SENATOR SPEAKS HERE TOMORROW

Senator Morris Sheppard will speak in Ballinger at 10:00 o'clock in the morning, (Wednesday). In a message received here Tuesday morning by friends Mr. Sheppard stated that he would speak here Wednesday afternoon if there was no conflicting date. James E. Ferguson is billed to speak in the afternoon, and arrangements were made for Senator Sheppard to speak in the forenoon and he was so advised and agreed to the change.

Senator Sheppard spoke at Sweetwater Monday night; San Angelo, Tuesday night; and will speak at Abilene Wednesday night after speaking in Ballinger Wednesday morning. The speaking here will either be in the court house or on the park lawn. Senator Sheppard is one of the best orators in Texas. He has done more than any other one senator in behalf of prohibition and woman suffrage, and has an enviable record in the United States senate.

REVIVAL MEETING AT SPRING HILL

It is announced that a revival meeting will begin on Friday night of this week at the Spring Hill school house. The Rannels Association Baptists, under the leadership of Missionary M. A. FILIPINO REVOLT LEADERS TAKEN

(By Associated Press)
MANILA, July 8.—Twenty-three alleged leaders of a secret clique formed among the Philippine Scouts to advance their demands for allowances of pay to equal the pay given white soldiers, were arrested at Fort McKinley today.

It is understood that there was a plan for a demonstration on August 2nd, when it was intended, according to the military authorities, to present a petition for increased pay and allowances to Governor General Wood, commanding officer of the Philippine department of the army.

A large majority of the three hundred scouts who refused to perform their duties last Saturday, returned to regular drills when the seriousness of their action was explained.

FARM BUREAU MAN GETS GOOD HEARING

J. W. L. Hall, field service director for the Farm Bureau Cotton Association, spoke to an audience of farmers which filled the lower floor of the district court room Saturday afternoon.

Oscar Sykes, local representative of the Farm Bureau Association, called the meeting to order and introduced the speaker. Mr. Hall reviewed the work of the association, telling what the farmers had gained by the co-operative marketing system, and what they would yet gain by the pooling system of selling. He was frequently applauded, and no doubt the organization will gain new members before the 1924 crop goes on the market.

The Farm Bureau Association will make its final statement for the past cotton season at an early date, and those who are familiar with the year's work declare that the report will make a good showing.

