Brooks Says Group Seeks Control Of Lt. Governor Office

Pierce Brooks, Dallas insurance
executive who led a field of 11 op-
ponents in the first primary, open-
ed his runoff campaign for lieuten-
ant governor with a charge
that his opponent did nothing as
a legislator to halt the runaway
cost of state government.

"My opponent was a member of
the Texas Senate from 1941 to
1948 when the cost of our state
government increased approxi-
mately 500 per cent and he didn't
or couldn't do anything about
hauling it then, what can the people
expect him to do about it now?"
Brooks also charged that his op-
ponent made no effort during his
eight years as a senator to com-
ply with the law providing for
legislative redistricting after each
federal census. The Dallas County
candidate said he always has been
a staunch advocate of redistricting.

Brooks hailed the result of the
first primary which he lead, as
convincing proof that the people
of the state want a lieutenant
governor who is completely free
from entering alliances and who
won't be dominated by "a certain
group of money hungry and pow-
er thirsty individuals who are
seeking to control the office of
lieutenant governor through the
election of one of their key men."

Brooks said that "any man who
goes into public office with the
all-out support of any special
group must pay for that help, one
way or another, when and if he
goes into office."

"My sole allegiance," Brooks
said, "is to my God and the peo-
ple of Texas."

Locomotives, Cars Delivered For New Train, New Schedule

All cars and locomotives have
now been delivered for the five new
Southern Pacific "Sunset Limited"
streamliners between New Or-
leans and Los Angeles, and prepa-
rations are complete for the re-
cord breaking 42-hour schedule
that goes into effect August 20,
that railroad announced this week.

Heralded as the streamliners
with the Southern accent, the \$15-
000,000 worth of equipment fea-
tures cars of gleaming stainless
steel exterior, containing private
rooms of latest design for com-
fort, and deep-cushioned "Sleepy
Hollow" chair car seats for econ-
omy travel. In each train will be
a "French Quarter" lounge, "Au-
dubon" dining room and "Pride of
Texas" coffee shop — all styled
in motifs of the colorful 2,070-mile
route through the states of Louisi-
ana, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona
and California, according to H. H.
Gray, passenger traffic manager
for Southern Pacific.

Many of the new cars are al-
ready in service on the train's
present schedule, Gray said, giving
travelers a pre-taste of the
smooth-speedier service to come.
He described among features of
the train the enclosed toilet and
lavatory facilities, room accom-
modations, non-fogging windows,
finger touch end doors, pressurized
air-conditioning with automatic
zone heating, high intensity non-
glare lighting, circulating ice wa-
ter in all the rooms, and other new
improvements in the science of
railroading.

Practice of Personal Hygiene Urged As Health Measure

Austin, August 9 — In addition
to the general instructions for
community sanitation which are
important in preventing poliomy-
elitis, Dr. George W. Cox, State
Health Officer, today issued an ur-
gent warning to every individual
in Texas to practice strict personal
hygiene to protect his own health
and that of those about him.

"Of course, cleanliness and per-
sonal hygiene are ordinarily taken
for granted," Dr. Cox said, "but
at this time with the incidence
of poliomyelitis having attained
a total of 1395 cases, I wish to
re-emphasize some personal hy-
gienic measures which may help in
preventing the spread of this cri-
pling and often fatal disease."

The state health officer stressed
the importance of scrupulous
cleanliness of the person. Frequent
bathing and immaculately clean
clothing are vitally necessary. Ora-
l hygiene with thorough brushing
of the teeth and the use of a mild
antiseptic are recommended. The
nasal passages should be kept
clean and dental defects corrected
immediately.

Sanitation and thorough clean-
liness in the home are instinctive
with the average housewife, but
at this time their importance to
health must be re-emphasized.
Home sanitation includes those
taken-for-granted measures as
washing the dishes in hot soapy
water and rinsing them in hot
clear water; keeping sinks, bath-
tubs and fixtures scoured clean
rinsed with a mild antiseptic solu-
tion; sunning and airing bed lin-
ens; ridding the home of flies, rats
and roaches which, since poliomy-
elitis is believed to be a fifth-borne
disease, are suspected as being re-
sponsible for transmission.

