Lubbock Senator To Aid In Drawing Report; Ellis County Man Is Lauded For Work In Probes

AUSTIN, Feb. 21.—Acknowledging that nothing material can be developed and none of the charges substantiated, Representative Elwin Gerron of Waxahachie, author of the resolution calling for an investigation into administration of the highway department and the board of control, today asked the joint committee of senators and house members making the inquiry to conclude the hearing and file a report of exoneration.

The committee by unanimous vote decided to acquiesce in his request, after members of the highway commission and board of control said they were satisfied to permit the investigation to end without introducing further testimony bearing on charges or inferences brought out in the hearing.

Parrish to Aid in Report
Representative Murphy of Livingston, chairman of the joint committee, and Senator Parrish of Lubbock were appointed to draw the report for submission to both houses. This will be done probably tomorrow.

Explaining that he had preferred the charges on information and belief obtained from reading newspapers, and hearing rumors, Gerron said in introducing the investigation resolution, he believed he was doing the people a service.

Tech Students To Visit In Santa Fe

Dr. Granbery To Take Sociology Students On Trip To Museum; To Be Gone Until Monday

In search of studies of anthropology, twenty-one students of the department of sociology of Texas Technological college under the direction of Dr. John C. Granbery, head of the department of history and sociology, will be in Santa Fe, New Mexico, this week-end to visit that museum there. Lindbergh Named Technical Adviser For Aeronautics

Lone Eagle To Become U.S. Employee In Aiding U.S. Building Of Aviation; May Be In Cabinet

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh has accepted his first official post with the government—technical adviser to the aeronautics branch of the commerce department.

Secretary Whiting announced the appointment today and said that Lindbergh was ready to respond to any call from William P. MacCracken, jr., the department's assistant secretary in charge of aeronautics, to advise or assist the government in all phases of its regulation of civil aviation, establishment of airports and airways, research and prevention of accidents.

Post Carries Fee Pay
The post will carry pay, but only on a fee basis, covering the time actually devoted to government service and will not require Lindbergh to live in Washington.

Lindbergh has been mentioned as a possible selection in the cabinet of Herbert Hoover for an assistant secretaryship in charge of aeronautics but the flier has said there was no authority for the rumors.

Chicago Searched For Gang Killers

CHICAGO, Feb. 21. (P)—A search of all Chicago, including the entering of private premises for liquor law violators, was ordered today by William F. Russell, commissioner of police.

The commissioner, who charged the St. Valentine's day massacre of seven members of the Moran gang was a result of liquor running and prohibition, ordered a survey of the city with particular attention paid to all buildings fronting on alleys, such as garages, barns and sheds.

No progress was made, however, in solving the massacre, not even a new theory as to how the slaughter was evolved.

BOY SHOTS FARMER

Ten-Year-Old Wilds Shot Gun On Alvin Farm

ALVIN, Feb. 21. (P)—Rebelling when ordered to do his farm chores, a 10-year-old boy seized a shot gun today and probably fatally wounded C. H. White, 42, farmer near here. The boy, who had been living with the family, also threatened Mrs. White.

Small shot fired at close range struck White in the face and neck.

Witness Alleges Figures Changed In McCloskey Case

Former Bexar County Commissioner Cites Instances Of Irregularities; Returns Altered

AUSTIN, Feb. 21.—Changes in figures recording the vote for congressman in the fourteenth Texas district in the official records of the clerk of Bexar county were made by Dave Dewhurst clerk of the commissioner's court, upon direction of that body, John T. Covington former commissioner testified today in the criminal trial of Augustus P. McCloskey, congressman-elect.

Through Covington it was brought out that the official returns from the election showed many irregularities not authorized by the commissioner's court.

Occurred in Bexar County
The changes occurred in the records of several other contests in the twentieth precinct of San Antonio (Bexar county), as well as in that in which Mr. McCloskey was credited with an advantage over Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach out of which grew five indictments, one of which McCloskey now is on trial. Some of the changes, it was shown, concerned men who had no opposition.

Covington testified that McCloskey refused to participate in the official canvass because of his dual position of candidate and county judge.

The trial was adjourned until tomorrow morning.

"Hello World" Gets Chance To Tell "Radio Omission" About

His Station; 163,231 Affidavits Endorsing Programs Presented

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—W. K. Henderson, owner of radio station KWKH at Shreveport, La., opposing the application of station KVOO of Tulsa, for the 850 kilocycle frequency his station has been allocated, today presented the Radio Commission with 163,231 affidavits endorsing his station and its programs.

Henderson, famous for his greeting of "Hello world! Dogwood in Shreveport on the air!" testified after Senator Russell, democrat, Louisiana, and a number of the Louisiana delegation had declared the station was very popular in the south and that in their opinion its wave length should not be changed.

Conducts Vigorous Campaign
The Shreveport broadcaster, who has been conducting a vigorous campaign over his station against the application of KVOO, said he had announced over his station and was widely known for the fine record played by it.

30-Year-Old Wife Is Aiding 93-Year Old Pioneer

(By Associated Press)

MARILLO, Feb. 21.—Charles A. Goodnight, the last of the three men who blazed the first trail over which cattle were driven northward from Texas after the civil war, is writing his memoirs.

In this literary effort, the 93-year-old ranchman and former Indian fighter is assisted by his 30-year-old wife. The book, which they hope to complete soon, is to tell of the early days in the southwest.

Preserves Relics
Colonel Goodnight—the title has no military significance—has been interested for many years in the preservation of historical data and relics. He is closely identified with the activities of the Panhandle-Plains Historical society. He and J. Everett Haley, field secretary of the society, have collected much material of historical value.

Mrs. Goodnight—her maiden name was Goodnight, too—was a nurse before her marriage two years ago. Since she ceased to be Miss Goodnight she became enthusiastic about preserving historical information and urged her husband to carry on his research at home by exploring his own memory.

Colonel Goodnight was the first white settler in the Texas Panhandle. He and his wife live on a large ranch southeast of Amarillo and the town where they get their mail is named Goodnight, too. They spend most of their time in their Clarendon home.

Was A Scout
Goodnight was a scout under General McKenzie when he came to Texas and he participated in the last battle between Indians and white men in Texas. That was in the Palo Duro canyon in 1874. Incidentally, he is the discoverer of

Four years later the scout turned cowboy, and helped the Adairs of New York and England establish the famous JA ranch of 400,000 acres in the Palo Duro country. Later he established his own ranch south of Amarillo as a livestock breeder because of his attraction for the country.

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Money Asked For Repairing Capitol

Measure Calls For Appropriation Of \$3,000,000 For Renovation Work On State Building

AUSTIN, Feb. 25.—A bill calling for an appropriation of \$3,000,000 to repair the interior of the state capitol was drafted today by Representative George Purl and four other legislators.

It calls for a complete renovation of the state house, following plans drawn up by architects of Texas University and A. M. College. The board of control is designated to reappropriation and redesignation of office space throughout the building containing an emergency provision, it is likely that the measure will be acted on by the house committee on appropriations some time next week.

Signers of the bill, contend that the capitol is in danger of destruction by fire, that there is an imminent hazard of the collapse of floors and ceilings, and that conditions generally are overcrowded and unsanitary.

Final Decision On Highway Plan Expected Tonight

Either County-Wide Or District Road Campaign To Result From Action Of Meeting In Courthouse

Either one of two things will more than likely result from the meeting to be held tonight in the district court room at the courthouse, beginning at 7:30, of representative Lubbock county citizens interested in improved highways. First, decision will be made to call another county-wide bond issue election for the purpose of raising funds to pave the state and federal designated highways, or, second, steps will be taken to create another independent road district, other than district number one, which includes the city of Slaton.

