## Williams appointed justice of the peace

County precincts 2 and 3 will have a new Justice of the Peace.

Williams worked in law enforcement for 14 years, serving as a municipal judge for two years in Muleshoe and also work-

ing with the sheriff's office in Sherman and the police department in Ranger.

"I did it when law enforcement was fun," said Williams, who lives at Lake Colorado City.

Williams also worked in the oilfield before moving to Colorado City in 2002 to help look after his wife's parents.

Four votes were cast by ballot for Williams with one ballot cast for George Walker.

Williams was sworn in Monday afternoon and will begin work on August 31.

"I've always loved law enforcement

and I can get back close to it with this," he said. "It also allows me to spend more time with family as opposed to being on the highway all the time."

Williams worked for Swift Transportation Trucking Company out of Phoenix, Arizona for the past seven years, spent six days a week getting up at 2 a.m. to hit the road by 3 a.m.

"I want to thank Ryan Eime for holding down the fort," said Williams. "He's doing a fantastic job." Eime left the Sheriff's Department to manage the Justice of the Peace office until the county

## Westbrook volunteer firefighters to host mud bog fundraiser

A mud bog fundraiser to benefit the Westbrook Volunteer Fire Department will be held August 29th at the County Fairgrounds west of town on business I-20.

Drivers may register for the event from noon to 4 p.m. Boggling will begin at 5 p.m.

"We don't want to change anything from the way 4-H does it because it worked so well," said Mindy Hale, Westbrook's firefighter.

The Westbrook mud bog will feature VIP parking along the fence line. Sixteen "front row" spots will be offered at \$25 each and guarantees the ticket holder the

spot even if they are running late for the event.

"We added the VIP parking because the fence spots are so popular," Hale said. Spectators can sign up for the fence parking or buy mud bog tickets at Stacie's Creations, 258 Walnut Street, 728-2100.

Mud bog tickets at the gate for adults are \$5 each and \$2 for kids 12 and under. The registration fee to participate in the bog will be \$30 per entry, with 100% payout and plaques for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each class.

Proceeds from the mud bog will help

## CISD adopts balanced budget

The Colorado Independent School District board of trustees approved the 2009-2010 budget, and maintained the tax rate at \$1.17 per \$100 valuation Monday.

The board approved amendments to the 2008-2009 official budget, which should leave the district with an approximate \$123,330 increase to the fund balance at the end of August, after the final bills are tabulated and final receivables are collected from TEA.

"CISD could receive additional Tier II state revenue once the final tax collection numbers are in and TEA makes their adjustments," said Shelia Redwine,

business manager.

New Financial Integrated Rating System of Texas requirements led the district to approve a balanced budget for 2009-2010, instead of the traditional deficit budget.

"Indicator 15 (of FIRST rating system) says it 'will be considered passed if a district adopts a balanced budget,'" said Jim White, superintendent, "which suggests if you fail to adopt a balanced budget, you fail it."

Failing indicator 15 on FIRST would be the third of three strikes against the school, possibly dropping it from a superior status. Other school district business

managers and the service center specialist recommended CISD not take the chance.

Although CISD has always used a deficit budget, there were sufficient funds in the fund balance to cover any emergencies. As a general rule, the district overestimated their expenses and underestimated their revenues to provide flexibility in meeting any unexpected situation.

"This is just reducing our safety cushion," said White.

The board approved the \$10,384,606 balanced budget for the 2009-2010

## Football season starts!

### COLORADO CITY WOLVES

Colorado City will kick-off the 2009 football season Saturday night in Sweetwater against the Reagan County Owls.

Participating in the Sammy Baugh Classic at the Mustang Bowl for the third year in a row, the Wolves have their hands full, as a tough Owl team rolls into Sweetwater for their first appearance in the classic.

The Owls return five starters on offense and five starters on defense from last year's 3-7 season. Last year, the Wolves came from behind to squeak out a 27-25 victory in the season opener at Wolf Stadium.

Nine lettermen return to anchor a Wolves' offense and defense dotted with several young players. Sophomores are expected to see a lot of action.

Senior running back Jamarcus Brooks, who rushed for 900 yards and 400 passing yards last year, is again the Wolves' top offensive threat. Last season, Brooks was coming off a broken leg injury, but all indicators show he is com-

## Soldier returns home after second tour of duty in Iraq

One of Colorado City's own will be returning from Iraq this Friday.

National Guard Sergeant Rhea Hawley arrived in El Paso last week, along with 3,200 Texas National Guardsmen.

He and his wife, Dawn, had been in their home for about a week, when he went to Iraq for his second tour of duty in November 2008.

"When he left, everything was still packed up," said

Dawn. "He got to come home for two weeks in February. I had to show him where everything was."

