RAINS FALL OVER MOST OF THE HILL COUNTRY.

Providence has again smiled on the Hill Country. Conditions never looked better and farmers, ranchmen and business men are more optimistic than for years. Every one is busy. DEFECTIVE CHILDREN

A gorilla is supposed to have the intelligence of a three-year-old child, because it can learn to do anything that a child of this age can do, except talk; and there are many three-year-old children that cannot talk. The gorilla is therefore accorded first place among animals. There are standardized mental tests used by universities to determine the mental age of animals and children, just as there are tests for physical strength. The gorilla can never be taught more than a three-year-old child knows already, because its brain does not contain the tissues necessary for more learning. There are people, whose brains lack the same tissues, and hence they can never advance beyond the learning of a three-year-old child, no matter how long they may go to school. She owes it to herself, her family, her home, and her country to bring into the world only healthy, normal children, and not burden the state and society with children that are sure to become wards of the government.

Finish every day and be done with it. You have done what you could. Some blunders and absurdities no doubt crept in; forget them as soon as you can. Tomorrow is a new day; begin it well and serenely and with too high spirit to be cumbered with your old nonsense. This day is all that is good and fair. It is too dear, with its hopes and invitations, to waste a moment on the yesterdays.—Emerson.

FORMER JUNCTION METHODIST PASTOR DIES.

Rev. Jas. T. Tracy, Methodist pastor at Miles, and father of Postmaster Earl D. Tracy, died at the Temple Sanitarium last Saturday morning and was buried the following day, March 7th, at Miles.

Rev. Tracy was pastor of the Junction church in 1917-18, and has many friends throughout this county and the entire western part of the State.

Eighteen years ago he came from Middle Tennessee, where he was born 63 years ago, and since that time has been a member of the West Texas Conference. He has been in ministerial work since he was 32 years of age. For the past three years he has been serving the Miles Methodist Church, and the large number of sorrowing friends who attended his funeral was evidence of the high esteem in which he was held by all who knew him.

Deceased has been in bad health for nearly a year, and some months ago had undergone an operation. Since that time he has been gradually growing weaker, and about two weeks ago was taken to Temple.

He is survived by his wife, one son, E. D. Tracy of Junction, and two daughters, Mrs. Ernest Pearcey of Bastrop and Miss Beulah Tracy, a student of McMurray's College at Abilene, all of whom were with him at the time of his death.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and interment was in charge of this order. Rev. H. E. Draper, Presiding Elder of the San Angelo District, conducted the funeral services.

Postmaster Tracy, who had been with his father for the past week, returned Monday night, accompanied by his mother, who will make her home with him for a while.

HONORED WITH BIRTHDAY PARTY.

For many years he was the executive who guided the destinies of the Houston Post and at the time of his death, was a member of the board of directors of the Houston Post-Dispatch. A true, loyal friend, a regular democrat and a forceful writer. The craft will mourn his death. He was 76 years of age.—San Saba News.



THE HISTORIC OLD SPANISH TRAIL, WEST.

The Texas borderland with her sweeping canyons and lofty peaks was first traversed by Cabeza de Vaca, in 1535. In his Neufraquiries or report to King Charles the Fifth, he speaks of the Pecos River as "a mighty river running from the North." Right, in his history of the Big Bend, gives Cabeza's crossing of the Pecos as near the mouth of Live Oak Creek, for that is the only place where the Pecos "flows from the North." This trail that De Vaca was following on that long journey afoot from the coast of the present Galveston to the West coast of Mexico. He was the first Spanish traveler over this trail of the Red man, the trail that throughout time has stood like a camel among trails, destined as the great trunkline of the

South.—The Old Spanish Trail—De Vaca was also the first white man to cross the continent, for he landed at Tampa Bay in 1528, and through those years of ambition, struggle and disaster, he was at many of the notable spots on the Old Spanish Trail of today.

Next came De Espejo in 1553. He gave the Pecos the name of "Rio de Vacas," on account of the many buffaloes.

Mendoza traversed the Trans-Pecos country in 1683. He named the Pecos River the "Rio Salado," or Salt River. He tells in his records of the trip of killing three buffalo bulls near Comanche Springs, the present site of Fort Stockton. De Vaca, too, was at these springs. They are so notable any crossing of the Trans-Pecos country would include them. Ft. Stockton is building into an important Western city through irrigation from these great springs. Auto travelers of the Old Spanish Trail today camp by these springs that through the ages have been the watering and camping place of men and beasts.

Three hundred years ago this trail was followed by daring Spanish adventurers seeking their Eldorado, their dream cities of gold. Side by side with them came the brave Franciscan Fathers, risking death and privations, desiring to save the savage soul as the bore the burden of the cross.

Following in their wake came the pioneers and adventurers and then the soldiers. The trail became a connecting link between outlying posts scattered through the Southwest borderland. It became the old government road followed by the emigrant trains marching into the sunset of their dreams on the California coast. Over it the heroic drivers speeded the Butterfield stage coaches with mounted guards for protection. Bigfoot Wallace was one of the early drivers pioneering the perilous way across the Southwest.

An advertisement in the Texas Almanac of 1858, of the San Antonio and San Diego Mail Line, mentions Fort Lancaster and Fort Davis of this section. The ruins of old Fort Lancaster are now one of the sights on the Old Spanish Trail of today at Live Oak and this ancient crossing of the Pecos River. The town of Sheffield is near by. The next stop of this coach line was the Comanche Springs, now Fort Stockton, then Fort Davis where the old government post is still a respectable ruin.

