Zollie Steakley, Texas Supreme Court Justice To Deliver Commencement Address At MU

WICHITA FALLS — Zollie Steakley, Texas Supreme Court justice, will deliver the commencement address at Midwestern University in graduation ceremonies at 8 p.m. Saturday, June 1 in Memorial Auditorium.

About 240 students will receive degrees. Steakley has served on the Texas Supreme Court since 1961. Before that he was an assistant attorney general of Texas for three years and served as Texas secretary of state for four years.

After his graduation from high school at De Leon, Steakley received a bachelor's degree at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene and a Bachelor of Law degree at the University of Texas.

During World War II he served in the Navy.

Steakley is a deacon of the First Baptist Church in Austin and has served as chairman of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

He is a former president of the Lions Club in Austin and a former director of Lions International.

The invocation will be delivered by the Rev. Alanson Brown of the Church of the Good Shepherd in Wichita Falls.

Honor graduates will be announced by Dr. C. T. Eskew, director of Midwestern's Division of Sciences and Mathematics.

Kenneth Edward Siber, 1968 Hardin Scholar, an accounting major from Burkburnett, will be introduced by Dr. William

J. Thomas, director of the Division of Business Administration.

"We are increasingly proud of our graduating seniors," said Dr. Travis A. White, Midwestern president. "This strengthening of our academic program has made such an achievement more difficult, but we feel the degree is worth much more."

The Hardin Professor Award, the highest honor Midwestern bestows each year on a member of its faculty, will be presented by J. N. Sherrill, Jr., of the Hardin Foundation. 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WARNING TO EXPERTS

In the ten-year period from 1956 to 1966, according
to authoritative sources, the number of employees on
state and local government payrolls increased 63 per
cent and the monthly cost of paying them increased 143
per cent, while the population of the country rose 17
per cent. These figures substantiate what has become
a virtual maxim — that demands for the tax dollar
increase far faster than people.

Countless "experts" recommend solutions for con-
trolling inflation and stabilizing the value of our money.
The most immediate solution of necessity appears to be
a tax increase. The increase may be accompanied by some
cuts in government spending, but in all likelihood the
latter will turn out to be illusory as the pressure for
more political spending builds up.

Thus, the cost of government at every level will con-
tinue to expand, and inflation will continue to eat away
at the value of the dollar. The process will not end until
we realize tax-dollar spending increases must one day
be brought into balance with population and productivity
increases.

When The Votes Are Counted

A short time ago, when two Senators from a western
state failed to support a Senate measure to cut the \$168
billion federal budget by \$6 billion, they were berated
by the local press, which may be an encouraging indica-
tion that the people back home are beginning to back up
economy in government. The test of their sincerity will
come on election day.

A crucial question to be answered at the polls is
whether voters will still pursue the old hog in the trough
philosophy of voting for every candidate who promises
the bring home the bacon from Washington in the form
of government handouts favoring local constituents. It is
just this kind of grab bag approach to politics that has
brought the nation to the point where the value of the
dollar is jeopardized, and we face the "worst financial
crisis" since 1931.

NO ONE ESCAPES

Civil disorders have virtually wrecked large areas
of many American cities. Pictures show riot-torn streets,
buildings demolished, stores gutted and police standing
helpless while hoodlums make off with stolen merchan-
dise by the carload. Reporters have accurately termed
these civil disorders "the other war." Most of us, when we
read the news about riots in a city a few hundreds or a
few thousand miles away, tend to thank providence that
we have escaped the unpleasantness. But have we escap-
ed? We most decidedly have not.

All wars are expensive, including "the other war."
Destruction of public and private property will be re-
flected in insurance rates, in the cost of government and
hundreds of other direct and indirect ways that are in-
escapable no matter where we live.