DALLAS, Feb. 21.—Arrangements were made today for students of Simmons University, Abilene, to accompany their cowboy band on the special train which leaves here February 28 for the Presidential inauguration at Washington, Homer D. Wade, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, persuaded those in charge of the train to add three more cars to accommodate the students and band.

State republican leaders, who leave Sunday for Washington to appear before a senate patronage investigating committee, will arrange an audience with President-elect Hoover at which the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will extend him an invitation to attend its next annual convention at El Paso.

Interurban Kills Corsicana Couple

ARLINGTON, Feb. 21. (P)—Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Martin of near Corsicana, were killed today when their coupe was struck by an interurban at Bowen Stop, one and one-half miles west of Arlington.

The two were on their way to visit a brother of Martin at Grapevine. The body of Martin was identified by the brother tonight.

Martin was dead when witnesses of the crash reached the demolished automobile. Mrs. Martin died shortly after reaching a hospital at Fort Worth.

FIGHTING BREAKS OUT New Shantung Uprising Is Under Way In China

CHEFOO, Feb. 22.—(Friday)—Nationalist forces clashed with anti-nationalists today near Chefoo, precipitating the first battle of the new Shantung uprising. The nationalists are making vigorous efforts to organize their defense. They are receiving additional arms and have commandeered 80,000 bags of flour.

Robison Stripped Of Leasing Power By House Action

Kemble Bill Providing For Turning Duty To Board Of Two Regents And Commissioner Is Passed

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 21.—Land Commissioner J. T. Robison, central figure of a recent dispute with administrative heads over the leasing of Texas university mineral lands, tonight stood apparently partially shorn of his power through house adoption of the Kemble bill, placing land lease duties in a board to be composed of two university regents and the commissioner.

Kemble's measure was framed as a substitute to that already passed by the senate, giving the regents sole authority to dispose of properties believed underlaid with mineral deposits.

Lawmakers Work Late
The lights of the capitol were on before the house lawmakers heard the last argument hinging on what speakers declared was the most important action taken this session. Throughout the discussion, in which Kemble, Pope, Stevenson and Peterson, figured, ran echoes of the investigation of the land office now in progress.

Speaking for his bill, Kemble argued that responsibilities growing out of leases were too heavy for one man.

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Snowbound Town Greeted Supplies

DURANGO, Colo., Feb. 21. (P)—Hundreds of cheering men, women and children greeted the first train that has reached Silverton, Colo., in 17 days as it approached the depot late today.

The regular mixed train was followed by an extra freight, both trains carrying all kinds of food supplies, coal and delayed mail for the snowbound community.

An engine which had been used in clearing away the snow jumped the track and went into the Animas river at Elk Park about 6 miles south of Silverton. Engineer Pete Meyers was injured slightly.

A few minutes after the arrival of the supply train, the cars containing food supplies were opened and delivered to stores, where they were distributed to residents.

Fraud Testimony Enters Oklahoma Governor's Trial

Story Of Financial Aid Extended To Johnston Told Thursday By Ponca City Attorney

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 21.—A story of financial aid extended Governor Henry S. Johnston, on trial on eleven articles of impeachment, by a lawyer who represented a convict in an effort to obtain a pardon, was related by David L. Carter of Ponca City, the attorney, before a house investigating committee today.

Carter was attorney for J. T. Crane, convicted banker, who after aiding in preparation of an audit of state penitentiary records, was granted a parole only to be arrested later at Amarillo, Texas, for questioning in connection with purported swindling operations.

Asked About Money
On one occasion while Carter was at the Governor's office to plead for clemency for his client, Carter said, the Governor asked if he had any money for him.

On a suggestion of J. F. Murray, Carter's law partner in 1927, Carter said, their law firm agreed to give Johnston, in financial straits, their fee, above \$2,500, in a damage suit. Carter told the committee that he did not know whether the money ever had been paid to the Governor.

Relief Man Tells Of China Famine

PEKING, China, Feb. 21. (P)—Appalling famine conditions were described today in a report from Shensi province by E. H. Oliver, representative of the International Relief committee.

At one point, Oliver said, he found 200 villagers huddled in a cave. They were without food, all were afflicted with a terrible eye disease and were awaiting death.

In one district 70,000 out of the 120,000 population were restless and food and the remainder had very little. In another upwards of 100 families had committed suicide and at San Yuan a mob of several thousand hungry maddened people was threatening to loot the city unless they were fed.

East Coast Gets Heavy Snowfall

Worst Snow Of Winter Piles Up Section; New York Has Worst Snow In 3 Years

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—From Canada to the Carolinas and westward in an almost solid blanket to the Mississippi, snow piled up today in the most widespread storm of the winter.

It was the worst storm in three years in New York City, and Manhattan's snowfall was far below that in many other places.

Ten Pennsylvania counties reported 17 inches of snow when New York had seven, Nashville, Tenn., had 14, Charleston, W. Va., had 12, and many other towns were near the one foot mark.

Shovelers Work All Day
More than 15,000 shovelers worked all day to keep New York's streets open and throughout the snow band across the eastern states forces were marshalled in a great offensive against drifts that threatened to paralyze transportation.

Atlantic City's boast that there isn't any snow on the boardwalk, was snowed under early today.

Ferry service in New York harbor was slowed down and ocean liners hesitated to negotiate the journey between their piers and quarantine.

The Woman's Day

Just what's what about this drudgery of women of the past as compared with the lightness of today's woman? An article by Ernest Elmo Calkins, an advertising man who has more than done his bit toward making no home complete without this device and that to simplify housework, inspires the question. He writes on "The Emancipation of the Housewife."

FROM PUMP TO WOOD BOX
He speaks in detail in painting the luridly hideous past for the housewife. He reminds us of the wooden sink into which soft water was pumped by an iron pump from a wooden cistern. He reminds us of the drinking water brought in from the well in the back yard, and how both well and cistern had to be "primed" with hot water in the cold weather. He reminds us that the only source of hot water was in the reservoir at the back of the kitchen stove. He reminds us of the problem of Saturday night baths in the wash tub, set beside the kitchen stove, especially when the family was large and the stove reservoir had to be reinforced by kettles and dish pans of hot water.

BASE BURNERS AND SOAP
He reminds us that base burners were the only means for heating the rest of the house; that food was kept cool in summer by being hung down the well; that a family wash was done mostly with elbow grease and wash boards; that such things as electric or water power washers were utterly unknown, and that even soap powders to loosen the dirt were not available and that the housewife had to even make her own laundry soap.

BEANS AND BREAD
Then he came to the food phase of housekeeping problems. He reminds us that everything came to the kitchen in a raw state—that oatmeal and beans and dried fruits had to be soaked overnight; that bread and pancake batter had to be mixed and left to rise; that vegetables and fruits were chopped in a wooden bowl with a huge cleaver; he reminds us again and again of the impossibility of buying prepared

jellies and jams and canned fruits and salads and desserts. Raw materials only came to the housewife. Then seasoning and stoning and chopping and drying and soaking and combining and cooking were all up to her.

Dish-washing engrosses him next. No hot water; no special soap preparations, no dish dryers, not even scrapers for pots and pans.

And paragraph after paragraph about lamps to be filled and cleaned, kindling to be cut and piled in the wood box, coffee bought green and roasted, and on and on and on with all the data that we know so well.

CAN'T ARGUE

No matter how argumentative one is inclined, it would be sheer folly, of course, in the face of all this evidence, to try to argue that today's woman because of her very convenience, because of the very surfeit of luxuries and necessities offered her, doesn't have a much easier job than her grandmother.

We won't therefore, try to argue that way at all. But the argument is there—that to some extent it's only an exchange of one form of drudgery for another. The electric light bulbs must be replaced and the meter man let in and the bill paid and some new lamps bought and shades rematched.

