per dozen is low compared to many of the good markets. Every flock owner

should strive to produce high quality market and hatchery eggs and then if possible, find a market where quality is appreciated. Many hatchery operators will pay a premium above market for high quality eggs from the right kind of a flock. Flock owners must not expect a high price for market or hatching eggs until they have real quality to offer."

Study of the ten high and ten low flocks which reported for December gives a clue to why some flocks are profitable, some not, Ware

pointed out. The high 10 flocks average 17.74 eggs per hen. The low ten flocks averaged only 64 eggs per hen—less than one egg per hen per month. Income over feed cost was 26 cents for the month in the high 10 flocks, nothing in the low ones. It cost \$1.19 to produce a dozen eggs in the low 10 flocks and only 12 cents in the high flocks.

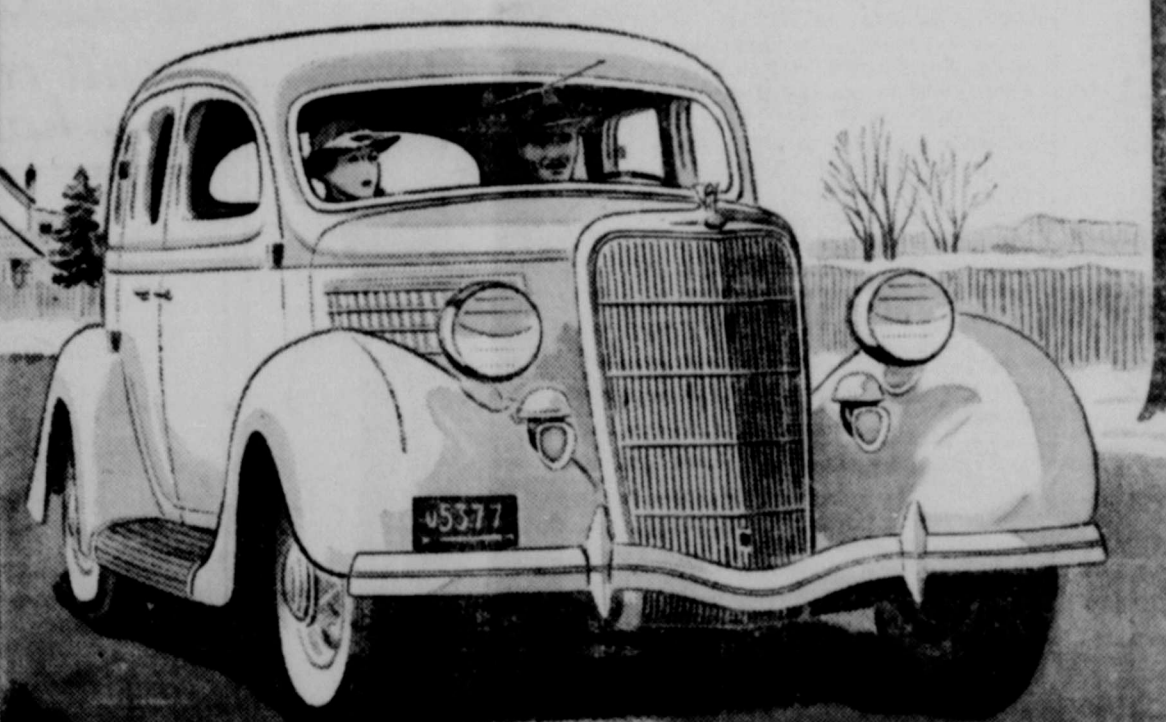

RECHARGING WATER BEDS AND CONSERVING THE FERTILITY OF THE GREAT PLAINS

By Ogden S. Jones, Supervising Geologist, Kansas Emergency Relief Committee and Geologist to the State Planning Board

The Great Plains are Aiding in the Building of the Delta at the Mouth of the Mississippi

We are great wasters. Natural resources, by many thought to be inexhaustible, are exhaustible and are being depleted before our eyes. The state commissions are taking wise steps to curb the waste and over production of oil and gas.

We are at present justly concerned over soil losses due to wind and water erosion, and we are vitally concerned at this time over a water shortage both for domestic and stock use.

When we state that the Great Plains soils are aiding in the building of the Mississippi Delta we mean that due to excessive soil erosion, the valuable top soil of this area is allowed to wash into our drainage systems, and is carried by the major streams in their mud (soil) laden waters to the Gulf.

The thought behind some of our past engineering work has been to drain and get the storm "run off" out of this area as quickly as possible. We did not stop to consider in so doing that we were robbing Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas of soils that had taken hundreds of years to evolve from the basic rock material. Neither did we realize that in getting the "run off" away we were breaking into nature's program of recharging or saturating our underground water beds.

Another destructive agent which is at work is the wind erosion of these west plains. Of course we cannot curb or control the winds, but much is being done in our colleges in the way of advancing modern farm practices such as terracing, contour farming, and a wise selection of drought resisting grasses to combat the above evil. Terracing is one of the best known practices to hold or check storm run off. It holds the water for the crops and allows it to work into the subsoil and later into the underground water beds, thereby accomplishing a threefold benefit, namely, retarding "run off", retarding soil erosion and the building up of the water table, and, of course, subsoil moisture.

