Census Begins In County

Workers for the U.S. Census Bureau will begin compiling house-by-house address lists within the next few days in Red River County.

Census workers will be walking or driving on streets and roads in the county to prepare the address lists. They will be knocking on doors and asking householders for a correct mailing address.

Ms. Epperson, census office manager, said residents can identify the census employees by a red, white, and blue census identification card which all will carry. Census workers also will carry 11 x 16 books, or address registers, in which the addresses are written.

These address lists will play a vital role in the nationwide 1980 census. They will be used to produce mailing labels for the census questionnaires. Census Day is April 1, 1980.

Smith said had sufficient names to force the council to call a local option election. Smith did not present the petition to the council at the meeting, however, saying

that he wanted to continue to add names to the petition in the event that some of the signers did not qualify under the election laws. Smith said in a telephone

interview Wednesday morning that he thought legalized sales would be an asset to the city in terms of added tax revenues, and would relieve the tax burden

on Bogata residents who are on fixed incomes. Smith said that he had more than 100 signatures on the petition at this time. The council took the

position that it would not endorse the proposal, but if the election was called and passed, it would look into the possibility of a city license or franchise to the operator of the business, so that the city would have some control over the operation.

In other council business, the cost of trash disposal was discussed. It is now costing \$60 per week.

Also, a request has been made to TP&L for authority to lease and fence the area of TP&L property in Bogata for a place to park the trash receptacles.

A resolution was approved to purchase a 5280 square foot lot from Mrs. Cleone Sullivan for \$500. The lot joins the Bogata water tank lot on the north. It will be used to enlarge the existing storage yard.

Homeowners Are Eligible For

Exemption

All people owning their own homes and living in them are eligible for the new residential homestead tax exemption provided by the state legislature as part of the tax relief measure voted on last November.

The Talco-Bogata Consolidated Independent School District Tax Office mailed approximately 1200 affidavits to people of the school district the latter part of February. Filling out these forms and filing them with the tax assessor will make a substantial reduction in your taxes for 1979. To date approximately half of the forms have been returned.

The deadline for applying for this exemption is April 30.

Aging Committee

Compiles Directory

The Red River County Committee on Aging (a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service) is compiling a directory of skill that retired persons have to offer. For example: carpentry, sewing, plumbing, baby sitting, baking, etc. These will be put together into a directory for public use. Prices of the service will be negotiated between the buyer and the seller.

If you have a service to sell, you are asked to send your name, address, telephone number and available services to the County Agent's Office, Box 709, Clarksville, or give to Mrs. F.P. Brumley in Bogata.

The purpose of this is to give retired persons a chance to earn extra money, which will not effect Social Security, and to help persons who have odd jobs to be done to get in touch with someone who would like the chance to do them.

Hervey Elected Bogata Principal At Meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Monday, April 9 at 7:00 p.m. The board normally meets on the first Tuesday of each month but had delayed the regular meeting for April so that the results of the April 7 trustee election could be studied and approved.

In major action taken by the Board, Buford Hervey was elected as elementary and junior high principal of the Bogata School effective as of August 1, 1979. Hervey has been principal of the Sabine High School for the past six years and has also served as high school principal with the Hull-Daisetta and Channelview School Districts. He is 43 years of age and was reared in the Joliet Community and graduated from Bogata High School. Hervey and his wife, Gale, have two children, a son who will be a freshman at Rivercrest and a married daughter. Mrs. Hervey will also teach in the school district.

The returns of the April 7 trustee election were canvassed and the results were approved. After approval of the results, the oath of office was administered to the newly elected members: Kenneth Jeffery and John M. Ward of Bogata and Gene Smith of Talco. Jeffery and Smith were elected to three year terms and Ward was elected to the one-year term. In the election of Board officers, John Ward was elected as president, Gene Smith as vice-president and A.D. Stephenson as secretary of the Board.