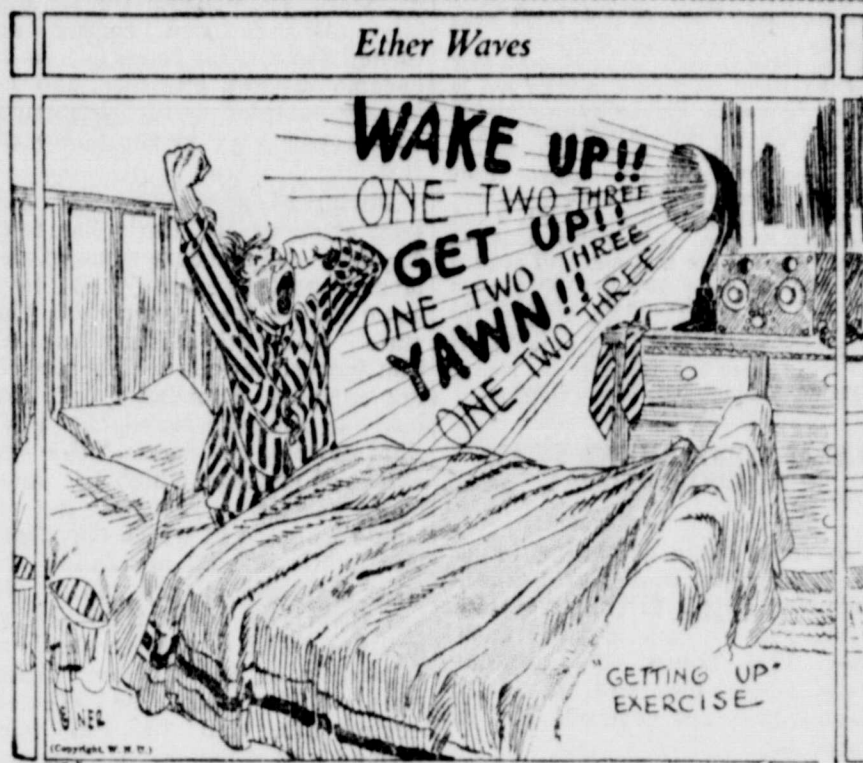

PRESIDENT'S SON DIES FROM BLOOD POISON

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 8.—Tentative plans for the funeral of Calvin Coolidge Jr., youngest son of President and Mrs. Coolidge, it is understood today include a simple service at the White House at 3:00 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The body will then be taken to Northampton, Massachusetts, the Coolidge home, where another service will be held, and burial will take place Thursday at Plymouth, Vermont, where the president was born.

The boy died at the Walter Reed Hospital a few minutes after 10:00 o'clock last night, death being due to blood poisoning caused by a blister on the foot. The remains were removed from the hospital to the White House shortly after the death, and the capital is in mourning today in sympathy for the president and his family.

Young Coolidge was ill just one week. On Monday afternoon of last week Calvin experienced a broken blister on the right foot during a tennis game with his brother. Blood poison developed from the blister and the condition of the boy soon became serious. After a conference of half a dozen physicians and surgeons last Saturday, an operation was performed Saturday night, and later blood transfusion was resorted to in an effort to save the lad's life.

President and Mrs. Coolidge were at the bedside of their son, or remained in the hospital near him almost constantly from the time the physicians announced that his condition was serious, and both were present when their son died.

The death of the president's son makes the third death in the White House during the occupancy of the last three presidents. President Wilson lost his first wife during his first administration. Less than a year ago President Harding died.

BREEDING YAKALOS MAY AUGMENT FUTURE WORLD MEAT SUPPLY

WAINWRIGHT, Alta., July 8.—A new breed of livestock which may have a bearing on the future meat supply, has been developed in the national park here by crossing buffaloes with yaks. Superintendent A. G. Smith says the stock has heavy beef qualities, combined with a good rustling nature.

The breed has been given the name "yakalos," which Mr. Smith believes will prove more practical than "catalo," evolved several years ago by crossing buffaloes with domestic cattle. "Yakalos" breed true to type, are sturdy and able to forage for themselves, he said.

More than 1,500 buffalo calves were born this year in Wainwright park, which makes up for the excess sires killed last winter. The herd now numbers 6,000 full grown buffaloes, the largest in existence and one of the remnants of the millions of bison that once roamed Western prairies, according to Mr. Smith.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, July 8.—After taking six more futile ballots today, running the total roll calls on balloting up to ninety-three, the Democratic National Convention adjourned until 9:00 o'clock tonight.

A conference of the leaders was planned during the recess this afternoon in the hope of finding some way through the political whirlpool which has witnessed the bitterest battle perhaps in the history of the Democratic Party, or at least since 1860 when the convention adjourned without making a nomination, and convened later by the Northern states which nominated Douglass.

MAY COMPROMISE ON REPARATIONS

(By Associated Press)

PARIS, July 8.—A compromise plan for collecting reparations, and continuing the reparations commission in control in the execution of the Dawes plan will be proposed to Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain by Premier Herriot of France when they meet this afternoon, it was stated.

The reparations commission, under this arrangement, would decide whether Germany was in default, but a separate body would be created to determine whether the default was voluntary or not.

A note explaining the French attitude on reparations has been drafted by Premier Herriot in collaboration with his advisors, and same has been approved by the French cabinet. After being presented to MacDonald the proposition will be sent to the various allied powers.

TWO WOULD BE GOV. ERNORS HERE TOMORROW

Adj. Gen. Thomas D. Barton will speak at Ballinger Wednesday night at 8:30 instead of Tuesday as first announced. A message was received here late Monday stating that a confusion in dates had made it necessary to postpone Mr. Barton's speaking date until Wednesday evening. He will speak at the court house at 8:30 Wednesday evening.

James E. Ferguson will speak at the same place at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon, both Gen. Barton and former Governor Ferguson visiting this city tomorrow. Arrangements have been made for the speeches, and both candidates will no doubt receive good hearings.

