The exact date has not been set for this meeting but it will more likely be held the latter part of March. Fifty-three West Texas counties comprise the 18th district which will meet here. A number of visitors from Oklahoma and Kansas will also attend the Legion meeting or five hundred are expected. The district meeting of the Parent-Teachers Association meets in Perryton April 1-2-3. The last meeting was held at Childress, Texas. Over three hundred and fifty to four hundred delegates will attend this convention. The other convention is a district meeting of the Baptist Sunday School and Y. P. U. It will be held on April 9-10. The district extends as far south as Hall county and includes Amarillo on the west. About four hundred guests are expected for this gathering.

Girl Killed At Booker

Year Old School Girl Loses
Life In Runaway While Re-
turning From School

Little Miss Othella Harper, 10, was almost immediately killed on Monday afternoon of this week, when the buggy in which she was riding home from school was wrecked. After the horse had become excited and ran away. The little girl, her sister, Maggie, 13, and Byron McCaughy, 12, were returning from school and had just reached the place that leads to their home when the horse got excited at something and bolted for home. As he turned at the gate toward home the two children, Maggie and Byron, were thrown from the buggy. The other child lay in the windmill tower as the horse reached home.

As a cause from this impact the buggy was almost completely demolished, and the little lady received injuries that resulted in her death. Although she was not dead when she was reached, she died on the way to Beaver where they were taking her to the hospital.

Funeral services are being held at 2 o'clock today (Wednesday) at the Christian Church in Booker, and interment will be made in the Heart Cemetery—Booker News.

CAPTURE LARGE WHISKEY STILL

SHERIFF TALLEY AND DEPUTIES
GET STILL AND ONE
THOUSAND GALLONS
MASH ON RIVER

Sheriff Sid Talley and Deputies Fred Huston, D. D. Taliaferro, and J. W. Pottorff got themselves a nice Christmas present when they uncovered a still, two still dug-outs and a thousand gallons of mash on Christmas afternoon. The moonshine equipment was found on the bank known as the old Christopher place, and now owned by a man at Stinnett. No one lives on the ranch at the present time. It is located about twenty-five miles southeast and just across the line in Roberts county.

Sheriff Talley and his men have been working in cooperation with Sheriff Ramsey of Roberts county for some time in an effort to find this source of moonshine liquor which they thought was hidden some place in the rough country of that section, and the find came at the end of a three day search. The still had an estimated capacity of about a hundred gallons a day and was already in operation. The officers state that a fire had been burning under the still and a small quantity of liquor run off, showing that the moonshiners had evidently been apposed of the search.

The still and other liquor making equipment was brought to Perryton by the officers, the mash was poured out. Sheriff Talley says that the dugouts for the making of whiskey were very cleverly concealed and that they were not noticed until almost right on top of them. The suspected operators of this moonshine plant are citizens of Ochiltree county, so state the officers.

Grandma Whippo Dead

Aged Pioneer Woman Passes Over
at Ripe Age of Over Ninety-
six Years Last Friday

Died at the ranch home of her son, E. L. Whippo, Friday, December 26, 1930, Mrs. Matilda Preston Whippo, at the ripe age of ninety-six years, four months and fifteen days.

"Smooth the locks of silver hair,

Matilda Preston Whippo was born near Cincinnati, Ohio, on August 11, 1834. At the age of three years, she moved with her parents to Liberty, Indiana, where she grew to young womanhood. After graduating from college at Dublin, Indiana, she taught school until she was married on January 2, 1856, to Chas. H. Whippo. Seven children were born to this union, four of whom are still living. They are Mrs. Alvin Teas and Jas. H. Whippo, Cornvallis, Oregon; Mrs. Pauline Peacock, Glendale, Calif.; and E. L. Whippo, of this county.

When just a girl, the deceased united with the Presbyterian church, later placing her membership with the Friends Church at Fountain City, Indiana. Her early married life was spent near Terre Haute, Indiana, later moving to Fountain City. Following the death of her husband, who passed away in this county in 1890, this grand old lady has made her home at different places with her children, in this city and county, in Oregon, and in New York. Since 1926 she has been in the home of her son, E. L. Whippo.

FOR CHRISTMAS

Sixty needy families in and near Perryton were made happy on Christmas day through the distribution of baskets filled to overflowing with good wholesome food for the holiday table. These baskets were made possible by the American Legion and Auxiliary of Perryton working in cooperation with the business and professional men of the city. The committee from the Legion had been working faithfully on this project for several weeks before Christmas, and a sincere effort was made to help every needy family. Many names were turned in, which on investigation, were turned down, and it is hoped that none that were really needy were missed. Six of these baskets were delivered to the Gray country, and three went into the Waka community.