Separation is something the young couple are well acquainted with. In their two-and-a-half year marriage, they've spent six months together. "He's one of the nicest people you'll ever meet," said his wife, who has decorated the front yard with American flags, red-white-and blue streamers and a huge sign that reads, "my hus-

band, my hero."

They met on the Internet when Rhea was on his first tour in Iraq. When he returned home, he was assigned to Operation Jumpstart as part of the border patrol. Shortly after they were married in Ruddick Park, he was re-assigned to the border patrol. Then he shipped out to Iraq for a second time.

"This has really, really been the roughest year of my life," said Dawn. "It's a lot harder

He is preceded in death by his wife, Carolyn Williams; his parents; and his sisters, Clara Elizabeth Wilburn and Edith LaVern Rasco.

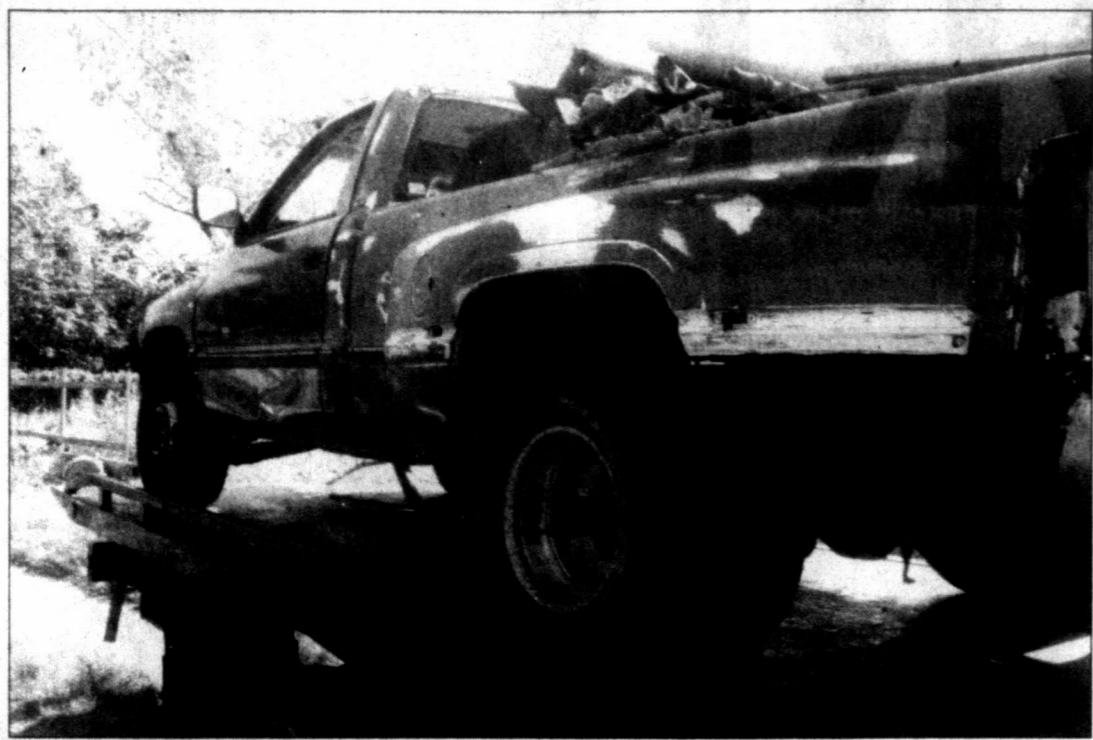
### Florence Landers Smith 1914-2009

## Police enforce ordinances

An effort to maintain city ordinances will result in more red tags showing up around town as law enforcement officers tag junk vehicles.

"If a junk vehicle has been sitting for quite a while without registration or if it's not up to code, we tag it," said Jessie Hernandez, city code enforcer.

The vehicle owner is sent a certified letter that they have 10 days to bring the vehicle up to

code or remove it.

"On the 11th day, we give them a citation," said Hernandez.

Those cited must appear before the municipal court the first Thursday following the citation and the judge makes the final decision on the disposition of the vehicle.

Indications that a vehicle should be classified as junk are flat tires and weeds that are grown up around the vehicle.

Officers check the registration, then tag vehicle and log it automatically the same day.

Since 2007, most owners of junk vehicles responded promptly in either moving the vehicle or bringing it up to code.

"When Jessie came, he really started checking into the program and met with the city attorney to verify the legal and correct ways," said Lieutenant Cary Hale.

While Hernandez is completely in charge of the program, local police officers assist as needed.

The first two red tagged junk vehicles were removed by police from the owners' properties August 11.

Refusal to give officers permission to take junk vehicles will result in the owner receiving a citation daily until the vehicle is removed.

Owners do have the option of sending the municipal judge a letter of explanation or requesting an extension within the 10 day compliance. The letters must be received five days before the end of the 10 day period, however.

