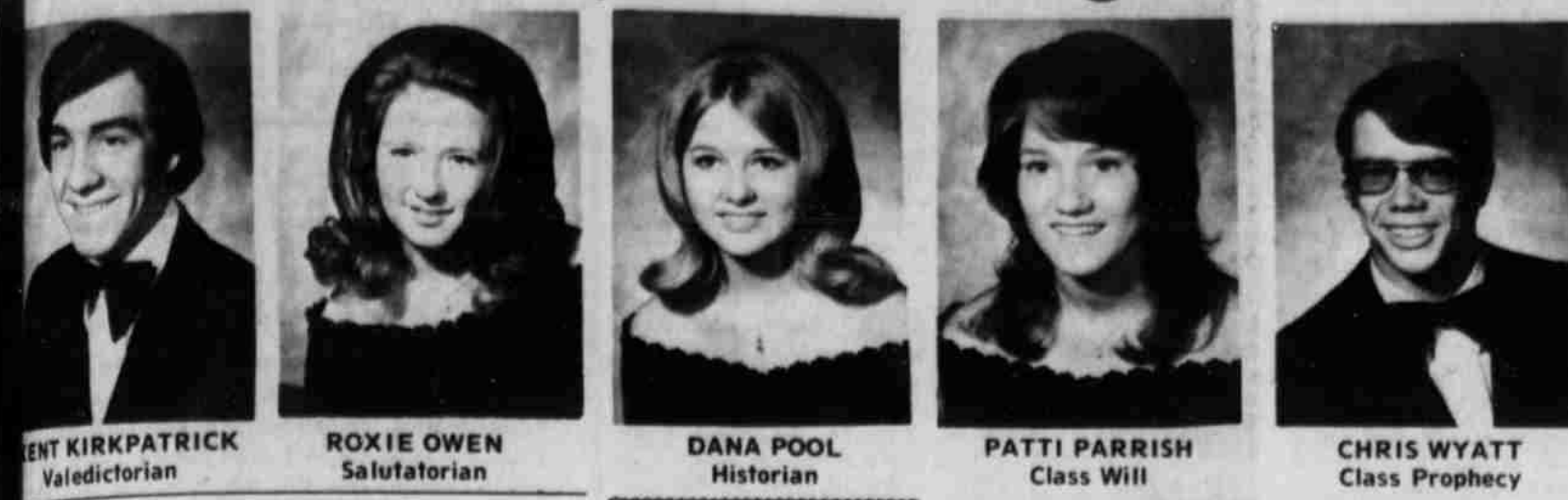

Algerita onto U.S. register

The Algerita Hotel has been entered in the National Register of Historic Places in Washington, D.C., according to an announcement by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to the National Historic Preservation Act, and accordingly was entered in the national register.

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the nation's cultural resources worthy of preservation.

Congressman Burleson said this action makes the hotel eligible to be considered for federal grants-in-aid for historic preservation through state programs.

At the request of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, a restoration request for \$100,000 was made by the city to Austin about 60 days ago.

Entering the hotel into the National Register of Historic Places now makes the Algerita eligible for such aid.

Jim Hundley appeared before the city commission at its May meeting Monday night to ask the council's reaction to the registering of the hotel as a national historic place and was told by Mayor McCrary that "we will have to wait and see what this means."

Mayor McCrary told the council that Hundley had received a "guesstimate" from Robert Cox and Lefty Davies that a complete restoration of the Algerita Hotel, including air conditioning, would cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000.

An engineer's estimate of a full renovation made a couple of months ago put the cost as between \$200,000 and \$300,000.

Whether the entering of the hotel here in the national register means that a federal grant is in the offing is an unanswered question here.

The city council and other taxing agencies which now own the hotel property through delinquent tax proceedings, have been considering for over a year the demolition of the old hotel as a health hazard, as well as possible restoration, or partial restoration.

While at Tech, Bird did research in commodity and livestock marketing and was a member of the Black and Gold Fraternity Club and the Tech Rodeo Club. At South Plains College he was a member of that school's livestock judging team.

With the city and school equalization board hearings scheduled for next Wednesday, both the city council and school trustees are busy trying to complete their new budgets before those upcoming hearings.