"If good personal hygiene is
combined with good community
sanitation and hygiene, it is hard
for any disease to get a foothold,"
Dr. Cox said. "With such a dread
disease as poliomyelitis prevalent
in the state, no precaution should
be overlooked and no bars should
be left down for its entrance."

R. W. WEATHERBY INJURED IN FALL FROM TRUCK

R. W. Weatherby received a
painful head injury the first of
the week when he fell from a gas-
oline delivery truck. A local phy-
sician took several stitches in his
head and he is reported back on
the job.

Weatherby said he started to
step from the platform on the
truck and struck the concrete
with his head.

charged with the crime.

State-Wide Improved School System Predicted for Fall

Austin, August 8 — Texas' al-
ready vastly improved public
school system will be on an even
higher level during the 1950-51
school year it was predicted here
today.

More classroom facilities and
more and better trained teachers
will be available, it was pointed
out by E. P. Sturgeon, state associ-
ate commissioner of education.

Under the new Gilmer-Alkin law
which went into effect last fall the
teaching staff was increased by
2,000 and more than half of the
school districts of the state added
to their classroom facilities.

Increase in pay for teachers has
added to their morale and made
the profession far more attractive
to young people, Sturgeon pointed
out. More young people are pre-
paring for careers as teachers and
these better trained instructors
will be available in larger num-
bers next year to replace retiring
instructors and those less ade-
quately trained.

School districts which met the re-
quirements of state law in order to
receive additional funds from the
state had a teacher, for every 20
pupils in average daily attendance
during the last school year, but
many districts were forced to put
pupils on a half-time basis.

"This will be partly alleviated
during the 1950-51 school year by
the construction of more class-
rooms and the availability of more
teachers," Sturgeon said.

"This will add to the great ben-
efits derived by a great many of
our school children in the last
school term through their being in
smaller classes, where they can
get more personal attention."

"During the 1948-49 school year
a survey conducted by the Texas
State Teachers Association dis-
closed that more than half of the
classrooms in the entire state were
badly overcrowded."

"Superintendents are almost
unanimous in their reports of the
willingness of teachers to accept
additional assignments and to partici-
pate in extra-curricular activi-
ties."

"Teachers are satisfied and are
proud of their profession. That sig-
nifies there will be better educa-
tion for our children in rooms pre-
sided over by well-trained instruc-
tors. It is only reasonable that
happy, efficient teachers can do
far more in importing knowledge
than dissatisfied and inefficient
persons."

Increased enrollment in courses
leading to degrees in education in
the state's colleges was also point-
ed to by Sturgeon as an indicator
of the attractiveness of the teach-
ing profession in Texas schools
now, with its resulting benefits
to the children.

A&M; Buddy Parker, Baylor;
chosen leading infielder in the
Sinton tourney; Shug McPherson,
Texas A&M; Travis Cook, Sul-
Ross, and several others.

Ramsey Praises Hiway Program, Pledges His Support

Dallas, August 9 — Texas' \$78-
000,000 a year program of new
highway construction — with
emphasis on the farm-to-market
roads — was praised here today
by Ben Ramsey of San Augustine,
who is actively forwarding his
runoff campaign for lieutenant
governor.

"In every section of the state
I've visited during my campaign,
I have found farm-to-market
roads completed or under con-
struction," Ramsey said.
"Many more such roads are
needed to further the development
of our rural sections, and I pledge
my fullest support to the mem-
bers of the state highway com-
mission who are seeking to con-
tinue this wise policy," he declar-
ed.

"It is also a great source of
pride to me, as an economy-mind-
ed public servant who for many
years in the Texas Legislature has
helped to maintain the policies and
prestige of our fine highway de-
partment that this vast system
of ours is being maintained at a
minimum cost, in spite of a tre-
mendous volume of traffic," he
said.

"This efficient maintenance by
the engineering forces of the
highway department thus allows
the major portion of our state
highway funds—some \$78,000,000
out of approximately \$100,000,000
expended annually on the Texas
highway system — to be concen-
trated upon the construction of
new highways, of which the great-
est number are the badly-needed
farm-to-market roads."

