# Youth Killed, Two Hurt In Cycle Wreck

An 11-year-old Bovina youth was killed Monday afternoon in a car-motorbike accident five miles south of Bovina on FM 3333.

Andy Serna, Jr. was killed instantly when the four-wheel bike was struck by a vehicle driven by Sharmy Dawn Christian, 22.

Two other youths, Stephen Heard, 11, driver of the motorbike, and Ralph Serna, 10, were also injured. Tuesday at noon, Heard was listed in very critical condition at the Clovis High Plains Hospital, and Ralph Serna was listed as "fair."

DPS Trooper Richard Diegelman said that there were four riders on the motorbike originally, and that the boys had

stopped to let another friend off at his home. When they attempted to get back on the Farm-to-Market Road, the accident happened.

Diegelman said that the youths pulled onto the highway in front of the east-bound auto, a 1984 Lincoln. Complicating the situation was the fact that the Christian automobile was meeting another car in the westbound lane, and could not swerve to the left.

With her daughter in the car was Lilly Christian. The two were returning home from shopping. The wreck happened about 1/4 mile west of FM 1731 on the new farm road. Sharmy Christian is a junior student at Texas Tech University who was home for the Easter holiday.

Young Serna was pronounced dead at the scene by Bovina Justice of the Peace Wayne Spears. The other two youngsters were taken to the Clovis Hospital by Bovina Ambulance.

Also investigating the accident was DPS trooper Craig Hunt.

Andy Serna, Jr., 11, was born June 24, 1973 in Weslaco. He was a fifth grade student in Farwell.

He was a resident of the Bovina and Farwell area for the past six

years moving here from Weslaco. He was a member of the Calvary Liberal United Pentecostal Church in Clovis. He was a member of the Farwell Grade School band and also active in the Bovina Little League baseball.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andy Serna of Bovina; two sisters, Maria Serna of Bovina and Lisa Serna, also of Bovina; and one brother, Ralph.

Paternal grandparents were Mr. and Mrs. Luis Serna of Bovina and maternal grandparents were Mr. and Mrs. Ventura Sauvedera of Weslaco.

Services were pending at press time.

## Three Are Elected

In Saturday's City Council elections, Dudley Hughes was re-elected to his position on the Bovina City Council. He retained his seat on the council after receiving 96 votes.

Keith Knight will be a new council member after receiving 120 votes. Leon Ware also was elected, leading the ballot with 127 votes, Larry Scott received 63 votes and Bobbie Haney received 55.

According to J.E. Sherrill, election judge, 163 people turned out to vote.

Those completing the City Council to date are Roy Lee Stowers, Dudley Hughes, T-Bone Treinen, Leon Ware, Keith Knight and Mayor Sonny Roach.

The voters in the Bovina Independent School District re-elected the two incumbent candidates, Steve Sherrill and Don Teague.

# Blood Drive Is Successful

Again the United Methodist Women send a "thank you" to all who visited the Bloodmobile March 29.

Elouise Dixon says a big Rah! Rah! goes to the Bovina Supermarket because of all their employees who were on duty that day and were of the proper age and were physically able, gave a "pint of life."

According to Elouise, this was the largest response the community has ever had. "This is good because we now have a large deposit of credits," she said.

Now, what is credit? Elouise said one pint of blood equaled one credit. One credit equals \$10. When someone from the Bovina area goes to a hospital serviced by the Coffee Memorial Blood Center, Inc. and they can be given a credit of \$10, per pint of blood needed. This does not include the administration, the hospital costs, etc., just the cost of the blood the

person needs. One blood drive gives two things: It gives financial help and we, by our gift, supply the life-sustaining element that cannot be artificially manufactured nor stockpiled for any length of time.

The Coffee Memorial Blood Center, Inc. serves hospitals in their district, the northern part of the Panhandle, and many larger hospitals throughout the United States.

The 39 credits the community gained last March, says Elouise, will be good for one year. Then they will be dissolved. In the meantime, we will have another drive October 25, 1985. By overlapping, we should always have a supply of \$10 credits available to us.

# Seven-Year-Old Is Snakebite Victim

Seven year old Adam Murphy, son of Rod and Suzanne Murphy of Abilene, was bitten by a rattlesnake on Easter Sunday.