The council struggled through a three-hour study of the new municipal budget Monday night and will hold a special meeting sometime before Wednesday to complete work on it.

The school trustees have budget consideration as the prime topic on their agenda for their May meeting Monday night.

The reason for all this hustle is that the local taxing units want to be prepared for any confrontation from legal representatives of oil firms at the equalization board hearings.

Of course, the fireworks may not come off. But city and school officials want an approved budget this time prior to the equalization board hearing, something neither had last year.

Now not only are the equalization board hearings almost a month ahead of last year's but almost all the budget work is done.

The school budget is a real problem because the Texas Legislature is still in session and is getting ready to give consideration to teacher pay raises on a state level. That could really wreck any budget adopted by the school district, as could any changes in the district's funding requirements.

Introduction to Anthropology, Composition I, Composition II, American Literature, Principles of Geography, World Geography, U.S. Government, U.S. History to 1865, U.S. History since 1865, Introduction to Mass Communications, Introduction to Law Enforcement, Patrol Administration, Legal Aspects of Law Enforcement, Criminal Evidence and Procedure, Traffic Law, Police Organization and Administration.

Gene Gandy named new Garza sheriff

Holleman to Yoakum job

Gene Gandy was named Garza County sheriff Saturday morning by the county commissioners court in an emergency session to serve until the November, 1976, general election.

County Judge Giles W. Dalby told The Dispatch that the action was taken after the court learned that J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman had "abandoned" his sheriff's position here when he was sworn in Friday as deputy sheriff of Yoakum County to be stationed in Plains.

Holleman had resigned verbally Monday of last week effective June 1 but submitted a one sentence letter of resignation to the commissioners court later in which the effective date of resignation was left blank.

Judge Dalby told The Dispatch he was told Friday night of Holleman's being sworn in as a Yoakum County deputy and telephoned the sheriff's office in Denver City and had the action confirmed by law enforcement teletype before calling the commissioners court into emergency session.

Gandy, a deputy sheriff only three weeks after being named by Holleman, had completed his first week of six weeks of required law enforcement training at South Plains College in Levelland when his appointment as sheriff came.

Judge Dalby said Gandy was one of only two applicants for the position since Holleman announced his intentions to resign.

In notifying The Dispatch of the court's action Saturday morning, Judge Dalby said state law provides that the court make an immediate appointment to fill the vacancy as Holleman's action in being sworn in as a Yoakum County deputy legally left the Garza law enforcement position open and also wiped out Holleman's appointment of Gandy as his deputy.

Judge Dalby said the court had believed it would have a month to select Holleman's replacement until learning that Holleman had been sworn in as a Yoakum deputy Friday.

All but one member of the county commissioners court and Sheriff Gandy met with the city council Monday night and from that meeting came indications that a new effort to merge the Post police department with the Garza County sheriff's office may be undertaken in the months ahead.

The joint meeting's immediate purpose was for the county to secure the help of the city police in carrying out duties of the county sheriff's department while Sheriff Gandy completes his requirement law enforcement schooling.

He will attend classes at SPC in Levelland five more weeks out of the next ten on a one-week-in-class and one-week-on-the-job alternating basis.

Police Chief Jim Trulove also attended the joint meeting.

Trulove not only pledged close cooperation with Sheriff Gandy, including acting for the sheriff in Gandy's absence attending classes, but spoke up strongly for city-county law (See Gene Gandy, Page 12)

CONTRACT GETS 3-2 VOTE

Council splits on street lighting

By a split 3 to 2 vote with one councilman abstaining, the city council Monday night passed on first reading a new three-year contract for street lighting with Southwestern Public Service Co.

That was just one of several actions taken by the council in a long six and one-half hour session which started at 6:30 p.m. and ended at 1 a.m. Tuesday.

The last three hours of the session was spent by the council in an item by item review of the proposed new city budget for the city's new fiscal year beginning July 1.

The council hopes to complete action on the budget in advance of its board of equalization hearing at 2 p.m. next Wednesday.

The council expects to meet before Wednesday to complete budget consideration with the undecided question at present being whether or not to write a salary boost for city employees into the budget.

City employees received a ten per cent salary boost in the current city budget, adopted a year ago.

