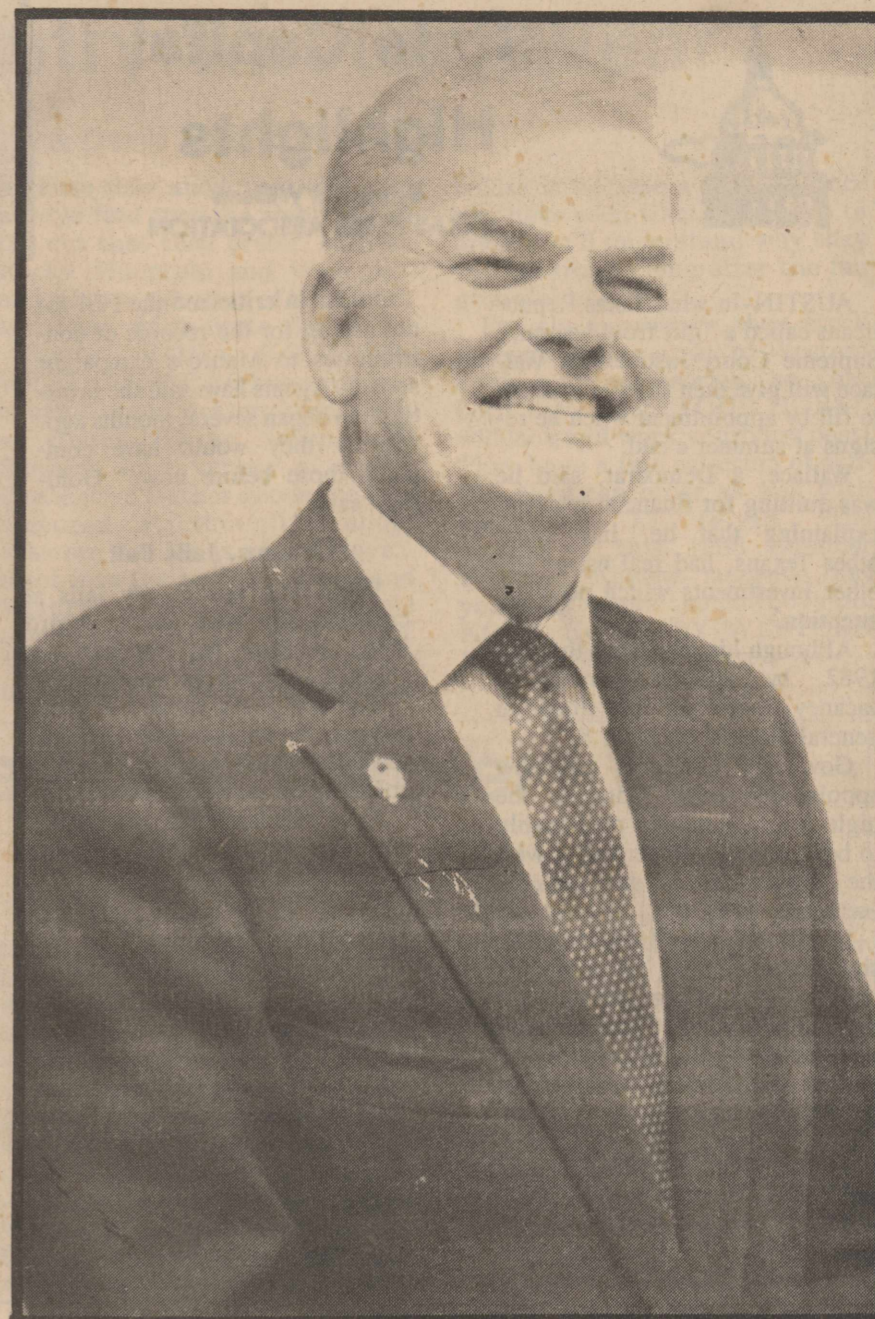

Dr. Tom Hargrove Recipient Of Two Ag. Communications Awards

Top awards for professionalism in agricultural communication and for excellence in international affairs were presented 13 July to Dr. Thomas R. Hargrove, head of the Communication and Publications Department of the International Rice Research Institute (IRRI), Philippines.

