SPANISH AVIATORS ARRIVE IN BRAZIL

SPANISH JAUNT OF 4000 MILES EARLY TODAY

LAND AT BAHIA, 800 MILES FROM RIO DE JANEIRO

(By Associated Press)
RIO JANEIRO, Brazil, Mar. 26.—The Spanish Aviators, Ignacio Jimenez and Francisco Iglesias landed their plane, the Jesus Del Gran Poder, at Bahia, this morning, completing a flight across the South Atlantic.

The aviators landed at the Aero Postal Field, "Camassary" at Bahia at 10:30 a. m. (8:30 Eastern Standard time.)

Bahia, or Sao Salvador, is on the northeast coast of Brazil, located about 800 miles north northeast of Rio Janeiro, the goal of their flight. It is about 4,000 miles from Seville, Spain.

The aviators left Seville, Spain, in a secret take off on Sunday afternoon at 5:42 o'clock (12:42 p. m. Eastern Standard Time). They had been in the air 43 hours and 48 minutes when they landed at Bahia.

The record established by Arturo Ferrarin and Carlo P. Delpetta, Italian, was made on a non-stop hop from Rome to Brazil by way of the Cape Verde Islands, covering 4,000 miles in approximately 59 hours.

STEAMSHIP IS LOST IN FIRE

NEW GERMAN LINER TO BE TOTAL LOSS, OWNERS FEAR

(By Associated Press)
HAMBURG, March 26.—All indications are that the giant new North German Lloyd liner Europa would be a complete loss as fire which broke out in her fore-cabin early this morning raged through the afternoon.

A new danger arose with the incoming tide. It was feared the Europa would turn turtle. Neighboring docks were hastily evacuated and ship itself was given a wide berth.

All other vessels in the neighborhood were removed quickly to prevent a possible spread in their direction. Whether parts of the ship could be saved or not it was apparent early that the liner sections must, for practical purposes, be considered lost.

Cause of the fire had as yet not been determined. It spread with alarming rapidity, aided by strong winds, from the fore-cabin to the middle section of the liner. The fire department's work was greatly hampered by fog.

At 1:30 p. m. the Europa was still burning. It had not until its starboard rested on the ground.

One theory was that the fire was caused when a night watchman threw away a burning cigarette.

'Taps' Sounds for Foch; Whole World Mourns

AMERICAN GUNS BOOM TRIBUTE

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP).—Guns boomed at reveille from coast to coast today as the American army paid its last tribute to its one-time high commander, Marshal Foch of France.

Opening the ceremonies at each army post, 21-gun national salutes were fired, followed by single shots on the stroke of each succeeding half-hour through the day.

Flags at Army posts and all government buildings were lowered to half-staff for the funeral day. At noon in Washington at high requiem mass was arranged at the church of St. Paul, attended by Secretary Kellogg as representative of President Hoover, Secretary Good and General Summerall, chief of staff, and twenty generals of the army and other high ranking officers.

'JOKE' BANDITS AT BRADY ARE SEEKING BAIL

THREE OF YOUTHS WHO ROBBED BRADY BANK AFTER RELEASE

BRADY, Tex., March 26.—Three of the youthful quintet alleged to have robbed the Farmers and Merchants bank here last Thursday sought release on bail in applications to be heard here today.

Two of the group were granted heavy bail last yesterday, which was not accepted by defense counsel. R. C. Turner, asserted to have held a gun on his old school mate, Harold Johnson, assistant cashier of the bank, was granted bail of \$12,500, and Lucille Awall, one of three girls accused in the holdup, was allowed bail of \$8,000.

Others charged with the robbery are Coy Nigh, Billie Ballard and Irene Curtis.

Lola Smith, who said she was an unwitting participant in events immediately preceding and following the robbery and against whom no charges have been filed, told of movements of the sextet about the time of the robbery. She said she was seated in an automobile with the other three girls two doors from the bank, when Turner rushed up and threw a gun and money on the floor of their car. Then, she told the court, Turner went back to his own car, parked in front of the bank, started the motor and sped away.

The car Miss Smith was in, she related, was driven by Miss Awall. Miss Awall drove out about a mile on the San Angelo road, turned back, and on the outskirts of town, hid the money in a pile of tin cans, Miss Smith testified. The

COAST REBEL FORCE LOSES TO FEDERALS

CALLES TO BOTTLE UP INSURRECTOS IN SONORA STATE

(By Associated Press)
Defeat of the rebel troops besieging Mazatlan on the West Coast left the way clear for General Calles to bottle up the main body of the insurgents in the state of Sonora.

General Carrillo, defending commander at Mazatlan, reported that the rebels after a sanguinary defeat were in flight to the north, but insurgent headquarters at Juarez denied that the siege had been lifted.

