MENARD CATTLEMAN TAKES NEW DUTIES

Ft. Worth, Feb. 5.—Leo Callan, new chairman of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Texas, has arrived in Ft. Worth and has taken over the direction of the commission's activities from the retiring chairman, J. E. BoogScott. Mr. Callan is to move here from his former home in San Antonio.

Cesar Kleberg of Kingsville and Dr. E. F. Jarrell of Tyler, members of the commission with Mr. Callan, have been in Fort Worth since Monday.

Conferences have been held daily among members of the commission, the retiring chairman and Dr. L. J. Allen, chief inspector for Texas of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry. No announcement as to the future policies of the commission have yet been made by Mr. Callan.

THE ORIGIN OF ST. VALENTINE'S DAY

Where did St. Valentine's Day get its name?

Did old St. Valentine himself use to slip around in the dark hours of the night and slide pretty bits of pasteboard or tin-sweet paper under the doorways of sweet young ladies?

He did not. As a matter of fact, if St. Valentine were to come to life today and see the pervasiveness of the popular custom that is practiced on the day that is named after him, he would be the most surprised Christian martyr that ever met an untimely death.

It was pure coincidence that gave St. Valentine's Day its name.

In the medieval church, February 14th was the feast day set aside to the memory of St. Valentine who is popularly supposed to have been beheaded by the Romans in 306 B. C. because of his profession of the Christian faith.

But there was another festival occasion which also fell on Feb. 14. It was believed in England and France, during the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries, that half way through the second month of the year, the birds began to pair. Hence, this day was looked upon as a day specially consecrated to lovers and a proper occasion for the writing of love letters and the sending of lovers' tokens.

At first there was no point in common in the observance of these two days. St. Valentine's Day was celebrated with a religious motif, while the love motif predominated the festival of the opening of the mating season.

As time went on, however, the overlapping of the two festival days caused confusion. St. Valentine's Day, as a religious holiday, gradually passed into the discard. But the lovers' festival day kept going strong. This latter holiday had no definite name. What was more natural than that it should gradually come to be called St. Valentine's Day after the real St. Valentine's Day came to be forgotten?

This is the real history of the name of the festival of St. Valentine's Day it is, and St. Valentine's Day it will always be in spite of the fact that Valentine, the saint, was entirely disassociated with the observance of the festival as it is celebrated in this day and time. The simple fact that the two holidays fell together on Feb. 14 is the explanation of it all.—Gene Wallis, in the Dallas News.

DISTRICT COURT ADJOURNS TUESDAY

With all cases disposed of on Monday of this week only a few routine details were attended to by the court Tuesday morning before adjourning for the February term, after practically clearing the docket, which was the lightest in several years.

While more than fifty civil cases were on the docket at the beginning of the first week, there were no contested cases and after continuing a number of these cases the court was able to dispose of about thirty very rapidly.

Only one criminal case was tried. In this case Shorty Fambrough was charged with driving a car while intoxicated. He had been indicted by the grand jury the week before. The jury returned a verdict of guilty and assessed his punishment at thirty days confinement in the county jail.

Three other cases were continued to the September term. The grand jury adjourned last Friday, after returning four bills. Arrests have been made in two of the cases so far.

RIECK'S GOAT COATS FINDING BIG DEMAND

LAW-ABIDING PRINTERS.

The fact that there isn't a printer in a Texas penitentiary causes commendation of that law-abiding craft from Brice Collins. Writing in the McKinney Courier-Gazette he says:

I do not believe that more than half a dozen printers have been sent to the Texas state prison for the commission of serious crimes in the last forty years. I challenge any man of my vocation, including the ministry, to name any class that can show a record for law-obedience comparable with that of the union or non-union printers of Texas. No matter, reader, who you are, you know very little about the average printer. As a rule, they herd together. He may not be always arrayed in fine raiment or personally pulchritudinous, but don't be deceived—the unostentatious "comp" has learned a lot as a looker on in Vienna. If it was not for him neither you or anyone else would know how to read a newspaper, magazine or book, if you had one, which you would not. You owe more to the printer than any man on earth. Broad assertion that, but I can prove it.

The one dissipation of the ancient printer was that he would get on sprees. He was too much of a philosopher to get fighting drunk, but frequently he was humorously drunk. Setting type, a type at a time, he unconsciously memorized many of the things he set, and the droll, the tragic and the informative came back to him most accurately of all when he was a bit "stewed." The Linotype has succeeded his place. A Linotype operator sets columns where the hand compositor set sticks. He goes too fast to get much out of what he sets up as a rule, but he too is a law-abiding citizen as a rule.

There is but one newspaper man in the Texas penitentiary—he may have been released or served his time out by now. And that speaks well for the law-abidingness of the whole newspaper bunch. They write of crimes and criminals and set crime stories they get first hand information of criminals and must come to see the foolishness of crime as a means of livelihood or as a diversion. And therein may be the reason for the scarcity of printers and editors in not only Texas penitentiary, but all prisons.—Denton Record-Chronicle.

WHITEWASH FORMULA GIVEN BY GRIFFIN CAN BE MADE AT HOME

Several written, telephone and oral requests have been received by O. P. Griffin, county agricultural agent, for a good formula for the preparation of whitewash, and Mr. Griffin gives the following formula as adopted by the government for general use:

No. 1.—One bushel of lime, twelve gallons of hot water.

No. 2.—Three pounds of salt, two pounds of zinc sulphate and six gallons of boiling water. Then mix the two liquids and add two gallons of milk. You will then have twenty gallons of whitewash.

Where a smaller quantity of the wash is needed use a proportionately smaller quantity of each ingredient.