The awards were given by Agricultural Communicators in Education (ACE) in Washington, D.C. this week. The international 650-member professional society is one of five professional societies comprising the U.S. Agricultural Communicators Congress, which meets in Washington every four years.

The Professional Award, ACE's highest recognition, is presented annually to recognize excellence of an agricultural communicator. Hargrove is the first Professional Award winner actively working outside the U.S. and first to win an Excellence Award in the same year.

"Under Hargrove's leadership, IRRI has become one of the largest publishers of agricultural science in the Third World," said Joseph J. Marks, ACE president.

"More than one million copies of three editions of 27 IRRI books have been translated and co-published in 42 languages in 25 Third World countries."

One IRRI book, *A Farmer's Primer on Growing Rice*, is the world's most widely published agricultural text with more than 600,000 copies distributed in 33 languages.

Hargrove also pioneered the training of professional science editors in the Third World through a three year series of

editing and publication training courses at IRRI, co-sponsored by the International Development Research Centre (IDRC) of Canada and the University of Toronto. Forty-six editors from 25 countries were trained in five, four month courses.

IRRI is best known for developing high-yielding rice varieties that launched the "Green Revolu-

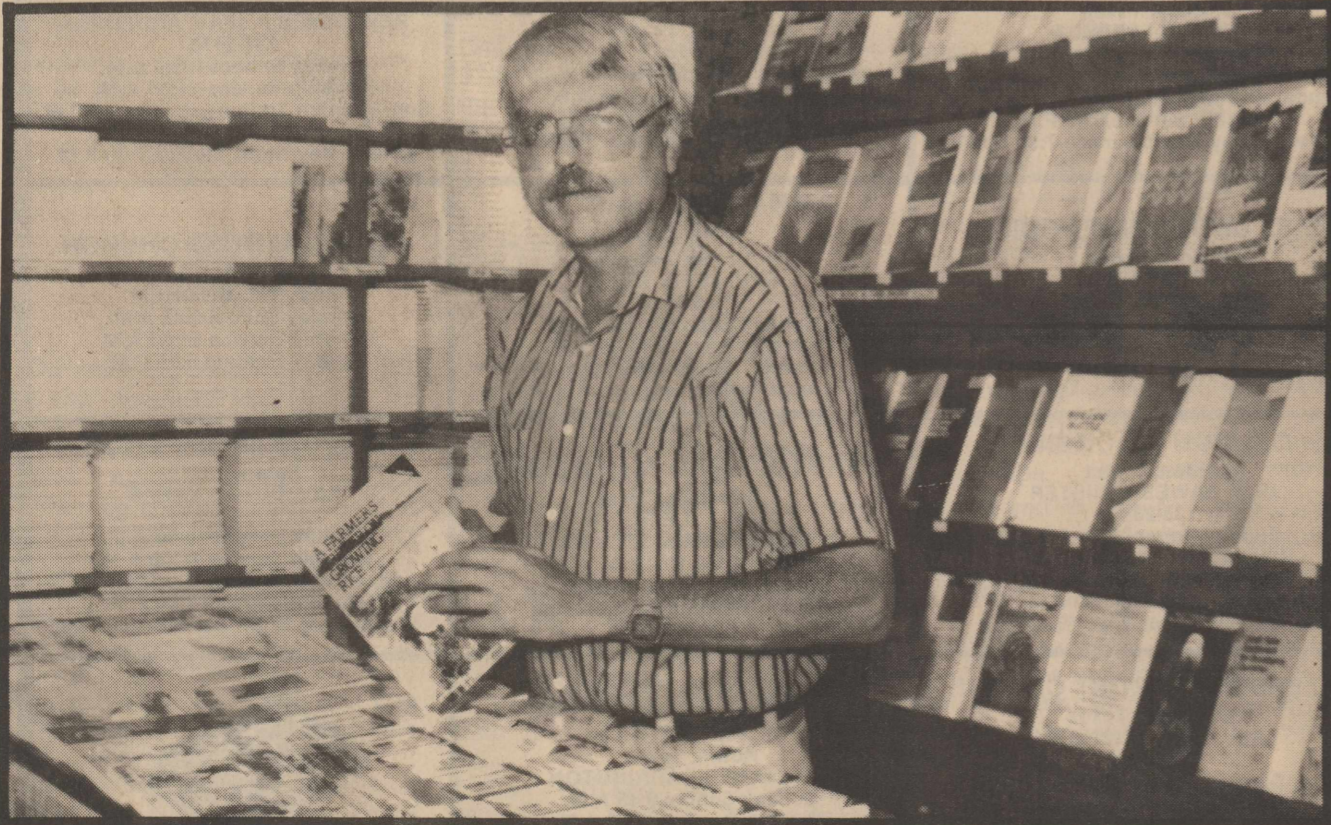
tion" in Asia and are now grown on about 55% of the Third World's riceland. The Green Revolution is credited for having fed Asia, despite a 53% increase in population since the 1960s.