A furnace isn't so much less bother than a stove and a bathroom is one more room to keep clean.

Two Fathers Seek Custody of Youths

Habeas Corpus Proceedings Filed in 99th Court Here Thursday; Hearing Is Set For February 27

Contention is made that two 14 year old boys were illegally taken from their fathers and are being illegally restrained of their liberty. The fathers of the two boys ask that their sons be returned to them and be released from the Texas State Juvenile Training School, at Gatesville.

A. E. Shireman and Frank Anthony are the fathers entering the plea for their boys, whose names are Floyd Shireman and Albert Anthony. Their petition claims that both boys were tried on December 3, 1928, following complaint made against them and another lad, J. B. Morris by C. D. Ellison. The Shireman boy was tried under the name of Floyd Sherman.

Claim Right

Under the law the fathers are entitled to the custody of the boys until they reach the age of 21 years. It is claimed, and the further statement is made that custody of the two boys was taken from them against their will and consent. It is also alleged that the county court has no jurisdiction in the matter, but that, according to the constitution of the State of Texas, the district court should have been the body acting on the cause. No warrant or order of arrests were issued for the minors, and no notice was issued and served upon the fathers as to the charges, before the trial.

Lubbock Division Of Federal Court Gets Denton Case

The fourth case at law, to be filed in the Lubbock division of the United States District court, northern district of Texas, as filed here yesterday and is styled F. William Leising, receiver versus S. W. Fulton, Jr.

Leising is the receiver of the First National Bank of Denton, and in the original petition on file states that when the bank became insolvent on August 7, 1928, he was appointed receiver and that soon thereafter an assessment of 100 per cent upon all of the outstanding capital stock of the bank was necessary to liquidate its debts and other affairs. It is claimed that Fulton owned 15 shares of this capital stock.

Demand was made on Fulton, the petition states, for \$1,500 but he failed and refused to make payment. The suit asks for interest and costs, in addition to the \$1,500.

How to Achieve Beauty

How to achieve beauty—these beauty aids are free water, sunlight and air. Some people are wont to take them too much for granted, and, consequently, to neglect them. Yet they are most important beauty aids and come within the reach of everybody everywhere.

First is water, inside and out. Cleanliness, we have been told, is next to godliness. I should like to say, also, that it is next to beauty. Health thrives in cleanliness, and beauty cannot possibly exist without it. Does this seem trite to you—this emphasis of such self-evident facts? Then learn that few people are as clean as they should be, even those who bathe often and scrub their hands and faces until the skin is dry and chapped. What matters most is the manner of cleansing, not the time and energy consumed in effort.

The cleanliness that most people ignore is the proper kind of inner cleansing. People should drink water, lots of it, to clean their bodies inside as well as out, of the poisons that come from fatigue and lack of exercise and overeating, with improper elimination of waste products. Eight glasses of water a day, two before breakfast, are good. Ten are better. Twelve are splendid. And if you feel that you need more, go right ahead and drink. It's good for you. It will keep your eyes bright and your skin clear and your kidneys and stomach and intestines in good working order.

Then water outside. This means baths, baths of all kinds. There are so many different kinds, but in general there are two distinct types, the sedative and the stimulating baths. Sedative baths are warm, cleansing baths. They may be taken morning, noon or night, but are best taken at night because they induce rest. A good water softener and a mild soap and soft towels are the accessories of the warm bath.

The stimulating bath is either hot or cold. A hot, quick bath, taken at night when the body is not too tired, is splendid both for the nerves and for the circulation. A quick cold bath, shower or plunge, in the morning will wake up the sleepy system and send the blood tumbling around the body in a healthy, happy way. Followed by a brisk rub with a sturdy Turkish towel, the cold morning bath is one of beauty's finest inspirations.

Now sunshine. Fortunately, it is not hard to induce people to indulge in sunshine. Most of them like it. Only sometimes they forget, when they are busy at their offices or playing in their comfortable, pleasantly-heated homes, that they need more and more sunshine than they can ever get. If people could be outdoors all their waking hours it would not be too much, provided that they protected themselves against unwise burning from the too-hot sun rays. If you take plenty of sunlight with

your play and with your work, walk in it, ride in it, bask in it, you will get a healthy body, and very pleasantly, too.

And as for air! Do I have to say "breathe deeply?" And remind you to sleep with windows wide open and to walk in the air and exercise out of doors whenever you can? You know these things as well as I. But let me say that air is necessary to beauty. Because it is necessary to health. For men, you remember, can live several weeks without food, several days without water, but only a few minutes without air. Does that show its importance? Then get lots of it, for the sake of your health and good looks.

POLL TAXES LIGHT

Total Of 5,211 Paid Voters In Lubbock County Now

There is at least one thing gratifying, in the report made yesterday by County Tax Collector A. J. Clark of the final check-up on poll taxes paid and exemption certificates granted. It will not require so many votes to win any election that might be held.

The total for Lubbock county shows exactly 5,211 qualified voters. Of these 4,131 represent poll taxes while there were 1,020 exemptions. Last year's voting list showed more than 7,200 voters in the county. This being an "off" year politically, the light payment for the privilege of voting is not unexpected, although some had thought agitation for road bond elections would have swelled this total to more than 6,000, at least.

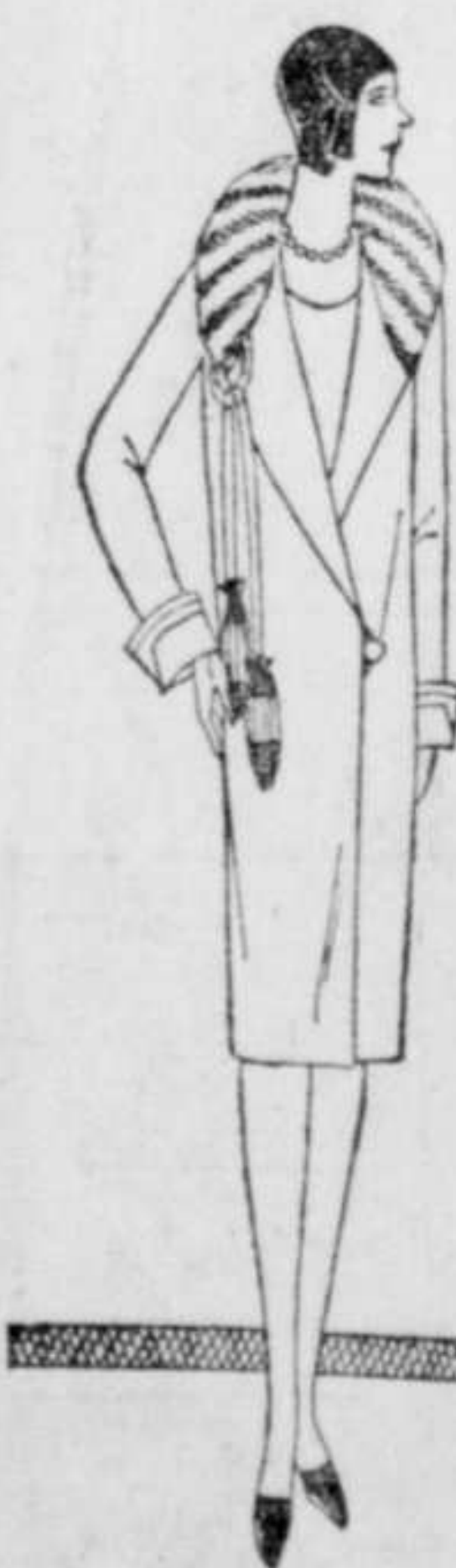

Maladors Again Bow To Butts, 51 To 22, In Final Game



THAT NEW RULE
The new football rule whereby fumbles are to be ruled dead at the point of recovery by the opposition has been received with open arms by leading football coaches and experts of the country. Introduced before the rules committee by the untimely Knute Rockne, the new ruling will eliminate all the heartache that comes to the stronger team who sees victory turned into defeat in the form of an opposing linesman scampering off toward his opponents goal line with the fumbled pigskin tucked under his wing. Those who favored the ruling pointed out that a fumble was usually the fault of one man and not an entire team and that the whole team should not be made to suffer.