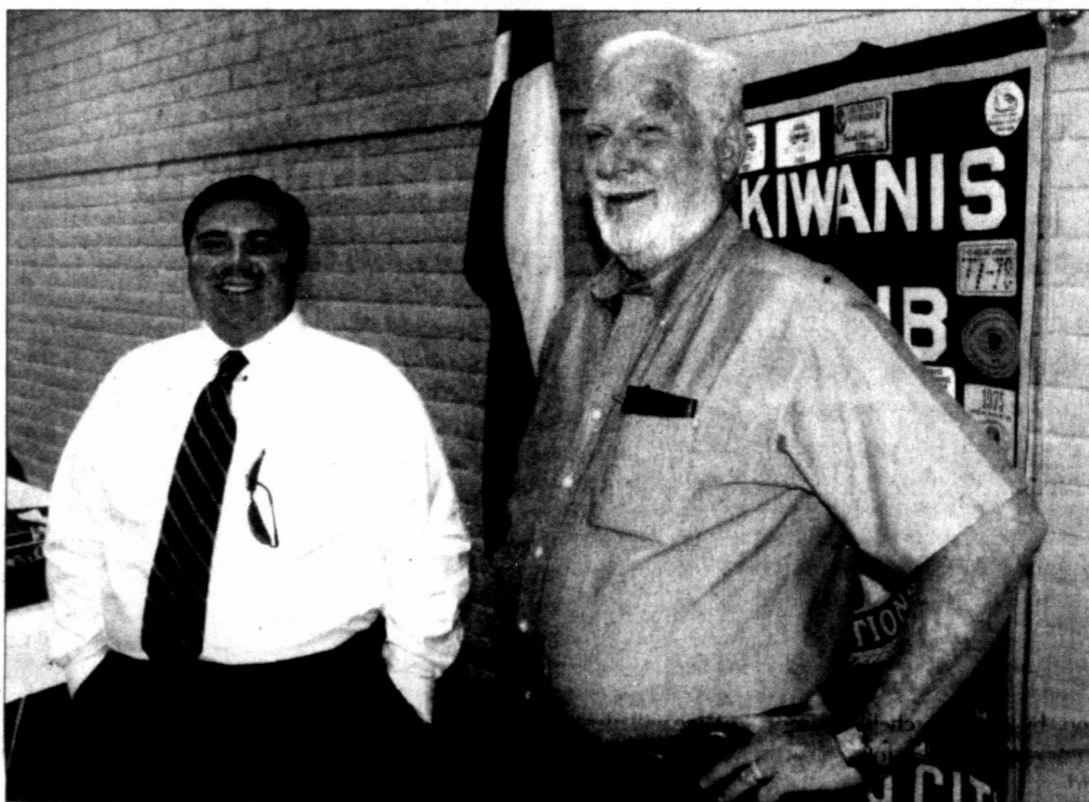

## Technology links past and present

Colorado City is about to be put on the map — the World Wide Web map.

Cell phone users will have instant access to information about Colorado City's historic buildings due to cutting edge technology introduced from Japan.

Quick Response Codes link the physical world with the Internet via a two-dimensional bar code. So simple to create that anyone can design one, QRC provide massive amounts of information with the click of a cell phone camera. The black-and-white digitized images range anywhere from one inch squares to four feet by four feet squares.

Dustin Haisler, QRC specialist from Manor, Texas, along with his wife Amanda and Manor city manager Phil Tate met with Main Street and city leaders this week to discuss how using cell phone technology and internet access can benefit Colorado City's marketing strategies and economic development.

Haisler was instrumental in helping Manor become the first U.S. city to implement the technology on their downtown buildings, high school and Jennie Lane SmartPark.

"We initially were looking for a document management system," said Haisler. "I did some online research for a bar code we could use that was cheap. It hit both of us this had a lot of economic development potential. If it can be read by any cell phone with a camera, why are we holding back?"

"We started with the concept of nothing," said Tate, adding the system was extremely easy to use.

QRC was developed in 1991 by a Japan company that offered it to anyone to use.

"It's free technology," said Haisler. "You can create it, open it, or read it for free. It's a web-based generator and you don't have to be tech savvy to use it. Anyone who knows how to use the Internet can make a code. Once the reader is on a phone, it's as simple as pointing."

Manor used the technology to revitalize their downtown and restore a historic park. "We selected a number of historic sites and tied the history to the website. As people go to different places, they have access to photos, founder information, historical references, site locations and even audio

## Loraine ISD approves 2009-2010 budget

Following a public meeting, the Loraine ISD approved the 2009-2010 budget at a called meeting Monday evening.

The board approved the 2009/2010 Budget for the district in the amount of \$1,873,680.62

The board also approved the school's lunchroom budget of \$118,594.00

A tax rate of \$1.17 / \$100.00 valuation was approved, as well.