Established in 1960, IRRI is the prototype for 13 International Agricultural Research Centers that improve production of key food commodities in developing countries. The Centers are sponsored by the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research, a consortium of 50 donor nations and agencies. The U.S. and Japan are the largest CGIAR donors.

Hargrove, 44, holds PhD and MS degrees from Iowa State University. He earned his BS degree in agricultural journalism at Texas A&M University.

He joined IRRI in 1973 after working as editor of the Iowa Agricultural Experiment Station. He became head of IRRI's communication program in 1979.

Hargrove is married to the former Susan Sheldon. They have two sons, Miles, 15, and Tom, 14. Hargrove's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Hargrove, grow cotton near Rotan, Texas.

State Capital Highlights

AUSTIN—In what Texas Republicans called a "gift from heaven," Supreme Court Justice Jim Wallace will give then another vacancy to fill by appointment when he resigns at summer's end.

Wallace, a Democrat, said he was quitting for financial reasons, explaining that he, like many other Texans, had real estate and other investments which need his attention.

Although his term runs through 1982, by resigning creates a vacancy that will be filled in general election on Nov. 8.

Gov. Bill Clements can now appoint his third judge to the high court, someone presumably to be on the November ballot with the slight edge of one month's incumbency.

In all voters will be choosing six justices this fall due to resignations of Chief Justice John Hill and Robert Campbell and now Wallace, all Democrats. The normal rotation is to elect three of the nine justices.

Bullock Leading Poll

Meanwhile, Comptroller Bob Bullock received his own "gift from Shipley." A recent poll by George Shipley, owner of an Austin public opinion and research firm, shows Bullock with a sizeable lead against any potential opponent in the race for lieutenant governor.

In a match-up with two state senators talking about running, the poll shows Bullock beating Hugh Farmer of Fort Worth by 55 percent to 11 percent and Chet Edwards of Duncanville by 57 percent to 13 percent.

Even Republican primary voters favored Bullock over former State Republican Party Chairman George Strake, the GOP nominee for lieutenant governor in 1982; Railroad Commissioner Kent Hance, who has talked about the post; and Rob Mosbacher Jr., a Houston oilman, who is considering a run.

With long and varied experience in state government, Bullock believes the time is right for him to help solve some of the state's problems. "I think Texas is at a crossroads," facing problems in education, prisons, tax structure and economic development.

Bullock is a former: state representative, assistant attorney general, executive assistant to Gov. Preston Smith, secretary of state. He was elected comptroller in 1974.

Mauro Hires Top Lawyer

State Land Commissioner Garry Mauro last week hired a nationally known defense attorney after the FBI subpoenaed agency records as part of an investigation of dealings between Mauro's office and land developers.

Noted San Antonio attorney Gerald Goldstein said Mauro has "nothing to hide" and he is convinced political enemies are using federal investigators to smear him.

Goldstein criticized the FBI for not asking for the records of contributions to Mauro's campaigns sooner. Agents have said the investigation began several months ago. "Surely they would have compared those before now," Goldstein said.

Prisons, Jails Full

With state and county jails at capacity, the state parole board voted to allow bail for parolees charged with simple burglary.

The action led some anti-crime groups to charge that criminal justice in Texas is now determined solely by available space in jails.

State officials said some 5,000 convicts await transfer to state prison from county jails.

Agridollars in Place

With predicted higher prices at the supermarket, officials announced last week the state is ready to secure loans on a \$5 million program to boost agricultural diversification.