Matty Bell, who goes to A. and M. next fall as director of athletics, says that the change will cause football teams to take more chances to advance the ball.

"It is a great change," Bell declared. "A team well drilled in fundamentals and offense was too greatly penalized by a fumble, when a member of a far weaker team could snatch the ball up and run 50 or 60 yards. Losing the ball is penalty enough."

"Now the well drilled teams will have some protection and I expect next fall will see many more backward and double passes."

Dana X. Bible, popular Southwestern Conference mentor, who leaves A. and M. to take over the coaching duties at Nebraska next fall, believes the latest change will make the football code as near perfect as possible. Bible is a member of the national rules committee.

"We have the game just as we want it," he said. "I do not believe that the code will have to be rewritten, and it is very likely to remain as a standard code for the future."

"I have heard some criticism concerning the fumble rule. There are some who believe we are taking something from the weak team. But as a general rule it is the weak team that will be guilty of more errors."

There are some critics who are strongly against the change, pointing out that the element of chance in football furnished the spectators with their main thrills and caused the crowds to stay until the last minute lest a touchdown resulting from a fumble be missed. But undoubtedly the new rule will tend to encourage a more open brand of football with additional chances and excitement.

THAT LONG COUNT

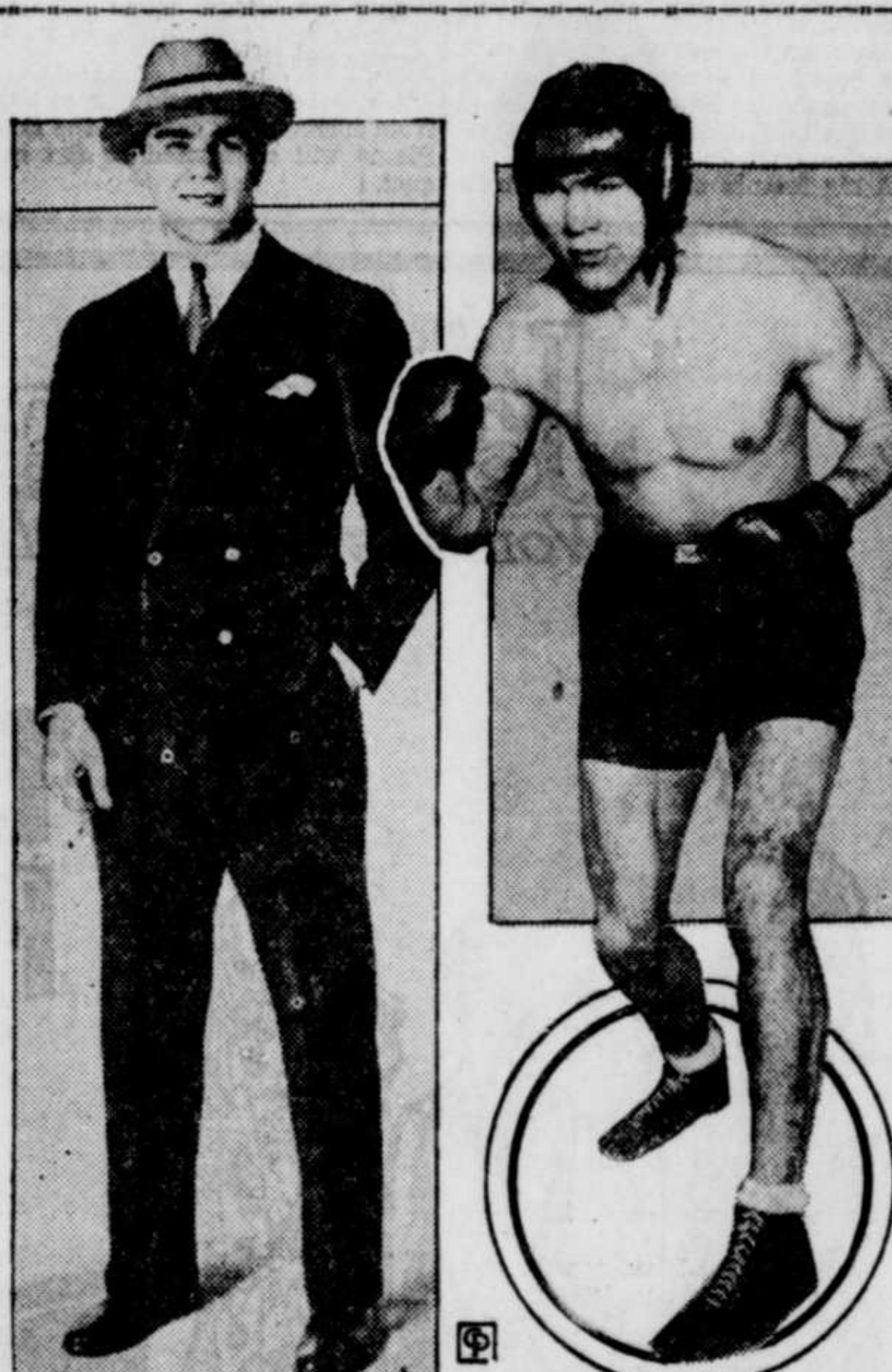

At Least Fifteen Teams Expected To Compete In Meet Here Today And Saturday

Final plans were made last night for the opening of the District Two basketball tournament this morning at the Tech gymnasium when the county cage champions gather here for the two day tournament. Although but ten of the eighteen counties in the district were heard from, district chairman E. Y. Freedland said last night that at least fifteen teams were expected.

Failure of the county athletic directors in sending in the entries prevented the previous arrangement of the schedule for the teams to follow. As a result the drawing cannot be held until all the teams arrive here today. The outstanding teams of the district are included in the list already in the hands of the chairman: Post, Garza county; Olton, Lamb county; Muleshoe, Bailey county; Dickens, Dickens county; Levelland, Hockley county; Slaton, Lubbock county; Ralls, Crosby county; Petersburg, Hale county; Wilcox, Lynn county; Lockney, Floyd county.

L. A. Eleven Wins Intramural Title

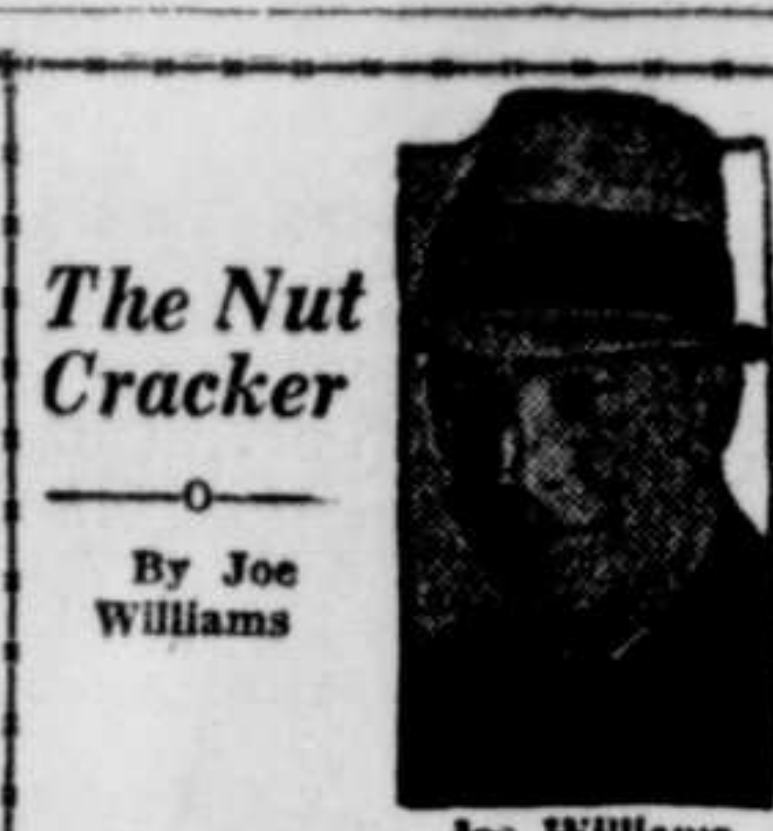

New Manager And Owners Cause Big Change In Players

Only Two Veterans Remain On Roster Of Revamped Texas League Entry; Will Have Strong Catching

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 20 (P)—San Antonio will give Texas League baseball fans a look at an entirely rebuilt team this summer.