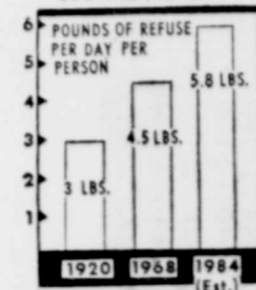
Just as we all have a stake in the tragic cost of
the war in Viet Nam, so we have a stake in "the other
war." We should think about this the next time we see
or read of looting and burning. It may not be our own
property going up in smoke or being carried off by van-
dals, but we will be paying part of the cost of both the
lost property and the forces of law and order that must
be called upon to bring the destruction to an end.

According to the publication, "The Kansas Rest-
aurant," "Food marketing services have increased 117

Beauty And The Bath

"It's the little things that
count," goes the old saying, and
no place is this more true than in
decorating. A few columns back,

I discussed how
proper lighting
can transform
the bathroom
into a lovelier,
more functional
area; now, I'd
like to suggest
a few lighting
"extras" that can mean a world
of difference in comfort and
economy.

A grooming aid the whole
family will appreciate is *pedicure
lighting*. Use a 75-watt reflector
bulb in an adjustable fixture
mounted under the lavatory
counter. Either a hooded bullet
or "eyeball" fixture will do the
trick.

If you have a baby in the
house, *heat lamps* (infrared
bulbs) are ideal for keeping him
warm while drying and dressing.
Adults will find them nice to have
over the tub for added warmth
while bathing, too.

Night lights are absolute
necessities for most of us since they
prevent stumbling in the dark by
sleepy wanderers. Newest and
most convenient is the *Panelsec
Nite-Lite* by Sylvania. It's an
electroluminescent source that
consumes about five cents worth
of electricity a year. Such lights
are inconspicuous by day, but
provide a subtle glow at night
that's just enough for dark-
adapted eyes to see by.

To keep bathroom air fresh
and pleasant, try *ozone lamps*.
Mount these small 4-watt bulbs in
shielded metal fixtures above eye
level (to avoid eye damage from
viewing directly). They activate
oxygen in the air and destroy
odors.

Is your bathroom everything it
could be? Why not turn on the
lights and find out?

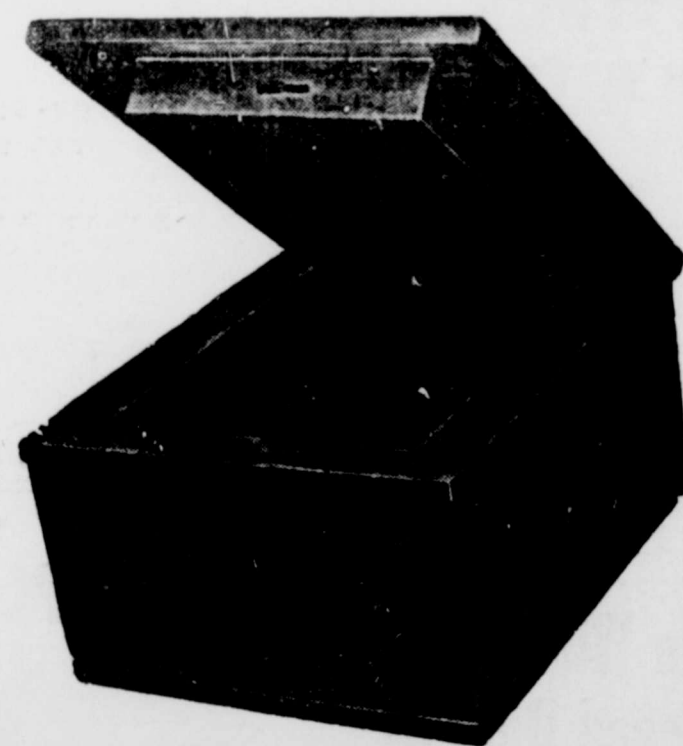

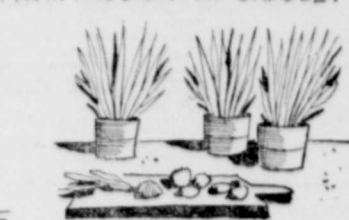

• The "textured" look. The "in" look of texture, stressed in fashions, household fabrics, wall paneling and siding, is also available in modern roofing materials. Heavyweight asphalt shingles, those weighing 290 or more pounds per 100 square feet of roof area, have thick edges that cast deep shadow lines and give the roof surface a richly-textured appearance. The extra weight of the shingles also increases the durability and weather-resistance of the roof. Heavyweights are designed by the manufacturer to last at least 20 to 25 years without maintenance.