The loans, up to \$250,000, will be made at two points below the market rate for T-bills, according to the sponsors, Sen. Bill Sims and Rep. Dudley Harrison.

Some predict the loans will encourage \$36 million in new revenues and 4,800 new jobs over the next five years.

Other Highlights

- The latest colorful quote from Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower comes as a comic insult of Vice President George Bush: "If ignorance ever goes to \$40 a barrel, I want the drilling rights to that man's head."

- A recent poll of Texas accountants show nearly two-thirds do not want a state income tax, according to the head of the Society of Certified Accountants. Almost three-fourths said they did not expect lawmakers to approve an individual state income tax.

- Former Gov. Mark White last week mailed personal letters with a press release announcing his partnership in the new Houston office of Keck, Mahin & Kate, a Chicago firm. Joining the firm with White is Grant Cook, a highly regarded Houston trial lawyer.

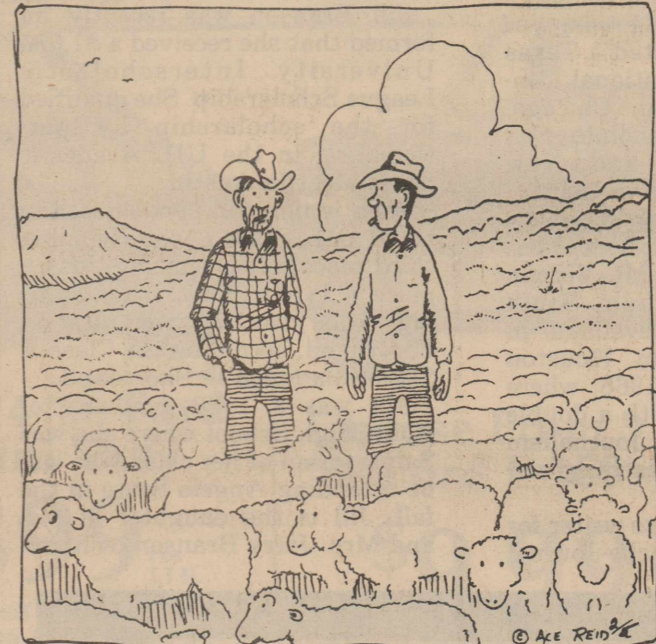

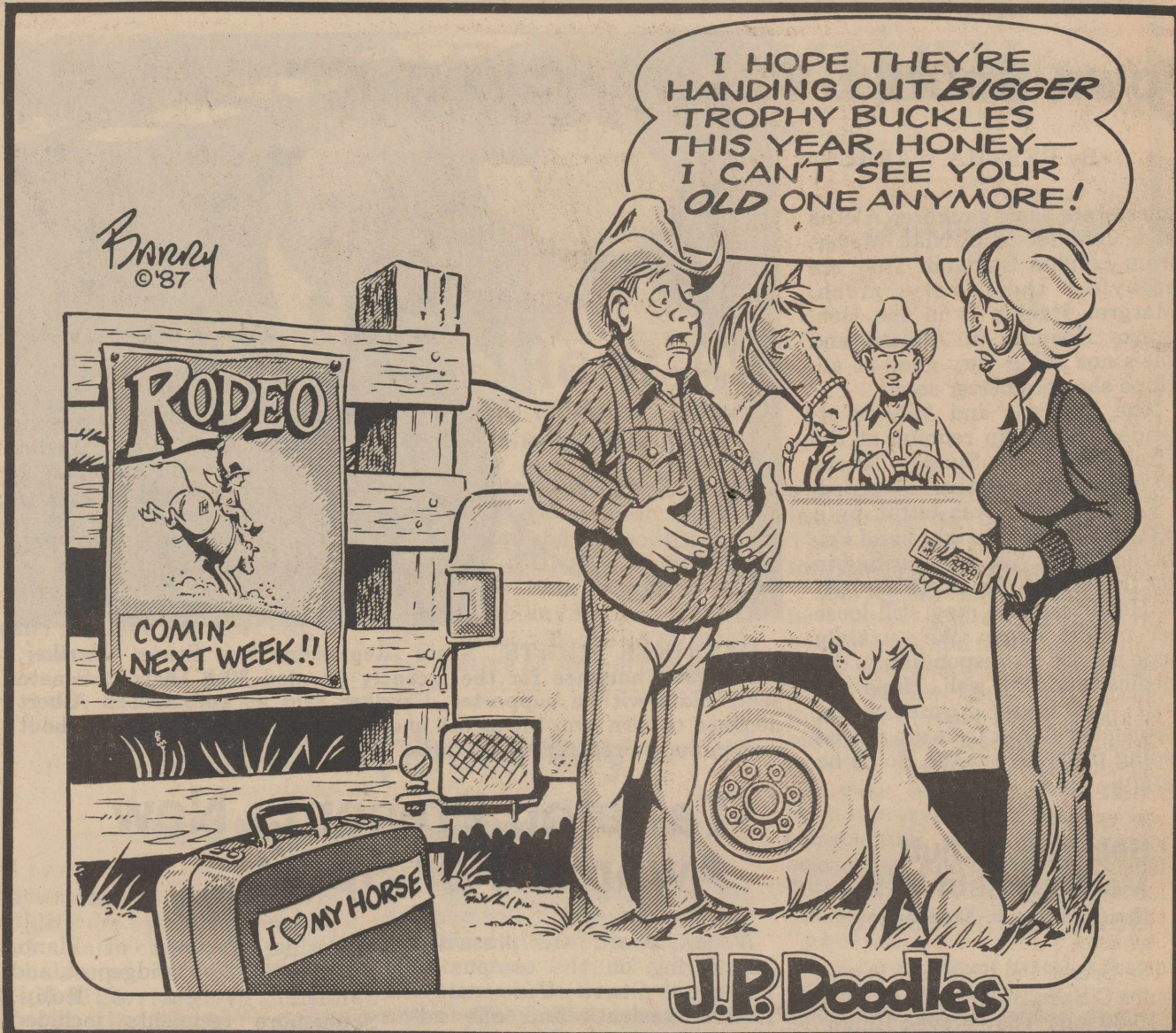

New Tower Chimes System Installed At First United Methodist, Rotan

A new tower chimes system has been installed in the First United Methodist Church of Rotan, and it will be dedicated to the glory of God in the July 10 regular Sunday morning service at 10:30 a.m. Installed on May 17, the system was first used on a thirty-day trial basis, and the funds for its purchase have been provided as memorials from six of the church's families.

The system, a Maas-Rowe Digital Chronobell, provides the bell sounds from two sources: the hymns are played through the means of professionally recorded, specially coded tapes which are made in the Maas-Rowe factory in Escondido, California, and all of the other bell rings are made by the mechanical striking