United States Senator Morris Sheppard will pass thru the city Wednesday en route to Abilene from San Angelo, he being billed to speak at San Angelo tonight and Abilene tomorrow night. Arrangements have been made for him to speak here at 10:00 o'clock in the morning.

RURAL REVIVAL RUNNING GOOD

The revival which began at the Eagle Branch Church, North of Ballinger, Sunday night, with ev. Scott W. Hickey in charge, is drawing large crowds at both the day and night services, according to a report coming to The Ledger. Two services are being held each day—10:30 a. m. and 8:30 p. m. The pastor of the church, Rev. John Bishop, was fortunate in getting the aid of Rev. Hickey at this time. J. N. Tidwell, the boy preacher, will deliver the sermon at the Wednesday evening service.

Mrs. Frank Marburger and daughter, Miss Lula, are here from South Texas, on a visit to Mrs. Marburger's father, Otto Vogelsang and family.

Taking advantage of the action of the convention yesterday which released all delegates from their instructions, the McAdoo strength scattered, while the Smith delegates held intact and continued to vote for the New York governor, his vote remaining about the same as before the delegates were released.

The convention has been in session two weeks today, and today is the eighth day of balloting. Delegates are becoming restless and are eager to break the deadlock, name a vice-presidential candidate and go home.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, July 8.—The Democratic National Convention today lifted Senator Ralston of Indiana, to a new point of vantage in balloting for a presidential nominee. McAdoo's strength was hammered to a new low level, and the lowest vote he has received since balloting began, while Smith is about holding his own, his delegation refusing to accept their release and go to other candidates. Senator Ralston's vote has climbed to a higher point than attained by any other candidate, except the two leaders—McAdoo and Smith. Added to several important blocks of votes going to Ralston is the Missouri vote of 36, which has previously been cast for Senator Glass, and Nevada's six votes which have been going to Governor Ritchie.

However, there is no definite sign of a stampede yet, but there is increasing activity on the convention floor in behalf of those who have been waiting hopefully for the hour of dissolution when the factions would be broken up. Balloting began today with the 88th roll call, and the leaders stood as follows on the first ballot of the day:

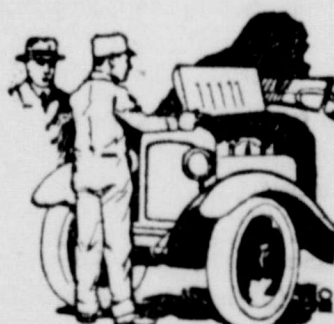

SPLITTING THE VOTE

The turmoil in the Democratic National Convention, and the fight between two factions to name a presidential nominee, is causing some of the boys to predict that the democrats will play a losing game this year.

Such talk in a doubtful state might be in place at this time, and it is the old campaign thunder used in every presidential election, but we fail to see the logic in the argument.

While it is true that the democrats are somewhat up in the air over the question of choosing a

leader, we predict that, with the exception of a few radicals, all will be well when a standard bearer is selected and we become better acquainted with him.

Those who fear a split in the party, and predict republican success, perhaps fail to take into consideration the fact that the republicans are split. There are already two republican presidential nominees in the field. LaFollette will receive the farm-labor-progressive element vote which made it possible for a little handful of representatives to hold the balance of power in the last congress.

With oil smeared all over the republican waters, and with two republican candidates for president in the field, we see no cause for the democrats to get grouchy. Remember that the Klan and prohibition question will also figure in the republican vote.

HUMANE SOCIETY IS CITY'S NEED

A humane society is badly needed in Ballinger to mete out punishment, or see that the law does it, in cases where dumb brutes are the victims of brutes in human form.

According to several cases reported to The Ledger recently, horses have been treated unmercifully by teamsters, and in their anger, because the horses balked, or were a little unruly, the drivers have resorted to methods of whipping the teams that left the dumb brutes almost maimed.

