Democrats Speculate-- Republican Close Ranks

Democrats Wonder About 1956 Slate

AP State Capital Correspondent
Speculation about the Democrats' 1956 slate, with some emphasis on lieutenant governor, boiled today after the party's well-attended and enthusiastic \$15-a-plate dinner in Albuquerque last night.
More than 750 persons, probably a record for a function of this sort, heard National Democratic chairman Paul Butler assail the republican national administration for "misconduct" in government. He pleaded for unity in behalf of a Democratic victory next year.
The meeting was alive with rumors typical of such a gathering. One of the most interesting linked the name of State Rep. Jack Campbell of Roswell with the race for Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor.
Campbell, who incidentally did a masterful job as master of ceremonies at the dinner, did not attempt to deny that such a possibility had been talked. But he was emphatic in indicating that he was not interested.
"I don't even know if I'm going to seek re-election" (to the house), he said.
The incumbent lieutenant governor, Joseph M. Montoya, has not announced whether he will seek re-election. The speculation about (Continued on Page Four)

Four Leading Republicans See Victory

SANTA FE, (AP)—Four top New Mexico Republicans, who have lined up on different sides in the past, united today in a prediction of GOP victory in the state and nation in 1956.
The quartet were former Gov. Edwin I. Mechem; Gen. Patrick J. Hurley; Alvin Stockton, the unsuccessful 1954 candidate for governor; and Holm O. Bursum of Socorro, who lost the nomination to Stockton.
Their statement was released by State Chairman Merrill B. Johns. Johns called it the opening of an aggressive "campaign for victory in '56."
Whether by coincidence or not, the statement's release came quickly on the heels of last night's big gathering of Democrats at a money-raising dinner in Albuquerque.
Mechem and Hurley differed in 1952, when Mechem liked Wesley Quinn for the Republican Senate nomination which eventually went to Hurley. Mechem-Hurley relations worsened even more after the Canvassing Board headed by Mechem certified Dennis Chavez the winner over Hurley in the close and bitter Senate race of 1952.
Last year, Mechem's administration was considered pro-Bursum in Bursum's contest with Stockton, who was Hurley's 1952 choice for Republican campaign manager.

30,000 GI's In Korea For Thanksgiving

WESTERN FRONT, Korea, (AP)—More than 30,000 American soldiers will observe Thanksgiving camped in the bleak hills of Korea guarding the 2½-year-old armistice.
The 24th and 7th Infantry divisions, grouped just south of the armistice zone, are providing nearly one pound of turkey for each man, with such trimmings as shrimp cocktail and oyster dressing.
Most of the troops, just back from strenuous field maneuvers will eat in their own Quonset mess halls. But dinner will be taken to a few on duty in bunkers and outposts overlooking the demilitarized zone and Communist North Korea.
On the lips of many, like Lt. Ed Fallon, were sentiments such as "thank God it is not a shooting war." Fallon, 22, was a former minor league baseball player at Spokane, Wash.
Many soldiers said they were thinking about happier past and future Thanksgivings at home.

Storms and Cares Of Office Set Aside As Ike Goes Home

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP)—The storms and cares of office take a little recess today in that big white entry place on the rim of Gettysburg battlefield.
President Eisenhower has some work to do. But at the same time three lively grandchildren are coming with their parents, Maj. John S. Eisenhower, and Thanksgiving Eve, with a family holiday in prospect.
The farm problem which bothers Republicans cropped up again yesterday, in the wake of Cabinet National Security Council meetings 22 miles away in a mountain lodge at Camp David.
Eisenhower, through his press secretary, made it plain he's still standing behind Secretary of Agriculture Benson—just as he was 25 years ago when he issued a declaration of support from his Denver hospital room.
Press Secretary James C. Hagerty didn't say in so many words that administration farm policy might not change in the future, or that Benson was assured of continued support, but there was no backing down from the Oct. 29 expression of complete confidence in Benson.
Hagerty did say that Eisenhower "is the only one who appoints or removes a Cabinet official," and at no time has he "entertained any suggestion whatsoever of the secretary of agriculture being replaced." Benson has been the target of attacks on farm prices and policies.
Official business increasingly claimed the chief executive's time. Eisenhower's chief assistant Sherman Adams was due in with a briefcase full of business today. Col. Thomas W. Mattingly, chief heart specialist at the Army's Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, was expected too for the President's weekly detailed physical checkup.
Hagerty flatly denied a published report that the President's brother Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower recently intervened to save Benson's job.
Hagerty boiled over a bit when newsmen pursued the question.
Denying Benson ever has offered to resign—although many Democrats and some influential Republicans are after his scalp in the controversy over farm price drops—Hagerty told a news conference with pointed emphasis:

