From Mrs. C. W. Price, Box 28, Lubbock:

GRAPENUT PUDDING
Four tablespoons minute tapioca, 3-4 cup brown sugar, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 cups hot water, 1-2 cup raisins, 4 tablespoons walnut meats, chopped, 1 small apple, pared and chopped, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 1-2 cup grapenuts. Add minute tapioca, sugar, and salt to water, and cook in double boiler 15 minutes, or until tapioca is clear, stirring frequently. Remove from fire, add raisins, nuts, apple and vanilla. Just before serving, add grapenuts. Serve with whipped cream. Serves six.

From Mrs. M. E. Hilborn:

BARBECUED CHICKEN
Broil young chicken. Remove to hot pan and let set at least 5 minutes with the following sauce poured over it:
Melt 2 tablespoons butter, add 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 teaspoon mustard (dry), dash of tobacco, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, dash of pepper and 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce. Let boil up.

PEA AND OLIVE SALAD

One small can tiny lot peas, 1 bottle stuffed olives, 1 onion.
Chop fine onion and onion, add peas. Marinate in French dressing 1 hour. Drain and serve on lettuce leaves with mayonnaise. Garnish with slices of stuffed olives.

From Mrs. C. C. Jones, 2117 Tenth street, city:

OSGOOD PIE
Two eggs, one cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 teaspoon vinegar, a lump of butter, 1-2 cup raisins, 1-2 cup nuts. Beat yolks lightly, add sugar, butter, vinegar and spices. Beat the whites stiff and mix into above. Add nuts and raisins. Bake filling and crust at one time.
This makes one pie.

MACAROONS

Three egg whites well beaten, 1 cup chocolate, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups powdered sugar, 1 cup nuts. Bake moderate oven.

THE SUCKER MARKET KEEPS RISING

THIRTY THOUSAND AMATEUR INVESTORS WERE LOSERS IN RECENTLY UNEARTHED FRAUD

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, March 29.—From 23,000 to 30,000 amateur adventurers in finance were the real losers in the exploitation of Canario Copper stock, the government said today in closing its case against five men whom a defense lawyer had pictured as going "broke, down and out" to pay their debts. Federal Judge Knox will charge the jury tomorrow.

After defense counsel had denounced as "atmosphere" the government's evidence submitted in an effort to convict the five for using the mails to defraud, Assistant Federal Attorney Lowell Wadmond attacked the group collectively and then singled out each man.

John and Herbert Locke, principal defendants, Wadmond said, had admitted they were the heads of the enterprise, and that in itself was enough to show the extent to which they were involved.

George F. Shurtliff, brother-in-law of the Lockes, said to have lost heavily in the enterprise, was not the loser in Canario mines, the prosecution said, but the victims were "from 23,000 to 30,000 suckers" who had dropped \$3,000,000 for securities in holdings which were