"This is the same tax rate the district has maintained for the past three years," said Eric Stoddard, Loraine ISD superintendent.

A copy of the budget will be posted on the Record website later this week.

## Council to discuss motel plans

The Colorado City council will hold a public hearing Thursday evening on the 2009 proposed tax rate beginning at 6 p.m. at the Civic Center.

The council will also discuss development of an economic development program with Stewart Investment Company for the construction and operation of a hotel/motel in Colorado City.

A review of city manager applicants will be considered during an executive session according to the agenda.

## Library offers card sign up next month

September is Library Sign-Up Month.

New users are encouraged to drop by the Mitchell County Library and sign up for a library card.

"We are encouraging everyone who doesn't have a library card to come get one," said Brigada Hiser, librarian. "During the month we will also be reminding everyone of all the services we have to offer."

To obtain a library card, adults will need a photo ID and two proofs of residence in Mitchell County, such as a bill with their name and address.

Parents must sign up for children 17 years of age and under. Children can obtain a library card through the information on their parents' card. If the parents do not have a library card, they will need to provide a photo ID

(of themselves) and two proofs of residence.

Children from 11 to 17 years of age will also need an additional form from parents giving their permission to use the Internet.

Children 11 years and under can use the Internet in the library, as long as a parent is seated beside them.

First time library card users are initially limited to two books. When those are returned in a timely manner, the patron has unlimited access to books, unless the parents themselves impose a limit.

The library also loans out movies, with a two movie per household limit.

The library will continue to offer pre-school Story Time every Wednesday at 10 a.m. and Teen Time will continue on Wednesday afternoons at 4 p.m.

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH

### 65 MILES TO THE NEAREST STOPLIGHT

Sanderson is the smallest town on AMTRAK. Jim Street, publisher of the *Terrell County News-Leader* in Sanderson calls it a whistle stop (defined as a station where a train stops only on signal). "The trains don't stop unless there's someone who wants to get off here or somebody wants to get on. But if you stand out there and flag it down, the train will stop for you."

Jim says if you don't happen to have a ticket, you can buy one once you get aboard. Sanderson was named for a railroad man.

"It was created because of the railroad," says Jim. "People putting the railroad through saw an interesting place to build a town. Charlie Wilson was one of those guys. He bought a bunch of property with the idea he'd be able to sell it and make some money."

Back in those early days, the story goes, Charlie Wilson put up a saloon for railroad workers. Pretty soon a guy by the name of Roy Bean came along and decided to put up another saloon in Sanderson.

"Someone sneaked into Roy Bean's place one night and put kerosene in the whiskey bottles. The next day, customers complained about the terrible taste. So Roy Bean left town and went to Langtry."

Sanderson is very much by itself. No big towns are nearby.

"We're pretty much out here in the middle of nowhere. It's sixty-five miles to the nearest stoplight."

Because of its remote location, Sanderson attracted outlaws, cattle rustlers and bandits. Two gunmen who tried to rob a train near Sanderson in 1912 were not successful.

"They stopped the train and one of the guys went into the mail car to rob it. He got some stuff, then the agent in charge told the gunman that there were some real treasures on the bottom shelf. When the gunman stooped down to look, the agent hit him over the head with an ice mallet, used back then to break ice, and killed him. The agent took the robber's rifle and stood waiting until the other guy came looking for his buddy. When he walked through the door, the agent shot and killed him. The train proceeded into Sanderson and displayed the bodies in the depot where they were photographed. They're buried in our cemetery."

Sanderson is in Terrell County, which used to be part of Pecos County.

"It was created in 1905. We had our centennial celebration here a few years ago. If you look at a map, Pecos County comes to a little 'V' at the bottom of the county. The reason is they wanted a piece of the railroad in Pecos County so the county officials could get free train rides."



## Dove Hunting Holds Great Income Potential

As we approach the first day of Dove hunting in Texas, September 1, it seems a good idea to review just a bit of the value that this passion can bring to the state and to our county. Each year over 400,000 hunters take to the field to enjoy dove hunting. In addition, hunters spend a total of about 3.6 million days in the field each year in Texas. Simply put, one out of every four dove hunters in the nation hunts dove in Texas. Landowners stand to be the beneficiary of this hunting revenue as 95 percent of the land in Texas is privately owned.

Research has shown that, in Texas, food and lodging expenditures can reach as high as \$59 million while, transportation can climb as high as \$44 million. Add in an additional \$20 million for trip costs and toss in a \$94 million chunk for equipment, and that could bring the total to well over \$219 million per year. This equates to \$438.28 per hunter, per year spent in association with hunting migratory birds.

Mourning dove are the primary bird in Mitchell County, however, Eurasian Collard and White Wing Dove have

become increasingly more numerous, over the past few years, right here in our own back yards.