In other action related to personnel, members of the auxiliary staff which includes secretaries, aides, cafeteria workers, bus drivers, and janitors were approved for employment by the Board according to recommendations made by their immediate supervisors.

Jimmy Haynes, Jim Pirtle and Jack Franklin were approved as members of the Board of Equalization for the school district. An insurance claim in the amount of \$6,737.68 was approved for damages to the Talco School boiler which occurred some months ago due to a malfunction. Also, the Board approved the purchase of a new 53 passenger school bus for delivery during the 1979-80 school year.

Due to a recent statement by the Texas Education Agency, a revision has been

made in the procedures for election of high school cheerleaders at Rivercrest. The Agency has stated that such procedures being used at Rivercrest whereby at least one black contestant would be guaranteed to be elected as a cheerleader are not within Texas Education guidelines and that there should be no categorization of race in the selection process. Therefore, in an effort for the Talco-Bogata Schools to be in compliance with the guidelines of the Agency, any mention of race has been taken out of the procedures. Since cheerleaders are selected by a combination of popular vote by the student body and a panel of outside impartial judges, the Board did specify that an effort be made to have at least one of the outside judges to be a black.

Approval was given by the Board to set a set of guidelines for use of the Eunice V. Pirtle Baseball Park located at Joliet and also authorized that the

officers of each of the three baseball fields located at Bogata, Talco and Joliet be in charge of scheduling and decision making related to use of the fields.

Tillman Hale, Rivercrest principal, discussed in detail some of the plans and work that had been done on the 1979-80 student schedule and also talked about some of the problems and conflicts encountered in working out a master schedule. The feeling was stated that there could be more continuity to the program and a better utilization of faculty members by eliminating or phasing out some of the electives. Board approval was given to these plans in

In other and final action, the Board set 7:30 p.m. as the starting time of meetings during daylight saving time, approved the various financial reports, and discussed procedures for approving payroll checks now that these are being done by data processing.

Shadowland Destroyed By Fire

Shadowland, a stately and historic two-story manor located east of Deport on FM 1149, was destroyed by fire at 12:30 a.m. Tuesday morning. The house was built in 1919

and 1920 by John G. Wright, Sr., and was the property of his daughter, Estelle W. Montjoy. Wright hired the artisans who rebuilt Paris after the Paris fire of 1916,

and their European influence was evident in the architecture of the house.

The Wrights lived in Paris and used Shadowland as a summer home. The house

had four bedrooms, a formal living room, formal dining room, sun porch, and a large fireplace in the living room. Smaller fireplaces warmed the upstairs.

The walls were of cross box construction using 1x12 planks and 2x4's on 24" centers. It was one of the few homes of the time with a concrete poured storm cellar, a favorite playground of the Wright children.

A Delco pumping system placed water in an overhead storage tank which gave water pressure to the house, and a central elevator, used primarily to lift firewood to the upstairs rooms, was another feature.

Deport attorney John G. Wright lived in the house in 1949, and at that time the house was fitted with gas lights.

Deport Fire Chief Duane Glover said that the fire started on the left side of the front door at the south part of the house. The house had been unoccupied for six months and there was no electricity to the house nor butane tank on the property, according to Glover. The building to the west, a three car garage and an old harness shop were not destroyed.

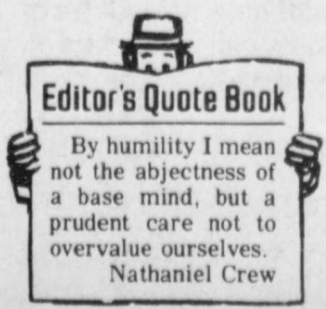
The awards were based on entries from the Spring and Fall of 1978, Cameron said. Lisa Johnson, PJC sophomore from Blossom