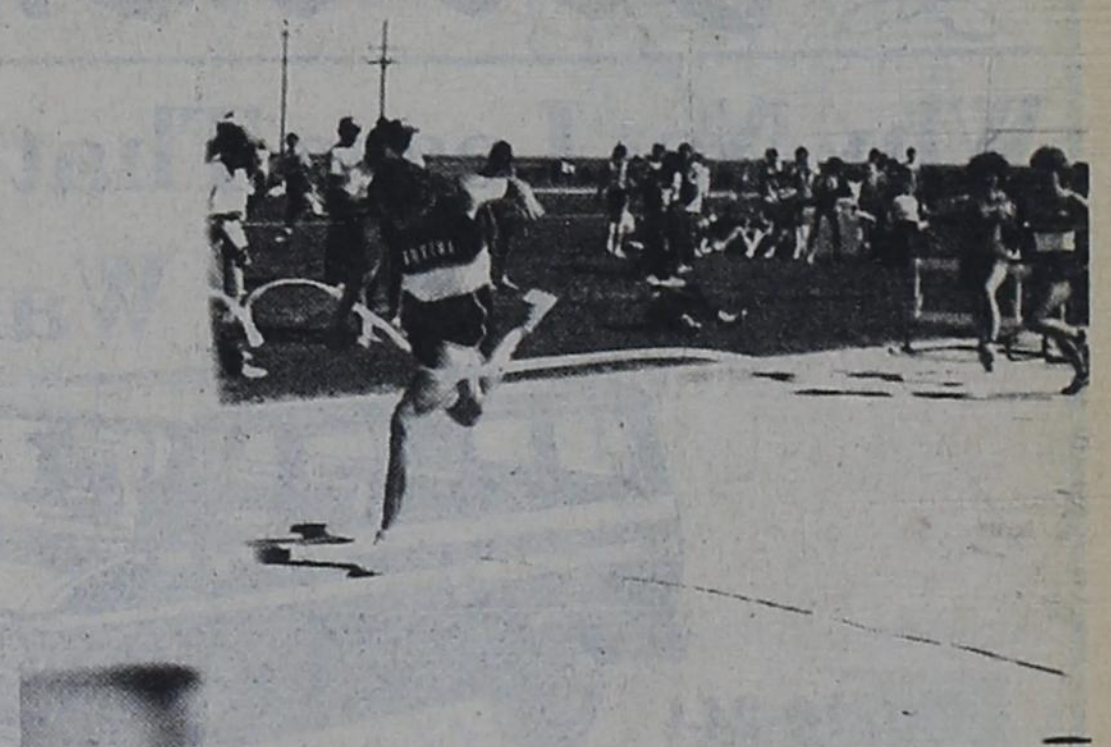
Adam and his family were at the home of Adam's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Elvin Murphy, who live on a farm near Abilene. Adam and three playmates were on a hill near the farm and when they ran down the hill, Adam was bitten.

He did not see the snake and assumed he had stepped on a thorny bush. His parents and grandparents looked at the wound and thought it to be an insect bite or perhaps a stickery plant. Only one small puncture could be seen and the family applied ice.

Adam and his family drove home to Abilene and by the time they arrived, his leg had begun to swell. He was taken to the Emergency Clinic in Abilene where the leg was x-rayed and examined. Sometime later the doctors told them that it could possibly be a snake bite.

Adam was then taken to the emergency room of a hospital where it was then determined to have been a rattlesnake bite.