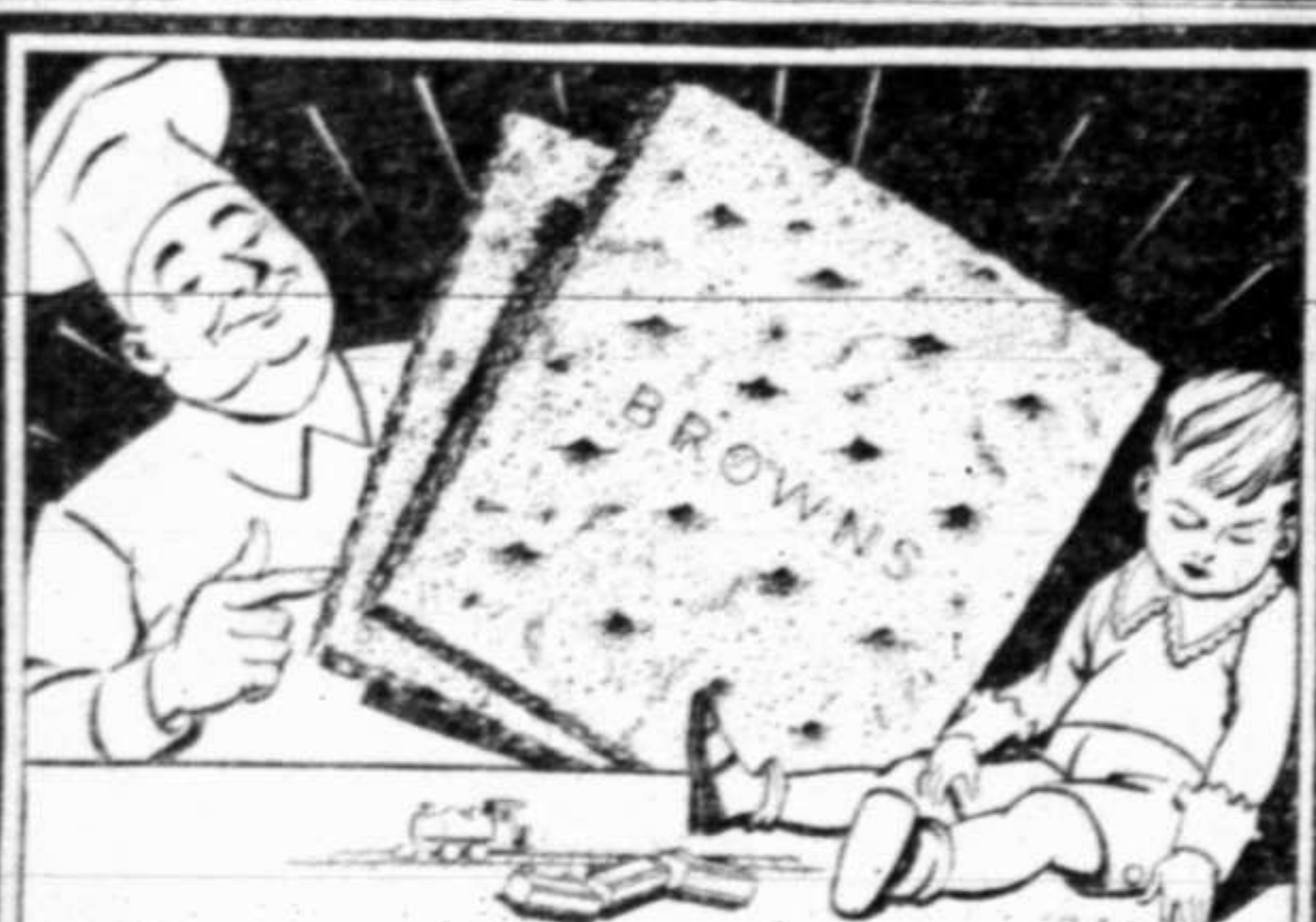

INDUSTRIAL TRACK LAID

GRANT PERMISSION FOR DENVER TO EXTEND TO DOWNTOWN

The Lubbock City Commission yesterday granted the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway permission to construct twelve blocks of industrial trackage.

The trackage, when completed, will extend from the Denver depot, across 18th street and up two alleys toward the business district. It is planned to lay tracks in the alley between 19th street and Broadway

for a distance of five blocks, and other tracks from 20th to 19th street in the alleyway between Avenue G and H.

Meeting in its regular semi-monthly session, the commission also voted to order material for the lighting of Sixteenth street from Texas to College avenue and on Avenue Q from Sixth to Nineteenth street.

Might As Well Start Thinking About 'Em

AUSTIN, March 29.—Automobile license plates for 1930 will have deep yellow bodies with letters, figures and borders of dark blue, and will be the same size as the 1929 plates, it was announced Wednesday, notices for bids to be opened April 23 were sent out by the board of control.

The same lettering and general design will be used for next year's number plates for all types of vehicles, with the exception that the line "Texas 1930" will appear above the license number instead of below it, as this year.