Eddie Robinson's Son Finally Has Life Figured Out

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—At 22, darkly handsome Edward G. Robinson, Jr., has had more than his share of troubles. But now he thinks he has his life on an even keel. "It was all part of growing up," he says. "I was confused. I was despondent over my marriage. I turned to drink as a panacea for all my problems. But that was no solution. When I woke up in the morning, I had a headache, and my problems were still there. Drinking added to my problems. He was arrested on drunk charges. He also was charged with passing bad checks and holding up a taxi driver.

"I was acquitted on those matters," he said. "My big problem was drinking. I was miserable over my marriage.

"We tried to make it work. We went back together many times. I didn't want my daughter to be raised in a broken home. But it was worse for her to be living with parents who were always fighting. I'm afraid we would have destroyed each other if we had stayed married."

Young Robinson said he has recovered from the hurt of the broken marriage and has conquered his drinking problem.

"I couldn't handle it," he admitted. "Now I have a little wine before dinner or a beer now and then if I feel like it."

The greatest boost for his mor-

ale has been the improvement of his acting career. He owes it to Minna Wallis, an agent who managed Van Johnson's career, among others. She's the sister of producer Hal Wallis.

Eddie had gone to school with the producer's son. Mrs. Wallis, formerly comedienne Louise Fazenda, interested her sister-in-law in Eddie's problems. Minna took his under her wing, quickly got him roles in two Climax TV shows and in a war film, "The Screaming Eagles."

Since high school days, Eddie has wanted to be an actor. He skipped college to attend two years of classes at the neighborhood playhouse, spawning ground for many top stars.

He did a lot of TV shows in New York and toured in the road company of "A Streetcar Named Desire." But until recently his Hollywood career has never gotten off the ground.

Top Example Of TV Fare

NEW YORK (AP)—The cleanup camera of television has had one of its finest triumphs. The occasion was "The Caine Mutiny Court Martial" on CBS-TV.

It's doubtful if Herman Wouk's play, based on his novel, could altogether fail in any medium. With good actors and the device of a commentator it probably even would communicate great feeling on radio. For it's a solid, unified drama on the grand theme of man's responsibility.

As one who saw the play from the balcony on Broadway, I enjoyed the television version more. This was because of a camera that enabled one to see at close range the acting of one of the finest casts ever assembled. In Lloyd Nolan, as Capt. Queeg, we saw a man coming apart at the seams in the same room with us. In Barry Sullivan, as Lt. Greenwald, we saw the man who leathfully wielded the verbal scalpel on Queeg's paranoid personality.

Charles Laughton's editing of the play was most perceptive. But without the discerning camera direction of Franklin Schaffner, the TV director, the effectiveness of cast and script might easily have been diluted.

There was superior entertainment on the TV set throughout the weekend. In the top drawer was Maurice Evans' presentation of George Bernard Shaw's "The Devil's Disciple" on NBC-TV.

Shaw's mercurial wit was given a zestful edge by a cast that included Evans as Dick Dudgeon, a

Lou Michaels, Kentucky tackle, placed high in the balloting for his role in Kentucky's 23-0 victory over Tennessee. He made several key blocks and tackles in addition to booting a field goal and averaging 40 yards punting.

Tackles Forrest Gregg of Southern Methodist, Norman Hamilton of Texas Christian and George Struge of Washington also were praised.

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Paper Still Responsible

EVERY NOW AND THEN the matter of whether a newspaper is responsible when they publish or print something someone else has written and signed, comes up.

The same question arises regarding the publication of an advertisement which may appear in a newspaper—an advertisement properly signed and printed as a paid advertisement.

The average individual or person, of course, is thoroughly convinced that only the writer or the signer of such an article whether it is a news item, a letter or an advertisement.

This, of course, is not true. A newspaper is just as responsible for the item, the article or the advertisement as the individual who claims credit for writing it.