• Use of color. Asphalt shingles are now available in a wide range of colors, including black, white, and blends of red, blue, brown, green and gray. Use of colored shingles is an effective and practical way to dramatize and individualize a house, and allows color coordination of the roof and other exterior house features.

Hardboards 'Limitless' In Versatility

No matter what your reason for remodeling—more space, easier care, a new use for an old room—beauty is bound to be a consideration.

This is one reason, says Building Supply News, that prefabricated hardboard paneling has become an increasingly popular wall treatment in home remodeling projects.

According to Mrs. Maxine Livingston, consumer merchandising consultant for the trade publication and a member of the American Institute of Interior Designers, the decorative finishes now available in hardboard panels are "almost limitless in design, pattern and color."

The choice of marble patterns, simulated tile, leather textures, a variety of rich-looking woodgrains, embossed fabrics, vinyl, unusual grass cloths, canes and burlaps, and even exotic tapestries, gives homeowners "unlimited versatility in highly attractive wall treatments," she says.

The new "decorator look" of hardboard is a bonus attraction for do-it-yourself remodelers. The panels already have wide acceptance for durability (they resist dents, marks and scuffs), low-maintenance (they can be sponge-washed clean), and ease of installation (they can be nailed or applied with a panel adhesive to furring strips attached to the existing wall). The furring strips can also be applied with adhesive, eliminating any nail holes.

Cure For Inflation

BRITONS are angry over the devaluation of the pound. Americans are extremely unhappy over continuing inflation. But few on either side of the Atlantic seem to realize that both of these disasters are caused by the desire of the people to consume more than they produce. Something for nothing is just not possible, but politicians and public alike are reluctant to admit this stubborn fact.

On the whole, British workers produce about half as much per man hour as American workers and receive roughly half the pay. There is plenty of featherbedding in our country, but not so much as there is in Britain. Two men to do one man's work and men working one, two or three hours a day in our country is not an uncommon sight, but abuses of this nature are much worse in the British Isles.

A plasterer who is limited to four of five square yards a day is not earning his pay and is making housing more costly than it should be. He thinks he is getting something for nothing, but most of it is taxed away to pay for housing and other subsidies. It is the same with a paper-hanger who is not permitted to paste up more than six rolls a day, or a pair of carpet layers only one of whom works at a time—the tacker waiting for the cutter and sewer and the sewer in turn waiting for the tacker. Two men doing the work of one is a fifty percent featherbedding operation, making labor costs twice as high as they should be.

In Britain today it costs nearly five cents to get one brick laid, whereas before World War II a workman would lay more than four bricks for one cent.

Demanding more than one earns is the cause of many economic ills, including devaluation in Britain, just as it is the cause of inflation and economic problems in other countries, including our own.

When we learn to limit consumption to production and not to try by every devious means we can think of to get some of the wealth produced by others, the world may enjoy permanent economic prosperity.

Desserts Abloom



The many customs of Easter can come to the modern festive table quickly and easily in bakers' desserts which you set abloom. Candy Easter eggs nestled in pastel-frosted cupcakes are harbingers of the renewal of life. Spring bouquets fashioned from gumdrops, candy shot, and chocolate-frosted cupcakes rival nature's riot of color. The rabbit, a symbol of the ancient East where they are connected with the moon, take shape easily and convincingly using soft, coconut-frosted cake balls. Decorate each dessert as follows:

Spring Bouquet—Slice a leaf-shaped mint gumdrop into 4 sections so the leaf shape is retained. Insert a short toothpick into each of 2 "leaves" and set into top of a chocolate-frosted cupcake. Press in 6 or 7 tiny, colorful gumdrops to resemble "flowers." Squeeze together one end of remaining "leaves"; place between gumdrop "flowers." Scatter silver shot among "flowers."