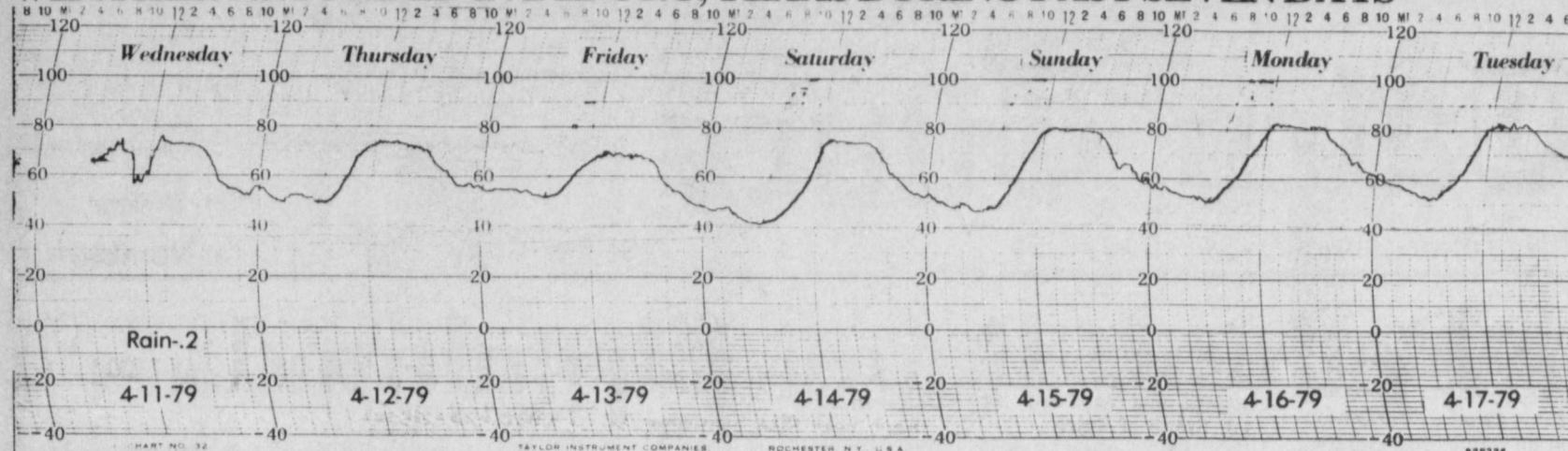

Let's Manage Our Dollars

Nine "safe home" precautions can make vacationing less worrisome. The following guidelines will help make a home as safe as possible:

-Ask a neighbor or apartment manager to watch your home while you're away.

-Tell police if you plan to be away several weeks.

-Some police departments will patrol homes for vacationers. Tell the police who you expect to be in your home during the vacation, and give them departure and return dates.

-Leave several low-wattage lights on, or connect them to a timer so they are only on for the evening hours. Also, a radio that's on can be a deterrent.

-Stop delivery on mail and newspapers.

-Arrange to have the lawn mowed—if the vacation is longer than a week.

-Check locks on all outside doors and replace unsafe ones with a dead bolt lock. Ask a locksmith for specific information.

-Be careful about telling strangers or casual acquaintances that you'll be away.

-Inventory your possessions and have all household valuables engraved with your social security or driver's license number. Ask the police about borrowing an engraver.

-Consider installing a burglar alarm system.

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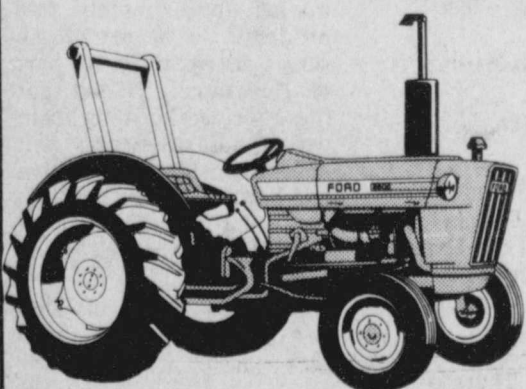