Ice Manufacturers Must Pass Costs On

FORT WORTH, Texas, March 29 (AP)—A careful checking of production costs and the passing on to the public of resultant savings is one guide to prosperity for Texas ice manufacturers in the opinion of Leslie C. Smith, Chicago, representative of the National Association of Ice Manufacturers.

Addressing the annual convention of the Southwestern Ice Manufacturers Association yesterday, Smith said: "Check production costs at every turn and give the public the benefit of these checks if you would help the industry. Our business is not a 'has been' business, but is one that the public can not do without."

Houston City Plant Destroyed By Fire

HOUSTON, March 29 (AP)—A city project started eight years ago and completed last December went up in smoke last night with an estimated loss of \$75,000. It was the new fertilizer plant.

With only one fireplug available, firemen were able to lay but one hose line and within an hour the entire plant was destroyed.

The fire started when a belt jumped a rotary dryer.

J. G. Claiborne, formerly with the home office of the Employers Casualty company and Texas Employers' Insurance Association, at Dallas, has taken over the Lubbock agency for these two companies. He succeeds L. L. Thompson, and his offices are at 211 Temple Ellis building.

Plan To Control Crude Production

WASHINGTON, March 29 (AP)—The announced plan of the American Petroleum Institute for control of production is to be investigated by both the Department of Justice and the Federal Trade Commission.

Attorney General Mitchell has been asked by Secretary Wilbur of the Interior Department for an opinion on the legality of the plan under the anti-trust laws, and the trade commission plans to study the institute's curtailment program on its own initiative.

I. T. T. Buys Radio Communication Firm

NEW YORK, March 29 (AP)—The New York Herald-Tribune said today that the International Telephone and Telegraph corporation had purchased the R. C. A. Communications, Inc., the World-Wide Wireless system of the Radio Corporation of America. The price was about \$100,000,000.

The deal makes the International Telephone and Telegraph Company the largest international communications system in the world with a comprehensive telephone, telegraph, cable and wireless system extending to the remotest parts of the globe.