For purposes of this discussion Mourning doves will be the featured topic.

Mourning doves prefer feeding areas featuring an abundance of hard-coated seeds. The most common types of hard-seed in our area are: annual sunflower, pigweed (careless weed) western ragweed, grain sorghum and wheat. While these are some of the main staples for quail as well, dove have two characteristics that distinguish their foraging from quail.

Doves eat almost exclusively seeds and insects.

Secondly, doves are "pickers" not "scratchers", so it is essential to have seeds on bare ground for improved dove habitat.

Mourning dove nesting habits are important in management schemes. They nest in isolated pairs and are very discriminating about locations. Nest site locations can range from various trees in rural environments to street lamps in urban settings. Mourning doves also nest on the ground if trees are lacking.

The female typically lays two eggs, each laid one day apart and incubates

them for 14 days. Both male and female share the nesting job.

The male is the caretaker for the nest from midmorning to early evening and the female takes over the nesting at night. Both male and female produce pigeon-milk - a liquid secretion from their crop glands to feed to the young, which are called squabs. As the squabs mature, the milk is gradually replaced with regurgitated seeds. Young doves can leave the nest after 14 days, but, they remain nearby where the male feeds them for several more days.

Until recently, land management for doves was considered unimportant because of the migratory nature. Doves appeared in September almost regardless of how the land was managed. But, as hunting popularity increases, available land decreases and dove number and generous bag limits increase, managing land to fit dove needs for food, cover and water enable a property to hold and attract more dove that can in turn increase economic returns in uncertain economic times.

Dove Management in Texas is available in our office and offers a tremendous amount of insight to help landowners improve and manage hunting land. Good hunting and good managing!

## Safe canning preserves harvest goodness

During tough economic times a short food budget and an abundance of homegrown vegetables and fruits triggers the desire to can and preserve foods at home. While this can be a fun, rewarding and money saving way to preserve foods long after the season ends, care must be taken to assure that the foods you canned were canned cor-

rectly and are safe to eat.

Following research-based methods and using tested recipes are just things to consider when canning foods at home. "Not all recipes for home canning have been tested for safety," said Mary McMullen, County Extension Agent for Family and Consumer Sciences. Sources of tested recipes include

the National Center for Home food Preservation (<http://www.uga.edu/nchfp/>), USDA and manufacturers of home canning equipment and supplies. Recipes from cookbooks, outdated extension publications and the internet should not be used.

Using the right equipment when canning also is important. Some foods can be preserved using a water bath canner, but others must be processed in a pressure canner. "If the right canning method is not used, then the finished product could make people very sick," advises McMullen.

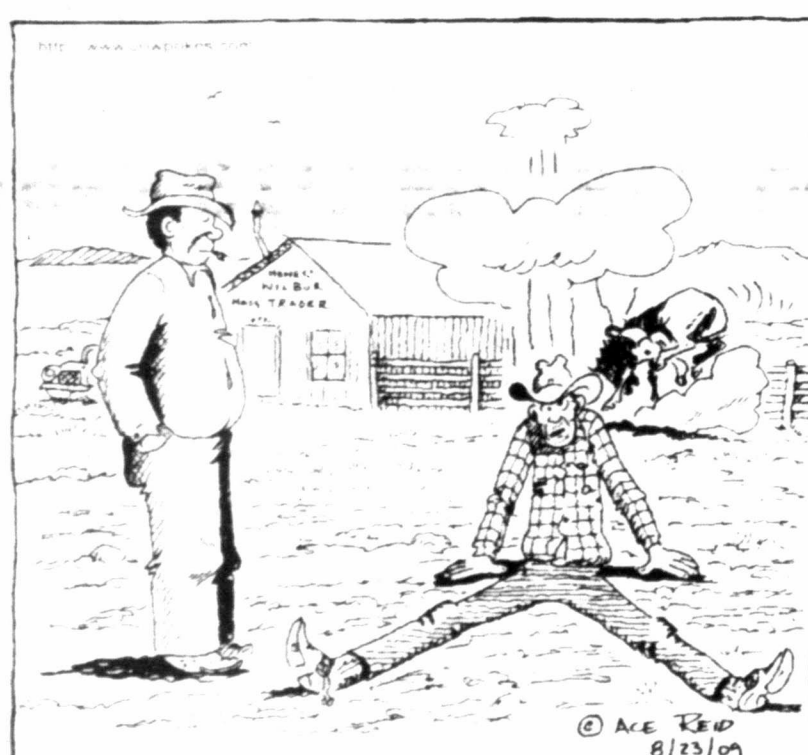
Also, make sure that the equipment you have is in good working order. Experts advise that dial gauges on pressure canners be tested annually to make sure they are accurate. In addition, canners should be checked to make sure they are in good working order.