With the change in the ownership and operation of the club after President Harry Ables resigned and sold his stock, and Secretary T. E. Connor, Jr., was made business manager and placed in charge of the entire organization, a new manager and new players in almost every position were inevitable. Frank Gibson, 1928 leader, was placed on the market, and will be sold within a short time, it is expected, to a major league club as a catcher and coach of pitchers. William Sanford (Billy) Alexander, who caught for San Antonio in the pennant-winning year of 1908—the last time flag has flown from the local ramparts—has been made manager and has selected an old mate, Pat Newman who played first base here the same year, as his assistant.

Shortstop Ray Flaskamper and third-baseman Dusty Dogges have been sold to Dallas, outfielder Leo Najo was traded to Omaha of the Western League for outfielder Frank (Dutch) Wetzel, and second baseman Johnny Chapman was traded to Beaumont for pitcher Gene Walker. Pitcher Newt Newman was brought back from Dallas to which club he had been exchanged in the 1928 mid-season for pitcher Dick Schuman, and now Walter has moved along to Beaumont, in company with another Bear veteran, Tink Riviere.

The only veterans on the Bear staff are Andy Messenger and Norman Glaser, besides a couple of youngsters who were with the club in the fall.

THE PRESS AND ITS CRITICS

Minnesota has a newly enacted law providing that newspapers may be suppressed for criticizing public officials, at the discretion of minor courts.

The law has caused consternation among the newspaper people of the country, who jealously guard the principle of a free press and apparently with cause for jealousy. Widespread criticism of the press of the country, with charges that it is "bought" and "controlled" by sinister interests, has been voiced by public men whose actions as servants of the people have been brought in question by the newspapers, and now that a state has enacted a law which makes it possible for an officer holder to bring about the suppression of a paper that criticizes his official acts it seems that the absolute limit has been reached.

The Minnesota law will probably be declared unconstitutional, since it clearly is in violation of the provision of the federal constitution which prohibits the abridgment of the freedom of speech or of the press. A free press is fundamentally necessary to the maintenance of a government of, for and by the people. Already the newspapers of the country are hemmed about with myriad court decisions which have been based upon conflicting state statutes so that the average editor never knows when he is lighting of some trivial misstatement or technical error that may creep into his columns; and these court decisions have so restricted the privileges of the press as to shut many public records in which the people are interested and which ought to be published in the interest of the people. But the press makes comparatively little complaint of these conditions because it is the purpose of the reputable newspaper to be constructive and not destructive, and reasonable restrictions designed to protect private individuals against damage through the publication of information about them are not objectionable. The newspaper does not want to injure anybody.

In a recent issue of Editor and Publisher, a newspaper trade magazine, there was an interesting article discussing the press and its critics, and it concluded with this pertinent paragraph:

"To sum up, there is more visible and audible dissatisfaction with the press now than ever, but the evidence shows that it springs from the same critical spirit which in like manner tests and doubts all other institutions of the day. And in estimating the comparative growth or decline of influence and power of the newspapers there must be set against this noisiness of hostility the great, silent and ever-growing number of readers and subscribers who by their support declare their confidence in the integrity and disinterestedness of the press."

Censorship of the press, the first step in the suppression of newspapers, is directly contrary to the spirit of the American public. We can not believe, therefore, that the Minnesota law will be given endorsement by any considerable portion of the people. There is little probability that other states will undertake similar legislation. Despite their critics, the newspapers are the people's friends, and are so recognized.

AN ADVERTISING TAX?

The legislature is to be asked to authorize municipalities to tax themselves for the purpose of advertising to the world the salubrity of their climate, the prosperity of their residents, and the attractiveness of their resources and so on. It is a good way to spend money. It is perfectly possible to reap benefits beyond the cost of obtaining them. And yet it seems a shame to put upon the legislature and the city authorities the legitimate problems of the chambers of commerce budget committees over the state.

We want farm relief and step over each other besieging lawmakers at Austin and Washington to get it. We want old age relief, automobile tax relief, railroad relief, traffic relief, divorce relief, juvenile relief, and so on and on. Relief is getting to be a talkman, sometimes justifiable and sometimes not. But more and more it means merely "Gimmie!" And when everybody says "Gimmie!" somebody has to pay.

The staff of the average chamber of commerce is an efficient institution. It works well and industriously and it is worthy of its hire. Why, then, take over its functions as an affair of government? Government nowadays takes our tots and records their births, cares for them in kindergarten, inspects their milk, examines their tonsils and teeth, tells them where they may cross the streets and when, prints pamphlets about the bugs that crawl on the grass in their back yards, tests the strength of the cloth that goes to make their bibs, sets down the formula for remedies prescribed for colic and hires old maids to write brochures on when it is best to spank them and when to change the linen on their beds. Some of this is well and good. Some of it is—well, not so good. But all of it taken together explains why it is confusing to say what is government and what is not. A fairly good rule however is that if the government can be persuaded to do it and the chamber of commerce can be relied upon to do the same thing it is far better to rely upon the chamber of commerce.

CONGRESSIONAL GENIE TO CONFRONT HOOVER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—The Arabian Nights fisherman who accommodated him to let the huge genie out of a bottle, only to have the brute threaten to kill him, out of pure meanness, was lucky in having an exceptionally benevolent genie to deal with. As all must recall he floundered the poor sap in to returning to his container, ostensibly to prove that a 50,000,000 gallon genie could deflate himself inside a one-quart receptacle, and then corked him up again until he had made terms to the fisherman's everlasting financial advantage. Fisherman Herbert Hoover has no assurance that the congressional genie will be so glib when he pulls the stopper and the genie comes bounding forth for his scheduled extra session beginning in April or thereabouts. From all indications he is liable to develop into a darned unmanageable genie.

Everybody knows what Mr. Hoover wants congress to do at the extra session—as follows:

1. Pass a farm relief bill.
2. Maybe increase the tariff somewhat—not to excess—for the benefit of a very, very few industries.
3. Adjourn and go home until next December.

The evidence is overwhelming that Mr. Hoover and his most trusted advisers have scrutinized every precedent in American history in the hope of hitting on some plan by which the president can end an extra session of congress when he would like to have it end.

Hardly necessary to say, none has been hit on. A special session of congress is the easiest thing in the world for a president to start. No power on earth can stop it—until it gets ready.

The next congress—the new one, which will assemble when Mr. Hoover issues, as he must, his call for it to meet in extra session—is a good deal of an enigma.

On paper Mr. Hoover will have nice majorities in both houses.

The hitherto recognized group of progressives will no longer hold the balance of power in the senate. No progressives lost their seats last November but so many Democrats were beaten by Republicans that the G. O. P. "regulars" unquestionably are on top if they stay "regular."

In the lower house the margin is ample.

However it all depends on Mr. Hoover's own policies.