of 15 tuned metal rods (miniature bells) which are played in combination to produce seven different bell tones. Each of the 15 miniature bells has an electronic pick-up which directs the nearly inaudible sound into the amplifier, and on out through the loudspeakers on the tower to produce the cast bronze bell-like tones.

Controlling the bell system can be done either manually by an operator, or automatically by the specially designed digital timer. The timer, with the capability of controlling over 600 events a week, can be set and changed very simply, and it also will display the weekly program schedule for review purposes. The timer also features a special Holiday schedule which enables special schedules to be set for holidays without having to alter the regular weekly schedule.

In addition to the hymn player, which is set to play on Sundays at 9:00 a.m., and 8:01 p.m., and on Monday through Saturday at 12:01 p.m., 5:01 p.m., and 6:01 p.m., there are six different types of special bell rings which are created through the use of the seven bell tones made by the miniature bells in the system. The schedule and an explanation of those bell rings follows:

The special ring heard most often is the Clock Strike which is used as a public service to announce the time of day. It utilizes the Westminster Chime melody followed by the striking of the hour. This particular ring has been made famous by London's "Big Ben" clock in the Parliament building tower. Words commonly associated with this ring are, "Lord, in this hour, be Thou our Guide, that by Thy power, no foot shall slide." The Clock Strike is set to ring on Sundays hourly from 1:00 p.m. through 8:00 p.m., and on Monday through Saturday from 8:00 a.m. through 8:00 p.m. On Monday through Friday the system rings the quarter-hour between 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m.