There are many other aspects to canning that one needs to consider, including jar size, head space, and recommended processing (canning) times. All of these can influence the safety of the final product. "The last thing that we want to do is tell someone that the food they have just spent hours canning has to be thrown away

Westbrook pay off the loan on their new rescue truck.

Although Mitchell County helps the department out with a yearly budget, most goes for oil changes and fixing flats to maintain Westbrook's five trucks.

The rest of the fire department's expenses are covered 100% from donations and fundraisers to try to buy trucks and equipment.

"We're in dire need of bunker gear. We have some, but the majority is hand me down," said Hale. "It doesn't always fit, but it protects them, which is the priority."

Like many small volunteer fire departments, Westbrook has very devoted personnel. "We have no full-time paid people, even though we have people that put in full time," said Hale.

"I'm proud to be a firefighter," said Hale. "We may not have the best training, but we bust our tails and put our lives in danger for something we don't get paid for."

The department is also very family oriented, with husband and wife teams, and even second generations serving on the force.

Mindy's dad, Matt Syler, is the 2nd assistant fire chief. "We have fire training every fire, because we learn something different," he said.

The department's firefighters also do all the vehicle maintenance themselves. "One thing about working on the trucks ourselves, we can put whatever we want on it," said Chief Brandon Hale, who was elected as chief at age 24.

Most fire department are connected with the forestry service

and Westbrook is no different. They have three forest service trucks, two 6 x 6 big military looking vehicles that can handle any terrain nicknamed Gunny and Sarg and one tanker, Turtle, named after its driver.

"Anytime they call we have to respond," said Chief Hale. "We've been to Water Valley, Big Spring, Snyder and Barnhart, which is 50 miles south of Sterling City. That's a three-hour drive in a military truck."

Westbrook also works closely with Loraine and Colorado City. Colorado City will take calls for Westbrook during the mud bog. "They've been really great helping us out with everything," said

Hale.

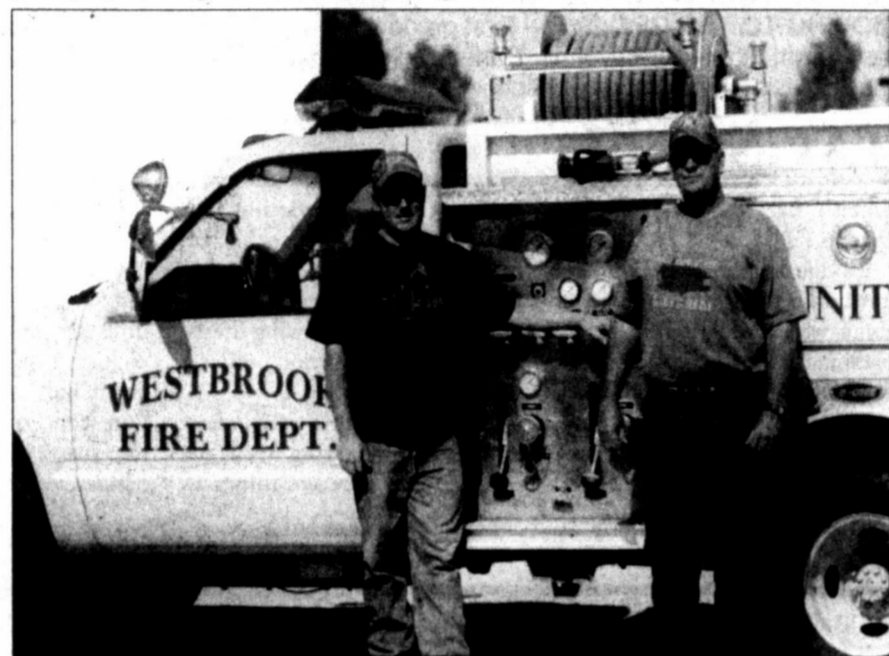
Last year the department responded to 89 calls. This year they've handled between 25-30.

"The end of summer and winter are our busiest times of year," said Chief Hale. "As long as we've got enough people to protect the home front we'll go anywhere the military trucks will get us."

Serving as a volunteer fireman often means spending 12 hours fighting a fire, then getting up two hours later to go to work.

"Last year we were sleeping in the fire truck because we knew the papers would be going off," said Hale.

"We never got tired of it, just scared of how big it's going to be," said Chief Hale.

The few times Rhea has been able to phone home, if the cat hears his voice on the phone, he'll take the phone and run away with it.

The home in Colorado City is the first home they've ever bought and Dawn took care of all the details by herself. "When he comes here, he will actually be coming home," she said.

Hawley's group of 332 were the last flight in after a lengthy delay in Kuwait, causing great anxiety among loved ones in Texas.