In the line by line budget review councilmen added some \$12,000 in additional budgetary expenditures for the coming year, but any tax boost is doubtful.

The city's action on the street lighting contract came with Mayor Giles McCrary casting the deciding vote after Councilman Ed Sawyers abstained from voting and the other four councilmen split two-two on the issue.

Councilman William Wilson who voted no, said he would not vote for the contract until the utility firm gave the city a firm price at which they would sell the street lighting system to the city.

The city is now paying \$776.30 monthly for the 228-light street lighting system, owned and maintained by the utility firm. The new contract would increase the cost 14.5 per cent

Stalcup named area supervisor

County backs grant request

The Garza County Commissioners Court Monday passed a resolution endorsing the county's participation in the community development block grant to secure funding for a community and youth center.

In another action, the court voted to proceed with plans for a re-districting of precincts in the county via a population survey to be conducted by personnel this summer hired through the federal CERTA manpower program.

The session was a continuation of the regular meeting of April 28.

More are needed in housing survey

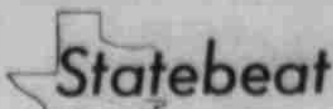

AUSTIN — It was a cloudy Saturday when I walked into Memorial Stadium in Austin, home of the famous Longhorns, packing my telephoto lens, and I observed the growing crowd of teachers who came to make a point about getting a raise in pay, even though they said that they were interested in other matters of education reform as well.

It seemed ironic to me that there was one among those present who was not a teacher, yet he stands at the center of a principle in education which has knocked the stuffings out of inequality as it exists between different school districts in the state.

The lawsuit which Demetrio Rodriguez filed against the Edgewood School District in San Antonio alleged that discrimination exists when school children in the state receive different qualities of education because they live in school districts with different economic resources.

Even though the suit is now some three years past, it has put state legislators under the magnifying glass in a pot of mighty hot water. They must come up with a plan for financing state education which, at the very least, is a token response to the principle established by a lone man in San Antonio with a sense of justice.

Lower courts upheld Rodriguez when the appeals were filed, and the case went all the way to the United States Supreme Court. The country's highest judiciary copped out, however, and wrote an opinion which said that Texas educators ought to do better, but there was no requirement for the immediate equality of fund allocation.

So take the Supreme Court's ambiguity and let the promise-anything-but-give-little Texas Legislature try to work it out, and the result is exactly what we've got in this session regarding school finance — nothing which speaks directly to the Rodriguez suit while the Governor will accept anything that won't raise taxes.

During the week after the teacher rally, the House's Education subcommittee on school finance recommended an \$8,000 per year starting salary for teachers, but the regular Education Committee upped it to \$10,000 in a two-year pilot project in special districts, and threw in the weighted-pupil approach for state-subsidy of districts.

But when the bill got to the House floor, Dan Kubiak of Rockdale convinced the members that a better plan yet was in the offing via the program approach and valuation of school tax property at market rather than prorated price. By the time the Senate gets through with it, one wonders whether anyone will remember Rodriguez.

One thing is sure, however. If it means an increase in taxes, the Governor won't sign it.

In principle, at least one thing ought to be clear. What Demetrio Rodriguez was addressing by his lawsuit is not merely a legal issue. It would seem to be more of a moral one. It is hard, particularly in this day and age, to argue that children who live under the same system of school finance should receive differing qualities of education.

To say such a thing would be the same as saying that some kids should have better books, buses and teachers than other kids. Well, that might not be what we say is right, but in practice it is still factual.

There is a way for the Legislators to wipe out the inequality and not raise taxes. With all the cool heads up there under the big dome, I figure they would have come up with the answer by now.

The solution (as well as the bookkeeping) is simple. The taxing power of independent school districts would be transferred to the state. The state would then implement taxation equally across all districts and collect the revenues. The money would then be given to the districts on an equal dollar-per-pupil basis, and the independent districts would have the local control to administer the program however they felt appropriate with the funds available.

All in all, it doesn't sound like such a bad idea. It's just so crazy it just might work. If the Legislators don't go for it, I think I know of one guy who might find the idea appealing. He lives in San Antonio.

Try Gardening instead of Jogging

Travis County extension horticulturist, Ted Fisher, in his excellent column "Ted's Tips" offered the following suggestions for keeping healthy and also provide the family with fresh vegetables.