The federal authorities placed the losses at Mazatlan at 58 rebel dead; 3 federal dead, 7 wounded.

To Stamp Out Revolt
General Calles' strategy is now to force the insurgents into Sonora and hold the revolution there until it can be stamped out.

The insurgents, however, claimed further outbreaks in central Mexico, stating 7,000 men are concentrating in Guanajuato for a march on Mexico City.

A battle at El Estero, northwestern Jalisco, was reported by the government which gave the casualties as 27 rebels and 6 federal killed.

'Lost Battalion' of 300 federal soldiers was wandering around near the Sonora-Jalisco border, but in danger of capture by the rebels.

General Almazan, leading one of Calles' main columns was moving northward to meet the insurgents and was concentrating at Bermejillo. The insurgents reported further southerly movements to check

FIFTY FROM LUBBOCK TAKE PART IN NEW TOWN FESTIVAL

Ten carloads of Lubbock citizens, including members of the Lubbock high school band, left shortly after 8 o'clock this morning for Dougherty, in Floyd county, newest of South Plains towns, which is today celebrating its "first birthday."

Garnett O. Reeves, assistant manager of the Board of City Development, was in charge of the party of 50 members of which will return here early this evening. Several thousand visitors from over the plains section, were expected to attend the numerous entertainment features planned.

Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college, was scheduled to make the address of the day, beginning at 1:30 p. m. Dr. Horn drove to Dougherty about 10 o'clock this morning and due to pressing business was to return this afternoon, immediately following his address.

Whiteside Given 20 Year Pen Term

HOUSTON, March 26 (AP).—Thomas P. Whiteside, Jr., Houston attorney, today was convicted of murder by a jury which fixed his sentence at 20 years.

Whiteside was indicted after the death of his wife in 1927. He was sentenced to an 18 year term but the court of criminal appeals reversed and remanded the case because the term "homicide" was used, and "homicide" is not an offense in Texas.

BOUNDARY ROW ON CITY LOTS

In an effort to settle boundary disputes on certain Lubbock residential lots, the civil suit of Mrs. Addie Jones versus W. B. Sides is on trial in the 99th district court today before Judge Clark M. Mullican.

According to testimony introduced in the case, each of the lots in the block contain only about 47 feet instead of the regulation fifty. Evidence shows that each property owner in the block has exceeded his property line by about three feet, and by the time the last man got his fifty feet, his entire garage was across the property line.

Two other civil cases, those of Baldrige versus the Railway company and Miller versus the Railway company, both scheduled for trial this week, were continued by agreement.

REPUBLICANS WILL CHANGE PARTY PLANS

REORGANIZATION FOR SOUTHERN STATES CONTEMPLATED

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 26.—Reorganization of the Republican party machinery in South Carolina, Georgia and Mississippi was decreed today by President Hoover as a result of disclosures in connection with the handling of federal patronage in those states.

Composition of the new party machinery in these states will be left to citizens there, but in the event of the failure of this plan, other steps will be taken by the national organization to set up an effective organization.

At the same time, the president disclosed that patronage recommendations from other states of the "Solid South" would be made by special committees which will cooperate with democrats who supported the republican ticket in the last presidential campaign.

The president's statement, made at his weekly press conference in reply to questions of correspondents, was regarded as ending the regime of Perry Howard, negro committee man for Mississippi, who is to stand trial next week on charges growing out of the handling of federal patronage in his state.

Some republican leaders also predicted that Joseph Tibert, national committeeman for South Carolina, might be asked to retire but there was no official information on the subject.

Prince Flies Back From Foch Funeral

CROYDON, England, Mar. 26 (AP).—The Prince of Wales arrived safely by plane from Le Bourget at 6 o'clock this evening, after attending the funeral of Marshal Foch as representative of King George.

The fog over the English channel was so thick the airplane in which he made the homeward flight had to be guided by directional wireless.

MOTHER KILLED AS DRY OFFICERS RAID ILLINOIS HOME; BOY TAKES UP BATTLE

AURORA, Ill., March 26.—A mother was shot and killed last night by county dry officers as she bent over her husband who had been knocked unconscious.

The third member of the family, a boy of 9, then took up the battle with six deputy sheriffs and wounded one in the leg before he could be disarmed.

The deputies said the woman was shot because they thought she was reaching for one of the guns her husband had dropped when he slumped to the floor after being hit with the butt of a deputy's pistol.

The slain woman was Mrs. Lillian Deking, 40. The man, who was shot, was Joseph Deking, 45. The son was Gerald Deking.