The Night Bell is rung every night at 9:00 p.m. It consists of the striking of the lowest bell once every 10 seconds for nine strikes, and is used to remind the people to spend time with God in prayer and Bible reading before the day ends. In some other traditions this ring is used to call people to pray the "De Profundis," an ancient prayer based on the

13th Psalm. The Night Bell is rung every night at 9:00 p.m.

The Trinity Bells are played on Sunday mornings as a reminder to the congregation to get in an attitude of quietness and reverence in preparation to worship Almighty God—the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. This ring uses three bell tones, with two of the tones played in three groups of three strikes, followed by the third tone as a low swinging bell. This same ring is also used in some other church traditions for the "Angelus" prayer. The Trinity Bells are set to ring at 10:25 a.m. on Sundays.

A Peal of bells—the ringing of two or more swinging bells simultaneously—is used most often for the celebration of festive events such as weddings. In this particular system, the peal can be set to ring from two to seven bells. A four-bell peal is set to ring on Sundays at 12:00 noon in celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ and his eternal victory over sin and death for all who personally receive him.

Swinging Bells are used to call people to the church building for

various events. Three separate swinging bells can be scheduled in this system. The high swinging bell plays at 5:55 p.m. on Sundays before the evening worship service, and the medium swinging bell plays at 9:25 a.m. on Sundays, just before Sunday School. The low swinging bell is not currently scheduled.

The Toll is used for solemn occasions such as funerals. Like the Night Bell, the toll strikes the lowest bell once every ten seconds; however, unlike the Night Bell, the toll has an adjustable length.

When used for a funeral service, the toll is often set to ring the same number of times as the age of the deceased. Since the system has been installed, the toll has been used in that manner twice. The toll is not currently set for automatic play.

It is the hope and prayer of the First United Methodist Church that the new bells will be not only a beneficial service to the community, but will, even more importantly, serve as a means through which God gives special blessings to all who hear them.

The Matron of Honor was Kathy Claborn of Canyon and the groom's sister, Theresa Sanchez of Abilene, was the bridal attendant.

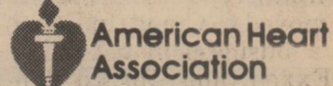

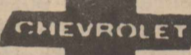

TAX PLANNING

WHO OWNS YOUR LIFE INSURANCE?

Take time to make sure that your life insurance program is properly planned. The beneficiaries of a life insurance policy usually receive the proceeds tax-free. If properly planned, the proceeds will not be subject to income tax nor will they be subject to estate tax.

To avoid including the proceeds in the estate, the deceased must have no "incidents of ownership" in the life insurance policy. This means that the deceased cannot have had the right or the option to cancel the policy, to change the beneficiaries, to borrow against the cash value of the policy, nor to assign the policy.

The elimination of possible estate tax can be accomplished either with or without the use of a trust. If the spouse of the deceased is the beneficiary, the marital deduction will eliminate estate taxes on the proceeds. A second choice is for the owner of the policy to be someone other than the deceased. For example, the wife or the children may be the owners and/or the beneficiaries of a policy on the husband or father. The settlement options provided by most insurance companies may make this solution second choice to the use of a trust.

Some of the advantages in using a trust include:

- * Greater flexibility in determining who will receive distributions of the life insurance proceeds.
- * Providing for such contingencies as remarriage of a spouse or children of second marriages.
- * Limitations on the spending of children at different ages and special provisions for handicaps or medical requirements.
- * Possible reduction of the guardianship duties for minor children.
- * Investment discretion for the trustee in putting the idle funds to work.
- * Possibility of providing tax-free dollars for paying estate tax.

In summary, a trust will provide a vehicle by which the wishes of the deceased can be carried out to cover situations that develop even after his or her death.

No Fee Required For S.S. Services

People in the Big Country area have been receiving direct mail solicitations asking that they pay \$7.00 to join an organization that says it will provide many services related to Social Security, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

First, Hammons said, there is no need to pay any firm money to obtain any of the services provided by Social Security.

In return for the \$7.00 payment, this firm offers to provide a statement of a person's earnings covered by Social Security, a plastic Social Security card, and a guide to Social Security.

Any person can obtain a statement of Social Security covered earnings without paying anybody. All a person has to do is call any Social Security office and

ask for a request for statement of earnings form. After completing the form and mailing it, the person will receive the statement in a few weeks. This firm can do no more.