Be it remembered, during the convention period his rivals complained bitterly that there was no knowing what party he really did belong to. During the campaign, as loyal Republicans, the hush, hush with equal vigor, but that did not mean that they had changed their minds any.

There are progressives, not of the "ultra" bloc, who believe Mr. Hoover is going to make a pretty liberal president. If he disappoints them, they may flop out of alignment with him.

Yet if he shows himself a bit too liberal there are apt to be ultra-conservatives who will flop out of alignment with him the other way.

The Smith Democrats and the Hoover-crats are also an uncertain element—two elements. At present they are viciously divided. Should they remain so it is hard to tell how they will assert themselves.

The genie is difficult to psycho-analyze. A dangerous genie for Fisherman Hoover to let out of his bottle.

Still he must do it. He may well worry about ways and means of getting him back inside the things. He doesn't want so rambunctious a genie loose all summer.

Your Health

THESE BOOKS ARE SAFE GUIDES TO HEALTH

EDITOR'S NOTE.—The seventh and last article of Dr. Fishbein's interesting series on "The Human Body and its Care" is presented here. The series in pamphlet form, can be obtained from The American Library Association, 86 East Randolph street, Chicago.

Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygeia, the Health Magazine
"The Human Body," by Logan Clendening, is a joyous presentation of things known and thus far believed about the human body.

The book is written with the historical approach. It presents an outline of physiology, makes clear the structure of the body, the mechanisms of the body, the stomach, the heart, the lungs and the circulation. Dr. Clendening shows how the human being with a proper appreciation of his body may derive from it a considerable amount of satisfaction, of comfort and of pleasure, and also how he may avoid much of the discomfort and disease that not infrequently assails him.

Concluding chapters concern analysis of these processes and of tissue repair. This book sparkles with epigram and humor. It concerns itself with scientific literature and with normal hygiene. Occasionally in striving for lightness of touch, the author attempts to startle the reader, the author takes a point of view with which scientists in general may not agree but on a whole the book is to be depended upon as a reasonably safe guide to knowledge of the human body.

Weighty Problems

In "Your Weight and How Control It," written by the writer of this article, are collected 18 essays on the factors governing weight written by specialists who have given special study to the various phases of the problem. The book does not give a certain weight for every person of a certain height, but takes into account individual differences of breadth and thickness along with age and height.

The right weight for an individual is that which permits him to enjoy perfect health. The last half of this book is written by Prof. Flora Rose and Mary Henry, who take up the general subject of nutrition, discuss the various food and energy requirements and provide a series of menus for the fat and the lean. The book attempts to be an absolutely rational presentation of the weight problem in the popular field.

Since Prof. Joseph Jastrow left the University of Wisconsin, where he was for more than 30 years professor of psychology, he has been devoting himself in large part to education of the public in psychology matters through syndicated newspaper articles. Because of his scientific background and of his years of experience and sound judgment, he is probably the most reliable of all the writers on psychology in the popular field.

Most of his book, "Keeping Mentally Fit," seems to have been made up from the collection of newspaper articles in organized form. Through this organization, and by means of a suitable index, the average reader will be able to find an answer to almost every psychology question that may disturb him. He will find the answer moreover in a sufficient form and in a manner of expression which makes it exceedingly readable.

WHAT ARE YOU WORTH?

It is not easy to determine the value of a man. Perhaps it is best to say that we are worth as much as we put into a "going concern"—as much spirit and sympathy and service.

KEEPING BOOKS

Pew men or women have a definite gift for figures, for financial accounts, for keeping books. Anyone can learn something about operating his own financial affairs competently. There is a satisfaction to be found in knowing where your income goes and why. It is worth while to keep books at least to the extent that you can determine whether you are actually spending more money than you take in. Many do that very thing. The writer knew of a man who was making sixty dollars a week and had signed agreements to buy so many things on the installment plan that he required seventy-two dollars a week for the outlay. A little simple bookkeeping would have been some help to this man. On a larger or smaller scale many people are nearly as foolish as this man was.

INSTALLMENTS

No doubt but what installment buying has been a great boon to the American people. It has helped thousands to have comforts and luxuries they could not otherwise have had. There is only one small but important point to keep in mind when you are about to put your name on the dotted line. Be quite sure you have a fair chance to have the money for the installment at the end of the month.

Your Income Tax

The cost of capital assets, less adjustment for depreciation and salvage, may be deducted from gross income if their usefulness suddenly is terminated and they are disposed of. For example, a manufacturer may be compelled to scrap machinery because it has become inadequate or obsolete. He may deduct the loss sustained, if he has sold, abandoned, or otherwise permanently parted with the machinery. Such loss must be charged off on the books of the taxpayer and fully explained in his income-tax return.

If a taxpayer demolishes a building used in his trade or business and replaces it he may deduct the loss sustained, but if he buys, as the site of a new building, land upon which is located an old building, demolition of the old building is not considered a loss and therefore is not deductible. The value of real estate, exclusive of the old improvements, is presumed to be equal to the purchase price of the land and building, plus the cost of removing the useless building.

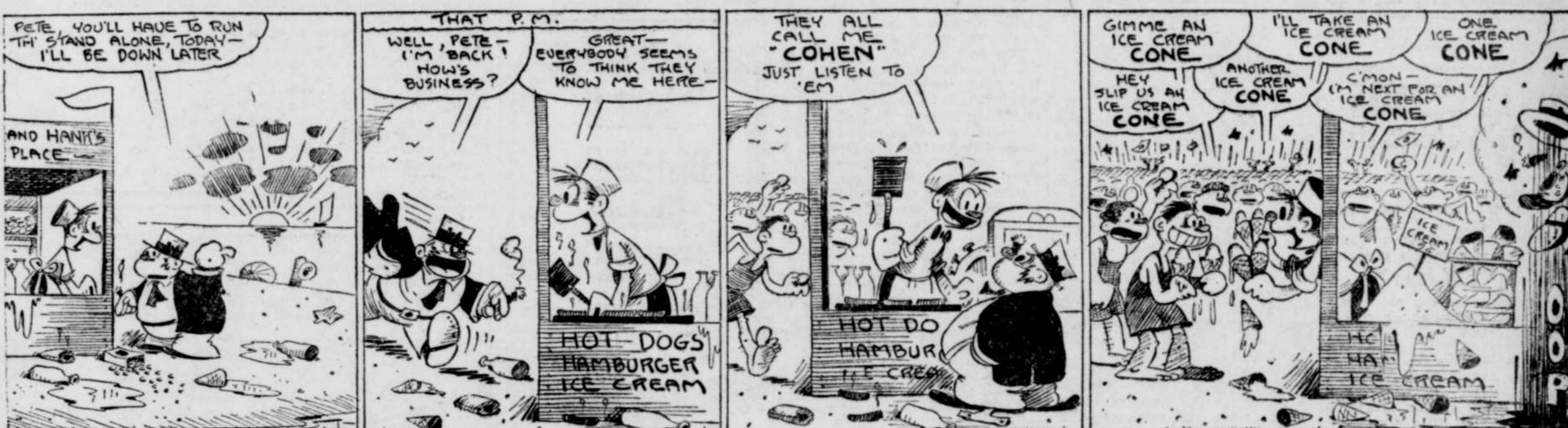

NEW YORK, Feb. 21. (AP)—The stock market finished the four-day week with an unexpected burst of strength today, sending scurrying to cover the bears who had sold short in expectation of heavy pre-holiday liquidations.

Pools brought forward the steel issues as market leaders, taking advantage of the highly favorable weekly steel trade reviews. Confidence was strengthened by an extreme gain of nearly 6 points in U. S. Steel, which carried it to 182 1/4 a new high for the movement, and about 10 points under its record peak.