LOPEZ STARTS FOR GUATEMALA CAPITAL

ELLINGTON FIELD, Near Houston, Tex., March 26 (AP).—Major Oscar Morales Lopez, Guatemalan army officer, who is a student attached to the third attack group, aviation, of the United States army, stationed at Fort Crockett, Galveston, Texas, hopped off from Ellington Field this morning at 7:11 o'clock, central standard time, on a one stop flight to his country's capital, Guatemala City, Guatemala.

A slightly overcast sky greeted the aviator this morning at the takeoff. A quartering southeast wind of low intensity was not expected to impede his flight to any noticeable extent.

PRODUCE FROM REGION BEING SHIPPED TO ALL OF WORLD

DALLAS, March 26.—Plans for extension of its transportation system into new Texas and Oklahoma agricultural territories, on a scale to meet the mounting production of these districts, is occupying officials of the Santa Fe system, F. B. Houghton, Chicago, vice president of the company, said in Dallas today.

He has been touring the Santa Fe lines in West Texas two weeks with J. S. Hershey, general freight agent at Galveston, and found the outlook promising for record-breaking yields in every line of diversified farming in that section he said.

"The most substantial agricultural territory on our whole system is the South Plains country," Mr. Houghton said. "From Lubbock Plainview, Floydada, Lamesa, Muleshoe, Seagraves and other points are shipping butter and dairy

MURDER SEEN WHEN FLAMES KILL FAMILY

MOTHER AND KIDDIES PERISH AS HOME IS BURNED

(By Associated Press)
TOLEDO, Ohio, March 26.—The deaths of Mrs. Gaylord Steger, 23, and her three small children, discovered after fire had partly destroyed their home here, were under investigation of county authorities today in the belief they were slain and the house was fired to conceal the crime.

The bodies were discovered after fire fighters had concentrated their efforts on extinguishing the flames in the belief that the Stegers were not at home. Mrs. Steger lay in the dining room, and across her body Gaylord, Jr., 5, was found. Krefl said the boy had been beaten over the head. Howard, 4, was discovered with two gashes in his forehead at a window, and Rose Marie, one year old, lay in a partly burned bed which authorities said had been saturated with kerosene.

Steger returned to his home just after the fire was put out. He said he had seen the afternoon some distance away.

No Trace Of Slaton Negro Is Discovered

No trace has been found of Archie Searcy, negro, of Slaton, wanted for the murder of his wife in that city early last week, members of the sheriff's department announced today.

Searcy is charged with slaying his wife's throat when he found Willie "Cornbread" Edwards, another negro, at home with her. Edwards was seriously cut with a knife and by window glass when he made a hasty exit through a closed window.

Sheriff Wade Hardy made a search of a field in the vicinity of Slaton Sunday after it was reported that the negro had been seen there. Another search has been made in the canyon north of Slaton.

Farm Credit Will Be Made Stable

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP).—A plan for extension of banking credit to agriculture was formulated today by officials of seven farm cooperative marketing associations who conferred in an all-day study of the farm relief legislative program.

The rural credit program was agreed upon by the cooperative organizations which then presented it to a joint meeting with representatives of the National Grange, the American Farm Bureau Federation and the National Farmers Union.

IMPEACHMENT FIRE FLARES OUT IN HOUSE

CHARGE LONG SOUGHT TO HIRE KILLING OF LEGISLATOR

(By Associated Press)
BATON ROUGE, La., Mar. 26.—Governor Huey P. Long of Louisiana was charged with attempting "to hire and induce one H. A. Bozeman to kill and murder one J. Y. Sanders, Jr.," a member of the Louisiana House of Representatives, in an impeachment resolution drafted for presentation today in the Legislature.

The charge was made in the last of nineteen counts contained in the resolution and was based on a sworn affidavit of H. A. (Battling) Bozeman, former personal attendant of Governor Long and former employee of the Louisiana highway commission.

In his affidavit Bozeman swore that about five weeks ago Governor Long, called him into his office and said he was planning to call an extra session of legislature and that Representative J. Y. Sanders, Jr., would oppose all of his measures.

"I have chosen you to do away with this (epithet)," Bozeman quoted the governor as saying. "I mean for you to kill the (epithet). Leave him in the ditch where nobody will know how or when he got there," the affidavit said.

Promised Him Pardon
"I'm governor of this state, and if you were to be found out, I would give you a full pardon and many gold dollars," the ex-governor further quoted the governor.

The impeachment resolution was prepared by a committee composed of Representatives Clark Hughes of Bossier parish, Paul Chaze of New Orleans and Representative Nathan Spencer of Tallulah, Madison parish. The resolution was to be introduced by a spokesman of the committee leading the fight against the governor.

The resolution was prepared by a group of lawyers, who labored over it all night. When the house meets an effort will be made to reorganize the body to depose Speaker John Fournot, whose attempt last night to adjourn the house sine die was blocked by anti-administration forces, who used their fists to get control of the assembly.