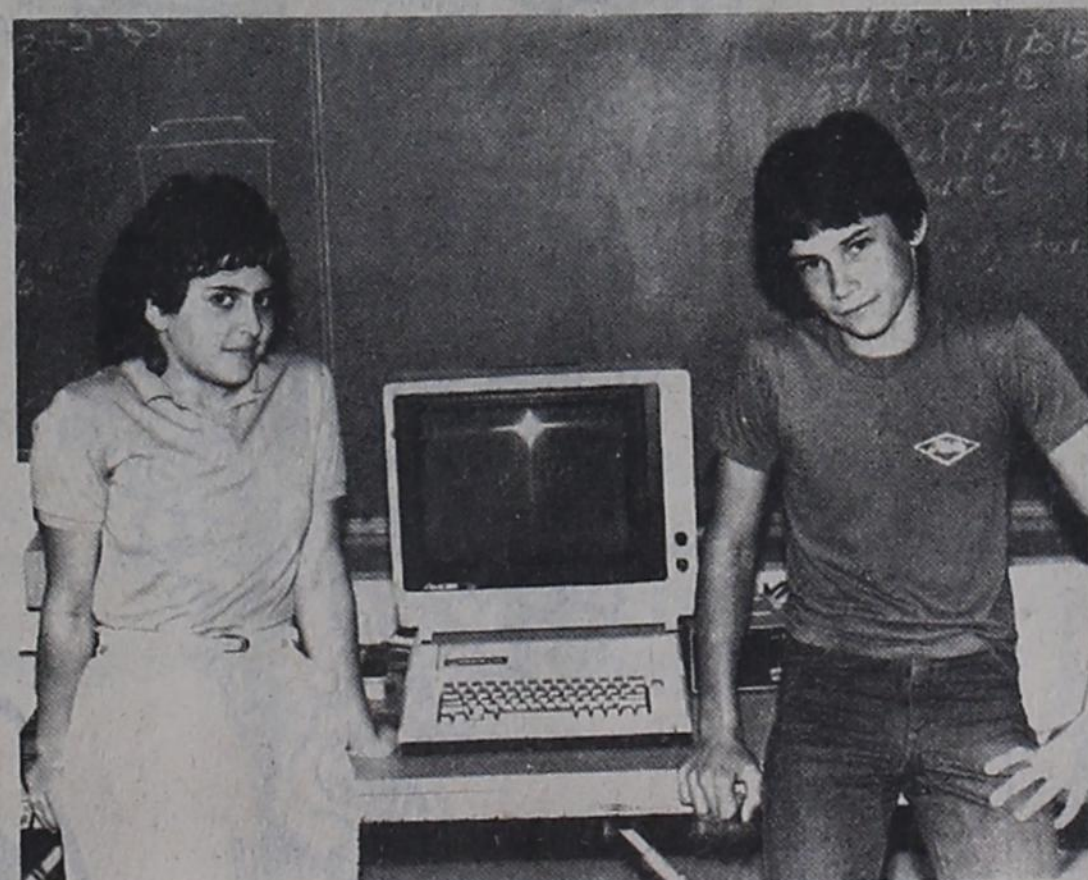
According to his grandmother, Juanda Murphy, he will be hospitalized for at least five days and then will undergo physical therapy for some time.

On January 26, the couple was honored with another reception that was held in Evansville, Indiana. This was also the groom's parents' 35th wedding anniversary.

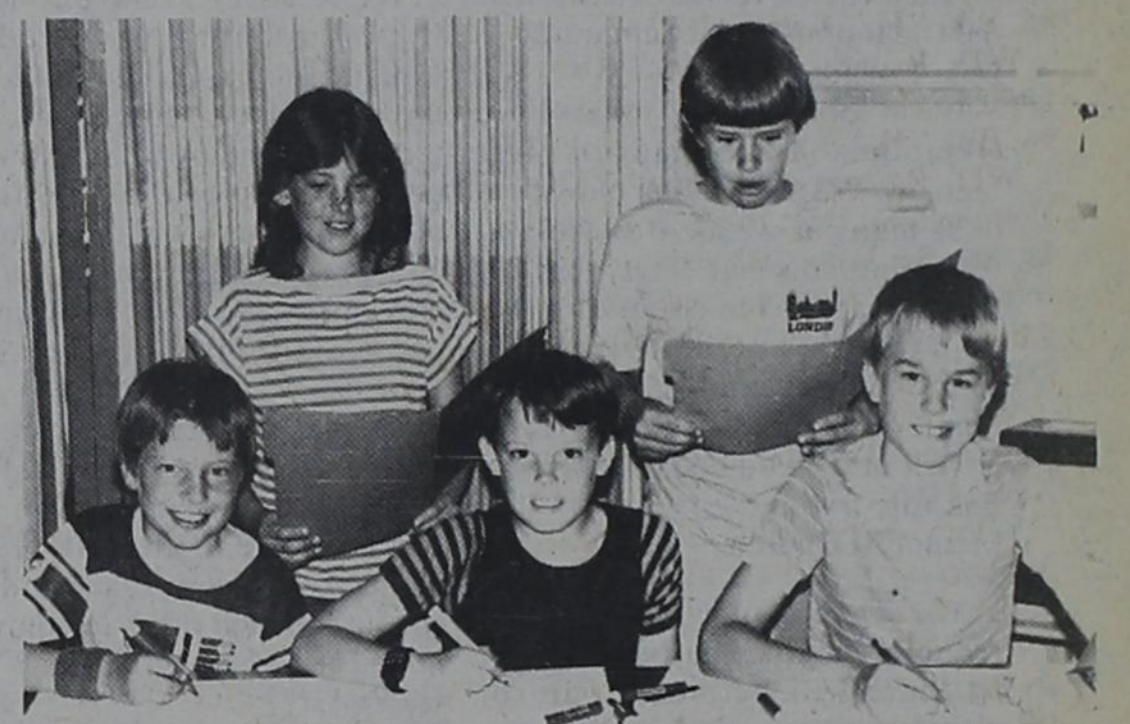
Prior to the wedding, friends in Bovina honored Alicia with a bridal shower held on December 28 at the First State Bank Community Room.