The market was irregular during the morning, as traders feared the banks might call loans freely to meet holiday and week end requirements, and there was some uneasiness over this afternoon's federal reserve directors meeting. In the afternoon, when it became apparent that call money would hold at the renewal rate of 6 1/2 per cent, and the opinion gained headway that the reserve directors would make no change in the rediscount rate, bulls met little opposition.

The federal reserve brokers loan compilation, published after the close, showed a reduction of \$91,000,000, which was regarded as cheerily large, in view of the considerable volume of new financing. This reduction follows a drop of \$101,000,000 last week, and brings the total down to \$5,477,000,000 in contrast to the high record of \$5,669,000,000 on February 6. The total however, is about \$1,750,000,000 above the volume of federal reserve brokers loans as of February 21, 1928. Wall Street understands that the federal reserve authorities feel that the loan total should be reduced to near \$5,000,000,000 before the credit structure can be regarded without misgivings.

MID-WESTERN LIVESTOCK
KANSAS CITY, Feb. 21. (AP)—(U. S. D. A.)—Further curtailment of sheep receipts prompted an uneven advance in fat lamb prices around the 11-market circuit of 10@40c. Aged stock, however, ruled steady to weak. Chicago, on the close, scored \$17.35 on 1 load of choice lambs. Total offerings were around 30,000 short of 16,000 from a week ago and 10,500 less than the corresponding day last year.

Hogs were on a steady to 15c higher basis, with packers showing considerable interest at the advance. Chicago had a top of \$10.75. The supply approximated 107,000 as compared with 146,903 a week ago and 153,972 a year ago.

Cattle trade around the loop was marked by considerable unevenness. In Chicago a few loads of choice weighty steers and good to choice yearlings held steady, but the general fed steer trade was slow at 25 @50c lower prices. The week's sharp upturn, however, was generally maintained at other points. Demand at eastern dressed beef markets showed improvement with a moderate upturn in prices. A good demand for dressed beefs at the end of the week is usually an indication of a satisfactory live cattle trade the following week unless the run is exceptional. Aggregate receipts were estimated at 22,500 about the same as last Thursday and 2,000 less than a year ago.

Cattle Supply Is Light In Ft. Worth

FORT WORTH, Feb. 21. (AP)—The supply of cattle and calves here today was light as compared with last week or for the corresponding week in 1928. Other classes of livestock presented a seasonable supply. About a fourth of the hog receipts on direct billing to local packers.

Trading limited mostly to mixed loads of cattle of rather common quality. A few good loads of steers and yearlings being the exception. While trading was generally slow in the cattle yards during the morning session, values were about steady.

The receipts included about half a dozen cars of steers of good quality and finish, some of them were late in arriving and no sales reported during the morning session. Except for packers no trading in bulls. They sold fully steady and to a fair demand. The better heavy bulls sold around 8.00 and the common light bulls around 6.50.

The supply of cows was light, but all classes went to the scales at unchanged values. Bulk of the canners and cutters sold at 5.00 to 6.00 and the butcher and beef cows at 6.50 to 7.50 in carlots while packers sold up to 9.25.

A few cars of slaughter heifers sold fairly early at steady prices. The sales were at 10.25 to 10.75. Some of the best slaughter yearling steers unsold at the noon hour and due to sell around 11.50.

The light offering of calves sold at unchanged prices with a car up to 11.00. Bulk of the common calves sold around 7.00.

A load of stocker steer calves sold at 12.00 and some steers at 10.00. Not enough morning trading in the sheep division to test the market. The supply was very light.

Hogs mostly 10c higher, rail top 10.20 and truck top 9.90. Packing sows mostly a quarter higher, bulk sales at 8.50@9.00.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21. (AP)—There was more business in cotton market today but it consisted chiefly of switching from March to later deliveries and had little effect on prices. May contracts ranged from 20.05 down to 20.00 and closed at 20.03. The general market closed steady at a net decline of 1 to 7 points.

The market opened steady at a decline of 3 points to an advance of 2 points. There was a little selling of near months on the relatively easy showing of Liverpool. Later deliveries were relatively steady on reports of unfavorable weather for preliminary farm work in the south.

Prices on old crop positions steadied up slightly after the initial offerings had been taken. There may have been a little trade buying as well as covering for over the holiday. Rallies to about or a shade above yesterday's closing quotations were checked by near liquidation, however, and the market eased off again.

March sold down from 19.93 to 19.92 and the new October contract from 19.56 to about 19.48. The market then steadied on covering.

Private cables said there had been continued liquidation of March in Liverpool, absorbed by trade calling. They also reported there was rather a better demand for cotton goods from the home trade.

Port receipts today, 8,378. U. S. port stocks, 2,095,663. Exports today, 35,296 making, 6,134,033 this season.

Next Tuesday will be the first notice day for March contracts and it is believed that there has been a very considerable reduction in the March interest in the past several days.

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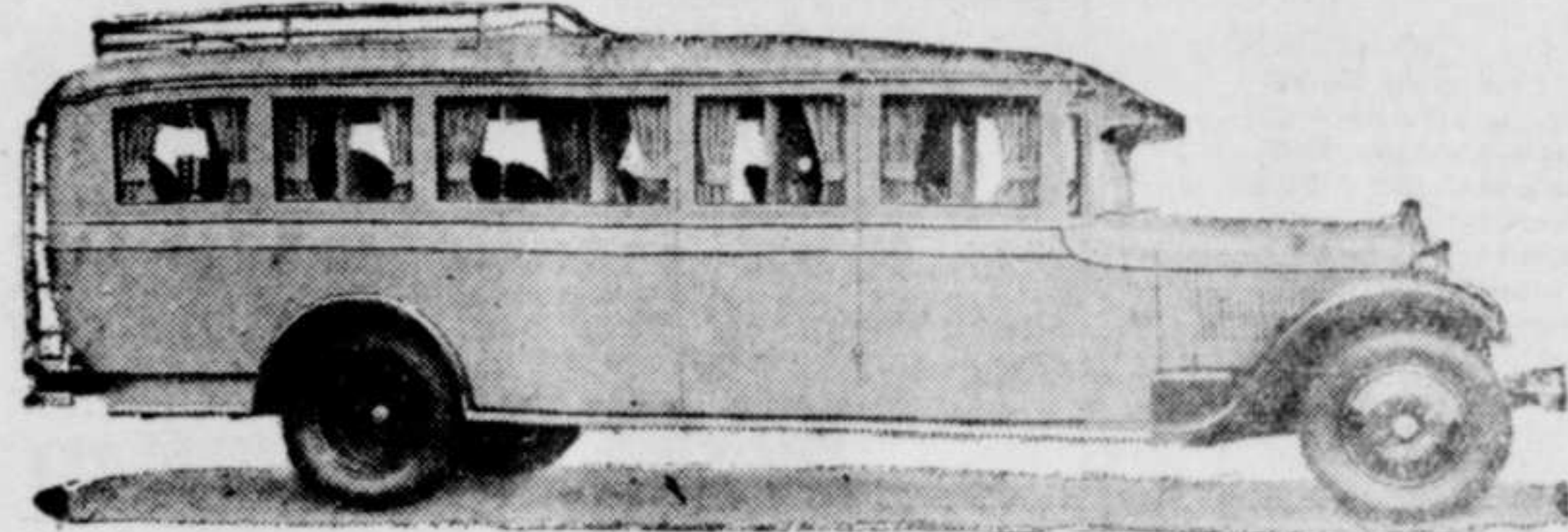