The resolutions of impeachment included these charges: That he has used the appointive

ENROLLMENT AT NEW PEAK

TOTAL OF 5282 NOW IN CITY SCHOOLS OF LUBBOCK

A total enrollment of 5282 was reported in Lubbock schools at the close of the seventh month of the Superintendent M. H. Duncan. This represented an increase of approximately 300 students from February 22 to March 22.

Government forces. Federal air raids at the rebel stronghold of Jimenez were reported. Several truckloads of federal troops passed through Yuma, Arizona, and strengthened the loyal garrison at Naco, drawing a protest from Governor Phillips of Arizona who announced further movements of that sort would be prevented. The insurgents meanwhile continued marching on Naco and were reported 10 miles from the town. Mexico City estimates place the number of federal troops in the field at 35,000 and the insurgents at about 9,000, including regulars plus an unknown number of irregulars.

WEST COAST ARMY RETREATS TO NORTH
MEXICO CITY, March 26 (AP)—The West Coast Army was in precipitous flight northward today after abandonment of its attack on Mazatlan. General Jaime Carrillo commanding federal forces there, reported to the government. His retreat followed a message to the embassy from William P. Blocher, American consul at Mazatlan, that the five-day attack on the city had ceased and the rebels were in retreat with the federal forces in command of the situation.

BORDER INTEREST IN REVOLUTION ASTIR
JUAREZ, Chihuahua, Mexico, March 26 (AP)—Communications telling of more alleged revolutionary outbreaks in central Mexico, the bombing of Jimenez, Chihuahua, by federal aviators, and of plans for a rebel attack upon the loyal stronghold of Naco, Sonora, intensified border interest today in the revolutionary situation. General J. Gonzalo Escobar, rebel commander-in-chief, announced here last night he had received advice saying 7,000 men were being concentrated in the state of Guanajuato for a march on Mexico City. Escobar said three trains had been dynamited and that communication between Mexico City and northern points was being interrupted. He declared 300 members of the 6th federal regiment had been wiped out; that Manzanillo, west coast port, and Uruapan, Michoacan, had been occupied by the rebels and that Tehuantepec, in southern Mexico, had been attacked by revolutionaries.

A courier brought word to El Paso that federal airplanes had bombed the rebel stronghold at Jimenez, six civilians having been reported wounded.

DESTROYER ARRIVES AT MANZANILLO
SAN-DIEGO, Calif., March 26 (AP)—The arrival of the United States destroyer Robert Smith at Manzanillo, Mexico, was announced here last night at naval headquarters. The Robert Smith left here Saturday morning and was said to have covered the 1,100 miles to Manzanillo in 48 hours.

AMERICAN BEATEN BY JUAREZ-REBELS
EL PASO, Texas, March 26 (AP)—Exhibiting five broad welts on his back, George Williams, an American citizen living in El Paso last night told of having been beaten by rebel soldiers in Juarez, across the border from here, because they claimed he had "insulted the revolutionary movement."

Williams said he was in a Juarez restaurant and made a remark about "the foolishness of the revolution."

Okeh Bevin, eastern aviator, Bevin took off from Metropolitan airport at 5:53:30 p. m. yesterday. To break the non-stop record of 18 hours, 21 minutes and 59 seconds set by Captain Frank Hawks and his mechanic, Harry Grubb, last February 8, Bevin had to set his ship down on Roosevelt Field, Long Island, at 3:15:25 p. m. today. Special equipment in the little orange and black Lockheed monoplane enables Bevin to keep the oil and gas pressure up while in the air. A gasoline pump was installed at his side so he could force fuel from tanks in the fuselage behind him into the wing tanks above. Seven gallons of lubricating oil were placed in the bottom of the cockpit so Bevin could pour them into a funnel leading to the oil tank. The plane carried 300 gallons of gas at the take off. For rations Bevin took only three cheese sandwiches and a quart of water. Just before he was ready to start he jumped out of the plane, ran to a store at the field and bought three packages of chewing gum. Bevin planned to follow the great

circle route across the country, which take him over Albuquerque, N. M., Ashland and Wichita, Kan., Charleston, Ill., Terre Haute, Ind., Columbus, Ohio, Pittsburgh and eastern Pennsylvania.

power in an attempt to influence the judiciary and has publicly boasted he controls the judiciary. That while governor he has bribed or attempted to bribe a member of the state legislature. That he has, through himself and through boards controlled by him, wasted, misused, misapplied and misappropriated funds and property of the state.

Used Military Power
That he has subordinated civil authority to the military and as commander-in-chief has attempted to impose his own will, through the militia, as superior to the courts without declaring martial law causing the militia to loot and pillage private property and to take from the person of certain individuals their private property and destroy private property without due process of law.