In addition, there is no need for a plastic Social Security card, Hammons said. It is of no use for Social Security purposes. The Social Security number card issued by the Social Security Administration is the only official card and should be used whenever a Social Security card is needed.

People can obtain many publications about Social Security free at all Social Security offices. Just call and ask.

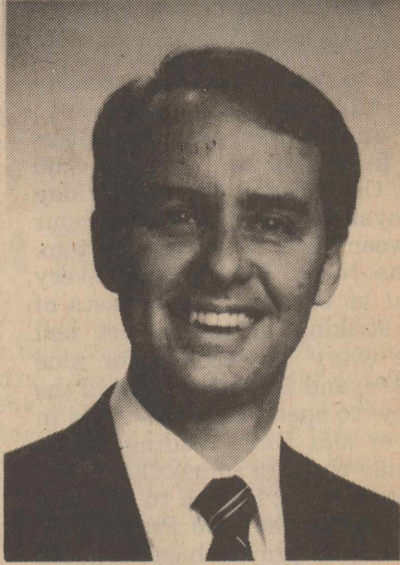

County Agent News

By Richard Spencer

Cooler weather and the recent rains gave us a break from the two week heat wave. Crops should be reviving soon.

Cattle grubs cause greater economic losses to the US beef cattle industry than any other insect pest. Control time is now through the last of July. The pests can be controlled by sprays, pour-ons and injections, all work well.

Africanized honey bees or "killer bees" are continuing to move up through Mexico and fast approaching the Texas border. They are reported within 560 miles of Brownsville and are expected to reach South Texas in 18 months to two years.

The bees are aggressive when their colonies are threatened. This could cause problems for individuals allergic to insect stings and for children and older people who are more susceptible to such stings.

Experts say that not much can be done to keep the bees out of Texas but much can be learned about managing them as we work with the Mexican Government and their beekeepers.

The new seedless watermelon "Tri-x-313" is a very hot item on the produce stand. This melon is sweeter than its seedy relatives and tend to stay fresher over a long period of time.

The marketing picture for seedless watermelon is bright. The negotiation process has already begun with chain outlets expressing use for salads. Grocery stores are also increasing the amount of floor space devoted to the new product.

A research study published this month in the New England Journal of Medicine says stearic acid, one of the major saturated fats in

beef, actually lowers serum cholesterol levels. Until now, it was generally assumed by medical researchers that all saturated fats were harmful.

This study's chief researcher, a Texas Doctor, said "this means that meat is not on the 'bad list' anymore for foods. If beef is obtained in the proper way (lean), it really should not be feared as a cholesterol raising food."

Cattle producers are praising the results of the study.

Food is still a bargain in the U.S. because of the American farmer's productivity, people can buy their food for less of their disposable income today than even a few years ago.

Presently, the average American spends about 15 percent of his income for food. Just over a century ago, food spending in the U.S. accounted for 61 percent of income in 1869, when average income was \$791 a year and \$479 of that went for groceries. Today's spending for food in China amounts to 52 percent of income, 36 percent in Korea, and 32 percent in Mexico.

One U.S. farm worker today supplies enough food and fiber for 80 people, 21 of whom live abroad. Producing an abundance of high quality food and fiber is inherent to American Agriculture.

Seventh Graders Honored At Trinity & Baylor Universities

Seventh graders from Texas who participated in Duke University's Eight Annual Search for mathematically and verbally brilliant students were honored at ceremonies held at Trinity University and Baylor University on June 17th and June 18th. All students invited to the ceremony had earned scores on at least one section of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) or the American College Testing Assessment (ACT) equal to or greater than the scores obtained by 50 percent of college-bound high school seniors. These very capable seventh graders took these college entrance tests as participants in Duke University's Talent Identification Program (TIP).

"TIP was established in 1980 to identify bright young students, to help develop their special abilities, and to direct them toward special academic pro-

grams for the gifted and talented. The 1988 TIP Talent Search involved nearly 46,000 students and covered 16 southern, southwestern, and midwestern states. It is one of four university-based talent searches which together cover the entire United States," said Dr. Robert Sawyer, Executive Director of the Program.