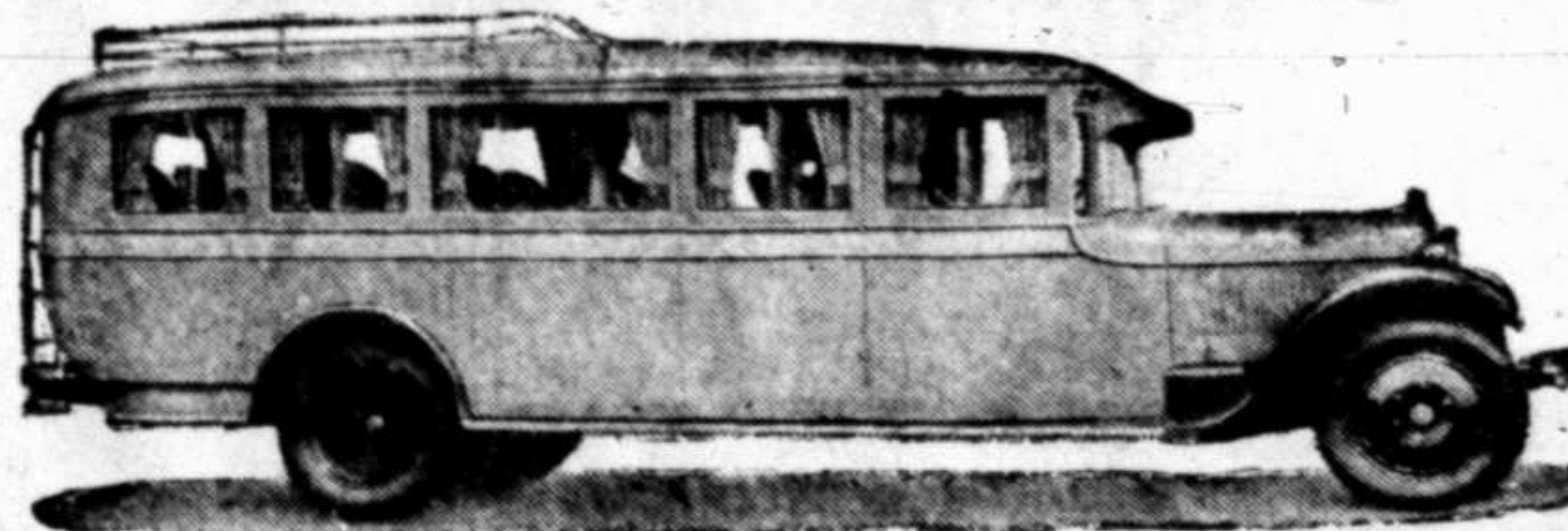

GOVERNMENT TO SEEK NEW USES FOR FARM PRODUCTS NOW BEING WASTED

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 29.—Federal aid to carry on the search for new methods of utilizing waste products of farms was proposed today as one phase of a new plan for farm relief in testimony by Anson Marston, of Ames, Iowa, president of the American Association of Land Grant colleges, before the house agricultural committee.

Marston pointed to the use of corn stalks in making paper as one of the many uses for waste products that such research might discover. So far, however, he said, the use of corn stalk paper was not general enough to benefit all farmers.

Wm. M. Marshall, a Fort Lauderdale, Fla., farmer, advocated a plan for handling all the perishable products from one section through one shipping point in mixed carload lots.

Before the senate agricultural committee the new McNary farm relief bill was endorsed by Howard Klosser, representing 430 national farm loan organizations in the 8th federal land bank district comprising Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota, and Wyoming. He said he had supported the McNary-Haugen bill with the equalization fee but he thought the substitute measure would provide the relief needed.

At the beginning of today's hearings, Chairman McNary of the committee made public telegrams from John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Charles M. Schwab and an assistant to Owen

D. Young, declining the committee's invitation to appear on the farm issue. Rockefeller said he had never made a study of the farm problem and was therefore not qualified to testify. Schwab said he had other engagements and Young's assistant said the financier would be kept in Paris for some time on reparations matters.

WAR DEBT EXPERT COMPLETE SCHEME

PARIS, March 29 (AP).—Before adjourning for a seven-day Easter holiday, the reparations experts today completed the foundation of their reparations scheme and will be ready to talk figures when they get back to work next Thursday.

Today's plenary session at which the various delegations each presented their own ideas of what should constitute a basis for a discussion looking toward the fixing of exact figures was described as one of the most important single sessions yet held.

It was proposed that the various suggestions and observations offered be reduced to writing for the delegates to read during the Easter holiday.

TUCSON, Ariz., Mar. 29 (AP).—The first Mexican revolutionary engagement in northern Sonora in which firing took place was reported to have occurred early today, resulting in federal troops capturing Mesquite, a small rebel post 30 miles west of Nogales, Sonora, revolt headquarters.

In some circles this was interpreted as a surprise federal strategic movement in a possible attack on Nogales. With reports of the federal victory came rumors of the intended movement of federal Mexican troops across southwest Arizona.

Granbery Attends Session At Austin

Dr. John C. Granbery, head of the history department, Texas Technological college, is attending a meeting of the Southwestern Political and Social Science association in Austin today and Saturday. The

meeting is being held at the University of Texas.

Dr. Granbery is on the program for a lecture Friday morning on "The Psychological Factor in United States and Latin American Relations."