Easter Egg Nest—Garnish pastel-frosted cupcake by gently pressing top of cupcake into a dish of shot of many colors. Nest 3 colored jelly bean "eggs" into center of cupcake.

Bunnies—Press soft, coconut-frosted cake ball into shape of a crouching bunny—large at one end; small at the other. Create a bunny head at small end of cake, using long, sliced pink or red gumdrops on toothpicks for "ears," chocolate chips for "eyes" and a cinnamon red hot for a "nose." Fashion bunny's tail from half a large marshmallow; hold in place with a toothpick.

Heavyweight Roof Hardly Dents Household Budget

Roofs, which do one of the biggest jobs in protecting and beautifying a home, are one of the least expensive building materials.

Even a high-quality roofing material like heavyweight asphalt shingles represents less than three percent of the total cost of an average \$20,000 house.

The "bargain" cost of a high-grade roof is further emphasized by the fact that

heavyweight shingles are designed by the manufacturer to last a minimum of 20 to 25 years without maintenance. This allows the homeowner to amortize the roof cost over a long period of time, and saves expensive roof repairs.

Initial cost of heavyweights—which weigh 290 or more pounds per 100 square feet of roof area—is slightly higher than standard weight shingles. But installation costs are about the same.

Burk Traffic Revision Is Set

BURKBURNETT — Drawing up ordinances to deal with truck traffic and the building code were authorized by the Burkburnett City Commission Monday night.

First reading on each ordinance is scheduled for June 3.

They will promulgate through "truck traffic on Third Street and named the building code, specifying types of pipe which may be used in sewer lines.

City manager Gary Bean reported the completion of six new water wells and the anticipated drilling of one more which will bring the city water source to 103 wells.

Installation of new benches and barbecue facilities in Washington, Permian and Burk Royalty parks also were reported by Bean.

Monthly corporation court reports showed \$1,535 collected in fines, including 37 traffic violations. Payment of current account in amount of \$4,730 was approved by the commission, which also approved the monthly report of the city manager, tax department and budget and revenue accounts.

The time has come to do something for the American farmer, to balance the costs of modern farming with prices in the marketplace for their crops.

That's what we mean when we talk about "bargaining power for farmers"—the right to bargain with the middle-men to get a fair price for their crops.

I am cosponsoring a bill with Senator Walter Mondale of Minnesota which I believe will help correct the dangerous cost-price imbalance which is driving families off the farms. Our "bargaining power" bill will create a National Agriculture Relations Board made up of producers and buyers to set standards for buying and selling farm products, and to let farmers participate in setting prices for their products. Today farmers are largely unorganized from a marketing standpoint. They are captives of a vicious market demand system. They have no collective strength to take to the bargaining table and to tell buyers "meet my price and leave me room for a fair profit." Instead they must take what is offered, and often that is pitifully little.

The farmer has always been the foundation of our national prosperity, but the sad truth is that while our national economy has reached record heights, farm earnings have sunk to record lows. And, of course, farm costs have gone up like costs everywhere. Labor is more expensive; farm machinery and fuels are more costly; seeds, fertilizers and greater outlays now than a decade or two ago.

All these things cost more today than they did in the 1940's or 1950's, but farm prices have actually dropped 9 per cent since then.

It is worth noting that while food prices have spiraled upward in the past two decades, the farmers' earnings have gone steadily downward. In Texas nearly half of our farmers earn less than \$5,000 a year, although most have a large investment in land, machinery and farm tools. Farm employment has dropped 46 per cent in the past 17 years.

Part of that is because of mechanization, new machines that make it easier to work the soil. But other farmers quit their land to keep from going broke, driven off by low farm prices. So farmers and farm workers are moving off the farm and into the cities, forced to seek another life in the concrete jungles of the streets.

A poll in this month's FARM JOURNAL magazine shows that nine out of ten American farmers want Congress to create a climate for bargaining power. Nine out of ten say they need better prices from processors and buyers if they are to survive.