Eastern Kansas soils have lost approximately one percent of their virgin fertility for every year they have been under cultivation. At the present time certain areas have only ten percent of their original crop producing value with less than 50 years of cultivation. Erosion accounts for the greater part of the above loss.

The KERC Program Of Water Conservation

The KERC water conservation measures under the direction of John G. Stutz, executive director, are as follows:

1. Wells for domestic use.
2. Garden and farm ponds.
3. State, county and city lakes.
4. Soil erosion.
5. Municipal water supplies.

On the well program Kansas Emergency Relief Committee had 75 qualified geologists working in 85 Kansas counties attempting, and with good success to date, in augmenting the failing water supplies of the areas involved. We have completed some 600 community wells in sections hard hit from failing water supplies.

The garden and farm ponds, seemingly built to serve one purpose, (to supply water for garden irrigation and stock watering) will be of untold value in the following manner:

1. Will tend to store and hold in place the "run off" of storms.

2. By holding in the earth reservoirs created by the Kansas Emergency Relief Committee, the destructive force of the water causing soil erosion will be retarded.

3. This stored water will materially raise the lowered water table of the state. Of course, in the eastern section of the state where impervious shales and clays predominate, the downward movement of the water will be limited. However, in the western portion, these farm ponds even though constructed in porous material will be beneficial in that the "run off" will be checked to such an extent that erosion will be retarded and the ground water (sub-surface) will be added to and replenished.

It is a well known fact that the water table of the state, in particular the central and northern portions has been on a more or less gradual decline since the settlement of those areas. Naturally, this decline has been more rapid in the past few years due to the cumulative effect of the subnormal rainfalls experienced in that time and the heavy withdrawals.

Recharging the water beds is of paramount importance, otherwise certain areas in the state will be unfit for farming and will return to a desert like condition. The farm and garden ponds are to play a tremendous role in the building and maintaining of certain portions of the state.

Larger engineering work such as state, county and city lakes will do the same work but naturally in concentrated areas, but it remains for the farm ponds to do good over the widest area. Such work as reservoirs of large size created by dams in the major water sheds as flood control measures will also be of benefit. However, if the pond program is carried out 100 percent there would be no major floods.

Again we might construct diversion dams in the streams to carry off water after it reaches a certain gauge level and allow it to overflow areas of high porosity with the thought of building up the underground supplies which would most certainly be done. This diversion should be done unless the Kansas farmer and stockman with wise forethought backs to the limit the Kansas Emergency Relief Committee program of water conservation.

Also we are planning to build overflow dams for the purpose of holding impounded water in contact with certain porous bed rock beds capable of absorbing or filtering with water. Much can be done to recharge the depleted water beds.

Salt Water Menace

Another phase of the water conservation which has had in the past but little attention except by a few, is the pollution of fresh water beds by improperly plugged oil tests. It has been variously estimated that some 10,000 on more abandoned oil wells scattered over this state are polluting certain fresh water horizons with the salt water encountered in the search for oil and gas.

Due to the slow rate of penetration of the salt water into the fresh water beds it may take several years for the contamination to reach a point where it is noticed. By that time the well is a matter of history. We may expect a modern law in the future which deals with the job in a manner that should be effective as to sealing off the salt or mineralized water from the fresh water horizons.

The drought has made us all water conscious and we will do well to think and act on the many phases of water conservation. We have heard for years about keeping our states dry—now our motto should be "keep the Great Plains wet", and I mean with water.

I wish to compliment the wise group of men that have conceived and wish to put in practice the splendid concepts of "The Great Plains Farm Pond and Terracing Association."

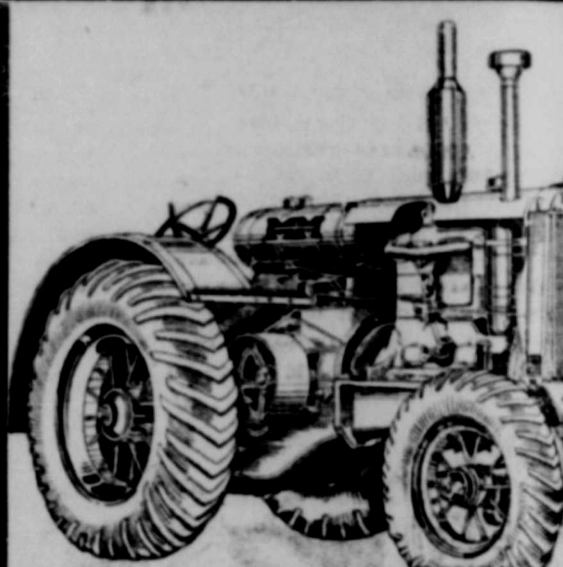

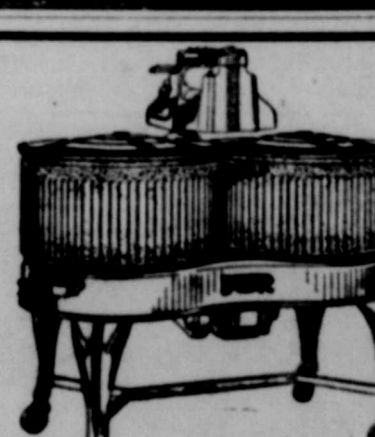