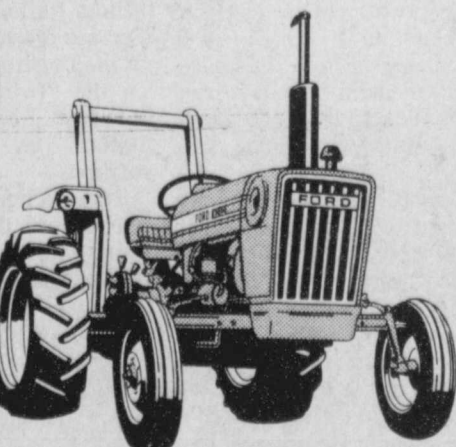
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Mrs. Fortner Presents Program For FHA

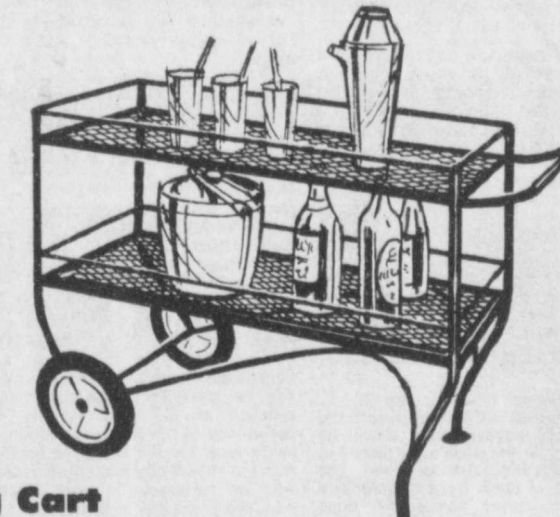

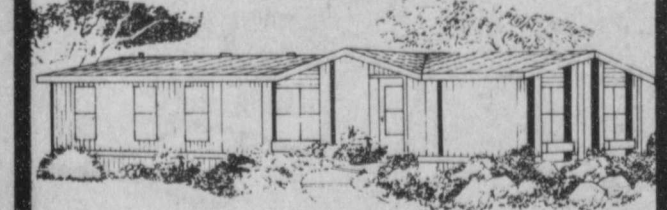

Better Fishing Is Ahead

Fishing will improve in many Red River County ponds this year.

Over 10,000 channel catfish and 92 pounds of minnows were delivered to some 40 landowners on April 3. The delivery was arranged by the Red River Co. Soil & Water Conservation District. This is one of the many services provided landowners by the local district.

Arrangements are made by individuals placing orders with the district for fish desired for their pond. At this time, recommendations are made on stocking rates, feeding and other fishpond management techniques. After several orders are received, the district makes arrangements for delivery at no cost to landowners. Two sizes of catfish were received 4-6 inch at 15 cents each and 10-12 inch at 35 cents each. The fathead minnows cost \$4.25 per pound and are placed in the pond for forage fish. The fathead minnows are much better than golden shiners and many other species for forage. They are not as fast and don't get too large for catfish or bass to eat. The recent delivery cost landowners \$2,100.00.

The local district started the fishpond stocking program to fill a need to landowners. The need developed when the federal hatchery ahead to stop fur-

nishing fish for private waters. Also, the state hatchery cut back on their program and are now charging for stocking fish.