When the Davis Mountains became a State park, travelers over the Old Spanish Trail will follow the trails that are lined with blood of Indians, Spanish Commandadores and Padres, and be of the Anglo-Saxon as he finally conquered the land. This Trans-Pecos country bristles of old years of history and was also one of the last stands of Indians and outlaws as they fought the search of law and order. It was, twice often traveled by the Spaniards in their scout paths between Mexico and Santa Fe, the second oldest city in the United States.

It today is a Southern highway stretching from ocean on the Gulf to ocean on the left, and marked through this border country by ruins of old forts, or lonely rock-covered graves, or stretches of the old road hatched out of solid rock and laid in the olden years were worn down by stage coach and covered wheels.

On the highest peaks looking down on it are rock monies marking the last resting place of war chiefs waiting that last call back to these scenes—their own Happy Hunting Grounds.

GOOD SALADS

A salad which is especially appetizing with a game or tame duck dinner

is sliced oranges with French dressing. Arrange the slices overlapping each other on lettuce and add the dressing just as it is ready to serve.

Canned pears dipped in salad dressing, rolled in chopped nuts, blanched chopped almonds, are especially good. Place on lettuce and serve with any good salad dressing.

Emergency Salad.—Combined grated cheese, canned peas, a hard-boiled egg chopped, a few tablespoons of chopped watermelon pickle, a dash of onion juice or a little scraped onion with such seasonings as are needed, makes a most tasty salad. Serve on lettuce.

Apple chopped or cut into small dice, two parts of apple mixed with one part of finely diced Spanish onion; mix with a good salad dressing and serve on lettuce.

A combination of apples, bananas and oranges, using twice as much apple as bananas and half as much orange as bananas. With a cupful of cream, add a cupful and a half of sugar, the grated rind and juice of a lemon.

Pineapple and Nut Salad.—Use the sliced canned pineapple, arrange a slice on each plate and fill the hole in the center with grated cheese, cover with French dressing and sprinkle with chopped nuts and minced parsley.

Almond and Cabbage Salad.—Shred a firm white head of cabbage, add a cupful of blanched almonds shredded, season with salt and paprika, and add a cupful of sour cream. Toss a salad bowl with lettuce leaves, heap in the salad and serve with cheese and crackers. Pineapple finely diced added to chopped or shredded cabbage with a good salad dressing is a very tasty combination.

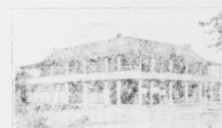

Attention is again called to the fact that no communications addressed to this paper and intended for publication will be printed unless the name of the person sending in the news matter, is signed to it. Two such communications were received last week, and while we would have been very glad to have used them, we could not do so because they were not signed by the writer.

We might also call attention to the fact that obituaries and cards of thanks will not be used when mailed in, unless the person sending them has an account with the paper, or makes some arrangement as to payment for same. Such matter is charged for and The Eagle can not open a number of small accounts, indiscriminately, unless arrangements are made personally, or by telephone. The rate on cards of thanks and obituaries is 2 cents per word, the same as other advertising. We are always glad to accommodate our subscribers and if they will see or phone us, when sending in this kind of matter for publication, we will be glad to charge the account even though the trouble of doing so amounts to more than the charge itself, but we frequently receive such matter from persons who are not subscribers, with the request that same be published and that a bill be mailed them. We used to do this, but found that in most cases such charges resulted in a total loss to us, so the practice has been discontinued.

The Eagle will go a long way to accommodate its subscribers, but it doesn't care to take long chances on losses in accommodating non-subscribers.

There is nothing super-human about the management of country newspapers, such as this one. We make every effort to get all the news that is suitable to print, but cannot learn of everything that happens. We shall be glad to have anyone phone or send in news for the paper. It will not take much of your time and will materially assist us in giving you a better newspaper. It takes money to collect news just the same as for any other kind of work, and a newspaper of the size of The Eagle doesn't have sufficient financial income to enable it to pay special reporters that would be necessary to collect information on every county happening.

Probably every editor of every newspaper has been chided; good-naturedly by some friends, concerning favorable comment made with reference to someone who had died, or with reference to newly-weds. Editors take such chiding good-naturedly and pass on at that, but there is often reflection on the part of the newspaper man. It is not infrequent that the newspaper man could write a half column concerning the man who would have the newspaper tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, about other people; and half a column, if it contained the truth, would cause the editor to have to slip out over night or else face an infuriated foe in the person who would have nothing but the truth told on other people.

Now isn't this so?

This much has been said by the way of preface. The remaining comment shall be by way of digression, romancing and generalization. But why should newspapers tell all facts concerning those who have died or those who may have taken unto themselves a helpmate? or any other person, for that. Ministers do not. Bankers do not. School teachers do not, and our friends do not, as for that. It would be unwise and indiscreet for anyone to undertake to broadsides the shortcomings of fellowmen. So why a newspaper do it? On the other hand, if a newspaper should make it a part of its business to divulge all that it might know or believe about the social conditions and the business conditions of the town, an uproar would be created that could not be stopped short of social fued. This would hold true with reference to any town a man might select. The fellow who thinks he would get joy out of such a thorough-going, truth-seeking, revealing practice on the part of a newspaper, should stop to think of these things in light of common justice, discreetness and fairness to all concerned.
