LAMESA SCHOOLS SET TO OPEN MONDAY

Bennett, Gaines Are County Winners

Ballot Totals Near First Primary Vote As Officials Chosen

County Gave O'Daniel's Choice Partial Nod Only

Dawson county went to the polls Saturday to join the State in the selection of run-off candidates. A total of 3411 votes were polled, as again 3718 votes in the First Primary in July. Therefore possibly a greater percentage of the qualified voters in this county voted than the total of the state.

The sheriff's race probably created the greatest interest of any race in Dawson county, although there were more votes polled in the County Treasurer's race than any other.

A. M. (Buck) Bennett was elected Sheriff over Tom Cooksey, 1824 to 1582.

In the Public Weigher's race, Granville Wyatt defeated Will McHenry 1729 to 1290.

Homier Pace was elected Constable, defeating Jack Aldridge, present incumbent 2126 to 862.

In the County Commissioners' race in Precinct One, Oley Shofner nosed out Howard Moore, 419 to 398.

Accident Occured In Victim's Back Yard

Once again the grim reaper stalked into this community, and with tragic swiftness snatched the life of little nine year old Joe Burt McBride, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. C. McBride, South Katherine Street, Lamesa.

Monday afternoon while a neighbor boy, Kenneth Pruitt and Joe Burt were playing in the yard between their homes, Kenneth remarked that his father had a gun in his car for which he had traded only a few days before. The lad's curiosity was aroused and he asked Kenneth, who is 12, to show him the gun. Mr. Rufus Pruitt, father of Kenneth, had placed the gun under the back seat of the car, preparatory to a trip the Pruitt family intended taking this week.

There were three shells in the magazine, but none in the firing chamber. Kenneth went to the car and got the gun out. It is a bolt action .22 caliber rifle. He started throwing the bolt action to show the younger boy how he had seen his father do.

Evidently he threw two of the shells out while the third shell went into the firing chamber, as little Joe Burt walked in front of the gun, which was accidentally discharged.

The bullet struck the lad in the chest and passed clear through and out on the other side, in the region of his heart. He was rushed to a local hospital, but death won the race.

Thus another home is saddened, another vacancy exists around the fire-side and another little desk that would have been occupied Monday at school will remain empty, while the giving and taking of life still rests only with God.

To the sorrowing parents, there are no words to comfort and soothe the aching heart, but in the words of Christ we find solace when he said, "Suffer (Continued on Back Page)"

Chief Phinizy cites that the alleys are for the purpose of loading and unloading and that is the only excuse for a car or truck stopping in them.

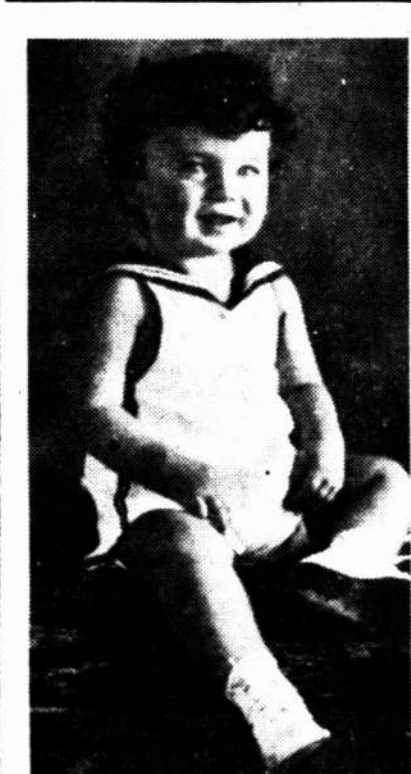
Provisions have been made by the City Commission to fine offenders in the sum of five dollars for violation of this ordinance. The cooperation of the public is solicited by local officers.

Fair Committee In Meeting Monday To Thresh Out Details

Board Of Directors To Hold Meeting Soon

The Dawson County Fair Committee met Tuesday afternoon of this week and decided to call a meeting of the board of directors for next Monday.

The committee decided on the educational type of exhibit for communities. This simply means that a community, in order to compete, may decide to make their exhibit up of a single item, such as for instance, eggs, or canned vegetables, or any one of a number of things which they might decide upon. It is claimed that this will give each community a better chance of competing than under the old order of exhibits.