America is exercise conscious today as never before. There are joggers, walkers, hikers, bicyclers wherever you go. Countless people are engaged in daily exercise in pursuit of stronger, healthier bodies and peace of mind. There are many ways to promote good health, but from a physical standpoint, athletic types as well as nonathletes have long expounded gardening as a healthful hobby.

In a recent survey conducted by the American Medical Association, it was found that 47 percent (137,500) of the doctors polled, used gardening to keep their health and sanity. Among the doctors, gardening topped all other hobbies and sports. It stands to reason that these professional doctors advocate gardening to their patients as a good way to health and relaxation.

Results of psychological tests relative to hobbies, personality traits and life habits associate a general feeling of relaxation and inner peace among people who pursue gardening in one form or another. Psychologists agree that gardening seems to promote such feelings and certainly a relaxed, contented person is a more healthy one.

The mental and physical benefits of gardening are not new. They have been known for decades. However, at no time in our history has gardening assumed a more important role than in the 20th century.

Today as never before, our society is beset with tension, stress, and frustration. The strain of the "daily grind," and

the pressures of modern life make us yearn to "get away from it all" whenever we can. And one of the easiest ways "get away from it all" is your own backyard in seclusion of your garden. You can lose yourself in your garden, thereby losing all your tensions and frustrations at the same time.

I have often wondered if the might not be far fewer aspirin, tranquilizers, and sleeping pills would take up gardening. You don't have to have an especially landscaped home to enjoy gardening. Even the modest corner vegetable patch can be the source of great satisfaction.

Gardening has yet other attractive benefits. With its skyrocketing price of food nowadays, a vegetable garden even a small one — can lower your food costs by as much as \$100 a year.

All of this points to the reason why gardening has become one of the most popular hobbies. There are now about 10 million home gardeners in the United States, according to recent nationwide survey.

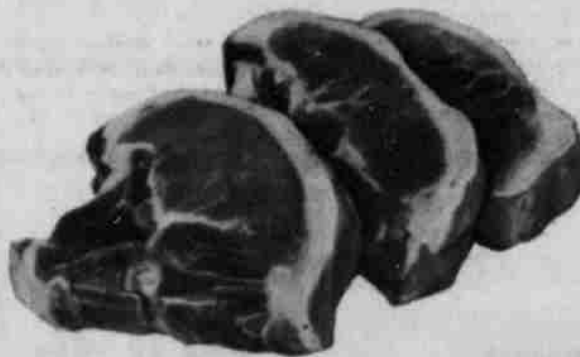

Post's need for licensed child care is explained

EDITOR'S NOTE: — In a series of five articles, Judy Barker, day care licensing worker of the State Department of Public Welfare, explains Post's need for licensed child care facilities.

By JUDY BARKER
Presently there are no licensed day care facilities in

Post. According to Texas law, every person who keeps unrelated children in their home on a regular basis is subject to licensing.

The primary purpose of such a law is to insure optimum physical, mental, intellectual and emotional development for children who are away from

home during portions of the day. Due to economic conditions, it is increasingly more common to find families where both the husband and wife work. Frequently, they do not have time to visit the facility and observe its operation before placing their child in it. Therefore they may be unaware of health, sanitation, fire and psychological dangers which could be present in the facility. Licensing procedures are relatively simple and require, among other things, fire and sanitation inspection of the facility, health inspection for all persons who will be associated with the children, and in some cases, gas leakage inspections. There is no charge for the license.

The benefits licensing can bring to the Post Community are many. First, it is a protective service for children in that it sets minimum standards for care. Second, it is an aid to parents who seek information on available facilities. Third, it provides information and resources for the operator of a day care facility. Consultation and printed materials are available free of charge for use by day care providers. In addition, the day care operator is provided with free advertisement by means of a list of licensed facilities which is distributed to the general public.

Spur captured first place in both the women's and men's divisions of the invitational volleyball tournament held this past weekend here in the junior high school gym.