Each basket contained one or more dressed chickens, bread, cookies or a cake, apples, potatoes, coffee, sugar, milk, canned peas, corn and tomatoes, dried beans and pork, bananas, cranberries, butter, candy and nuts. Many of the baskets also had bundles of clothing, and toys were sent to every family where there were children. A number of families were also given a load of coal. A conservative guess on the value of the food, clothing, fuel and toys distributed by the Legion on Christmas Eve, would almost reach \$1,000. BUCHANAN REPLACES SHANKS; BOYER FOR
BULL; CUDD IS ASSESSOR AND MRS.
BLANK IS TREASURER; NORRIS
IS NEW COMMISSIONER

Today is moving day at the Ochiltree county courthouse and new bosses are to be found in almost every office in the building. Six new county officials took office this morning. Buchanan takes Shanks' place as county clerk. Boyer takes the county attorney job from Bull. Flowers is now in Grigsby's office as county judge. Norris beat Handley for commissioner.

Cudd is the new assessor and Mrs. Blank is the new treasurer.

This is one of the biggest shake-ups that has ever happened in county officials in the history of this county. Sheriff Talley is one of the few officers who is staying in. He ran a successful race for re-election and starts today on his twenty-third year as sheriff of Ochiltree county. R. C. Allen, county engineer and D. R. Allen, justice of peace for precinct one, both went back into office with opposition.

In the commissioners court we find one new face. W. R. Norris of the Notia county replacing Sam Handley of the Wolf Creek community as commissioner from precinct four. Three veterans are back on the job however; R. A. Fuller from the southwest part, W. G. Yeary representing the northwest part of the county and H. C. Brillhart from the northeast. Every member of this court is a business man of ability and Ochiltree county is fortunate in having men who will give of their time to serve in such an important office.

Dave Shanks retires from the county and district clerks office after serving faithfully for twelve years, to make way for Irvin Buchanan, who is going in well qualified to do the job. Boyer, prominent young attorney is now to be found in the county attorney's office, replacing J. M. Bull, who had served two terms. Oscar C. Flowers, another young attorney takes the office of county judge, which has been held by J. M. Grigsby for the past ten years. Judge Grigsby will remain in the courthouse, having an office as justice of precinct two. The Judge served three terms as county judge in Wheeler county before moving to this county.

Mrs. J. T. Guthrie, former county treasurer, and J. W. Wright, assessor, gave up their offices of their own accord, neither running for re-election. Mrs. O. E. Blank went in today as county treasurer, and M. M. Cudd takes the office of assessor. J. W. Wright has served this county eighteen years as assessor and Mrs. Guthrie had put in six years as treasurer.

Heavy Truck Loading

State Highway Officials State Trucks Loads Are Now Too Heavy for Bridges

Washington, D. C.—Alarm is expressed by State Highway Officials throughout the country over what they fear may prove a premature movement to legally increase motor loads and also to extend the legal width of motor buses before highway engineers are able to determine scientifically what the effects would be on present construction.

Recent tests of motor vehicles, particularly of motor trucks and motor buses, as moving loads, indicate that wide differentials exist in the impact reactions produced on loads, depending upon the tire equipment, speed and other variables.

The data at the present time is so incomplete that the State Highway Officials at their recent sessions at Pittsburgh unanimously passed a resolution opposing any changes in bus width and truck load weight now permitted by the laws of the states.

It is expected that the investigations now going forward will be completed within a few months and at that time a definite recommendation will be made for any changes. In the meantime, state highway officials are hoping that no state will let down the bars to wider buses and heavier truck loads until their investigations have been completed.

The width of a bus beyond 96 inches will be opposed by all state and particularly so in view of the fact that most of the roads are not now more than 20 feet wide.

Furthermore, a very careful canvass of the bridges now in use in the various states shows that over 90 per cent were constructed before the present regulation as to load weight went into effect. In fact, these bridges are now under constant watch to prevent accidents and loss of life. To permit increased truck loads and wider buses before these deficient structures can be brought to date will be inviting danger.

Highway officials are well aware of the seriousness of the bridge situation and are doing their utmost to correct it as speedily as possible. Their chief concern, however, is that no additional load weight be authorized by law until the bridges are either strengthened or rebuilt altogether.