"As soon as I saw that plane in the sky, the tears started falling," Dawn said. "The families sacrifice the most. The soldiers know they're okay, but we don't."

"Reality is going to set in when I have him in the car coming home," she said.

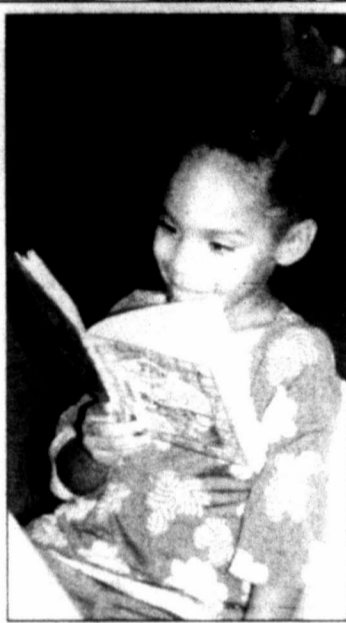

site locations and even audio recordings," said Tate.

"It compliments historical markers, not take away from them," said Haisler. "It can highlight what you have and empower people to take ownership of things you can't get a historical marker for."

"We are looking at using QRC to label all the historic buildings and the entrances to the city," said Cecilia Scott, Main Street coordinator. "We can also find out how to label headstones, particularly those of historic figures like Dick Ware."

The technology can also revitalize print advertising. A code included in a newspaper ad, allows a cell phone user to bring up a restaurant's complete menu, sales, discounts or even coupons. Emergency contact information can be stored within the code to assist rescue workers responding to an emergency.

The codes allow information to be directly embedded or accessed through a link to a website.

"You have so much potential and history here you can highlight with these codes. You can compliment what's already here without creating anything new," said Haisler.

rubbish has also undergone a change.

Previously, the code enforcement officer sent a courtesy letter about weeds and rubbish before sending the 10 day citation letter.

"Before it was taking over a month before we could get anything done on weeds and rubbish," Hernandez said.

Now the 10 day warning will be posted on the owner's door or, in the case of property owners who live out of town, the letter will be mailed. Following the 10 day compliance period, officers will issue a citation.

"Jessie has spent a tremendous amount of time trying to cut the red tape and expedite things to

keep Colorado City beautiful," said Hale.

Communication is key in resolving violations of city ordinances. Property owners can pick up copies of the ordinances at city hall or if they have a question concerning city code enforcement, they can contact Hernandez at the police station.

could appoint a new justice.

The commissioners also approved changes to the county's credit card policy. The new policy, proposed by county auditor Janna Ratliff, clearly defines what the card can and cannot be

used for.

"It's really pretty liberal," said Ratliff. "There are some counties out there that are pretty restrictive."

Other counties, including Howard County, have similar

policies.

One of the changes avoids the confusion of using the credit card for meals and gas, while using a per diem.

"There will be one form for mileage and per diem and another form for using the county credit card," said Ratliff.

A tax sale bid of \$150 by Traven Berrie for property on the northeast corner of 5<sup>th</sup> and Cherry was approved. The commissioners also approved a \$100 bid by Roy A. Owens Jr. for two lots in the 500 block of Cypress.

school year.

Of that budget, 80-85% goes toward payroll, which the state does not consider as contributing to education, thus costing CISD a point on the FIRST rating. The remaining 15% of the budget covers utilities, insurance, student travel, equipment, supplies, capital outlay, and technology.

Of the 230 CISD employees, 100 are full time salaried teach-

ers and 100 are contract hourly workers, counting for \$7.2 million of the \$10.3 million budget.

The state contributes roughly half of the district's yearly budget, with taxpayers picking up the rest.

"It's a huge burden on the taxpayers," said White. "As evaluations go up, the state aid goes down at a faster rate than a dollar for dollar."

or redone," said Agent McMullen. However, if one did not use a tested recipe, if unsealed jars were not identified within 24 hours after canning, or if jars were not processed properly (i.e. using a water bath canner instead of a pressure canner) we may have no other choice. Nobody likes to throw food away, but nobody wants to get sick or worse from eating unsafe food."

## Repairs continue on Opera House

Workers began making repairs to the outside stucco on the Opera House this week as part of the ongoing restoration of the historic Colorado City building.

"We're hoping to have it completed within two weeks," said Jan Lemons, Opera House board member.

Ronnie Atispe is overseeing the stucco repair as workers from TDCJ, Wallace and Ware Units remove and repair the old stucco, repair damaged boards and replace trim.

Inside the Opera House, work continues on schedule as prison trustees stripped and primed the interior lobby walls, caulked and prepped the window areas. Painting the lobby is scheduled after all the outside stucco has been repaired and the new windows, which have been completely refurbished at TDCJ, are installed.

Main Street and Linda Clay are collaborating on color schemes to bring the Playhouse closer to its historical roots.

