Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas
"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

ANTI-POVERTY BILL is now law. This massive assault upon the dark areas of our society will help the following: young people—probably as many as one-quarter million young men and women who need assistance in completing or resuming their education, through full-time or part-time jobs and occupational training; unemployed heads of families; low-income farmers; struggling small businessmen; adult illiterates; the mentally ill and retarded; local communities anxious to cure their own ills. Too many yet for working details, and remember that these programs are now authorized but funds are not yet appropriated to do the job.

FARM PRODUCTION nationally is near record levels in spite of severe drought conditions in key production areas, but Texas is particularly hard hit. The Department of Agriculture has already processed hundreds of county applications for in excess of 1963 (known as a bad drought year) for having and grazing privileges in designated disaster areas.

EUROPEANS ARE WORRIED ABOUT SENATOR GOLDWATER'S NOMINATION. They have a right to be concerned. Americans elect not only a president, but the leader of the whole Free World. President Johnson has confirmed his position despite French President deGaulle's efforts to undermine American prestige in Europe. 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Austin.—Texas Democrats and Republicans are gearing for their big clash in the November general election. Democratic leaders are in Atlantic City, N. J., at their party's national convention.

OIL RISE — Texas Railroad Commission ordered a substantial increase in oil production for September.

Wells which are under proration will be allowed to produce 28 per cent of their capacity during September, compared with 26.5 per cent this month.

New production quota amounts to 2,831,583 barrels daily, compared to 2,794,312 for August.

Dove Season To Open September 1

September 1 is the first day of the dove season. The North Zone season this year will start at 12 noon Sept. 1 and close at sunset Oct. 30. Bag limit is 12 daily and 24 in possession after the first day.

It will be necessary to have a new 1964-65 hunting license to hunt on Sept. 1. New fishing licenses are also on sale and new ones will be needed after Aug. 31. Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited.

Alcorn Starts Out On Candidates' Finances, Winds Up Unconstitutional

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur surely must have a flaw in his thinking this week, but we'll let you figure it out.

Dear Editor: I have been reading the financial statements of the two candidates for President and the way it looks to me, the wives and children are worth more than the men, and I would like to ask you if you think this is a sound trend?

It's a fact, the total worth of Mrs. Johnson and children and Mrs. Goldwater and children is a lot more than the net worth of the two men, according to the financial statements the newspapers have been publishing.

It's not that either man is hard up for cash, but this idea that the women and children have a lot more in their name is a trend which I do not look upon with favor, although understand I am not asking the Supreme Court to rule on it. You get the Supreme Court trying to re-district the division of money between a man and his wife and the lid is off. In fact, the Court if it keeps going is likely to come up one of these days with a ruling whose effect clearly implies the Court itself is unconstitutional, if it hasn't done it already. For example, the Court is now claiming that Congressional districts and state

Anybody can see this is unconstitutional.

And therefore, if a Supreme Court Justice is confirmed by a Senate made up by this clearly one-sided and unfair representation, isn't the Justice himself unconstitutional?

I tell you, the day the Supreme Court rules the Supreme Court is unconstitutional, where'll we turn?

Starting out on the financial condition of Presidential candidates and winding up on the unconstitutionality of the Supreme Court just goes to show you where thinking can lead both me and the Court too. These are critical times we're living in.