This may be used in whitewashing chicken houses and other outhouses but for the purpose of whitewashing trees it is best to add a quart of crude carboric acid. The acid will kill all germs and insects that the lime in the mixture fails to destroy. —Brownwood Bulletin.

DELECTABLE DISHES

Delicious dishes of all kinds may be prepared in the winter, even when the fresh things are not in market. A delightful salad is the following which can be served at any season:



Fig and Cheese Salad.—Mix to a paste any cream cheese, or cottage cheese, using one cupful of dried figs, one-half cupful of roasted almonds, chopped, and two tablespoonfuls of orange juice. Mix and mold into balls and roll the balls in the chopped almonds. Place four or five of the balls on a bed of lettuce, garnish with sections of orange and serve with:

Honey Dressing.—Take one-half cupful of strained honey; beat slowly into three well-beaten egg yolks. Place in a double boiler and stir over the heat until the mixture begins to thicken. Remove from the heat and beat until cool. Add salt and cayenne, a tablespoonful of lemon juice, and just before serving fold in a cupful of whipped cream.

Orange Shortcake.—For dessert, when it is hard to find something appetizing, prepare a rich biscuit dough and bake it in large-sized biscuits. Split them and butter well, making a small shortcake, using oranges that have been peeled, cut into small pieces, sprinkled with sugar and allowed to stand to season for an hour or two. Heap the fruit with plenty of juice on each layer and serve it hot.

Graham Pudding.—Take one-fourth of a cupful of butter, add one-half cupful of molasses, one-half teaspoonful of soda, one egg, one-half cupful of sour milk, one and one-half cupfuls of graham flour, one cupful of raisins, and spices to taste. Mix well and steam four hours. Serve with an Egg Sauce.—Beat the white of an egg stiff; add one cupful of sugar to the beaten yolk, a pinch of salt, vanilla and one-half cupful of boiling milk, then stir in the egg white and serve at once.

Prunes, figs, as well as dates, may be stuffed with nuts, fondant or a cream cheese. Served as dessert they are wholesome, easy to prepare and especially good for children.

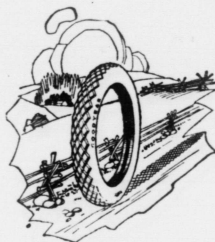

OLD GRANARY BURYING GROUND

Within the confines of the older (eastern) states of this Union there are many ancient, quaint, and hallowed burying grounds, most of which closely surround or adjoin a much-loved chapel or meeting house. Among the most interesting of these is that precious plot of ground known as Old Granary Burying Ground, near the present business center in the city of Boston.

The town granary once stood on this site—hence this peculiar name. The burying ground was established about the year 1640.

Within this well-kept enclosure which is surrounded by an imposing protective fence, lie the remains of three signers of the Declaration of Independence, nine governors, Peter Panell, that public-spirited individual who presented the city the famous hall which bears his name; Paul Revere, that patriot who, on April 18, 1775, warned his country of the marching of the British troops towards Lexington and Concord, and other notables of their time.

Probably the most conspicuous headstone that graces the shaded covering of the departed is that erected by Benjamin Franklin, the most important literary man of his day, in loving tribute to the memory of his father, Josiah, and his mother, Abigail.

An outstanding feature of the plot are a number of almost century-old elm trees which cast their shadows over the resting place.

The graves of many of the stones which mark these ancient graves are weathered, broken and peculiar in the shape of preceding custom. An unusual one reads:

Here lies the body of John Downing, aged about 52 years, died April 19, 1804.

I began with chest for room below. He craves a mansion in his upper store. Thus rest given more than we do ask or know.

Instead of grace uninterrupted glorie.

Another:

Here lies interred the body of Mr. Thomas Crawford, who departed this life.

Aug. 23, 1773, Aged 56.

Stop here my friend and cast an eye.

As you are now, so once was I;

As I am now, so you must be.

Prepare for death and follow me.

A good name is better than precious ointment.

another on the famous Panhandle. The two articles have an interesting affiliation.

Improved highways have, so to speak, opened the doors to the Panhandle. When men could travel only on horseback or in covered wagons, when even railroads were few and far between, the great Plains country, the great Western and Northern portions of the state could not be exploited and developed. Consequently that animal known as the range cow earned a livelihood for nearly all Westerners.

The possibilities in gas, oil, agriculture and manufacturing were there always, but the country was too inaccessible to attract business men or to make local promotion profitable.

But more railroads were built, highways were constructed, machinery was imported, scientific farming was introduced. The range cow is being relegated to the background; the "big open spaces" of Western Texas won't be so big and open in a few years more. The Texas West is becoming a good place to live. —Texas Commercial News.

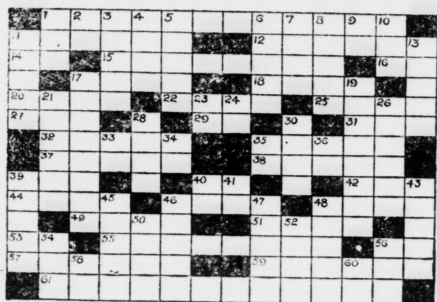

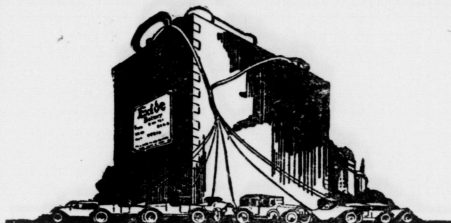

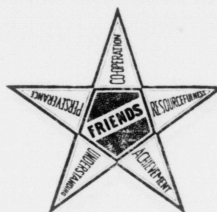