Farm prosperity is of the utmost importance to Texas. We have over 300,000 farm families in Texas, more than any other state.

That is why I support the Mondale "bargaining power for farmers" proposal. It will bring a better life to our farmers; a stabilizing force to our economy.

Dinner In 15 Minutes



Wives who also go off to business, full-time or part-time, are great collectors of recipes with timesaving ideas. A favorite trick is to plan a weekend roast which will also provide one or two meals for the family during the work week. Here's a wonderfully satisfying dish using leftover ham that takes just 15 minutes to prepare. Serve it with chopped spinach and for dessert—angel food cake with lemon sherbet.

Quick Barbecue Rice with Ham

1 can (3 oz.) sliced mushrooms	1 can (10 1/2 oz.) condensed onion soup
3/4 pound cooked ham, cut in strips (1 1/2 cups)	2 cups Minute Rice
2 tablespoons butter	1/4 cup chili sauce
3/4 cup diced celery	1 teaspoon prepared mustard
	Dash of Tabasco sauce

Drain mushrooms, measuring liquid; add water to make 1 1/2 cups liquid. Lightly saute ham and mushrooms in butter. Stir in measured liquid and remaining ingredients. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Cover and simmer 5 minutes. Fluff with a fork before serving. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Barbecue Lamb Ribslets in Tomato Sauce



Barbecuing is not confined to the outdoors but is a way of cooking that can continue all year 'round inside the house. The only requirements are a range, a favorite cut of meat such as lamb and a sauce.

Many cuts of Winter Wonder lamb are suitable for barbecuing but try lamb ribslets for a pleasant change. They are cut from the breast and are succulent and tender when browned and simmered in a zesty sauce. And they're economical, too.

TOMATO AND RAISIN BARBECUED RIBLETS
(Makes 4 servings)

2 pounds lamb ribslets	2 tablespoons soy sauce
1 can (8 ounces) tomato sauce	1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup each: dark seedless raisins; chopped parsley	1/2 teaspoon ground oregano
	1 clove garlic, chopped

In Dutch oven or large skillet brown lamb well; drain off drippings. Meanwhile, combine remaining ingredients. Pour sauce over browned lamb and simmer covered one hour or until lamb is tender.

Dear Aubrey: I am planning to have my photograph taken, but I don't know how to apply make-up to look my best. I would like to minimize my round face and, if possible, soften my features. A. L., Brentwood, Calif.

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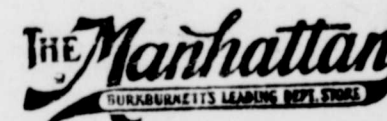

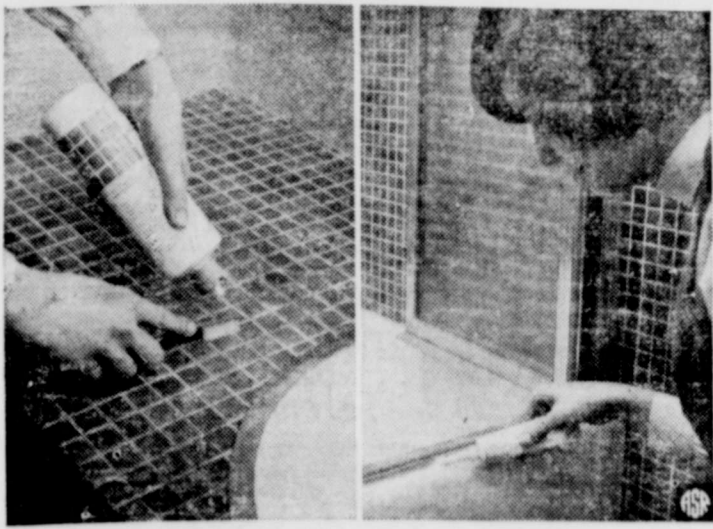

Little Things Count



If it's the little things that count, as they say, then in house-keeping one of those "little things" is the grouting around the bathroom tile. So often it becomes dirty and unsightly because it is difficult and tedious to clean—but what a difference in appearance it makes when kept sparkling white.