The auditorium has newly textured walls and a fresh coat of paint and the stage and stage steps have been rebuilt.

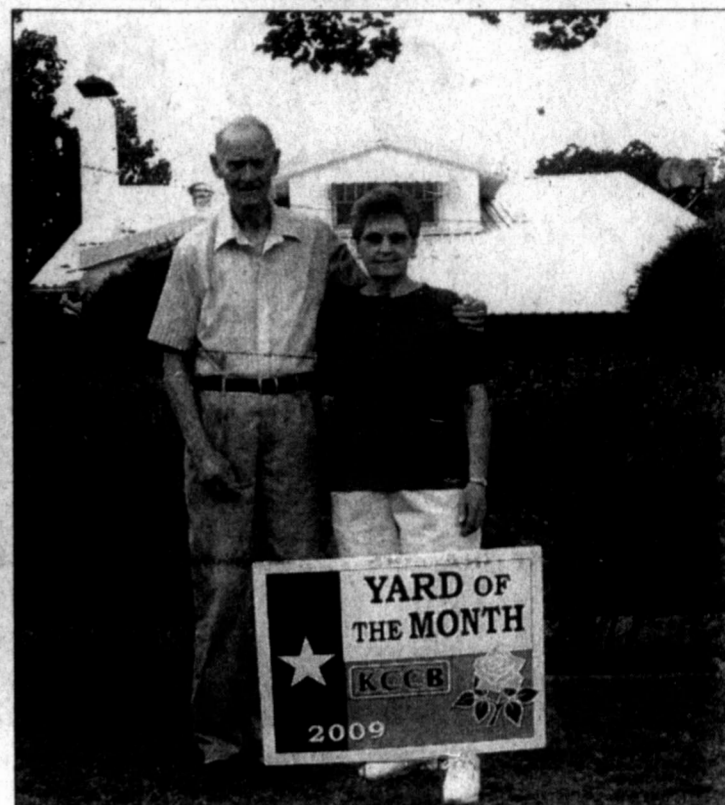
"We are so thankful to Warden Heaton and the talented guys from TDCJ for all the fabulous work they've done," said Lemons. Workers solved the problem of raising the catwalk to accommodate the dropped ceiling.

Workers raised the catwalk 18 inches, one and a half inches

at a time. They also built three new rooms backstage to provide storage, prop and musical equipment space and an on-stage dressing room.

The renovations to the stage and back stage area will also allow the Opera House to seat overflow crowds on stage behind the band's position.

"We still need to complete the electrical work and we're clearing out all the side rooms," said Lemons. "We're also trying to work out the best feasible way to get better bathroom accommodations." Currently the Opera House Board has two to three options under consideration.

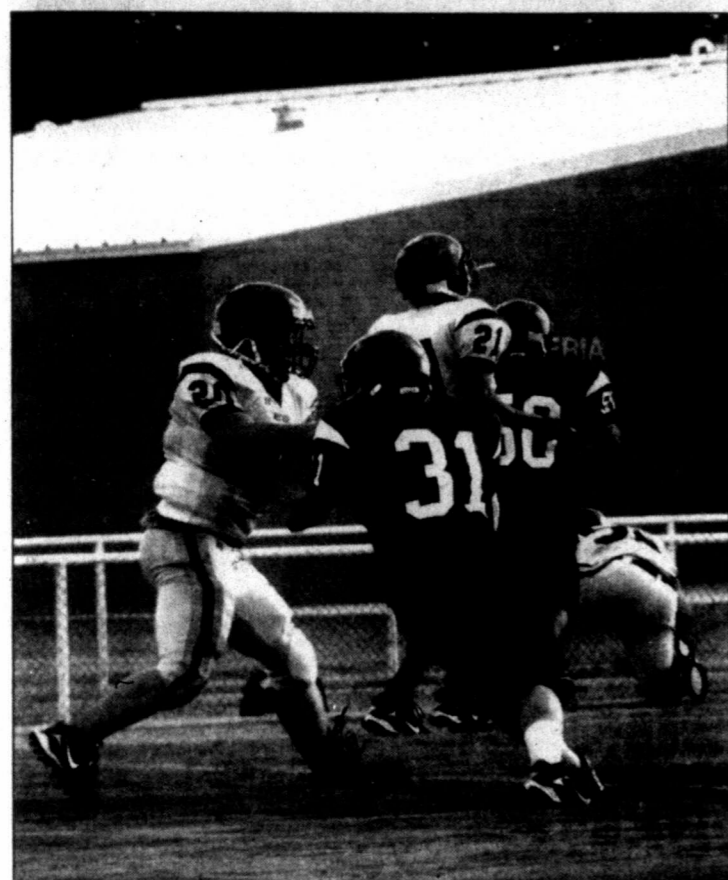