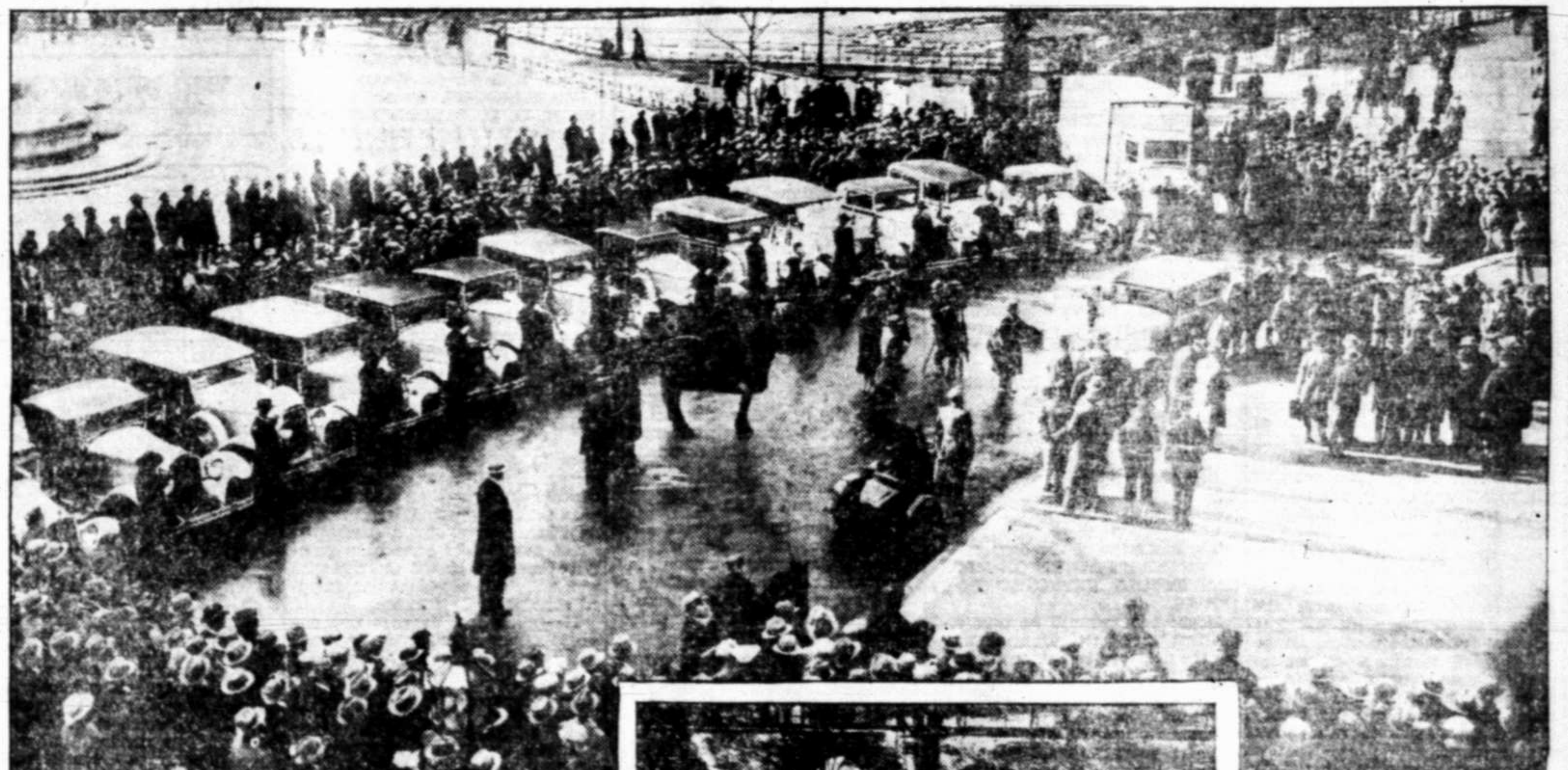

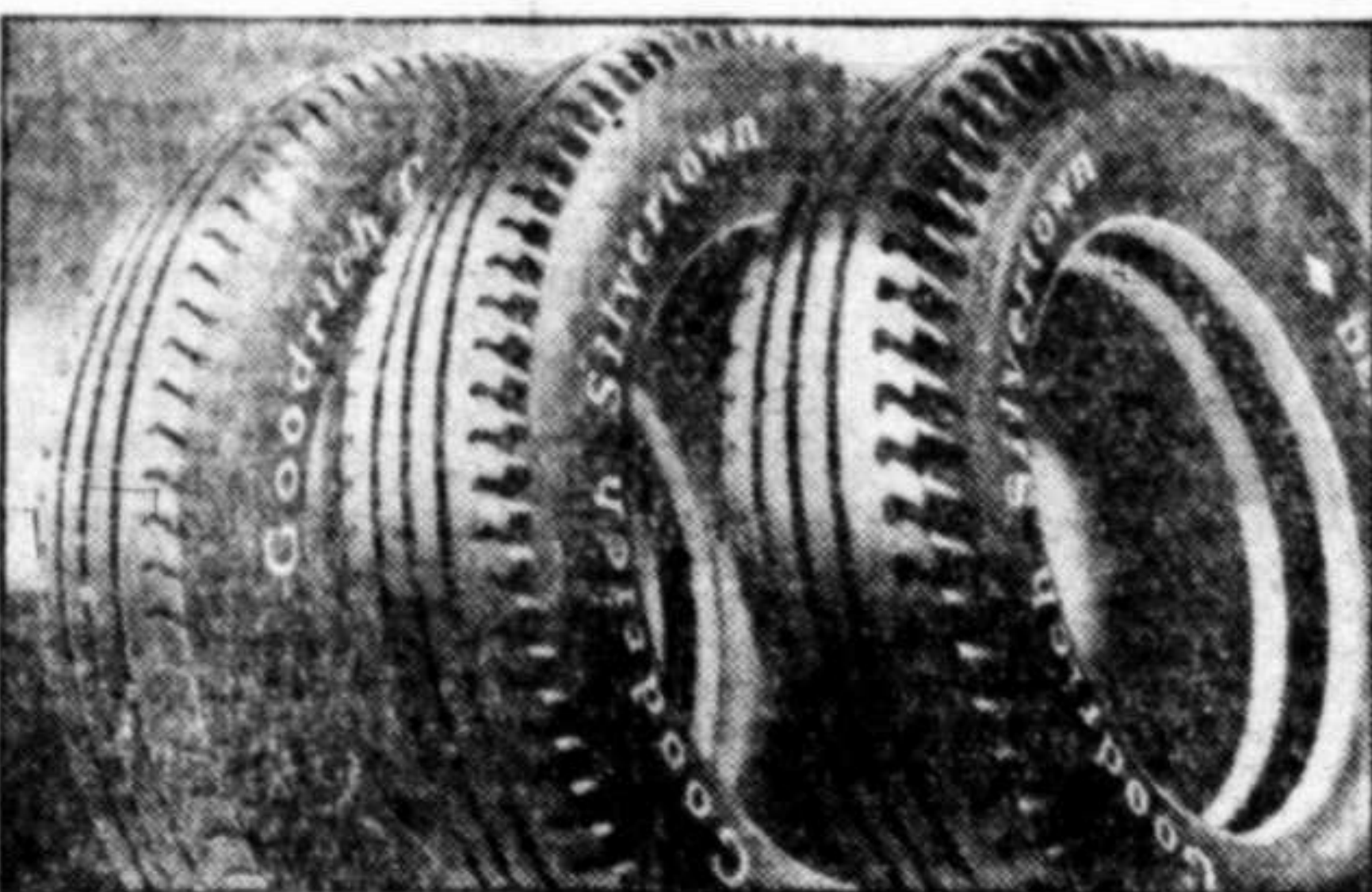

FARM RELIEF BILL PLANNED

MEASURE IS BASED ON
SUGGESTIONS OF
PRESIDENT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 28.—Based upon the broad, general suggestions for farm relief laid before the country in the campaign speeches of President Hoover, a farm aid bill is beginning to take form in the house agriculture committee.

A farm board, price stabilization agencies and a revolving fund appear to be the three points that will form the foundation upon which the agricultural aid structure is being reared. The details of the superstructure are coming to view as the hearings proceed.