This needn't be a problem any longer, however, for grouting can be cleaned easily now—and kept clean—with a new tile cleaner and protector containing silicones. Just squirt a little of the clear liquid along the cracks between tile, then scrub with an old toothbrush and rinse off. This will remove the accumulated soil—dirt, soap scum and at the same time lay down an invisible silicone shield which protects the grout from future dirt or discoloration for some time.

The cleaner, developed by Dow Corning, also does an excellent job of cleaning, polishing and protecting the tile itself, the bathroom fixtures, chrome, floor tile and even painted walls, too.

Little things count, incidentally, in long range home maintenance just as in daily or weekly care. In the bathroom, for example, check the condition of joints between tile or floor and fixtures periodically. If cracks have developed, repair them immediately, for water seeping in can cause serious damage.

The best choice for mending faulty joints in the bathroom, where changes in temperature and humidity are frequent, is a long-lived silicone rubber bathtub caulk, made by the same company, which can stretch and contract with these changes while still maintaining a dependable seal.

Effective Mosquito Control Begins At Larval Stage

Mosquitoes continue to be one of mankind's greatest insect problems. In addition to being a nuisance, these pests are responsible for the spread of such diseases as sleeping sickness (encephalitis).

Employees work year-round to discover breeding places, identify the species which are present, and continually test new methods of effective, economical control. Attention is first focused on locations within the district where water tends to stand. This is where the mosquito breeds. 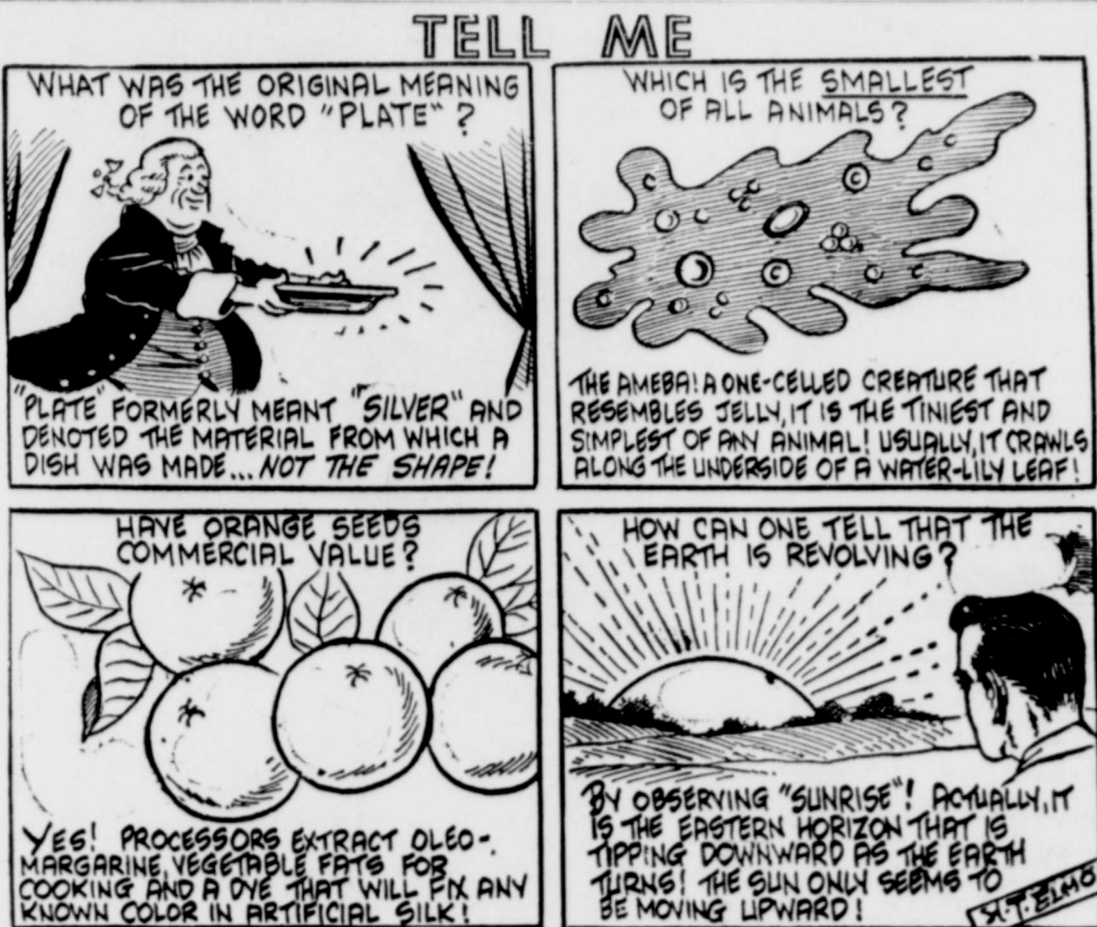