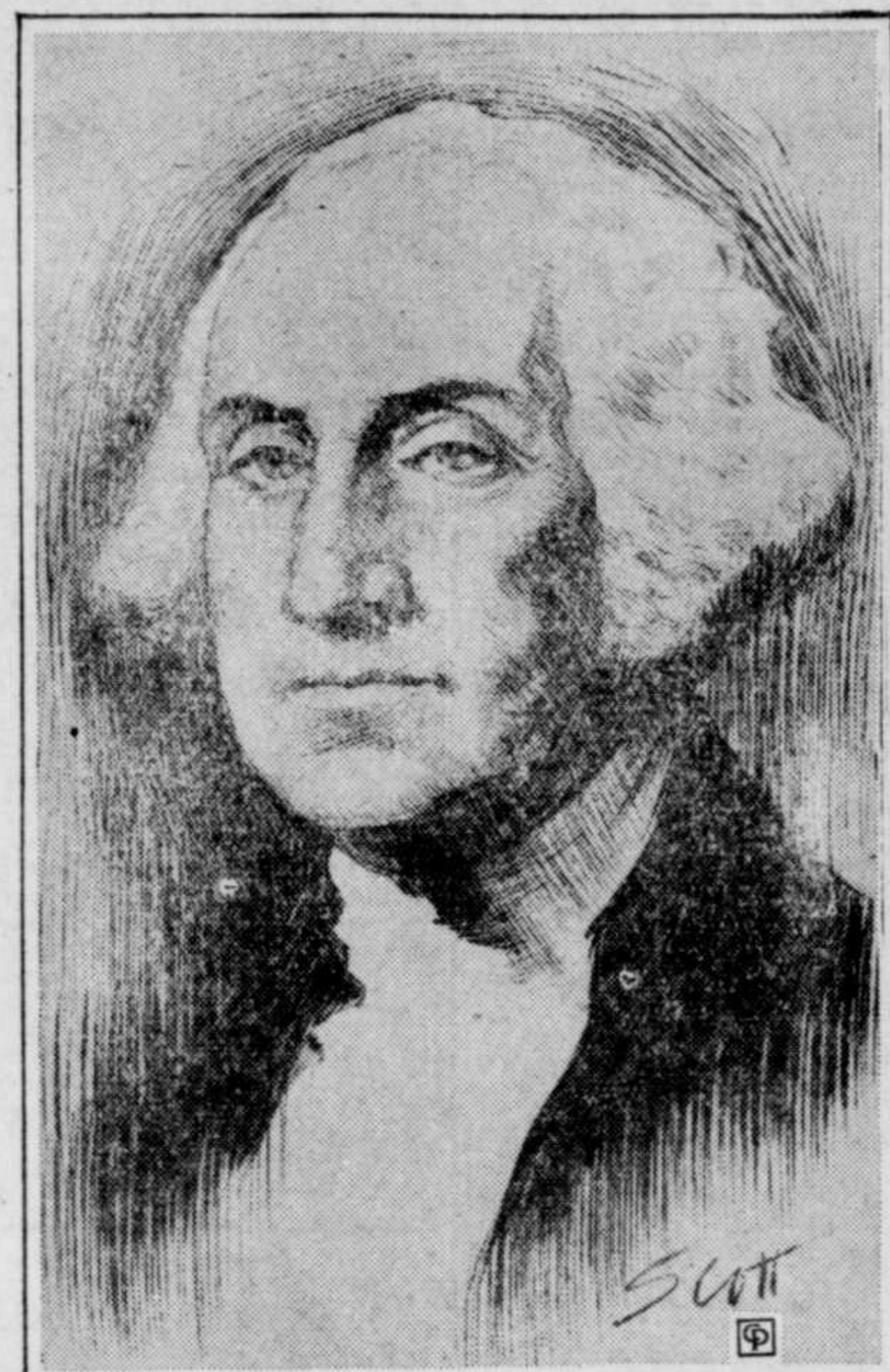

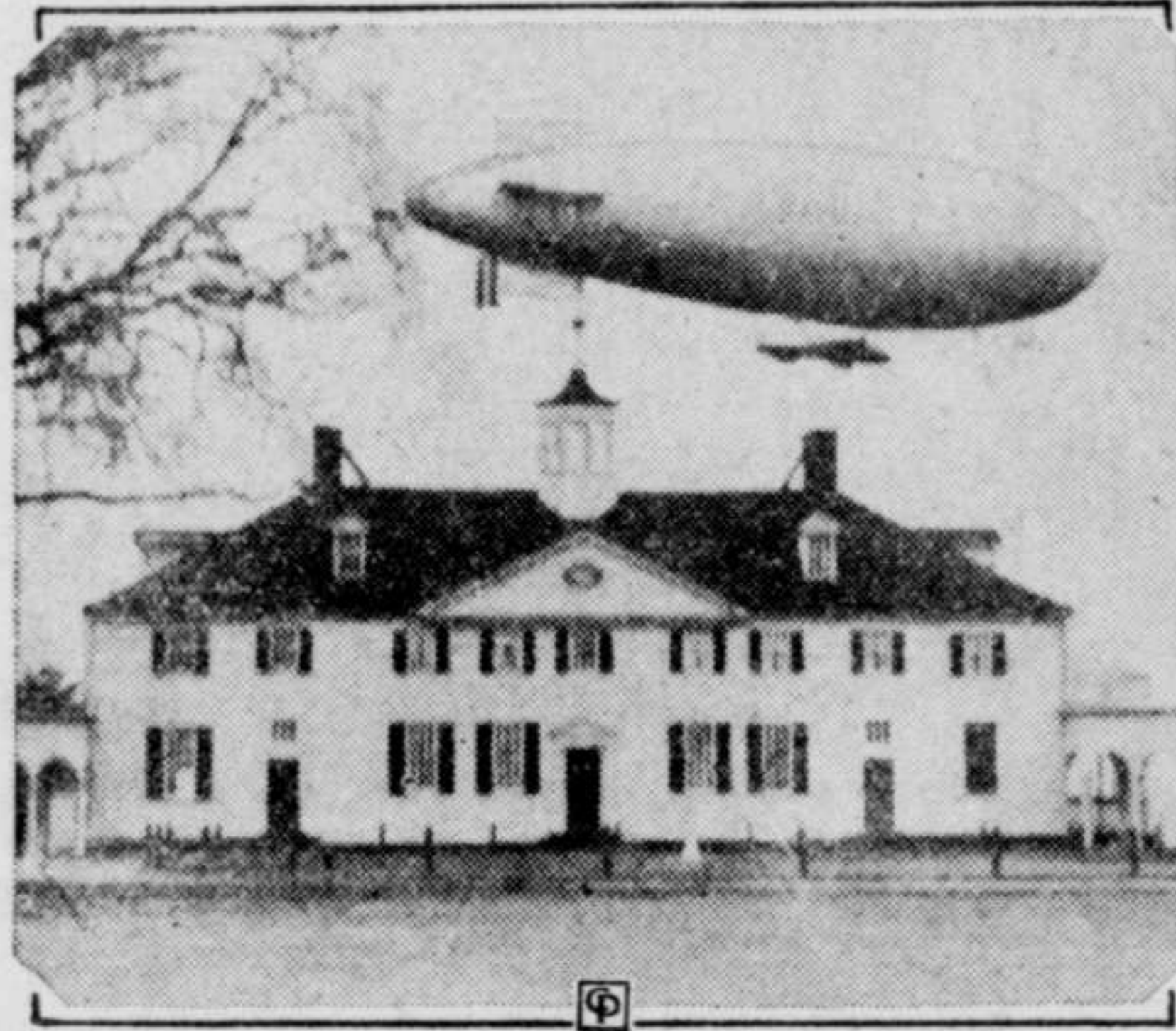

But the three trail blazers succeeded, and by opening a market for cattle they saved Texas from the financial blight which afflicted other states which had seceded from the union in the civil war.

Loving, a relative of Goodnight's, was slain by Indians on one of the cattle drives.