The fact that the individual is willing to sign the article, advertisement or letter, does not in any way relieve the newspaper of its responsibility. The paper is held liable for what it publishes regardless of the individual quoted or regardless of who signs the letter or the advertisement.

We believe that is as it should be. We feel the paper should be held responsible for what it prints or publishes and that all writing letters or advertisements or articles should keep this in mind.

There is very little to be accomplished by libeling organizations, groups or individuals. Much can be done at election time and when the reason for exposing some project, movement or even individual is during a campaign than the person has considerable more freedom.

There are probably far more articles either edited or rejected than anyone realizes and in most instances it is simply because the article might result in a libel suit.

There are a good many things which the average newspaper does not want discussed in their columns not because they desire to refuse someone the right to voice an opinion but simply because nothing can be accomplished and it all results in a controversy that goes on indefinitely.

But the fact does remain that a newspaper is just as responsible for what it publishes or prints as the individual who writes an article or a letter and it must accept that responsibility even though the average citizen doesn't realize this is the case.

Hagerty said the farm problem, involving the question of flexible as against rigid price supports "wasn't even discussed" at yesterday's Cabinet meeting. Benson attended the meeting, flying in by helicopter as did most other officials.

A reporter asked if there have been any requests from within the Cabinet that Benson get out.

"I haven't heard of any," Hagerty replied. He made it plain he had checked the whole situation with the President during the afternoon.

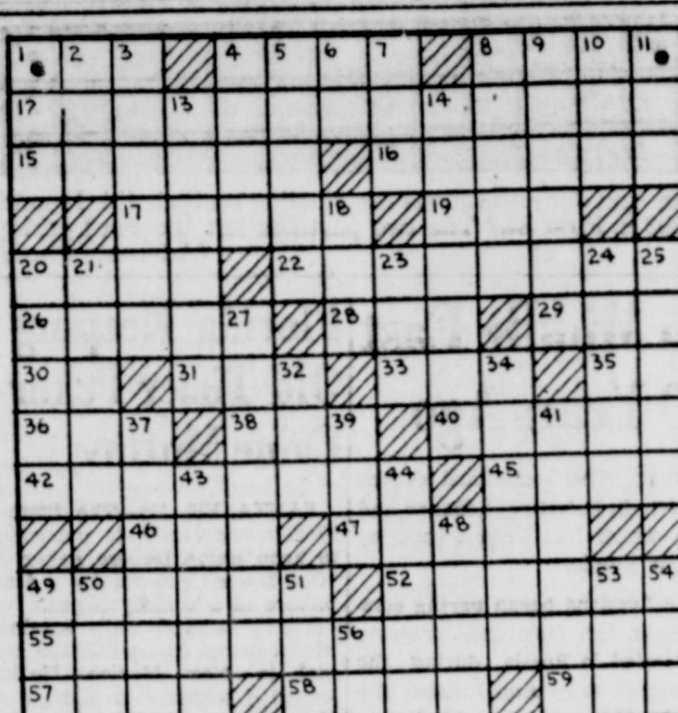

Credit Tightening May Delay Refinancing Government Notes

WASHINGTON, (AP)—A tightening of the money market after the Federal Reserve Board's severe crackdown last week on credit expansion may delay briefly the announcement of plans for a 12-billion-dollar refinancing of government securities.

This was indicated today as the interest rate on 91-day Treasury bills, by which the government borrows to meet its short-term needs, bounded upward to high level in 22 years.

In the light of the money scarcity that development evidenced, it was learned, the Treasury is taking another look at tentative plans to announce within the next few days a program for refinancing government securities maturing Dec. 15.

The announcement now may be delayed a short time, one source said, to let the money market settle down from the effects of the reserve board action.

It also appeared unlikely that the Treasury would borrow any new money—in addition to the refinancing—at this time.

Increased tax receipts may have eliminated any immediate need for further new borrowing. The Treasury's bill rate—the rate of interest it pays for 91-day borrowing—climbed steeply this week to 2.44 per cent the Treasury paid in June 1953 during the stringency of credit shortage of that year, and was the highest bill rate since the historic high of 4.25 per cent in the money drought of March 1933.

The bill rate is generally regarded as the "best" indicator of money availability. There are 13 issues of bills, each amounting to \$100 million, and a new issue is reflected in its place. The bill rate is set by offers from the

money market where each weekly issue is auctioned by the Treasury.