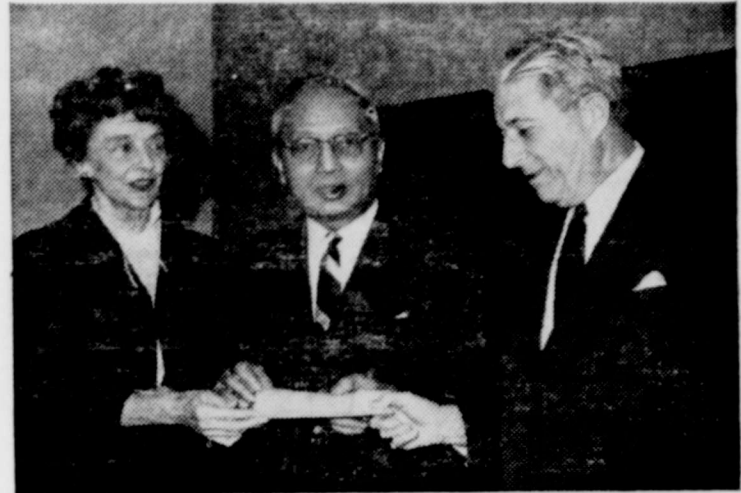

Kids and Cards Help Raise Record \$5.8 million for UNICEF

"We see this as heartening evidence of the continuing determination of U. S. citizens to help close the gap between the mounting needs of the world's children and the limited resources available to UNICEF to meet them," said Mrs. Pantaleoni.

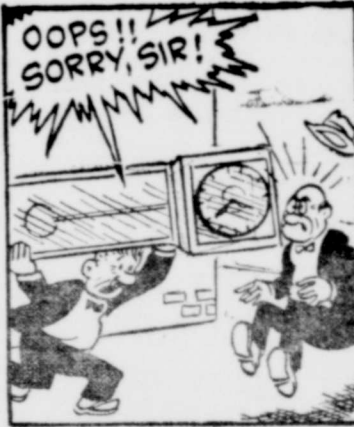

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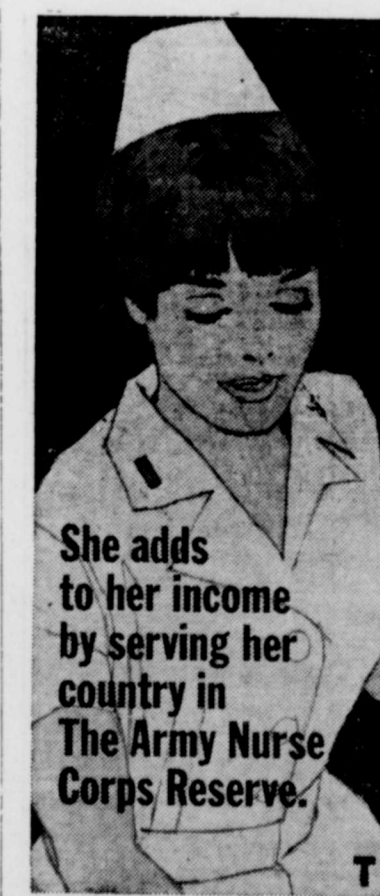