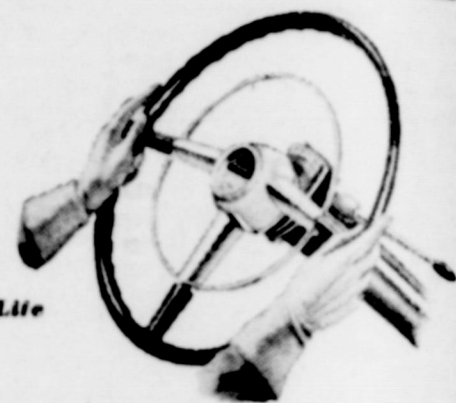

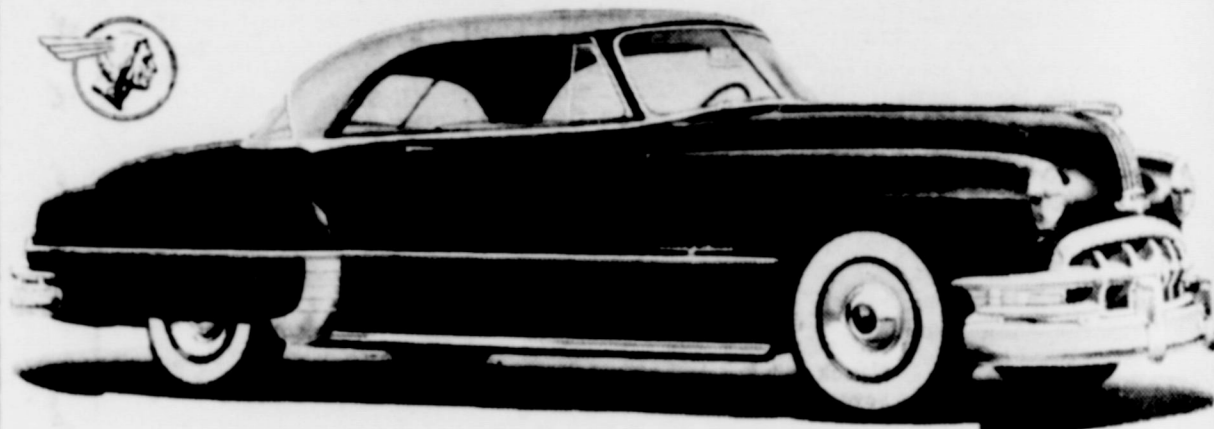

Land Commissioner Defends Land Owners Against Court Ruling

By J. N. McKee

Odessa, August 5 (Special) Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office of Texas, came forward this week in defense of West Texas land owners by filing a formal written statement strongly protesting a decision by the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals in a case appealed from Reeves County. The Appeals Court recently refused to recognize a typed provision inserted in a printed oil lease which, by its special provisions, was favorable to the land owner and to the Texas Permanent School Fund. The case was that of Kild and Cherry versus Louis Crouch and others.

Giles in his statement declared that some 35,000 oil and gas leases covering school lands were in jeopardy by reason of the court's ruling. "I cannot believe," Giles wrote, "that it was the intention of this court to create a tremendous liability on the state by its holding; nor can I believe," he continued, "that it was the intention of the court to cripple the policy of the state in the administration of the Relinquishment Act and the approximately seven million acres of land subject thereto."

The typed-in part of the contract said that a producing well would hold 160 acres and the lease would terminate unless delay rental was paid on the land not held by production. District Judge G. C. Olsen, in the original hearing in Pecos upheld the land-owner.

However, the Court of Civil Appeals held that the inserted clause was meaningless and that one producing well validated the whole lease. Judge McGill, for the Appeals Court, was unable to attach any meaning to the provision common to oil and gas leases throughout Texas.

as became aroused when the now-famous case of Green vs. Robinson took away their ownership of minerals under land sold by the state as mineral classified lands. J. T. Robinson, then Land Commissioner of Texas, endeared himself to the West Texans when he fought by their side to have this opinion nullified. Land owners of many West Texas counties formed an association and pushed through a bill in the legislature intended to affirm in long-owners the right, cast in doubt by a Supreme Court opinion. Entry of the present land commissioner into the renewed fight for rights of owners of mineral

classified lands will probably win Giles as warm a spot in West Texans' hearts as that held for Robinson.