Liberal Athlete Killed

Bill Ravenscroft Dies From Injuries Sustained in Auto Wreck Last Week

Ursel Ravenscroft, better known among his friends as "Bill", 20-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. P. E. Ravenscroft of this city, died at Epworth Hospital shortly after 3:00 p. m. Tuesday, December 23, from concussion of the brain, resulting from an auto accident near Tyrone, Okla., at 8:00 o'clock the preceding evening. Bill and Carl Cantwell of Liberal were returning home from Hooker, Okla., in Shorty Snyder's Ford roadster. Cantwell was driving and when about two miles this side of Tyrone was blinded by the lights of an approaching car. There was a pile of sand at the side of the road and Cantwell is reported to have asked his companion whether to try to avoid the sand or the car. He struck the pile of sand and the Ford was completely wrecked, Bill being thrown out and rendered unconscious. He never regained consciousness.

Cantwell was cut about the hands, face and head, but his injuries are not serious.

Bill was a star player on the Liberal high school Redskins football team and was recently voted the most valuable player on the team. He was also a member of the Liberal high school senior class and a capable young man of splendid physique, with a bright future before him.

He was a general favorite and the news of his serious injuries brought forth much concern. His passing brings sadness to the many who knew and admired him and the bereaved family has the sympathy of the community in its sorrow.—Liberal News.

Director of Census Announces Returns of Unemployment Classifications in Texas

The Director of the Census announced today the unemployment returns for Texas by classes and sex.

The unemployment inquiry, which was made last April as a part of the population census, covered all persons usually working at a gainful occupation who were not at work on the day preceding the enumerator's call. These returns are presented in seven classes, based on the worker's status, such as "out of a job," "having a job, but on lay-off," "unable to work," etc.

The most significant group, designated in the tables as Class A, is made up of persons out of a job, able to work, and looking for a job. These persons numbered 75,827, forming 1.3 per cent of the total population. The total included 63,543 males and 12,284 females.

The next most important group, designated Class B, comprises persons having jobs who are on lay-

off without pay, excluding those sick or voluntarily idle. In this class there were 19,436 persons, 16,088 males, and 3,348 females.

The remaining returns were grouped into five classes, as follows: Class C, persons out of a job and unable to work, 6,221; Class D, persons having jobs but idle on account of sickness or disability, 9,272; Class E, persons out of a job and not looking for work, 3,259; Class F, persons having jobs but voluntarily idle, without pay, 4,284; Class G, persons having

jobs and drawing pay, though not work (on vacation, etc.) 5,103.

The above returns were based on a total census of 5,824,715, including 3,009,281 males and 2,815,434 females.

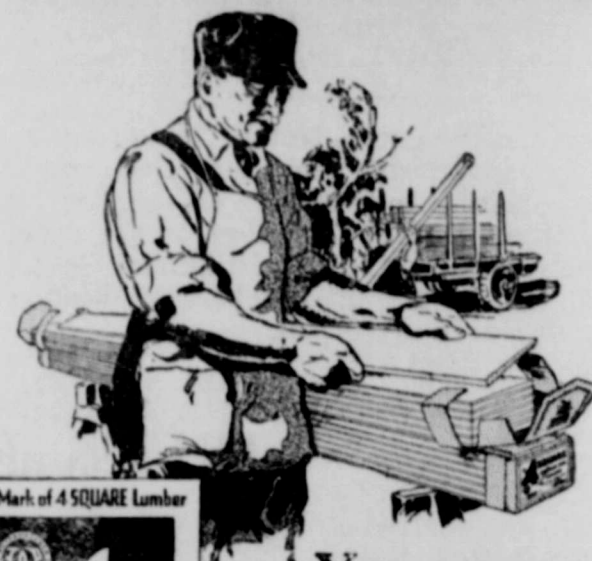

The Pierce Johnson Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary is entering the year of 1931 with a record of less than three years of constructive service behind it and prospects for increasing usefulness ahead, said Mrs. Sibley Jines, chairman of Unit Activities and Community Service, in outlining the program of the organization for the new year. The year of 1930 has been the most successful in the life of the Auxiliary, she declared and she predicted further expansion of Auxiliary activities in 1931.

"Like all the Auxiliary's other 7,000 Units, the first interest of the Pierce Johnson Unit during 1931 will be the welfare of the disabled veterans, their wives and children, and the widows and orphans of the dead," Mrs. Jines stated. "For ten years the Auxiliary has aided the American Legion in its long fight for justice for these unfortunate and heroic victims of the war. A vast amount of good has been accomplished but still the distress caused by the war is far from being ended."