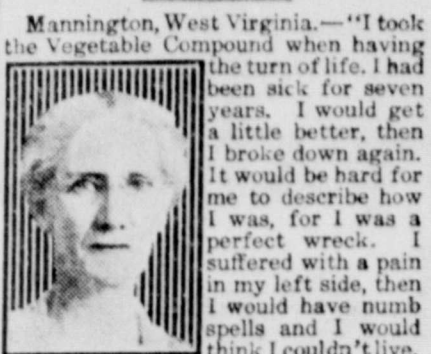

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Public officials who give satisfactory service ought to be retained in the public service. Those who are peculiarly qualified for the positions they hold ought not to be removed to satisfy the whim of some selfish group of the citizenship.

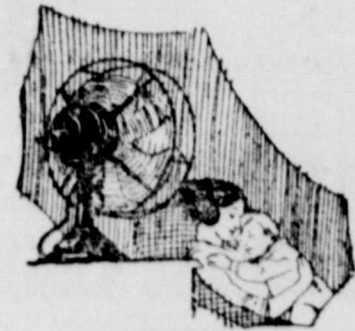
We can see no valid reason for the removal of District Attorney Walter U. Early from the office which he has filled so satisfactorily for more than seventeen years. It can be said without exaggeration that no other prosecuting attorney of Texas has given more faithful service than has he, nor has any other been more successful as a law enforcement official. Practically all his professional life, in fact, has been devoted to the one business of public prosecutor; for he was city attorney and county attorney for several years before he became district attorney, and he is now completing his eighteenth consecutive year in the latter office.

During his nine terms as district attorney Mr. Early has been required to prosecute some of the most important cases that have come before the courts of the state. The path of duty has led him into situations which tested not only his knowledge of the law and severely taxed his physical powers, but demanded every ounce of courage which a man could possess. There is not a single instance in which this fearless public official has failed to meet the tests as they came. He has displayed both the ability and the desire to enforce the law, regardless of any sinister influence which might be exerted against him; and he has performed that duty in a manner which has won the respect and admiration of the bar of the district, every member of which has at some time met him in open court in the trial of criminal cases.

To remove Mr. Early now, after his years of experience and while he is in his prime as a prosecuting attorney, and to substitute for him a young man with limited experience and with unknown qualifications of mind and heart, would be the height of folly. The enforcement of the laws depends

not only upon the willingness of the officials, but upon their actual ability; and we are constantly warned that the problem of law enforcement is one of the most serious questions that confronts us. By all means we should retain capable law enforcement officials who are performing their duty efficiently. To change could not bring improvement; it might bring retrogression. — Brownwood Bulletin. Immediately following the naming of the board of directors a meeting of the new board was called to meet in Ballinger Thursday, at which time officers will be elected, committees named and the machinery which will put in motion the 1924 fair will be put to work.

The association is being organized with a capital stock of \$10,000. 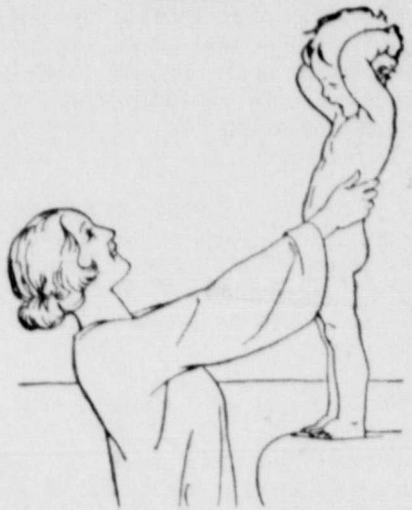

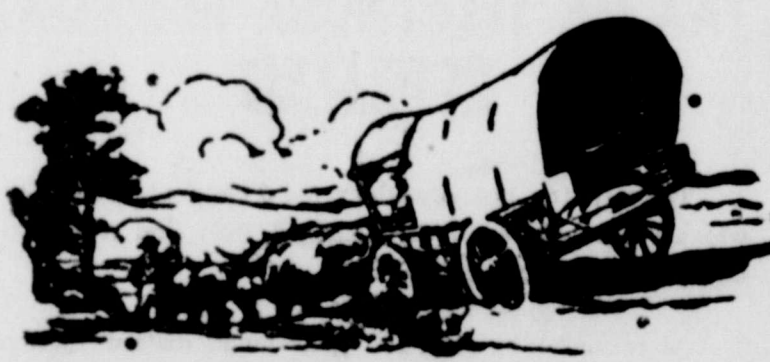