The 1988 students invited to the Texas Ceremonies had attained at least one of the following criteria: an SAT-Math score equal to or greater than 500 (for boys) or 450 (for girls); an SAT-Verbal score equal to or greater than 430; a TSWE (Test of Standard Written English) score equal to or greater than 52; an ACT-Math score equal to or greater than 24; an ACT-Social Studies score equal to or greater than 20; or an ACT-Natural Science score equal to or greater than 25. All participants received Certificates of Distinction in recognition of their achievement; the highest scorers also received scholarships and books.

Among those honored at the Texas Recognition Ceremonies was Stephanie Baugh of Midland, Texas. She attends school at San Jacinto Junior High. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Baugh of Midland, Texas. Grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Sam Baugh and Mr. and Mrs. H. Thompson.

Our club is still in the process of organizing and paying our dues of ten dollars per couple, so we continue to welcome new members.

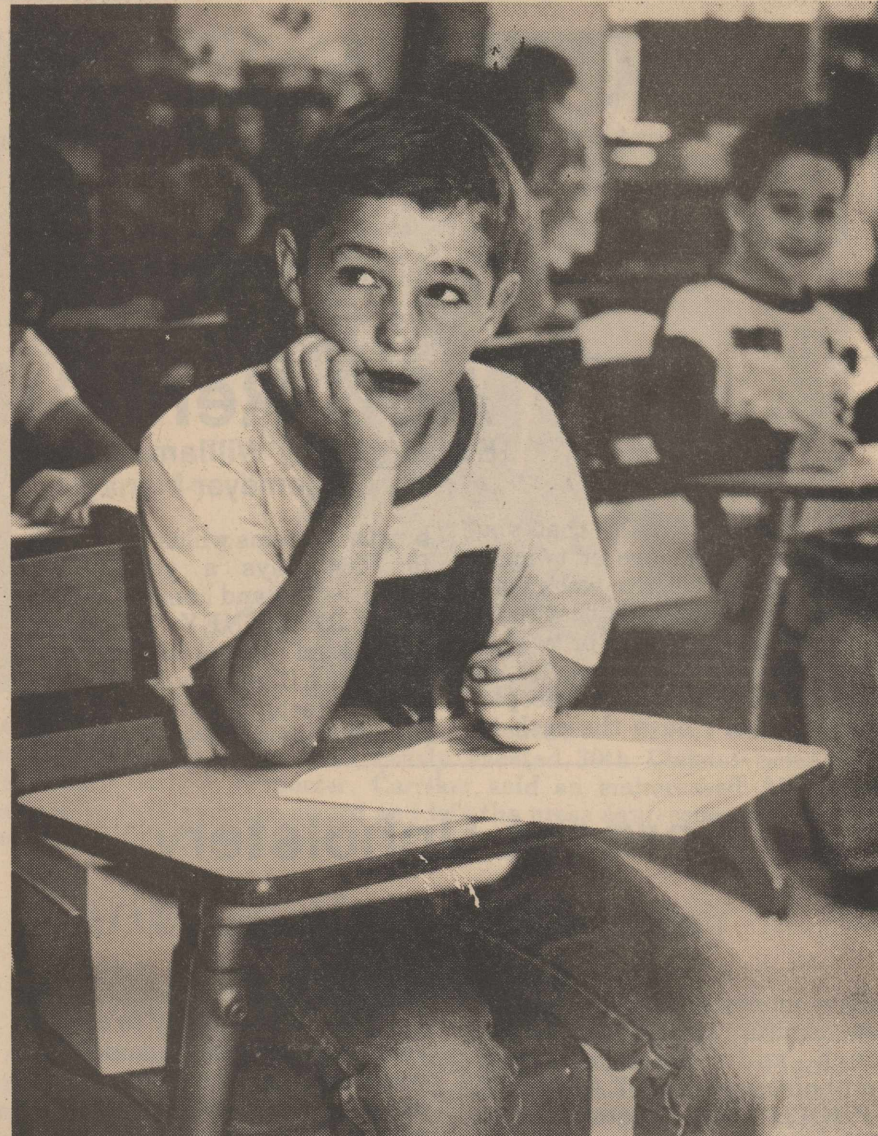