"Justice is never automatic. Without the powerful voice of the American Legion and Auxiliary to plead their case before the country, the position of the disabled veterans and their dependents would be pitiable. Every law beneficial to veterans which has been passed since the war has been secured through the support of the Legion and Auxiliary. Thousands upon thousands of deserving veterans, widows and orphans have been given essential aid in proving their claims for government compensation. In every community there are homes which have been kept together, children who have been given a fair start in life and families which have been re-established economically through the assistance of the Legion and Auxiliary."

"This work must go forward and be increased in scope for each year sees the number of disabled men and dependent families enlarged as more and more veterans break down from results of their war service. The government's policy toward the disabled veterans has been liberalized considerably during the past year but nothing can ever replace the personal interest and attention which the women of the Auxiliary are able to give to the disabled and their families."

Other work on the Auxiliary's program for 1931 includes Americanism activities to foster a better understanding of the ideals and institutions of the United States; support of an adequate national defense for the country; building better international good will through peace, the interrelated federation of war veterans, and the carrying out of projects to improve civic and social conditions in the communities in which Auxiliary Units are located.

BARTHELMESS TUTORED BY SPANISH EXPERT

Richard Barthelmess learned many things about the Spanish language during the making of "The Lash," his First National-Vitaphone starring vehicle coming to the Ellis Theatre next Wednesday and Thursday.

Under the tutelage of his friend, Manuel Reachi, he, for example, learned the meaning of the word "adios" which is a combination of two words, "a" and "dios," meaning "to God." Its oldest and closest English equivalent is the new

archaic "Godspeed."

The fullest meaning of "adios" was retained in "The Lash," the film version of the novel by Lainer and Virginia Stivers Bartlett. With the aid of Spanish and Mexican technical advisors the romantic flavor of early California was injected into this first picturesquely romantic story Barthelmess has done since "The Fighting Blade" and "The Bright Shawl."

This coupled with "When the green grass grew all around" definitely phased a sound in the Mexicans' mind which developed into "Gringo."

DIRECTOR CITES EXPERIENCE WITH FILM

Many people have asked what I consider the most useful quality for a director to possess, when about to begin a new production. To this query, I have a stock answer of one word: "Enthusiasm."

I mean that the director must first of all be enthusiastic about the story. He must believe in the soundness of the dramatic premise upon which it is founded. He should be enthused about every member of the cast.

A perfect example of the theory is my own experience with "Part Time Wife," my second feature production for Fox Movietone. When I first read Stewart Edward White's "The Shepper Newfounder" in the Saturday Evening Post, I said "There's a corking good story for the screen!"

When Fox had bought the picture rights for the story, I had been so thoroughly sold on its screen possibilities that I wasn't at all surprised when I was assigned to direct it. If anything, I was enthused.

MAKING MONEY
FROM OUR GAMESPORTSMEN'S PLAN TO PAY
FOR SHOOTING RIGHTS
TO BE EXTENDED
NATIONALLY

Farmers in every state in the Union may soon be able to quit worrying about the low price of corn or wheat, with money rolling in from a new and more profitable crop.

The sportsmen of the United States opened this new source of riches for the farmers when they adopted, at the recent Seventeenth American Game Conference, a new game policy setting forth their belief that the farmer who practices environmental control for the production of more game is entitled to compensation for his trouble.

Adoption of this policy by a conference which speaks for millions of sportsmen from every state means, in brief, that hunters are ready to give financial encouragement to the farmer for the farmer's part in preserving their sport. The farmer who wants to raise a "crop" of game is assured of a steady and profitable "market" from sportsmen who hunt on his land.

The new game policy was embodied in a report submitted to the conference by a committee which has made a long study of the situation, and its straightforward statement of the principle of compensation marks a new era in the relationship between farmers and sportsmen, to the great benefit of both.

To the farmer, the new policy means a new source of revenue from all his lands, those now idle as well as those in cultivation. To the sportsman, the new policy means a steady increasing supply of game in the United States.

In Texas, said another speaker, J. G. Burr, director of research of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, many farmers working under the state's hunting preserve system are making more money on their game crop than on their cattle or cotton, because the game market does not fluctuate.

Texas farmers who establish shooting preserves are allowed to charge a maximum of \$4 a day for the privilege of hunting on their land. As a result, the acreage in these hunting preserves rose from 1,000,000 to 2,500,000 in the first two years, and the increase in game may be gauged by the fact that the state shows a 100 per cent increase in takings of wild turkeys, and an increase of 24 per cent in deer.