That he, while governor, has been guilty of gross misconduct in public places and particularly that on or about February 12, 1929, in New Orleans, he "did participate in an entertainment where intoxicating liquor was served, at which entertainment the said Huey P. Long did depict himself in a scandalous and indecorous manner."

That he has publicly flouted the constitution of the United States and of the state and has usurped to himself the powers of the legislature and of the committees and has on occasions commanded the breaking of the quorum of committees with the purpose of preventing the consideration of legislation by these committees.

That he while governor, while in the city of Baton Rouge, and in the Parish of East Baton Rouge, La., did "attempt to hire and induce one H. A. Bozeman to kill and murder one J. K. Sanders, jr., a member of the house of representatives of the state of Louisiana, as shown and set forth in the sworn statement of H. A. Bazeman, March 25, 1929."

NANKING, China, March 26 (AP)—It was authoritatively learned today that President Chiang Kai-Shek has signed a punitive mandate against the Kwangsi military clique. Its issuance was expected tonight.

Waters Creep Into Nashville Streets

NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 26 (AP)—Waters from the Cumberland river crept into the business and residential sections of Nashville today toward a predicted crest of 50 feet. The record stage is 56.2 reached during 1927. The river front section of Nashville is dotted with homes, business houses and ware rooms. Ready residents in Northeast Nashville were leaving their homes, and should the river reach 50 feet at least 1,000 families would be forced out.

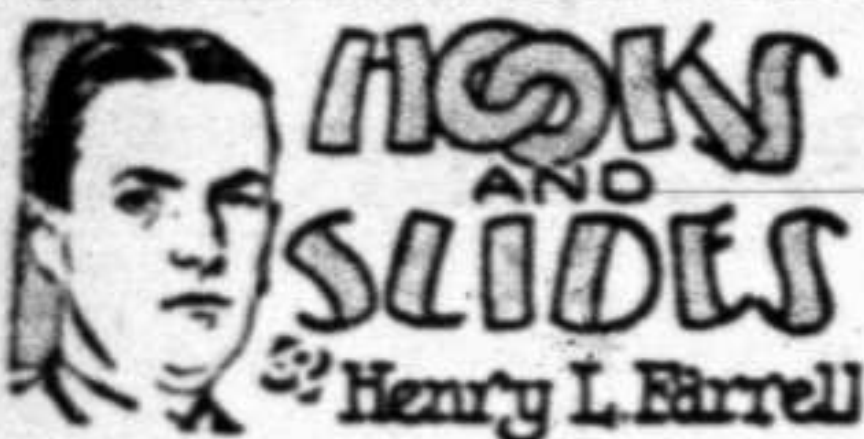

LOT OF LUCK NEEDED

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 26.—The 500 horse power motor of Gar Wood's "Miss America VII" have boosted the world's water speed record approximately two tenths of a mile an hour.

FEDERAL BOAT ACTED WITHIN RIGHTS, STATEMENT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 26.—The treasury department is standing squarely back of its coast guard service in defense of the sinking of the British schooner I'm Alone in the Gulf of Mexico Friday by the patrol boat Dexter.

Forwarding the first official report of the incident to the state department, Secretary Mellon has taken the position that the Dexter was within its rights in firing upon the rum runner when its master refused to leave to after a "continuous pursuit" about 200 miles into the Gulf from a point "Within Four Leagues" of our coast.

Increasingly doubtful the same view will be taken by the British and Canadian governments. Their diplomatic representatives here are awaiting an opportunity to examine the official reports from the coast guard and the British consulate at New Orleans, where the crew of the sunken vessel was landed. If these confirm current newspaper accounts of the sinking, in which one British seaman was drowned, they are expected to take a serious view of the incident.

Built As Rum Runner
Although it operated under Canadian registry, the I'm Alone is described in official circles here as having been built especially for rum-running by an American bootlegger now in prison at Boston.

During the last five years, Mr. Mellon said in a memorandum on the coast guard's position, the vessel "has made a very large number of false clearances from British ports." Before it was sunk by the Dexter, he declared, "The master of the I'm Alone had a pistol and