As an indication of the firmness with which the committee has seized upon the idea of a farm board, witnesses are being requested to confirm their testimony to suggestions as to how such a board should operate. Other testimony largely appears incidental to the farm board and stabilization ideas.

Two definite details seem to have been determined in connection with the stabilization corporations, both in line with suggestions by co-operative leaders yesterday. They urged that if stabilization corporations were to be formed, the farm board initiate such steps only upon the appeal of the marketing agencies for action. The other phase that appears likely to be written into the bill is a provision that stockholders in the stabilization corporations shall be members of the co-operative groups.

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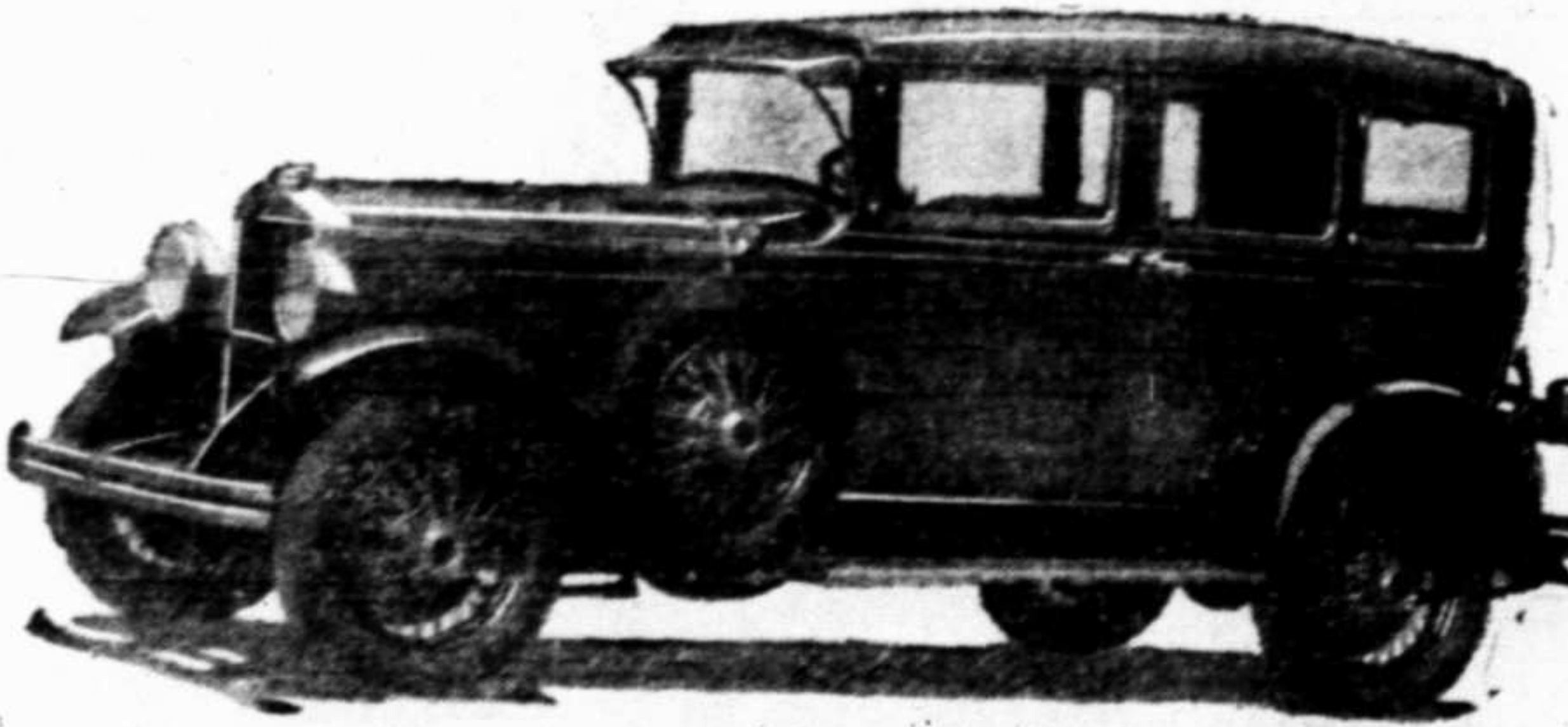

NOGALES, Ariz., March 29 (AP)—Five persons met violent deaths and three others were injured last night in an explosion that destroyed a federal bomb factory near Mexicali, capital of the northern district of Baja California.