All the speakers stressed the point that farmers will be put to little cost of time or money to reap this new harvest.

Simply by letting a few patches grow up to weeds or brush, leaving a few fence corners untouched, occasionally putting out a few ears of corn on stakes or low bushes for feed during the coldest days, and controlling predatory animals and birds, any farmer will have the nucleus for a small game preserve which will bring in an abundant return of cash and increase the nation's now-diminishing game supply.

Best of all, the plan can be put into effect in any state, since there is no state in the Union not suitable to raising game of one kind or another, Mr. Gordon said.

Other cardinal points in the game policy adopted by the American Game Conference, which was under the auspices of the American Game Protective association, and thereby represents the attitude of sportsmen everywhere, were the following:

Extension of the game lands under public ownership and management as fast as funds will permit in the various states.

Training of experts in the field of game administration.

Study of factors favoring game propagation, and increased utilization of these factors.

Enlistment of scientists and non-hunters in the general program of wild-life propagation.

Redistribution of the cost of game administration, now borne almost entirely by hunters through their hunting licenses. The report points out that since game administrations are largely concerned with other wild life besides game, it is unfair to ask the hunter to bear the entire burden alone.

HARMONY PLAN UPSET

From present indications the spirit of cooperation hoped for during the short session of Congress has practically vanished, and bitter strife has taken its place.

Just before the opening of the session a number of Democratic leaders issued a statement pledging assistance to the administration in the enactment of necessary legislation of a beneficial nature. It was naturally suggested at the time that there would be a wide divergence of opinion as to just what legislation would be beneficial and so it has turned out.

Within a week after Congress met strong opposition to certain of President Hoover's proposed relief measures developed, chiefly over the

amounts of various appropriations and the manner of their expenditure.

Generally speaking, the President has stood for lower appropriations than his opponents, and he has asked for greater latitude in directing the use of appropriated funds than the opposition is willing to give him. Then the President's insistence on action by the Senate on World Court adherence has created additional friction.

A few days ago President Hoover issued a statement highly critical of certain groups in Congress, whom he accused of obstructing relief legislation and "playing politics at the expense of human misery." This was met with a storm of disapproval and resentment on the part of Democrats and insurgents, in which even some regular Republicans joined. Public opinion is divided over whether the President's criticism was justified.

In any event, the legislative situation is in a turmoil often report that augur well for prompt action on the various important measures under consideration by Congress. To the layman it appears that all concerned are playing politics in the same old way.

TO THE CITIZENS OF OCHILTREE COUNTY:

Upon the advent of my first year to serve in the capacity of county attorney of Ochiltree County, it is my desire to take over the helm of this office assured of the faithful and sturdy co-operation of the law-abiding citizens of this county. Whatever small measure of success may possibly be credited to the ensuing administration will rest and depend and be fundamentally due to the assistance of those whom I am to serve, namely, the public spirited people who comprise and make up our good county.

It is my firm conviction that the continued success of the enforcement of all laws on our statute books depends upon a frank discussion between the public and its officials. If during the next two years, problems arise which need the assistance of the county attorney, I want to give the earnest assurance that I shall attempt to render as diligent and beneficial a service as I shall have at my command. Needless to say, there will be mistakes made and many of them chargeable solely to this office but I am going to exert every possible effort to minimize the same and whenever a mistake is made, if it is possible to correct it, I shall be exceedingly glad to do so.

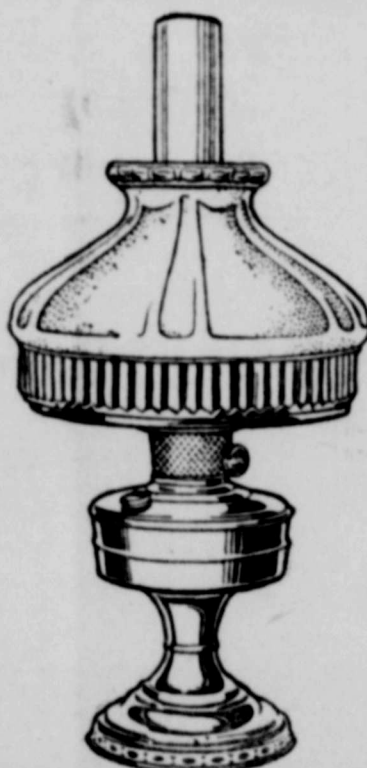