The size, frequency and manner of handling the bill offerings make the bill rate a sensitive barometer of money conditions. The bill rate rises quickly to reflect credit shortages, and falls rapidly when there is plenty of money and credit available.

This week the bill rate rose by nearly two tenths of a point, an unusually large jump from one week to another. This development followed the turn-around by the Federal Reserve Board last week. The board approved, effective last Friday, the start of a fourth round of increases from 2.14 to 2.12 per cent by the reserve banks in their discount rate—the interest rate at which reserve banks lend to their member commercial banks.

In addition the reserve board last week resumed open market sale of government securities it owns. Such sales pull money out of commercial banks and immobilize it in the reserve banks.

Both actions tend to make credit scarcer, and therefore more expensive.

Japanese Ban Cotton Exports

TOKYO (AP)—The Japanese government, in an attempt to quell American charges that cheap Japanese cottons are flooding the United States market, said yesterday it would no longer approve contracts for export of cotton goods to America.

The government previously had suspended export license applications on four specific cotton items considered most competitive in the United States market—gray and bleached cloth, velveteen and corduroy.

COTTON ALLOTMENT SET
WASHINGTON, (AP)—New Mexico has been allotted 8,424 acres for extra long staple cotton in the 1956 crop planting allotment. This compares with 8,529 acres for this year. Under an Agriculture Department production control program, plantings across the nation will be limited to 45,305 acres compared with 46,154 allotted for this year's crop.

Russian Interest In Middle East Started Nearly 200 Years Ago

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Russian interest in the Middle East is nothing new.

Nearly 200 years ago the czars tried to expand their sphere of Russian influence southward through the old Ottoman Turkish Empire. Palestine was governed by the Moslem Turkish Sultans. The big powers found it useful to maintain the shaky Ottoman Empire intact, but each sought a foothold with the Sultan's blessings.

France, Britain and Russia extended their influence by becoming "protectors" of minorities in the empire, and particularly by protecting their rights in the holy places in Palestine.

The French set the pace as far back as 1935, reaching agreement that year with the Sultan to become guardians of the holy places and protectors of "Orthodox" in Ottoman lands.

Claiming to be spiritual heir of the Orthodox Byzantine Empire, Russia tried to counter French influence by becoming protector of Eastern Orthodox Christian communities in the Middle East. Fights between Catholic and Orthodox priests over the conflicting claims in the Holy Sepulchre and the Church of the Nativity developed into international conflicts between Russia and France, and sometimes Britain.

The problem of holy places and minorities gave Russia a continuous weapon for intervention in the Middle East until the Bolshevik Revolution. Then the Communists renounced the church and lost their weapon. But Russia began a Middle Eastern comeback during World War II by reviving the Orthodox patriarchate in Moscow. The Soviets began active support of Orthodox communities in the Middle East.

Florida Keeping Old Timer Pekor Caine Mutiny

SANTA FE, (AP)—The State of Florida apparently is determined to keep Ralph Dubose Pekor, the "Old Timer" who painted a famed picture of a smiling Christ.

Pekor escaped while serving a life sentence as a habitual criminal in New Mexico. He later served a sentence in Florida and New Mexico asked for his return. While in the Florida prison, he painted the picture which won him fame.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Santiago Campos of New Mexico says Florida officials returned New Mexico's extradition papers. The reasons:

1. The papers had a technical error in Florida's viewpoint.
2. The papers were held together by a paper clip instead of being stapled.

Campos, with a sigh, is preparing new papers for the governor's signature.

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Santa Fe Loads 26,281 Cars

Santa Fe loadings for week ending November 19, 1955 were 26,281 compared with 25,953 for the same week in 1954. Cars received from connections totaled 13,101 compared with 11,708 for same week in 1954. Total cars moved

moved were 39,382 compared with 37,661 for same week in 1954. Santa Fe handled a total of 41,366 cars in preceding week of this.

Colfax Weddings May Top 3,000

RATON, (AP)—With a little luck, Colfax County's thriving marriage business may hit 3,000 this year.

Records in the county clerk's office shows 2,658 marriage licenses have been issued here so far in 1955.

Raton is a popular marrying place for Colorado residents impatient with that state's marrying laws. There is no waiting period in New Mexico.