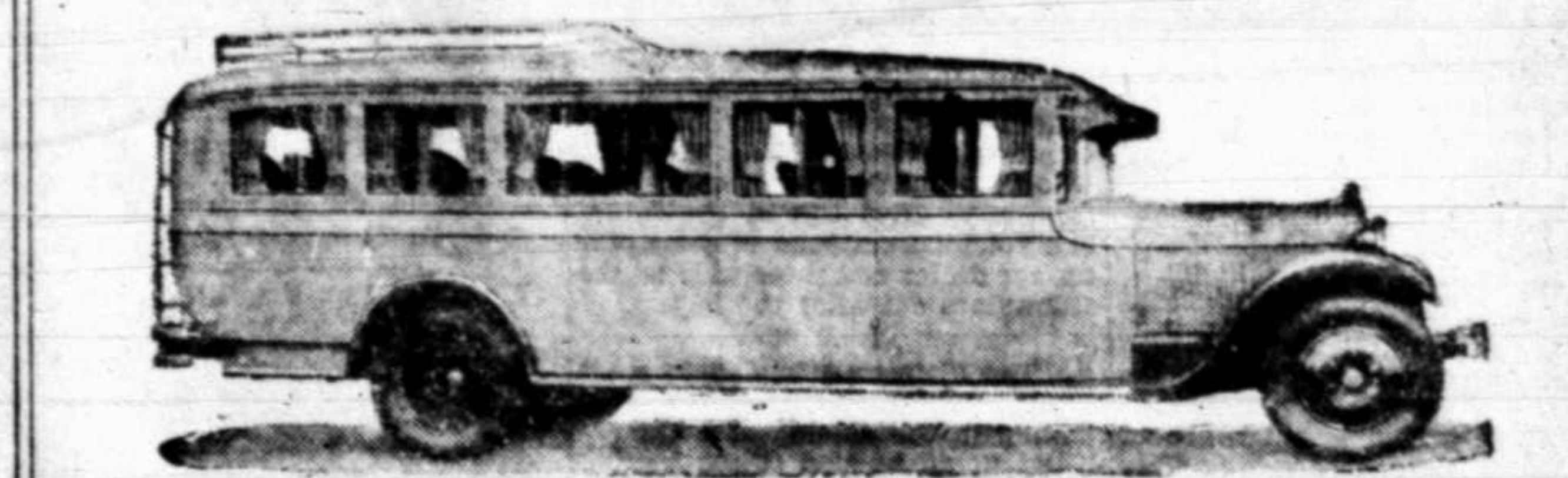

COTTON SHOWS GOOD ADVANCE

MARKET RESPONDS TO RELATIVELY FIRM CABLE REPORTS

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, March 26.—Cotton opened steady at an advance of 10 to 12 points in response to relatively firm cable reports. May sold up to 20.82 and the new October to 20.10, or about 10 to 15 points net higher on covering combined with moderate trade and commission house demand.

This bulge met resistance. There also seemed to be some Southern selling, which eased prices slightly. The outlook for showers in Eastern belt created uncertainty as to whether the first half hour.

The market was quiet later, with prices easing off under further liquidation and some Wall Street or local selling which may have been influenced by the action of the stock market. May declined to 20.72 and the new October contract to 20.00, or about ten points from the high levels of the morning, with the general market ruling about net unchanged to 6 points higher at midday.

LIVERPOOL CABLES BETTER THAN DUE

NEW ORLEANS, March 26 (AP).—The cotton market opened firm owing to Liverpool cables coming in much better than due. First trades showed gains of 8 to 29 points. The market continued to improve on trade buying and covering by shorts. May advancing to 20.06, July to 20.12 and October to 19.93, or 14 to 16 points above yesterday's close. Towards the end of the first hour the market was quieter and prices showed losses of 3 to 4 points in the early high.

Prices broke sharply later under pressure of liberal selling promoted by reports of progress in planting in South Texas, weakness in stocks and a reported further advance in call money. Values sold off rapidly until May traded to 19.76, July 19.81 and October to 19.58, or 39 to 35 points down from the highs and 13 to 21 points under yesterday's close. At noon the market was active but weak and at or near the lows.

CRUDE OUTPUT HAS INCREASE

DOWNWARD TREND TO PRODUCTION IS CURTAILED

(By Associated Press)
TULSA, Okla., March 26.—Adding approximately 13,728 barrels of light oil and 5,694 barrels of heavy oil daily, the total producing areas in the United States during the week ending March 23, halted a downward trend in production and showed an estimated daily average production of 2,650,941 barrels, 19,422 more than the estimate for March 16, according to the current report of the Oil and Gas Journal.

Despite proration in effect in the Greater Seminole area, Oklahoma fields added 27,705 barrels daily. West Texas lost 3,040 barrels. The total Mid-Continent production increased 25,226 barrels. California decreased 19,750 barrels. Gulf coast, Southwest Texas, Eastern and Rocky Mountain areas all reported increases.

BRUNER PRODUCER IS COMPLETED

DALLAS, March 26 (AP).—The Humble Oil and Refining company's No. 5 Moses and Baggett in the Bruner field near Luling has been completed, the flow gauging around 5,000 barrels daily. The well is remarkable in that it is an offset of the No. 4 well in the same tract which had to be plugged back to prevent it from becoming filled with water although it lacks eight feet of being as deep as the No. 5 producer.