This should be watched with a great deal of interest. According to A. G. Bearden, secretary of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, there is a rapidly rising interest in the coming fair and from all indications, this promises to be the greatest and largest that Dawson county has ever held.

When the board of directors meet next Monday, they will, among other business approve the premium list and release the fair catalog to the printers.

Every citizen in Dawson county should do everything possible to make of this a most successful exhibition. There is nothing to promote or cement the friendship of the entire citizenship that will compare with a well rounded successful county fair. It is impossible for a few citizens to put the proposition across, for it is a county wide proposition and one that should serve every citizen in the county.

Remember the dates, October 13, 14 and 15, with the big carnival attraction opening on Monday morning preceding the opening day of the fair which is on Thursday.

Opening Schedule For Grade School Released To Public

Children Are To Report Throughout Day

Children intending to enroll in the elementary school this year should study these plans closely before presenting themselves for enrollment:

Enrollment will begin at 9 o'clock, September 5. Pupils will be enrolled in "shifts" throughout the day instead of by the old plan, where all of the children came at one time for this purpose. It is hoped that children will be enrolled more accurately and easily by this plan. Children whose family names begin with A, B, C, D, E, or F, will report at nine o'clock. Children whose family names begin with G, H, I, J, K, L, or M, will report at ten-thirty o'clock. Children whose family names begin with N, O, P, Q, R, S, or T, will report at one o'clock. All others will report at 2:30 p. m.

Children will be dismissed as enrollment is completed.

Requirements on the part of pupils will be: (1) To determine what hour he is to report for enrollment and then present himself to the room section indicated below. (2) To present a book card and report from school attended. (3) To be able to show a record of immunity against smallpox if he has not attended this school before. Vaccination and smallpox records are on file in this system for children who

Modern Tractors Make Farmers' Work Easier

The ease with which farmers now prepare their land, plant, cultivate and harvest crops is in decided contrast to the methods employed a generation ago. The use of modern tractors and equipment has not only made farm work far easier but has been instrumental in lowering production costs as well.

Yet had it not been for pioneering efforts begun a generation ago, farmers would not now be enjoying the steady, dependable, time and money-saving tractor power that has lightened their labor load so materially. One of the earliest and very probably the original tractor designers, was honored during the recent National Air Mail Week when over one hundred letters went through the air from a tiny post office to all parts of the country. 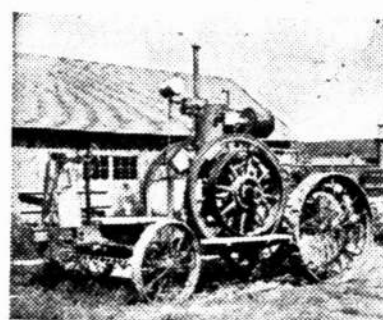
"Froelich, Iowa, honors John Froelich, 1849-1913, inventor of the world's first gas tractor.

Records show that Froelich's single cylinder, gasoline-burning tractor was put into service near Langford, South Dakota, in 1892, and that it not only supplied belt power but could actually move itself and pull other machinery at the same time. During that year it operated successfully for 72 days, supplying the power to thresh 1,000 bushels of grain a day.

In 1893, a number of business men in Waterloo, Iowa, joined with Mr. Froelich in organizing the Waterloo Gasoline Engine Company. Gasoline engines were built and experimental tractor development work was continued, until in 1912, the successful Waterloo Boy, kerosene-burning tractor was introduced.

In 1918, the Waterloo Gasoline Engine Company was purchased by Deere & Company. Thus there is a direct chain of events leading from Froelich's original tractor to the present line of modern John Deere two-cylinder tractors sold here by Allen Hardware Co.

Today's tractors are not only different in appearance from the old Froelich tractor, but they can do many