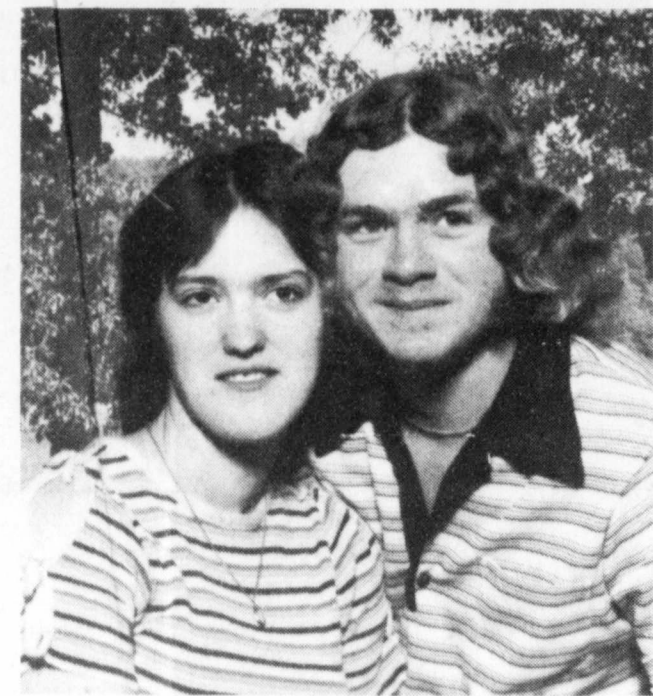

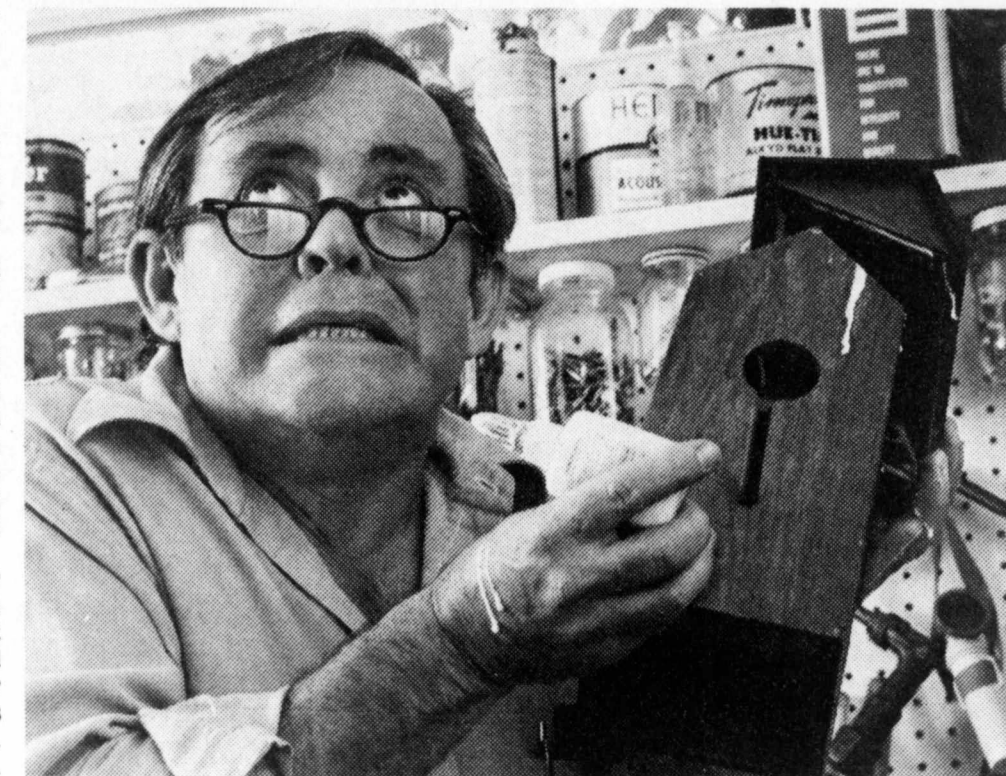

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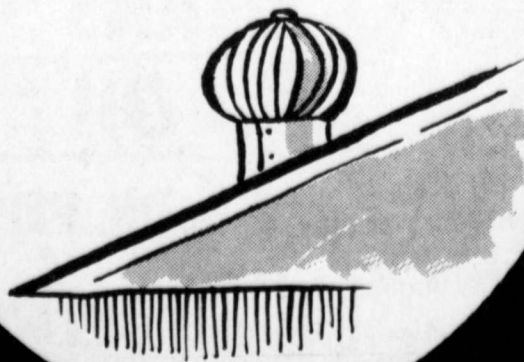


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Listening At The Library