Pipe lines runs of oil from the Bruner field in Cooke county reached 4,300 barrels daily last week, the peak production in the history of the field.

NACO, Sonora, Mexico, March 26 (AP).—General Lucas Gonzalez, in command of the federal garrison here, is not convinced that the rebels, if they eventually come down out of the hills, really will fight. General Fausto Topete, at Rebel base headquarters in Cananea, Sonora, has expressed doubt that the Federals at Naco will put up a determined battle.

There is a good deal of previous friendship and clashing of motives entering into the situation. General Topete is a friend of General Gonzalez. They have campaigned together. Lieutenant Colonel Guerrero a six foot two inch black-bearded gentleman, who holds authority to sign passports for persons wishing to pass to and from rebel-held Cananea, is to General Gonzalez, "Mi Amigo." General Gonzalez learned for the first time today that Guerrero is ranged against him at Cananea.

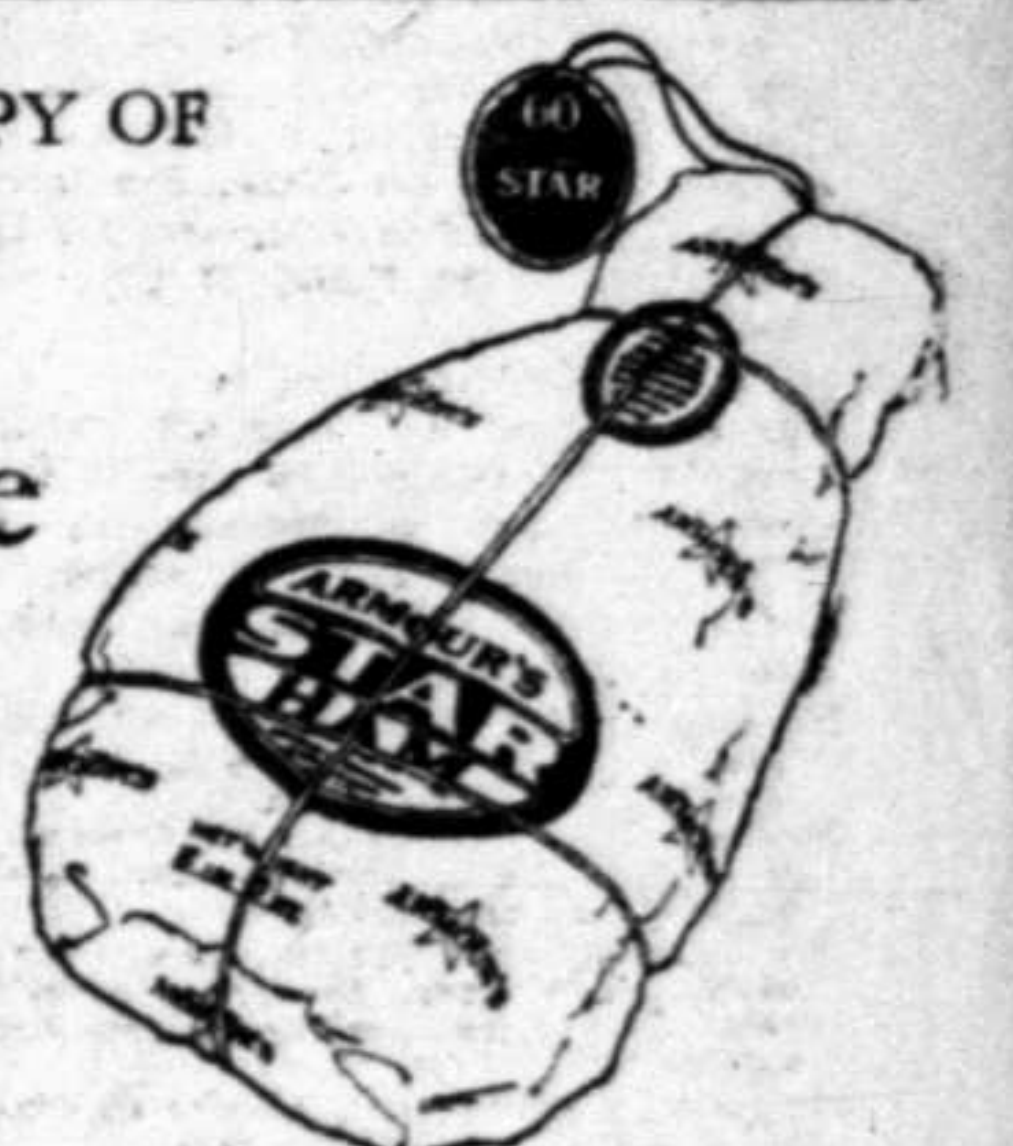

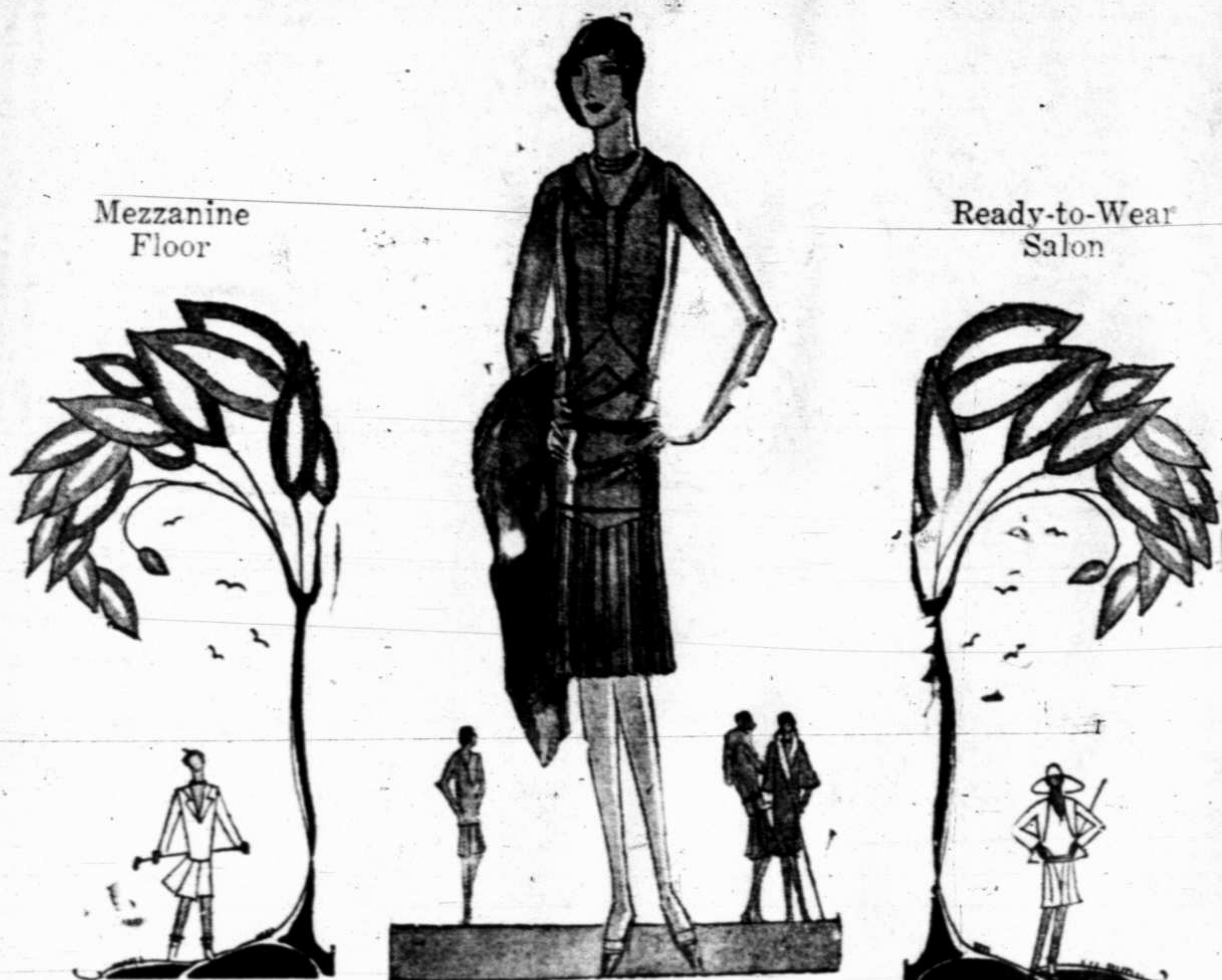

SNOWSLIDES BURY FOUR IN COLORADO

DENVER, March 26 (AP)—Snowslides today had snuffed out at least four lives, bottled up the story of an attempted slaying and suicide, and isolated a half dozen villages along the Continental Divide in Colorado.

Four men, trapped as they slept, were crushed to death yesterday when a slide crashed down a mountain and buried their cabin near Gunnison. The mining settlement of the Empire Chief mine, where the men were employed, was wiped out, but others in the camp heard the roar of the slide in time to escape. From the village of Naturita came meager details of the attempted slaying of John G. Blake, 60-year-old pioneer of that vicinity, by Mrs. Alice Scott, who committed suicide by taking poison. It was learned Scott was shot through the lungs.