100 Fairview Citizens And Property Owners Appeal To The Voters Of Fairview, Pride And Lou School Districts

Whereas, the Board of County Trustees for Dawson County on July 6th without petition and at the request of a limited few, if any, of the Fairview citizens called a meeting of the Board and decided to order an election to approve an order made by the board grouping Fairview with Pride and Lou schools for high school purposes, and on August 10th the Board met again, but this time had a petition with 29 Fairview citizens (24 of whom were voters) who desired said election, but also had another petition with more than one hundred Fairview citizens and voters who appealed to the board not to disturb the Fairview school, thereby showing that a majority of those interested in the Fairview School did not want to be grouped with the other schools. Notwithstanding the wishes of more than 75% of the Fairview citizens not to be disturbed with this grouping, a majority of the County Trustees decided to use that vicious, renegade article 2922 and force the grouping on Fairview without their consent and over their protest. Article 2922 was evidently conceived to do just such things as this, as the law for consolidation provides that a majority of the voters of each district must vote for consolidation before it is legal; and whereas, if this election should carry by a majority vote of the proposed high school district, Fairview

would no longer function, a new name would be given the large district (perhaps Welch or Shacktown high school district). All power would be vested in the new trustees, including the right to levy and collect taxes, raise valuations in order to meet the increased expense, and then after all of this was done, Fairview and the other school as now located would be deprived of their present high school facilities and the Welch high school would have no elementary school facilities and the children of Welch would still have to attend these schools as they are, or do without schooling. And whereas, the forcing of the Fairview school into such an arrangement, over their protest and against their desire and wish is a violation of the spirit of free government, is unjust, and is not right, and smacks too much of the taking over of small free countries by larger countries who rule dictatorships, whose motto is might and force regardless of right and justice.

Therefore, we the one hundred citizens interested in the Fairview school appeal to the sense of justice and fairness of the voters of these three school districts, to not approve this doctrine of force and might over justice and right.

The interested ones of Fairview were not given a hearing as to whether or not we wished to surrender our school to the larger district. We were entitled to a hearing, even murderers, rapists and thieves are given a hearing before a judgment is rendered, but we were not.

If the Lou and Pride people wish to consolidate their schools for high school purposes or for general purposes, we have nothing to say, but when it is sought to bring the Fairview school into the group, we feel that the wishes of an overwhelming majority of our people should be considered. This appeal is made only to those of these districts who are fair-minded and open to consideration of a proposal on the principles of right and justice, and all we ask is that before you vote, please investigate and learn if we have truthfully stated the situation, and if you find that we have, all that we ask, is that you let your vote be governed by that wonderful rule, "Do unto others as you would that they do unto you" or as given by Confucius, "Do not unto another, that which you would not have another do unto you."

To those who would like the names of the Fairview petitioners against the dismemberment of its school, you can find them on a protesting petition at the County Superintendent's office.

He asked Dale to smell, and when he replied that he didn't care to, Charles unthoughtfully tossed the contents into his face.

(Continued From Front Page) have attended this school before. Children who have been vaccinated and whose vaccinations did not "take" will be required to be vaccinated again this year unless child has had at least three such unsuccessful vaccinations.

Children should not purchase a large amount of supplies until they have had instructions from teachers as to their needs. About the only equipment the needed the first day or two will be paper and pencil, or pen. It is the custom of the school to recommend no special brand of supplies except in very rare instances. Parents are hereby notified that requests from children to purchase certain brands of materials because of premium or prize values involved will do so out of his own initiative and not at the request of the teachers. Teachers will request children to purchase the minimum amount of supplies and no child will be penalized in any manner for being unable to make such purchases.

Children have been known to ask parents for money to purchase expensive or unnecessary supplies, claiming they were requested by the teacher.

when in reality no such requests were made. Parents in doubt about such matters may feel free to call the school for confirmation.

Attention is called to the importance of keeping children in school as much as possible. Every child should begin the very first day of school and stay there for the entire year. A few parents find it imperative to keep children out for cotton picking for a part of the fall. In cases where this is necessary, parents are urged to permit the child to enter at the beginning and stay as long as possible before cotton picking opens. Such children may find it helpful to attend school during bad weather and other days when they are not working. Every day spent in school has some value to the child.

Children under six years of age on September 1, 1938, will not be admitted to the first grade.

Parents are urged to bring first grade children to school on the first day and stay until the necessary information is acquired by the teacher. Children enrolling in the primary grades in this system for the first time might get along a little better in company with parents. All other children, it is felt, will need no assistance, however, parents are invited and urged to visit the school and to confer with teachers about the work of their children any time and as often as they choose.

All children should be able to give this information: Name, age, birthday, where born, when successfully vaccinated for smallpox, name of parent or

guardian, his occupation, his mailing address, former place of residence and school last attended. After children have determined the proper hour to report, they should study the schedule below to determine which room to report to for enrollment. This schedule is for the purpose of enrollment only and changes and adjustments will be made as they are needed.