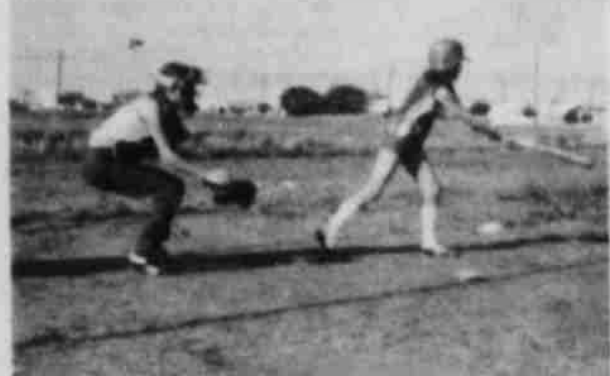

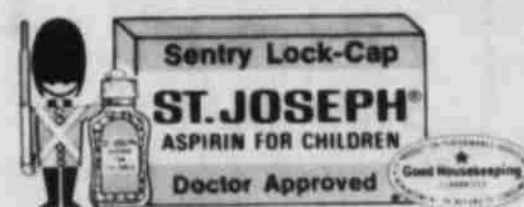

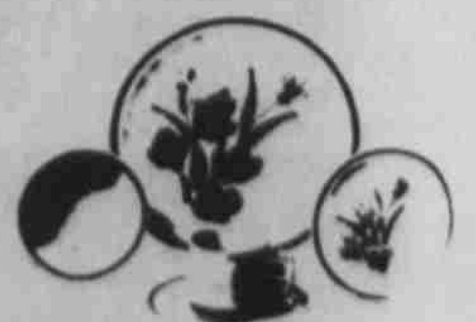

The city and county spent some 18 months considering such a consolidation at the time of construction of the new county law enforcement building and jail which was half financed by federal funds.

That first city-county law enforcement consolidation attempt ended when the council by a split vote decided against undertaking such action because with the sheriff heading the joint department, it had no assurance that city ordinances would be enforced.

In discussing such a law enforcement merger Monday night, Sheriff Gandy pledged enforcement of city ordinances and said he'd even pick up a stray dog if necessary.

The council and court agreed to re-establish a joint city-county law enforcement cooperation and explore again the feasibility of the consolidation under Sheriff Gandy's command, as required by state law.

Mayor Giles McCrary named Councilmen Jim Wells and Ed Sawyer to the committee and Judge Dalby said County Commissioners Herb Walls and Ted Aten would serve from the court.

The committee also would include Sheriff Gandy and Police Chief Trulove.

The committee was named after the city council by resolution unanimously voted its approval for city police to provide all possible assistance to the new sheriff during his transition period.

Under a consolidated city-county law enforcement agency, Chief Trulove would become Sheriff Gandy's chief deputy.

Both Gandy and Trulove pointed out that only through such a consolidation could either the city or county qualify for any additional federal law enforcement funds.

Sheriff Gandy told The Dispatch after the joint session that he would not immediately appoint a deputy as he wanted to take the time necessary to secure a good man.

On weeks when he attends law enforcement classes at SPC, Gandy is driving back and forth daily from Post to Levelland and takes Police Officer Bobby Green with him as Green also is taking the required training.

He said 18 out of the 20 already have approved the contracts.

King also said Southwestern Public Service last year lost \$39,000 in its street lighting efforts in cities and towns in its service area, but couldn't say exactly what the loss was for Post.

When the vote finally came, Councilmen Jim Wells, and Bill Pool voted yes, Councilmen Jim Jackson and Wilson voted no, and Councilman Sawyers abstained from voting.

Mayor McCrary, who votes only in case of a tie, then cast the deciding vote for the new three-year street lighting contract which would replace the 10-year contract expiring June 30.

Before the contract is approved by the city it must pass on second reading at the next council session.

The council got its first protest of its new mobile homes ordinance when Jack Aull appeared before the council contending the ordinance was unconstitutional, but he withdrew his objection and departed satisfied when Mayor McCrary explained to him that the new ordinance does not prohibit a mobile home from being on the same lot with a regular

residence providing it is no closer than 10 feet to the residence.

Harvey Morton, attorney for the city, reported to the council that in response to his letter General Telephone had written him that it had not increased any rates here since the 1974 appearance before the council.

Mayor McCrary and the council asked that any local residents who have complaints concerning any increase in the telephone firm's charges, such as for installing or moving telephones, to report them to city hall for the council's consideration.