Franz Schulenberg, German bomb maker, his 17-year-old daughter, Blanche, and three Mexican federal soldiers on guard duty were killed. The blast resulted when a bomb exploded in the process of manufacture, touching off nine kegs of explosives and thirty aerial bombs. The explosion which killed Schulenberg, Blanche, and the three soldiers, injured Francisco Kennech, chemist engaged with Schulenberg in making bombs, and two soldiers. All three were in a hospital in a serious condition.

The factory was located on the packard ranch of the Colorado River Land Company, five miles east of Mexicali.

REBELS BURST INTO ACTIVITY IN SONORA

NOGALES, Ariz., March 29 (AP)—Sudden activity in rebel quarters marked developments in the Mexican revolution in the state of Sonora today.

Sometime during the night, General Ramon Yucupicio and his 500 Mayo and Yaqui Indian soldiers slipped out of the rebel garrison at Agua Prieta for an unannounced destination. Their whereabouts today was a mystery.

Between six and ten truck loads of rebel troops, the trucks commandeered for military purposes, left Nogales, Sonora, westbound for the Sonora desert with the avowed

purpose of reclaiming it for the insurgents. About 100 rebel soldiers were on their way to Mesquite, Sonora, and to Conoyta, Sonora, both near the Arizona border.

PLOT TO KILL CALLES TOLD

MEXICO CITY, March 29 (AP)—Enrique Lickens, Mexican consul at El Paso, informed the government today there was a plot on foot to assassinate General Plutarco Elias Calles at his headquarters in Northern Mexico.

The consul said a telephone conversation between two prominent rebel leaders (presumably at El Paso or Juarez) had been overheard in which it was related the rebel General, Jose Gonzalo Escobar on fleeing from Torreón, left behind him "well paid agents" to kill Mexico's former president and minister of war.

Thus far no attempt has been made on the life of General Calles, who has his headquarters in the vicinity of Torreón.

BLIMP DASHES AGAINST TREE

GUST OF WIND TEARS CRAFT AWAY FROM 100 HOLDERS

(By Associated Press)

LAKEHURST, N. J., March 29 (AP)—An army blimp was a tangle of wreckage today as the result of its while on a visit from Langley field, rude reception by Jersey coast winds.

The army non-rigid dirigible TG-5 was torn from the grasp of a ground crew of 100 and hurled nearly a mile by a gust of wind that struck it while it was being walked into the hangar.

Captain John McCullough, commander of the blimp, and a seaman of the land crew were slightly injured by being knocked down as the ship blew away.

Warrant Officer Lasater and three soldiers were aboard the blimp. They escaped uninjured when the ship, relieved of its helium gas, came down near the Lakehurst railroad station.

The fact that the rip cord of the helium bag was in the hands of one of the ground men and was pulled when the dirigible tore away, was releasing the gas, probably saved the ship from being blown out to sea and saved the lives of the officer and three men aboard it.

Kellogg Free For Vacation In Europe

WASHINGTON, March 29 (AP)—Frank B. Kellogg was free today to return to Europe for a vacation in Europe before returning to the practice of law at St. Paul after his four years of service to the nation as its chief pilot in foreign affairs.

Preparing to leave Washington with Mrs. Kellogg to take passage on the Ile de France, he relinquished the post of Secretary of State late yesterday to Henry L. Stimson, proud of the multi-lateral treaty for the renunciation of war negotiated during his administration but disappointed that it could not be made effective before his retirement.