Beginners between the ages of six and six and one-half years of age, September 1, 1938, report to room 108 high school building.

Beginners six and one-half years of age and above September 1, report to room 106 high school building.

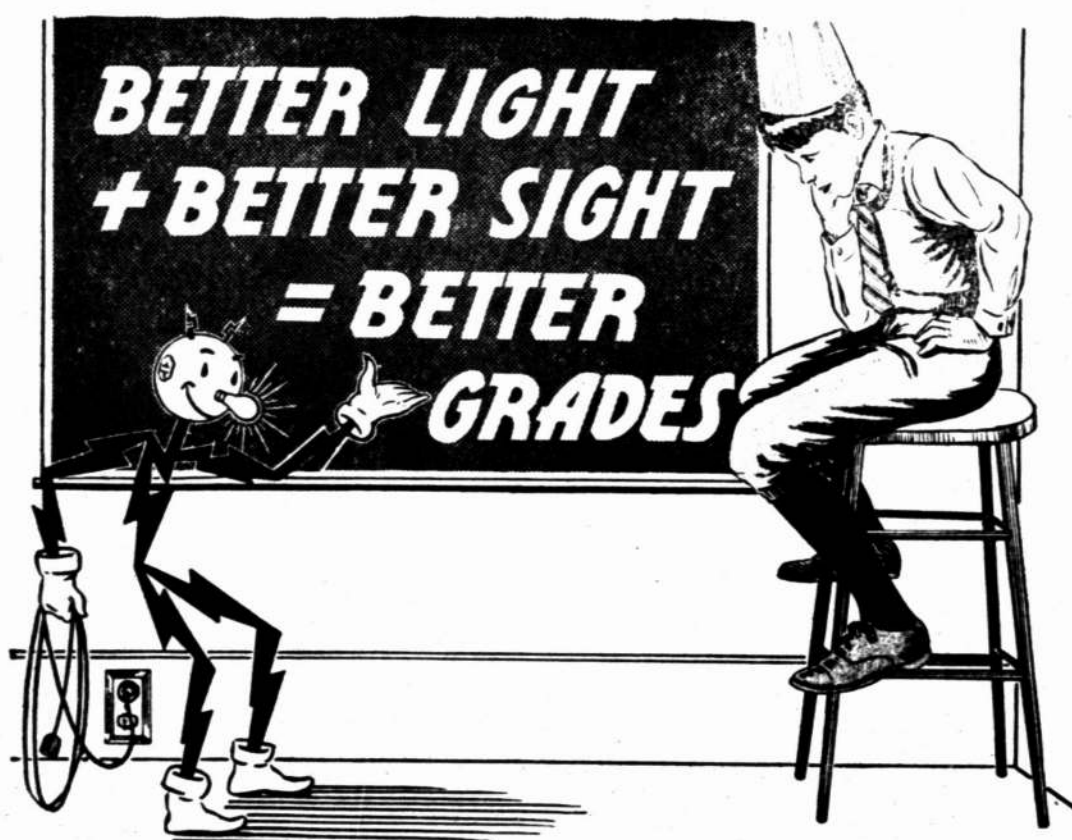

When selecting a refrigerator always consider size and cost. Choose one with plenty of shelf area. The shelves not being less than five inches apart.

Square cornered dishes are preferable for vegetables. Use bottles or small containers for milk, which should be kept in the coldest place. The meat should be kept in next to the coldest place.

Odorous vegetables and fruits should be kept in a zipper bag or jar.

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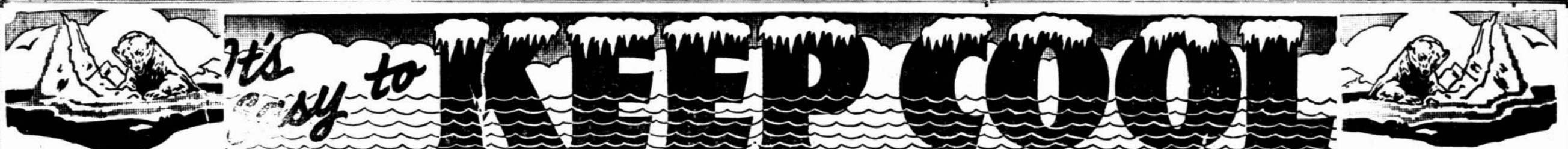
